

Good evening, Members of the Board of Governors, Mr Greeff - Director of the Marist Schools' Council, Mr Thiel - Executive Headmaster, Mrs Klement and members of the St David's Foundation, members of the Parent Teachers Association, past Headmasters, Mr Wilson and Mr Castle, Mr Castle in his capacity as the Chairman of the Old Boys' Association, invited guests, ladies and gentlemen, especially our guests of honour here tonight, the boys of St David's Marist Inanda. It is a celebration of all that has been achieved in the classroom and the scholastic development of each and every boy.

What gives us the ability to learn and how are content, skills, values and attitudes learnt? This vexing question has puzzled theorists, philosophers and pedagogues alike. At the risk of over-simplifying a highly complex process, in the time afforded me, I offer just two thoughts on this matter. Firstly, I contend that for learning to be maximised, the 'situation' should be conducive to learning. This involves providing an environment where questioning minds can investigate and explore without the fear of failure or rebuke. These environments are often more informal than formal, and range from classroom contexts to figuring the workings of a tightly packed tent on a camping trip. In these contexts, initial failure when associated with determination and a will to succeed, are arguably the most significant contributors to learning.

Secondly, and by no means negating self-learning, I suggest that for learning to occur, it must be facilitated. This suggests the role

of a parent, a sibling, a peer, a teacher, a coach, in fact anybody who is willing and able to pass on knowledge and skills to another person. This role is no respecter of age or academic qualification. How often have we not learnt from our own children? It does, however, imply a willingness to learn and grow. Perhaps that is it - to learn we must be willing to do so! If our homes, our schools, and indeed our society, are to be places of learning, they must be characterised by individuals, of all ages, who are willing to learn. Let us all then be creators of learning environment, facilitators of learning and let us all, young and old, be willing to learn!

This year we bid farewell to members of our Prep School staff. Mrs Pascoe will be taking up a post at Bellavista to pursue her interest in remedial education. We thank her for her contribution to St David's over the past year. Miss Booysen and Mr King have chosen to explore education in England and will be taking up teaching positions at an independent school in Surrey. We wish you joy, success and learning as you embark on this exciting chapter in your lives. Some weeks ago, we held a beautiful Mass to celebrate Mrs Ansell's contribution of over forty years to St David's. We wish Mrs Ansell a full recovery and everything of the best in her retirement. As you are aware, Mr Williams has been appointed as the Principal of Marist Linmeyer Primary School as from next year. He is our guest of honour this evening and it gives me great pleasure to call on him to complete the Headmaster's address. Mr Williams.

MR TONY WILLIAMS FAREWELL AND TRIBUTE

Thank you Mr Edwards

Firstly let me state categorically that this evening is not about me. It is, however, an evening of celebration which allows me to sit back and reflect on the outcome of my key role here at St David's.

So seldom in schools do we have the opportunity as a community to celebrate the academic growth and success of the boys in our care. As a community we mainly connect at fundraising, religious or sports events but tonight I would like to reflect for a while on the journey that is, academic development.

Our boys, for most of the school day at least, can be classified as living organisms. To fully develop and grow, such organisms need at least four things need to be present:

Firstly, Light – It says in John 8:12 that Jesus is the light of the world and it is his characteristics that we try and instill in our boys on a daily basis in order for them to grow as young men. Next is

Water/Food – This for me equates to the knowledge the boys gain on a daily basis at school. As Sir Francis Bacon stated in the late 1700s, knowledge is power. The teachers have all worked incredibly hard to ensure that every boy acquires the knowledge, skills and values in order to make them responsible and valued members of society.


Air – We love to have fun – and learning should be an enjoyable experience. Sometimes you just need to take a step back and breathe in some fresh air before you can mission forward again. Outdoor time, whether in the form of structured extra-curricular activities or just plain old free play is vital to restoring our energy levels.

Time – Everyone grows and develops in their own time and in their own ways. No one student is the same and we celebrate each other's differences.



The reason for this analogy is that some boys may feel disappointment at not achieving the highest academic award tonight, they may look back and say I wish I just put in that extra bit of work. But boys, remember that your academic development is a growth journey, and not always a smooth one.

I bet many of the parents here tonight could label themselves late developers. My school marks were never great, I rarely received an academic award, until I reached university and only in the last few years of courses I have taken did the word distinction ever



become a reality. We all develop at our own pace and in our own good time. The key boys, is just to give of your best in all you do and never give up on a challenge.

The journey to educational success is, as stated earlier, not smooth. I firmly believe that our children will develop into more effective working adults if they are allowed to feel and experience the rough journey of life. Most of our boys live in safe, secure houses, have no experience of the stresses of public transport and have never walked home from school through a tough neighbourhood. Most adults here, however, did have to experience more hardships than I believe our boys do today. So what should we, as parents and teachers, be doing to ensure our boys are tough enough to cope in the real-world.


The terms that come to mind are those of resilience and grit – who some of you have heard me talk about last year. My experience as a parent, however difficult it is, is to not remove the obstacles in your son's lives that make it easier for him to cope with his daily demands. I am not talking about dropping him in a crime ridden suburb and making him find his own way home but rather making him learn responsibility and take ownership for his actions.

I know how hard it is to get the call from my daughter's school, Dad I left my project at home or sports kit at in the bag at the front door and my response has, at least since the elder one moved into the Senior Primary, sorry princess – your responsibility, your fault. As parents we feel awful, sometimes gutted. Am I a bad parent or am I actually doing her a favour? As a teacher and parent, I know what the correct answer is.

I suppose my final message to the St David's Prep parents is therefore, don't smooth over the educational journey. Allow your son to develop his resilience and grit in a structured and caring school environment. Be there for him, but don't do it for him.

I would like to thank the entire parent body for their support of our initiatives and I'll definitely miss the informal chats and laughs I have had with many of you here today.

Boys, I thanked you in assembly last week Wednesday for the most special send off and farewell anyone could have hoped for. All I hope is that those who I have taught have gained in knowledge, skills and perhaps a bit of humour. I am a firm believer that each and every connection made with another person is of benefit to both parties. If I was not fully available to connect and discuss what you needed at a particular time, I apologise but on the other hand



I hope that even in some small way my greeting, smile, high five, lesson, conversation or advice given made your day at the time. It is because of this that I am first and foremost a teacher.

The Marist ethos of this school (a difficult word to understand I know) is highlighted in the banners around this Hall. These are guiding principles that you boys should strive to live out in your daily lives. Be present to your class mates in their times of need, love the work you do in school, at home and for your community, have simple relationships free from deceit or lies, be like a family member to each other (yes, argue and disagree) but do so with the aim of improving the situation or relationship and treating each other with respect and show the characteristics of the Mother Mary who nurtured and cared for her son and family during difficult times. Boys, thank you for all you do to make this school special. Remember, without you there would be no St David's Marist Inanda, You are the school – you make this place rock with energy. Take Courage, work hard, be good people and become a Man. "Try not to become a person of success, but rather try to become a person of value."

I regard those wonderful people sitting amongst the boys in those funny looking superhero outfits as my extended family – and as



with all families some are closer than others – but all dear to my heart. I noted in my notes for the staff farewell function last week that I would gladly "magically transplant" the entire staff of St David's to Marist Brother's Linmeyer with me.



Unfortunately the reality check was that it is not them that have to change – they are doing a tremendous job in helping to raise the fine boys in front of me – but me that needs to change, face new challenges, develop new friendships, tackle and overcome disagreements and make a success of the next journey in my life. So, to the staff of St David's Marist Inanda, I can honestly say that I have learnt and grown alongside you and I treasure the memories we have formed together as a staff. You will always hold a special place in my heart and I shall always be just a phone call away.

Jack Welch, a successful American business man said, "Before you are a leader, success is all about growing yourself. When you become a leader, success is all about growing others." I pray that my input into this school over the last 10 years has allowed the staff and boys to grow and I know that such growth is not possible without the correct conditions of the support of parents, fellow teachers and students.

In the qualitative world of an educational leader one cannot put numbers or percentages to the impact, significance or success of one's input. Every journey has its challenges but I know that the memories that have been made along the way have made the journey worthwhile. I have reached my destination, grown, made a difference in some small way to everyone here and now it is time for me to move on to my next journey.

I would like to thank the parent body for their continued support, the teachers for their continued professionalism and diligence and lastly the students for their continued... growth.

As I stand here and close this folder, I do so because I have finished this chapter. When I awake in 2017, a new book will be opened and new chapter begins.

You are truly a Marist teacher.



PREP CO-WORKERS REPORT

The Princess Alice Adoption Home

Princess Alice Adoption Home (PAAH), situated in Westcliffe, is a temporary place of safety which provides 24 hour residential care to babies who have been consented for adoption, abandoned or occasionally removed from family care.

The Home cares for 30 babies and toddlers (aged new-born to two years old) in a healthy and loving nursery environment.

Princess Alice is also a safe haven for up to four pregnant girls who are destitute or in crisis. While at the home, the birth moms are counselled and helped to decide whether to keep their baby or consent for adoption.

As part of St David's outreach programme, the Grade 7's pay regular visits to the Adoption Home, they visit it once every three weeks during term time. The number of boys who joined us in our visits varied each time but real commitment was shown by Bradley Becker, Warwick Brown and Connor Human. Thank you.

The Home has found itself needing to cater for more toddlers rather than babies this year as the adoption process is taking longer to complete. This has meant that they need to provide more solid and finger foods and a "gogo programme" has been implemented in order to stimulate the little minds.







It is always heart-warming to spend time at the Home and Mrs Moorhouse and I feel very blessed and privileged to be able to take our St David's boys to give of their time.

The Johannesburg Mini Council was established in 1972, and is made up of 80 Grade 7 councillors from 40 local Johannesburg primary schools. St David's Marist Inanda has been involved with the Council for the last 20+ years and Joshua Maroun and I were privileged to represent St David's on the 2016 Council. The Council, a registered non-profit organisation, provides community services to under-privileged people and animals in Johannesburg.

Mr Edwards and Miss Meirowitz were fully supportive of each initiative, and their encouragement and council throughout the year was invaluable, and appreciated.

During our year on Council we had the opportunity to see life beyond Sandton. We played with young children, entertained the elderly, cared for homeless animals, raised money for The Guide Dog Association, helped feed the hungry, and distributed blankets and clothes to keep people warm. Not only did we have fun carrying out these tasks with our Council friends, we learnt to appreciate our good fortune, treat each and every person with respect and kindness and realised our Johannesburg Mini Council motto for 2016: "Although we are each just a grain of sand, our Council beach was a helping hand."

- · Callum Porrill: 4 events in the Open age group



Cross Country Report







Rugby Report





2016 saw our Open A team compete again in the St. John's and St. Stithian's annual rugby festivals. At the St. Stithian's festival we won 2 out of our 3 matches with a 12-12 draw resulting against St. Andrew's College. We were particularly proud of our 24-7 win against Waterkloof House Preparatory School. The St. John's festival yielded similar results. From our 4 matches we only lost 1 match narrowly, 5-7, against St. Benedict's. The boys did, however, redeem themselves later against St. Benedict's in the ordinary season with a 28-15 win against the old foes.

The ordinary season was a very successful one for our senior teams as the Open A team only lost one match against St. Stithian's. The Open C and D and U12 C teams were the unbeaten masters of the rugby field in 2016. The Open A and U12A teams also recorded very commendable 75% plus winning percentages. Overall, the U12 and Open age groups recorded 39 wins from their 48 matches resulting in a very boastful 81% winning percentage. Our junior teams faired satisfactory, but we have hard work ahead in 2017 if the U9 to U11 age groups are to reach the successes of the U12 and Open age groups.

Our biggest achievement, however, is that as a Prep School our overall winning percentage has increased almost 3% from 58.59% in 2015 to 61.54% in 2016. 



The Jubilee Dinner - 10 June 2016

A very special welcome to all the Friends of St David's Marist Inanda, to parents, staff, pupils, the Marist Brothers, Brother Mario and Brother Vincent, Mr Mike Greeff, Director of the Marist Schools Council, Also to the past headmasters, the incumbents Mr Mike Thiel and Mr Graham Edwards, Fr Tebogo, Heads of other schools, the Chairman of the St David's Board of Governors, Mr John Chemaly and members of the Board past and present.

Welcome to the Chairman of the trustees Mr Robin Smith and members of the Trustees' Board. A special welcome to Joshua Clegg the Head Boy and Bogosi Msutwana Deputy Head and the Matric class of 2016.

Welcome also to all the outstanding Old Boys, especially those who have travelled from overseas and locally to be with us here this evening.

I would like to thank Mike Smith for all his efforts to get the class of 1966 and, Richard van Lienden from the class of 1996 here tonight.

I hope that by the end of this evening all of us feel even more connected to the history of St David's Marist Inanda.

James Bond was given the number 007 and the license to kill because of his special talents. The Old Boys will recall that when we were here in the early days as boarders, we were also given a number. I never forgot mine, which was MI 139. I wasn't given a license to kill, but I was given a license to cane. Many of you experienced this at first hand.

We all have different memories and stories about boarding school and we could spend most of the night reminiscing on some of these, but the one that I always tell, was when a group of us were punished by Mr Trevor Elliott, who was one of our Prefects when we were in Grade 9. My punishment was to polish his shoes, so I polished his shoes on the outside, on the inside, on the sole and even on the laces. Needless to say, I never received another pair of shoes to polish.

For years, the Brothers had been anxious to obtain a College site out of town for the junior boarders of Koch Street and Observatory. Such a place was Inanda, just 1 mile from the Dunkeld bus terminal. The first section of the School was built in 1940 and opened up as the kindergarten in January 1941.

This was completed with every modern arrangement and no expenses were spared in the matter of the equipment. In 1941 the primary department was built a two-story building consisting of eight classrooms and four locker rooms. The floors were tiled and the windows occupied the maximum amount of space that could be allotted to them. This made the dormitories like a cold storage and some of us had to have 8 to 10 blankets on our beds to keep out the frostbite. Every room had an electric clock and a wireless telephone connected with the principal's office.

The boarding department included a boiler room, kitchens, dining hall and dormitories which were ready for the 1942 intake. The boarding fee, which included laundry, was 24 pounds per term and the tuition for the Grade 11s and 12s was 9 pounds and nine shillings per term.

In the dictionary, school is defined as an "institute of learning"; few scholars ever recorded it in this light, and most harboured dark thoughts of an inquisition of torture. The average schoolboy awoke on a cold bleak morning and suddenly remembered that it was Monday and that he had not yet done his homework.

This reminds me of a story. The teacher said to Tommy: "Why is it that you are always late for school?" Tommy replied: "Please sir, it isn't my fault, they always ring the bell before I get here!"

As a boarder we would generally get up to some mischief. The most noteworthy of these was the dash to the Bonanza steakhouse, which is today Thrupps shopping centre, to collect the hamburgers for the midnight snack. It was incredible that we were never caught, especially with the aroma of monkey gland sauce and chips that would waft through the domitories at lights out. Good night boys, good night Brother; the door would close and the snacks would come out,

It is difficult in a short time to sum up 75 years, but here are some of the highlights that will bring back memories to many of us.

Would all the Old Boys who were at Marist Inanda from 1948 until 1960 please stand, Please can we give them a round of applause.

The official opening of the school was January 27, 1943, Br Walston was the Headmaster. In 1944 there were 200 pupils and the first swimming gala and athletics meeting was held.

In 1947, rugby, boxing and cricket were introduced, Prefect scrolls were awarded and the Matric class of 1948 had their first College Dance

During the 50s the School roll increased to 500, the school bus named Gertie was introduced, the bicycle shed was built and Nancy Buckley Jones took over as matron and Brother Benedict was appointed Headmaster.

One notorious event during the 50s was when the 1953 matrics were caught stealing the exam papers out of the rubbish bins from the old roneo machines and were severely punished during that year.

In 1960 Brother Anthony was appointed headmaster and during this time, six classrooms were erected for the junior school and the roll of the School increased to 600. Ray Bischoff became the first School Springbok and the land we are now on, the McGill-Love farm, was purchased with the house Maryknoll.

During the 60s, 155 boys from St David's travelled to Cape Town for the Marist Centenary celebrations. This was quite an experience, as on the way back from Cape Town (remembering that in those days it would take two days), most of the boys had runny stomachs and the buses would have to pull up on the side of the road frequently so that boys could scatter into the veld.

The school expanded to 800 pupils by the end of the 60s. Michael Ross was chosen for Craven Week rugby, Terence Lavery and

Lee McGregor were awarded Springbok colours in athletics and swimming respectively.

Would all the Old Boys who were at Marist Inanda from 1961 until 1989 please stand. Please can we give them a round of applause.

During the 70s, Br Timothy became Headmaster of the College, Mr George Manolios became head of the Primary School and Gr 0 was opened. The Marist Brothers celebrated 90 years of the Brothers in Johannesburg and land which is now the Inandas, was sold. The McGregor oval that we are now on was opened and the Science wing and the new swimming pool were established.

During the 80s, Br Anthony returned as Headmaster, two international school tours were undertaken, and the first Valedictory Mass was celebrated. Fr Brewer was appointed chaplain.

In 1989, Mr Paul Davies was appointed headmaster of the College and Mr Greg Royce appointed headmaster of the Preparatory School.

Would all the Old Boys who attended St David's Marist Inanda from 1990 to 1999 please stand,

Please can we give them a round of applause.

The 90s were a very exciting time for St David's Marist Inanda. Mr Paul Edey was appointed College headmaster. Mr Rick Wilson was appointed Prep headmaster and Mrs Wendy Schaafsma retired after 33 years. Fr Michael Austin was appointed chaplain after the passing of our beloved Fr Brewer. The College pavilion, The Prep pavilion, Champagnat Hall, Mini Marist and the Prep computer centre were completed.

Would all the Old Boys who attended St David's from 2000 until 2010 please stand. Please can we give them a round of applause.

The new millennium brought more exciting times. A new media centre was completed and the St David's website was launched. Paul Edey was promoted to Executive Head and Malcolm Williams was appointed Headmaster of the College. The 1st cricket side won the Johnny Waite knock-out and the Gr 00 was opened.

Our Astro hockey field was completed and the new Chapel of Mary was dedicated in 2007. Also, the Old Boys hosted the first Rite of Passage dinner for the matrics.

Fr Chaka Motanyane was appointed chaplain and Mrs Glenda Anderson retired after 35 years. As we know in 2010 we hosted the World Cup football and Mr Phineas Selima retired after 52 years at St David's and the Brother Anthony wing was opened. Mr Willem van Merwe retired after 32 years and the Brothers celebrated 125 years of education in Johannesburg during this time.

These are just some of the memories that I'm sure we all can share and remind us of what a special place St David's Marist Inanda is.

This reminds me of the story about a widower and the widow. They had known each other for a number of years being high school classmates and having attended class reunions. At one such reunion, they had a wonderful evening, their sprits high, the widower throwing admiring glances across the table. The widow smiling coyly back at him. Finally, he picked up courage to ask her: will you marry me? After about six seconds of careful consideration, she answered: yes, yes I will.

The evening ended on a happy note for the widower, But the next morning he was troubled. Did she say yes or did she say no? He couldn't remember. Try as he would he just could not recall. He went over the conversation of the previous evening, but his mind was blank. He remembered asking the question, but for the life of him he could not record a response. With fear and trepidation, he picked up the phone and called her.

First, he explained that he couldn't remember as well as he used to. Then he reviewed the past evening. As he gained a little more courage he then inquired of her. When I asked if you would marry me, did you say, yes or did you say no.

Why you silly man, I said yes, yes I will. And I meant it with all my heart. The widower was delighted. He felt his heart skip a beat.

Then she continued. And I'm so glad you called because I couldn't remember who asked me.

I would like to leave you with a poem:

The title is 'Keep in touch'.

When you're done with school and your last term ends
And your various paths you take
Don't lose sight of your boyhood's friends
True pals aren't easy to make.

They may be scattered around the earth from Cape Town to Japan,
Each one trying to prove his worth
And doing his job as a man.

Another link is the Old Boys club To those you have known so long All they ask is a yearly sub, The sum, the proverbial song.

Whether or not your luck is out Or your riding on fortune's crest, You'll find in the end, beyond all doubt, That the old tried friends are the best. Remember Once a Marist Boy, always a Marist Boy.

There is a certain quality in lnanda boys that is very rare.

Mr Castle, the Chairman of the Society, has made it so incredibly easy to become a part of the Society, through his organisation of comedy evenings, reunions, rugby days or the football days which Mr Sithebe and Mr Kolkenbeck-Ruh organise with great success,



and I think you should do yourselves a favour and fully embrace what the Old Boys' society has to offer. Mr Castle has been at St David's since the age of 5, and I am not sure who else would you want leading the Old Boys?

I'll end off by saying it's been great to see you all again. My words may seem a little vague from your perspectives now but I hope I have mentioned something useful that you can take away. Best of luck for your final exams. Look after each other on Vac. Treasure these friendships. Cherish all of your lasts at St David's and know that your brothers will always be there for you, as you are for them.
