HEADMASTER'S ADDRESS



Prizegiving Speech - 2013

"Free at last, Free at last... God Almighty we shall be free at last"

Just over 50 years ago, August 28 1963, these were the ringing tones that rang out from the Lincoln Memorial as Civil Rights Leader, Martin Luther King Jr, addressed a gathering of over 250 000 people. History tells us that Luther's speech was a catalyst to effect meaningful change in America.

For Luther, racial equality was a dream he shared on a national and a global stage and remained committed to achieving it until his assassination by James Earl Ray on 4 April 1968. He was 39 years old.

Good evening Mrs Greeff, Mrs Williams, Mr and Mrs Wilson, Father Teboho, Chair of the Board, Mr Artemides and Mrs Artemides, Vice Chair of the Board, Dr Bussin and Mrs Bussin, Honoured Guests, members of Staff, and our men of St David's.

Each of us has our dreams and hopes for the future. When one works in a school one is surrounded by generations of students — and staff — at different stages of development, and with a range of aspirations. Most of us would scoff at the thought of someone in this Hall having an impact such as that of Martin Luther King. But who's to say that we do not have a young man in the Hall tonight who is not beginning his path to greatness?

As a collective, as St David's, we also have dreams and aspirations which drive us ever onward in ensuring that we participate in the formation of young men who can leave us well placed to make a meaningful contribution to society.

Dreams and aspirations move towards reality when we begin to set goals and focus on processes to embrace and achieve these. It has been most encouraging to have been part of these aspirations, goals and processes which have seen the School on a path of sustained growth and change. It is this mind set of continuous improvement which is part of what makes St David's great. This School is 72 years old this year and our next benchmark is our Vision 2016 programme when we will celebrate the School's 75th Anniversary. The St David's Marist Inanda of 2013 is a school which has a national footprint and has a growing reputation for innovative practice and for sustained excellence across the Academic, Cultural and Sporting arenas with no compromise on our ethos and values. Our Old Boys are making their mark at tertiary level and beyond.

So what should our next dream be at the School, what dreams and visions can we pose to our boys to grow them further?

Our challenge is to understand how we as individuals can fulfil our unique aspirations and dreams in a way that is significant and harmonious to our greater community. This may seem daunting – even impossible. I have a short clip on Roger Bannister, on his achieving the "impossible": the 4 minute mile barrier that everyone said was impossible to break. Significantly within the next few months 8 more athletes also did. Bannister went down in history for his individual achievement, yet he also was the catalyst for liberating many others from an "impossible" mind set, the mental block that limited achievement, to an exciting fulfilment of their potential, too. Martin Luther King also had the power to liberate the minds of others. What an exceptional quality to have as a leader.

Let us consider another type of leader – the Warrior Leader – you know the one ... William Wallace in Braveheart; Henry V..."Once more unto the breach dear friends"; Agincourt ..."We few, we happy few, we band of brothers."; Winston Churchill, who promised only "blood, sweat and tears" but inspired a Nation to "fight them on the beaches, fight them in the streets and to never surrender". They inspired men to superhuman feats and changed the course of history. They were all charismatic leaders; they all had vision, passion and determination. They all stepped into power vacuums and created order out of chaos; for this the common man was willing and even eager to obey. The same, of course, applies to Adolf Hitler. What about the world in 2013? What sort of leadership is emerging? What about South Africa? Consider Julius Malema, charismatic, with a clear vision, passion and determination...in the midst of a power vacuum ... The masses are certainly desperate to be lead.

Are we in danger of becoming one of Mr Bean's troops, unthinkingly obeying every grunt of command without question? Let's take a snapshot of our world. I have really enjoyed teaching a little District 9 in the last few weeks, Neil Blomkamp's Sci-Fi recreation of the xenophobic violence that was unleashed in 2009. His artistic vision holds up a mirror of our society with its abuse of power in the guise of bureaucracy, our hypocrisy, our prejudice, our fear. Wikus van der Merwe captures these qualities so well – as South Africans we react on so many levels to the stereotypes the film presents. But at the heart of the film is that our unusual hero, Wikus, becomes more human, the more he ceases to be one. His innate sense of right comes to the fore as he empathises with the world from

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the Prawns' perspective. He makes a stand against prejudice and authoritarian leadership.

District 9 creatively articulates a deep unease in our society: how do we break through our fear of others? How do we hone our skills to seek that which is common and to build relations? The film also touches on the Gini coefficient, the ever-widening gap between the "haves" and the "have nots" in our country, which our educated mind acknowledges as being an extreme threat to future peace and stability. In our comfortable upper-middle class cocoon we frequently choose to ignore this disparity between rich and poor in our country, yet it is the biggest challenge that we face as a nation. How do we break this fear of others? How do we hone our skills to seek that which is common and to build relations? The Nando's Xenophobia Ad cuts to the quick and puts into perspective some of our prejudice. This ad was banned by the SABC. Amazingly the SABC spokesman said the ad was withdrawn because of its xenophobic undertones. Satire is a powerful weapon.

Next year, as the Born Frees, you will all be eligible to vote, you have the opportunity to make a difference collectively to the direction which our country is to take. How do you become active citizens in a meaningful way? You need to make informed decisions – your St David's education provides you with the skills to interrogate your world and to understand the causes of disharmony.

Are you going to vote DA, or ANC or SACP? Do you know anything about AGANG? Do you remember the euphoria surrounding the launch of COPE, and whether they are still coping? You haven't even read the EFF manifesto, possibly? Laugh at Julius Malema and dismiss him at your peril; he could well be an astute politician who reads the political landscape accurately; he's charismatic, with a clear vision, passion and determination...in the midst of a power vacuum ... and he is good at targeting the poor and the disempowered.

Or are you going to simply not vote and join 70 of the rest 18-25 year olds who have allowed apathy and cynicism to be a barrier to your active participation in influencing your own future? Of the 1500 000 South Africans who are 18-19 years old, only 185 000 were registered to vote by 13 August this year. You may argue 'That's politics', or be one of those who say, 'I've had enough of this BEE stuff and being disadvantaged ... we must move on now'. Have we really understood our context?

No matter. The real way for society to move forward is to tap into the energies that we each have within us so that we can make a significant contribution, simply based on how we interact with others. Despite the gloom and doom, hundreds of thousands of South Africans, have not "baled out" and succumbed to cynicism; they retain a Utopian vision of a Rainbow Nation. The fact that we have not left South Africa affirms this.

This year has had some great moments for me: watching our boys

win the Final of the Gauteng Debating Championships in style; the standing ovations our Choirs received at the Linder Auditorium and our 1st Hockey and Cricket teams enjoying resounding victories over my old school, King Edward's. The most significant experience, however, was accompanying twenty Gr 11s to a primary school in Alexandra where our boys taught Grade 6s for 4 ½ hours nonstop. I was overwhelmed by the enthusiasm of the children who were taught, but even more so by the excitement of our boys, who seemed to forget where they were, so engrossed were they in their interaction. The chatter in the bus on the way back expressed that they found the experience "awesome". There had been a connection that went beyond background, culture and race. It certainly affirmed my faith in the future of our country.

Another significant experience for me was meeting Mxolisi Ndlovu, a 21 year-old from a small village near Dundee in Kwazulu Natal. His mother - a domestic worker and single parent - died in 2005 and he matriculated in 2010; he had supported himself during that period, in addition to teaching himself and his peers Mathematics at his school - there had been no Mathematics teacher for months at a time. He achieved four B symbols in Matric, including a B for Maths. When asked why he had applied to be an intern, he said that he had had no work since matriculating; school and living on the farm was all he had known, but he was determined to make something of his life. He continued to teach Mathematics to other people in the community. This young man was one of the 50 out of 2000 applicants who was selected to be part of the ISASA Maths and English Programme. At no stage did he speak with self-pity of his challenges or his hardships; he spoke only of his determination to become a teacher so that he could assist others in reaching their potential. I was extremely impressed by his strong sense of self. This meeting reaffirmed my conviction that each of us, despite challenges, has a significant contribution to make.

Similarly, the constructively influential leaders of the 20th century, such as Mahatma Gandhi, Martin Luther King Jnr and Nelson Mandela, created harmonies and rhythms based on servant leadership. Our own founder, St Marcellin Champagnat, was similarly a harmoniser, exhibiting an authentic moral leadership of real brotherhood.

The National Planning Commission put together the following vision for our future that I am sure they would both have endorsed; it is one that I am certainly going to direct my energies into transforming the vision into reality:

Vision 2030

"We, the people of South Africa, have journeyed far since the long lines of our first democratic election on 27 April 1994, when we elected a government for us all. Now in 2030 we live in a country which we have remade. Therefore, in 2030:

- We experience daily how we participate fully in efforts to liberate ourselves from conditions that hinder the flowering of our talents.
- We all see to it and assist so that all life's enablers are available in a humane way.
- We all have actively set out to change our lives in ways which also benefit the broader community.
- We all assist the institutions we have creatively redesigned to meet our varied needs.
- We reach out across communities to strengthen our resolve to live with honesty, to be set against corruption and dehumanising actions.
- We know that those to whom we have given the privilege to govern our land, do so on our behalf and for the benefit of all the people.

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- We say to one another: I cannot be without you, without you this South African community is an incomplete community, without one single person, without one single group, without the region or the continent, we are not the best that we can be.
- We acknowledge that each and every one of us is intimately and inextricably of this earth with its beauty and life-giving sources; that our lives on earth are both enriched and complicated by what we have contributed to its condition. South Africa belongs to all its peoples.

Now, in 2030, our story keeps growing as if spring is always with us. Once, we uttered the dream of a rainbow. Now we see it, living it. It does not curve over the sky; it is refracted in each one of us at home, in the community, in the city, and across the land, in an abundance of colour. When we see it in the faces of our children, we know: there will always be, for us, a worthy future. South African belongs to all its peoples. We, the people, belong to one another. We live the rainbow. Our homes, neighbourhoods, villages, towns, and cities are safe and filled with laughter. Through our institutions, we order our lives. The faces of our children tell of the future we have crafted."

Let us come back to where we have been as a School this year – the engine for forming our young men. The events I mentioned earlier this evening are part of the evidence which indicates that the School has enjoyed another fine year. In so many areas we have enjoyed much success.

The same qualities come through at all the events I attend every year, across all areas: a determination to compete, and time and time again having boys put themselves on the line for their teams and their School.

The Matrics have been central to this success, with many of them stretching themselves to the limit across the sport and cultural arenas to assist the School in achieving its goals. These boys may not always have been in the top teams, but you can't buy this sort of commitment.

Tristan, you have been a presence throughout the year in support of the School. You have dealt with your knee injury with dignity, and you have focused on motivating the School to give of its best in every respect. I think of your motivating speeches before big matches, and those sentences which start with..."Gents, it's time for us to remember who we are...". Luke, your speech last Thursday showed your absolute commitment to your School and your

passion to succeed. Both of you have grown through the year; your commitment to your school and your support is appreciated.

St David's is an innovative and dynamic educational environment, and I have as colleagues members of staff who regularly go the extra mile as a matter of course for the benefit of the boys, their colleagues and the School.

My thanks to the Academic, Administrative, Catering and Support staff, and the parents, for their ongoing support, in particular David Smith, Nick Clogg and Brad Ireland. Thank you also to Mike Greeff, Board Chair Cleo Artemides, Mark Bussin and Members of the Board.

Special mention must be made of Prep Headmaster, Rick Wilson, who retires at the end of this year. Rick completes 30 years of Headship and it is important that you know that Rick received a standing ovation from his colleagues after his farewell speech at this year's national conference. Rick and Gerry – you have always supported a range of High School activities and you will be missed. I also now need to find another cycling partner! Thank you and go well.

So who is going to remake our country into the South Africa of Vision 2030? Is it going to be one of you chaps sitting in the Hall this evening? Martin Luther King was 34 when he gave his 'I have a Dream' speech. Nelson Mandela was in his 20s when he became involved in politics and St Marcellin Champagnat moved out of formal schooling in his mid-teens. Roger Bannister was 25 when he broke the 4 minute mile. 2013 Nobel Peace Prize Candidate, Malala Yousafzai, is only 16 years old.

It is up to you chaps, with your joie de vivre, your energy and the courage of youth to make the seemingly impossible happen. I leave you with this final message from the poem, 'Invictus'. I hope it resonates with you as it does with me.

Out of the night that covers me, Black as the pit from pole to pole, I thank whatever gods may be For my unconquerable soul.

In the fell clutch of circumstance I have not winced nor cried aloud. Under the bludgeonings of chance My head is bloody, but unbowed.

Beyond this place of wrath and tears Looms but the Horror of the shade, And yet the menace of the years Finds and shall find me unafraid.

It matters not how strait the gate,
How charged with punishments the scroll,
I am the master of my fate,
I am the captain of my soul.

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Mrs Watson for her involvement and support, and wish her a happy and fulfilling retirement, where she will pursue new ventures of her own.



ENGLISH OLYMPIAD 2013

This year, on Tuesday 5 March, two Grade 11 students and seven matrics wrote the English Olympiad examination.

Participation in the English Olympiad is entirely voluntary; the examination attracts boys with varying ability in English. It is an open book paper that encourages independent thought and creativity, and demands that the entrants approach their set work from a critical standpoint, with an open mind.

Preparation for the exam is largely self-regulating and the onus is on the entrants to read and think about their texts in their own time and to bring their thoughts to a forum of discussion with other students, guided by the teacher in charge.

The paper itself is always challenging and interesting and this year's students found the exercise thought-provoking and enriching.

It is with great joy that we received the news that Daniel Peter placed first in this year's English Olympiad. This is a tremendous achievement as the Olympiad examination is written by over 7500 candidates from private and government schools across South Africa, and it draws the brightest and best of our country's English students.

Part of Daniel's prize was inclusion in an elite group of winners at the Grahamstown National Schools Festival which takes place every July, a week before the celebrated annual Grahamstown Festival. There Daniel was exposed to an eclectic and brilliant array of drama, music, lectures, exhibitions, writing, discussions, workshops and events. Each of these was handpicked to delight, challenge and enrich the group and extend their thinking. At a gala dinner during the Festival the names of the top three winners were revealed.

Being a guest at the National Schools Festival is enormously prestigious and a fitting reward for an absolutely brilliant young man. In addition to the trip to Grahamstown, Daniel was awarded a cash prize and he is offered a full scholarship to Rhodes University after he matriculates. The cherry on the top of his magnificent achievement is an overseas tour - the top three candidates will be taken on a glorious tour to the UK in December.

We are very proud of Daniel's success and of the achievements of all our other entrants, all of whom were awarded certificates, in the either the gold, bronze or merit categories.



Physical wellbeing is important, as it ensures that we are well-rounded and physically, mentally and emotionally active. Career planning can be seen as one of the most important components of maturing into a 'Good Man', as we are afforded the opportunity to research and discover potential careers which could ultimately determine whether we develop into a 'Good Man', or remain a good boy."

Francesco Mariano remarked as follows on his community service project: "The first thing I learnt is that we often live in a bubble and do not realise that all around us there are people who are suffering and looking for help. Mostly due to circumstances we ignore the cry of people in need and rather focus on our own lives. It is ironic that in keeping to ourselves, we lose out on the growth, in our own lives, that comes through serving others. Outreach and service is vital to the growth of a community and in helping others achieve their rights. The main focus of outreach is serving others, but in doing so, you often find yourself."





At the time I felt it to be very significant and specific to me, as I see it constantly. However, seeing other pupils' infographics made me realise that the form of prejudice which I chose to expose and ridicule, was actually rather benign and insignificant. I have become more educated and faced a sort of reflection where someone in my position realises how lucky he truly is."



LIFE SCIENCES



The combined Gr12 Life Sciences and Visual Arts Camp at Parnassus in July

Life Sciences embraces the branches of science that deal with living organisms and their organisation, life processes and relationships to each other and the environment. Examples include biochemistry, genetics, microbiology, medical health, anthropology, evolution and ecology. At school, a large emphasis is placed on the relevance of these fields to learners as individuals and teens maturing into adults who will become contributing members of society.

As such, this year we decided to involve the Grade 9 and Grade 12 parents in the "Life Sciences in Society" theme. At subject-specific evenings parents were shown the scope of Life Sciences and were encouraged to discuss and debate relevant topics that appear in the media. We believe this significantly contributed to discussions that subsequently occurred in the classroom, making them pertinent and appropriate to the boys and the South African context.

Excursions this year were to the Yebo Gogga Yebo amaBlomo 2013 at The University of the Witwatersrand and The Body Works display at SciBono.

This year, we added a new dimension to our Grade 12 Life Sciences camp with the invitation of the Visual Arts Department to Parnassus Farm in the Magaliesburg.

Certainly the synergy of the flair of the artists with the scientific thinking of the biologists proved to be healthy. We were impressed with the academic fervour of the learners, peppered with the brisk mountain climbing breaks. Despite the mid-morning snacks of scones with jam and cream, Mrs George and I learned about shredding for the holidays.

Mrs Karina George is thanked for her extensive reading, thorough research and continual challenging of the boys to stretch their thinking beyond what is obvious, particularly in her senior classes. Joining our team, we were thrilled to welcome Mrs Rachel Minnie to the Life Sciences Department, where she has become a valuable member of the team, contributing her obvious love of the subject, enthusiasm for practical work, and a nurturing care of the learners. The combination of our staff with interested, motivated learners produces school leavers we know are not only pleased with their matriculation results, but who will continue their love for the subject and use their understanding of it to formulate responsible decisions in the future.

The Science Department enjoyed a busy and successful year in terms of the outings and activities in which the boys participated.

Project-based learning

Mrs Dell attended a course on Project Based Learning (PBL) in June last year in Columbus, Indiana. This year we applied the process to the Grade 8 Science Expo which was held on Monday, 10th June. The boys were allowed to choose from one of eight topics related to density. The project was introduced with a presentation by Dr Shane Durbach, a team leader in the Strong Materials Unit at the University of the Witwatersrand. Each boy was accommodated in their first or second choice of topics which included sound-proofing; strong, lightweight materials; marine mammals; lava lamps; a James Bond car; how to get an egg to float; the shape of ships' hulls and The Titanic. All the projects needed to show how density was applied.

Bronze medals were awarded to Matthew Benning, Michael-John Brewer, Connor Davies, Andrew Mason and Wesley Traill. Tomi Longwe, Thomas O'Donoghue, Jordan Parker and Jaime Zenha achieved Silver medals for their efforts. First prize went to a group who designed and demonstrated their James Bond car that could rise and submerge with the aid of water or air filling the ballast tanks attached to the car. Their simple but effective model effectively demonstrated the application of density. Calvin Abel, Alan du Trevou, Riley Kamstra and Adam Potterton are to be congratulated on a task accomplished with distinction.

The principles underpinning PBL were applied in the Grade 10's project on waves, sound and music. Mr Chris Luke introduced the topic with a fascinating demonstration of the different qualities of sound that emanated from a wide range of instruments. He also showed how the shape of the reed affects the sound made by a saxophone. The learners were then tasked with creating their own instruments.

Material Trail

Mr Mudzingwa and Mrs Dell entered the Grade 10s in the Materials Science Trail. Paul Richardson, Dylan Richards and Michael Nortjé received a special award for the creative presentation of their project.

St David's Senior Science Expo

The Grade 11 Science Expo was held on Thursday, 11th July. The theme was Mythbusters and the Science Department were delighted with the standard, range and depth of the projects presented this year.

Thorough scientific method and close attention to detail, perseverance in making the project work and refining the method, enthusiasm and often patience in presenting and

comprehensive understanding of the scientific concepts were all aspects of the projects that impressed us.

Two groups qualified for Bronze medals: Charlie Lin and James de Sousa for "water defies gravity" and Jared Tumiel and Miguel Zenha for their project on dust explosions. Anton-Paul Czuba and Matthew McWilliams confirmed the myth of the heat ray attributed to Archimedes and achieved Silver medals for their efforts. First prize went to two learners who started with a simple myth but extended and developed it, combining a thorough understanding of the principles with extensive practical work and enthusiasm in presenting. Congratulations to Rory Shaw and Robert Mason for their various demonstrations of temperature and pressure.

Science Outings

Grade 8 learners attended the annual Yebo Gogga exhibition at the University of the Witwatersrand earlier in the year.

In October the Grade 8s were taken on a tour of the Amalgamated Beverage Industries plant in Midrand. The intention was to see first-hand the practical application of carbon dioxide gas but the learners were privileged to see far more science in action. This world class facility produces and packages over 2 million plastic bottles per day in peak season. It was fascinating to watch the robotics and electronics in action in a production line.

Grade 11s went to Sandton City armed with bathroom scales to determine the acceleration and deceleration of the lifts. The data they collected also enabled them to calculate the height travelled between floors.



As in previous years, we had a large number of boys taking part in the first round of the Harmony Mathematics Olympiad and St David's received recognition for participation over the past 10 years. Special mention must be made of Rory Ellis in Grade 9, who placed first in

Gauteng in the second round of the junior competition and qualified for round three, to which only the top 100 learners nationally are invited. Rory follows in the footsteps of a number of St David's boys who over the years have excelled in the Olympiad. He has recently been invited to attend the South African Mathematics Foundation Annual Mathematics Camp to be held at Stellenbosch University during the first week of the December holidays. We wish Rory well as he embarks on further problem solving.

In May we once again hosted a successful fourth leg of the Tour de Maths Competition. As a passionate Mathematics teacher, it is always heart-warming to see a hall full of young people enjoying Mathematics. Throughout the year many of our boys have achieved individual successes at the various legs and we hope to encourage more boys to take part in the future.

The Epoch and Optima Trust continues to offer us funding and we are extremely grateful for their on-going generosity and support. Over the past six years it has enabled us to offer a quality Mathematics education.

As our 2013 Grade 12 boys begin their final examinations, we reflect on the outstanding results of the Class of 2012. An extremely high standard was set with 34 Core Maths distinctions. This feat is attributable not only to the boys' ability, but to the dedication, commitment and passion of all the Mathematics teachers. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the members of our Department for another successful year.



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SENIOR CHOIR

The St David's Senior Choir had a magnificent 2013. The Choir grew substantially, succeeded in drawing standing ovations and managed to add some volume to the singing in the College Mass on Thursday mornings.

The year was kicked off with auditions for the new Grade 8 group. In these auditions 55 candidates were recognised as being able to sing. According to St David's tradition, they were all obliged to add their voices to the Choir programme for at least their Grade 8 year. CHAMBER CHOIR

The Chamber Choir is a relatively new part of the choral programme at St David's. It was started two years ago by a St David's boy, Matthew Zambon, who is currently studying Music at Melbourne University in Australia. Matthew always set very high standards and managed to leave a legacy of musical excellence. This year the Choir really lived up to Matthew's expectations and established themselves as a powerhouse among choirs in Johannesburg.

The Chamber Choir is the First Team of the choral programme and prospective members have to prove themselves worthy on several levels. The first requirement is the ability to sing independently. Due to the small size of the Choir, each boy has to be able to contribute a powerful voice to the ensemble and must also be able to sing solos. The second requirement is discipline. Each boy's track record in the Senior Choir is checked and if there are any disciplinary and team work issues, that boy is not selected to be part of the Choir. Boys have to prove that they are willing to work for excellence and in 2013 this was stringently enforced in the selection process by the boys themselves.

Rehearsals were scheduled for 18h00 on Thursday evenings and the boys rarely missed them. Their repertoire was also challenging. It included Lonely Nights by The Soil, Hey Beautiful Girl by Ladysmith Black Mambazo, Proud by Heather Small and a very difficult arrangement of Nearer my God to Thee by James Stevens.

Their opportunities to perform grew from only three in 2012, to 12 outstanding performances at events around Johannesburg in 2013. Some of the highlights were:

- A performance at the Wits Choir Festival on 1 September.
- A performance with the Senior Choir at the St John's Senior Schools Choir Festival at the Linder Auditorium on 16 September. They received standing ovations.
- A performance at the opening of Holy Rosary Convent's new state-of-the-art hall on 31 October.
- A performance at the first Sacred Songs concert in the Chapel of Mary at St David's on 2 November. The Choir performed with the professional group Artemis and Friends and showed they could hold their own in a highly classical context.

Jayme Kingaby was the captain of the Choir in 2013 and contributed much to its success with his enthusiasm.

In 2014 the St David's community can look forward to interesting performances. The Chamber Choir is already booked for Valentine's Serenades at several Girls' Schools and as an opening act at an international music conference in July.

The St David's Band has two parts: The main band follows the instrumentation of a classic rock band: drums, bass, electric guitars and keyboard accompanied by various St David's singers. The Brass Band consists of four trumpets and seven saxophones – an improvement on last year's six members. The Brass form a separate ensemble and have separate rehearsal times and pieces, but both bands also combine to play as an extended ensemble. The Band in its various permutations has played extensively this year and at a high level of musical competency.

Once again the band played the soundtrack to the school play, a tradition we aim to keep up through the coming years. Karate Boy'tjie had the band learning twelve commercial hits sometimes off a score and at other times by ear. The music was challenging, all members having to follow the conductor at all times, playing smaller extracts of each work as commentary for the stage performances; this endeavour relies on timing, discipline and supreme concentration and the band members came up trumps.

The Marist Conference show cased our band and our top musical talent to the upper management of the other four Marist Schools. The Boys enjoyed the stay over trip to The Good Shepherd Retreat Centre immensely and shone on stage in true Marist spirit.

Another successful performance was the Lovemore Music Concert at Thrupps Centre. The St David's Band played last and followed the Hugh Masekela Band and The Yamaha All Stars Band to huge acclaim from all who were there. They were commended by Lovemore Music for their enthusiasm, high performance standards and for their courtesy and good manners.

Other performances this year included: Open Day, Music and Mercedes – hosted by Saheti School, the St David's Ensemble, Solo and Prep Soiree, the New Boys evening, the Grade eight evening, Prep and High school assemblies, the Old Boys' assembly and the Headmaster's farewell.

ST DAVID'S MARIMBA

From Swedish House Mafia to PSY to Miriam Makeba, the Marimba teams of 2013 drew their inspiration from far and wide, producing an eclectic mix of songs as they planned, improvised, practised and sometimes just busked their way through repertoire both known and unknown to deliver performances that were always energetic and attractive.

St David's Marimba bands made tremendous progress this year. Participation grew from approximately 25 members overall in 2012 to almost 50 across all of the bands in 2013. The boys also showed a greater willingness to take on a variety of songs: the Grade 8 Band, for instance, wowed everyone by learning more songs than the other two bands combined, while the Senior Band managed to put together more than an hour's worth of music when they were asked to provide entertainment for an Umalusi Schools event. They presented themselves like professionals.

The Bands added their exuberance to several assemblies, a highly successful Music Soirée, the Foundation Donors' Dinner and served as pre-event entertainment at the College Prize Giving.

The highlight of the year was our success at the International Marimba and Steelpan Festival. St David's made an excellent showing at this year's event, which was hosted by St Benedict's on 3 and 4 August. Three of our Bands with 46 boys between them participated.

Our Grade 8 Band was one of the largest bands at the festival. Their exuberance attracted a lot of attention and they managed to draw a thunderous applause.

The Grade 9 Band delivered a tight and precise performance of a dance hit, Levels by Avicii, which had several complex ensemble requirements and drew positive comments from the adjudicators.

The Senior Band wowed the audience with an arrangement of Beautiful People by Chris Brown and David Guetta in the category Small High School Band: In the mix. This category required them to integrate an additional instrument into their performance. They used an electric guitar and displayed a lot of variety and incredible skill. Several boys, for instance, played both their marimbas and percussion instruments at the same time. Their energy and their ensemble skill made for a performance that was head and shoulders above the other groups in that category. They won their category convincingly.

Marimba at St David's has become one of the most popular extramural cultural events. We look forward to its continued growth.

DRAMA REPORT

With Drama becoming an ever-bigger and more popular component of St David's extramural cultural life, it was seen as essential to start the Drama Club in 2013. Drama Club affords boys the opportunities to grow their performance skills in a fun and informal setting and to prepare for a variety of small projects. In future, Drama Club will run alongside Dramatic Arts (which is being offered at St David's from 2014). It will facilitate rehearsals for the major productions and give other essential opportunities to boys who do not take Drama as a subject, but would like to focus on Drama as their extramural contribution to the School.

As introductory years go, Drama Club's first year of existence did pretty well. Two projects in particular stood out.

The first ever monologue evening at St David's served to introduce boys to one of the academic requirements of the subject Dramatic Arts. Boys had to create little solo skits and present them to a small crowd of supportive parents and Drama lovers. From 2014, monologue evenings will become a regular and essential part of the Drama calendar.

Another first was St David's participation in the 48 Hour Film Project, which is one of the largest short film projects in the world and is hosted in many major cities around the globe. This year the Johannesburg project was run from 6 to 8 September and drew a wide variety of participants. The St David's Drama Club team was one of the youngest teams there (with an average age of 15) and was also the only team to formally represent a school. In less than 48 hours the team had to write, record, film and edit a mini-musical. The boys managed to create a beautifully original short film that competed well against films produced by much older and professional teams. The film was screened at Cinema Nouveau at Rosebank Mall.

The Drama Club looks forward to an exciting 2014 which will see St David's production of the Shakespeare classic Macbeth, greater participation in the 48 Hour Film Project and the expansion of the St David's Smart Device Film Festival.

SOUND & LIGHTING REPORT

Sound and Lighting is one of the more interesting projects to be part of at St David's. A small group of dedicated boys get the opportunity to work with the ever-increasing high tech gear that St David's is accumulating as it builds up its store house of performance and presentation equipment. Our sound systems across the School, our lighting gear in the Champagnat Hall and our projector set-ups are all state of the art.

The Sound and Lighting team fulfils various essential roles:

- It makes sure equipment is set up for events in both the Hall and the Chapel of Mary;
- It is responsible for the design and set up of lighting in both the College and Prep major productions;
- It prepares and runs the PowerPoint presentations for the College Mass;
- It is responsible for keeping the inventory of all equipment up to date;
- It advises teachers on how to enhance the School's expertise in this area even further.

Who better than a bunch of teenage boys to run the show when it comes to gear? Under the leadership of Robert

Mason boys can "mess around" in a constructive way and enhance the School's technical IQ while they're at it.

This year the team members were also given formal opportunities to grow their skill. They did scaffolding training and are now properly certified to work with the School's scaffolding.

One of the stand-out projects for the team was the setting up of the sound and lighting for the College major production. Sound-wise, the production was incredibly complex with almost twenty individuals and a whole band to mic up. It took several hours of work to get just the right balance of sound and to sort out all the glitches that come with so much complexity. Lighting-wise it was also the most ambitious production taken on in years. Apart from the School's own lighting equipment, additional intelligent lighting with moving heads was also hired. From sorting out how to work with these new lights to designing the lighting cue sheet for the show way into the small hours of the morning, the boys enthusiastically took on every aspect of their responsibilities.

2014 will see Robert Mason retain his position as Sound and Lighting captain, with Ciaran de Chaud as vice-captain.

MAJOR PRODUCTION



"If you wanted to I think you could change the garden forever." This is one of the most memorable lines from Karate Boy'tjie and it serves as a perfect summary of the ethos of our 2013 Action Musical. It is especially apt because it also speaks to some of the decisions each one of us has to make every day. Life is after all, just like a garden, and we are often allowed to do some serious landscaping if we are willing to follow our dreams, to stand up for our convictions and to fight for the safety of the ones we love.

In the 2013 Major Production the main character, Daniel, has some very tough obstacles to overcome: new in school, he's trying to make friends, dodge some nasty bullies, and navigate his way through a romantic relationship, all of this on top of being at the most complicated stage of his life, namely teenager-hood! Daniel's struggles, however, turn out to be just what the doctor ordered, not just to turn the boy into a man, but to change this new community into a home for him and his friends. Daniel becomes the catalyst that changes the entire garden.

Daniel couldn't do it, however, without a bunch of whacky, weird and wonderful characters to complete his new family. And where better to find them than right here in South Africa? The decision to set the story here was a no-brainer. What with our rich array of home-grown stereotypes, how could we resist taking on the persona of "boy'tjie" rather than that of "kid". The emergence of stand-up comedians like Trevor Noah and Loyiso Gola, who have built their careers on poking fun at the dos and don'ts of South African culture, has made it possible for us to really appreciate as well as to tap into the dramatic value of our own national identities! What a joy seeing these truly South African characters come alive on our own stage.

Schools no longer need to stand back when it comes to producing quality musicals and worldwide it is being recognised that some of the most innovative and striking work is being done with teenagers. St David's has taken this trend on board and is certainly standing at the forefront with some very creative work. In Karate Boy'tjie our boys not only sang and acted, but also danced and fought their

way through an original script. The boys were exposed to vocal coaching, acting coaching, choreography, physical theatre and quasi-karate, the concept of minimalist set design, highly complex lighting design (which they did themselves) to make the set design come to life, rearranging of existing musical scores and the accompaniment of an entire musical with a student band. At virtually every level of this production the boys (as well as the girls from St Teresa's Mercy School who collaborated with St David's in this project) were encouraged to push boundaries in ways that would have made professionals pause and reconsider.


More than 100 learners participated in the various aspects of the production. That makes Karate Boy'tjie the biggest St David's High School production yet! Audiences were virtually blown off their chairs by the teenage energy radiating from the Champagnat stage.

The St David's Kung Fu Ninja Band kept toes tapping, the choreography of Kim Rose-Mathew made old and young bop up and down in their seats while the excellent fighting direction of Jaques de Silva elevated the show to a level that defied expectations. Add to that Costuming, Make-up, Lighting, Sound and Technical and St David's delivered a theatrical experience that won't easily be forgotten.

Debating is certainly a skill that equips one for life and it has been wonderful to be involved with this dynamic and successful club. Debating encourages the boys to think critically and analytically and to participate in thought-provoking dialogue which focuses on current and relevant topics.

The year began in earnest under the expert coaching of Phiwe Salukazana. The Gauteng Schools' SACEE Debating League began in February and both the Junior and Senior teams performed well in the early rounds of the tournament. The

Juniors won 5 out of 7 debates and the Seniors won 10 out of 12 debates. This meant that both teams were invited to participate in the Championship rounds. These took place in May and the Junior team showed much promise in winning 3 out of their 6 debates. The Senior team did exceptionally well to win 5 out of 6 debates and to make it through to the final rounds. These took place on 4 August at Fourways High School. In the quarterfinals, St David's came up against Sacred Heart where the boys successfully proposed the motion that "Developing nations should place limits on internal rural to urban migration". In the semi-finals, St David's were successful in proposing the motion that "The Government should subsidise films that subvert traditional gender roles" against fierce opposition from Pretoria High School for Girls. This took the boys through to the finals

against King David Victory Park where St David's were given the task of opposing the motion that, "Newly democratised Arab nations should ban religious parties from participating in elections". This proved to be a closely contested debate and following a lengthy adjudication process, St David's was declared the SACEE Debating Champions. This is a tremendous achievement and I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate Daniel Peter, John-Paul Da Costa, William Shoki and Venanzio Petrarolo once again for their brilliant efforts.

In September, a team made up of juniors and seniors took part in the St Peter's festival. The team made it through to the Senior finals where they lost narrowly but the experience proved to be a valuable one for all. Austin Govender was named as Best Speaker, William Shoki was named 2nd Best Speaker and Daniel Lee was named 3rd Best Speaker.

It was with much anticipation that both the Senior and Junior teams took part in the Gauteng Schools' Provincial Debating Championships in September. The Juniors won 3 out of 6 debates while the Seniors won 5 out of 6 debates to make it through to

the quarterfinals. They won this debate but unfortunately lost against Pretoria High School for Girls in the semi-finals. This completed an excellent season for the Senior team in which they achieved an 88% win-ratio.

Congratulations go to Daniel Peter who was named as 2nd Best Speaker of the Gauteng Championships and to Daniel Lee who was named 4th Best Speaker in the Junior division.

We also congratulate William Shoki and Daniel Lee on their selection to Gauteng Provincial teams.

Special mention must be made of Daniel Peter who has been a committed, talented and enthusiastic member of the Debating Club during his years at St David's. He has been a fine ambassador for his School and his country. In August he represented South Africa at the Eurasia Schools' Debating Championships which South Africa won and where he was named as 4th Best Speaker. His influence and passion for Debating will continue to be felt as the boys seek further success in the 2014 Debating championships.







ATHLETICS





The 1st XI has enjoyed a very successful year. The team played against top schools from around the country on a weekly basis. Much of the same against St Benedict's where a narrow 15-9 loss showed the grit of the side by overcoming the 30 and



FUTURE PROBLEM SOLVING

Our Future Problem Solvers have been quietly active this year, with slow, steady growth in interest in the benefits of the Program.

Happily we now have four staff members involved: Mrs B Geldenhuys from the Prep School, Ms L Rider, Mrs G Dell and Mrs S Soulsby from the College. A visit from our Australian mentor, Dr Niranjan Casinader, resulted in an unofficial training session over dinner one evening in September and has given the staff a better grasp of the process of the Program. We hope to be more successful in developing the boys' competitive skills after our first interactive training ever.

From the boys' perspective, we now have Gr 6, 7, 8 and 9 involvement. Our regular attendees from Gr 7 and 8 are making excellent progress through the Program and will shortly be competing against their Australian counterparts in a National Final. The competition will determine whether a team is invited to the International Finals in the USA in June 2014 or not. The competition takes the form of a two hour scenario analysis where the six-step process is applied to a futuristic one page story written around the problems of plastic polluting our oceans. We have recently formed a Gr 9 team who may try to compete as well. These boys are strong debaters who bring good logical skills to the Program: they need to learn future-based creative thinking techniques to compete effectively.

An enthusiastic group of Gr 6 boys has joined the Program and all are happily engaging with the activities which lead to the more formal six-step process which is core to the Program. Mrs Geldenhuys has the boys designing creatively new school bags through techniques which give them a secure plan to move into new territory. They have learnt how to SCAMPER and will soon be able to apply de Bono's Six Thinking Hats to

stretch their skills further. Group work and respect for each others' ideas is a feature of the work as well as learning to use others' ideas to reach more creative solutions as a group. These are skills which will aid them in their adult working life.

As always, we have struggled to find time for our activities: we continue to be accommodated at the end of the school and sporting day and even then compete with many other activities – not an ideal time for brain-work but top marks to the stalwarts who continue to attend! Happily, in 2014 the Prep School will be introducing a lesson each week into the school day. Considering the value of learning thinking skills, increasingly recognised as crucial in 21st century life, this is an exciting progression. The College is investigating a similar move.

Recognition for FPSP is still a tricky area which needs to be addressed. Team and half colours may possibly be awarded according to number of hours spent in the Program and contribution to furthering its scope. Until we have enough other South African schools involved, we cannot hope for top honours for overseas competition as we are still the only South African competitors. Mrs Soulsby has presented the Future Problem Solving Program at various conferences and schools: we wait for others to join.

Mahatma Gandhi summed up the need for planning and practising in the present to cope with a new and different world in the future when he said: "The future depends on what you do today." Malcolm X supports this too: "Education is our passport to the future, for tomorrow belongs to the people who prepare for it today." We sincerely believe the Future Problem Solving Program participants are learning skills now to enhance their effectiveness in their futures and are having fun in the process!

FIRST AID REPORT

Since the inception of the St David's First Aid Team four years ago, the number of boys willing to do first aid has increased year on year. Currently, the 2013 team comprises twenty boys across Grades 8 to 12. All team members have the minimum entry level first aid and CPR training: Seven of the team have Level 3 First Aid and six team members have Level 1 First Aid.

The team have enthusiastically done duties at 25 sporting events during 2013, both home and away, covering Basketball, Cricket, Swimming, Athletics, Hockey and Rugby. Besides handing out ice packets to soothe aching muscles, the First Aiders have tended players with broken bones, lacerations and concussion to name but a few injuries. Some have also had the experience of using neck collars and spine boards. During the year they clocked up an impressive 468 hours of

service. Without the help of these dedicated boys, the First Aid support for sport would not be as extensive. My thanks to the Team for a successful year, for the time you have invested and the dedication you have shown.

SANTA SHOEBOX PROJECT 2013

This year we accomplished the following:

- 1 The Old Boys AGM was held in February this year in line with the school's financial year end. Willy Castle was voted in as Chairman, Charles Hodgson as Vice Chair. Committee members: Chris Busschau, Kyle Biller, Remy du Plessis, Danillo Giacovazzi, Byron King, Darryl Jago, Mark Reeves, Gordon Tonetti.
- 2 Two of our Old Boys, Darrell Caister, Head Boy 1986 and Conor Mc Fadden were appointed as Trustees on the St David's Marist Foundation.
- 3 The Old Boys continue to sponsor 25% of the cost of education at St David's to a son of an Old Boy from the Old Boys' Bursary Fund. The award was once again based on performance and commitment to the school.
- 4 The database continues to grow through the efforts of the Foundation/Alumni Office. Byron King, 2007 Old Boy and Committee Member, has increased the followers on the Facebook group to 600.
- 5 Old Boys contributed R20 000 to Merit Awards in Grade 11.
- R60 000 of the net profits were raised from the PTA/Old Boys Golf Day.
- 7 Old Boys contributed R40 374 to the 2013 Matric Rite of Passage.

Jubilee Book Project

At the beginning of 2010, Julie Egenrieder was assigned the task of initiating the research for a book on the History of St David's in readiness for publication in 2016 for the 75th anniversary of the school.

A lot of groundwork has been covered and a skeleton history of the school of +- 100 000 words covering the period 1941 to 2012 has been completed together with a timeline, synopsis, background history of South Africa and the world. Also lists of former Principals, Brothers, Prefects, Chaplains, Old Boys as Brothers and Priests, Matrons, Holders of Champagnat Medals, Honours Blazers, Bursaries, Springboks and more are now available.

During the course of this work Julie became a member of the Marist Old Boys' Committee and has benefited greatly from the support, knowledge and enthusiasm of the other members. This year is significant in that our new Chairman is none other than Willy Castle who has been so closely associated with St David's for most of his life and is passionate about the school.

Julie has been kept extremely busy with interviews and many of the Brothers, including the late beloved Brother Anthony and Brother Aidan have given an insight into their time at St David's. A number of Old Boys, mainly in Gauteng, but also in Cape Town have been interviewed and contacts have been made with Old Boys in Europe, USA, Australia and the Far East.

This is proving fruitful as further contacts with Old Boys not previously on our database are established. Julie has been involved with networking between many of the Old Boys, Staff and the Brothers. It is wonderful to see old friendships being renewed once more.

It may be of interest to read some anecdotes that have been picked up during the course of the research:

Brother Mario 1963-76

It's not well known that Brother Anthony was not officially qualified when he became Headmaster in 1960. He had to get a South African Matric as his Irish equivalent was not considered good enough. He also needed a supp in Maths and Brother Mario helped him. He had to write the JMB Matric which he did in Hibberdene. Brother Mario covered his Maths book with a cover from an Agatha Christie mystery so that it would not be obvious what he was reading on the plane! The remainder theorem was bugging Brother Anthony and he wanted to revise it on the journey down there. He continued his studies and completed a BA through Unisa.

Jock Loseby - 1946-51

Now, something about the food........There was no white bread in the first year or two I was at Saint David's and sometimes we were given thick brown bread sandwiches with peanut butter for tea. Many times the day dogs gave us some of their lunch. Enrico Giglioli, the Italian Ambassador's son, was particularly generous to me in this regard.

Some interesting facts about our menu included -

Frogs eggs, particularly sticky sago pudding,

Army biscuits with weevils in them and

lumpy porridge

Before our longer holidays we had Beanos which included lovely food, Ice cream, cool drinks and sweets.

Alex Quail - 1962

There was an incident in the early '60s. NASA had just got going and the boys wanted to develop a solid fuel rocket. Alex had a recipe and they used the Science lab on the second floor where they, brewed some stuff up which then exploded! Br Anthony flew up the stairs to see what damage had been done, but no one was injured and Br Anthony was obviously relieved. Eventually a rocket was built by one of the geniuses of the school – Hawkins, who is now believed to be a Professor of Applied Mathematics.

Harry Distin Curtis - 1972 (last year of the boarders)

Harry enjoyed Br Anthony and recalled an incident when a group of boys went to the local restaurant, Beefeaters, now Giovanni's. One of the boys had two gorgeous sisters (Madeleine Lalieu was one of them and later became Wickins) who worked there. They got their beers and burgers and afterwards started the trek back to school. Jamie Curtis lay in the road trying to hitch a lift, when a round the corner came a white VW Beetle, Br Anthony's car! Unaware that it was Br Anthony, one of the boys went up to the window, cigarette in hand. Needless to say cigarettes were extinguished rapidly! Br Anthony got them all in the car, took them back and all he said was that he didn't mind them having a good time but "Why in St David's tracksuits?"

Brian Kirchmann - 1958

One time, Br Bonaventure had a Science class and some of the boys had concocted an evil smelling potion in a phial and had broken it in order to fill the classroom with a disgusting smell. Br Bonaventure calmly told them to close the windows, gave them work to do and went outside and watched them suffer. The instigators had to run the gauntlet afterwards during break.

Cecil Thokoane - 1985

Cecil was awarded a bursary and (came to St David's in 1982), Standard 12 having been educated in Soweto schools until then, Cecil was not a member of the Swimming team and tells the story of how he nearly drowned earning the wrath of Willy Castle. He had been at the school a couple of months, it was the beginning of the spring/summer season and PT shifted to the swimming pool where the boys were going to play Water-polo. Being just 12 he thought he could just swim and got into the pool at the deep end and promptly proceeded to sink. Fortunately one of his class mates, Steve the American, spotted him and rescued him. By lunch time the whole school knew that he had nearly drowned and he only started taking lessons four years ago in 2009 overcoming his fear.

Mark Reeves - Head Boy 1985

Mark remembers Br Anthony telling the boys that "They must not feel guilty about being privileged because if it wasn't for the privileged people the poor would have nothing". Mark believes that the Marist ethos revolves around compassion and remembers that the Brothers hoped that the tradition of the eldest son becoming a Brother would continue.

Thabo Hermanus - 1992

Thabo started school in Alexandra, and passed top of the class in each year. When he completed Standard 2 at M.C. Weiller, instead of going to Standard 3 remaining in Alexandra, he started at St David's going backwards to Standard 1 and did marginally well. While at the time this was difficult for him as he thought he would get left behind by his peers from Alexandra, over time and, looking back he realised that most of the boys he was at school with in Alex didn't even make it to Matric. It was a real sacrifice for his parents but it was so far sighted of them. His mother was a teacher in Alex and his brothers also started at St David's, although they completed their Matric at Wendywood High. His mother had said to him that if he failed one year he would be out of St David's. He worked hard and came third in Standard 1 during his first year. He felt being older helped with his confidence considering the jump in the standard of education he had to contend with and he mentioned Gladwell's: The Outliers in this context. After a year he had used to the school and it exposed him to a whole new world. He wasn't envious or jealous of the lifestyle he saw that the white children had but it created ambition in terms of defining what success was, the picture was bigger now and it was no longer necessarily out of reach.

Tim Forssman - 2004

Tim was academically average but managed to get 2 distinctions in Matric. The turning point for him was the cultural tour to Egypt in 2004 which influenced his eventual choice of Archaeology as a career.

During the time Tim was in the High School, a Chinese boy Mark Ma joined the school; he couldn't speak a word of English and was staying in a flat on his own. A request went out for parents to accommodate him for a term and eventually after boarding with a couple of families, the Forssman's said he could stay with them and he ended up staying with them for 3 years in Standard 9, 10 and for his first year of varsity at Wits studying BSc Building. Mark's father was major of a district of Chong Ching which has a population of 32 million people. Tim and his brother Chris visited him in China in 2009 with Warren and Justin Bessler and Jordan Forssman. They spent 3 weeks travelling around China visiting some of the major cities and attractions and spending much time with the Ma family.
