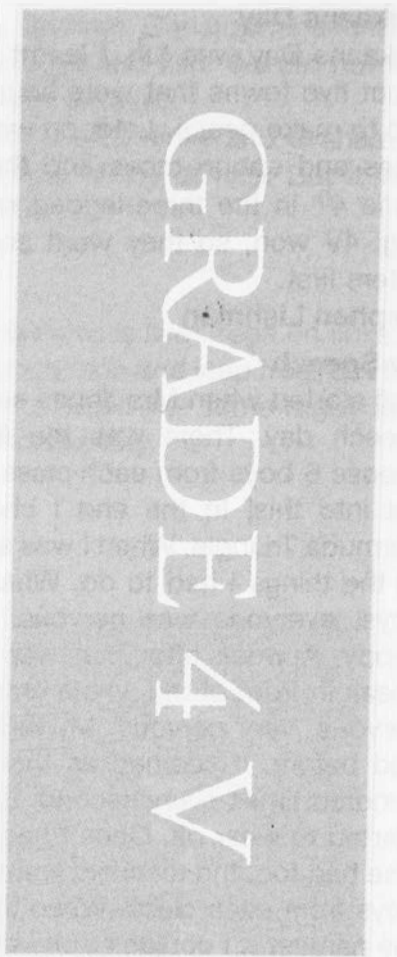

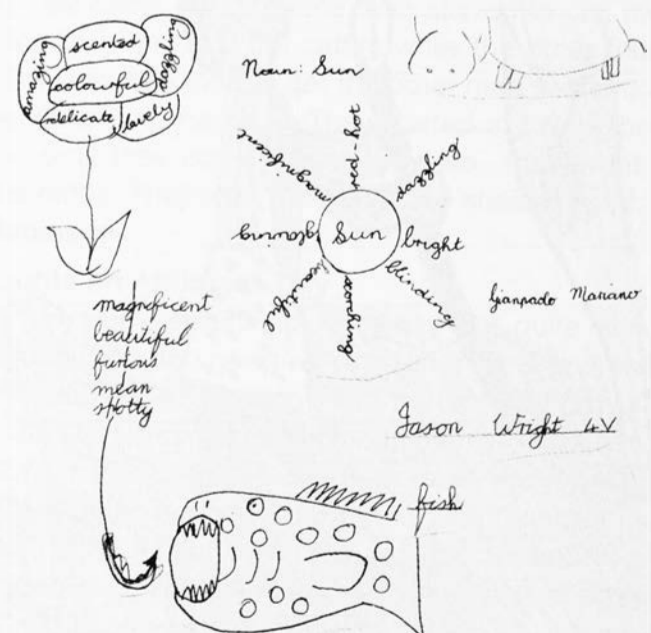

Here are a few of the boy's favourite and not so favourite things about Bushpigs. We are sure you will notice that the one list outweighs the other by far.....



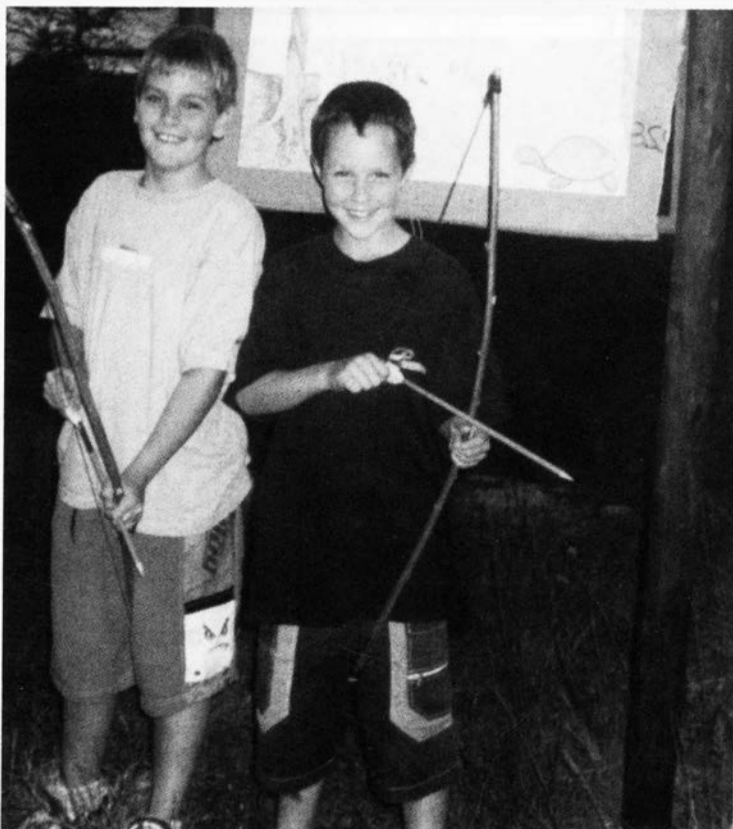
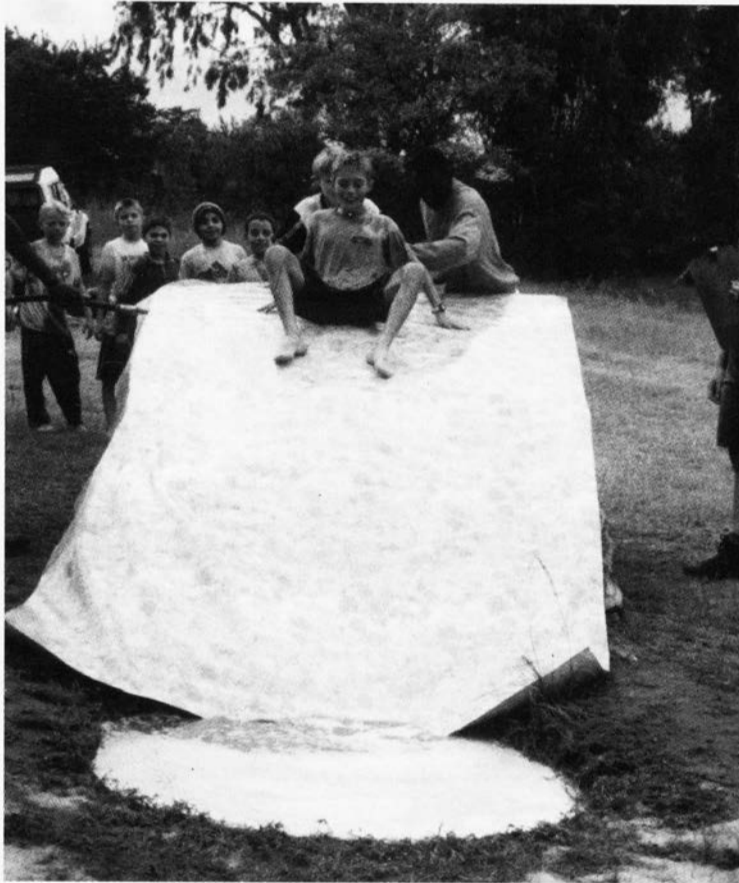
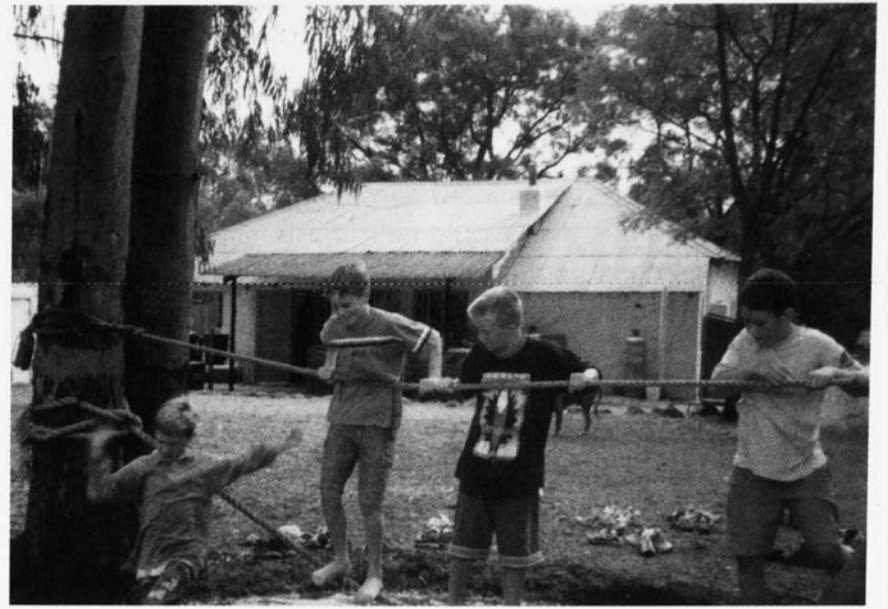
