

Headmaster's Address

At the 1991 Prizegiving

It gives me great pleasure to present my third Annual Report. Last year I indicated that in order to keep tonight's proceeding to manageable proportions in terms of time, the Preparatory School and the High School might have to resort to separate functions. Indeed, as the expansion in terms of numbers has continued it has been necessary to do just that and so tonight we have a separate Prizegiving. It is always sad when tradition has to be interfered with and though in this case it was really necessary, I have indicated to the whole College parent body that anyone is free to attend both functions should they so wish, though I acknowledge that it would be an extremely stoical parent who would want to sit through two such occasions!

Last year I touched upon the somewhat worrying scenario of the paucity of well-qualified young male teachers entering the profession and urged the parent body to consider its attitude towards teaching when counselling their children. I do so again: A teacher affects eternity, he will never know where his or her influence ends. I know that this influence can be for good: it can also be destructive, and negative teachers cause immense harm. My Staff continues to believe in the nobility if its calling, despite the crumbling of idealism in our materialistic society. This year has been a momentous one in the history of South African education. The changes brought about by the government's volte-face has seen the opening of public schools to all races, and the handing over to other education departments of schools which had been standing empty as there were no white pupils to fill them. The mere notion that a school could remain unused whilst literally thousands of non-white pupils had no schools to go to certainly focussed everyone's attention on the futility and stupidity of apartheid legislation, just in case we had all forgotten. Catholic schools as we all know were in the vanguard of defying current legislation of the seventies by opening their doors to all races. Yet I ask the question here "What does God think about all this?" - as opposed to what the Staff, the Parents, or the Board of

Governors think. Is St David's fulfilling Christ's mandate "Go teach all nations"?

Within the horrific spiral of violence which daily surrounds us; the lawlessness within our suburbs; the complete disregard for the sanctity of human life; and nearer to home the rampant theft among our own pupil body on an almost daily basis here at the school, the challenge to all of us is clear. Namely, are we concerned what God thinks about all this. We should be, we certainly should be. I quote from part of the Vision Statement which emanated from the momentous National Catholic Schools Conference held in Durban earlier this year. Amongst other things it says:

A teacher affects eternity, he will never know where his or her influence ends.

"Education is an ongoing process of the development of the whole person in an environment in which all members of the school community are challenged to live out the Gospel values in the context of our rapidly changing situation in South Africa — The Catholic schools should nurture in the members of its community a good self image, pride in their origins, language and culture. Whilst realising their own dignity and uniqueness they should be guided to cultivate an understanding and a deep respect for the dignity of others — The basic principles and values of structures must embrace the ministry of serving humanity. Structures need to reflect Gospel values by ensuring greater democracy through communication and training, and promoting the dignity of the society which it serves. Profound conversions of the heart will be necessary to achieve this mission in the new South Africa."

Wise words indeed and we need to take cognisance of them. Next year the College will seek to create its own Mission

Statement in order to set itself a clear path along which to travel.

A concern for all of us here and one which confronts the Staff continually is the mismatch between education and employability. Now this problem is not new to the Republic for it has been recognised for many years and it is one of our most senior national challenges. It has been the subject of investigation and discussion by bodies in the educational field and in the public and private sectors.

Many of our pupils are influenced towards tertiary qualifications which the employment market does not require, rather than to those for which there is an unrequited, indeed growing, demand. Professor de Lange stated in his 1981 Report that "countries with a high level of productivity and a higher per capita output have excellent educational systems with an emphasis on technical and engineering training". I believe that this is fundamental to the future of our country. Attitudes must change. There are just too many matriculants and graduates who will face difficulty in finding appropriate employment opportunities. In order to develop to the full the country's economic potential the shortage of skilled people at all levels, particularly in the technical field, must be addressed. I am not advocating technical secondary education at all, indeed I believe that the academic curriculum we follow is a sound one, but I am advocating the change in attitude in our society which so often sees tertiary technical education as second best. A 1989 statistic reveals that the proportion of University to Technika students in South Africa is 4:1. In the rest of the world it is almost the exact reverse.

The majority of our pupils want to enter University and we equip them to do so. But we are not an academic elitist establishment which at entry at secondary level accepts only those who are destined for university. We serve the wider community and reflect the diverse nature of that community. All of us, both teacher and parent, have a real responsibility to direct and encourage our children towards those areas best suited to **their** talents. It is an awe-some responsibility, and one which

none of us should shirk. Perhaps it is pertinent to recall that it was Winston Churchill who said "My education was interrupted only by my schooldays!".

Sir Harvey–Jones, former Chairman of ICI, made the following observations at a Preparatory School Conference in Britain:

"Education is not just about cramming in lessons and passing exams — The irony is that once you are launched upon your life, your educational achievements are of no importance whatsoever. All they help you do is get on the bottom rung of the ladder — When I interview young people wanting to join various companies, what I look for is not just the qualifications, but those elusive qualities like stickability, courage, humour, the ability to communicate compassion and sensitivity. Technology has freed us from using human beings as substitutes for machines so we have a greater responsibility: we have to produce human beings who are human beings".

These life skills can be learnt in a close community such as ours and though I acknowledge that living and sharing with others of different background and personality is not always easy, indeed it can be most difficult, it does provide opportunities to explore, grow and develop one's confidence.

Our Golden Jubilee Year is almost at an end. It has been a splendid celebration not only of our foundation and the self-less sacrifice of the Marist Brothers, but also of the wider Marist family itself. I thank especially Mrs Glenda Anderson, the Chairperson of the Jubilee Committee, Mr Tony McLintock who chaired the Fête Committee, Mr Mike O'Shea, the Chairman of the PTA, and all the members of those committees who worked so tirelessly throughout the year. The success of the many various events has been a tribute to each and every one of them.

Under Mr Royce's firm direction our Prep School goes from strength to strength. Kumon is now fully integrated in the Maths Department and we lead the way in South African Education in incorporating this inventive Japanese approach to the subject in our Curriculum. The Music Department under the direction of Mrs Middlewick goes from strength to strength, and the two choirs under the baton—wielding

talents of Mr Spence and Mr Howard, have performed with distinction. I am hoping to appoint a Director of Music in the College next year.

I am pleased to announce that Open Scholarships for 1992 have been awarded to Stephen Laing and Ian Acott, both from our Preparatory School, and to Zunaid Mohammed from Model Primary School in Lenasia. Our Std 6 intake for next year is now closed and my Staff and I look forward with interest to watching the progress of what appears to be a fine group of young men.

Earlier this year the College received its own Citi Golf sponsored by VWSA and Caltex and the School Driver Education Programme is now part of the High School's curriculum. So far all our pupils who have taken the driving test

down the road have passed first time which is a huge tribute to the perseverance of Miss von Guilleaume and Mr Lambe who are the instructors. Both of them have had some hair-raising experiences out on the roads with our pupils, ranging from selecting reverse gear and accelerating when the lights changed to green, to selecting neutral in the same circumstances, revving into the red band and looking startled when no movement was taking place! I commend the fortitude of both these Staff Members who have indicated their willingness to continue the programme next year.

Apart from the SDEP vehicle previously mentioned the school has recently increased its fleet of mini-buses to four. The cost of hiring outside transport is extremely expensive and it will be more cost effective next year to have four of our own buses. We have been able to secure a small sponsorship for these new vehicles which made the proposition even more favourable.

The Eight Day Cycle with its longer periods has been a huge success and, on the advice of the Staff, we shall be using it next year. However, we have been concerned with the length of the school day and next year we will follow a modified programme. Full details will be circularised to all parents but basically, after classes there will be a General Period until 14:20. This period is for both Staff and Pupils to use at their discretion. Extra tuition; Counselling; Societies' Meetings; Use of the Library, etc. may take place at this time. In any case, all pupils will be required to remain at school until the General Period ends and only then may go home, if they are not required for any further activity. I have approached the PTA to see if the Tuckshop could be opened during the General Period. From 14:30 to 16:00 there will be a Games Period after which pupils are free to go home. Thus the day is shortened by one and a half hours.

Recently I was privileged to host Father Greg O'Kelly, Headmaster of a Jesuit school, St Ignatius College, in Australia. Currently he is the Chairman of the Australian Conference of Headmasters and Headmistresses, and he was one of the guest speakers at our own Conference in August this year. Amongst other things he said "Creative thinking is the sex of our mental lives"; "A school cannot rise above its Staff Common Room"; "You achieve an education, you don't just secure it"; "Apartheid has to die in each one of us". The best Roman Catholic priests have such wisdom and Father O'Kelly was a remarkable man. He confided in me that his school found it difficult to come to terms with the Marist School down the road because time and again St Ignatius would lose the rugby cup final to them!

On a more serious note he had recently given a talk in which he listed some of the expectations of the parents from his school. I share some of these with you – adapted slightly.

"From the point of view of the parents, the list of expectations is fairly straightforward. We are to ensure that their child has the best teacher in **each** of his subjects, and we are to know their child individually. We are to educate their child properly in drugs, smoking, diet, exercise, first aid, careers and work experience; provide for their social devel-

opement and run dancing lessons; ensure that nobody steals in the school, and personally see to the detection and return of any stolen property; we must maintain their children's manners, haircuts, clean shoes, proper speech, train them in public speaking and the conducting of meetings. We are to educate them in taking initiatives; learning leadership; expose them to a variety of sports and musical instruments; personally supervise their filling in the Diary; make sure they do their homework; teach them hobbies and make sure thay have a particularly good grounding in English, Maths and Science, and we must, of course, provide for their community service programmes and their sex education. We are expected to insist on and maintain firm and strong discipline in the school, except where their child is involved in a subsequent penalty, and we must avoid being too narrow, too harsh or unchristian. We are individually responsible for the care and supervision of litter-free grounds. We must ensure that their children have only good friends; that they remain motivated; that they get served in their right turn in the Tuckshop queue; that we help them find out what they want to be; that they are not subjected to name calling; that they are taught good study techniques, and that they are presented with the faith in a way that they will remain good Catholic /Christians /Hindus /Moslems/Jews, etc. all their lives and produce the ideal family, go to Church; regularly; avoid premarital sex and drugs, whilst loving their neighbour and being alert both to Human Rights and the need to think positively about VAT!"

Now clearly I have tried to keep the above simple and so obviously this does not describe this school. Whilst it has been presented in some humour, most of it is what we try to be all about as teachers and co-educators of your sons. It does not represent the unrealistic picture that at first it may appear!

I would like to thank my Staff for the magnificent work they do. All of them are prepared to go the extra mile for your sons. To Father Brewer for always being there; to my Executive and Management team; to the Housemasters and their House Staff; and to the Staff as a whole for their magnificent input to the school. It is to you that we owe the successes that have been achieved. We

are now academically fully computerised thanks to the expertise of Mr Geldenhuys. The new Guidance Department has proved to be an invaluable source of information to so many of our pupils thanks to the unflagging efforts of Miss Henning. To the Secretaries and Bursarial Staff goes my admiration for their professionalism and unflappability. To the Estate Manager and his Staff for allowing us to work and play in such beautiful surroundings.

We are fortunate in that we lose only two Staff. Leon Benadé leaves on promotion to Headmaster of St Patrick's CBC Kimberley. Leon has given three years of loyal, committed, principled service to this College. He is talented, tough and direct. He frightens some people, has discomforted others and set very high standards for the boys. He has done a superb job as Deputy Headmaster, as RE Co-Ordinator, on my Executive and on the Academic Planning Committee, where his incisive, thrusting comments have forced direction; on the Honours Committee; as Master i/c Waterpolo; as U/15 Rugby Coach; and as demanding schoolmaster. All of us wish you and your family everything of the best as you take up this demanding challenge.

We lose too Mrs Horn, who relocates with her husband to Cape Town. In her short while here she has impressed everyone with her quiet yet forthright approach to her teaching. We offer both her and her husband our congratulations on the impending birth of their first child this year.

As we congratulate Gary Norton on his appointment as Deputy Headmaster, and Richard Girdwood as Senior Housemaster, we shall welcome Mrs Heynike, currently at Rand Park High School, and Mrs McLoughlin from Kearsney College in Natal, to teach both Science and Biology. In the important rôle of RE Co-Ordinator we welcome Mr Stephen Sadie. Educated at Sacred Heart Marist College, Observatory, for which we will forgive him, he has a BA from Wits and a BA (Hons) in Religious Studies from Cape Town. He has worked for the Justice and Peace Commission in the Johannesburg Diocese and is currently serving on the National Review Team. He comes to us from the teaching staff at Lumko Institute.

The baby boom continues at the College. The Royce and van der Merwe families celebrated the arrival during the year of sons Liam and Matthew respectively, while the Howarth family welcomed their second daughter, Michelle. In three short years six babies have been born to Members of Staff, a delightful statistic.

The search for academic excellence continues. We were pleased with our 100% pass rate in last year's Matric, but disappointed that the potential of some candidates went unfulfilled. The mixed ability class structure this year has been a success and there are growing signs that the pupil body here is keen not to waste its many talents.

Ours is a small school and justifiably may hold its head high in terms of the successes it achieves. It has been a most successful year in so many ways and I wish to thank the pupil body for its commitment and loyalty to the school. I thank Charles Kyriakakis and his fellow Prefects, and the Matric Body as a whole. It has been a good year. As the Matrics leave us may I share with you a favourite saying of Kurt Haan, a past Headmaster of Gordonstoun in Scotland – "Be hard on yourself but gentle and compassionate on others".

I thank Mr Brian Steele and the Board of Governors for their wise counsel and guidance on so many issues. The self-less service of this body of men is a real strength of this College.

To my wife as ever, thank you for your companionship, advice, and support.

There have been many wonderful memories over this past year but for me, and I suspect for many others, one abiding memory will remain. When Kieran Roane in Std 9 demanded of his doctors that he be allowed to return to the College to continue his studies, despite the debilitating nature of his illness, leukaemia, and they gave in to the persistence of this remarkable young man, nothing more encapsulated the real essence of this school's motto "Confortare Esto Vir" – Take Courage and Be a Man!

The Head of School's address

The Head of School's address to the invited guests, parents, staff and pupils on the occasion of the 1991 prizegiving.

I stand here no longer a shy, vulnerable teenager, but a proud Matric pupil on the brink of manhood. Having just completed Matric, I am (together with the rest of the Matrics) in probably the most enviable position in the school, with the world waiting to greet us and accept us in its mainstream. Reflecting back it seems that only yesterday I was presented the honour of leading the school during its Jubilee Year and to promote and build on the ethos and values of the school: 'Confortare esto vir' (Take courage and be a man). It has been 50 years now that St David's Marist College has been imparting knowledge with understanding, care and love, which is education in itself.

It has always been with pride that I have seen with how much spirit and camaraderie the school has faced up to its challenge; be it on the sports field, in the debating arena or the academic front. Thus, I can with heart-felt conviction state quite categorically that the Marist family ethos is alive and well in St David's today. It is this ethos which envelops our greatest qualities: Persistence, virtue, manners and especially courage. It is this courage which we should always have ready to defend ourselves, but never to offend others. Even though manners maketh man, it also takes good manners in concealing how much we think of ourselves and how little we think of others.

Humility is also an important Marist attribute which we all try to ascribe to. In the words of St Bernard, "It is no great thing to be humble when you are brought low, but to be humble when you are praised is a great and rare attainment."

The Marist environment will contribute greatly to the conciliatory climate much needed in these troubled times.

Academically, we as a school are still growing. We have overcome our shaky transitional period and from here onwards the only way is up. All of us at St David's have come to realise and appreciate the value of education, but at times we have been guilty, at one point

or another, of expecting it on a platter without paying its due price – **solid hard work.** In my growing experience at St David's, I have come to understand Euripide's words, "He who neglects learning in his youth, loses the post and is **dead** for the future."

St David's has often been criticised for compelling its pupils to participate in sports. However, it helps with the building of the pupil's confidence and team spirit and succeeds in fulfilling an all—rounded education which is what the College stands for. St David's offers a variety of sports to suit every individual's tastes. These include rugby, hockey, cricket, athletics, swimming, waterpolo, basketball and tennis. For all sports this turned out to be a fruitful year and the manner in which the boys conducted themselves both on and off the field is commendable.

Rugby, the school's most popular sport enjoyed a particularly successful season. After a shaky start during the preseason Natal tour, the 1st team made a remarkable come—back and enjoyed a victorious season, with only one loss on the Reef. The climax of the season was undoubtedly the St Stithians game which we won in the dying seconds of the match. The team was ably captained by Bradley Rains who went on to achieve a position in both the Transvaal Craven Week and National Quaggas sides.

The 1st XI Hockey side showed a marked improvement which was not without determination and heart. They improved on last year's poor showing at the Aitken Trophy Tournament of a 24th place, to an excellent 12th place in an enlarged field. Junior sides fared equally well.

Summer sports ranged from Cricket in which Ivo Rugani made the Nuffield side to Swimming and Waterpolo which had a fairly good season considering the squad sizes. Byron Hardy was both selected for Transvaal Waterpolo 'B' team in Basketball, Matthews Visinsky, once again, represented the U/21 Springbok side and the SA Schools side, with his brother David joining him in the Transvaal and SA Schools side.

A wide spectrum of cultural activities were offered by the College this year including Debating, Oratory and Drama. The school was particularly active in Drama which has made a strong re—appearance at St David's with the help of Mr Girdwood and Father Brewer.

At this point I would like to thank my Deputy Head Prefect, Ivo Rugani, for his unfailing support. Thanks also to the Prefects, who, after an uncertain beginning, amalgamated into a cohesive and effective unit. I would like to echo my thanks to all the mothers for their self-less service, interest and devotion to the College. The Marist mothers were not mothers to be leaned upon but mothers who made leaning unnecessary.

To all the teachers: the human mind is worthless when it has closed doors and you have succeeded in opening ours.

Father Brewer: your service and contribution to the College has been immeasurable. H M Tomlinson said quite fittingly, "The most important thing you've taught us is not to see things as we are, but as they are."

Mr Davies: you have helped to raise the school to new heights in your endless quest to make St David's a force to be reckoned with. Yours has been a mammoth task and the successes are evident.

A final word about the Matrics. From a group who in earlier years were branded the misfits of the school, they have produced 14 prefects, yielded 1 National representative, 5 Provincial representatives, 3 Rotary Exchange students and scores of other honours.

A man must have dreams....a memory dreams of the past and eager dreams of the future, we must **never** stop reaching for new goals!

Matric '91 you have made this statement ring true!

As a farewell gift from the Matrics of 1991 it gives me great pleasure to present to the College, two academic trophies and much needed fans for the Chapel.

JCSTA Report 1991

This was an important year for the Johannesburg Catholic Schools' and Teachers' Association and for teachers in Catholic schools in South Africa generally.

In February, after much preparation which included the Consultation Process initiated by the Catholic Institute of Education and hosted in the North Region by St David's, the JCSTA held its Conference. This event, held at the Catholic Renewal Centre in Kensington on the 15th and 16th February, drew some 500 teachers from all Catholic schools in Johannesburg. The purpose was to investigate ways in which the education crisis impacts on Catholic schools and to shape the agenda of the National Catholic Schools' Congress.

This Congress, hosted by the Durban CSTA, was held at the Durban Technikon between June 30th and July 3rd. Drawing on delegates from Catholic schools nation—wide, the Congress unanimously accepted proposals which will begin to have significant impact on Catholic schools as early as 1992. Indeed, the inclusion of the Religious

Education Co–Ordinator on the Executive Committee of this College in 1992, is just one example of how these proposals have impacted on the schools. Other proposals will have far–reaching implications for other practices, such as admissions policies, public examinations and approaches to the curriculum.

Ultimately, the work of the JCSTA and the CIE will have greater implications for teachers and pupils in Catholic schools.

St David's Marist Co–Workers

Our group numbered about 25 this year and we had an active and effective programme which we planned early in the year. Meetings were held regularly on Mondays during 2nd break and no other activities were permitted in the high school during that time. Our group divided into "cells" each of which focused on a different aspect of service. The group was responsible also for starting a fund-raising venture in the form of a "100 Club". Some money for the needy was obtained also from the sale of hot chocolate at break during winter. Later in the year we were involved too in the sponsored fast, the proceeds of which went to charity. It has been an interesting and successful year from the Marist Co-Worker's point of view and we are satisfied that we have been able to make

some little contribution to improving the lot of those who are less fortunate than we are.





The Annual Art Exhibition

This year the judges were Mr S Sher and Mr G Hickling. Mr Sher opened the exhibition with a short talk entitled "Why Art Education?" His talk is reproduced below:

Living in a technological age, we are only too aware that education today needs to equip us for life in such a world. Yet our lives each day are full of aesthetic choices: Whether its the clothes we put on, our homes, the quality of the city environment and for that matter the technological things we surround ourselves with. Aesthetics informs our responses and decision making, because motor cars, shavers, sewing machines and hi–fis are visually designed. We have a need as humans to be visually stimulated and thoughtful.

No wonder that some of the most universally valued human achievements are in the realm of the arts, whether visual, musical, literary or dramatic. We are aesthetic creatures.

What about educating this artistic sensibility? How do we approach it in the school? Some would say that children are inherently creative and so one just leaves them to it. Others tend to say that only some have it. Most don't. So again we don't need to expend much effort. Those who have it will generally produce the goods and the others won't.

In the important subjects like Maths and English we don't allow ourselves that sort of sloppy thinking. We expect a certain ability and performance from most children. And teachers work hard at getting it.

When it comes to art however, we seem to shortchange our children. Perhaps because we've been shortchanged ourselves and we all too readily accept that we can't.

It begins in the home where we surround our children with stereotypes and slush, whether Smurfs, Donald Duck, Turtles or Simpsons. These are foisted upon us by their marketers whose prime concern is their own pockets – certainly not the value of their products.

On top of this we provide our children with enough colouring in books to convince

them that they cannot draw and all they need do is colour in between the lines.

The process is continued in the school where children are taught that neatness is the chief value and in the name of education, continue to colour in more stereotypes to reinforce "important" concepts. While art being rather messy, is either shunned or recipe orientated activities are offered that produce cute results but require very little in the way of genuine creativity or problem solving.

So children's confidence begins to erode at an early age. Many parents will have noticed that the same child who at age 4 is drawing independently, exploring his/her feelings and environment with line and colour, by the age of 9 feels that they can't draw. Whether intended or not, a message has been received.

A qualitative art programme in contrast, builds up children's confidence to make their own decisions, express themselves, meaningfully and investigate visually through various media. This is a greenhouse for creativity and

lateral thinking which in turn benefits the whole person.

Where such a programme does occur as with all education, you can be sure that behind it all is a highly dedicated, hard working teacher. One who is orchestrating meaningful learning experiences which are inspiring and stretching.

There were quite a few pieces on this exhibition which were selected as having particular merit. The children who produced these and many of the other pieces on view are to a greater or lesser extent aware, that to produce an art work of merit takes a lot of hard work. Generally it requires a tremendous amount of perseverance to successfully resolve the problems of design, form, colour and conception - in each case, through a unique medium. To sustain an initial deep involvement through to a qualitative completion of the work, while retaining a vitality and freshness, is believe me no mean feat.

In awarding merit we have tried to select work which reflects these qualities, whether of primary or high school students.

Extract from Father Brewer's sermon at the Valedictory Mass.

Education is a topic about which so much is written, about which so many generalizations and assumptions are made, about which so often unreal expectations are demanded.

For many people education is what happens in the classroom – end of story. "Behave like adults, get good marks, pass matric" It sounds so simple, so easy, but unfortunately it is very idealistic, very unrealistic; because in education it is not adults we are dealing with but teenagers – teenagers who are going through the most difficult and formative years of their lives, teenagers who are trying to understand themselves and their place in

life, teenagers who are searching for their own identity and questioning the values of their parents. Yet how often is this fact brushed aside with little understanding and Ittle sympathy. Get good marks - it is so easy to applaud a pupil who gets good marks, to bask in the reflected glory of his success, to take some or all of the credit to ourselves, but what about the pupil who does not get good marks? How quickly we distance ourselves from him; the system throws everything at him; he is labelled and judged and sometimes even his own self-respect can be damaged. And yet he should be the object of our special attention, the object of our constant encouragement. Emmerson Wrote and I quote: "The secret of education lies in respecting the pupil."

Education is not just what happens in the classroom. How are Christian values practised in the classroom? How is pride in one's school, loyalty to one's school, involvement in one's school, committment to one's school measured in the classroom? In what way does true character and leadership show itself in the classroom?

True education concerns the whole person, all aspects of his life – the spiritual, the academic, the sporting, the cultural. Each pupil must be encouraged to fulfill his OWN potential to the best of his OWN ability.

To hound a pupil and to demand standards he is not capable of is to destroy him. And to destroy him is to destroy communication and without communication there can be no education.



The policy of attempting to improve the standard of cricket was maintained and a number of new fixtures were introduced. From the outset, the 1991 year promised to be a rather different one. For an extremely youthful side it was to be a time of rebuilding and, therefore, it is no surprise that an analysis of the performance reveals somewhat disappointing results compared to their counterparts of the previous few years.

Largely due to the inexperience of the side, much of the play was irresponsible and consistency was not a hallmark of the various aspects of this difficult game. Too often irresolute batting resulted in the unnecessary loss of wickets – the players have much to learn about concentration which is essential to build a really big innings. Periods of exceptional play were often wasted by uneconomical bowling displays and fielding lapses at critical times ending in unnecessary losses.

Despite returning mediocre results, the team generally worked hard at their game. They were never disgraced and on many occasions good cricket was played resulting in some noteworthy individual performances which are chronicled at the end of this report. Many players improved and by the end of the year demonstrated some understanding of the finer points of the game. The additional individual practice required at First XI level will undoubtedly result in improved performances.

The highlight of the end of the 1990 season was the long serving Ivo Rugani's selection to the Transvaal Nuffield side - he is eligible again this year and hopefully will repeat this outstanding feat. Players who have come to the fore this year include Graham Pin as a reliable opening batsman, Christopher Hodgson as a middle order batsman of potential and medium pace bowler of ability, Karabo Balepile is certainly an all-rounder of potential and it was pleasing to note the improvement of the pace bowling of Ryan Lambert. Stephen Barrow develops in "leaps and bounds" as a wicket-keeper of courage and dedication.

My thanks to all the players who, importantly, demonstrated enthusiasm, a positive attitude in all respects and certainly show signs of developing. Finally, many thanks to Ivo Rugani and his Deputy, Euan Massey, who led the team in the first term, as well as to Christopher Hodgson and David Steele who alternated with the captaincy in the third quarter and proved to be competent leaders.



The results attained by the U/15 squad speak for themselves. There is very little I feel able to say and I will employ the words of the well–known schools rugby coach, **Norman McFarland** who, in his book, My Kind of Rugby, explained this concept in the following way:

"Rugby is about the practising of discipline, not only on a Saturday for eighty minutes, but during the course of a week, extending throughout a long season of perhaps nine months. It is about a way of life.

My kind of rugby is fifteen dedicated players who have a burning desire to win, a fierce pride in themselves and their team winning with style and grace or suffering the pangs of defeat.

It is learning from defeat and paying back with interest a loss of the previous season. It is forever an ongoing challenge that can never be put down, or rejected or cast aside. It has always to be grabbed in both hands, to prove oneself yet again, to be best until the next time.

To meet the challenge of the game and to discover its infinite pleasures, a high level of fitness is demanded and discipline, dedication and caring are its foundations. Allied to this high standard of physical fitness must come skill.

The forwards must be moulded together into a well-drilled disciplined, aggressive unit which will always take the game to the opposition. They must be able to scrum until their heads spin and their chests heave, and then come back for more. They must accept and be convinced of the importance of solid scrumming and its affect on the game. Hard, relentless scrumming is the platform for success for it is the very soul of forward play.

Line-out play demands great skill where players at 2, 4 and 6 act as powerful launching pads to set up attacks for the back line. The quick hands of a jumper at 2 is indeed an art, while the powerful, upright jumping at 4, with a determined two-Handed catch, is as

exciting as anything you can see during a game.

Control the line—outs and you have gone a long way to controlling the game.

To experience success the role of the three loose forwards is vital. The speed, drive and support of the three loose forwards or back row players can ensure a high standard of play. They are the destroyers of the opposition and the innovators for their own team.

Once the ball has been won by the forwards, it should never be surrendered until a try has been scored.

Playing for the team and for each other is important in any side if success is to be gained, which means caring about each other and being honest at doing the hard, unspectacular work which is often demanded. It is vital to believe in oneself, especially when things are going badly, when it would be very easy to give up.

Stubborn and resolute defence is a must if a side is to win the victory laurels. When the opposition launch attack after attack, there must be no flinching, no giving way. Stout, determined resistance must be the only answer.

There must be total commitment from all, a strong belief in their own ability and an unquenchable thirst to win.

Finally there must be pride, for it is the greatest motivating factor – without it you have nothing. Show me a team with pride in itself and I will show you a winning side."

It is always gratifying to say a few words on the occasion of an anniversary, particularly a Golden Jubilee, because in doing so we are recording that the present generation is generous enough to admire what has been brought into being by its forebears.

At the end of the year we will hear more about Mrs Anderson. 





Gentlemen - Greetings

A short note from your first punil

A short note from your first pupil.

Early in January, 1942, (sic) with great excitement, I set out from my home, 18 Saxonwold Drive, and pedalled my bicycle to school. After the Dunkeld bus terminus I took the dirt road to Marists leaving Johannesburg behind me. I arrived at the school which was deserted. I heard voices in the GRADES building which I entered. A few builders were at work in the toilets. I emerged and a woman, sitting in a car with about six children, asked what I was doing. I said I was in standard three. Whilst I was talking to her the younger of the two Winsor brothers rode in on a horse.

He was very upset to find myself and about six or seven others there before him. Later, his brother, Jackie, arrived by bicycle. That year there were about 25 children in grades I and II and Standards I and II; 4 pupils in Standard 3 (Helmut? Winsor); 2 pupils in Standard 4 (Colin?); 1 pupil in Standard 5 (Jackie Winsor).

The playing fields were rubble heaps, classes were 'non est'. The Brother spent his time supervising George Becket's Builders.

One Saturday morning my mother said I must dress up after lunch as the Bishop was coming to lay the Foundation Stone and my father would drive us to the school at 2.00 p.m. Dad, Gold Braid and Marmalaid(sic) arrived at 18 Saxonwold Drive at about 2.30 p.m. in his 1935 Humber Hawk. Mr Lipshits(sic), in uniform, was driving. My mother, my sister and myself sat in the back. Mother told him, Dad, that he was not 'Reviewing the Fleet at Spithead'. The Irish Community were not impressed with His Majesty's Pomp and Splendour. And visa versa(sic).

Advocate (later Judge) Viera introduced me to the Old Bishop, who was to lay the Old Foundation Stone removed from Marists Kock (sic) Street and the New Bishop, who was to lay the New Foundation Stone. I liked the Old but not the New (he was a 24 year old priest - the Bishop Elect - Dennis Hurley).

Advocate Viera said I was to lead the procession and took me to a classroom and told me to don the Red Altar Boy's Cossak (sic) (Dress) and White Surplus (sic) (skirt). I had been an altar boy at Rosebanck (sic) Parish when I was seven years old until the New Priest chased us all off the altar because he wanted boys older than 15 years. I therefore refused to lead the procession. Advocate then brought out the Crucifix and said "Don't you recognise this". I replied "That's mine from Rosebanck (sic) ". I then led the procession and the Kock (sic) Street stone was laid by the Bishop, George Beckett 'slopped'the mortar. Dad and Lips had long gone On His Majesty's Service thinking it best to leave "the uncouth Irish to the boisterous seas, his son".

Now -"Enter the Devil". The new bishop glared at me and I saw horns growing out of his ears, the Crucifix atop the mast, the standard began to vibrate out of control, I said to myself, "Satan - Get behind me" and turned the Crucifix away from him, the bishop, the derrick of the lattice boom crane swung out of control, the foundation stone flew through the air, the driver jumped out of the cabin and he and the builders jumped in a car never to be seen by me again. The foundation stone shattered in a million pieces when it fell out of the sky and struck a rubble heap.

One afternoon my dad told me to pick up the ACORNS under the oak tree at No. 18 and plant twelve on either side of the Main Driveway at Marists which I duly did. The Irish Brother was infuriated when I informed him Dad had said, "Nothing like good British Oak to line the entrance - the place needs something solid about it".
























Prep Academic

Address by the Principal of the Prep School

Prize-giving: 2 December 1991

I am pleased to be able to present my third annual report and what a dynamic year 1991 proved to be. With all that has been achieved, it is going to be difficult for me to follow Lord Butler's dictum to keep my speech like a woman's dress: long enough to cover everything and short enough to be interesting.

This year was dominated by the celebration of our Golden Jubilee commencing with a mass and a cocktail party launch and including amongst others, the wonderful ball at the Wanderer's Club, craft market, fun run and fête. I would like to pay tribute to Glenda Anderson for the outstanding job she and her committee did in organising these events and to Glenda's husband, Trevor, for the many hours of hard work devoted to these functions. My thanks go too, to Tony McLintock and his committee of parents who organised a fête that must rank as one of the best that I have attended, especially in view of the influx of people not associated with the school, generated by the highly effective publicity campaign and the wonderful spirit which pervaded the event. A debt of gratitude is also owed to Mike O'Shea and his PTA for their significant contribution to the jubilee functions and the fête, and their normal fund raising support which allowed the implementation of a number of projects ranging from the acquisition of the loudspeaker system created especially by John Farrel, to the R4 500,00 worth of English readers and the new intercom' currently being installed. The efforts of all the above people culminated in the raising of R73 000,00 over the course of the year, thanks to the generosity of the parents.

Arguably, the most significant/exciting academic event was the introduction of Kumon Maths to the school. The grade 0's tackled the system at the commencement of this term making St David's the first school on the continent to do so. Following an initial training session, Rosemary Walton and Joan Kirchhoffer have become old hands and have achieved remarkable results.

I was delighted to hear Tadao Kashima, Director of Kumon for Africa and the United Kingdom, express so high an opinion of our staff, in comparison to teachers he had encountered in the 250 odd schools in the United States where Kumon has been implemented.

Our thanks go to those mums who have voluntarily assisted the staff in the classroom. From next year, Kumon will be introduced to grades 1 and 2 and I am pleased to announce that Glenda Anderson has been appointed Kumon Co–Ordinator. The efficacy of the Kumon System is to be independently assessed by the HSRC in a research project to be conducted at St David's during the course of next year.

We continue to be pleased with the effect of subject teaching in standard 4 and 5 which together with other strategies has significantly raised the academic standard. In order to evaluate our own standard objectivity, David Spence arranged for the application of HSRC standardised tests in English and Maths. These tests assess the competence of pupils in the subjects and reflect how well they have been taught. We were delighted to discover that 69% of our pupils were better than the national average in English, while in Maths, 78% were above average and better. In this regard, credit must go to Beverley Geldenhuys for the work she has done in introducing calculators and keeping us all informed of new developments in anticipation of the new syllabus due in 1993.

Other highlights include:

Massimo Lurati's placement as fourth in his age group in the Science Olympiad.

The establishment of the Anthony and Timothy choirs and the new dimension this has added, thanks to the efforts of Marilyn Middlewick, John Howard, David Spence and Dr Andre Strydom. How wonderful it has been to hear more and more music around the school. I am frankly astounded at what has been achieved in so short a time since the introduction of instrumental music tuition.

Once again the Treadwell Week was held at St David's and Timothy O'Shea was selected to play in the OK U/12 week to be held at St David's during the December holidays.

Adriano Iorio was chosen to captain the Southern Transvaal B Chess team. I would like to thank Sue Rose for continuing to organise the chess so efficiently together with Rosemary Walton and Joan Kirchhoffer.

The U/11 and open teams made it through to the finals of the Southern Transvaal Primary Schools Football Association Knock—out Competition but were unable to bring home a trophy despite their great determination.

Nicholas Martin and Ingo Manning were again awarded Provincial colours for Swimming. Here I would like to pause to commend Willy Castle and all the staff involved in games for another fine year. The most important aspect of the games programme for me is the opportunity afforded so many pupils to actually participate and gain recognition, particularly at this time when sport is rapidly being relegated to Cinderella status in so many schools.

The opportunity for the boys to achieve on so many levels would not have been provided were it not for the dedication and commitment of all the staff and for this I thank them sincerely.

It is difficult to imagine the school without Father Brewer or Matron. Their consistent and wholly committed support of every activity has become such a feature of school life as has become Matron's unfailingly cheerful perspective, irrespective of the circumstances.

Equally difficult to visualise St David's without Willem van der Merwe whose success in managing these grounds is acknowledged all over the country. I hope too, one day, to achieve the degree of fame that he has!

To Barbara Levick, our secretary, I say thank you for running the prep office so efficiently, often under trying circumstances. A great deal of what is happening in education and in South Africa today has influenced what we are doing in the prep, and so much is going on right now that anyone who claims to know exactly what is happening, is clearly misinformed. What is clear, however, is that we have to face challenges on two fronts, namely:

- 1. What we offer in response to new initiatives in education world-wide and
- 2. How we react to changes in education in post-apartheid South Africa.

The challenges are daunting, although I would imagine that parents would take comfort from the fact this is a Catholic School and a Marist school in particular, and that these schools have almost always been the leaders and innovators in change. Although Father Greg O'Kelly, Chairman of the Association Of Heads Of Independent Schools in Australia, reminds us that it was the Catholic Schools which produced Fidel Castro, the only known Old Boy to confiscate his own school.

On the first count, we have to move away from a content-orientated curriculum, to one which is skill or process-based. In my first address to you, I spoke of the era of the explosion of knowledge-the amount of known facts in the world is currently said to be doubling every four years. When it comes to deciding which of these should be passed on to children, who can decide which of this vast body of facts is sufficiently important to warrant inclusion in the curriculum? Once you do decide, how soon is the fact disputed, disproved or irrelevant? Morover, we are currently educating children for a future which we cannot even describe, many of the jobs and careers in which todays Standard 2's will engage, have not been created. The best possible service which we, as educators, can render our children is to provide them with the correct skills in:

- 1. Speaking and listening processes
- 2. Reading
- 3. Writing processes
- 4. Mathematical understanding
- 5. Scientific insight

We have to show them how to find information and then to use it to their advantage in order to solve problems in the most efficient manner possible.

This approach will in many ways address the challenges posed by our existence in a post—apartheid era, particularly since it is a universally accepted principle — finally now also in this country — that primary school education is a sine qua non.

To this end, I and some members of my staff have become involved in the Curriculum Development Group investigating a primary school curriculum within the ISC and have met with representatives of the ANC in this regard, in order to be exposed to as many opinions as possible.

Within our own curriculum, we are gradually introducing a comprehensive list of skills to be integrated with daily teaching, and these are incorporated in the SSS assignments dealt with by the Standard 4's and 5's. We continue to scrutinize content for relevance hence, for example, the introduction of calculators in Maths. I wish to express my gratitude to David Spence for the invigorating manner in which he, the subject heads, Beverley Geldenhuys, Anne Morkel, Margie O'Kelly and staff have tackled the whole question. Of course, it is never enough to implement change without evaluating its effect and David has introduced the HSRC tests which I mentioned earlier for this very reason. Reading ages are now tested annually throughout the prep and under the guidance of Wendy Schaafsma in the Junior Prep. We are enhancing our ability to identify learning problems.

Change is always disconcerting, but how marvellous it is to have the guidelines of Marcellin Champagnat at hand: 200 years ago, he was offering what our country is asking for now, and our spirituality becomes increasingly important. In this regard, I would like to thank Shirley Bowles and Joan Kirchhoffer for the great work they have done in including all of us in the process of religious education and working to make it more and more of daily life for the boys. The occasional comment makes one wonder if we are achieving this, as in the following offering: "If you have only one husband, its called monotony."

Sadly at the end of this year, we bid goodbye to two staff members: Priscilla Carlisle and Marilyn Orford. Both have been loyal and long serving and we shall remember Priscilla for her organisation of the Dianne Chandler shows – always such a great success, her care of the school gardens and her formidable talent as an athlete! We wish her and her family Godspeed in their new lives in Natal.

Marilyn Orford leaves us to teach girls at St Teresa's where her meticulous approach, dependability and many talents, will truly make our loss the Convent's gain.

Joining us next year in Grade 1 will be Barbara Sternberg, known to many for her involvement in the after school care centre. Barbara trained in Natal and has many years experience teaching tiny tots.

Standard 2 will have two new teachers in Jane Egan and Allison Norton. Both are highly experienced teachers and are already members of the St David's family: Allison is the wife of Gary Norton, the new College Deputy Headmaster, while Jane's Mum is Shirley Bowles. We welcome you all and look forward to a long and happy association, as they bridge the important gap between standards 2 and 3 and the fine work being done by Shirley Bowles and Ann Whitfield.

Next year, Debbie Hurley will move to teach alongside Glenda Anderson and will expose the Standard 1's to her gentle and organised approach. We hope to increase Linda Ralph's exposure so that more classes may enjoy her enthusiasm and expertise. Sue Murray moved to Grade 2 at the beginning of the year where she did a magnificent job as well as co—ordinating the tennis. She has had a particularly difficult time during the last term as her father has been critically ill with cancer.

I am delighted to say that we will continue to operate 3 Grade 1 classes next year to ensure that the smaller numbers per class give each individual the best possible chance. I thank Carol Ansell for the outstanding job she does in monitoring our entrance testing procedure. My thanks too, go to Mary Clover, our librarian, who has done so much to help enrich the lessons by providing films, books and other material on request.

The Prep Head's Trophy for endeavour is traditionally awarded at the leaver's

luncheon to the Standard 5 boy who has consistently given of his best without receiving the recognition of first in class or playing for the first XI. The choice was an extremely difficult one and on Friday 29 November, this trophy was presented to *Geoffrey Metcalf*.

This year we have a new award; the Sifiso Sitole Memorial Trophy, which

the school has instituted to preserve the memory of Sifiso who died during the year. It is awarded to the boy who exemplifies most of the Marist characteristics of simplicity, humility, trust, sensitivity, love of work, service and sincerity. We have asked Sifiso's father, Archie, to present this trophy for the first time.

I would like to conclude by thanking the Headmaster, Paul Davies, for his support and encouragement during the year and my family and wife, Pam, in particular, for their patience, support and understanding.

The doctors had to shave some of his hair off to enable them to stitch and disinfect the cut. It was about twenty centimetres long and had to have thirty stitches. Next, his broken leg had to be set. "That's it!" declared Doctor Peck. "The operation's finished." Suddenly, Lonny's pulse rate dropped dramatically.

Doctor Peck reacted instantly, getting the heart starters out. Lonny's condition worsened and doctors feared they might lose him. They knew there was something else wrong with Lonny, but what? Scans showed that he had internal bleeding and that he had two broken ribs. The doctors realised that Lonny's condition was a lot worse than they had thought.

Outside, in the lobby, Lonny's parents had arrived. Mrs West was terribly upset and Mr West was angry; angry that the doctors had not accurately diagnosed his precious son's condition. I said, "Hello, my name is Jonathan Parker. My father is lying on the ground and he is not moving. I can't get him to open his eyes. I need some help, and quickly!" My mouth was so dry that I wondered if she had heard what I had said. Her voice was calm as she said, "Keep calm and take it easy. Where is your mother?" "She has gone into town to the supermarket," I replied. "Is there anyone else in the house?" she asked. I could hear my voice tremble as I said, "Just my three year old brother." "Okay. Now, I want your address," she said, still sounding calm. "It's twenty seven, Hampton Road, Glendale," I replied. "I'll have an ambulance there in four minutes, alright?" "Thanks!" I said, "But please hurry."

I put down the phone and ran outside. Jerry, my neighbour, was there, leaning over my father. He had heard my shout for help. "What happened?" he asked. I told him the story and asked him to stay with my father while I woke up Timmy and left a note on the door for mom. When I came back outside, I could hear the ambulance coming. It sped around the corner and came to a stop. Two men jumped out. One came to help us and the other got out the stretcher. They loaded my dad into the back and we all went off with them. We then whizzed off to the hospital.

When we arrived at the hospital, dad went into surgery immediately. His heart had collapsed. In the meantime, mom had arrived and I told her the story. 
Our trip to the Braamfontein Spruit

I have only one regret that more of you couldn't have been there to enjoy the festival with us. Well, perhaps next year.







Obituary

In Loving Memory of our friend Stephen Laing, his mother Pendré and his father Alasdair, who were tragically killed in a motor accident on 8 January 1992.

"And friends are friends forever
If the Lord's the lord of them.
And a friend will not say never
For the welcome will not end.
Though it's hard to let you go,
In the Father's hands we know
That a lifetime's not too long
To live as friends."

So sang the Anthony Choir in their concert on the night of 4 March 1992. There was hardly a dry eye in the audience as Stephen's friends said goodbye to him in song; the best way they knew how.

For a year, Stephen had been very special to his choir master John Howard and to Marilyn Middlewick the music teacher. He had a commitment and a self-discipline unusual in one so young and his dedication was a source of inspiration to all those with whom he came into contact.

John Howard once asked Stephen, "What is the most important thing in your life?" and he replied, after a moment's consideration, "I think I would hate to do anything that would bring shame to my family because they are so important to me." Well Stephen, judging by the remarks made by your prep school teachers, you certainly remained true to your creed. Your parents must have been very proud of you.

Caring! Sensitive! Talented! Committed! Loyal! Responsible! Cheerful! Diligent! - these words appear time and time again on Stephen's reports, so it was no surprise to anyone to learn that he had been awarded a scholarship for 1992. His grades, in seven years, had never dropped below a 75% average and he received the Religious Education prize several years running.

His letter of thanks for the scholarship award is on file and part of it reads:-

"Being given the scholarship has lifted, I think, quite a big burden off my parents' backs and this is a very nice way to pay them for being so good to me."

Stephen was part of a wonderful, caring family. His mother Pendré and his father Alasdair were friends of us all here at the Marist College. Alasdair was educated at St David's and he set the pattern of dedication and scholarship which was to be followed by his sons, Robbie and Stephen. With Alasdair, "his church, his Creator, his family and friends were his first consideration." He and Pendré did so much for their community. St Theresa's pupils and staff salute Pendré as



of God's special people", who seloyalty to her faith, her fam-

ily and her school will always be remembered. The staff and pupils of St David's echo these sentiments.

Monsignor Kiloran has this to say about Pendré and Alasdair, "They thought about others and put their thoughts into action. Pendré's very best classroom was her home. Their dedication to the church, both the Parish Church and the little church of their home has been an example of truly living the Sacrament that made them two in one flesh."

Sifiso Sizwe Sitole

"A butterfly lights beside us like a sunbeam.


And for a brief moment its glory and beauty belong to our world.

But then it flies on again, and though we wish it could have stayed, we feel so lucky to have seen it."

Sifiso Sizwe Sitole, aged 12, elder son of Dorah and Archie Sitole, was born at Baragwanath Hospital on 12 July 1979 and spent his early life in Moroka North and later Pimville, Soweto.

A Std 4 pupil at St David's Marist Brothers College, Sifiso met his untimely death after a short illness at the Johannesburg General Hospital.

Sifiso was a very pleasant, obliging and gentle boy who was devoted to his schoolwork and loved computer games and tennis. He will be most sadly missed by all his friends and relatives and very deeply by his



The following is the Eulogy delivered by Mr G Royce, Principal Prep School:

We have come together today not to say goodbye to Sifiso, but to say

"Hello" to him in a different way. We can no longer speak to him or touch him or watch him, but he will live forever with us in our minds and hearts and leaves a special memory because of the type of person that he is.

Sifiso joined the St David's family in 1985, when he started in Grade 0. In the almost seven years that he spent at the Prep, he became known particularly for two character traits.

The first of these was his gentleness. This side of him showed in his relationship with his teachers and friends and was reflected in the cards sent to him by his classmates during his time in hospital.

The second trait was his willingness to try his hand at everything. In his unassuming way, he participated in class and at games and quietly gave his best.

I would like to read a comment from his personal file written by a previous teacher at the end of the academic year:

"What a lovely little boy! Sifiso is very quiet and well behaved. Sometimes I wish he would be a little naughty! He tries very hard and his work is done to the best of his ability. He has a lovely sense of humour and sits and giggles when something happens in the classroom. The only problem I have had with Sifiso is that he tends to lose things ... Otherwise, he quietly gets on with his work and tries very, very hard. I have met his mother on a couple of occasions and she is a super lady, very concerned about Sifiso's progress. I have really enjoyed having Sifiso in my class - you will also enjoy him, I'm sure. Just be prepared for the mess by 08:00, but he copes very well despite this and by 13:30 everything will be tidy again. He is a dear child."

Sifiso himself left us more clues about his personality in his class journal.

"I might get a job as an Insurance Broker or at a Computer Technology Company as an accountant. I don't want a job where you go around the world every month and you see your family on the weekend (only) ... I don't think I'll be driving a very expensive car ... I think cars will be 90% electricity (driven). I think life will be harder to live because of the hole in the ozone layer. My greatest fear is that the violence will become even greater ..."

None of us are at a Catholic or Christian school by coincidence. We are here because we believe that Jesus Christ gave His life for us so that no matter what we do now, He is waiting for us to spend all time with Him. Sifiso is there now; and knowing the person that he is, he has a huge look of amazement on his face. His eyes are twice the size because he would have had no idea of the extent of your love that he generated amongst us. When he gets over your wonderful response, one of the angels will tell him that there are no Maths test to look forward to, no prep, no Afrikaans speeches to prepare and he can wear his hair anyway that he likes. Most important for him, he can be with his family every hour of the day for ever.

What he wants us to do now, is get on with our lives: to carry on playing hand tennis, work hard in class, go to cricket practice and what Our Lord wants us to do, is to remember the wonderful person that He gave us to share for eleven years.
