Mr Eyles, that laid back, Mr Cool character with a disregard for rules and teams other than Manchester City, and who teaches as well as they play.

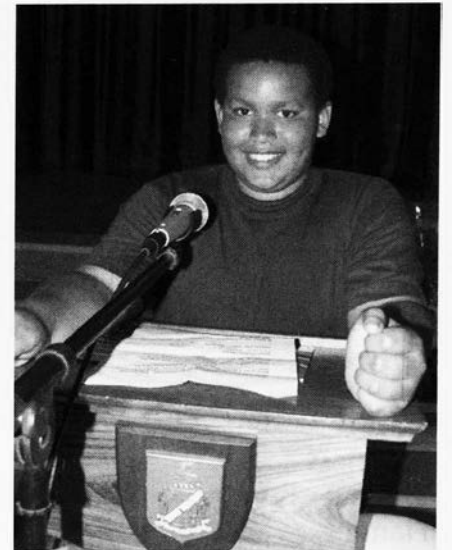

Prep 1st XI 2005

The Prep 1st XI of 2005 has completed a brilliant year of cricket. They won 21 matches, drew 2 and lost 1. With all due respect to the only team to that beat them, this was as a direct result of the school policy of rotating the batting order and giving many boys a chance to bowl during mid-week fixtures. In fact in the return fixture, St. David's inflicted a comprehensive 85 run defeat on the same opponents.

The 21 victories came against the best cricket schools in the Northern Johannesburg region. Wins were obtained against St. Benedict's, WHPS, St. Peter's, Trinity House and the Ridge amongst many. St. David's were the only unbeaten team at the excellent St. Peter's Festival and another highlight was defeating an extremely powerful Far North A team at the Far North Festival held at St. David's.

Many of the important matches hung in the balance for long periods of time. In these pressurized situations the determination and fighting character of the team pulled them through to narrow victories.

The team was competently led by Daniel Barnard, who scored 387 runs at 21.50 and who took 22 wickets. Michael Sherratt who is only under 12, scored a massive 914 runs at an average of 57.13 and at a strike rate of 107. Tim Wright scored 493 runs at 25.95 but at a supersonic strike rate of 156. Richard O'Mahony scored 425 runs at 28.33 and he took 19 wickets at 14.95. Michael McCollum took 22 wickets at 15.09. Gareth Wildman scored 556 runs at 27.80 and took 34 wickets at 15.32 with his express bowling. Rory Wildman took 32 wickets at 13.31 per wicket with his off-spin.

These were the standout performances but a characteristic of this team was that when the team was in trouble, when the key players hadn't performed, one of the lesser lights stepped forward to make a crucial contribution through a brilliant catch, by taking an important wicket or by scoring vital runs. Declan Ahern bowled many tight overs when most needed and his catching was amazing. Barry Morisse was ever reliable behind the stumps and played a few important innings. Who could forget Ethan Wallington's brilliant catch that took the fight out of Far North A or Stuart Ingledew's belligerent innings in the same match? Without Louis Wildman's determined innings, we would have lost against St. Stithian's. It was typical and fitting that Ethan Wallington should hit the final runs of the year, a testament to the never say die character of this team.

Something else to be pleased about is that contrary to current trends and to many of their opponents, the St. David's boys played their cricket quietly and with respect for the opposition. The tiger only roars after it has caught its prey. The Prep 1st XI boys certainly let their cricket do the talking and they have now earned the right to roar!
