To-day three great Monuments in Johannesburg stand as a testimony to the faith and noble work of those grand men who have devoted their lives to the education of youth, the "Old School" at Koch Street, Observatory College and Inanda College. The names of Brothers Frederick. Albert Dominic and Euphrase will live forever in Marist history and will be remembered by all Old Boys. Their work is done, but their spirit will never die. May all Old Maristonians show the same courage and faith and ever be loyal to the traditions of Marist.


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## KOCH STREET

## " Diamond $^{\text {Jubilee 1889-1949" }}$

Three score years in the life-time of a college is no great span, but stili long enough for three generations to have gone through the classes of the school.

The Marist Brothers came to Johannesburg just 60 years ago and literally pitched their tent at the site now known as Sacred Heart College (Junior Department), Koch Street. The appearance of Koch Street has altered down the years and all that the first pupils recognise as belonging to the original buildings is the little cottage in the Brothers' garden where the Brothers of those days had their small community chapel.

Former pupils of a later generation point out Br . Ernest's Chemistry Room in the corner of the yard, but note - almost with regret - that the old "gym." has given place to a more modern structure. All the trees - bar one - which sheltered classes who had tired of the tedious tent atmosphere have been cleared away to make a football pitch. Even this is no longer the bright red ground which endeared itself to so many Old Boys, but is covered over with asphalt. However, such externals affect the school very little. To the Old Boys returning, there are hundreds of screaming, squealing youngsters swarming over the yard just as noisy, playful, and mischievous as were their fathers and grandfathers. With few exceptions the Old Boys no longer meet their old teachers and names such as Frederick, Columbanus, Valerian and Callixte are shrouded in the veil of veneration which envelopes the objects of school-boy worship; the people and things which remain ever-present to the youth who was a boy, to the youth who becomes a man and to the man who, in his old age, is still child enough and man enough to speak of his teachers with awe, respect and affection.

KOCH STREET is the parent school of Observatory and Inanda and if these two very fine colleges can boast of beauty, attractions and amenities which Koch Street can never have, these children must bear in mind whence they derive their greatness, whence their spirit comes, and they must not forget that it is natural for a child or grandchild to wish to outshine a parent and that the fond parent gladly watches with justifiable pride and satisfaction the progress and advancement of the off-spring.

Old Boys find the new generation of Brothers much as the old generation was. In fact, they are pleasantly surprised that the younger men know so much about the worthy pioneers, and hold them in exactly the same deserved admiration as any child ever had for his Brother-Teacher. This may be due to the fact that trying to lead the same life as the early Brothers they are in a better position to appreciate the merit of the lives of those great men.

The worth of the first Brothers and that of those of later years has been shown by the manner in
which their Past Pupils have rallied within the last week to mark with fitting celebrations, religious and secular, the 60th anniversary of the Brothers' arrival in Johannesburg

On Sunday, October 16th, His Lordship Bishop Whelan, celebrated Pontificial High Mass in the Koch Street quadrangle in thanksgiving for the graces granted to the Brothers and their schools, and as a token that the Brothers are not unmindful of the goodness with which Almighty God has favoured them and their efforts. In his sermon His Lordship stressed that the "old school" had been built on the determination of the parents to give their children the education which they though best for them and which they claim an inviolable right to give. No State can ever interfere lawfully with the right of the parents in this respect. To avail themselves of the right parents had to make sacrifices and suffer. Such sacrifices have been made in the past and would be endured in the future should the necessity arise.

On Saturday, 9th October, the Old Boys' Dinner was held at the Maristonian Club House on the Pretoria Road. Some two hundred Former Pupils attended and enjoyed themselves. Among the guest-

speakers were His Worship the Mayor, Councillor S. P. Lee, and His Lordship, Bishop Whelan, O.M.I. Acting-Justice Lucas paid a noble tribute to the Marist Brothers and their work in South Africa in general and Johannesburg in particular, and made an eloquent plea for less cramming and more effort at right and constructive thinking in modern education. There is more need to teach to think than to make our youths store houses of facts or submitting them to an intensive and exhaustive course of instruction, which fits them only to exploit their lesser-gifted or less fortunate fellow men.

Acting-Justice Lucas was replied to by Reverend Brother Aquinas, present Superior of Koch Street. Brother Justin, Provincial of the Marist Brothers in South Africa, toasted the guests of the evening and a concluding speech abounding in flashes of splendid wit was ably delivered by Mr. L. C. Burke, PostMaster General. The Banquet and speeches were most certainly a success and will go down in Marist history in Johannesburg as one of the best functions held in the 60 years of the school's existence.

It is only right to mention that the Banquet was extraordinary in so far as the local Association had as its guests Marist Federation representatives from Cape Town and the Eastern Province, who had attended the bi-annual conference of the Federation at Koch Street that morning. Mr. D. A. Daly, the newly re-elected Chairman of the Federation, was present as well as Mr. A. Maccelari, Chairman of the Western Province Association, and his ViceChairman, Mr. J. de Nobrega. Mr. Barry AsshetonSmith, Chairman of the Port Elizabeth Association, represented his centre and Uitenhage had an enthusiastic and worthy deputy in Mr. McAninch, who had come over from Pretoria for the occasion.

At the conclusion of the function Mr. A. Lawson, one-time Chairman of the Johannesburg Association, and present Vice-President of the Federation, presented the Club with the minutes of the very first meeting of the Marist Old Boys' Union held at Koch Street on 5th April, 1902. These minutes have been framed and will be jealously guarded at the club-house as a souvenir of pioneers who had confidence in their fellow Old Boys, who started a movement which has grown in prestige with the years and whose ultimate strength and influence none can foresee.

The following day, 9th October, actually Foundation Day, was marked by the opening of the bowling greens for the new season, divers sports and the presentation of the Sussman Cup, which had been won by the Old Maristonian Soccer Club. General jollification prevailed among the boys who attended.

On Tuesday, 11 th October, another very pleasant event was held at the club. This was a cocktail party at which Mr. Len Pollock and his wife were the "Hôtes Parfaits" to a large gathering of Brothers, Brothers' Boys, Brothers' friends and well-wishers of their Association in Johannesburg.

After having been entertained to lunch at Koch Street the members of the Old Boys' Association Committee and that of the Maristonian Club went up to Observatory, where they watched a cricket match between Inanda and Observatory.

Cricket bats were presented by the two Chairmen, Messrs. R. Effren and L. Pollock, to the boys who had put up the most meritorious performances. They were Master L. Rafferty of Observatory and Master A. Zyistra of Inanda.

A "gym" display was given on Saturday afternoon,

15th October, by the scholars of the Sacred Heart College, Eckstein Street, Observatory, under the direction of Mr. S. Meets. The variety of the exercises, the precision of the movements, and the ability of the Participants was a matter of no small wonder to the parents and spectators. The exhibition showed that the Marists in Johannesburg have moved with the times and it must have recalled to the Past Pupils present happy days spent with Messrs. Vieyra and Lilly. It was a grand show and all credit must go to Mr. Meets and the Brothers who co-operated with him in the organisation.

In the evening, the week's festivities organised by the Association came to an end with a Grand Ball in the City Hall. Some four hundred Marist Associates danced to their hearts' content with evident enjoyment and becoming gaiety.

At the conclusion of the dance, Mr. "Bob" Effren thanked the Ladies' Committee and all who had helped to make the week's celebrations a success, and he said a final word about the Marist Brothers and their influence in Johannesburg. He paid tribute to the loyalty, nay, veneration, which existed among the members of the Association for the Brothers and all they stand for in education.

A word of thanks and congratulation to Honorary Secretary, Mr. Frank Anderson, and his assistants, Messrs. Jimmy Young and Frank Russell, is most deserving.

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## THE NECESSITY FOR SOUTH AFRICAN VOCATIONS

The first religious reached South Africa about a hundred years ago. As members of the various communities were no longer able to perform their duties they were replaced from seminaries in Europe. But a catastrophe second only to the Deluge in the History of Man struck the world. World War II. Students left the seminaries to answer the call of their country. Some did not return. Seminaries were destroyed and unsettied conditions make the rebuilding very difficult. The ravages of war have left the inhabitants of several parts of Europe in a state of despair with the consequent deterioration of morals. Religious, who would once have been sent to South Africa, will have to remain in Europe to take their part in the rehabilitation of these lost souls so sadly war-torn.

The missionary field in South Africa is enormous and the few gallant labourers whom God has sent into the vineyard are hopelessly overworked. Does it not sound strange that one priest should be responsible for the spiritual welfare of thousands of souls? The Africans may be black, but, as much as we, they were created in the image and likeness of God and they have immortal souls to save. Priests are sorely needed for work on the African missions.

South Africa is a non-Catholic country where Catholics form a minority. The religious, therefore, have, in addition to caring for the spiritual needs of the faithful, the added task of bringing back to God those who have strayed from the right path. This means that their work is doubled and, since each priest has to work at full strength, even in Catholic countries, the number of religious must also be proportionately increased or they will not be able to carry out God's command, "Go ye forthteach all nations."

Europe has not sufficient priests for its own needs. Where will these priests and brothers come from? Only South Africa can answer that question.

## BROTHER BARTHOLOMEW:

At the beginning of this year Inanda sustained a serious loss in the transfer of Brother Bartholomew to Durban. Appointed Senior Housemaster in 1944 his conscientious and unending attention to duty, his pleasant manner and his unruffled disposition laid the foundation of the family spirit that is conspicuous in the school. In his capacity as sportsmaster he organised house leagues in all games and kept his teams busy throughout the year.

## THE NEW PLAYING FIELDS

The levelling of the front fields commenced on the day that the Inanda's first Matric, 1948, wrote their first paper. Tournapulls cutting, loading, transporting and spreading 20 tons of soil at a time, soon had the top terrace cut away and dumped on the lower one. Intervening banks were pushed over by bulidozers. The rough levelling was completed when school re-opened at the end of January when powergraders smoothed out the surface. The rush of waters following the summer storms ate away the banks in places, but the construction of concrete drains prevented further erosion. The banks were plañted with kikyu, which should give adequate protection.

## THE TURF WICKET:

Under the guidance of Mr. Max Houliston, the curator of the Wanderers' Club, Kent Park, the centre of the ground was excavated to a depth of 3 feet over an area of 90 feet by 60 feet. This was filled with alternate layers of top soil and kraal manure to within 3 in. from the top. The black clay for the surface of the wicket was given free of charge by the Union Fireclay Works, Boksburg, through the courtesy of Mr. Tait, Jnr., and Mr. Marshall, of Jeppe Boys' High School." This was planted with Maginiss grass early in March and was top-dressed with light layers of clay until it is now up to top level. Before long it will be mowed and we hope to open it before the close of the year.

## TURFING OF THE FIELD:

The whole levelled area was subdivided to provide a cricket ground of about 5 acres in area. This was to be turfed. The remaining portion was divided into three soccer fields for the juniors. In summer these will be used for cricket and special hard pitches have been laid down for them.

The turfing of the cricket ground was an extensive iob. It was decided to plant kikyu grass after the model of Ellis Park so that the field can be used both for cricket and rugby. It will give us two further rugby fields. The planting began in mid-March and

## ATHLETICS

This year we held our Annual Meeting at Kent Park where the condition of the track and the excellence of the field appointments gave every opportunity for good times. This was countered somewhat by a rather boisterous wind that came up during the afternoon. The Long and High Jumps were finalised beforehand as well as the 880 yards Senior and Junior and the Cross Country event.

The House Championship was won by College Captain Ananiadis, followed by Benedict (Barale), Osmond (Smith) and Bishops (da Cruz).

Victor Ludorum was $H$. Grisdale, who won the Freemantle Cup. He gained his points by winning the open 100 yards, 220 yards, creating a new record of 24 seconds, and the 440 yards. The runner-up was Frank McGrath, who won both High Jump, 5 ft .1 in ., and the Long Jump, setting a new record of 20 feet. The Risi Cup for under 16 went to M. Forrester, who won the Mile open, the 120 yards Hurdles and the Cross Country. Dubuisson won the under sixteen 100,220 and 440 yards. The 880 yards went to M. Rogers, who raced above his group to win in the good time of 2 min . 10.8 secs. Rogers won the Bob Effren Under 15 Cup by carrying off the 100, 220, 440 yards and the Long Jump. His performance was the outstanding one of the meeting and he now holds five records: 100 yards, 11.1 secs.; 220 yards, 25 secs.; 440 yards, 58.1 secs.; Under 18880 yards, 2 min . 10.8 secs., and the Long Jump, $17 \mathrm{ft} .10 \mathrm{in}$. Gibson won the 120 hurdles and tied in the High Jump with Babaya at 4 ft . 9 in .

Clive Nichols won the J. P. Richardson Cup Under 14 by winning the 100 yards, 220 yards, 440 yards and the Long Jump. Sieling won the Hurdles and Snyders the High Jump.

Otto Gilbert nearly duplicated this performance under 13, for which he was awarded the Junior Freemantle Cup. Stephan won the 440 yards and Ian Irvine created a new Under 13 record in the High Jump by clearing 4 ft . $2 \frac{1}{2}$ ins. R. Kourie won all events under 12 to be awarded the Kitty Shaw Cup under 12, and J. White won the Kitty Shaw Cup under 11 by a similar performance. The George Roy Trophy under 10 went to A. Zuncle and the George Roy Trophy under 9 to P. Owen. The E. V. Hulse Cup for the Open Mile was won by M. Forrester. At the conclusion of the meeting the trophies were presented by the Chairman of the Maristonian Club, Mr. Len Pollock.

## PRESIDENTIAL REPORT

At the very outset we were restricted to some extent in developing as much as we wished, since some of our Associations were trying to rehabilitate themselves after the war and in so doing had to contine the major portion of their activities to domestic matters. Reports we have received from time to time, however, clearly reflect that our members have been generally very active.

The vocations which were conceived and fostered in our Schools and Colleges must be a great consolation to the Brothers. As your President I am very mindful of this fact and I know that you all share my pride in those past pupils of various denominations who are carrying out these great services.

At the beginning of this year we were honoured with a visit from the Very Rev. Brother Leonida. This was an historic occasion and tribute to its importance was paid in the form of a Civic Luncheon given by His Worship the Mayor of Cape Town.

As your representative I had the privilege of presenting Bro. Leonida at a special function organised by the Old Boys' Association (W.P.) and held in the City Hali, Cape Town, with an illuminated address artistically executed by one of Cape Town's leading painters. The address itself expressed our loyalty to the Marist Brothers and appreciation for all they had done for us and are continuing to do for the welfare of this country. I would add that the badges of all the schools and colleges in South Africa appeared on the address in their natural colours. Brother Leonida was particularly impressed with our Old Boys' tie and took one as a sample with the object, if possible, of making this the universal tie for all Old Boys' Associations.

During the football season just ended we were also honoured with a visit from Old Boys who were members of the All Blacks Rugby Touring Team. On behalf of the Federation, I was happy to extend to them a hearty welcome to our country and in September last, wished them "Kia Ora" on their return to their native land.

Your Federation met regularly and at no time was it necessary to postpone a meeting owing to the lack of a quorum. This I consider is a tribute to the enthusiasm with which your interests were served. It would not be fitting to let this occasion pass without expressing my appreciation for the tasks performed by those who represented you at these meetings. I refer to Rev. Fr. Galvin, Rev. Bro. Connall, Messrs. Lawson, Taylor, Carden, O'Farrell, Boule, de Nobrega, Dobson and Maccelari. I also wish to record my thanks to Mr. Davies, who was Registrar for three quarters of my term of office. He was an asset to the Federation and a great help to me. He was sorely missed when he left to take up residence in Rhodesia, but we were fortunate to find such an able substitute in Mr. Dobson. To him I also extend my thanks.

Finally, I wish to express my gratitude to the Chairmen, Executive Memiers and all other members of the various Associations for their co-operation and support during the past two years
