

On arrival the boys were introduced to all the staff and the basic ground rules were spelt out. Of course, these were to be revised on numerous occasions.



Anton Engelbrecht had this too say...


The worst part of Bushpigs was the scavenger restaurant because I almost lost my appetite and my breakfast...


