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
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
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"His Excellency, the Most Rev. Archbishop Martin Hubert Lucas, the new Apostolic Delegate to Southern Africa, was born at Haarlem in Holland on the 16th October, 1894. Having entered the Society of the Divine Word in 1919, he did his ecclesiastical studies at the Colleges of Uden and Teteringen, where he was ordained priest on the 26th October, 1924. After holding several important positions in the Dutch Province of his Society he was appointed Apostolic Delegate to Southern Africa in succession to the late Archbishop Gijlswijk and was consecrated Titular Archbishop of Aduli in Rome on the 27th October, 1945.



Brother Frederick (1846–1946)

The Press and Radio of South Africa on October 7th, 1946, announced as an event of importance, the death of Brother Frederick, and surely to thousands of Marist Brothers and Marist Old Boys, the passing of this venerable well-beloved figure was a most significant and regretted happening.

Brother Frederick was within three weeks of his hundredth birthday, when on Sunday, 6th October, he very peacefully breathed his last, fortified by the rites of Holy Church and surrounded by his colleagues and the devoted Sisters of St. Josephs, who comforted and helped him in his last days. Although he had been a patient at St. Joseph's Nursing Home for the past two years, he was far from being an invalid, and had he had his own way he would have been up and doing, attending to his well cultivated garden and interesting himself in the Marist College at Uitenhage.

Readers of the "Maristonian" will be familiar from back numbers with the work of Bro. Frederick but let us give the salient features for those unacquainted with them. He was born in the South of France on 28th October 1846, joined the Marist Brotherhood 68 years ago, and came to South Africa in 1878 where for the past sixty years he was occupied in various capacities in Port Elizabeth, Uitenhage, Johannesburg and Roma Basutoland. He became Provincial Superior of The Marist Order in South Africa in 1903 and was Superior of The Marist Order in Uitenhage, Roma and of course Johannesburg where he established Marist Brothers Koch Street in 1889, the oldest surviving Boys-School in Johannesburg.

The writer of this notice can be pardoned if from now on he quotes freely from his own account of the Golden Jubilee celebration of the Marist Brothers Johannesburg held in 1939, since Brother Frederick was a central figure there.

He arrived in Johannesburg on September 24th 1889, after a few days journey from Port Elizabeth. The Golden City was then a small mining village set among the boulder-strewn veld, with neither spectacular mine dumps nor fine buildings to relieve the dreary surroundings, nothing but tin shanties, wattle and daub-huts and occasional glimpses of the gaunt mining machinery. Three years previous the diggings had been proclaimed and extremely primitive conditions prevailed.

On October 9th, Brother Frederick and his two Marist colleagues waited expectantly for the arrival of the first pupils in the one-storied building that was then Koch Street Marist School. At 9.30 a.m. Peter Busschau, the first pupil, came in. Five more trickled in within the next hour, and by 11 a.m. twenty cheering lads from Fox Street, where the End Street Convent then was, came along in a waggonette, obligingly bringing their desks with them. The first foundation had been truly laid; the work had begun. In two years there were 300 pupils and before a dozen years had elapsed the roll numbered 700. Of course three small class-rooms had to be added too, the marquee was set up, where seventy youngsters could be taught, that is, when it wasn't flooded out by one of Johannesburg's torrential downpours.

Milestones marking the progress were : The Presentation of the first Candidates in 1894 for Matriculation, The establishment of the first Cadet Corps 1895, the erection of the gymnasium and the holding of public gymnastic displays, organisation of Soccer and Cricket Teams and continual addition to the buildings and amenities of the School. Bro. Frederick had his cinema shows and gramophone concerts in the 1890's—tremendous novelties in those far-off days.

Old pupils of 50 years ago will tell you about all this as they lovingly speak of their old master going round the classes with a famous "black bag" containing sweets for good boys and the hidden sticks that meant "bitter sweet" for the not so good. In the 1939 Golden Jubilee Celebrations of the School, Bro. Frederick was once more in Johannesburg among these old boys. The black bag and stick were also there and each of them received a sweet and a rap of the stick—. The accolade which the grand old man bestowed on these grand old boys of the days that were long since.

Before leaving Johannesburg as "provincial superior" in 1903, Bro. Frederick had the satisfaction of seeing the School he founded expand into a great College of 700 pupils. The next six years, his energies were devoted to the administrative work of the Marist Province. In 1907 he established a mission school and agricultural College among the Basutos at Roma some twenty miles from Maseru and when a few years later he became superior of the Mission, thanks to his energy and ability, the wilderness began to blossom. A fine mission, agricultural and teachers training school now exists as monuments to his labours in Basutoland.

In 1912 on Sunday afternoon, a severe cyclone struck the Roma Mission, the Brother's house was destroyed and Bro. Federick and a companion were buried among the ruins. Bro. Euphrase was killed but Bro. Frederick was rescued unscathed some hours later and with characteristic energy at once set about rebuilding.

Bro. Frederick was a very human personality and possessed a fund of quiet humour and a merry twinkle in his eyes that close on his hundreth birthday enabled him to recognise his latest acquaintance. "I'll try to make my century," "I'll try to carry my bat", were expressions he used to utter. He bravely carried his bat through life and even if he missed the century by a few runs, all Marists and their old pupils salute this fine Christian gentleman and are proud of the heritage he left them. R.I.P.

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RELIGIOUS NOTES

During the past year the spiritual welfare of all boys in the College has been carefully attended to. The Catholic boys have had solid training in the Truths of their Religion, while regular instruction has been given to non-Catholic pupils. The only sound basis for any education is Religion: unless our boys are imbued with this vital principle, our work is in vain.

Generous contributions have again been made to the Holy Childhood Fund. During the year Rev. Father Erasme visited us, to thank the boys for their generosity in the past. He urged them to make even greater efforts, and especially to make their donations a personal sacrifice. Interest was added to his visit by the screening of some entertaining and instructive films on Native Mission Work.

We were sorry to lose our zealous Chaplain early in the year: Rev. Father Mason. We wish to express to him our deep gratitude for his solid and conscientious work among us. We extend to his successor, Rev. Father Abel, a warm welcome, and express our gratitude for what he has already done for us. Rev. Father Delport, has continued to take a live interest in the College. He has generously and regularly helped us with Mass and Confessions: we are very grateful to him.

In September our Catechism classes were examined by Rev. Father O' Callaghan, who expressed himself well satisfied with the Religious Training at the College. We thank Father O' Callaghan for the sympathetic and thorough manner in which he conducted the examinations.

At the end of the second term we were honoured with a visit from His Lordship, The Rt. Rev. Bishop O' Leary, who came to present certificates and trophies won last year. In a very interesting and practical address, His Lordship impressed on the boys the great importance of Christian Education, stressing the fact that their primary end in life was the love and service of Almighty God. Many of us learned for the first time that His Lordship was a Marist pupil sixty years ago, and that he had also once been a dashing Rugby three-quarter. We are sorry to hear that His Lordship's health has not been the best lately, and we wish him a speedy recovery.





Rev. Brother Provincial's Bursary.



The War Memorial Chapel Appeal Committee.





CHINA.

Eight years of warfare in China ended with the collapse of the Japanese Empire in August 1945. The courageous Chinese leaders and people during those long and terrible years will always be remembered.

The world is vaguely aware of the destruction and suffering endured by China since 1937. We hear much of the homeless people in Europe, which is bad enough, yet it is estimated that about 40 million Chinese were driven from their homes after July, 1937, and those who survived found shelter in the unoccupied areas in Western China. Many millions died through starvation, brutality and inhumanity.

China played a great role in the war. She opposed the threats of Japan and waded through eight years of hardship and destruction. She played the major factor in the bringing about of the defeat of Japan, for she weakened the power and strength of her enemy so that she was too weak to resist the allied Lattack.

Now begins the second struggle. The struggle for the reconstruction of China. But there can be no real reconstruction until there is a United China. At present China is in a very critical position. Civil War seems inevitable. Both parties, the Nationalists and the Communists cannot seem to come to an agreement. Whatever the outcome may be, the good works accompanied by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek, the leader of the Nationalist Party, will always be imprinted in the sands of time.

At the beginning of the war China was unprepared, the Chinese were ill-disciplined, unorganised and in want of equipment and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek took the responsibility of disciplining and equipping the Chinese Army, and through his strategy, tactics, personal bravery, patience and cheerfulness he brought about the defeat of Japan. A strong, stable, democratic China is necessary for the future peace of the world. There is little or no danger that such a nation will have dreams of world domination such as led to the downfall of Japan. Her principles are against it.

China has existed as a Nation for more than 30 centuries. In that space of time many great nations rose and fell. What is the reason for China's longevity? I think it is the character of the people, their love of the good earth, their loyalty to the family, their philosophy of good-will to mankind. It will be well if other nations would adopt their characteristics, the principles which guided China through the ages of time.

THE "MARIE CELESTE"

It was dawn when I sighted her. She was rocking aimlessly through the rough seas, silhouetted against the colourful rays of the rising sun, just peeping above the horizon.

"Ship to our starboard !" I shouted, watching her clumsy movements. The Captain soon appeared, and followed the ship with his telescope, a puzzled expression twisting his ruddy face: our practical Captain for once in his life, seemed undecided. He finally ordered the helmsman to change course, and we drew abreast the strange ship. There was no sign of life, and a heavy silence hung over her like an evil cloak. The Captain ordered a boat to be lowered; I was among those chosen to man it, and the Captain himself accompanied us.

Our footsteps sounded noisily on the weathered deck, and our shouts went unanswered. A huge albatross circled lazily above us, and I remembered that this bird is an evil omen to seamen. The ship's timbers creaked, the wind whistled through her rigging, but no human sound reached our ears. We were already leaving when I sighted the diary, lying under a rusted old sea chest. Common seaman's curiosity prompted me to read it before parting with it. There being no time just then, I tucked it under my shirt and joined the rest of the party, where I was greeted by a very irate Captain.

That night, under the flickering light of a stunted candle, I pored over my discovery. The writer was evidently a simple seaman, but his last few entries held me spellbound. They clearly explained the mystery of that strangely deserted ship.

The Second day of December, 1845.

The weather has not improved, and to-night promises to be stormy. We have not yet reached port, and nerves are affecting the crew. This morning the half-breed Carlos excited the crew by saying he'd had another of his visions,—this time he's dreamed of sudden death.

Afternoon :

The weather turned out as expected, and I can even now hear the thunder rolling closer. We have not reached our destination, and this has somewhat dampened even the most optimistic spirits. An early mist has fallen, and time only thickens it. The atmosphere down here seems clammy, I am going on top for a breath of sea air.

The Third day of December, 1845.

The minute I reached deck last night, I sensed something wrong. Every man I saw was staring stiffly past the leeward, even the thunder had stopped. I turned slowly, expecting to see something terrible, and saw-at first-nothing. When my eyes grew more accustomed to the mist, I made out the faint, yet softly glowing outlines of a ship, bearing down on us. An icy fear gripped my heart, I stared stupidly and clenched my fists. My fingernails dug into moist palms, and my eyes instinctively closed as I awaited the inevitable collision. A hoarse whisper opened my eyes. "The Flying Dutchmanthe Ghost Ship !" gasped its terrified owner, and I gaped as I saw the bow of this "ghost ship" pass soundlessly through the solid bulk of the "Marie Celeste's" side. The whisper broke the tension and, as one man, the crew rushed for the lifeboats, myself among them. It was then that I slipped helplessly to the deck, and was trodden down by

those behind me. With the words "Flying Dutchman" roaring in my ears, I slipped into confused oblivion.

The Fourth day of December, 1845.

This morning I noticed that I was not quite alone on the "Marie Celeste". The dead body of Captain Beckett lay huddled against the railing. His hair was matted with blood. Captain Beckett died in the pursuit of his duty, he had foolishly tried to stop that mad stampede for the life-boats. I then noticed only one of the life-boats was missing, and I realised that many of the terror stricken crew, in their frantic haste, had met with a watery grave. The Tenth day of December, 1845.

I cannot control the ship, and I have a feeling I'll never see land again. This morning I noticed a huge albatross hovering over the ship; she reminds me of a vulture, patiently waiting for me to die. The heat is unbearable, but I cannot stay below decks, for everything there reminds me of my jovial shipmates, whose laughter will never more echo through a ship. The "Marie Celeste" has a new, unfriendly atmosphere, she seems to resent my presence, and this, coupled with the utter hopelessness of my position, is driving me mad.

The Twenty-first day of December, 1845.

I cannot stay on this evil ship any longer. There is only one place for me to find rest. The sea is calling, the sea —

The unenviable fate of this luckless sailor brought a lump to my throat, but I knew that our cynical Captain would not be affected in any such way. He would merely jest about the appearance of a "ghost ship", he would only ridicule the sailor for choosing the end he did. I suddenly knew what I was going to do.

I reached the deck, diary in hand, and strode over to the rails. Salty spume flecked my face, and a cold night wind fanned my cheek, whipping my hair over my eyes. Far into this dark, wild freedom I flung the little book, where its owner might reclaim it



From the Drum-Major A Knight, down to the very youngest, we all fully appreciated the work done by Mr. Beattie.



The weather on this occasion was exceptionally warm for June and we naturally noted this, our visitors the more so.



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

The Under XI Rugby was started for the first time this year and it has given the very young boys of the College an opportunity of learning, at an carly age, how the game is to be played.





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

As soon as possible Inter-School Matches will be organised so that Tennis may hold its own among the sporting activities of the College.

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



Other personalities of the boxing world present were Mr. Pitts and Col. Short, both of whom are connected with the professional ring in the Transvaal.



THE DIARY OF THE YEAR.

The record of events at Inanda during 1946 was faithfully kept by Jock Airoldi and Errol Hulse.

The accuracy of their historical record is equalled only by the brevity of other entries. Nothing of importance was left out, and most of the results recorded elsewhere were put in. A few highlights are picked at random.

February 23—At the swimming Gala 15 records were broken. (This is sufficient evidence for the excellence of the coaching methods of Bro. Michael and Bro. Bartholomew.—Ed.)

March 7—J.C. boys had their first practical science lesson in the new laboratory. All the bunsens were lit to celebrate the occasion.

March 17—School 1st Cricket XI defeated the Old Boys 125-77.

March 18—In the High Jump, R. Buffa established an Under 14 record with a jump of 5 ft. 3/4 in. Over 15, Kennaugh established 16 ft. 9 ins. for the Long Jump.

April 13—Boarders go to Observatory to see their College tie in the triangle relay races, Observatory—Koch Street—Inanda, with 8 points each.

May 3—After a long delay the Drinking Fountains were erected in the playing fields and proved most popular, even as a source of amusement to the junior school members until . . .

May 9th—Day scholars football league began. (It proved most interesting and successful throughout the season. Usually six teams took the field, sometimes eight. The climax of the season was the defeat of the 2nd XI by the day scholars. Ed.)

May 19—Senior Catholic Boarders attend Corpus Christi Procession at Ellis Park.

August 1—All Catholic boys attended Mass to beg God's blessing on the 2nd half. August 16—Feast of Assumption and a holiday. The first cross-country race was held. The Course was down past the Inanda Club, through Ilkley Estate, past Sandown and over the veld to the turn near the old abandoned school-house, back past Tara and home. Part of the Course, as measured by the speedometer of the school-car, exceeded 7 miles. The estimated distance was 8 miles. Gonsalves won this in the phenomenal time of 45 minutes with G. Airoldi 2nd and E. Hulse 3rd.

August—30—Rev. Father Erasme, O.M.I., made his annual appeal for the Holy Childhood most interesting by a film in colour, about the work of the Holy Childhood. Both Father Erasme and the picture were given an excellent reception. Even this was exceeded by the announcement that Bishop O'Leary had awarded a half-holiday to the school for the excellence of its work in this field.

September 4—Rev. Father G. O'Callagan, O.M.I., carried out the annual inspection of the Christian Doctrine classes. To show his appreciation of the boys work, through the year, he asked the Principal for extra recreation and this was granted amid prolonged cheers.

September 17—The Seniors go to the Marist Old Boys Memorial Chapel Fete and came back much filled but much poorer for the afternoon at Observatory.

October 23—Brother Bartholomew returned from town with 150 feet of cricket netting. Little time elapsed before frames were erected, the nets being hung and three practice cricket wickets were in operation. Our Cricket Coach is kicking his heels in England awaiting transport to South Africa. When he comes, coaching and practice goes on to a very systematic basis.

THE CHAPLAIN.

The welcome given him and his confreres by the natives was a great compensation for much that they had to suffer previously.

Most conspicuous was the fidelity of the natives during their absence for the war years; they regarded the return of the Fathers as further proof of the prevalence of God. Our old friend Father Hanno, O.F.M., returned to Kokstad and Father Coelistin, O.F.M., to Mount Frere.

Father Canisius, O.F.M., was succeeded as Chaplain to Inanda by Rev. Father F. Konz, O.M.I., whose regular class lessons on Christian Doctrine, and whose short sermons on Sundays, are an outstanding example of practical concrete religious instruction.

The Jury were Clarke, McGrath, Hart and Smith. After many pertinent and impertinent questions to the witnesses, they returned a verdict of "Not Guilty."




After such a game the Old Boys enjoyed their refreshments to the full— and the School XI scored up equally as well.





OLD BOYS' NOTES

THE OLD MARISTONIAN CLUB.

It is my privilege, as Chairman of the Old Maristonian Club, to give you some first hand information about this ambitious undertaking of the Old Boys Association. Perhaps a few explanatory notes might be useful to enable you to fully appreciate the worthy motive underlying the formation of this social and sporting centre.

Many readers, for many years, have scanned these pages for the news of an Old Boys Ground, some have been patient and confident, others dubious and disappointed, but fortunately not apathetic. The Club is our War Memorial, and as such how can it fail to appeal to parents of present boys and old boys ?

The property acquired on the Pretoria Road is now being developed and the large dwelling house is being converted into a very comfortable Club House equipped with every convenience to ensure the comfort of members. One of its attractive features is the large lounge opening out on to a verandah 54 feet by 28 feet which will be admirable for all social functions. The Bar, Dining Room, Club Room, etc., complete the picture of the main building, while at little cost the large fruit packing shed at the back of the main building will be transformed into change rooms equipped with showers.

Ground development has started, and the Club is putting down two Bowling Greens, three Tennis Courts, a grass Rugby Field, Soccer Field, and a Cricket Oval which will be turfed as soon as the levelling has been completed. Owing to an inexhaustible supply of water from four points, maintenance of the grounds and gardens does not present a difficult problem, and the Club has been fortunate in obtaining nearly all the piping necessary to lead water to the new fields. Approximately \pounds 6,000 is at present being spent on development, so you can all appreciate that the Club is now an established fact.

The present membership consists entirely of 100 Foundation Life Members and Ordinary Membership will be opened in January 1947, and judging by the large number of interested people who visit the ground every week-end, we can look forward to at least 500 new members during 1947. Donations to the Club exceed £ 1,000, proof positive that this project is appealing not only to those directly interested in the Marist movement, but also to the general public.

The Club's sporting activities have been confined to Hockey, Rugby and Cricket, but next season will see our re-entry into Soccer, and it might be advisable at this stage to remind you that the Club, at present running under the name "Marist Brothers Association Football Club" has no connection whatsoever with either the Marist College or the Old Boys Association, and has not had any since 1939. It is perhaps a tragedy that a Club, originally sponsored and supported by the College and its Old Boys since 1902, should through circumstances beyond our control, become our competitors in this field of sport. Owing to some legal technicality, The Marist Brothers, I understand, cannot force this Club to change its name, and as it refuses to do so voluntarily, I think it only fair to everyone interested to know the true facts especially as the Old Maristonian Club is about to participate in the Soccer Leagues. No good purpose can be achieved by regrets, and it only rests with us to make the best of a bad job.

I am taking this opportunity of making a direct appeal to you to either take out Life or Ordinary Membership as soon as possible, for although my Committee has ensured the establishment of the Club, you and you only can ensure its continued success. Parents of boys past and present, have still the opportunity to take out either class of membership, and we are confident that they will not only enjoy their membership to the full, but it will help to establish a community of interest between parents, and the boys past and present.





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REVIVAL OF OLD BOYS' RUGBY CLUB

After but one season, the resurrected Old Maristonian Rugby Club has won high regard in junior Rugby circles on the Rand.

A newspaper advertisement invited Old Boy Rugby enthusiasts to attend a meeting at Observatory, in April, 1946. At this meeting it was decided to enter one team in the Third League Competition this season. We would concentrate on modestly establishing the Club and, this object achieved, we would then increase the Club entry for the following season to three teams. The meeting immediately set about electing a Committee and started off by choosing Bro. Ralph, the driving force behind the whole scheme, for the task of Chairman and Coach. Bro. Patrick was elected Treasurer and the Committee was :---Messrs. S. Gillespie, Y. Dugas B. Tomkins and G. M. Artz (Secretary). In addition, the following were invited to become Hon. Vice-Presidents: Rev. Bros Vital and Macartin, Messrs. S. J. Pitts, D. Grace, L. Pollock, J. Richardson, F. O'Connor, L. Spitz, E. J. Rohan-Irwin and Bob Effren. The Rt. Rev. Bishop D. O'Leary accepted our invitation to become Patron of the Club.


Financially launched with the assistance of some Old Boy well-wishers, and with the co-operation of Rev. Bro. Raymond, the Headmaster, who had placed at our disposal the facilities at the College, the Club then kicked off to its first season.

With a membership of just over 30 and only one team, it was appreciated that not every one could play regularly. The membership was, however, too small to field a second team with any success. But most members who have attended practices have represented the Club on at least one occasion. Very sportingly, they realised that sacrifices would have to be made. To ensure the team's success, practices were held twice a week.

The occasion of the first game, on April 20, was the only time I ever saw the Coach despair. It was a friendly game against Combined Banks. Five minutes before the start of the game only 12 of the Old Boys had arrived. Bro. Ralph was looking very worried when two more arrived and with a depleted side, we took the field to win 13-9. All subsequent fixtures allayed any of the Coach's fears, for there was always a good attendance of players and supporters. It was not until the fifth match of the season that the Old Boys had their first and only taste of defeat, at the hands of the heavier Wanderers "A" side, by 14 points to 6. This defeat was avenged in the final league match of the season, when we defeated Wanderers 15-3. The most memorable encounter of all was the one with the hitherto all-conquering Old Forestonians. In this game the Old Boys had the better throughout. They were perhaps unfortunate to share the points, in drawing 11-all with Forests, who then went on to win all their subsequent fixtures, just as we did. We defeated them 6-5 in the play-off thus becoming league leaders of our section. We lost 12-8 to Rietfontein in one of the fastest and finest games of the season.

REMINISCENCES OF AN 1887 PIONEER

We left Uitenhage to see the first Grahamstown Exhibition. We then left for Kimberley, which at that time was still a tin-shanty town with many mud heaps. At the end of November we set out by ox-waggon for Witwatersrand.

In this half-tent waggon was slung a big katel made from ox-reims with an eight-inch thick feather mattress. The mattress, about eight feet by six was a good shock absorber, the roads were in a wretched condition, all ruts and bumps. We were travelling during the rainy season and often a waggon sank to the axles; the following vehicle gave that place a wide berth. In places the road widened to five hundred yards.

We had struck a bad thunder storm, the lightning was vicious and we were a little uneasy. The Zulu drivers then broke the news to us that we had a full load of dynamite and advised, that we had better "pas op".

At length we arrived at the Vaal River; it was in high flood and the "Pont" had been carried away. For fourteen days we sat and watched the river, before a crossing was made. During the vigil our supply of flour gave out, but we fared well on two muid sacks of mos bolletjie rusks and biltong. Eventually we arrived at an outspan six miles from the main camp of the Rand. Our five weeks' trek through rain and mud was over. We could rest now from the constantly recurring task of extricating our waggon from the many bad spots. Among the Trekkers along the route there had been much borrowing and lending of spans of The people of one waggon cheerfully and oxen. willingly assisting in the difficulty of others. This was the spirit of the times. In those times as long as you were a white man and played the game you were every one's friend. Race was no bar to fellowship. But, unfortunately, the Jameson Raid with its consequent ill-feeling and wars, destroyed this fellowship and has left us with the ugly inheritance of Racial intolerance.

At the age of five years I attended my first school, a wood and iron shanty. Our teacher was Mr. Bailey. This class was six strong, four boys and two girls. This school with its mud floor was stuck out in the veld, near where now stands the Victoria Hotel. My next school was St. Michael's College out on the hills where later the first Jeppe High School was built. By now I had learned to ride a donkey, so getting to school was no hardship. But what scraps I got into with the boys over that donkey ! They would ask to leave the 100m and go off for a ride.

My next school was the Marist Brothers. We were a tough lot, due, I think to the Kimberley element. The Kimberley kids were the world's worst. In Brother Valerian we had a very fine lion-tamer—A boy had to be sent only once to Brother and he would be cured for keeps. Then dear old Brother Frederick would come along with a bag of sweets to cure the pain.

In 1895 or 96 there was the big explosion at Veldschoendorp. Mr. George Geddes was my teacher then. When the explosion occurred, the ink-wells were forced out of the desks and a cloud of dust came down from the ceiling. I did not wait for permission to leave but rushed out, grabbed my bike and rode towards the gasometers at the edge of Veldschoendorp. We thought one of the tanks had blown up. I followed the crowd: men on horse-back and cape carts racing for the dorp.

And what a sight ! The houses were blown flat and the veld for half a mile was covered with white feathers; no, it wasn't snow. The feather mattresses and pillows had been blown to bits. There were some awful sights that day.

To-day, I look back.

A very enjoyable and successful dance was held and we take this opportunity of thanking the Ladies, Mesdames Martin, Saber, Chandler, Kelly, Haupt, Sister O'Connor and Mrs. McMaster for their kindly assistance without which there would have been poor success. We extend also our sincere appreciation to our very willing helpers, Messrs. Haupt and son, Kelly, N. Artz and Frank McCue.

Speaking of the future, I wish to make an appeal to all Old Boy Rugby enthusiasts to join us next season. This is a 100 per cent Marist Club, the only qualification for membership being past attendance at any Marist College and the desire to play Rugby in the right spirit.

It is the intention to enter an Under 19 side in next season's competition. This season's successful team has every chance of promotion to a higher league and we may possibly enter yet another team. That depends on the loyalty of our Rugby players, and we have any amount of them playing for outside teams on the Rand. With three competitive teams in 1947 we shall be taking a step in the right direction towards building up an Old Boys Rugby Club to compare with the best. We shall be installed on our own ground at the new Maristonian Club on the Pretoria Road. Mr. Bob Effren has offered the Club generous financial assistance towards the ground, so all that remains is for our ranks to swell with the influx of Rugby talent which undoubtedly exists among Old Boys.

In conclusion, on behalf of the Old Maristonian Rugby Club, I wish to express my appreciation to the Principal, Brothers and boys at Observatory for their kind co-operation which assisted us in becoming established.
