## A TRIBUTE TO <br> WILLEM VAN DER MERWE

In Marist school culture there is a Marist style based on presence, simplicity, family spirit, love of work and Mary's way. Willem's love for the Marist Brothers is evident. Willem was born in Cape Town and went to school at Northlea in Rhodesia and he is the only South African citizen that I know that has two ID books with different dates of birth and I leave it up to your imagination as to what he uses them for.

How do you summarise a lifetime? Well, it will take a while.
Willem arrived at St David's 32 years ago and I still recall my first meeting with him when Brother Anthony introduced me to a Texan smoking, ex-Zimbabwean soldier, cement factory builder, farmer, handyman, steel worker, grass grower, builder, plumber, welder and fixer of anything but unfortunately Willem couldn't swim. Willem and I took swimming lessons at the Eskom swimming pool and I had to pretend that I couldn't swim so as not to embarrass him as he was training for Iron Man.

When Willem first arrived at St David's it was very simple, there was no tractor, there was no bakkie, no tools and there was definitely no golf cart. There were no fences around St David's and keeping people off the property was a huge nightmare. Pupils on motor bikes were the worst especially when they chose to ride on the cricket pitches. One such person, who shall remain nameless proceeded to do a victory lap down Rivonia Rd after destroying one of the pitches and with the help of Brother Aidan's X-ray vision, we got his number plate.
One weekend, on a trip to the Rugani farm, we brought the old tractor back to St David's where Willem fixed up Rugani 1 and that is the red tractor that you still see driving around the school nowadays.

We all remember Willem's Big Foot Ford bakkie that was used for pulling the lawnmower, carrying building supplies from the hardware, and giving children rides at their birthday parties. Willem loved custom made vehicles and fast bikes. Every three months the latest, fastest motor bike was heard driving out of his house on Sunday mornings to the Breakfast run.

My first recollection of Willem's sporting ability was when we were sitting in Willem's lounge in January 1980 and we were watching television and Willem said how great it would be to run the Comrades Marathon that was advertised on TV. My immediate comment was to tell him that the first thing he needed to do was to stop smoking. He then picked up the last pack of Texan Plain and threw it in the rubbish bin and the next 10 Comrades were history.
Willem has toured the world and been to places that we would only dream of. After returning from a trip to Tokyo and having arrived at home at 2 in the morning, he was rudely awakened by Tom McFadden and I as we had not yet qualified for the Comrades and had to run the Benoni Marathon that morning to qualify.
Willem's claim to fame after Comrades races was that he was always dehydrated and had to be taken to hospital every year to have drips put into him to rehydrate him. Two incidents that really stand out were on one of our Comrades races, at 62 km , I was going to stop with ITB. Needless to say, on sitting down on the pavement, I received a quick smack on the side of the head and was told to get my $A$ into $G$ and reminded that this was my fault and he would be dragging me all the way to Durban.


Another incident I recall was on a flight to Two Oceans with George Ndlovu, Willem's 2 IC on the support staff, there was a bomb scare over Bloemfontein. The plane dropped out of the sky, the chutes came out, and Willem and George had to run from the runway to the airport. He did have quite a job getting George back into the plane to get down to Cape Town as George had never flown before.
I'm sure Willem remembers these trips to Cape Town where we used to sleep in the sick bay at St Joseph's and our long chats with Brother Benedict and Brother Lawrence in the evenings.

Willem has, apart from Comrades, Two Oceans and Iron Man also completed numerous 94.7 and Argus Cycle races, Fish River Canoe Marathons and over twenty Duzi's. I will never forget the day when he asked me to second him on one of his Iron Man escapades. Needless to say that I was more broken than he was at the end of the event.
When Willem arrived at St David's, his first workshop was part of the old stables which also doubled up as a shebeen for Osborne, next to what today is the Astro. His love of work was pushed to the limit as the area adjacent to his workshop, the present car park, was a huge hole where parents would drop and fetch their kids. Willem went about filling the hole turning it into a Prep School playground with grass and irrigation. It took over 200 loads of sand to level that area.

In his first few years at St David's, Willem's love for family was demonstrated by extending his involvement in school activities. Willem used to help coach rugby and accompanied tours especially our football trips down to East London. He then started the canoe club which went from strength to strength and a number of boys that he coached have represented the country and our boys have done exceptionally well in SA Championship races.
If it wasn't for Willem, I would probably not still be at St David's, so you can blame him for me still being here. He built my house on the property from scratch and he also built the swimming pool roof with help and prayers from Father Brewer that makes our pool the best school pool in South Africa. Not many of you know that Willem laid out the piping for the clinic in Slough that Brother Anthony was building. He assembled it on the service road and then took it apart and took it to Slough to fit into the new clinic.
Our Prep Pavilion was also one of Willem's building projects.
I remember having tickets for the Michael Jackson concert and the only one I could force to come with me was Willem. What are friends for? Willem also went to see ZZ Top but didn't like them too much! He was jealous of their beards.

Willem loves animals and Socks and Megan were always part of the school and everyone on campus knew who their boss was.

Our fields, buildings, gardens, swimming pool and cricket pitches all hold testament to Willem's huge contribution in maintaining our facilities which no other school can match.

We wish Willem good luck, good health and our thanks go with him in the next stage of his life. We are really going to miss you, Willem!

# CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT MIKE GREEFF 

## To the Matric Class of 2012:

Yet another group of St David's men are about to move into the world to take their place as adult citizens of South Africa. The lessons I share with you here will, I trust, assist you in planning your own future leadership, but more importantly your citizenship of South Africa.

What do we mean by leadership? We can take any number of approaches. Firstly, we can look at it from an academic point of view: planning, organising and controlling. Secondly, a commercial or money making approach to leadership; asks, What is in it for me? What do I get out of this? We certainly have enough of this kind of leadership in our country. Thirdly, some would see the political approach to leadership; as trampling or annihilating anyone in your way, saying what people want to hear and then not following through on promises made. We unfortunately have enough of this kind of leadership in the world as well.
In my own life, I often rely upon what I've called the Sydney Klevansky version of leadership and citizenship, which is selfand people focused. You may well ask, "Who is or was Sydney Klevansky?" He was "Klev", a legend in his world which included my world for several years. He was a teacher of mine at school, he taught me Latin from Std 6 through to Matric; he never married, he very proudly told us and then showed us that he wore false teeth; he stood no more than 5 feet 4 inches tall. Klev was 58 years old when I met him in January of 1974. This man's life was dedicated to my alma mater, Parktown Boys' High School, and to the Ark, the Jewish Orphanage. He had been at the orphanage, attended Parktown, and then gone off to fight in the Second World War. When he returned he dedicated his life to the boys of Parktown and the orphans at the Ark. He had a most distinctive voice, everyone who knew Klev recognised him through his voice: when Klev started to speak, people listened. On one occasion at an Old Boys' function, there were speakers from each of the decades of the school, from the 1920s to the 1990s, and the Ball Room at the Wanderers was packed. Klev was the last to speak. As the announcement was made that Klev was going to address the audience, everyone gave him a spontaneous standing ovation before he had said a word. Klev made his way to the stage but couldn't see over the podium. There was a scurry to get the microphone off to one side and then, as he said "Good Evening fellow Old Boys", there was another standing ovation. This was the effect that this man had on so many lives.
I count myself very privileged to have had his influence in my life. Although Klev taught me Latin, I have not spoken it since. However, I would like to share with you eight of the things he taught me that stood true when I was a boy at school and in the thirty five years since.

1. We always have a choice. In life you are going to be faced with choices at every turn and there will

always be two paths. There will be the easy thing to do and the right thing to do. Always do the right thing; the easy thing might take you a short way but the right thing will take you through to the end. When the easy thing and the right thing are the same thing, there is no decision to be made.
2. Respect people because they are people. Don't respect them because they have a rank or position; it is important to respect people because they are people and not because of what you believe they can do for you.
3. Don't expect someone else to do something you are not willing to do yourself. There is dignity in every job that needs doing. Look for the dignity in that job and respect the person doing that job to the best of their ability. If you feel that it is beneath you, don't ask someone else to do it.
4. Prepare for the next day. The next day or the exams, are a worry only when we haven't prepared for them.
5. Laugh and find humour every day. Children find laughter in everything. Why do we lose that ability to laugh, where do we lose that ability? Laugh until your stomach hurts! Actively look for it. With so much to worry about on a daily basis, let us find humour every day.
6. To be happy, you have to have three things: have something to hope for, a dream; have someone to love and to love you and have something to do. Gentlemen, have your hopes, have your dreams, nobody has the right to knock your dreams. Don't dream for somebody else, dream for yourself and when you share those dreams, you inspire people.
7. Keep a balance in your life. Don't allow one thing to dominate the rest, and if it does, be careful which one you prioritise. I have always viewed this in terms of three circles: there is your spiritual circle, your family and friends' circle and your work life circle. If any one circle becomes too big it dominates the rest. Brian Dyson, a past Chief Executive of Coca-Cola delivered an end-of-year speech in 30 seconds. He said "Imagine life as a game in which you are juggling some 5 balls in the air. You name them work, family, health, friends and spirit and you are keeping all of these in the air. You will soon understand that work is a rubber ball: if you drop it, it will bounce back. However, the other 4 balls -family, health, friends and spirit - are made of glass. If you drop one of these, they will be irrevocably scuffed, marked, nicked, damaged or even shattered. They will never be the same." Strive for balance.
8. Don't grow old, grow up. Growing old takes no skill, if a 20 year old goes to sleep today and wakes up in a year, he will be 21 years old, if an 80 year old does that the same thing will happen. Growing old takes no skill, it implies being worn down. Growing up takes skill, it implies growing and learning from life's experiences. Bob Dylan said it when he sang "May you stay forever young". Grow up but don't grow old

My blessing and wish to the Matrics of 2012 is taken from Psalm 94, verses 18 and 19, a Psalm very close to my own heart which says: "When I said, 'My foot is slipping', your love, O Lord, supported me. When anxiety was great within me, your consolation brought joy to my soul." Gentlemen you are going into new and exciting times but also frightening times. Take consolation from Psalm 94, that the Lord's unfailing love will support you, His consolation will bring you joy.

Vision 2016, our strategic plan, is focussing on 'loving, living and leaving our legacy'. 2013 lies ahead of us as a year of promise. Let us make it a year of hope for many, for ourselves and others.

## To our St David's Community

Our achievements in every area of learning and growth for the boys in 2012 have been commendable. The development of our campus has exceeded the development of the community around us; the new classroom block, the Prep playground, property acquisitions for staff housing and the continual work of keeping St David's looking the way it does. We were privileged to receive affirming feedback in the Perception Survey conducted on our behalf
by Deloittes Consulting. We came through the scrutiny of the media with dignity. We are infinitely stronger for the experience and I commend every young St David's man for the way you carried yourself through that experience. We still face the challenges of transformation and of financial pressure in difficult and tough times.
We say a very special thank you to Willem van der Merwe, who retires at the end of this year, after a lifetime of service to St David's. He has been a son of the Marist Brothers and his commitment to St David's and to the Marist Brothers has been extraordinary. On behalf of all at St David's, I send Willem our love and our best wishes. Our thoughts go with him as he moves into retirement.

## From the Foundation Manager

St Marcellin's vision was to educate the poor and the disenfranchised. This decision was not only an educational one but one that challenged the status quo of the time and contributed to social reform. The Marist Brothers subsequently took the message and the mission of St Marcellin to every continent, starting schools and universities which now exist in 76 countries across 6 continents. The Marist Brothers who started the first Marist school in the Cape in 1867 (after travelling for 62 days by ship from Marseilles) were men of courage and conviction being the first Brothers to establish a Marist School outside of the European continent. This courage and conviction has been called into play throughout the interceding years, and the Brothers have continued to challenge the socio-political status quo in South Africa and other African countries: opening the doors of their schools to black pupils in defiance of Apartheid legislation, providing 'places of safety' for struggle leaders, being integrally involved in the process of reconciliation in a divided country and challenging young men to be change-makers. A bold legacy, initiated by St Marcellin, carried forward by the Marist Brothers and entrusted to, amongst others, those of us fortunate enough to be working at St David's Marist Inanda.
Year-end provides us with an opportunity to reflect on our past year and and the successes achieved over this year as well as the seven decades preceding; a time to measure ourselves against the vision of St Marcellin as well as that of the Marist Brothers who founded our school in 1941. A walk around St David's on any given day leaves one with the impression that we have not only survived the past 71 years, but have thrived: becoming a school of nearly 130 staff who nurture and educate nearly 1200 boys on a daily basis; believing that we have the opportunity to impact on the lives of these boys and the paths they will take. Believing that, instilled with the right set of values, skills and attitudes, these boys have the potential (and, we could argue, the obligation) to contribute to a better society, on a micro, macro and global scale.
Until the early '80s, the Marist Brothers dedicated themselves to the task of educating and nurturing the boys at St David's as well as the boys and girls of the other four existing Marist Schools in South Africa. At that time, the decision was made to withdraw from the everyday running of these five schools, believing that lay educators were capable of continuing this work, so that the Brothers' energies could be directed to more pressing social needs within South Africa and other African countries. This handover was a tremendous show of faith in the abilities of the lay educators, but also presented some challenges to the Schools around maintaining the Marist ethos and around the additional financial burden incurred by having to employ good lay teachers to replace the Brother teachers. The former was (and is) achieved by the Brothers' continued presence in the Schools at various levels (Board, Foundation, various committees etc.) as well as their continued visibility and accessibility whenever needed. The Marist Management Council was also established to oversee the governance and ethos of the Marist Schools. St David's appointed a Chief Executive, whose role included oversight of ethos, governance and finances. The first CE was Paul

Edey, the highly respected Headmaster of the High School at the time. He was succeeded by Mike Greeff, the current incumbent in the position. The financial implications for St David's were addressed on a number of levels, including the aforementioned restructure in the management structures. Tight financial controls and sound business decisions have not only ensured the growth of St David's but also enabled the School to continue the work of the Brothers.

Looking back over the past and all the sacrifices that have been made to bring St David's to its present position, leaves us humbled. However, it also challenges us to look towards the future and the sustainability of the St David's in order to ensure that it continues to thrive. This thinking motivated the Board of Governors, including the Marist Brothers, to establish the St David's Marist Foundation in 2006. The objectives of the Foundation are primarily to: establish a 'war chest' on which the school can rely in the future should it need to and to support the school in its strategic objectives, amongst these being the meaningful transformation of the school. Fundamentally, the Foundation should, in the long term, provide the school with resources which will enable it to continue the Brothers' work of providing an excellent, relevant education to a broad spectrum of boys.

The Foundation has, with the support of our generous donors who share this vision, made some progress towards these goals. Our net Capital exceeded the R13 million mark at the end of 2012, and awards in excess of R3 million have been made to date. The impact of this R3 million investment is remarkable and the return on investment has, in many instances, exceeded expectation. The manifestation of St Marcellin's vision is a blessing to those involved in the process - to watch a boy or young man develop his talents, overcome adversity and just enjoy being a child, is priceless. There is no doubt that these boys' lives have been immensely impacted by the sacrifices made by others, from St Marcellin to our present-day donors and friends of the St David's Marist Foundation.

Mike Greeff's presentation in September this year challenged the whole St David's community to LOVE, LIVE and LEAVE our LEGACY; and the Jubilee Campaign, which culminated in our 75th Anniversary celebrations in 2016, provides the opportunity to make a meaningful financial contribution to this legacy.

# CHAPLAIN'S NOTES FR TEBOHO MATSEKE 

## Year of Faith

The Acts of the Apostles 14:27 states: "....They called the Church together and reported what God had done with them and how he had opened the door of faith". In this text we learn that God opened the door of faith for the early Church. As Christians, do we know that God has opened the door of faith for each one of us and invited us to step through the threshold into a deeper relationship with Him? God called and continues to call all of us to enter into His house. The Year of Faith is an opportunity for all humanity to turn towards Jesus Christ and encounter Him in the sacraments, especially in the Eucharist and discover the faith and the Church.
On the 11th of October 2012 Pope, Benedict XVI declared a Year of Faith which will last until 24th of November 2013. The 11th of October is the 15th Anniversary of the opening of the 2nd Vatican Council and also the 20th Anniversary of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. The Pope called on all Catholics to study and reflect on the documents of Vatican II and the catechism so that they may deepen their knowledge of the faith. The Pope said: "The Year of Faith is an opportunity for Catholics to experience a conversion to turn back to Jesus and enter into a deeper relationship with him. The door of faith is opened at one's baptism but during this year Catholics are called to open it again, walk through it and rediscover and renew their relationship with Christ and his Church".

In keeping with the Year of Faith, Pope Benedict XV1 canonised seven more saints on the 21st of October 2012, namely Blessed Kateri Tekakwitha, Blessed Pedro Calungson, Blessed Marianne Cope, Blessed Maria Carmello Salles Barangueras, Blessed Anna Schaffer, Blessed Jacques James Bethieu and Blessed Giovanni Battista Piamarta. Their personal stories and the difference they made by their simple lives and example provide us with inspiration. Most of these new saints died when they were very young and most died for their faith. They also all changed the lives of young people by drawing them closer to Christ.

## BENEDICT XVI DECLARED A YEAR OF FAITH

2012 was an exciting and inspiring year. In the first week of January I joined the Grade 8 boys at a camp in KwaZulu Natal. This was a meaningful experience. During the Lenten period we were reminded of the death of Jesus Christ daily as we had purple wrist bands for Lent and also the Stations of the Cross every day from Ash Wednesday until Holy week. That period brought the boys closer to the Lord and made them more aware of the solemnity that goes with Lent.


We were so fortunate to receive the relics of St Marcellin Champagnat. At a beautiful ceremony, two boys brought the relics to the altar where they were blessed. Mrs Cherie Smith, the RE Co-ordinator of the Prep School explained the meaning and significance of relics. We will keep these relics in our Chapel.
In July 2012 the School was also privileged to celebrate Mass for SAFM. This radio broadcast took place on the 29th July 2012. The boys read and sang very well and we received a great deal of positive feedback from friends and parents. In the month of September a Marcellin pilgrimage to Rome and France took place. Three of our staff members, Mr David Smith, Mrs Cherie Smith and myself were privileged to go on this meaningful and significant journey. We visited the catacombs, where we celebrated Mass and experienced the depth of our church and heard how Christians died for Christ in the early centuries. Especially moving was the painful and informative story behind St Cecilia, the patron saint of musicians. We also visited the Vatican and the tombs of St Peter and St Paul. In France, we visited the place where St Marcellin Champagnat was born, and learnt about the history of Marcellin Champagnat at The Hermitage. 2012 was also a year in which we held a retreat at Hartebeesport Dam and also celebrated the sacrament of Confirmation, at the Rosebank Parish Church where the Archbishop of Johannesburg, Buti Tlhagale, confirmed a number of St David's pupils. First Holy Communion was celebrated in the College Chapel in September where thirty eight Grade Three pupils received both the Sacraments of Reconciliation and First Holy Communion.
We pray that 2013 will be a peaceful and fulfilling year for our community here at St David's.

This has been another year where the boys of St David's have shown their appreciation of the ethos of the school and involved themselves in the many activities and drives with enthusiasm. Apart from assisting the community, the boys have developed their own awareness and compassion for others.
There are a number of activities which have now become institutions at the School. The boys have been involved in the following on a weekly basis; The Alexandra Soup Kitchen; SMILE; Visits to Mother Teresa's home in Yeoville; The Alex Science Project; visits to Headway. Many of these activities have been financially supported by the pupil body through their generous contributions on a Thursday. A full balance sheet of income and expenditure may be seen on Moodle under the Outreach course.
Many boys are unable to attend the school-organised activities and find their own activities outside of the School. It is very encouraging to see boys take the initiative in finding ways to contribute to the community and the school often receives feedback on the valuable service they have been to others.
Once again St David's was an official Shavathon host and the day raised in excess of R20 000 (contributions by both the Prep and High School). On Saturday the 3rd of March the School hosted a Shavathon at Norwood Mall and raised over R7 000. Boys were involved in Shavathons at Sandton and Eastgate Malls. Total proceeds raised by the School was in the region of R30 000 .

At the end of the first term the Grade 10 boys were involved in an Outreach Day at Drake Koka Primary School in Kwa Thema. Apart from having an academic enrichment programme, the boys were involved in games and generally made contact with children with whom they had never seen or heard of. The conditions in the surrounding township was also an eye-opener and made us aware of our privileged position. Drake Koka was also invited to St David's to be part of the Grade 11 Outreach Day in August. The theme of the day was the Olympic Games and pupils were divided into 'countries' and entered the 'stadium' to the sounds of their 'own national anthems'. The games were of a fun and competitive nature and again encouraged contact and getting to know those of different cultures and backgrounds. As lunch was distributed a light snow descended to mark a very memorable day.

In the second term St David's was involved in the 94.7 Jacaranda Winter Warmer campaign. We were able to collect 101 blankets and R7690 with which 258 blankets were bought. Sister Heather organised a blood drive in the school pavilion on Friday 29th of June which was also successful. The month of June also saw the Champagnat Day celebrations which raised R92 000 for the School Bursary Fund. These funds came from sales on the day and donations made prior to the day. Many thanks to boys in both the Prep School and High School and especially to Mrs Marais, for her organisation and co-ordination of the day.
The annual trip to Maristcare in the Eastern Cape was a great success. Five matric boys and three Grade 11 boys were involved in painting, visiting soup kitchens, crèches and clinics. The trip was from Monday 13th August to Friday 17th August.
Civvies day in October yielded a number of tins of food as well as donations. The tins will be made up as parcels for the people of our soup kitchen and the money goes into a High School account which funds the various activities our boys are involved in. Thanks to Mr Dave Hill for initiating the Movember drive for cancer. A number of the male staff in the High School have grown moustaches to support this cause. The year will end with our Christmas gift initiative. Gifts will be delivered to Mother Teresa's Home in Yeoville.
This has been a successful year on the Service front and our boys and their parents have contributed generously. Involvement in Service has grown and the enthusiasm of those who will be taking up the portfolio next year will ensure that this growth is maintained.

# SALT OF THE EARTH 

EASTERN CAPE SERVICE TRIP

A party of eight boys and two staff members departed for ADDO in the Eastern Cape in the earlier hours of the morning on Monday 13th August. The 13 hour journey was made easier by our early start but was certainly an eventful one. Most memorable was our trip through Middleburg (North Eastern Cape). The town is in decay and poverty and unemployment is everywhere. It is an example of what is happening in many rural South African towns and was an education for our boys. Having left St David's at four in the morning we arrived in ADDO at approximately four thirty that afternoon.

The Sisters of Mercy have a small complex at ADDO which consists of a modest size church, house occupied by the sisters and comfortable volunteer quarters with kitchen and two rooms with showers. Sister Martha welcomed us and made sure our stay was an organised and happy one. Each morning we met in the church and Sister Martha had a reading and hymn ready. Songs were played and the words reflected upon. The boys found this spiritual start to the day inspiring and it focused us on what we were doing and why. On the Tuesday morning we departed for Dunbrody where a small primary school is situated. The name of the school is 'Sacred Heart' and we spent two days there preparing the outside walls for painting. Having brought paint down with us we still purchased the necessary undercoat in the town of Kirkwood. Apart from making a contribution to the school, our boys picked up DIY skills which will stand them in good stead. The children of the school are from homes with very modest incomes but they were all dressed in uniform and cheerful. Our boys were touched by the surroundings of the school and the facilities that the children have to make do with. There are no playing fields and pools of rain still stood around the grounds. There are only a few classrooms but the Marist Brothers have been involved in trying to upgrade and provide what they can in terms of maintenance and sponsorship.

The St David's boys inter-acted a fair amount with the children and played games and chatted. This was again an experience for our boys who witnessed first-hand some
of the poverty of our country. They could not fail to feel privileged in a sea of want and lack of facilities. Up the road from the school is a more affluent primary school which stood out in contrast to Sacred Heart. As Brother Christopher pointed out, it has a profound psychological effect to see what others have and then to compare. Our contribution in part was to make those children feel better about themselves and to make them realise that they too are deserving of the better things in life. At the end of our stay the children sang for us and presented us with gifts of oranges. The valley is orange country which sustains the local population to a large extent.
On the third day we were taken around to see the work of the Sisters of Mercy and Marist Brothers. First stop was a crèche which was established in an RDP township. The crèche was established to look after children whose parents had no minders when at work. Our boys were shown the facilities and again inter-acted with the children. We were then taken on a visit to a clinic which was initiated by the Marist Brothers and their sponsors. In the afternoon we made a trip to Uitenhage and were welcomed by Brother Christopher and Brother Claude. This was followed by a trip to the Joe Slovo squatter camp where our boys assisted at the soup kitchen and handed out sweets which we had brought with us. The dire poverty of the area was shown to us as we visited a tin shelter which housed a mother and her five children.

The trip was an emotional one and once again put into perspective the privileged position we find ourselves in. This was the lesson of the visit and was as much a part of its aim as was our contribution to the local community. The boys were also exposed to the work of the Marist Brothers and reminded of the values of those special people. The ethos of our School and its role in the community was also brought into sharper focus. It was a week which the boys will never forget.

# HEADMASTER'S REPORT <br> MR R WILSON 

It was a quiet day in heaven when the bell at the Pearly Gates rang. St Peter opened them to find the Pope standing there (Don't worry Father Teboho - this isn't blasphemous!)

He welcomed him in and took him to a comfortable little suite and told him breakfast was served at 8 h 00 . The Pope went to sleep and the next morning was woken by a tremendous noise from outside his window.
When he looked out, he saw a golden chariot being drawn by a wonderful team of horses and a brass band marching in front - all proceeding along a red carpet. Inside the chariot was an ordinary, but tired looking man.

A bit irked - the Pope called St Peter and queried why such a fuss had been made of this "ordinary fellow" when he, the Pope had slipped into heaven with a minimum fanfare?

St Peter said, "It's all a question of precedence. We expect all Popes and priests to take their place in heaven, but the ordinary looking man - he's a Headmaster - the first one of his kind to make it in here!!"
Chief Executive Mr Mike Greeff and Mrs Greeff, Chairman of the Board - Mr Artemides, Members of the Board, Special guests of honour, Ron Thackwell and Mrs Thackwell, Fr Teboho, Head of High School Mr Williams, invited guests, colleagues, ladies and gentlemen and the boys of the Senior Prep.
Earlier this year, I attended the ISASA annual conference in Durban. As is usual, it had a theme and the theme was "From Success to Significance." It was an extremely thought provoking conference with two outstanding addresses, amongst many, from two great South Africans: Dr Imtiaz Sooliman and Braam Malherbe.

Imtiaz Sooliman was the founder of The Gift of the Givers. Whilst I had heard of and admired the work of the Foundation, I had no real idea of the extent of the work they have done in far-flung countries and the unbelievable success with which they have met. Thus far they have distributed over R475 million in 33 different countries and saved hundreds, if not thousands of lives. So inspirational was Dr Sooliman's address, he received a sustained standing ovation.

Braam Malherbe is another remarkable South African. He is an extreme athlete, author, motivational speaker and TV presenter. He achieved two world firsts by running the entire length of the Great Wall of China - 4800kms (a marathon a day for 98 consecutive days with only Sunday as a rest day.) He and his partner also ran the entire coastline of South Africa ( 3200 kms .) He also took part in the Great Race to the South Pole and came 3rd. All of these activities were undertaken as fund raisers for children who have been born with cleft palates and cleft lip disfigurements and the corrective surgery they receive is nothing short of miraculous enabling them to face society as 'normal people.'


These two addresses by significant people and the underpinning theme of the conference made me pause in thought. From Success to Significance? How does that epithet apply to school and to children? What is the great aim of education - to turn out children who will be successful in life or young folk who are going to be significant in life? Which is more important - making a lot of money to enable a life of comfort and luxury or making a difference in the lives of others, to your country or even the world? In trying to draw a comparison between the two - would it be fair to say that successful people are more motivated for themselves whilst significant people live their lives for the good of others? Maybe, maybe not! Is there a hidden meaning in the title "From Success to Significance" which implies that success is the lower rung of the achievement ladder and significance therefore rates above it? Is it possible to be both successful and significant at the same time? Perhaps it is!
What should be the focus or goal of a good school - success or significance and how does one engender something as altruistic as living a significant life ahead of success, when all every boy wants to really do is pass university, own a BMW, have the latest technology in his pocket and enjoy overseas holidays? Perhaps this is where the understated value of a strong Outreach programme comes into play. By assisting those in need whilst you are so young - you are taking steps towards significance. It certainly takes a pretty special human being to constantly put others before oneself.

In terms of successes and significance, how has St David's rated this year? Mr Greeff has given you some facts about whole school developments and initiatives undertaken. Some of them could be regarded as significant and others as successes.

In the Prep we have enjoyed a particularly significant year in terms of Outreach for a start. At the final Board meeting

I was able to present each member and the Marist Brothers with an extremely detailed 16 page report compiled by Mrs Cherie Smith on the activities and assistance given to those in need. We were called on to help more frequently than in any previous year and you, our St David's family, responded magnificently. I thank all of you and all the teachers involved most sincerely for your support in this regard. If you have the time and inclination - please take 10 minutes to go onto our website to read Cherie's report.

There is a national shortage of teachers with more leaving the profession than entering it. We are trying to be proactive in this regard and we currently have two of our 'old boys' as teacher interns in the Prep. Byron King and Darryl Jago are superb young men and both have the makings of becoming excellent teachers in the not-too-distant future. A significant initiative!

What about successes this year? There have been many. The academic highlights will be celebrated tonight and yesterday we recognised the achievements of our boys across a whole range of sports. One of the highlights had to be the swimming results where both our ' $A^{\prime}$ ' and ' $B 1$ ' swimming teams were undefeated once more - in the case of our ' $A$ ' team for their 15 th successive year. I wish Liverpool could find that sort of consistency and dominance!
Our canoeists won the South African Schools Sprint Championships for the third successive year and we had area, provincial and even competitors in international events.

Sports success is all well and good but I always believe that such results are not necessarily indicators of a great school. I frequently receive feedback on those boys who have left us for boarding schools. Whilst saddened by the fact that these boys are not in our school, I find it affirming for the Prep that they are meeting with great success. Ex-Prep boys occupy the top academic positions in Hilton in Grade 8 and Michaelhouse in Grade 10. Most of our other lads at these schools received academic awards in their 2012 Prize Giving ceremonies.

And what of our current Grade 7s? Sadly, a few will leave us for boarding school and we wish those boys well. To those boys - never forget that you are Marist boys and please come back to see us - often! I would also like to place on record my appreciation for the 75 young men who now leave the Prep. After a small wobble (for a few) at the beginning of the year, these boys 'stepped up to the plate' and have been exemplary in every respect. Boys, as well as achieving highly in every sphere of school life, the most impressive aspect of your year has been your conduct, your leadership and most of all for being the most tremendous young men. Go forth, go well and become significant people! I was going to play that wonderful song: "You'll never walk alone" for you - but if I did, I think someone behind me will kick me into the gallery!

And now I turn my words to our guest of honour, Mr Ron Thackwell.

Ron and I go back just on 40 years! That's a long time. We met at college and ended up (wait for it!) playing in a rock band. I found an old picture of us. He's front right and I'm back right. I guess we looked a little different then!
Ron has been with us for 14 years. He is a consummate English teacher for whom his career has been one of vocation as opposed to merely being a job. We had a staff farewell last week for Ron and Joyanne and in both cases we were able to reflect on teachers who are in the profession for the right reasons - they love teaching children.

## GO FORTH, GO WELL AND BECOME SIGNIFICANT PEOPLE!

Ron's input into the Prep School goes far beyond his classroom practice. He is what I term 'one of those old world schoolmasters' who always looks beyond what his job description says he has to do and he goes the extra mile for us. He's a man who will step into the fray when others might not. Nothing is too much trouble for him and he will always volunteer when help is needed. Ron is a multi-talented man. In addition to his teaching English, he is a multi-instrumentalist, has been a noted sports coach (as I revealed at his official farewell - his greatest claim to fame was teaching Bobby Skinstad rugby), his has been 'the dulcet voice' at all our galas and athletics meetings and he has also revealed his pseudo mean-streak side when supervising Saturday morning detentions over the past few years. I wonder who is going to able to fill those shoes?

Future Problem Solving? - YES!
The year 2012 saw the initiation of a project called the Future Problem Solving Programme in the Prep School. A group of Grade 6 and 7 boys was invited to join the Program where the motto is "Teaching students HOW to think, not WHAT to think!" We've tried to do just this.
Using a variety of fun techniques, the boys have learnt to work comfortably in teams, respecting each other's opinions and piggy-backing off each other's ideas to leap-frog in order to reach better, futuristic thinking. They have had fun learning recognised creative techniques and in the process have created some wonderful new objects: chairs that include a full meal and TV and shoes that have hidden jets and guns, that change according to terrain and come when called!
The techniques they have learnt include SCAMPER (Substitute, Change, Adapt or Add, Maximize or Minimize, Put to other uses, Eliminate, Rearrange or Reverse) Deliberate Escape (remove a vital aspect of a situation or place) and Synectics (list

an animal's attributes and force these into a new connection - as above).

There is a formal side to the Programme: the Booklet which involves a six-step process to analyse and resolve a future-based problem. The processes involved have been interspersed among the fun exercises and the boys have made steady progress. Their wording of cause and effect problems is competent and they are using the creative techniques learnt to generate wonderful solutions. We hope to have a team invited to the American International Finals in June 2013. To achieve this we have to complete a booklet in two hours, submit this to Australia for marking and then be invited to attend the International Finals in June 2013 at the University of Indianapolis. We hope to make the grade!
Thanks to Mrs Knowles and Mrs Geldenhuys for their support through the year, and to the boys for their regular and exuberant attendance. We look forward to 2013.
