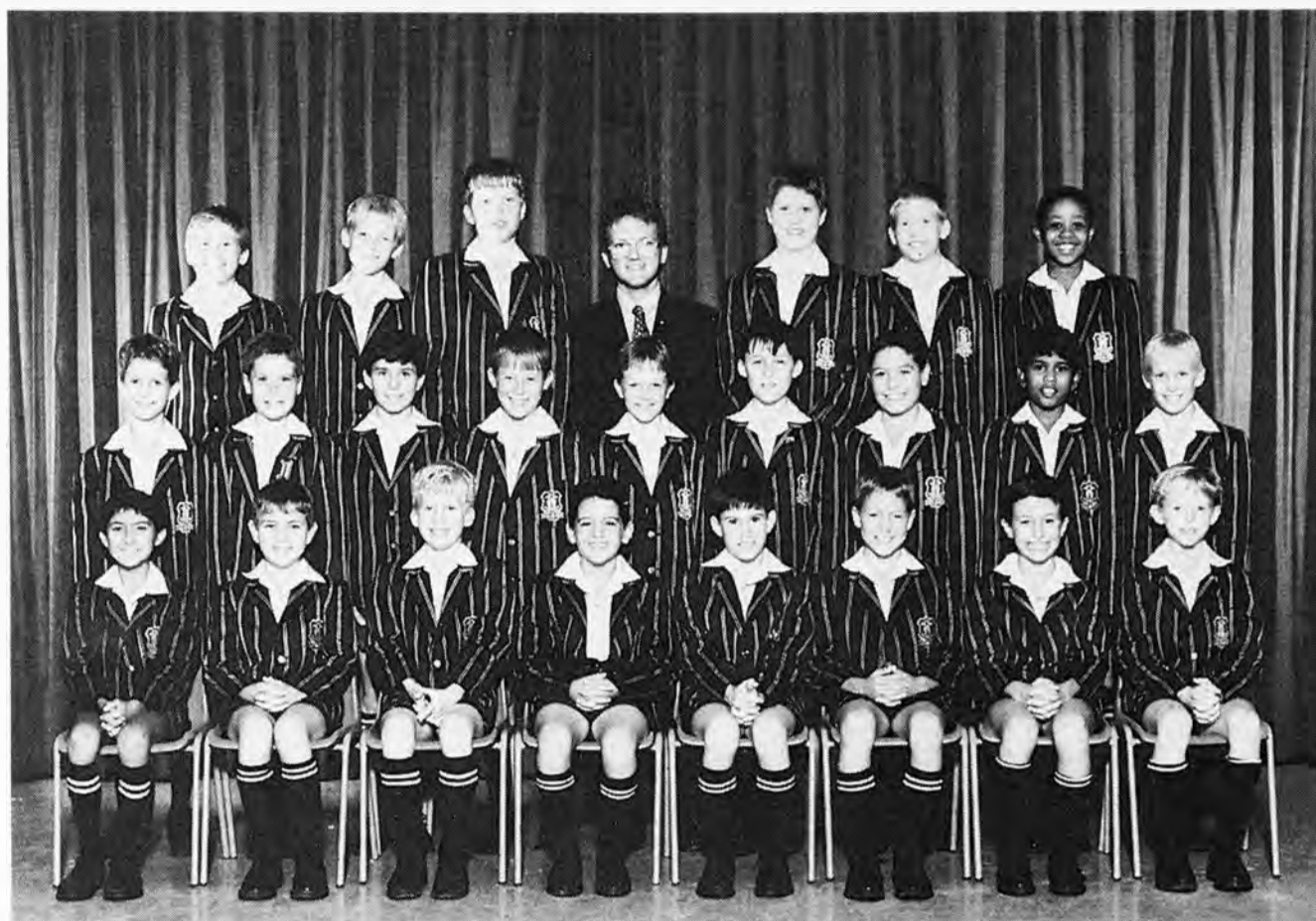

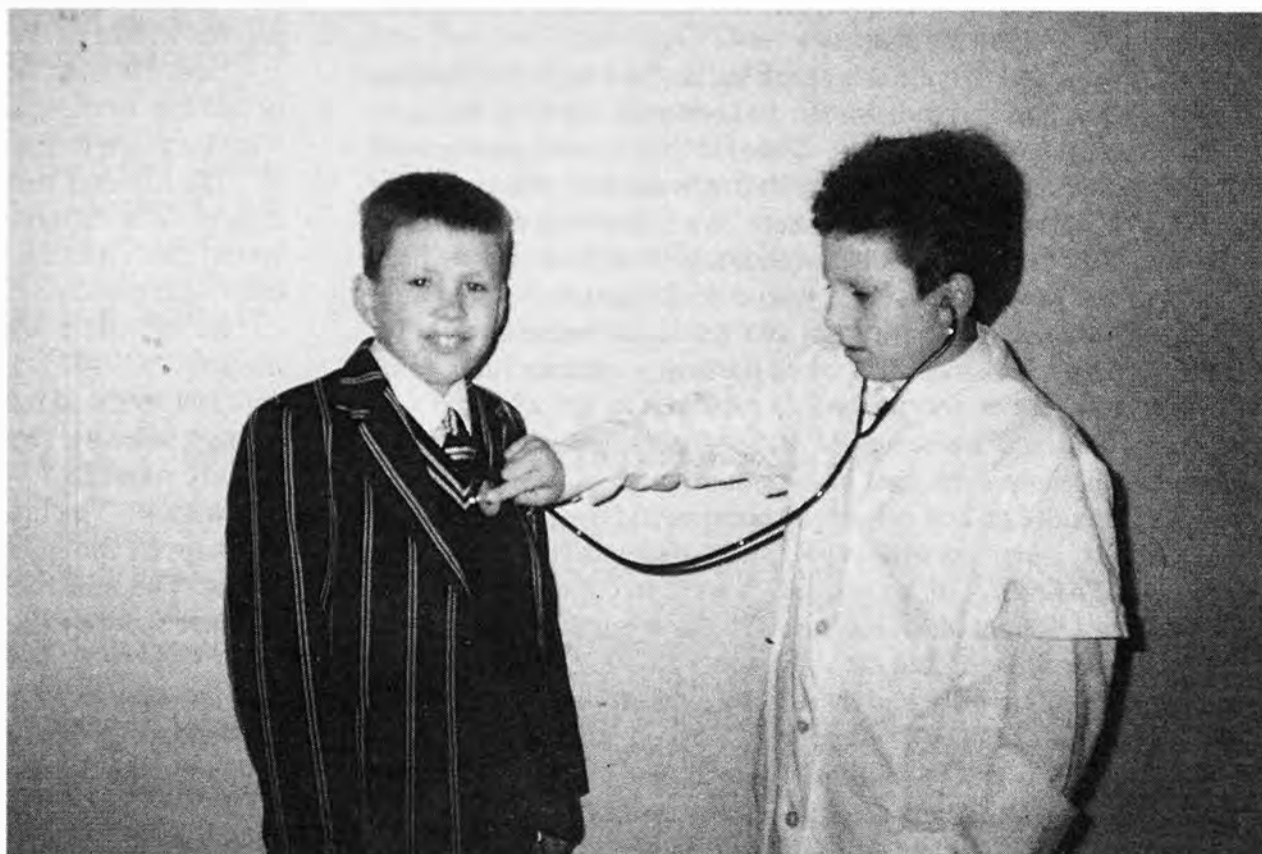


Mrs Ann Morkel with gold award winners David Smith and Levon Rivers after the Afrikaans Deklamasie

After everyone was plastered and bandaged up we went on another walk up a mountain where there was a cave. Trevor was going to go straight to the cave and wait there for us. Accompanied by Mr Mitchley and Mr Fry we headed towards the Numbi Gate early on a Sunday morning. We stayed at the Pretoriuskop camp for the first three nights where we went on several game drives. One highlight was two cheetahs who were marking their territory alongside the road. They walked next to the bus for two kilometres! Another highlight was a pack of wild dogs who fought over food next to the bus. Near Pretoriuskop we sighted a leopard and got mock-charged by an angry elephant.

We travelled north to Letaba on Wednesday where we saw lion,

elephant and buffalo. The Letaba River was flowing and a great deal of wildlife could be seen from the camp. The elephant museum proved to be fascinating and several more game drives proved fruitful as we added to a long list of animals and birds already spotted. The pupils proved to be excellent animal spotters and even better cooks (Shaun Falconer and Mark Schoombie in particular). My thanks to Mr Fry for his support and to the boys for making the trip a memorable one.
