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


A Poet's Invocation



A Distinguished Maristonian



AIR-MARSHAL SIR HUGH W. SAUNDERS, C.B., C.B.E., M.C., D.F.C., M.M. Air Marshal Sir Hugh W. Saunders

Our College is very justly proud of the great number of Old Boys who joined the Forces and distinguished themselves in the Land, Sea and Air Campaigns of World War No. 2.

The news that another name has been added to the long list of heroes gives us renewed justification for our pride in our Past Pupils. The hero this time is Air-Marshal Sir Hugh W. Saunders. Sir Hugh was at College some 35 years ago and his teachers still have pleasant memories of him.

Early in World War No. 1, the Air-Marshal-to-be distinguished himself while serving in both the West and East African campaigns. Later in the struggle he won his commission in the Royal Flying Corps, and before November, 1918, his decorations included the Military Medal, the Military Cross, and the Distinguished Flying Cross and Bar, and his prowess and success in combat had earned for him the title of "Ace". Such distinction led to greater success and shortly before World War No. 2, Sir Hugh was nominated Chief of Air Staff in New Zealand. He gained further laurels by leading the renowned No. 11 Fighter Group, and and all this has been crowned by his appointment as Air Marshal commanding the Royal Air Force in Burma. Brothers and Boys join in congratulating the Air Marshal. May he be spared many a year to enjoy the fruit of his labour and success, and may the blessing of God be with him at all times!

We offer our congratulations to the Air Marshal's brother, Guy, who is at present at Felixton, Zululand, and we tender our thanks to the Marshal's sister who forwarded us two fine photos of her brother, one of them showing the Marshal in the full dress uniform of the Royal Air Force on the occasion of his being received and decorated by His Majesty the King, which we reproduce opposite.



Religious Notes

Catholic Activities.

At the beginning of the scholastic year, the Rev. Fr. Payne, C.P.S., gave a retreat at the College which was attended by all Catholic boys above Standard IV. The Father in his inimitable American style made a deep impression on his hearers and much good was derived from these holy exercises.

In all the catechism classes the pupils imposed on themselves little sacrifices in order to assist the work of the Holy Childhood which attends to the needs of the destitute and abandoned children. The amount thus collected was £92. His Lordship Bishop D. O'Leary called at the College to thank all the scholars for their generosity and granted them a half-holiday. The Rev. Fr. P. Erasmé, the director of the Holy Childhood Organisation also conveyed his thanks to the boys and gave them a bioscope performance on Lapland where valiant missionaries devote themselves to the Christianising of the inhabitants of these Polar regions.

The Rev. Fr. A. Delport, parish priest of Yeoville, and Rev. Fr. Mason, the College chaplain, have been attending very zealously to the spiritual needs of the Catholic boarders. The latter also teaches Catechism to the Senior and Junior Matrics.

The greatest possible importance was given to "Vocation Week" during which Rev. Fr. W. P. Whelan addressed the boys on the necessity for South Africa to recruit its own priests and Brothers. The teachers also dealt with this subject which is constantly kept before them.

Towards the end of October, the Mysterium Fidei or Dramatisation of the Holy Mass in a liturgical devotional and historical setting, was presented in the Empire Theatre. This presentation greatly contributed towards instilling into the minds and the hearts of Catholic youths a greater love and reverence for the Holy Sacrifice of the New Law.

The Rev. Fr. G. T. O'Callaghan, diocesan examiner, reported very favourably on the oral and written standard of the Catholic doctrine in the different classes of the College. Every effort is being made to impart to the Senior Catholics a clear and adequate knowledge of the religious, moral, economic and social problems of modern life. The interest they evince is very gratifying to the teachers. Non-Catholics receive also a biblical and ethical training in order to enable them to fulfil in a better manner their duties towards the Almighty, their fellow men and themselves. These lessons are much appreciated by one and all.

The Rt. Rev. Bishop O'Leary's Visit.

The Right Rev. Bishop D. O'Leary, O.M.I., D.D., speaks to the Catholic Boys of the College:—

The primary aim for your attendance at a Catholic School is to help you to develop a deep and abiding friendship with Christ. No matter what you hear in common talk, the fact is that friendship with Christ makes for manhood.


The secret of such friendship is found in your religion. The school will try to show you the proper place of religion in your life. If you win in the most important struggle here, you will know that virtue is mightier than vice, that industry and honour pay better then sloth and deceit, that self-control brings higher joy than self-indulgence.

Your religion is not man made. It does not change with the fashions. It has ages of history behind it. It contains wondrous joys and insights for you, if you will but take the time to pray and search for them. It gives you definite, ennobling answers to the big questions of life.

In order that they may be loyal to their principles, all Catholic schools conduct religion classes. These classes do not merely make for intellectual effort on your part, because the Catholic Faith is not simply a system of human knowledge for you to learn. There is a spirit to be acquired, an attitude of mind to be developed, spiritual aids to be given to those who show co-operation. In your religion classes you must try to develop this spirit.

Catholic schools aim to aid you to comprehend the meaning, the depth, the beauty, the truth of your age-old Faith, and also to obtain an inkling of the "Charity of Christ which surpasses all understanding".

The class in religion, however, can only be a help. The main work must be done by you. THE MARISTONIAN



aided, of course, by God's grace. Final results will depend on the efforts you put forward to co-operate with God. Let the class in religion be your guide while you think over what Christ meant when He said: "Abide with Me."

Vocations Week: An Appeal.

For a Marist Brother one of the most consoling utterances by our saintly Founder is the one made before his death. It is treasured, too, as is everything that is said by one about to breathe one's last:—

"Ah!" Father Champagnat exclaimed, during his last hour on earth as he gazed with fatherly affection on the Brothers who surrounded his death-bed. "How consoling it is when about to appear before God, to remember that one has lived under the protection of Mary, and in her Society."

This is the key-note of a Marist Brother's life. It sums up in a few words why he gave up kith and kin, a probable successful life in the world, and why you see him devoting himself daily to the training and education of all his boys. He has dedicated his life to God entirely to Mary, God's own Immaculate Mother.

More Brothers are needed. It is to you we appeal to consider this question. It may be to you Our Lord offers a vocation in the Society of Mary. It may be for you a startling question. The answer may have been shelved by you so far. There is a way of passing off such an important decision. Not infrequently that attitude is an effort to cloak over from one's self an inkling that Christ's invitation would be heard if one did not stop one's ears.

Turn the matter over earnestly. Look at the question squarely. Pray for light. Seek advice, if necessary. And remember that the mere absence of a natural inclination is no sound reason for persuading yourself that you are not called.

Like St. Paul on the road to Damascus, you must make use of the final test, the Will of God. "Lord," he prayed "what wilt THOU have me to do?" Once that question is solved, my likes and dislikes should not really matter.

God grant that more Brothers from among our own boys will be forthcoming. God grant that those who do answer the call when they lay down their arms may say in all joy: "How happy I am to die under the patronage of Mary and in her Society."

The Holy Childhood.

The Rev. Father Erasmé, Director of this

Association for the Transvaal Vicariate, visited the College to thank the boys for their successful efforts towards the Holy Childhood. They had contributed the considerable sum of $\pounds 92$. In his address he pointed out the aims and purpose of the association, and urged the boys not to tire, for in these troublesome times more than ever the prayers, sacrifices and donations of every Catholic child were urgently needed.

Father Erasmé then went on to entertain the boys to a bioscope show of films that he himself had taken on the occasions of the Catholic Youth Leaders' Conference and of the Catholic Youth Rally. He also very kindly showed an amusing film of "Donald Duck" and an instructional film dealing with the customs and way of living of the Eskimos.

We can assure the Rev. Father that we greatly appreciate all the trouble he took upon himself and we offer our sincerest thanks for his welcome visit. We will continue to work earnestly for the Holy Childhood.

Annual Retreat.

The Rev. Father Payne, a Paulist Father, conducted the Boys' Retreat. All the Catholic boys followed the exercises, and many Non-Catholics availed themselves ot the opportunity to learn more about God, the Eternal Truths and the fulfilment of their duties. The Rev. Father commented on the good behaviour, the attention and earnest dispositions of the boys. There is no doubt that Father Payne's zeal and knowledge of boys were largely instrumental in arousing their enthusiasm and maintaining their interest and attention during the exercises. He presented the truths of our holy Faith with force and treated them in a language which boys easily grasp. On the closing day, it was an encouraging sight to see 300 boys approach the altar rails to receive their Lord and Master in Holy Communion. Father Payne was indefatigable in hearing confessions, giving private advice and preparing the boys for a worthy and fruitful reception of the Sacraments. The boys responded admirably and appeared to realise that a retreat is a great grace that God grants, and must be accepted with earnestness and None better than the Retreat gratitude. Master can tell the immense amount of good and the salutary effects of a good retreat on boys starting their scholastic year. Father Payne is to be heartily thanked for his earnest endeavours, and warmly congratulated for the enthusiasm he aroused in the boys.

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
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


- 1 Swimming practice to be held every afternoon for the Gala at Patterson Park on the 14th.



In the second half Mrs. Betty O'Connor, Chairman of the Committee, delighted us with her singing. She sang "Mighty Ocean" and though we youths cannot appreciate all the technique and difficulties of the piece, we do know that the singing was good. All too soon


My dear Editor,

Winner of Inter-Platoon Competition. Officer — E. Samworth.









It was a very select and well organised affair, thanks to the Matric students, expecially to G. Rallis who left no stone unturned to make the fourth College dance the highlight of the school year.





THE FIRST MARIST MAGAZINE

Perhaps this title is not quite correct, because the first News Sheet produced at the Marist School for the intellectual consumption of the scholars was more in the nature of a newspaper. Actually, the contents were of a more general nature than the Marist News which first saw the light of day in February last.


I notice that the February Marist News is identified as Vol. 1, No. 1, but strictly, this is not factual, as the newspaper referred to above was first published some thirty-nine years ago; and I was its youthful editor. Let me whisper a secret in your ear: I also did a few sketches, and I was also the "star" reporter; the printer's imp, the chief-cook-and-bottle washer, and in fact, the whole staff. Do you wonder that the venture only managed to survive three to four issues?

Being without financial backing, there were no funds wherewith to have the "paper" printed; and those of my fellow-students who became associated with the venture assisted me in producing the necessary copies by a process which is unknown to-day and has been superseded by the roneo and other duplicators. We had to use what was known as a "gelatine pad".

I remember well that we purchased the paper for the News Sheet from Messrs. J. C. Juta & Co., Ltd., sending one of our number periodically with the necessary cash to make the purchase. On one occasion we sent a certain —, let us call him "John Doe". John crossed the Noord Street Bridge, which you doubtlessly know is formed of wooden slats. We later discovered that he tripped and dropped the money between the slats, and despite every effort, failed to find it.

Being a lad of resource, however (but no conscience), he purchased the paper from Juta's on credit. No one of my associates in that world of journalism in embryo would accept responsibility for the cost of the paper; and I believe that this was the contributing factor in causing us to stop publication. I do believe that Messrs. J. C. Juta & Co., Ltd., eventually wrote off the amount as a bad debt; yet to-day they sell copies of my book "A.B.C. of Un-natural History".

vs. C.B.C., Boksburg


Score: Marist 32; C.B.C. 6.


In January about 70 boys left Koch Street to continue their studies at Observatory.



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

OUR JUBILARIANS



Obituary





The Floating Trophies were presented by Mr. J. Richardson, Chairman of the Old Boys' Association.



The Maristonian Club

Since its inception in 1902 the Marist Old Boys' Association of Johannesburg has had to carry on without adequate playing fields of its own for its playing members and always without any Club House as a meeting place for all Old Marists.

In 1927, ground at Observatory was leased from the Marist Brothers, but proved entirely unsuited to the requirements of the Association, and in latter years was not used by the Association, although the lease was still operative.

On the purchase by the Marist Brothers of extensive grounds at Kensington the Association was promised the lease of a certain area of these grounds in exchange for the lease at Observatory. Fate, however, in the person of the Johannesburg City Council intervened and these grounds were eventually purchased by the Council.

In November, 1944, however, the Association was fortunate enough to purchase 34 acres of ground on the farm Zandfontein, eleven miles from the City Hall on the main Pretoria Road, with approaches via Louis Botha Avenue, Sandown and Morningside, in fact about twenty minutes' run by car along tarred roads from the City Hall.

This purchase immediately promises a wonderful future for the Association, and will enable all past, present and future Marist Brothers boys and all those interested in the Marist Colleges to enjoy the benefits and amenities of a sporting and social club that will become one of the premier institutions of its kind in South Africa.


Club House


The grounds are ideally situated and enjoy a magnificent Northern aspect towards the distant Magaliesburg. The clubhouse will be built facing north and it is intended that when completed this clubhouse will become the Mecca of every Marist Old Boy in South Africa where even those not particularly interested in organised sport may gather and enjoy the society of their friends. Suggestions for the proposed Club House are as follows:—

- Underground.—Change Rooms, showers, conveniences, lockers and store room for sports equipment, store room for provisions and small refrigeration room.
- Ground Floor.—Main entrance to Club House, east side. Outlets north, west, south to fields. Ladies' rooms, etc., complete with lockers. General cloakroom, telephone booths, Secretary's office, Committee Meeting Room, casualty ward, kitchen, pantry and scullery. Gymnasium hall.
- First Floor.—General Hall, suitable for Club dances and concerts which will form a feature of the Club's social activities. Portion of this hall to have sliding or collapsible doors so that portion may be used as a dining room. Bar and bar lounge, billiard room with two tables, reading room, General Members' lounge, and card room.
- Verandah.—To be on the first floor, wide and running round the three front sides of the Club House, giving a full view of all grounds, with collapsible glass windows for weather protection.
- General.—Internal staircase from underground to first floor. Flat roof with flood lights to swimming pool for evening bathing and galas. Kitchen and bar to have hand-operated service lifts.
- Catering.—Members' requirements in the way of meals, light refreshments and drinks will be attended to by a competent Staff. The knowledge that service may be had at any reasonable hour will decidedly add to the social attractions of the Club.

Sports.

A Cricket Oval, Association Football, Rugby and Hockey playing fields will be laid down, taking the best advantage of the lay of the grounds and the site of the Club House. The Marist Old Boys have always been prominent in these sports but have been handicapped in the past through lack of their own grounds.






Six tennis courts will be laid down and although the Association has hitherto never catered for its members' requirements in this sport, it will now undoubtedly become one of the most popular Sections of the Club.

Two bowling greens will be provided, another sports innovation in the history of the Association. There are many staunch adherents of this popular and sociable game among Marist Old Boys, and the greens will enable older Members of the Association to take fullest advantage of the Club's amenities.

Squash Racquets. A Squash court will be built and those devotees of a game which is rapidly gaining popularity will find it particularly attractive in the evenings, winter months and during bad weather, when conditions are not favourable for other sport.

Swimming. In front of the Club House a swimming bath of adequate dimensions and complete with filtration plant will be built. A children's pool will also be provided. Swimming has always been a recreation particularly dear to inhabitants of sunny South Africa, and even



for those more devoted to other sports, a cool dip after the day's exertions is always welcome and refreshing. The pool will be specially welcome to lady members and juniors who will be entitled to make the fullest use of it during the week.

Athletic and Gymkhana Meetings. It is a practicable possibility to provide a course for athletic and gymkhana meetings, running along the western boundary of the property, and the inclusion of facilities for these most popular outdoor pastimes will certainly not detract from the attractiveness of the lay out.

Parking. Ample space will be available for car parking. Members will be able to park their cars close to the Club House, and access to, and exit from, the grounds, will be made as facile as possible.

A draft constitution of the proposed Old Maristonian Club is in course of preparation and will be considered in due course by a Special General Meeting of the Association.

In the meantime Foundation Life Membership of the proposed Old Maristonian Club is offered under terms and conditions set out as follows:-

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1. Foundation Life Membership (to the maximum No. of 200) shall be available for a limited period on payment of the Life Subscriptions set out below:—

To existing Life and Emeritus Members of the Marist Old Boys' Association £40.

To existing Ordinary Members of the Marist Old Boys' Association £45.

To other eligible persons to a limited number fixed by the Committee $\pounds 50$.

In addition to the above 200 Foundation Life Members, any Marist Old Boy within six months of his discharge from active service shall be entitled to apply for Foundation Life Membership on the terms set out above.

- 2. To Members of the Marist Old Boys' Association, Foundation Life Membership shall carry the following special rights and privileges:—
 - (a) Full active Membership rights of the Club, without payment of Entrance Fee or Annual Subscription.
 - (b) The right to transfer the Foundation Life Membership to a son or other nominated boy on his leaving a Marist Brothers College and becoming eligible for membership, with a further right then to apply for a New Foundation Life Membership or to become an Ordinary Member.
 - (c) The right to apply for joint Foundation Life Membership for his wife on the payment of an additional £5.
- 3. Foundation Life Members who are not members of a Marist Old Boys' Association shall be entitled to all the above rights and privileges, subject to such restrictions as may from time to time be imposed in regard to voting, representation on the Governing Committee and qualification for Club Teams.
- 4. On payment of the prescribed life subscription to the Club, an existing Ordinary Member of the Marist Old Boys' Association shall automatically become a Life Member of that Association.


Marist Hockey should go from strength to strength and for next season the prospects seem very bright indeed.

Lieut. A. W. Jurgensen, R.C.N.V.R. (known affectionately to his old school-mates as "Yank") joined as an ordinary seaman in the Canadian Navy in October, 1942.

Commissioned in May, 1943 he was seconded to the Royal Navy, trained in



Scotland as a submarine officer and subsequently transferred for service in the Indian Ocean. He served for more than 12 months in H.M. Submarine Otis and afterwards took a submarine back from India to England; he then travelled by air from London to Australia and served for a time in the Pacific before returning via the Panama Canal recently to Vancouver and thence to his base for demobilisation early this month. Before returning to Johannesburg he is on a business tour of Canada and the U.S.A., with his father. Yank was one of our best boxers and excelled in every form of sport — an old Maristonian of whom we are all justly proud.

A/B Leslie Jones (18), Old Marist boy, of Johannesburg, serving with the Royal Navy on a motor launch based at Singapore, was present at the Japanese capitulation in the Far East.

He was among a party fetching mail from the flagship Nelson, when eight Japanese envoys arrived in a fishing-boat with a white flag at the mast. They were wearing their traditional swords and had come to negotiate surrender terms.

A/B Jones and his party were given a grandstand view of their arrival and departure.

Mr. Louis Spitz, a past pupil and an ex-Chairman of the Marist Old Boys' Association, becomes our new municipal councillor after winning by a large majority the seat he contested at the recent elections. We heartily congratulate him on his victory. Mr. Spitz has always had the interests of his Alma Mater at heart, and we feel that he will not forget us now that he is in such an exalted position. We are just schoolboys, but ours would be a happier lot if the bus service to and from College were more adequate.
