

We dedicate the 1986 St David's College Review to our new College Chaplain, Father B. Brewer S.J.


Having spent the past sixteen years at St George's College in Harare, Zimbabwe, 14 of them in a senior capacity with special responsibility for school discipline, Father Brewer certainly has an understanding of young men, their lifestyles and problems. We thank Father Brewer for his interest, loyal support and active participation in the many and varied extra curricular activities that the College offers.





Religious Notes

St David's College has always been and still is a Catholic school and great emphasis is placed on the religious atmosphere of the school, both inside and outside the classroom. To this end, 1986 saw the appointment to the staff of a religious co-ordinator for both the senior and junior schools: Mrs Smurthwaite to the former and Miss Jenks to the latter. It has been their responsibility to draw up and implement the syllabus appropriate to the different standards; and in doing so to cover all aspects of Christian knowledge. Each section of the syllabus is supported by well researched aids in the form of references, quotes etc. Working hand in hand with them is the new school Chaplain, Father Brewer S.J., who has replaced Monsignor Plesters who has retired after a long innings of faithful and devoted service. We wish Monsignor Plesters good health and a good rest. Father Brewer has his own office in the Senior School block and pupils are welcome to discuss any problems or matters of concern with him.


One is often asked: what is the state of religion in the school? Unlike secular subjects which are taught, learnt and examined without necessarily affecting the pupil himself personally, religion is more abstract. In religion you are dealing with a way of life, the priciples and motives that govern it. It is a process of instilling Christian ideals on which the pupils can make right decisions and sound judgements. To expect immediate and concrete results is unrealistic. What can be done is to sow the seed and gradually nurture that seed. The nature of the task must of necessity begin in the home both by word and example — and the more important of these is example. How can you teach a pupil the importance of a relationship with God through prayer, the importance of attending their parish and receiving the sacraments if those he holds most dear, his family, do not regard these practices as important?

That being said, we can ask: what is St David's doing? Besides the religious classes given with great dedication by the staff, each day in the Senior School begins with a short assembly of scripture readings and prayers. Prayers are also said at the Junior School Line-Ups. On Friday mornings the Senior School have a longer assembly. Both staff and the different classes take it in turns to present their own assemblies based on a theme of their choice. Readings, hymns and appropriate prayers are selected. These assemblies prove a challenge to the participants and are interesting and inspiring for those listening. Every term each standard in the school has a class Mass and the opportunity for Confessions. There are regular First Friday Masses. On the first Sunday of the month during term time a Family Mass is held at which all parents are most welcome. Mass is held on other major occasions, e.g. Champagnat Day, the Feast of the Assumption, Ash Wednesday, etc. Several Masses are held jointly with pupils from other schools. Every morning in May, part of the Rosary is said in the Chapel. During Lent several classes did attend the Stations of the Cross. Altar Boys meet twice each week. Care is taken to prepare pupils for First Confession and first Holy Communion. At assemblies on Wednesdays the Junior School boys have very effective RE by way of school plays.

This year, the First Holy Communion will take place on October 26. Earlier in the year, thirty-five of the Standard 9 and 10 boys were confirmed at Rosebank Parish by Bishop Orsmond. In the second term several guest speakers were invited to address the Standard 10 boys on a number of different topics. The resources in the RE Room have also been extended. Many new and relevant books are now contained in this room for reference by teachers of R.E.

Words alone mean nothing without action of some sort. In this respect the boys of St David's have been outstanding in putting Christian ideals into practice. The support given to Br Anthony in Slough, Operation Hunger, Children's Feeding Schemes etc is indicative of the goodwill that exists. Under the aegis of the Co-Workers various trips and expeditions were organised to enable the boys to see and experience life 'on the other side'. A lot has been done, a lot can still be done.

Marist Co-Workers

The Marist Co-Workers' movement has moved into its third year at St. David's and we can confidently report that it is a well-established part of the daily life of the College. Once the initial birth pangs were over the greatest danger was stagnation, but this was obviated by an infusion of new blood in the form of several new members of staff who are now fully committed Co-Workers: Fr Brewer, the College Chaplain, Mr T. Oliver, Miss A. Gl'n-Thomas and Miss A. Jenks. Although Miss Jenks has formed her own Group in the Primary School, she also attends meetings and actively assists in the College Group.

I feel that it would be wrong to single out any single project as the highlight of the year, but I do feel that the visit to the Brothers' Mission at Slough should be regarded as the most important on our Group's calendar. The visit keeps both staff and boys in very close contact with the Brothers and the work among the poor to which their efforts are directed. This year the boys wre accompanied by Fr Brewer, Mr Oliver, Miss Jenks, Mr de Souza, myself and Mr P. Collins, a teacher from St. Henry's.

In May we organized a soccer-cum-picnic day with out 'twin', the Witkoppen Farm School. Our Standard Six pupils challenged Witkoppen to two soccer games on their fields, so that our boys could experience at first hand the lack of proper amenities which the average black child suffers from. Mr W. Castle organised, with the generous assistance of McCullough and Bothwell Outfitters, the presentation of a complete soccer outfit to the Witkoppen First Team which was victorious. With generous donations from parents and friends we were able to treat the boys to a slap-up alfresco meal. Althouth I was overseas at the time because of a family illness, I was assured that Margaret, my wife, was more than an adequate stand-in. After the boys had eaten, our staff hosted the Witkoppen Staff to a cocktail party. As reported in last year's College Review we had planned a visit each Friday by a group of our boys to Witkoppen during our Activities Period. This project is now well established. Here I am most appreciative of the assistance given by Mr Oliver and his friend Mr Nick Taylor, a Mathematics adviser to the Department of Education and Training. Both have given lessons to the pupils from both schools and to the Witkoppen Staff. During these Friday visits our boys do team-teaching as well as what they term "Homework First Aid". This means that groups of St David's pupils visit classes and assist the boys with any problems they may have had in their school work during the week. In such an atmosphere race consciousness does not exist.

The annual reunion of the various Co-Worker groups was held at St. David's on the first Sunday of May. During the discussions which follow Mass Bro. Provincial asked us to put a special emphasis on the spiritual side of the movement for the forthcoming year. Following this advice Mass was celebrated in the College Chapel on 15 August, the Feast of the Assumption. Groups from Linmeyer, Sacred Heart, Witkoppen and St. David's participated in the singing, and it was felt that this was the most suitable way of celebrating this day, as Our Lady is not only the patroness of the Marist Brothers, but also of South Africa.

In this review I shall not report on ongoing activities from last year or on Primary School activities which are dealt with by Miss Jenks.

At our Annual General Meeting in June, J.P. Genovese, G. Muller and J. Xenopolous were elected as the new Executive Committee. They replaced R. Alcock, R. Dolamore and S. Murray, who deserve a special word of thanks for the good work which they did during their year of office.

After the games, a picnic lunch was enjoyed by all 465 pupils at the school: 600 bars of chocolate donated by Nestlé;

720 cold drinks by kind favour of Coca Cola and

900 bread rolls from Manna Bakery spread by our Standard 4 boys with margarine donated by S A Milling.

Seemann's Meat Products supplied 36kg of sliced polony and Randburg Fruit and Vegetable Discounters supplied apples, oranges and tomatoes all at wholesale prices. The purchase of the fruit and polony was made possible by the support of our boys at weekly collections made by Mr Oliver.

70 of our boys were present. It turned out to be a good Friday for Witkoppen School. Mrs Eugenia Matlou reminded us that Black people were experiencing very sad and dark days in the townships around us, but that the love manifested in what we had done; gave them hope and would be long remembered.

Our referee, Mr Willy Castle, added to a happy day by presenting the winning Witkoppen team with a set of jerseys, shorts and soccer socks, most generously donated by McCullagh and Bothwell.

The Witkoppen Principal, Mr Sam Matlou and his staff, enjoyed a post picnic reception with the St David's staff, where plans for a hymn singing get-together were discussed.

The weekend began with an outdoor Mass, followed by a nightwalk as far as the nature reserve. Then came the braai and video.



SLOUGH

Getting stuck in the sand is nothing new for travellers in these arid parts of Bophuthatswana, but doing so at 2.30 a.m. transporting a young pregnant girl nearing her time on the road to Bendell certainly is an experience worth relating.

Three elderly women and the grand 'kgosi' of our church here at Slough, Rva James Tawane had a short while before got out to push me backwards so that I could try the left fork of that particular road - little did we realise what sort of a track lay ahead. It was a mere 20m or so and again we sank deep into the Kalahari sands. This time it left the back axle touching the sand. We gathered some foliage, jacked up the truck and then more disaster struck: my battery was completely flat. Using my torch I saw that there were some tracks only 5m back and the ground was much firmer. My plan was then to push the truck back and on to that track in the hope that we could push-start. However, the Kalahari sands won this titanic heaving struggle, and there we sat. It was 3.15 a.m. and no moon. After a few minutes the women were suddenly terrified by the screams of nearby baboons and the wailing of jackals. We got into the truck until they moved off. Soon afterwards the pregnant girl started to have what seemed like a fit. It seemed as though the time for her baby had come, but she couldn't deliver it. Oom James then hinted at going to look for help, but being quite my senior, I dissuaded him. We decided to listen for roosters which could mean some help - we also needed water for the young girl. After an hour or so it began to get extremely cold and Oom James lit a fire from thorn bushes. At the first sight of the dawn I consoled the women and let them know that Oom James would be with them, and so I set off back for Slough. As I ran I came across quite frequent baboon tracks, apparently quite fresh, and I can assure you that my eyes scanned the countryside very sharply. Whilst running I also thought out a strategy of attack were they to attack me. It is amazing just how fine one's senses become in the stillness of that desert track. I once jumped for cover when I confronted a jackal, but luckily it was sunrise and he seemingly slunk off into hiding. As I

kept running, I thought of the lives of the girl and the baby: would I get her safely to a hospital? ... would help reach them before I could get help? Please God, just a passing car - even a horse, or a donkey-cart nearby. I ran with renewed vigour when I met the crossroad that led to Slough. Soaked in perspiration I reached the first windpump, but it was dry. I ran on and ran on, not even lifting my head anymore as the sight of the long track seemed to make the road indefinite - once I was scared out of my wits by the shrill cry of a hornbill. Once or twice I stopped and listened for I thought I'd heard an on-coming vehicle - I recognised it as being the diesel pump at the village. I now began to run much faster, and by this time my legs were really aching. As I was approaching the last bend, about 2 km from Slough, along came a car. I waved it down, explained, and the driver, whom I knew very well, took me back to the mission. Thank goodness our four-wheel vehicle was still here, and both Brothers Richard and Anthony and the doctor. After my explaining the situation and giving directions, they then left, taking our workmen along to asist.

I washed and went off to teach for the rest of the day. Soon after I'd returned from school, our vehicle arrived back with the helpers and with three elderly women looking absolutely exhausted. Little did I know what distance I'd run: 23km. But more important, the girl had been taken on to Bathlaros and had indeed given birth (by Caeserian) and both were safe and well. The 23km run has left its mark in my memory: a two-and-a-half hour run keeps one fit in body; that the Kalahari sands are nothing to be played with; and a wonderful prayer — God loves a cheerful giver — give it all you've got!

Believe it or not, but I again answered a consistent knock at our front door at 2.00 a.m. the very next morning and again it was for a very similar situation. Thank goodness this case wasn't too serious to warrant another midnight trip along the same road, for her parting words of "Amen, Alleluia" were certainly reiterated loud and clear from my end — it seemed as though she was sleep-walking and in search of the bottle store: I wasn't going to be taken for another ride!



1986 MATRIC DANCE



The last activity was the Nelspruit Weather Station. There we learnt of the research project carried out by them. It involved the spraying or seeding of the clouds in order to induce them to rain. The highlight of that I think was when we were allowed to sit in the cockpit and groundpilot a lear jet belonging to the weather station. The day was finished off with a large campfire where we cooked up a real feast. We were also privileged to have one of our campers, Lorenzo Mossa, come of age (turn 16), and he was presented with a cake by Mrs De Souza.

The next morning we hiked down the mountain, with Mr De Souza following in the combi. Mr De Souza took us on our final treat to an almost unseen abandoned Gold Mine that he and his family had discovered.

Our expedition was over and we returned to Johannesburg. We all agreed that apart from interest sake, this tour was totally worthwhile as well as excellent fun. Our thanks to Mr de Souza for a most enjoyable time.










Art Exhibition

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ETERNAL SPIRIT OF THE CHAINLESS MIND: - LIBERTY THOU ART!

The right to be free has been an intense desire in mankind over the centuries. History itself recounts countless instances of people pleading, begging and ultimately fighting for their freedom. The Old Testament in the Bible relates the story of the Israelites who were oppressed by the Egyptians. They were used as slaves and generally their divine right to freedom was mercilessly abused. Unfortunately, the children of Israel became corrupted and were almost as bad as their former masters, the Egyptians. 
The U/14B Cricket side generally fared well this season and retained a good spirit throughout practices and matches. They won half their games but in those that they lost, they by no means disgraced themselves.



ESCAPE FROM EAST BERLIN

I was only a child when the Berlin Wall was constructed. Dividing the city into two, the wall ran right through a park, separating me from the place I had played in when I was young.
