In a year which was marked by slow economic growth and significant strain on the finances of the average South African, the St David's Marist Foundation was privileged to receive an increase in both the number of donations as well as an increase (the second highest in the history of the Foundation) in the Rand value of donations (R1,45million). In pure economic terms, this may seem unusual, however, we believe that it continues to show the generous and philanthropic spirit of our St David's community. At a time when the return on our investment portfolio did not yield the strong results of previous years due to the economic downturn, this increase in donations was most welcome.



The Foundation continues to support 17 boys through the various bursary funds contained in the Foundation, with a number of boys having already Matriculated through the programme. To date, the Foundation has made awards to the value of nearly R8 million to the School towards bursaries and capital development projects, from an income of nearly R2I million which has been built since the inception of the Foundation in 2006.

The need for quality, values-based education continues to grow. The St David's Marist Foundation continues to strive to achieve the objectives which were conceived by the founding Trustees and the Board Members in 2006. Their and our continued belief is that St David's, with the assistance of its community and like-minded individuals and organisations, should ensure the sustainability and growth of the School and all that it stands for, as well as continue to expand its ability to be able to offer a Marist education to boys from financially disadvantaged backgrounds, which is implicit in the teachings and values of 'Marist', as envisaged by St Marcellin Champagnat.

The Foundation has made some significant strides over the past 9 years through the generosity of our community and the organisations who have become 'Friends of St David's'. There remains a strong and growing belief that what St David's offers its boys is an education that responds to the needs of society. Our boys are challenged not only to achieve academically, on the



sports fields and in the cultural arena, but they are challenged daily to live lives of integrity, to have strong values that guide their decisions and actions, to display servant leadership and to respond to the needs that they see in the community. Whilst this has always been the approach of Marist education, the dire

need for the type of young men it produces has become more urgent with an increased recognition that we need to ensure that it is sustained and that boys who are excluded from the school due to historical and financial disadvantages, are given the opportunity to attend the school.



This growing recognition has, we believe, resulted in the increased donations to the Foundation. At a time when we would predict that people would slow down their giving, our community has responded with 'more', perhaps in recognizing that the answers to the immense challenges we face as a society lay in the hearts and minds of the boys and young men who fill the seats of our classrooms.



We look forward, in anticipation, to our 75th Jubilee year in 2016. This will be a year in which we celebrate and commemorate the journey of St David's Marist Inanda and all those who have been a part of its story and its legacy. We hope to bring together as many of these people as possible as part of these celebrations together with our current community. As part of our Jubilee initiatives, the St David's Marist Foundation has launched



two campaigns: The Circles of Friendship Campaign invites our community to form a circle of people who feel passionately about an aspect of St David's, be it academics, sport, culturals, leadership etc. and commit to supporting this financially through a monthly giving programme over a period of time. The second initiative is the Maristonian Project, which is a multi-purpose facility that will house, amongst other things, a 'home' for our Marist Old Boys and which will also be used extensively by the School. We hope that our community will continue to support the Foundation and the School through these two initiatives as part of the strong legacy we wish to leave as the current custodians of this great institution.

We are grateful to our Trustees for the time and wisdom they invest into the Foundation, to the School Board of Governors for their continued support and to each person who has chosen to gift the Foundation with their donation of money and kindness.






CHAPLAIN'S NOTES FR TEBOHO MATSEKE

At St David's Marist, Inanda our love for the children is the love that is manifested and embedded in us which comes from Christ himself. It is in the same love that St. Marcellin saw himself following in the footsteps of Mary the Mother of God. The characteristics of Marist are seen in the little things which we do in an extra ordinary way. We speak about presence, family spirit, love of work, simplicity and the way of Mary. It is with these elements that we are Marists. We are all called to do good in an extra ordinary way.

Every first Saturday of the month we celebrate a Family Mass in the Chapel of Mary. The Family Mass is for all parents, old boys and current boys and all members of the school are welcome to come and celebrate the breaking of the bread together as a family. As the Catholic Church encourages us to go for confession we do so as often as is possible. We offer confessions to our boys during Advent and Lent and also just before they receive their First Holy Communion which is always celebrated towards the end of the year. The First Holy Communion celebration includes each boy's family. All Catholic boys are thoroughly prepared during the year for this occasion. Their curriculum encompasses all the necessary arrangements for them to receive First Holy Communion at the end of the year and each and every year we have more than thirty (30) boys receiving First Holy Communion.

The Sacrament of Confirmation is a very important aspect of our school life and it is also a time where the pupils have to make a choice to live a moral life. This Sacrament is celebrated each year during the month of September. All Catholic boys



are prepared thoroughly every day for Confirmation and have extra classes every Thursday and Saturday afternoon just before the Family Mass. The Sacrament of Confirmation takes place at the Immaculate Conception Catholic Church in Rosebank together with the St Teresa's Convent pupils and the parish candidates. Over the years our boys have always made us proud as they encapsulate the Marist spirituality of simplicity and the way of Mary. We are proud to say St David's has prepared more than thirty boys to be confirmed each and every year.

Retreats are also part of our life at St David's, especially the boys who are going to receive their First Holy Communion together with the Sacrament of Confirmation. We include each Grade from Gr 4 - 6 in the Retreat Programme. During First Holy Communion and Confirmation preparation, parents are also involved by participating in the introduction of the retreats and they too, as parents, are given a role to play in their boys' lives. Parents and sponsors need to make sure the boys attend Mass

every Sunday and reflect the faith by good example. As we prepare our boys for these Sacraments we are reminded of the Pope's words when he said: "We need saints without cassocks, without veils, we need saints with jeans and tennis shoes. We need saints that to go the movies that listen to music, that hang out with their friends... we need saints that drink Coca-Cola, that eat hot dogs, that surf the internet and that listen to their iPods. We need saints that love the Eucharist, that are not afraid or embarrassed to eat a pizza or drink a beer with their friends. We need saints who love the movies, dance, sports and theatre. We need saints that are open, sociable, normal, happy companions. We need saints who are in this world and who know how to enjoy the best in this world without being callous or mundane. We need saints". (Pope Francis). We may not be the saints that we are expected to be: holy in all aspects but we are saints in the making.

We also observe Feast days and Days of Obligation such as Ascension Thursday and Ash Wednesday. We observe the Lenten period by praying the Stations of the Cross every day during Lent in the Chapel of Mary. We observe the month of May by saying a decade of the Rosary each morning in the chapel of our Lady. We also observe the feast of St Blaise by blessing each boy. St Blaise is the patron saint of throats.. The Feast of St Marcellin Champagnat, the patron saint of Marist schools, is a big day and we celebrate this in style every year.

As a school we will celebrate 75 years of St David's being in existence during 2016. We are looking forward to this beautiful and significant year. As we look forward to this celebration, we pray in our hearts the prayer of St. Francis of Assisi:



Inside we had a church service for an hour and the way that they sing the hymns is amazing, they put so much energy into it. One thing I noticed is that they are grateful for everything that they have and they do not blame anyone for the unfortunate chances they have had in life. We as a grade had managed to donate R 5 000 to the parish, R 100 to everyone registered at the parish and toys and clothes for the children. It was an honour to be able to help the less fortunate people of Lerome.

67 BLANKETS

From February to April 2015 St David's Marist Inanda took part in the '67 Blankets for Nelson Mandela Day' Campaign as part of their Lenten Appeal, coordinated by Mrs Cherie Smith.

During this time an incredible 192 blankets were knitted by the boys, parents, staff, family and friends of St David's and, on 14 April 2015, Mr Graeme Edwards (Prep School Headmaster), Mrs Cherie Smith (RE Coordinator), Ms Fiona Budd (St David's Marist Foundation) and the Prep School House and Vice Captains handed over the St David's blankets to Suzette van der Merwe (Executive Head of the Cell C Foundation) and Kevin Friedman and Arlene Snoek (67 Blanket Ambassadors) at the Cell C Head Office.

The 67 Blankets World Record Event, in celebration of 21 Years of Democracy in South Africa, took place on Tuesday 21 April 2015 at the foot of Madiba's statue at the Union Buildings, with the St David's blankets being part of this world record attempt to create the world's largest single blanket - a record which was successfully achieved. Several St David's staff members and boys travelled through to the Union Buildings to assist with the sewing together of the blankets for the record attempt.

During 2015 Cell C had partnered with 67 Blankets for Nelson Mandela Day and schools throughout the country were encouraged to take part and knit or crochet at least 21 blankets to stand in line to be one of 21 schools to win R21 000 sponsored by Cell C - in July 2015 St David's Marist Inanda was chosen as one of the top 21 schools in terms of blanket submissions and received a cheque for R 2I 000 which was donated to the School's community service

The St David's blankets were distributed on Mandela Day 2015 to NGOs throughout South Africa.

We would like to thank each and every person who participated in this campaign - boys, parents, staff, extended family and friends and community group supporters - knitters and crocheters - those who donated wool and those who sewed and crocheted squares together - and those who helped to pack and label the blankets - it was truly a phenomenal coming- together of our community towards a joint project of 'good wool'.

COLLEGE OUTREACH

Community service has continued to be an integral part of what we do at St David's. Most boys are involved with service outside of the School, but our weekly activities are still supported. These activities include the Alexandra Soup Kitchen, SMILE, visits to Mother Teresa and Headway. In many ways our boys benefit more than the recipients of our service because of the exposure it gives them to situations of disadvantage, poverty and need.

The Grade 10 and 11 outreach days are highlights on the community service calendar. We visited the same four schools in Alexandra Township this year: Gordon Primary, Emfundisweni Primary, Ekukhanyisweni Primary and Ikage Primary. Our boys offered tuition in both Maths and English. The children of these schools are always delighted to see our boys and valuable interaction takes place between communities which seldom meet. We are presently looking at other ways of interacting with these schools in order to advance our impact even further. I was able to speak to the four headmasters and their deputies at a lunch and conference at GIBS recently and to suggest that any ideas from their side would be welcomed. There will be follow-up on this in the new year. Thanks to all those staff who accompanied the boys on their visits - Ms Voorendyk, Mr Bhinder, Mr Mudzingwa, Mr Chonco, Mr Albertyn and Mr Lenye.

Our holiday 'camp' this year was to assist our fellow Marist School, Sacred Heart, with their 3 2 6 refugee programme. Sacred Heart held holiday activities at their school and our boys assisted as co-facilitators of the programme. Boys reported back very positively about their experiences. It is hoped that more boys will involve themselves in this programme in future. It is also an opportunity to visit and see the workings of a fellow Marist school. These programmes are offered in both the August and the December holidays. This is a wonderful opportunity to fulfil some of St David's community service requirements.

There have also been a number of charity drives this year. The year started with the annual Shavathon for Cansa and the collection of funds was the biggest experienced for many years. This has become a very worthwhile activity in light of the fact that our St David's community has been hugely affected by this dreaded disease over the years. The pancake drive on Shrove Tuesday was also exceptionally successful this year. All the proceeds were forwarded to the Marist Care Mission in the Eastern Cape. The 'clothes for cash' initiative was also a success this year. It is wonderful to hear from boys who continually bring forward ideas concerning charity drives. Our Christmas drives are under way and a number of teachers are involved in the Santa Shoebox project, amongst others.

In December last year our Head Boy and his Deputy went down to Addo in the Eastern Cape to take part in the holiday programme that the Marist Brothers hold in their schools. Sebastian and Matthew returned with inspired tales of their experience down there. Other boys have since enquired about also taking part in future. Once again the boys had firsthand experience of the workings of the Marist world.

HANDS OF CHAMPAGNAT



When we were in Grade 10 we were invited to be part of the Grade II social responsibility project to paint houses and plant gardens in Orange Farm.

We were affected by the entire project, because for many of us, it was the first time being exposed to harsh conditions our fellow South Africans have to endure to make a living in this country.

We then returned to School determined to be agents of change in our country. We formed The Hands of Champagnat because we realised that this was part of our Founder, Saint Marcellin Champagnat's vision and our Marist spirituality. This meant we were willing to take action courageously, with a humble spirit out of our concern for the poor and the disadvantaged people in our own neighbourhood.

This is when we contacted the NGO - Gift of the Givers - the largest disaster relief organisation of African origin on the African continent. They have been voted the top trusted NGO and their work is purely humanitarian. They spoke to us about an Early Childhood Development Centre in the area of Alexandra, near the Jukskei River.

Every year, the river would overflow, causing massive

damage to the property and belongings of the people living there. The Gift of the Givers built a community settlement on higher ground for the people living on the embankment. However, there is a lack of early childhood education in the area and building an Early Childhood Development Centre will provide a focal point of development for the community, providing essential early education skills for learners, and allow for teachers to become further skilled. It will also serve as a place of safety where parents can leave their children when at work, or in search of work opportunities.

We see this as an extremely important project and so our team, The Hands of Champagnat has R85 077 to build at least two classrooms this year. We look forward to a successful project. Thank you to the School community who generously sponsored this drive.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT MR GRAEME EDWARDS

Good evening Dr Bussin, Mr Thiel, Br Joe, Br Jude, Mrs Klement and members of the St David's Foundation, invited guests, ladies and gentlemen, and most importantly, the Grade 4-7 boys of St David's Marist Inanda. What a joy it is to gather this evening to celebrate the progress and the academic achievements of our boys. You are indeed most welcome.

"How then do we grow and develop the boys in our care into men who will be of women, those willing to work hard, to be faithful in relationships, honest in business dealings, and good fathers to their children?"

Whilst I concede that there is no single magic formula in response to this complex and vexing question, I would like propose just three thoughts for your consideration.

The first factor is a sense of belonging. Children who feel connected to their homes and school are likely to thrive. This sense of belonging is derived from an understanding of the past, their present reality and their future hopes and dreams. St David's offers all of these aspects. The boys are well positioned within a rich history of Marist education - one in which the virtues of simplicity, modesty and humility strengthen and inform present day practices. In 2016, St David's will celebrate 75 years of Marist education. This milestone serves as a tangible reminder of our past, our present reality and the future dreams for all our boys.

The second aspect which, is linked to the first, relates to being grounded in values, faith and an ethos that seeks to provide and promote the principles so often lacking in society today. Men cannot respect women if boys are not taught how to respect themselves, their peers and their teachers. I am reminded of the

sound advice offered by John Wooden. He contends that "The best thing a man can teach his son is how to love his mother".

Boys cannot be expected to be hard working adults if they are not taught grit and perseverance as children. Furthermore, boys will not be honest in business if they are not held accountable as children. Many of these lessons are difficult and painful to learn, but the long term value far outweighs this short lived discomfort of appropriate consequences for actions. The research reminds us that boys prefer structured, ordered environments, those where there are set boundaries and the security in knowing what is right and what is wrong.

The third and final aspect to consider is that failure is not the opposite to success. In this interpretation, failure is not the end of a process, but rather failure is part of the journey to success. As adults we fail, as humans we fail - it is how we deal with failure that counts. I urge you to focus on effort, to build selfconfidence, to set realistic and achievable goals. Even good men 'fail' sometimes!

I believe that St David's builds good men!

Boys, each of you is on a journey. There will be high points and low points. No matter where you are or how you feel, remember











that you are all destined to be a great man. With this school, your family and by God's grace, I am looking forward to watching you become a fine young man.

Tonight we celebrate the academic component of our school. The journey to this point has been made possible by a number of people.

Thank you boys, for your hard work and determination. No matter the award you receive tonight, it signifies a part of your journey year by year and grade by grade. I wish all our Grade 7 boys success and happiness in the future. To all boys who will be leaving us for whatever reason, always remember that once a Marist boy always a Marist boy!

I thank the parents for their support, co-operation and assistance in so many areas of our school life. The boys stand to benefit when there is a positive synergy between the school and the home. Thank you for being part of this leg of their journey.




LIBRARY REPORT 2015



There were a few pep talks needed to dispel the stage fright but once the boys got on stage, they wowed the audience with their talent. One of the biggest events in the African marimba calendar is the International Marimba and Steelpan Festival. Three bands represented St David's



Marist Inanda in five different categories. The senior band, lead and taught by Ciaran De Chaud (Matric), gave such an energetic performance that it made the audience dance.

If I were to tell you about all the amazing performances that the bands did, we would be here for a while. They say that a teacher's job is to inspire, but in this case I think it has been the other way around. I want my students to be motivated by music, to know that anything is possible, as long as you keep working at it and don't back down.

As Mrs Geldenhuys, or "Mrs G" as she is affectionately known, retires after 36 years of loyal service, we thank her for enormous contribution to Marist education and hope that she will now have more time to enjoy quality moments with her beloved family.

PREP SCHOOL ATHLETICS

The athletics season took place in March as usual, a time when our fields are in perfect condition. The sudden transition from cricket and water polo to athletics and the short and hectic nature of the season left little time for progressively building fitness or for refining techniques.

Despite all the time, effort and man-power that athletics requires, it still holds an important place on our school sports calendar. Athletics allows all boys to participate and it allows many of them to find a niche that they may not find in the other sports and of course, athletics is a sport of beautiful simplicity with the capacity to teach many life lessons.

The St. David's A and B teams participated in three inter-schools events, one of which was historical in nature! The St. Peter's inter-school athletics meeting was historical for St. David's in that it was the first time that we have ever participated in an away fixture (apart from Prestige Athletics). In all my 13 years at St. David's, every inter-school fixture has been held at St. David's. It was interesting for our athletes and officials to participate in and observe this fixture. It gave us renewed appreciation for our facilities, in that we don't have to run 3 3/4 laps for an 800 and it reminded us that our meetings are run in a rather slick manner.

As usual, the athletics season culminated in the Inter-House Championship. The format of this event was altered from what we have been accustomed to over the past number of years, dating back to before anyone can remember. The new format was to an extent experimental and it was designed to be more inclusive and to bring a fun element to the inter-house championship. Many of the new events proved to be very entertaining and successful although, the inclusion of the field events on the day, rather than as pre-contested events did drag the meeting out for much longer than desired. The new approach will continue next year with the successful items being retained and necessary changes made.

Points worth noting were three new records: Mark Ireland ran the U-I0-I200m in 4:19.48 and Jack Waterhouse broke the U-II-I00m and 400m records with times of I3.11 and 65.41. The Prep Athletics captain, Joshua Black completed his Prep athletics career unbeaten (since Grade 3 when it became competitive) in all inter-house and inter-schools meetings in 100 and 200m races.

The Junior Prep Inter-House meeting was as usual very successful and it ran very efficiently, largely thanks to Mr Ramsey's preparation of the boys and the assistance of all of the Junior Prep and Mini-Marist teachers.

Both the Junior Prep and Senior Prep athletics as well as the various inter-schools meeting and practices require a tremendous amount of co-ordination and man power. These events showcase the St. David's Prep staff's team work at its best. Each staff member quietly but efficiently gets on with his or her job to ensure a smoothly run event, which is much appreciated by myself and hopefully the boys and parents of St. David's.





CROSS COUNTRY

PREP SCHOOL CROSS COUNTRY REPORT 2015

Many boys were also affected by flu during the cross country season. The boys participated on courses that were very demanding. The St. John's course was memorable for its very steep hill near the finish, so steep and slippery that one of our boys (who had practiced on the hill before the race) rolled from near the top right down to the bottom, like a giant game of snakes and ladders! So, when it came to the final race on the calendar, the boys appreciated the relative shortness and easy nature of their fast home course and the parents appreciated the fact that the afternoon was not dragged out as it was at the other meetings.

All of the boys who participated in the inter-schools cross country must be commended for their efforts. As mentioned, this is not an easy sport and it comes with few rewards other than a sense of satisfaction at having done your best and met the challenge.

Jack Waterhouse must be singled out for his outstanding running in the U II age group. As with last year, he finished first in every inter-school cross country meeting and he obviously won the U II inter-house cross country championship race as well.

The U IIs proved to be a very strong age group with four St. David's boys finishing in the top ten at both the St. Peter's and St. John's meetings and a total of six different St. David's boys finishing in the top ten in the course of the season. It would have been interesting to see what this age group could have achieved had all their runners been fit at the same meeting.

A performance that epitomised the spirit and toughness that we as educators are attempting to instill in our St. David's boys was Gareth Potts' run in the U 12 age group at St. Peter's. On a tough course where all athletes were strongly advised to run in shoes, Gareth insisted on running barefoot. Not only did he complete the course but he finished in 9th position, much motivated by his dad's promise to him of a new rugby ball should he finish in the top ten!




