HEADMASTER'S ADDRESS



MR MALCOLM WILLIAMS

'To infinity and beyond.'

Good evening, Guest of Honour, Simon Hurry, Chief Executive Mr Mike Greeff and Mrs Greeff, Chair of the Board Mr Cleo Artemides and Mrs Artemides, Chair of Foundation Trustees Mr Robin Smith and Mrs Smith, members of staff, parents and the gentlemen of St David's.

It was with these words from Buzz Lightyear that I shook you from your reverie as I ended my address at last year's Speech Evening. I suspect my shout and clenched fist had something to do with it. Heroes, real or imagined, are larger than life figures who seem to achieve impossible feats.

On 14 October, 65 years to the day after American pilot Chuck Yeager broke the sound barrier for the first time, the world witnessed another heroic feat. "Fearless Felix" Baumgartner stepped out into the very thin air 39 kms above the earth's surface. A freefall of 4 minutes 22 seconds followed and he reached 1 342 kms per hour, becoming the first skydiver to break the speed of sound. Other records tumbled also. Of course this was a PR coup for Red Bull. 30 cameras were part of the filming of the event and the jump was timed to co-incide with European primetime TV viewing. 7 000 000 people watched on UTube, 130 digital outlets carried the live feed. Many of you watched, I'm sure.

What I liked was his comment soon afterwards: "When I was standing there on top of the world, you become so humble; you are not thinking about breaking records anymore; you are not thinking about gaining scientific data – the only think you want to do is come back alive. Sometimes we have to get really high to see how small we are." I was impressed by this humility from a man who had just boldly gone where none has gone before.

The world mourned the death of another of my childhood heroes in August, Neil Armstrong. He is remembered not only because of achieving the unthinkable - to walk on the moon - but also for how he went about things. He was chosen to be the first person on the moon

not only because he was Commander of the Lunar Module but also because he was seen as not having an ego. Friends and colleagues paid homage to him after his death, focusing on these qualities. They described him as a reluctant American hero who delivered a moment of human achievement that will never be forgotten. He shied away from public attention and stopped giving autographs when he found these were being used fraudulently to con people out of their money. He was remembered thus by one of his friends: "Neil will always be remembered for taking humankind's first small step on a world beyond our own, but it was the courage, grace and humility he displayed throughout his life that lifted him above the stars."

Sadly, some of our heroes have feet of clay and they crumble much like Ozymandias in Shelley's sonnet. When this happens the sense of disappointment is overwhelming. I remember my disbelief at the revelations of Hansie Cronje's involvement in match fixing, and his fall from grace before his tragic death in a plane accident. Our sports icons are in many ways our heroes, our role models, our modern gladiators.

I have had that same empty feeling over the past two weeks with the release of the USADA statement on Lance Armstrong, and his subsequent banning from cycling and his being stripped of his Tour de France titles. My interest in the Tour de France stems from his incredible story and his courageous battle with cancer. Two moments stand out for me in his various wins. In one, his handle bar was caught by a spectator and he crashed spectacularly. As is tradition, the leaders waited for him and he got back on his bike and continued with an incredible ride to regain his pole position. The other was when he broke away on a tough mountain stage and literally rode the other riders into the ground. I happened to be watching that piece live and I was fascinated by the absolute courage and endeavour I witnessed during that half hour. At the time many experts claimed his achievement was not possible but I was deaf to these calls – I know I did not want to listen or have my image of Armstrong tarnished. Now the evidence is overwhelming – a thousand pages, the sworn testimony of 26 people, including 15 riders and a network of use and distribution including trips in unmarked cars and the like. It certainly reads like a Hollywood thriller. Armstrong has brought new meaning to Nike's phrase "Just do it".

The most worrying thing is that Lance Armstrong never tested positive bar one possible occasion, which means he must have successfully masked his usage or there was other skulduggery. Are the winners the ones who are clever enough to avoid detection? Do I carry on taking an interest in such events? Most worrying for me though is the sense that everybody does it, that we should not be shocked because 'that's the way it is'. It is alleged young riders and others were pressured into participating also.

It is quite clear why Nike and other sponsors have severed all ties with Armstrong. Clearly he lost the plot. Of course what is most sad is that Lance Armstrong is a man who has done many good things also, such as the Livestrong Foundation which he has stepped down from. He will not be remembered for this and other good deeds.

We acknowledge the pressure, even at school, for you to give of your best, to aim for success. Yes, but not at any cost. The end does not justify the means. School is a relatively protected environment but you are also in your formative years. How you do things is a key part of equipping you for the future. Our goal is to prepare you to be able to become an active member of your community, to use your opportunities to lead, to make a difference. This is part of real success.

Dr Mamphela Ramphele, founder of 'Citizens Movement for Change', speaks of the need for us to become citizens rather than subjects,

for us to know the constitution and to know the foundations of our society, and to exercise our rights and responsibilities. She speaks of our need to understand the meaning of active citizenship rather than merely going about our business for personal and financial gain.

One person who has made a tremendous impression and is an example of active citizenship is a young girl who from the age of 11 wrote a blog under a pen name for the BBC about living under the rule of the Pakistan Taliban. Her name is Malala Yousafzai and her campaign has focused on the right to education for girls. She is now 14 and she has received Pakistan's highest civilian prize. On the 10th of this month, as you may know, she survived an assassination attempt on her life while sitting on a school bus. She was seriously injured and is still in hospital having undergone a number of operations. The world has been outraged by this cowardly act. Archbishop Desmond Tutu summed it up: "I can't imagine how anyone can justify harming a child for what they consider to be political reasons because they want women to be subjugated", he said at a press conference. Her comment in a recent interview from her hospital bed was that she would not change anything were she to have her time again, so clear is she on the merits of her cause. Here is an example of how moral courage and leadership go hand in hand, (and how global technology and social media can be a force for good by giving people like Malala Yousafzai a voice on the world stage).

We shall continue to grow our leadership and personal development programmes, which are values-based. It is on this foundation that we shall be able to make a contribution as active citizens in our community.

St David's is 71 years young this year and it has been another 12 months of fine achievements. We have had our difficult moments and challenges and we have faced these, overcome them and learned from them. The School's achievements continue to be founded on the passion and commitment of the staff and the boys to step up and give of their best, something evident in all areas. This is not an evening about giving a synopsis of the year but I have mentioned some of my own recollections and good moments.

On the academic front we continue to make our mark in Olympiads and other external benchmarking competitions, including 1st place nationally in the Royal Science of South Africa Essay Competition, 4th place in the National Accounting Olympiad, a Gold medal in the English Olympiad and our top two places in the Junior section of the Tour de Maths competition. We believe our 2012 Matrics will do themselves and the School proud in their final examinations.

"Return to the Forbidden Planet" brought all sorts of sci-fi monsters onto the stage, a Roy Orbison look-alike band and someone on the stage sprouting feelers. The energy and quality of the Choir, Jazz Bands and Marimba Bands have been enjoyed by all and our boys continue to perform with distinction provincially and nationally in the area of Oratory. Our Chess men are again on the up.

On the sporting front, our Swimming teams remain dominant and our Water Polo squads have made good progress. Our 1st XI Cricket squad enjoyed one of their best seasons with the Under 16A Cricketers also making their mark. The 1st Team Tennis remain in the Premier League and our Orienteering, Cross Country and Canoeing teams have done well, while our Climbers have certainly made their mark. Our Hockey, Rugby and Soccer sections have enjoyed fine seasons. Individuals have achieved at provincial and at national level across all of our sports codes.

Mention must be made of three boys who achieved 100 1st XI caps in Hockey and two who achieved 50+ caps for the 1st XV Rugby – no mean feat in anyone's book. It must be remembered that the success of individuals is based on the performance of all of those around

them in the teams that they have played for. Our St David's Soccer and Twenty 20 Cricket Festivals remain top events in the schooling calendar, drawing high quality fields from across the country. Our Future Problem Solvers, our Scuba Divers, our Hikers and our State Presidents' Award men all continue to develop in their areas.

The area of Service in the School continues to enjoy steady growth, in support of national drives such as the Blood Drive and Shavathons, what has become the annual Outreach Tour to the Eastern Cape, sports programmes, and the weekly activities co-ordinated by Mr Fry and Mrs Marais.

Active involvement is central to the success of the School and this year's Matric group have reflected this in all areas. Many have put the hard work in on the training fields – they have shown their 'love of work' in this area at least! Many have been involved across a range of areas and they and the School have benefitted hugely from their efforts. Most importantly, they have led - on the Executive, in particular sports and activities, in their Houses, in portfolios and as mentors. We shall continue to focus on giving all our senior boys the opportunity to develop their leadership skills, guided by the values and principles on which our School is based.

The principled leadership of Ryan Skirving and Reynard van Zyl has made its mark this year. With the School in the spotlight of the media, you were able to acknowledge errors made, apologise and then seek to move forward constructively. The response from the boys was to rally behind you and commit themselves to eradicating practises not in keeping with our ethos. At the same time, yours has not been a soft and fuzzy approach. You have led by example, by demanding high standards of yourselves and the School and giving no quarter when the pressure was on. I have valued your counsel and input on a range of issues and your direct and open manner in discussing matters of importance. Your passion for and commitment to your School is unquestioned and you have earned your respect through your genuine concern for the needs of others. Thank you Ryan and Reynard for your leadership of the Executive Matric Leadership Group and the School this year.

St David's remains an invigorating and energised education environment and I have as colleagues members of staff who seek new horizons and better ways of doing things and who go the extra mile as a matter of course for the benefit of those in their charge.

My thanks to the staff and the parents for their ongoing support, in particular David Smith, Nick Clogg and Alan Redfern.

Thank you also to Mike Greeff, Rick Wilson, Board Chair Cleo Artemides, Vice Chair Mark Bussin and members of the Board for their counsel and support.

In closing, I return to one of those heroes I mentioned earlier. Neil Armstrong's family released the following statement following his death: "While we mourn the loss of a very good man, we also celebrate his remarkable life and hope that it serves as an example to young people around the world to work hard to make their dreams come true, to be willing to explore and push the limits and to selflessly serve a cause greater than themselves. For those who may ask what they can do to honour Neil we have a simple request: honour his example of service, accomplishment and modesty and the next time you walk outside on a clear night and see the moon smiling down at you, think of Neil Armstrong and give him a wink."

STAFF NEWS

2012 saw the School benefiting from the appointment of a number of talented staff bringing their own range of skills; both academically and extramurally.

Mr Chris Luke (B Mus, UCT) joined us as Head of Music and Drama. A professional musician, Mr Luke has brought a vibrancy and energy to his department in the School. He has formed a dynamic team with Mr Jaco Ferreira (BA, Stellenbosch), who joined us from Sterkspruit Christian School in the Eastern Cape to teach Drama and Music at Junior level as well as Computer Applications Technology. Drama has also grown through Mr Ferreira's input, and Drama will be offered as a Matric subject from 2014.

Mr Kyle Biller, one of our Intern Students and a St David's Old Boy, completed his BEd Degree in 2011, and joined the Staff complement in the Maths Department on a full-time basis. He has already added significant value in the Swimming Section, having coached the team previously while working as an intern.

Mr Jonny Mallett (BA, PGCE, Rhodes) joined us to teach Geography and assist with Physical Education. Mr Mallett has a number of years of experience as a professional Rugby player and has coached Water Polo and Rugby at Primary, High School and Tertiary level. Mr Mallett was involved with the coaching of the 1st XV Rugby, and he will again take up this role in 2013.

Mr Vincent Gelderbloem was appointed as Head of Accounting from 1 March 2012. Mr Gelderbloem joined us from Dale College in the Eastern Cape, where he had been Head of Accounting for the past five years, and he also has a number of years of experience as a Housemaster of one of the boarding houses. Mr Gelderbloem has made a positive impact extramurally, and was appointed Housemaster of The Bishops from January 2013.

Mrs Ruth Stewart joined us from 1 February when she came in to replace Mrs Barbeli who went on Maternity Leave. Mrs Stewart is an experienced Senior English teacher and we were pleased to have an educator of her calibre take over Mrs Barbeli's classes. Mrs Barbeli returned on a part-time basis for Term 3; Mrs Stewart was then appointed in a full-time capacity from January 2013.

Ms Jacqui Aires joined us on 1 May in the English Department in place of Ms Cambitzis. Ms Aires holds BA (Unisa), BA Hons (RAU) and MA (Wits) degrees and added significant value to her department over Term 2 and Term 3, as well as on the Cultural front. We are very pleased that Ms Aires will be continuing with us in 2013.

Ms Bridget Kee was appointed to the staff as a Life Orientation teacher from 1 May 2012. Ms Kee holds a B Social Science Degree from UCT and a PGCE from UNISA with majors in Life Orientation and Geography. She has a number of years of teaching experience, most recently at St Mary's DSG in Durban. Ms Kee has also played sport at provincial level as well as having coached up to tertiary level. She is also assisting with sports administration at the school.

Mr Sandile Khuluse joined us from Michaelhouse as Head of isiZulu in May. Mr Khuluse added value in the isiZulu Department and we were sorry that due to his personal circumstances he had to leave us at the end of 2012.

On the part-time front, Ms Arienn Botha took up a position, teaching Visual Arts at Junior level. Ms Botha helped us out temporarily until August when Mrs Monique van Rooyen joined us to assist with Visual Arts. Mrs van Rooyen was a previous Head of Visual Arts at Bryanston High and is an experienced Senior Art teacher; she continues with us in 2013. Mrs Joan Sole joined us for one year, in a part-time capacity, in the isiZulu Department. Mrs Sole's decision to move back into teaching full-time necessitated her leaving us.

A number of long-serving staff left us during 2012, some moving into the commercial world – a loss to the teaching profession.

Mr Will van den Berg left us during Term 1 after 10 years. Under his leadership, the Accounting Department maintained a high level of performance. The success of the department was reflected in the boys' achievements in the Accounting Olympiads over the years, as well as the excellent IEB Examination results. At Cluster level he made his mark. His involvement beyond the classroom included his quiet, effective management of aspects such as textbooks and stationery, the management of Tennis teams, his assistance with Major Productions and he was the High School representative on the PTA. Mr van den Berg was always very professional in all that he did, and he was held in high regard. He left the school to study for his MBA and subsequently to move back into the corporate world.

Mr Dion Libera left us at the end of Term 1. In his two years as Head of Life Orientation he created a department where the areas of Guidance, Religious Education and Physical Education have been blended effectively. The result has been a Grade 8 to Grade 12 curriculum set at appropriate levels with comprehensive workbooks outlining the programme for each year; the "One Research Project" has also been implemented successfully and will be continued by the Life Orientation Department. Mr Libera also assisted in the Geography Department and was fully involved in Golf and Rugby. Mr Libera left us to take up a position at St John's College, his alma mater.

After 6 years on the staff at St David's, Mr Iain Busschau resigned at the end of Term 1 to take up a position in the business world. As an Old Boy of St David's, Mr Busschau has had a longstanding association with the School. Mr Busschau's contribution to the School has been significant in the teaching of Religious Education, Guidance and Physical Education. His contribution beyond the classroom has been immense. Extramurally he was involved in Cricket and Hockey, and provided much administrative support in extramurals as his involvement spanned tours and festivals as well as a range of functions where he contributed. Beyond that he worked with the Spirit Portfolio in guiding the boys and assisting at big events. Mr Busschau has also been fully involved in the managing of the Chapel as well as providing support to the Religious Education staff on a regular basis. Mr Busschau always placed the interests of the boys first and many have benefitted from his input. His contribution to the School is valued and appreciated. We are very sorry that Mr Busschau decided to leave the profession and move into the corporate world.

Ms Suzanne Cambitzis left us at the end of Term 1. In her 11 years at St David's she made a significant contribution to the School, particularly in the areas of English and the Cultural life of the School. Ms Cambitzis is a highly regarded English teacher. She developed the academic footprint of the School in her subject and was involved in the IEB as a marker and oral moderator. At Cluster level, she was part of the AP English Pilot before it was introduced and has since been successfully implemented at St David's. Ms Cambitzis has a tremendous breadth of knowledge and a passion for English that permeates all that she does. Extramurally her main areas of involvement have been in Debating and Public Speaking and there is no doubt that these have developed under her guidance and expertise. The School has excelled at provincial and national level in these activities under her mentorship. Nonetheless, Ms Cambitzis's forte is the classroom and she always set very high standards for herself and those that she taught. In his key area of Extramurals, the School valued Mr Redfern's strong sense of fairness, his consistent approach on matters of policy, his firm line on disciplinary matters, and his high expectations of the boys. Above all, we thank him for his tremendous commitment to the School during his time at St David's. We wish him and his family well with their move to Grahamstown.

We congratulate the following staff on their appointments:

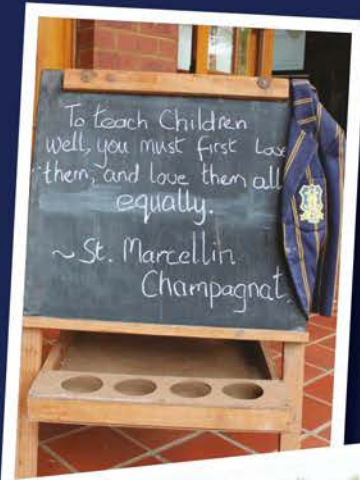

HEAD PREFECT'S ADDRESS

Good evening Mr Hurry, Mr and Mrs Greef, Mr and Mrs Williams, Mr and Mrs Artemides, honoured guests, members of staff, parents and the men of St David's.

It is surprisingly difficult to reflect on the 13 years I and some other matrics have had at St David's. There are so many memories and experiences that they all almost seem to blur together. This year alone has produced many great memories; but in particular, I really enjoyed our cultural tour to England, and remember the attempts of 2 guys, who shall remain nameless, to sneak out and how their plan failed when they set off the emergency alarms in the hotel. The Matric Dance was another big highlight this year. I think the MDC did an excellent job with the theme and décor but what stood out for me was the atmosphere amongst the matrics. Everyone was there to have a good time, and we were relaxed and happy to be together as a group. We even got a very memorable dancing demonstration from one of the IT teachers.

Thank you for listening to us and for considering what we say and generally for treating us like adults.

Thank you to all the teachers, coaches and assistants. There are too many to name individually, but thank you for giving us a fantastic holistic education which sets us apart as Marist men.

My parents also deserve a very big thank you. You have always been there to help, support and advise me. You have a lot of experience between you, and I have definitely benefitted from that this year. Thank you for always being there for me when I need you.

To all my teammates from Water Polo, Swimming and Hockey, and to my friends, thank you for a fantastic year.

Often in assemblies, we hear about the concept of a 'Matric Leadership Group', and to be honest, in the younger grades, I never truly understood what that concept meant. This year, however, has shown me exactly what that reality means. When the matrics are united and driven, they can achieve excellent results. The Matric Leadership Group is infinitely more powerful and influential than a few guys on the Executive. To the matric class of 2013, keep that in mind. Our School is in your hands now. Only you, along with the younger grades, can ensure that our school remains one of the top schools in the country.

Society in general is changing. When our parents were at school, they weren't allowed to use calculators, but we take ours for granted. St David's is changing as well, for example, when we were in Grade 8, we did not have the option of handing in projects electronically, whereas this year, we have submitted many of our projects over Moodle. One of the biggest advantages of this is that previously, when a project was due for, Wednesday, we had to have it ready by the time we went to school that morning. Now however, thanks to Moodle, the project is usually due for about 11:58 on the Wednesday night, because we wouldn't want to leave things to the last minute!

While doing research for a project this year, I read an article about human psychology, and the gist of the article was that the human brain is hardwired to notice change. When our forefathers lived on the savannah, a change in the environment could mean danger, as things like lions moved and were dangerous, whereas trees were immobile and were mostly harmless. We are comfortable when things remain the same, which develops a selective memory, where we remember past events and use that as a baseline model for what things should be like. This is why we so often "pine for the good old days where we perceive things were better" rather than embracing inevitable change when we are confronted with it.

I want to challenge you, for however many years you have left at St David's, not simply to "pine for the good old days" and to use the excuse 'well it happened to us' because as I'm sure you recall from the 'Betty' incident in the first term, that excuse doesn't work. Things will change, and you won't always be able to control the change, or even to have a say in what's changing, but don't just give up or ask your parents to sort out your problems for you as a first resort when times are tough. This is your school, do the best you can to make it the school you want it to be. If you do nothing to resolve your issues, how can you expect anyone else to? Take responsibility for your own actions and choices, because a school can have the best teachers and facilities in the world, but only the students have the power to make that school great, and St David's is a great school.

I'd like to end with this quote by Dennis Kimbro; "Life is 10% what happens to us and 90% how we react to it."

I have loved my time at St David's and would recommend it to anyone. Thank you all for a fantastic year. I wish you all the best for the future and for the choices and reactions that you will face.

Dear School

No. Was it unnecessary? Definitely. But it became very clear, very quickly why St David's is known as a brotherhood. Facebook and BBM were flooded with messages of love for the school. Osmond, wrote the words; "I'm a St David's boy and always will be." Miquee Mc Crindle wrote: "Vowing Never to be broken." And Steven Haupt wrote: "13 years at the best school in the country". What an achievement. In another memory, the First Cricket team was being chirped and abused by a top boys' school. We kept quiet and got the business done. The victory made me reflect on the words of the late Rod Smith: 'St David's is just big enough to compete with the top schools, but we are not big enough to be arrogant.' These words were proved by that performance and never has a post match handshake felt so great.

There really are no better days than your school days. Class time is often not the most exciting time of school. But I can assure you, whatever you do after school, you will not have Vince Roos running after you with a cattle prod in Science. You will not be able to hoist Waseem Seedat to the top of your human pyramid. You will not be able to witness Josh Jarvis practising his waltz in Biology, you will never be able to play a recording of the school bell on your phone, convincing your teacher that the lesson is over, and you will never be able to watch Chris Khoury scrunch up a piece of paper and land it in the bin after bouncing it off all four walls of the classroom. No more coughing as loud as you can when one of your mates' phones starts ringing in class. No more of Kgabi Moeng's random rage. No more Tristan Lloyd driving into poles. No more chirping Keagan Hertz about Liverpool. And, no more calling Reuel Jarvis' name from the top of the stairs by the Maths department.

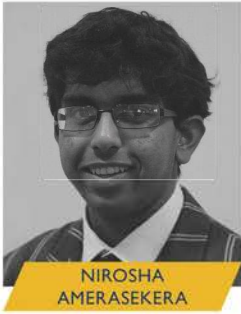

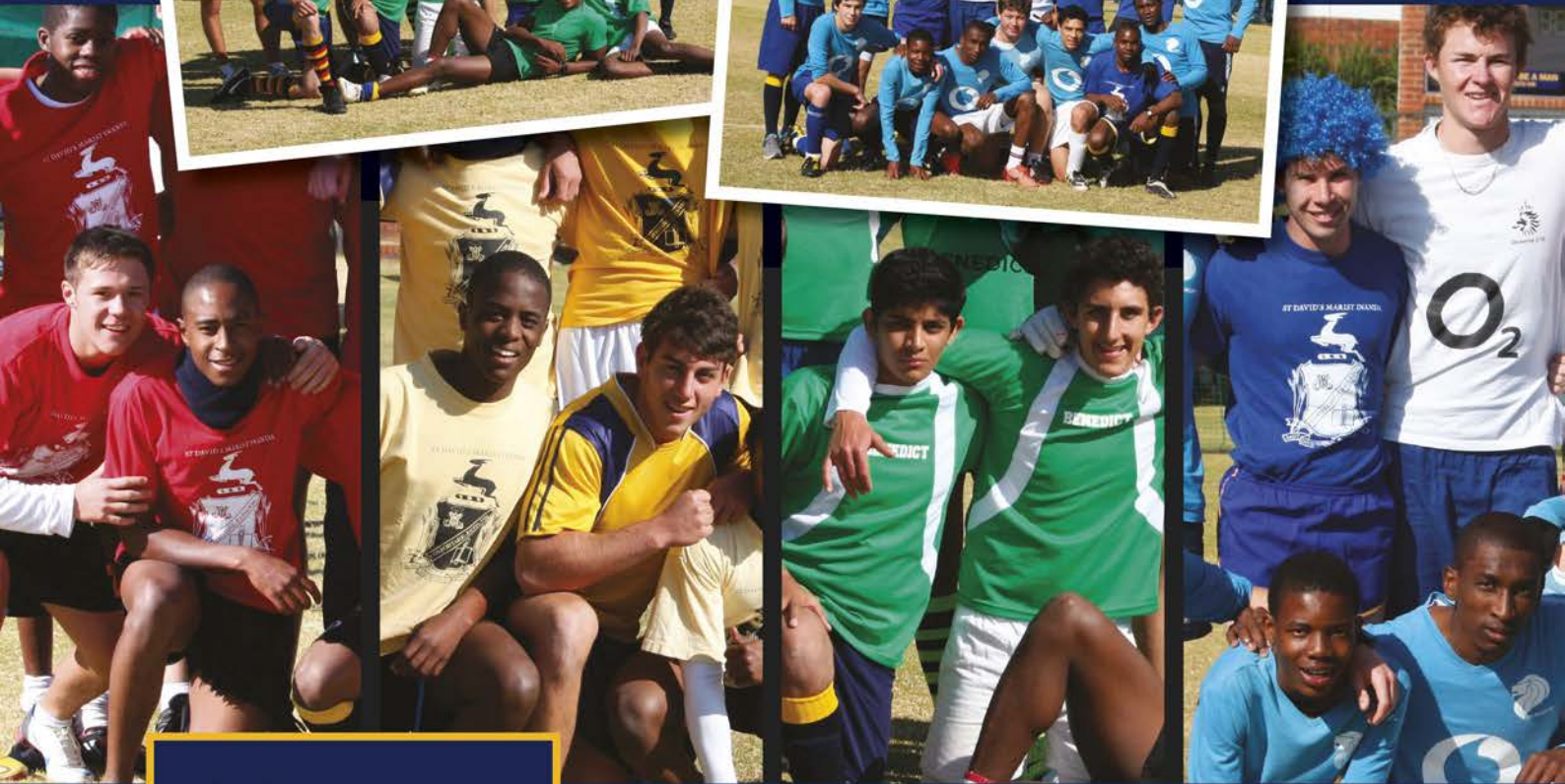
GRADE 11 CAMP REPORT

isiZULU CAMP 2012

ENGLISH

ENGLISH OLYMPIAD 2012

Candidates are required to prepare for a three-hour examination, using a set text. The theme for 2012 was "When Urban meets Rural", with the anthology entitled "Small Town Big Voice".

Seventeen pupils from St David's participated in the competition. Sean Neveling and Bradley Grieve achieved Silver

certificates, while Nirosha Amerasekera, Matthew Richardson, Takunda Nyadundu, Daniel Peter and Ryan Dunford were all awarded Bronze certificates.

Jordan Stier in Gr 12 finished in the 27th position overall. He has been offered a tuition scholarship for his first year at Rhodes University – a most fortuitous event, as he had already applied to study at Rhodes next year.

AP ENGLISH REPORT

Few lads are brave enough to sign up for the Advanced Programme in English. It's a tough, rigorous course – and definitely not for the faint-hearted. This year's theme was *Power and Powerlessness*. The prescribed literary and filmic texts the boys had to study were not only a harrowing dissection of human nature, but are considered cornerstones of tertiary courses in English. From *The Last King of Scotland* to *King Lear*, what it means to be human, and to relate to one another against the backdrop of history, is explored. The poetry chosen this year traced the development of the expression of thought and feeling from the Victorians to the Modernists, culminating in the study of one of the most powerful and influential works in the literary canon, T.S. Eliot's *The Wasteland*. In the words of one AP participant, "for an hour every week, I sat in a classroom after school – but I was not there: I was caught up in the pulse of the elite. The roaring '20s of *The Great Gatsby*, discovering shocking realities about our country in *Disgrace*, or dancing with Muriel as she became empowered in *Muriel's Wedding*...

my mind became that of each character, endowing me with an empathy I had not previously possessed. AP English has brought me one step closer to understanding those around me. And that is essential" – Daniel Peter. The mode of engagement in a course such as this challenges the learners to interrogate everything they thought they knew about the world, to analyse texts deeply, and to construct arguments in a way that differs substantially from school-work. The most rewarding portion of AP English is the debates that inform the syllabus as a whole. Here, the boys are free to think as creatively and rebelliously as possible. The aim of AP English is also to experience literature beyond the classroom. This year we saw an outstanding theatre production of Athol Fugard's *Boesman and Lena*. It was an exceptional encounter with Absurdist Theatre, and one that I'm sure the boys will never forget. AP English is not about who gets the best mark. It's about taking a risk and daring to learn!

LIBRARY

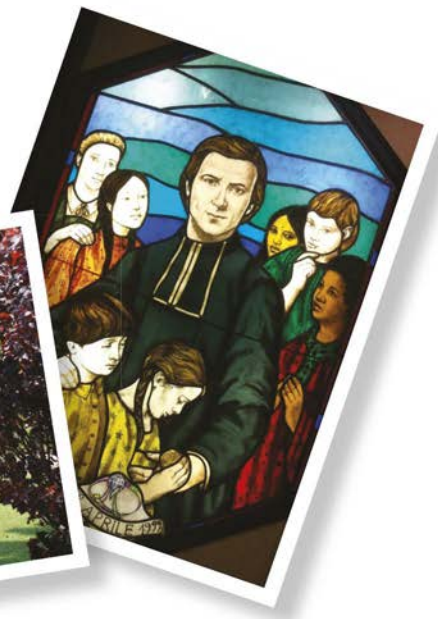

MATHS

The start of 2012 allowed us the opportunity to reflect on the outstanding Mathematics results achieved by the class of 2011. They have raised the bar and set an exciting challenge for future Grade 12s to emulate.

The number of boys willing to extend and challenge their mathematical skills by participating in the first round of the Mathematics Olympiad continues to grow. This year almost half of the high school took part with 87 qualifying for round two. Jordan Stier in Grade 12 and Nathan Michlo in Grade 9 both achieved a result in round two that placed them in the top 100 in the country, qualifying for round three and we congratulate them on this superb achievement.

We hosted our first Tour de Maths leg in May this year. It was most encouraging to see our school hall filled with boys and girls from various schools enjoying an evening of mathematics and social interactions. Our success in the Tour continues with Alexander Scott winning the junior individual competition and Samuel Sapire placing second. St David's placed third overall

in the junior section and this bodes well for the years to come.

Since April we have been able to watch the development of the much anticipated new classroom block. We hope to create a 'hub' for mathematical education in the future and to develop a passion amongst our boys by offering innovative ideas using technology with which they are so familiar.

Our association with the Epoch Optima Trust will continue into 2013 and once again we thank them for their generous and continued support.

The success that we continually enjoy is only made possible with a committed and dedicated group of Mathematics teachers who so often go the extra mile to ensure our boys achieve. I would like to thank all of them for their efforts and their support this year.

LIFE SCIENCES

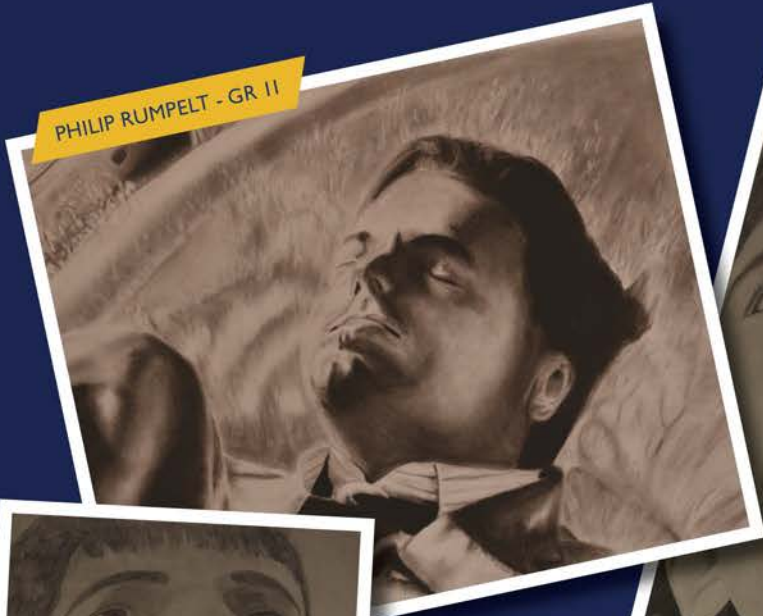

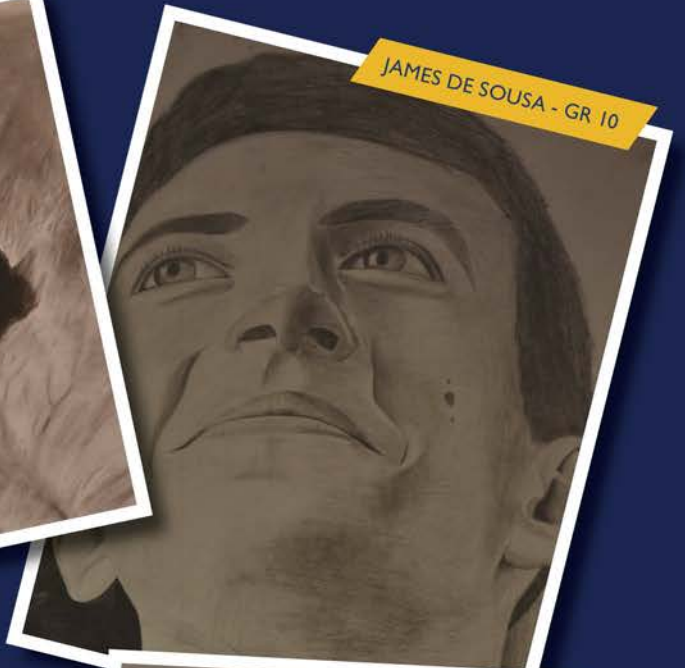

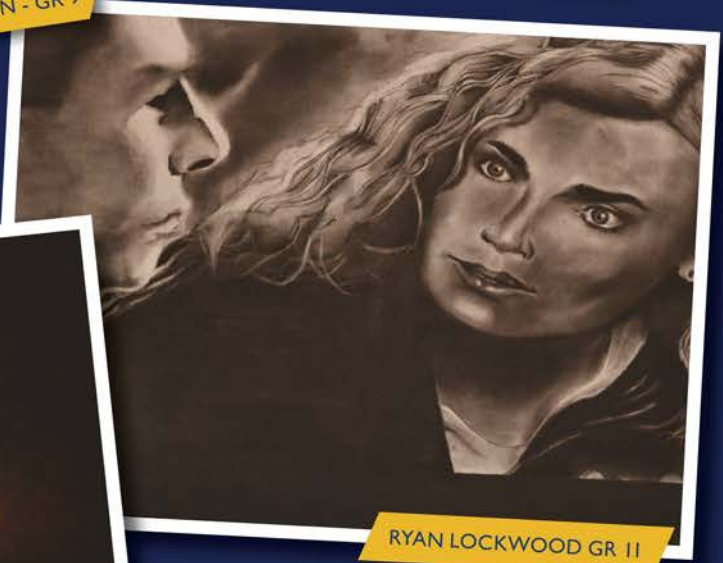

PHYSICAL SCIENCES

The Science Department enjoyed a busy and successful year in terms of the outings and activities that the boys participated in.

Mariette Liefferink was invited to address us on the Acid Mine Drainage problems faced by the people living in and around Gauteng. She showed us horrific pictures of the damage done to the environment and the appalling conditions under which squatters live on affected land. It was a sobering thought and raised awareness of the future if no process is put in place to remedy the problem.

Sci-Fest in Grahamstown

Ms Glanville and Mr Rogers accompanied a group of learners from St David's and the St Mary's Community Affairs Project to Scifest Africa in Grahamstown in March. The theme of the festival was "Science Rocks!". The lectures and workshops on offer were presented by some of South Africa's eminent scientists and many lecturers from overseas universities and institutions. "*The Dark Universe*", "*The ethics of progress*" explored some of the real and imagined ethical, political, religious and philosophical impacts of leading edge research in quantum physics through theatre. Dave Rowley gave us an update on the Bloodhound Project that is preparing to break the land speed record.

The Soap Box Derby proved to be very popular once again. The boys spent the morning making their wooden go-cart and then the test driving began in earnest.

Royal Society of South Africa Essay Competition

Mrs Skeen, as in previous years, presented a lesson on how to write essays and chose one of the previous year's topics to illustrate the process to both the Grade 10s and 12s. Mr Mudzingwa, Mrs Dell and Ms Glanville marked the essays and submitted the best to the Royal Society of South Africa's annual essay competition. Romek Sadowski was awarded 1st place for his essay on the topical issue "Fracking in the Karoo. Should hydraulic fracturing in order to extract shale gas be allowed to take place in the Karoo?"

Material Trail

Mr Mudzingwa, Mrs Dell and Ms Glanville entered the Grade 10s in the Materials Science Trail. Jared Tumieli, Paul Nussey and Miguel Zenha earned a special award for the creativity of their project.

St David's Science Expo

This year the theme of the annual Grade 11 Science Expo explored "Misconceptions in Science" and how to address them. Presentations included a video of the experimental work. Riyadh De Kock and Tinoda Chibaya were awarded first

prize for their gravity experiment. Luke Dyson and Bongumusa Masikane took the silver medal for their demonstration of electromagnetism and Patrick Savage and Robert Brown tied with Tristan Fayard and Ashlin Gounden in third place.

Science Outings

Grade 8 learners attended the annual Yebo Gogga exhibition at the University of the Witwatersrand.

Grade 11s went to Sandton City armed with bathroom scales to determine the acceleration and deceleration of the lifts. The data they collected also enabled them to calculate the height travelled between floors.

Project-based learning

Mrs Dell attended a course on Project Based Learning (PBL) in June this year in Columbus, Indiana.

The Grade 10 Physical Science classes used the methodology in the Mechanics section of the curriculum, specifically in the study of the Equations of Motion. The objective of this project was for the learners to identify an aspect of road safety and use equations of motion to raise public awareness of the dangers of this issue.

The driving question was: How can we as Grade 10 Science students raise awareness of road safety issues through the use of equations of motion? As an opening event Driver's Ed, an advanced driving academy demonstrated the implications of speed, reaction time and road conditions on stopping distances. The instructors talked the boys through the exercise and then we moved to 1st Avenue outside the school where they practically demonstrated how the increased speed exponentially increased the stopping distance. Mr Siphonhlapo, an Operations Manager from the Department of Transport was invited to speak to the boys. He gave many interesting statistics and information about the different problems they see on the roads. He provided some interesting alternative viewpoints on issues and indicated how the future is planned for road upgrades. The boys then had a week of class time to produce a poster or video or presentation that would be shown to the public with the intention of raising awareness about one particular issue. As a result, the boys have become highly conscious of the implications of speed, texting on cell phones, drunk driving, amongst other bad habits. We trust it will have a positive impact on their driving styles in the next couple of years.

We will continue to use the Project approach, particularly in Grades 8, 9 and 10, with a number of projects planned for 2013.

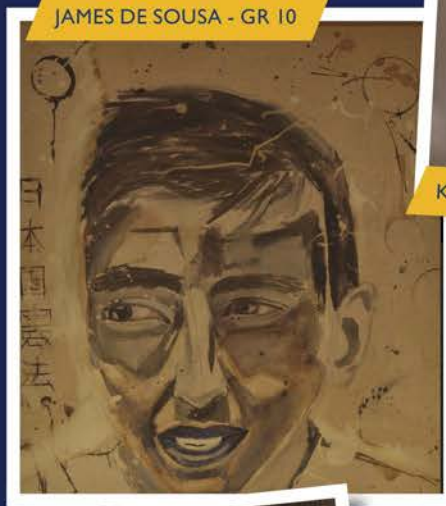

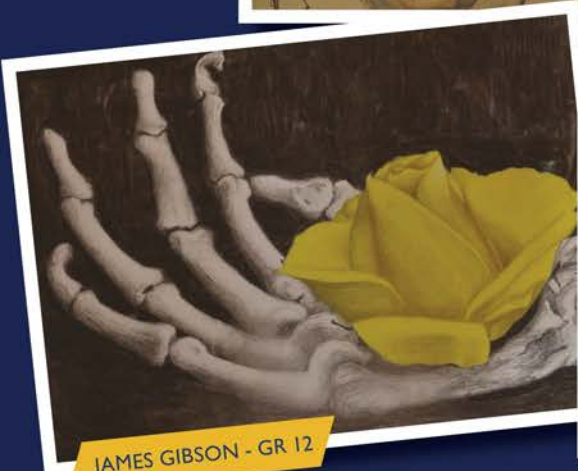

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES TO THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT IN 2012

Preparatory School and High School now combine in the Ensemble Soiree to bring you the best of all group endeavours from both categories. The Solo Soiree is a pristine event of sherry, Art and Music that sees all performers in suits of their choice. Both the Ensemble and Solo Soirees use interesting seating arrangements, specific lighting and audio visual presentations to make the evening more entertaining. The Preparatory Soiree happens later in the year and is now held in the Music Department. 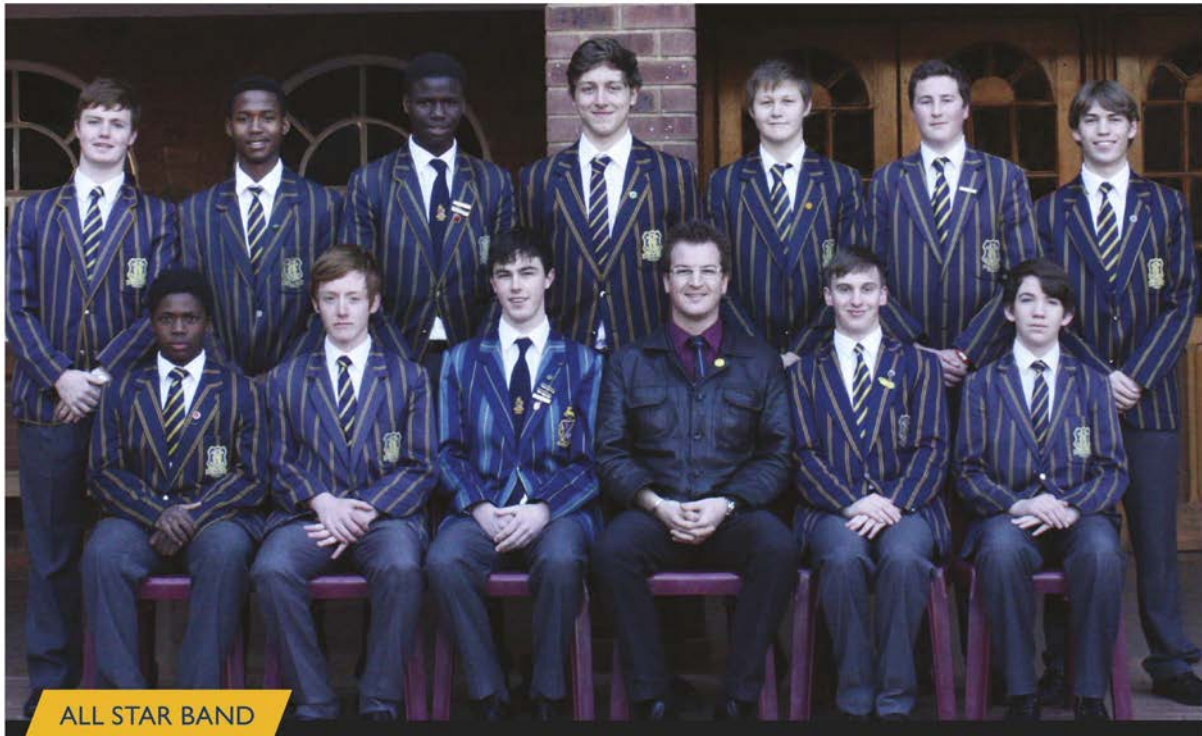

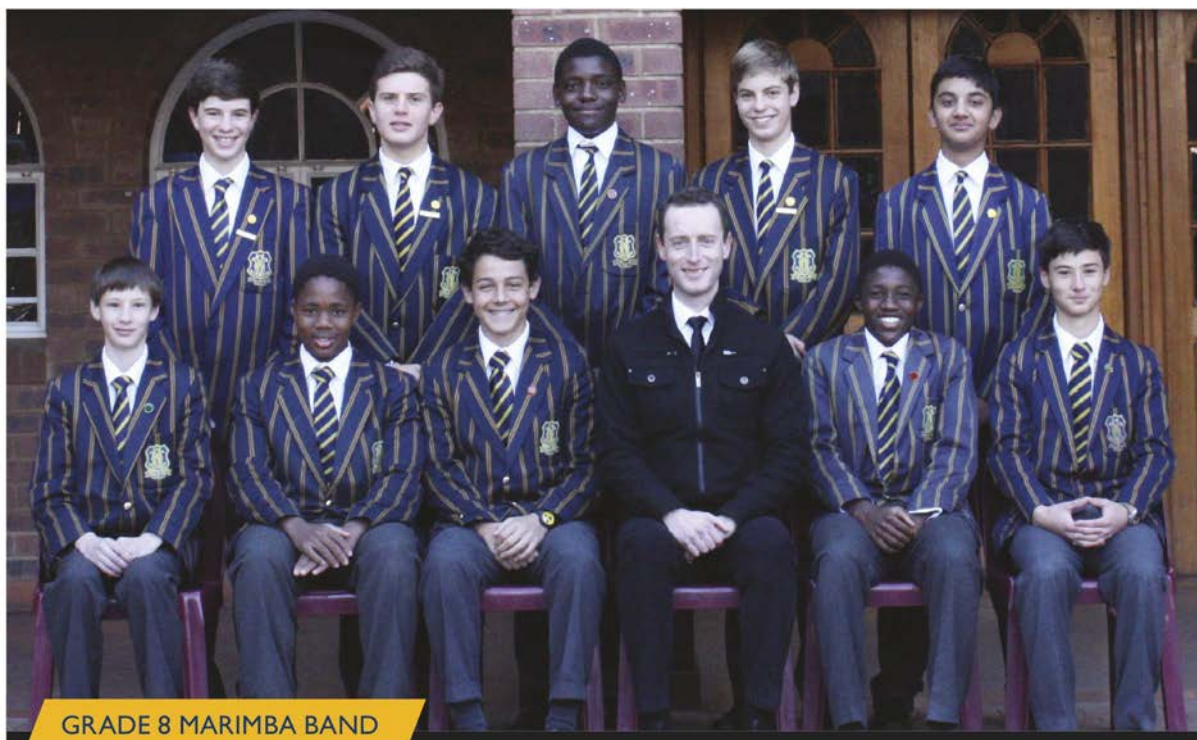

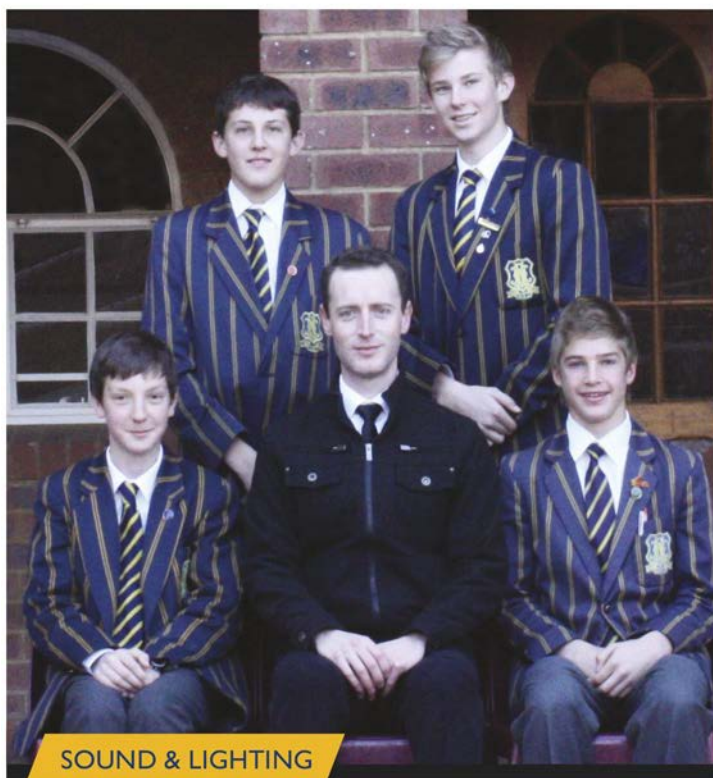

2012 has been an exciting year for Debating at St David's. A new coach, Phiwe Salukazana, was appointed in February, bringing with him a decade of Provincial and National Debating and Speaking experience, as well as Adjudication and Coaching expertise. We also bid farewell to the Madam in Charge of Debating, Ms Suzanne Cambitzis at the end of the first term, and welcomed in a new MIC for the remainder of the year, Ms J Aires.

The Gauteng Schools SACEE Debating League began in earnest in February and continued until August. St David's excelled, winning 6 out of 8 debates. They beat Parktown Girls, King Edward VII, Bophelo Mpilo, Jeppe Boys, St Stithian's Collegiate and Fons Lumenis, losing only to St John's and Roedeane. The

Junior Debating Team also boasted a significant improvement, winning 4 out of 7 league debates.

The Gauteng Schools Provincial Debating Championships commenced in September, but only the Senior Debating Team participated (unfortunately the Junior Debating Team was disqualified). St David's faced stiff competition in this Championship but rose to the occasion, winning 4 out of 5 debates to break into the quarter-finals. They won unanimously against Redhill, Roedeane, Sacred Heart and Pretoria Girls' High, and beat Pretoria Boys' High to make it to the semi-finals.

Semi-finals were held on the 12th October against an unbeaten King David Victory Park side comprised of two SA Speakers. The quality of the debate was outstanding, but

St David's narrowly lost the contest. King David Victory Park went on to win the Provincial Championships. This event was hosted by St David's. St David's also hosted the Gauteng Schools Debating Team Selection in October.

Although somewhat bruised from their disqualification, the Junior Debating Team had a particularly successful experience at the St Peter's Annual Sports and Culture Festival in September, where several young debaters competed for the first time. The team lost 3 out of 4 debates but their individual points were significant enough to place them fourth overall out of twelve schools – an impressive achievement indeed. Several adjudicators remarked on the team's talent and potential. The Juniors were mentored by an experienced member of the Senior Team, Venanzio Petralolo, who is

thanked for accompanying the novices and providing extra coaching and assistance during the competition.

Besides boasting an overall year win-ratio of eighty percent, highlights included William Shoki's selection to speak for the Gauteng Schools Provincial Junior Team, and Daniel Peter's selection to speak for the Gauteng Schools Provincial Senior Team. Daniel was also selected for the 2011/2012 National Team, and ranked 18th in the world at the Thailand World Schools Debating Championships. He will also represent South Africa in Turkey next year. All debaters are congratulated on their respective achievements and encouraged to give of their best in 2013.

We disappointed at St Alban's the following week going down 12-8 in Pretoria. The season finished with a high scoring affair and a 60-8 against CBC Boksburg at home.

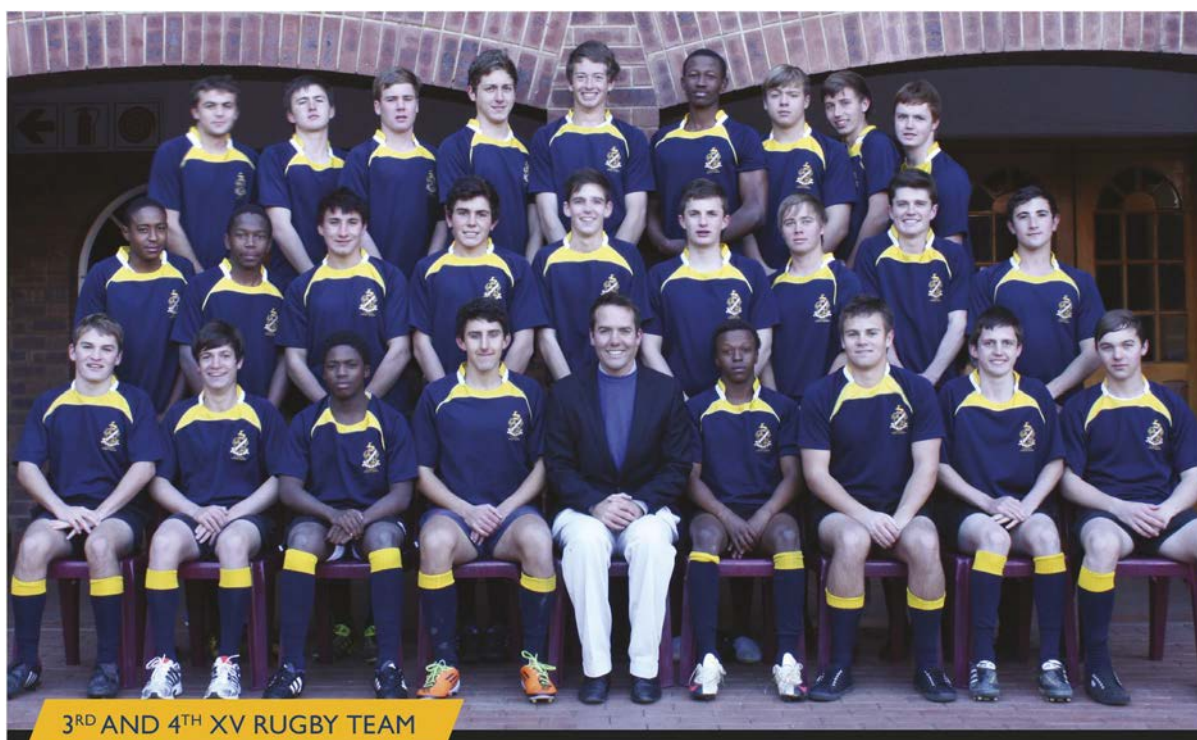

The 2012 Swimming season which saw in excess of 90 boys swimming in 3 teams in galas on Wednesdays was both challenging and exciting, with a few narrow defeats and some amazing swimming. While the A team were narrowly defeated at some of the galas (in which Afrikaans Hoër Seunskool, CBC Boksburg, Jeppe High School for Boys, King Edward VII High School, Parktown Boys' High School, Pretoria Boys' High School, St Benedict's College, St John's College and St Stithians Boys' College competed), it was a true feat when they tied with Pretoria Boys' at a league relay gala. At the Inter-High Relay Gala the swimmers gave 100% and swam some superb times and in the final stages, Pretoria Boys' just managed to beat St David's by a mere 7 points. At the Inter-High Individual Gala it was again Pretoria Boys' who finished in 1st place with St David's just 14 points behind them. When one takes into account the size of our swimming team in comparison with that of Pretoria Boys', this was a truly remarkable achievement.

At the Alan Burt Top Ten Gala the swimmers excelled and St David's finished in third place behind Westville Boys' High School and Pretoria Boys' and ahead of Kearsney College – our best result to date at this annual gala.

The B team also enjoyed success and were only beaten once by St Stithians – by a mere 2 points! The C team swam in the B galas and acquitted themselves well by beating many of the B teams. At the Inter High B Individual Gala the boys swam with passion and determination in front of a home crowd and were convincing winners, with the C team finishing in 4th place – excellent achievements.

The annual swimming tour to KwaZulu-Natal was once again most successful. This year a B team accompanied the A team in order to compete against other Catholic schools at the St Henry's Invitational Gala. It was most gratifying to watch these young men as they gave it their all and claimed 1st place. The A team then proceeded to show what they are made of at the Westville Invitational Gala and in an electrifying atmosphere they finished in 3rd place behind Westville Boys' High School and Grey College Bloemfontein. It was truly a moment that made the coaches, staff and supporting parents most proud to be part of St David's Marist Inanda. Their performance confirmed the calibre of our boys and showed that they can compete against some of the best all boys' schools in the country. On the Saturday morning 39 of the swimmers together with Mr K Biller and Mr M Schneider competed in the Midmar Mile swim. Out of a field of 2555 swimmers in the Non-Company relay event, the St David's swimmers proved themselves and finished in times ranging from 24 to 38 minutes with the St David's team 1 finishing in 10th place and team 4 in 11th place.

The annual Inter-House gala was a spirited and enjoyable event with The Bishops taking first place in convincing style, followed by Benedict, College and Osmond. New records were set by Blayne Duffy, Matthew Hancock and Logan Duffy.

Outside of school many of the swimmers competed both in CGA and national galas. Blayne Duffy swam in the Senior National Championships, Flavio-John Ferreri competed at SA Youth Championships and Dayen Wilson swam in the

SA Open Water Championships. As a result of an excellent time at the Championships as well as other superb times, it was a very special occasion when Flavio-John received the top award of Specific Honours in Swimming. Many of our swimmers qualified to swim at SA Level 3 National Age group Championships. A number swam at CGA Championships and 8 of our swimmers competed in the CGA Senior Short Course Championships and swam some personal best times with many including Matthew Hancock, Matthew Alexander, Hylton Collinson and Dayen Wilson receiving medals. Nicholas Reuss won medals at CGA Junior Short Course Championships. Logan Duffy, Matthew Alexander, Dayen Wilson, Hylton Collinson and Dylan Richards were selected to represent CGA at the NTS Interprovincial Gala where they performed very well.

As a result of our achievement at the Inter-High Gala, we were selected to take part in the first Top Schools Gala in October. Unfortunately the senior swimmers were not available to swim, but the junior swimmers did themselves and the College proud and swam some superb times and all returned home with medals. In total 7 gold medals were won (5 in individual races and 2 in relay events), 4 silver (2 in individual races and 2 in relay events) and 6 bronze (4 in individual races and 2 in relays.) 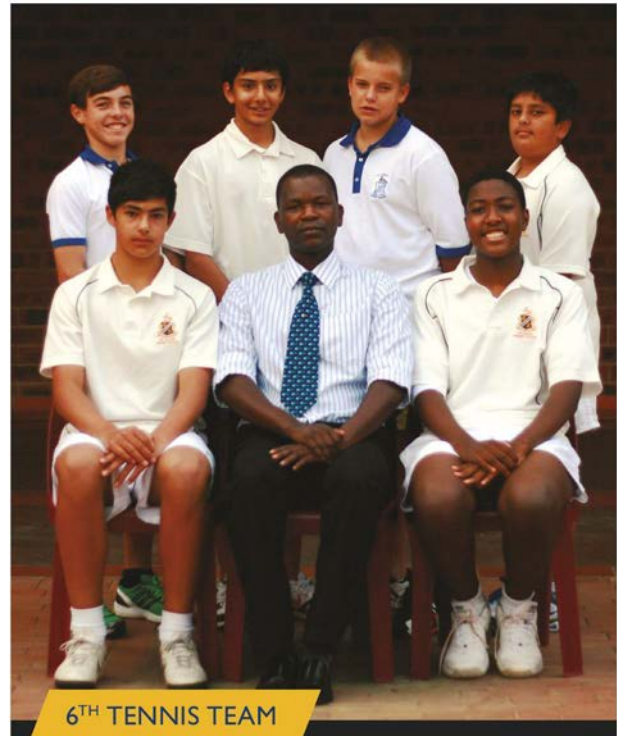

Our key players in the first team are mostly made up of Grade 10 learners and I believe we will be able to see even better results in the next two years.

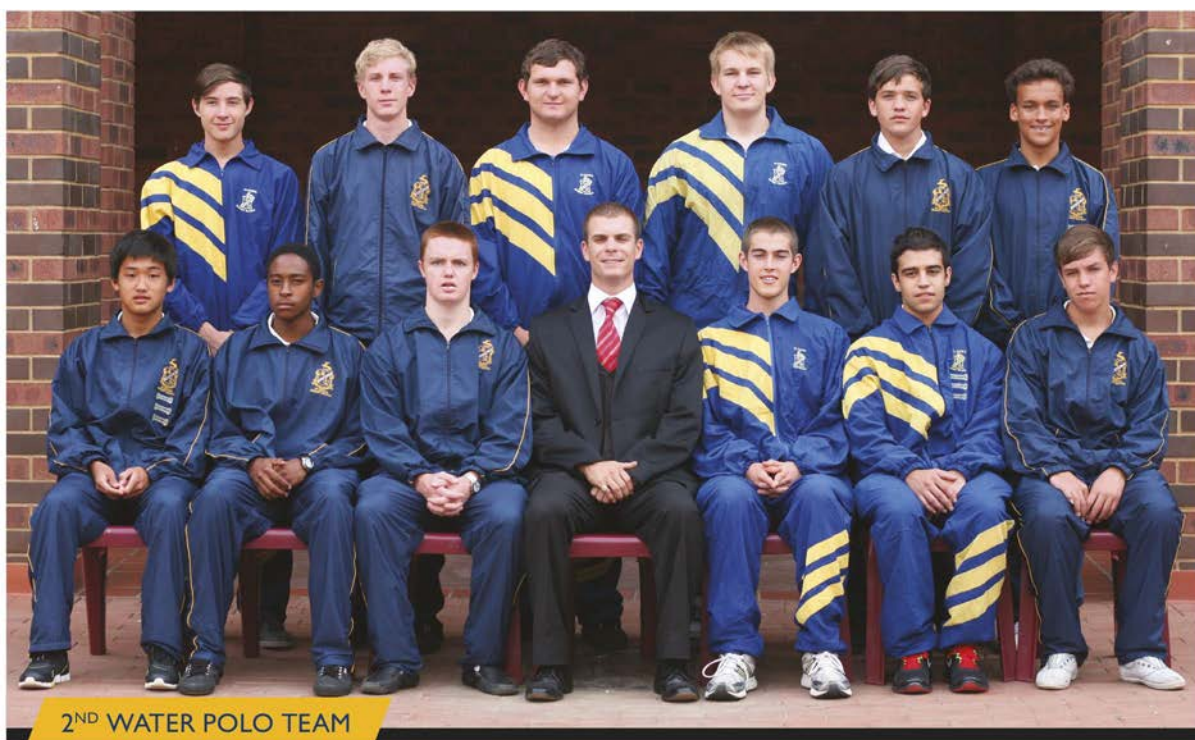

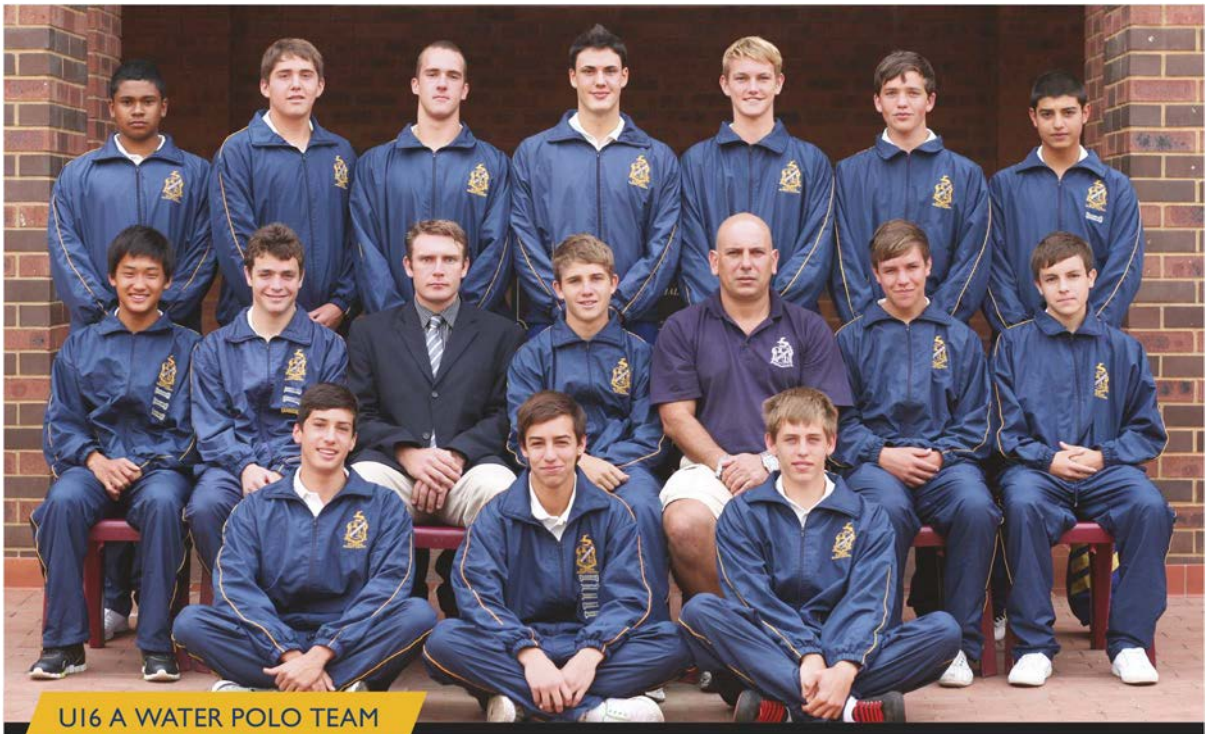

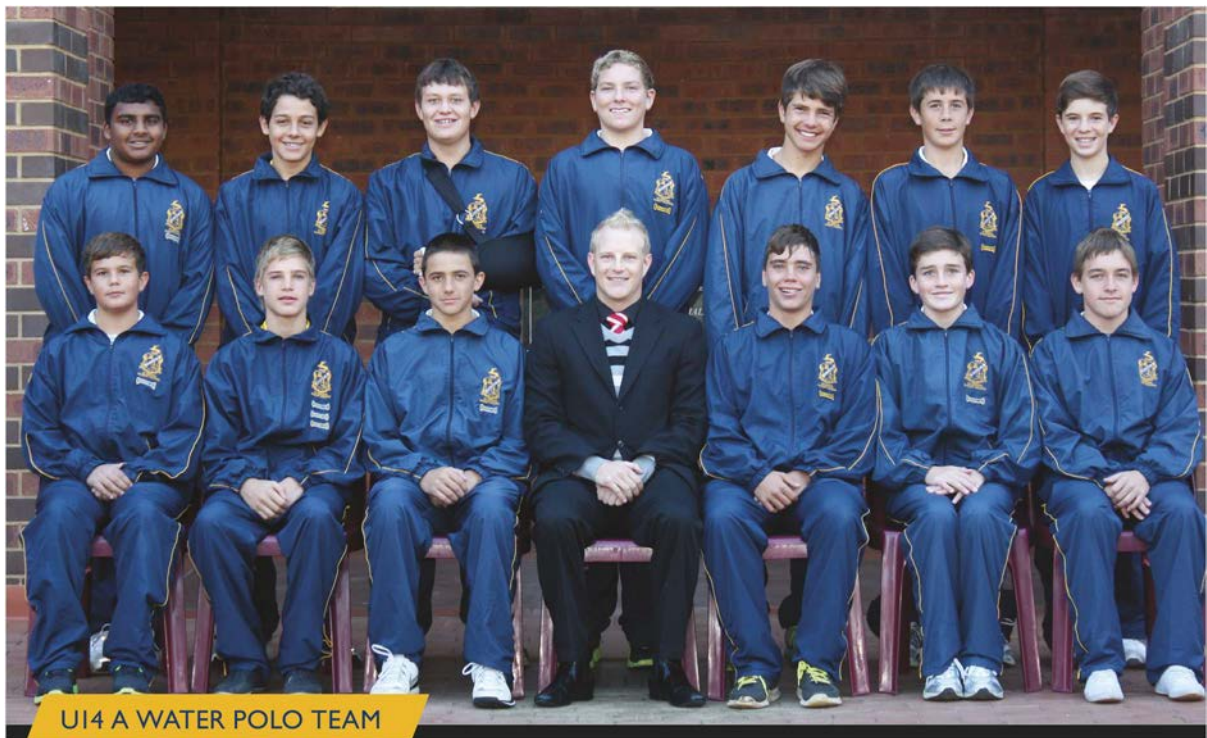

Future Problem Solving – International Finals 2012

What do Liza Minnelli, Fleetwood Mac and St David's have in common? – We all love New York!

A team of six top thinkers from St David's qualified to attend the International Finals of the Future Problem Solving Program held in June 2012 at Indianapolis University in Bloomington, Indiana. Although the competition ran over only five days, we made the expense of the trip count by spending four days in New York prior to a home stay of four days and then attending the competition.

The boys made every minute count in New York and rapidly ticked off sights seen. The Apple Store scored as the biggest attraction: at midnight on the last night in New York, there was a need to persuade them that it was NOT necessary to visit it one last time at that hour of the night – especially as they had already spent their allowances on significant purchases of computers and gadgets. On Wednesday 6 June, we finally met our competitors when we flew to Indianapolis and transferred to the University of Indianapolis in Bloomington. There were students from most of the states of America and from New Zealand, Australia, Great Britain, Korea, Malaysia, Portugal, People's Republic of China, Singapore and Turkey. While our boys did their best to meet as many students as possible, it was difficult to spend

The 2011/2012 MOBS year has developed into an extremely successful year for the committee with number of steps forward in the right direction. Building on last year we have again managed to grow the balance sheet and income statement of the Old Boys' and are in a financial position to contribute a substantial amount to the Old Boys' Bursary Fund, Capital and Administrative Fund and to those boys who would not have the opportunity to attend St. David's. This has been achieved by working closely with the School, PTA, Foundation and Alumni which has led to a more synergistic approach to raising funds, contributing to the Foundation, holding Old Boys' events and ensuring that we as an Old Boys' Association are socially and financially viable.

The School, PTA, Board and Foundation have been and remain extremely supportive and recognise the value that we can add to the Marist Family and St David's in particular. Their ongoing support is most certainly appreciated. In this regard I would like to personally thank Mike Greeff, Malcolm Williams, Rick Wilson, Lara Klement and Cheryl King for the effort and commitment they have shown towards us. In addition I would like to thank my committee for their enthusiasm and ongoing support towards the Marist Old Boys' Association. The members on the committee are as follows:

Charles Hodgson, Chris Busschau, Willy Castle, Batana Vundla, Sabelo Sithebe, Byron King, Gilbert Pooley, Mark Reeves, Danillo Giacobazzi, Remy Du Plessis, Justin Rodrigues, Mike Greeff, Malcolm Williams, Lara Klement, Cheryl King, Ashleigh Knowles, Julie Egenreider who is researching the History of St David's towards publishing a book for the 75th Jubilee.

I would like to thank Gavin Janssen a member of the committee who was devoted to his family and his fraternity and had an unwavering passion for life. He passed away on 24 March 2012. May he rest in peace and may God bless his soul.

After 6 years as Chairman of a growing and increasingly proactive Old Boys' Association, I believe that we have convinced those around us that the MOBS has a far greater role to play in the overall marketing of the Foundation and the School. Essentially we understand that as an Alumni Body we can and will make a far greater social and financial contribution to the School.

The Marist Old Boys' have an association with the School that is unparalleled in that we understand its traditions, ethos and the Spirit of Marcellin Champagnat. The role of the Old Boys' is continually changing and our Strategy Workshop a couple of months ago (kindly facilitated by Chris Elfick, a Marist Old Boy) has revised and reinvigorated our direction.

This year we accomplished the following:

1. The Old Boys' have again sponsored 25% of the cost of education at St David's to a son of an Old Boy from the Old Boys' Bursary Fund. The award was once again based on exceptional performance and commitment to the School.
2. We paid for the Old Boys' Matric Rite of Passage to the value of R25,074.
3. The Old Boys' Bursary has grown from R193 271 (2011) to R277,860 (2012) or 44% after awards of R18,847 and I believe that now is the time to award a deserving Marist family and candidate in 2013.
4. Our cash flow is positive with R101,738 in the bank and our income statement and balance sheet are sound. There is an estimated outstanding income amount of R60 000 from the PTA/Old Boys' 'Golf Day' which has not yet been deposited into our account as we are awaiting final confirmation of the exact numbers.
5. We are continuing to grow our database through the efforts of the foundation office (in particular Cheryl King, Byron King and Ashleigh Knowles) and other social media networks i.e. Facebook.
6. The School and the Board continue to encourage and support our involvement in the community – to such an extent that we received our first new pupil joining levy this year – this will be ongoing on an annual basis. This levy will enhance our ability to serve the Old Boys' community more effectively and ensure that any social responsibility programmes undertaken in the future are funded.

The Old Boys Calendar has involved the following activities to date:

- The Cape Town/Grahamstown Old Boys' Reunions were once again very successful and attendance is growing every time we go back and show our support (Attendance - 35+ Old Boys' in Grahamstown and 65+ Old Boys in Cape Town).

- The re-introduced Johannesburg get-together had over 50 Old Boys attend – It was hosted by Gianni Mariano (Obs Old Boy) at Maestro in Hyde Park and was enjoyed by all.
- PTA/Old Boys' Golf Day – oversubscribed by parents, staff and Old Boys. At least 40% of the field was made up of Old Boys. We hope to continue increasing our participation in 2013. Approximately +R125 000 was raised from this event of which we received 50% of the net profits from the PTA to fund future initiatives and we are exceptionally grateful for the PTA's support in this regard. We hope to grow our support and participation in 2013 and would like to increase the stakes in terms of fund raising for the Old Boys.
- The Old Boys' Reunion weekend was a huge success in terms of Old Boys attendance on the Saturday. The Sunday mass was however disappointing in terms of the number of Old Boys and Committee members who were present, however we have developed an action plan to rectify this.
- The inaugural 7-a-side soccer tournament organised by Sabelo Sithebe, Byron King and Willy Castle was the most successful start-up event that we as a committee have organised in the last 10 years. We had 20 sides competing and over 200 players and supporters attending. This event was not intended to raise funds as it was focused on bringing Old Boys back to the School but we managed a Net Profit of R8,500. This event will most certainly be on our calendar next year.
- The Matric Rite of Passage – the highlight of our calendar every year, as it is the formal induction of the Matric Group into the Old Boys' community. This was our sixth Matric Rite of Passage and every year continues to enhance our reputation as a school and fraternity that these young men want to belong to and get involved with. Once again I would like to thank, Mike Greeff, Cheryl King, Lara Klement, Ashleigh Knowles, Willy Castle, Malcolm Williams, Rick Wilson, St David's Teachers and Staff at the Wanderers Club for making this event so special. Special thanks must be mentioned to Chris Busschau our guest speaker – who as per usual imparted the appropriate words of wisdom to these young men.
- The Old Boys' UK reunion and Trustees meeting (part of the UK Foundation Chapter) was held at St Stevens Club in London with about 15 Old Boys in attendance. They are fervent about continuing their support and are currently planning 4 Old Boys' functions a year in the UK. The challenge at the moment is communication and we need to help them bring the base closer together via social media networks. Mike Greeff who attended the event can provide a more concise account of the evening.
- 2012 saw many successful reunions organised by the Old Boys' in conjunction with Cheryl King and Willy Castle. The 1952, 1962, 1972 and 1992 Old Boys celebrated their respective year milestones.
