



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BOB GOES AROVING

Most Old Boys in touch with local affairs know that Bob Effren, who left school more years ago than anyone cares to remember, but has never left the Old Boys Association, since he first joined and has moreover spent himself in its service, went to Europe on a holiday trip last year. Since his return he has had many tales to tell of his experiences on the trip, but every effort has failed to get him to write an article for the Maristonian. The editor, however, was not to be outdone and so laid a trap for him. He chose the writer to carry out the task whether because I am a very young reporter or else because he felt that I was so innocent, Bob would fail to see through my desire to be regaled with yarns about European affairs. However, the afternoon was pleasant, the Triangular Sports were on at Inanda, the tea (genuine tea) had been good and Bob was in reminiscent mood. Yet there were snags. I am no shorthand typist nor was there one available and had there been, Bob would have smelt a rat. He told me much more than appears here, but there is sufficient to show how observant he is and what a lover of all things Marist.

His first stop after leaving Johannesburg, was Cape Town. While waiting for his boat he went out to St. Joseph's College at Rondebosch and there bumped into Father (now Monsignor) Galvin. As Father is one of the Johannesburg Representatives on the Marist Federation, they had a long chat about things Marist. Later he went to see the new Marist venture, the Marist War Memorial Club, and in the evening he attended a Show in aid of the Club, given in the College Hall. Here he was instroduced to the men who had battled to build the Club, a battle that was not in vain as results now show.

After a short stay in England, Bob crossed the Border to Scotland, and of course, called at St. Joseph's College, Dumfries, where he was welcomed and entertained by the Principal, Rev. Brother Joseph. Brother took him around the classes and introduced him as an African Old Boy. Although the Boys were glad to see him they were somewhat disappointed that an African Old Boy should look so fair. Nevertheless, Bob was delighted by the welcome and as an Ex-Chairman of the Old Boys Association away back home, he was struck by the beauty of the War Memorial Chapel erected by the Old Boys of St. Joseph's, following the first World War. He was also taken over Mount St. Michael's, the Headquarters of the Marist Brothers in Great Britain and Eire, and but a stone throw from the College. Here he was introduced to several of the Brothers and brought away pleasant recollections of his short stay. Following a few weeks spent in England he took his car to the Continent and made a bee-line for Genis Laval, the Mother House of the Marist Brothers in the World. Here he felt at home, because he was entertained by Reverend Brother Superior General, Brother Leonida, whom Bob had officially entertained when in South Africa. He told me he felt like a member of the family by the time he had been introduced to several of the Members of the General Administration. Bob was entertained right royally by the Superior General and Rev. Brother Augustine and was presented by

Reverend Brother with delicious samples of the wines and liqueurs made by the Marist Brothers. This impressed Bob very much, because he never dreamt that the Brothers had ever attempted anything beyond Education!

From France he crossed into Italy and so to Rome. He was impressed by the magnitude of St. Peter's and by the tremendous crowds that the Holy Year had brought. One thing that disappointed him greatly was the fact that while he was away from home, the Secretary of the Old Boys Association in Rome, had sent a Circular Letter around the world, notifying all Old Boys that when they found themselves in Rome, they were to phone him and he would find accommodation for them and have them entertained while in the Holy City. Great was Bob's disappointment when he heard what he had missed, more especially as he would have been assured of a royal welcome and of a sort of official tour of Rome. If I know anything about him, I feel that he will one day visit Rome again.

It was growing dark by this time and the victors and vanquished were leaving the field when Bob suddenly said: "Have I ever told you about my trip to U.S.A.?" I assured him he had not and so I suddenly felt myself sailing past the Statue of Liberty and joining in the whirl of life on Broadway. In spirit we visited that magnificent pile of buildings known as St. Anne's Academy. Here Bob had been greeted by the present Provincial, but the then Principal, Brother Thomas Austin. Bob could not say enough in praise of this wonderful building. Later he went to Mount St. Michael's in the Bronx where he met an old International Soccer Player in Brother John and also a Brother Nicholas, who was very helpful in the matter of showing him round.

Shortly after he visited the College in Philadelphia. Before that, however, he visited a group of Old Boys engaged in an American Rugby practice. Unfortunately, however, he had no Brother with him and although they made him welcome they would not practise while he remained. Bob has a shrewd suspicion that they feared he might issue a challenge to bring over a team of Springboks and they were really afraid he might discover some weaknesses. Be that as it may he lost his one opportunity of seeing American Old Boys in action. Here again I feel that he will repeat his visit.

Darkness had now fallen and as Bob was getting ready for his East African trip, I had to release him in the full assurance that if he found anything of Marist interest during future wanderings over the globe, I should score a scoop as far as he was concerned.

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
College Notes



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THE MARIST BROTHERS AS MISSIONARIES

The Marist Brothers of the Schools may rightly claim the title of Missionary Congregation. From the earliest days of its Foundation the Congregation took pride in Missionary and essentially apostolic work, and Brothers were sent to far-off countries to spread the knowledge and love of Christ by means of Catholic Education amoungst children and youth.

The Founder of the Congregation, Venerable Marcellin Champagnat, volunteered for the Missions and had chosen as his field of Apostolate Oceanica, but his Superiors having decided that his real work was elsewhere, he made his missionary work effective by preparing many Brother Catechists and sending them as helpers, auxiliaries of the Marist Fathers in the distant Missions of Polynesia.

In 1836 when the first Missionaries left for Fiji three Marist Brothers were in the Group. One of the Brothers was Brother M. Nizier, who was the companion and the asistant of Blessed Chanel, who was the First Martyr in Oceanica.

In the years that followed many Brothers offered themselves for the Mission and went to swell the ranks of those who were working for the final triumph of Christ, and His Church in Pagan Lands. Within a short time the Marist Brothers had established Missions, Schools and Colleges in pagan countries.

The following list shows how widespread this missionary effort was: In 1867 they started work in South Africa; to-day there are nine schools or colleges for Europeans and one Native school. Other fields of activity with the date on which work began are: Turkey and Lebanon 1868; in spite of persecution and hampering restrictions there are seven schools functioning in these regions, Australia followed in 1871. 51 schools and colleges flourish there now in two "Provinces," namely Victoria and New South Wales: New Caledonia, 1873, which has four Houses; New Zealand, 1875, which is now a "Province" of 18 Houses; Seychelles, 1884, and four years later Fiji (Marist Brothers Foundation) and Samoa which now boasts nine flourishing Mission Schools.

Colombia, 1889, China, 1891, which to-day is a "Province" of 19 Establishments although recently most of these schools have been closed or reduced to inactivity through Communistic influences;

Aden (1892); Egypt (1898); Iraq (1902); Syria, New Hebrides, Jugo-Slavia and Bulgaria followed. Unfortunately not all these Missions survived the troubled years that followed, but the fact remains they were once foundations.

Greece was opened up as a field of Marist Apostolate in 1907 and Rumania the following year. Belgian Congo, Ceylon and Madagascar were all opened in 1911 and to-day they have a total of 22 Missions, Schools and Colleges as well as Training Centres.

Effect of Wars

The last foundation previous to the First World War was in Spanish Morocco and the disastrous effects of that War can be seen in the fact that the next foundation in the Foreign Mission Field was in the Solomon Islands in 1936 — a lapse of a full generation. Three years later came Kutama in Southern Rhodesia and in 1946 'Mtendere, Nyasaland

World War One and its consequences may have limited activities in the Mission Field, but this cannot be said of World War II, because since the 14th General Chapter held in 1946 (Sept.—October) the following Missions have been set up: The Philippine Islands (1948), Mozambique, Owerri (Nigeria), Macao (China), Hong-Kong, British Malava, all in 1949. Last year came New Guinea and Sumatra and at the moment efforts are being made to start schools in Japan. The total number of schools thus set up is 16 and while it must be pointed out that although some of these foundations are the result of expulsion from Communistic China yet the normal missionary development remains considerable.

Brothers have Schools

The Countries are:

Europe, 13 Countries — England, Ireland, Scotland, Belgium, Spain, France, Germany Greece, Holland, Italy, Lichtenstein, Portugal, Switzerland.

Asia, 7 Countries — Ceylon, China, Lebanon, British Malaya, Syria, Macoa, Hong-Kong.

Africa, 9 Countries — South Africa, Algeria, Belgian Congo, Madagascar, Spanish Morocco, Mozambique, Nigeria, Nyasaland and Rhodesia.

America, 13 Countries — North: Canada, United States, Mexico. Central: Cuba, Guatemala and Salvador. South: Argentine, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Peru, Uruguay, Venezuela.

Oceanica: 9 Countries — Australia, Fiji, Phillippine Islands, New Guinea, New Caledonia, New Zealand, Solomon Islands, Samoa, Sumatra.

In all the countries which may still be termed Missionary Zones and that excludes South Africa, Australia and New Zealand, the Marist Brothers have 84 Missions. Two are in Colombia carrying out work amoung the Native Tribes, 17 in Oceanica, 34 in Asia and 31 in Africa. 557 are Missionaries (Continued on page 19)

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The Starry Firmament

The earth is a great ball floating in space. It is not the only world; it is only a fragment of the great universe. Round the sun are many other stars and worlds, all centering around our sun.

of whom quite a number are Chinese, Singalese, Congoese and Natives of Madagascar. In these Mission schools 38,458 Pupils are instructed. Juniorates and Noviciates are situated in all these Countries to recruit and train subjects for the Brotherhood.

International Juniorate

Since 1909 a Juniorate on International lines has been functioning at Grugliasco some five miles to the North-West of Turin. This Juniorate called after St. Francis Xavier has already sent out hundreds of Brothers, nationals of practically every country in Europe (on this and on the other side of the Iron Curtain) to all Missionary Zones and has accepted and trained subjects from the United States, Mexico, South Africa, Ceylon, Aden, China and Madagascar. To-day the Francis Xavier Juniorate has some 100 Juniors, Postulants and Novices, proof enough that the call of the Missions, and the idealism of sacrifice still beckon to the Youth of to-day.

Here it may not be out of place to mention the Brothers who have died what may be termed the death of Martyrs in missionary countries: Oceanica two, China ten, and to these we should add the name of Br. Joche Albert, Superior at Si-Chang, who was shot by Communists on April 21st of this year. 173 Brothers were shot in Spain during the Marxist Revolution (Persecution) of 1936-39.

In all these countries where the Marist Brothers were the Pioneers of the Gospel at times, they are still the heralds of Good Tidings and the Assistants and co-operators of secular and regular Clergy, in their efforts to form Native Souls to the likeness of Christ and His Church.

With the Missionary personnel already at its disposal the Institute takes pride in developing its already established Missions and as the missionaries increase in number existing missions will be improved and new ones created so that under the protection of Our Lady, the Patroness and First Superior of the Institute, Our Lord's Prayer after the Last Supper may be realised . . . "that they may know Thee, the only True God, and Jesus Christ, whom Thou hast sent."


The English Association



The players of the Fourth XV were very willing but at no time did they ever lok like developing


into a good side.

At the beginning of December, 1950, a School Féte was for the first time held at the College. The day will be long remembered by all the boys and the parents who attended it, for it was a day


of beautiful sunshine, of great activity and one that offered entertainment to even the most exacting ones.




Boxing

A high standard both in swimming and diving was attained by the competitors and several new School records were set up.


Thanks to the officials, the House captains and the excellent behaviour of the boys, the programme, which was longer than in previous years, was gone through without any delays.

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




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SOCCER




INTER-COLLEGES ATHLETIC MEETING

What career can be more useful? You become an Apostle as truly as were those first Twelve under Jesus Christ, and it is to Him that we look for the strength to do good. We can count also on His promise to St. Peter of the hundredfold in this life, and Life Everlasting in the next. Think well on it. God is Truth and He has promised Heaven.

"If to-day you hear His Voice, harden not your hearts." What Our Lord told St. Paul, He tells us also: "My grace is sufficient for thee." And let us be brave enough to answer the call.
