For the adjudicator it is never difficult to decide who gets a medal... they are all definite winners! The only difficulty is to differentiate between the winners of the gold, the silver and the bronze.
If you have not attended an English Declamation or an Afrikaans "Deklamasie", then make sure that you be there next year. This is without doubt one of the highlights on the school calendar and a couple of enjoyable and entertaining hours you will not quickly forget.
