
Mr Paul Edey (Executive Head)

Mr. Malcolm Williams (Headmaster of the High School)



Brother Brendan



He and his wife, Jean, have three children and four grandchildren. Spare time is occupied by gardening, woodwork and cycling.




Mr Julian Giuricich




Mr Robin Smith

Mr John Biller






Mr Digby Bray

THE EXECUTIVE HEADMASTER'S REPORT

EXECUTIVE HEAD'S **REPORT 2005**

At the start of the year the Executive of the School, the Board and several teachers went on a strategic planning weekend. A number of key issues emerged of which the most critical was the need for greater diversity and transformation. In a speech to the academic staff at the end of 2004, the then Chairman of the Board, Eric Annegarn as-

ked staff whether our current model of being an overwhelmingly white Catholic boys' school would be sustainable in 2014. Clearly the answer to this is that we are committed to continuing as a Catholic boys' school in the Marist tradition but that we cannot remain 85% white. There is a moral imperative to change the demographics of our school population apart from the fact that we are currently educating our pupils for a South Africa that no longer exists.

We have been talking about the establishment of a St David's Foundation for a number of years. In April we appointed a Director, Mrs Chantal Ratcliffe, who has had considerable experience in the foundation offices of RAU (now the University of Johannesburg) and the University of Kwa-Zulu Natal. The school has committed considerable resources to this Foundation and at the time of writing, the trust deed has been drawn up and ten trustees are on the verge of being appointed. Initially the aim of the Foundation was to provide bursaries to capable black pupils so as to increase diversity and to fulfill our mission as a Marist School. The Foundation will do this and more. It will advance St David's on all fronts to ensure the sustainability of this school for our children's children. The development of the Foundation is the most significant thing to have happened at our school on a strategic level for some time. We are confident that the Foundation will be supported by the wider St David's community.

The school has enjoyed another fine year. The waiting lists at the entry levels of Grade 00, Grade 0 and Grade 8 are strong and the school roll is at an all time high. The extremely low staff turnover is also indicative that morale is high. The 2004 matric results were excellent, whilst the current matric class hold more individual awards for academics than any other group before them.

In 2006 we will begin a process of whole school evaluation. Initially this will focus on the key area of Teaching and Learning, and whilst the process will be led by our own staff, it will be guided by outside mentors appointed by the Independent Schools' Association. All sectors of our school community will be involved in this exercise which will show us where we are doing well, and where we can improve. Over the next three years we will cover all the key areas in the school including governance and management, values and society involvement, and Distinctive areas. The last mentioned focus area will look at Marist education and tradition. We will devise our own quality indicators to guide our assessment of these distinctive areas. The purpose of internal evaluation is to improve upon what we do at St David's.

Development of the campus has progressed apace and in August the long awaited Astroturf project began. The surface, situated in the centre of the campus, will be used primarily for hockey but will also be used for soccer and cricket. Hockey, a sport which is growing in popularity, has for too long been played off campus. The astro development will enable the school to cement its place as one of the premier hockey schools in the province.

Music has grown enormously since the development of the music block and the appointment of Mr Dry. Indeed, the centre is probably already too small. The Design & Technology Centre has really enhanced our curriculum and the boys have been involved in some exciting and creative projects. The centre has been used after hours by an enthusiastic Robotics Club.

As always the year has not been without its drama and sadness. In May a long serving member of our ground staff, George Ndlovu, was run over in Rivonia Road and the accident has resulted in him having to retire.

Julius Shibambu, our assistant estates supervisor, has been incapacitated since July as a result of having his leg amputated. We look forward to his return in the new year as things have not been the same without him. In November, Fred Cullum, who has been with us on the maintenance and ground staff for the past eight years, died after a brief but horrific battle with stomach cancer.

The name of St David's stands high, not only locally but across the country. I should like to thank a hardworking and enthusiastic staff for their commitment across so many areas of school life and the boys for their participation and ongoing pursuit of excellence. The quality and extent of involvement in sport and especially culturals is significantly better than it was ten years ago. It is also pleasing to note how many boys and staff are involved in outreach activities. Whilst we know that we can do more, the 'Beyond Our Gates' initiative is beginning to really take root.

We face a number of significant challenges over the next few years. The area around the school is almost unrecognisable from ten years ago, whilst the ongoing development of Sandton as the CBD has brought both challenges and opportunities. Access to St David's is going to pose a real issue and we will need to consider seriously both a boarding establishment and the creation of a significant staff village on campus. The densification of the residential suburbs Illovo and Inanda up to 15 dwellings per hectare in some areas, may well provide us with considerable opportunities.

This school has to be seen as an asset to, and partner of, the local community. The campus seldom rests and the use of our facilities by outsiders has increased considerably over the past five years. We must continue to build relations.

My thanks go to everybody for a most satisfying 2005.

CHAPLAIN'S NOTES

Week by week, one of my profound joys is to celebrate Eucharist with the boys and staff here at St David's, thereby presenting the teaching of the Lord to guide their lives and making Christ present in the Sacrament to strengthen them on their pilgrim way. This joy was heightened for all of us when our bishop, Archbishop Buti Joseph Tlhagale, came to celebrate a combined Mass on 29 September. As chief shepherd of the church of Johannesburg, he is also the Visitor to St David's which means he came by right. He was delighted by the warm welcome paid him by our Executive Headmaster, Mr Edey, and was impressed by the decorum and enthusiastic participation of the boys, both in their responses and singing, and also the spirit of reverence that pervaded Champagnat Hall during the Mass. Our Head Boy expressed the thanks of the school to the Archbishop and also pleased him by some sentiments expressed in their common language, Sotho.

During the Valedictory Mass in October for the Grade 12 boys, I quoted from an important paper delivered by Archbishop Michael Miller, Secretary for the Vatican's Congregation for Catholic Education. Entitled "The Holy See's Teaching on Catholic Schools" it was delivered at the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. in September. As he spelt out, the Holy See values Catholic schools as a great heritage of Catholic history and an indispensable instrument in carrying out the mission of the Church in the third millennium. One of the greatest challenges for Catholic schools, said Archbishop Miller, was to ensure their genuine Catholic identity in a culture of religious indifference or even hostility. He praised the noble line of men and women who have been Catholic educators like St Angela Merici (Ursulines), St John Baptist de la Salle, St John Bosco (Salesians) and our own St Marcellin Champagnat.

Citing the Declaration on Christian Education of Vatican II, Archbishop Miller stressed that the Church is concerned with the whole of human life, even the earthly part that has a bearing on the eternal, and so has a fundamental role to play in the progress and spread of sound education. One of the basic principles recognised by the Vatican is that parents are the first educators of their children and that means they have the inalienable right to educate them in conformity with the family's religious and moral convictions. In practice, as here at St David's, most parents share their educational responsibility and rely on schools like St David's Marist College.

Catholic schools have a straightforward goal: to foster the growth of good Christian human beings who love God and neighbour and thus fulfil their Christian destiny of becoming saints. It is this vision, lived and implemented, and not only spoken about, that prevents us from being merely "a booming gong or clashing cymbal". [I Cor.13:1] The challenge is to create a genuine community of faith inspired by the Gospel. To this end, Catholic educators are to have in themselves and to develop in their students a passion for truth that defeats the moral and cultural relativism of this age criticised by Pope Benedict. Or put in another way by T.S. Eliot in The Rock: "Where is the wisdom we have lost in knowledge? Where is the knowledge we have lost in information?"

Besides Religion Education classes in the weekly curriculum, all the boys from Grade 1 through to 12 have the opportunity of attending a weekly school Mass for their group. The Junior Prep

The overhead projector, used at Mass has been reliably and efficiently manned by Patrick Chapple and Antimo Osato in the Hall, and the Fisher twins, Andrew and Richard, in the chapel.. My sincere thanks to all these who assisted in the smoothrunning of the Liturgy which helps to make it an expression of true and uplifting worship for all.

Mr Mario Martins, assisted by Mrs Bonnie Pooley and myself, prepared the 34 Grade 11 candidates for the Sacrament of Confirmation. A day retreat for the confirmands was conducted by Rev. Bruce Botha, S.J. at the Good Shepherd Centre at Meerhof. Archbishop Tlhagale conferred the sacrament at Rosebank Church on 30 September.

Three high school boys were baptised in a moving ceremony during High School Mass. It was an occasion for all to reflect on their own baptisms as infants and to renew their own baptismal commitment. Three boys from the High School made their First Holy Communion, and three boys in Grade 3 were received prior to making their First Holy Communion with their peers in July.

The prospect of a new chapel for St David's is no longer a pipe dream of mine. Mr Robin Smith, a member of the Board of Governors, is pushing it to the planning stage. At the monthly Family Mass in term time, with Mr Edey's approval, I started a collection for furnishings for the new chapel. Old boys who come to be married in the chapel also make a donation to this fund. At present it stands at R32,000.00 with two bequests promised.

and Senior Prep can be accommodated in the school chapel, whereas the High School have their Mass on Thursdays in Champagnat Hall. My thanks go to Mr Gareth Dry, our Director of Music, who not only trains the various choirs that lead the singing but also encourages the college band to play sometimes for Mass. Parents and visitors frequently comment on the excellent singing of our boys at Mass. Ms Cleone Blake remains the reliable accompanist for all three weekly Masses until the end of 2005.

Sean Jamieson has succeeded his brother as sacristan responsible for preparing the hall for the celebration of Mass. He is assisted by James Lowe, Brendan Stott, Antimo Osato and Thomas Berti. Gerard Kairuz heads the team who replace the requisites for Mass afterwards in the sacristy. This year St David's had thirty- three candidates for confirmation. The process was a fulfilling experience for the candidates as they had already explored the value of the Sacrament of Confirmation in their Religious Education lessons. We had also examined the various challenges related to what it means to be a committed Catholic, and finally how candidates are to live out their commitment. When a young person is confirmed he becomes " a soldier of Christ" filled with the Spirit to accomplish many tasks in spreading the Gospel within his various contexts. A retreat was held at the Hartebeespoort Retreat Center, conducted by a Jesuit Ordinand (someone in the process of being ordained a priest). There were many challenges put before the boys on that day, regarding their commitment to following Jesus. The staff who attended were Fr. Michael Austin SJ, Mr. S. Fry, Mr. M. Martins and Mrs. B. Pooley.

The ceremony of Confirmation took place at the Rosebank Catholic Church on the 30th September 2005, where Archbishop Buti Joseph Tlhagale confirmed 110 candidates, including our thirty-three candidates. It was a ceremony marked by a great sense of prayer and serenity. The challenge the Archbishop left each candidate was to proclaim a message of hope in situations that need a ray of hope. The candidates have been empowered to fulfill this task with the aid of the Spirit.

LIFE ORIENTATION

Life Orientation at St David's is divided into three areas: Religious Education, Guidance and Physical Education. Each of these areas helps the learners to acquire the appropriate value systems to appreciate what they have at their disposal; how to deal with various issues of conflict management; respect for the rights of others, and to value life itself. A large component of the syllabus is teaching the learners to appreciate the diversity which is part of our human journey ,and to celebrate that diversity by recognizing that each person has a basic right to be respected regardless of race, colour or creed.

Issues covered this year have been those that directly influence teenagers: substance abuse, which was covered extensively in order to make the learner understand the long term effects of being caught up in a web of addiction; advertising and the role of media in persuading young people to accept and adopt a particular way of life was explored; and a project was done by the Grade 9's who had to take an advertisement from a magazine they had read, and evaluate according to set criteria. We also explored how religious aspects were portrayed through the advertisement.

By teaching Life Orientation we not only teach life skills, but also afford the learner the opportunity to live them, through various service projects, treatment of the environment and respect for human rights.

PILGRIMAGE

WORLD YOUTH PILGRIMAGE TO COLOGNE, AUGUST

One of the highlights of life at St David's for five boys will be their pilgrimage to the World Youth celebration with our Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI. Maybe they thought they were going on an easy trip to Europe as tourists and the first five days being hosted by families at St Josef Parish, Scholven in the Diocese of Essen probably reinforced this belief for Enele Khanye, Vusi Mbonyana, Otsile Mogale, Karabo Mooki and Connor Williams. There were outings, braais and concerts laid on by our generous hosts. On Sunday afternoon we attended the ceremony, "Going with the Star", in the vast Veltins Arena led by the Bishop of Essen assisted by the Cardinal of Montreal and other bishops when we sang, listened to Scripture readings and testimonies from young people from various countries who, like us, had chosen to spend the days of encounter with German families in the Diocese of Essen.

The next day we said goodbye to our hosts and took the train to Koln where we were assigned to a small town, Hennef, in two homes to accommodate our boys. Over the next five days they journeyed to visit the great Gothic cathedral towering over the city which displays the magnificent gold reliquary reputedly containing the relics of the three Magi who followed the star to worship the new-born child Jesus. On other days there were catechetical sessions in churches and Stations of the Cross on Friday led by the Holy Father. On Saturday night there was a Vigil Service at Marienfeld (Mary's Field), a disused coal mine seventeen miles west of Koln that had been prepared for the Papal ceremonies. A vast mound was built in the centre on which the altar covered by a canopy had been erected. When the Pope appeared in his popemobile the enthusiastic crowd broke into cheers and chanted his name, Benedetto in Italian, all the while accompanied by thousands of camera flashes. As a clarinet played a haunting melody, Pope Benedict accepted

a candle lit from a flame kindled in far off Bethlehem where the Magi worshipped the child Jesus. From this flame thousands of candles were lit and the flames danced like a massive swarm of fireflies darting around Marienfeld. Pope Benedict challenged the youth to first change themselves if they want to change the world. "Only from God, only from the saints like Francis of Assisi and Mother Teresa, does true revolutionary change come." The ceremony climaxed with adoration of the Blessed Sacrament and a blessing with the monstrance from the Holy Father. He had prepared them for this by trying to explain the wonderful mystery of the Eucharistic Presence of our Lord in the Host in language they might understand. He called the transformation of the bread and wine in the Mass to "nuclear fission" that also takes place in our hearts when we receive Holy Communion. Then it was over to the thousands who had brought sleepingbags to continue celebrating, with the youth chanting and singing and dancing, and vying with one another for the greatest volume. It was like New Year's eve - except for the good behaviour and total sobriety of the vast throng.

Next morning Pope Benedict returned to celebrate Holy Mass assisted by 750 cardinals, archbishops ands bishops and four thousand priests. The congregation was estimated at one million. Cardinal Meisner of Koln welcomed the Pope saying, "You belong to the youth and the youth belong to you" at which a mighty cheer went up. In his homily he challenged the youth, "Anyone who has discovered Christ must lead others to him. A great joy cannot be kept to oneself. It must be passed on." The consensus among the youth was joyous confidence that Pope Benedict would be as good a leader as the late Pope John Paul was

And they are happy to follow him.

"Beyond our Gates" is a St David's initiative that aims to make pupils aware of their 'social responsibilities to the wider community'. It is a whole school programme involving teachers and pupils working together. In the spirit of Marcellin Champagnat, the initiative develops in the boys an awareness of the needs of others and empowers them as they learn how to become actively involved in the lives of those around them.

This year saw the High School boys involved in:

- Collecting money for Child Welfare.
- Providing sandwiches for Alexander High School. This is a drive that is already in its second year.



- Raising funds for the SPCA
- · Every boy in the High School provided a child at Johannesburg Child Welfare with a Christmas gift. 400 presents were collected!
- Planning to adopt an animal at the Johannesburg Zoo.
- · Kids' Haven was provided with collections of toiletries. These were presented to the fundraising co-ordinator and to Sipho Mathebula when he visited the school. He is a former "Street Kid' who is now a young man with many exciting prospects ahead of him, despite his unfortunate childhood circumstances. Mr Mathebula visited the school in July this year and he gave an entertaining, but poignant address about what it was like to be alone and helpless as a six-year old boy living on the street, without any guidance or support. After finding Kids' Haven, he found the support he so desperately needed and he went on to become Deputy Head Boy of St Patrick's College in Kimberly. He is now a successful speaker and has been heard on many radio stations. Sipho Mathebula is proof that places like Kids' Haven allow children to grow beyond the circumstances that life has dealt them.



The Prep School continues to hold cake sales and civvies days in order to generate cash to donate to the following charities: Nazareth House, Slough Mission, San Salvador, Girls and Boys Town, Tape Aids for the Blind and Child Welfare.


A link up with the SPCA has been initiated and a group of boys, supervised by teachers, visit the animals on a weekly basis and collect food and money to support this worthy cause.


The Prep Co-workers continue to visit the Clairveaux Baby home on a weekly basis, donating gifts of money, food and clothing.




The Heralds of the Gospel




JUNIOR ALTAR SERVERS





THE HEADMASTER'S REPORT

Another Brick in the Wall, Part II

We don't need no education We don't need no thought control No dark sarcasm in the classroom Teacher, leave those kids alone Hey, Teacher, leave those kids alone! All in all it's just another brick in the wall All in all you're just another brick in the wall (Pink Floyd : The Wall)

Good evening, Father Lapsley, Mr and Mrs Chappel, Mr and Mrs Edey, parents, staff and the young men of St David's. It gives me pleasure also to welcome Mr Richard Hayward, Headmaster of I R Griffiths Primary; Mrs Sandra Fisher-Jeffes, Head of Craighall Primary and Mrs Heather Smith, Head of Wendywood Primary.

These strident lyrics from Pink Floyd's "The Wall" have been the refrain of generations of school leavers over the past twenty years. The words seek to express the frustration of every generation of teenagers against what they see as the unreasonable restrictions of their parents and their teachers. Of course as one gets older one realises that parameters are a part of life and that society can be a lot less supportive than the home or school environment.

Before Pink Floyd came along there were other spokesmen of the different generations. The film "American Graffiti" has one hilarious scene of two teachers in the 1950's speaking out against the evil of rock 'n roll and snapping piles of 7 single records. Then came the 1960's, Woodstock, Bob Dylan, the Beatles, the Rolling Stones and The Who, who even had a song entitled "My Generation". There was a bit of a wobble in the 70's when disco was king and then The Police and others came to the fore in the 80's. Many of these lyrics spoke of the desire for a new direction and a making of one's mark; they also provided a social commentary.

Probably bands like U2 and Green Day could be viewed as providing a similar social comment in the modern era. The 'make love not war' mantra of the hippie generation is often looked back on through rose-tinted glasses. In the present social context of HIV/AIDS, however, the soft porn lyrics of 50 Cent certainly seem in a different league and hardly as naïve and innocent as some of the previous generations. last year who spoke of their memories of seeing "Star Wars" for the first time. Those same people will remember the choices one had. Did one play cards, Monopoly or Cluedo at night? Or did one tune in to Springbok Radio? Did one listen to "10 O'Clock Tales" or "The Creaking Door"? "Inspector Carr" and Mark Saxon and Serge in "No Place to Hide" were there for the thrill seekers.

Competitions and quiz shows were also around then. "Venture", "100 000 to go" and "Test the Team" all had maestros who were able to take on all challenges from readers, although some of our Battle of the Brains contestants would have fared well. Some of these game shows were recorded live and a highlight of my early primary school years was attending the "Surf Show Pick-A-Box" in the Roodepoort Town Hall, with the famous Bob Courtney as Quiz Master. Well, he was famous in Roodepoort! The format was mind-bogglingly simple. Do you want the money or the box? We all got caught up in the melodrama, sharing the joy of the winners, and the tragedy of those who chose incorrectly. It was one of those great family outings that stick in one's mind, as well as being an evening when the community got together.

We have game shows on TV today; we have "The Weakest Link" with Anne Robinson, whose wax figure is in the Chamber of Horrors in the London Dungeon; "Survivor", where it is every man for himself, and then that lowest common denominator of human behaviour "Big Brother". The thing with most of these games is that they seem to focus on humiliation and putting others down, of seeing them squirm. Perhaps that is why I have some interest in a show that I have only been made aware of recently, "My Big Fat Obnoxious Boss", where the contestants go at it hammer and tongs only to find that the whole show is a hoax and that they are doing it for nothing. There is some sort of justice at work here.

The bottom line is that these shows continue to draw large viewership. Should we be getting our kicks from laughing at the misfortune of others? I am not suggesting that this is anything new. Your court jester and circus clown have played a similar role for centuries but this does seem to be on a much grander scale. Entertainment and reality are once again easily blurred. There is a danger that people will begin to believe that laughing at others and scoring points in this way is acceptable and is the norm. Surely this is a destructive force?

In comparison with the choices I had, what choices do our young men have? It seems to me they have two: "Do I hook up, via my earphones, to my cell phone or do I hook up to my iPod or MP3 Player?" When talking to others as a member of the 'now' generation you don't even have to miss a beat – all you do is take one of the earphones out to engage in conversation. How much is listened to or heard is another matter.

It is not easy being part of the 'plugged-in' generation. Marshall McLuhans's "Global Village" is now a global

And we were pretty naïve in a sense. "Star Wars" which I referred to last year had robots played by people. These days QRIO, Sony's robot, has progressed to doing a jig on the coffee table on *Carte Blanche* with Derek Watts looking on, with a rather bemused expression on his face. In terms of choices, I like to believe that I had more choices to evaluate when I was at school. I was taken by the number of people

desktop. In this world of immediate gratification there is access to masses of information at the touch of a button. There are big plusses to this but are things not too easy? Is it not too tempting to download others' views and even cobble items together instead of striving to develop and to synthesise one's own ideas?

The problem is that we are going to stagnate as a society and go nowhere as individuals if we are not going to develop critical thinkers, able to develop points and argue them cogently. The 'thought control' which Pink Floyd comments on is for many self-inflicted: an unwillingness to take risks intellectually, to develop a point of view or an argument. There should be an academic rigour, of questioning and research - not a hunting through websites for the best summary. We all know that these and other skills are crucial if we are to move forward.

What is the 'Brave New World', then, that faces our young men of today? Peter Aspden, a journalist writing in the *Financial Times*, makes a number of interesting observations in an article entitled "The me, myself and iPod generation".

He states that "... despite being better 'connected' than any other generation in history, today's young adults are actually less engaged with the wider world than ever. Even the icons of youth in 2005 – hooded tops, iPods, mobile phones – sever users from the community at large. They are potentially better informed about the world but care about it less". In other words there is an increasing sense of isolation, a lack of core interaction with others.

Aspden asserts that "there is a monster known as hyperconsumerism – not only an insatiable beast but one that barks a message to the young consumer; you are in charge, you decide, have it your own way. Because you're worth it". The message is clear: marketing power delivers self-esteem. What happened to the development of emotions such as empathy and understanding as one matures?

This is exacerbated by the technological explosion: we are entering the world of helmet cams, simple-to-use editing software and a desperate desire to upload - we live in a world of blogs and podcasts.

Mrs Crichton will be impressed that I now know what blogs and podcasts are. 'Blog' comes from 'weblog' – bloggers, people who run weblogs, can bare their souls on any issues to the faceless masses out there. The idea, when people first talked of the information superhighway, was that we would travel and connect. Aspden has a point when he states that so many voices clamouring to be heard does not produce a chorus, but a strange and new cacophony – a modern Tower of Babel, perhaps.

Of course, when I saw the word 'blogroll' I thought there might be some hope – until I realised that blogroll merely means a list of blogs!

We cannot ignore the potential drawbacks of the blog revolution. Man is a social animal. As the poet John Donne wrote:

"No man is an island, entire of itself;

every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. If a clod be washed away by the sea, Europe is the less."

Isaac Newton is acknowledged as one of man's greatest thinkers. His comment on his achievements is relevant: "If I could see further than others, it was because I stood on the shoulders of giants." Apart from working with others it is surely our challenge to have a greater sense of being part of the community and looking to serve that community. It is here where the African concept of Ubuntu has a strong message, a message that we as South Africans and Africans are part of and should be able to internalise. Whereas we might read and experience more of the 'Western' self and focus more on the individual, the message of Ubuntu, that a person can only be a person through others, strikes a very strong resonant chord. It is important that we do not lose our sense of self, but at the same time we should develop a the achievements of individual pupils across a number of areas. We would be here for a long time if I were to try and document all the successes of 2005.

Each of us will have his or her own highlights. I shall, however, mention a few that have remained in my mind. The School production of "Footloose", where we continue to see the benchmark being raised in terms of performance; the 1st XI Hockey Squad's tour to Malaysia; the excellent form of the 1st XI Cricket team and those individuals who scored centuries on a regular basis; the entrenchment of the Inter-House Music Competition in the annual calendar and the spirit and enthusiasm at all Inter-House events; our successful SMILE Programme; the expanded Sandwich Feeding Scheme; the other 'Beyond our Gates' class projects where our boys assist personally at institutions in disadvantaged areas; the Christmas gift collection programme which is rapidly reaching its target of nearly 400 gifts for Johannesburg Child Welfare; our two medallists in the National Maths Olympiad and our achievers in other Olympiads; the many provincial representatives across sporting and cultural activities; Adrian Gebers achieving 9th and 8th position in the world in the Short Sprint and Marathon categories as part of the South African Under 19 Canoeing team.

It has been another great year for the School. The challenge to excel set by Craig Roman, last year's Head Prefect, has been met by the 2005 pupil body.

In terms of development the long awaited Multipurpose Astroturf surface will be completed early next year and plans are well underway for the establishment of a new Chapel and the launch of the St David's Foundation which will take place in 2006. Obviously development is something which is ongoing, and each project presents its own challenges. We must not, however, lose sight of the fact that it is each person who is part of the St David's Marist family who really generates the energy of the School.

At this point I would like to commend the Matric group for the role they have played this year as the leaders of the School. The efforts of the Matric group have resulted in the Portfolio System becoming established firmly in the School and many boys have come to the fore in terms of carrying out their duties and taking responsibility. One of these Portfolio initiatives has resulted in the reinstating of the Inter-House Competition and the Inter-House Floating Trophy.

The 2005 Matrics have impressed also with their extremely high level of involvement in all areas of the School with many boys being involved in a number of different areas, often at the same time. In addition, they have been a very united group and have turned out in good numbers to support their peers in their cultural and sporting endeavours. This enthusiasm, positive support and camaraderie has permeated the other grades. Here credit must be given to Sabelo Sithebe and Kelsey Stuart, our Head and Deputy Head Prefects. These two young men have been fully involved in the School and at the same time have made it their task to attend as many school functions as possible. ACCOUNTING

The Higher Grade examiner has made the Accounting paper more challenging every year, thereby encouraging teachers to increase their standard of teaching. The percentage of problem solving questions has improved gradually, with the aim of preparing us for the new FET examination in 2008. With the introduction of a new Standard Grade examiner in 2003, the assessment has changed for Standard Grade as well, with the focus more on problem solving as opposed to straightforward bookkeeping that we were used to.

For the past two years we have produced a portfolio that is moderated by the IEB. The Grade Twelve portfolio is a record of all the assessment that is done during Grade Twelve and a certain portion of Grade Eleven. We welcome the portfolio moderation, since this is an external, objective inspection of our standard of work. Mr van den Berg was appointed by the IEB in 2003 as one of two moderators for the Accounting Higher Grade portfolios. This was an invaluable opportunity to measure us against other schools.

Our Matric results have been well above the IEB averages with 25% and 20% of the boys receiving distinctions in 2003 and 2004 respectively and the class averages were 70% and 68% respectively. We are very proud of Michael Hayward who attained the highest result in the country for the IEB final Accounting Examination, namely 98%.

New concepts that are being introduced with the introduction of the New Curriculum Statement in the Further Education and Training band are: VAT, Costs in Manufacturing and Business Ethics. More emphasis will be placed on analyzing financial statements and problem solving by looking at various case studies.

We are excited about the content of the new syllabus, and confident that we will be able to face the challenges that lie ahead.

Johannesburg Securities Exchange / Liberty Schools Challenge 2005

This year some of our Grade Twelve students took part in the JSE Schools Challenge.

Each group was issued with a fictitious portfolio of R500 000 in cash and R1 000 000 in shares. The JSE acted as a broker over a period of six months. Shares were traded according to their actual prices, daily volumes available and all other rules linked to the stock exchange. Market trends and company performances were analysed. Our students had access to the all the market information on the JSE website. We could see how each transaction affected the rating against the other teams in the game. We are very proud of Greg Beevers and his team who were placed 13th overall out of the 700 teams in the game.

In retrospect it was a worthwhile lesson as students learned how to make a success of the real money world. Tasks involved were: finding a balance between being at major risk with possible high returns, or choosing to be conservative with lower returns; learning the effects that global markets have on the South African economy; and the importance of having a finger on the pulse of a business in these forever changing markets. It was also very interesting to see what effect market sentiment and speculators have on the market.

Well done to everybody involved in this game. St David's has proved yet again that we are able to compete with the best.


is a compelling piece of work. His subject matter of boats and sky with lagoon water could have just been merely picturesque, but he managed to move beyond that – a difficult task.

Biology Study Weekend 2005





FLL Robotics Competition

The St David's Marist Inanda Robotics Team, aka the 'Robo Saints', achieved 4th place in the All African finals of the First Lego League (FLL) for Robotics competition and won the prized research and innovation award. This resulted in an invitation to the European championships to be held in Holland in 2006.

Just to gain entry in the finals, the team had to beat 46 teams in Gauteng alone to secure a place in the next round with the finalists from the other regions. The competition was held on 3 December 2005 at The Emerald Casino in Vanderbijlpark. Sponsors included the Shuttleworth foundations Hip2besquare programme and Everedy. The St David's team is; Lawrence Steyn, Perinnio Massi, Nicholas Von Roretz, Miles Demmer, Nicholas Hon, Mr. Marius Buys (Research and Presentation) and Mr. Johan Benade (Technical)

In the board play section robots have to complete 10 separate missions in under two and-a-half minutes. This makes for a lot of nervous energy to refit the robot just right. The machine is not allowed to be touched when running its pupil, written programme on the 1m x 2m game board arena and has to outperform a competing team's robot .Technical interviews follow where teams get judged on their understanding of the programming they have done. In yet another component, teamwork judges rove around freely and assesteams dynamic throughout the grueling 9 hour competition. In the research and innovation section teams identify a current problem in the ocean (this years theme) and propose a new and innovative solution. This solution has to be backed by technically sound research and is judged in the form of a 5 minute presentation. The St David's team proposed a design that effectively makes bathing areas 100% shark proof. Two cables with opposite charge over stimulate the shark's highly sensitive electrical sensors.



The Robotics Club is run by the Design and Technology department at St David's and is open to anyone from age 13 to 16. It runs every second Tuesday.

Wits Science and Technology Expo

Alexander Simpson and Nicholas Gishen presented their solution to supermarket woes in the form of a trolley bag that clips the handles of the bag onto the sides of the trolley to keep it permanently open whilst you shop. It also eliminates the "how many bags would you like?" question when arriving at the till. For this clever and innovative design they were rewarded with a bronze medal.

Wits Bridge Building Competition

After achieving successful designs in the schools newspaper bridge competition A Simpson, N von Roretz, G Starkey,R Dobson and M Carleo went on to challenge the testing devices in the bridge building competition held annually by the Wits Civil Engineering Dept. under the auspice of the very knowledgeable and entertaining Dr Luca. (Civils specialist and lecturer) On 17 March 2005 the St David's contingent excitedly set off to the Great Hall to be tested. The best bridge of our group was R Dobsons that weighed in at 20.1 kg.

ENGLISH

To teach English is a privilege. We have the opportunity of exposing our learners to the world in the broadest possible sense. Through literature the boys are encouraged to encounter life and to contemplate human experience; language studies require them to learn how to engage productively with words and meaning (a process that involves both imaginative thinking and rigorous analytical skills). We encourage our learners to practise their writing and oratory skills and present their ideas in a cogent and clear manner. English also tends to involve media and communication studies, and aspects of social and cultural study.

The English curriculum in the classroom is supported by extra-curricular activities offered by the school. These include

Public Speaking and Debating at Festival level and internal competitions; exposure to drama through the productions of St David's dynamic Drama and Music Department and through theatre outings and visiting productions. The English Olympiad is an opportunity for the boys to extend their traditional studies and engage on a personal and creative level with exciting texts.

As a department we hope to offer a balance of the traditional and the contemporary, local and foreign material and give our boys varied opportunities to explore their own talents and appreciate those of others.

GEOGRAPHY

With a new 'home', Lab two; seven PC'S with permanent connection to the Internet and one PC purely for the processing of weather data from our soon to be installed electronic weather station the Geography Department can now explore new teaching approaches like never before. 2005 also saw the department receiving a boost this year with the introduction of GIS (Geographic Information Systems). The Grade Eights and Nines have had this timetabled in and they have made astonishing progress with



aerial photography and satellite image manipulation. The Grade Tens have each been given a free ware GIS package with a large data set to take home with them and this has enabled them to work at their own pace and practise their map work skills interactively on a fun medium. The Grade Elevens will have the opportunity to use this tool for their research projects for next year. The Grade Twelves have benefitted from the purchase of interactive software for them to practise the last five years of IEB mapwork examinations with solutions on the network.

Tours

We were able to take the Grade Nines to the Satellite Application Centre and to the Sterkfontein Caves at the beginning of the year. The Matrics were taken up the Carlton Centre and on a tour of Johannesburg for a settlement study. The Grade Tens have a superb opportunity to experience the effects of orographic rainfall while hiking in rather wet conditions on the Grade Ten camp earlier on in the year.

HISTORY

History has become even more popular at St David's over recent years. The present Grade Ten class is an unprecedented sixty pupils. For a number of years now we have had to accommodate two classes in each of Grades Ten, Eleven and Twelve.

Our pupils are becoming more and more visual in their learning and the History Department has facilitated this wherever possible. Many lessons are accompanied by visual material, not only to bring the subject alive, but to make learning more enjoyable. The Grade 10 history class does a film analysis in the middle of their year in which they detect film interpretations and the devices used to transmit them. This has proved highly successful and again, enjoyable. The introduction of a history portfolio has also been of benefit to our boys. The historical investigations have been of a high quality and have ranged from topics such as the 'Guguletu seven' to an assessment of the film Troy. These were done with enthusiasm and again required skills of analysis and evaluation. Particularly impressive have been the Matric oral presentations. The boys used all their technical skills in their Powerpoint presentations. Speech delivery was accompanied by the most interesting pieces of film, pictures, cartoons and key points. Boys even dressed up in the characters they were discussing. The Matric group as a whole found this experience fascinating and informative.

History as a classroom subject has developed tremendously over the years and has moved away from rote learning and become a subject, which encourages thought and interactive debate. The Matric exam has encouraged this with almost two-thirds of the paper set on questions, which are source-based. The key to doing well is understanding and skills application. We have every confidence that this year's Matrics will again produce a number of history distinctions and maintain our excellent average.

Information Communication Technology

Learners were overjoyed at the beginning of the year to see that the computers in the High School computer center had been replaced with new Pentium 4 computers each with a 17" monitor. Many learners and some staff have successfully completed all seven modules of the ICDL. Training for staff on the ICDL was held during the April and August holidays. In 2006 the ICDL will be offered from Grade Six, ensuring that all learners will leave with a certificate in ICT.



comfortable 'B+' symbol. The Grade Nine team dazzled with their presentation, and was rewarded



To top all the excitement, Adrian Gebers was selected for both the South African Schools Team as well as the South African Junior Squad.


SA Marathon Champs


World Champs - Hungary

We look forward to reaching greater heights in 2006.




In addition, some boys ran individual races throughout the year ranging between 10km and 21km.






The Golf team performed admirably well over the year. There was some strong competition from the other schools and our players always met the challenge.

Malaysia Hockey Report

The tour departed on the 11th of April 2005 from JHB international airport and the first port of call was Singapore. What a beautiful place to begin the tour, a city where finance drives the economy and litter is a jailable offence. It was here that the first game of the tour took place. The school was built to develop those players who would go into international competition and had some incredible facilities. A normal day here would have the boys practising for two hours in the morning and then two hours in the late afternoon. It was a very competitive game and we eventually went down 2-1.

From Johor Bahru it was off to a town Malakka further north. This is known as the historical city of Malaysia and we visited a number of historical sights of interest. Game four took place here against a Malaysian school called St David's, so no matter what the result St David's would win this one. It was a closely contested game and we lost 3-1 but were treated to the standard noodles and chilli sauce at the after match function and, of course, a cold bottle of water.

It was back to the hotel for a swim and the next day we traveled further north to Kuala Lumpur. It was here we played three games of hockey the first one was played at the Commonwealth Village in the main hockey stadium against an Academy team. This was the best side we came up against the entire tour. In the first half we went down 4-0 but we managed to hold them in the second only conceding a single goal for a final score of 5-0 down. Setapak High school was the second game in KL and we lost this 3-0 but managed a victory against SMK Kepong Bahru the next day, wining 3-1.

There is not much else to be said about Ipoh and it was time to move up to Penang where we played the last game of the tour against Penang Free School. The score line of 5-1 down does not reflect the nature of the game and after scoring first we looked certain of victory but it was not to be, I think the legs were tired and energy sapped from a long three weeks.


Declan Berndt was the anchor player and school number one who in addition to excellent results for St David's also achieved considerable

HEADMASTER'S ADDRESS SENIOR PREP PRAISEGIVING 2005

Chairman of the Board Mr Chappel and Mrs Chappel, Mr and Mrs Edey, Special guest of Honour – Mrs Whitfield, Brother Joseph, Invited Guests, Parents, Colleagues and gentlemen of St David's, I bid you a very warm welcome to our annual senior primary academic Praise-giving.

In Zulu culture, it is traditional to have a praise singer preceding a certain category of luminary who is about to speak. I therefore feel particularly flattered that Mr Dry organises a whole choir to sing before I speak! I thank them for such a tuneful start to the occasion.

In its advertising campaign, a large financial institution dubbed this year "Two thousand and thrive," and looking back over the collective achievements of the different sections of the school - I believe that this clever play on words could equally apply to our school.

It might sound glib, it might sound like self gratification, but 2005 has been a wonderful year for our school. How can I qualify such a general statement? It is not that difficult. We are always mindful that one of the values we espouse, is that of humility and thus to crow about achievements seems contrary to that spirit. I re-assure myself however, that our preferred modus operandi is to celebrate our achievements together on campus and in other arenas – let our results speak for themselves. This function IS on our campus.

Of course, the primary objective of education is to engender in every boy a desire to become a competent, self-sufficient learner. In life, one of the greatest challenges we face as parents, is to consciously stand back from continually propping up our sons. In a nutshell - every time we do something for our son, we deny him the learning opportunity to be gained from doing it himself. Every time we fight a battle on his behalf - we deny him the opportunity of facing and solving a problem. We need to guard strongly, against raising a generation of children who don't have the confidence, experience, or determination to handle things by themselves. I know that it is so much easier just to do things for our children and thus avoid time-wasting and increased levels of frustration, but I put it to you that when we were children, our parents did not do so and we all learned our lessons the hard way. I pose the question to the adults present here - think back to your own childhood and try to remember if your parents repeated instructions as many times as you currently do. I think not!

decent, polite and most importantly, caring young men in what appears at times; an uncaring world. Who knows, one day they too may be brave enough to wear a PINK tie!

The citations we are here to celebrate here this evening are therefore the metaphorical icing on the cake, whilst the important ingredients, those which leave the taste in the mouth – humility, honesty, cheerfulness and moral fibre, whilst not as visually obvious, are to me equally critical and worthy of recognition!

To begin with: academics, and this evening is about academic recognition. We are ever mindful that this is our core function, although many boys are of the opinion that lessons are merely trials one has to endure before one can get out onto the sports fields. I wonder from whom they get that notion?

We are very confident that our standard compares very favourably with other schools. As indicators, I would point to the AMESA Maths challenge, a nation-wide Mathematics benchmark in which our boys achieved 12 bronze, 9 silver and 7 gold awards from Grade 4. – 7. Four of those achieving Gold awards were ranked joint highest mark in Gauteng province and one boy - Simon Rigby scored the perfect 100%.

We have an outstanding Grade 7 group this year and these boys were awarded academic scholarships to the following schools:

St David's: Barry Morisse, Daniel Barnard, Angus MacKay, Bradford Latilla-Campbell and the Rigby twins - Simon and Matthew.

St Andrew's Grahamstown: Daniel Still and Grant Prior.

St John's: The Fisher twins - Richard and Andrew.

These young men were part of a very talented year-group and several others must count themselves unlucky to have narrowly missed out.

Academically, under the watchful eye of Mr Webb, we are in good shape.

Our cultural programme continues to thrive and Gareth Dry constantly amazes us with the calibre of performance he gets out of both his choristers and casts. Each February, he takes our senior choir to The Drakensberg Boys Choir School, where they undergo intensive instruction from their music department staff. They return from that trip with a very sound grasp of the mechanics and discipline required to sing in a good choir.

In June, our senior choir performed at the Grayston "Magic of Music" festival at the Linder auditorium and they were without doubt – the strongest choir on display that night. The headmistress of a nearby leading Independent Girl's School later remarked that we should be exploring opportunities to take our choir on a road show!

Our annual play, "The Wizard of Oz," performed in conjunction with St Teresa's Mercy School, was another resounding success. The standard of singing from the lead characters, both boys and girls, was of the highest order.

Whilst highlighting a very real concern, I must state how proud I am to be Headmaster of this school and the source of my pride lies not in the tangible, measurable accomplishments – be they academic, cultural or sport, but rather in the quality of character to be found in the young men in this school. Overwhelmingly, they are thoroughly Our sport results continue to flatter. I was told by a prospective parent that she had heard that we were 'very competitive.' She was quite surprised when I informed her that our objective in playing sport is not solely the end result. Whilst we don't play sport to lose matches, there are other important life lessons to be gained from participating and giving of your best for your school.

For the record, our 'A' swimming team remains unbeaten for over four years. Our win ratio in football runs in the 75% range and no fewer than 9 teams went through the season unbeaten. We have also enjoyed very successful cricket and tennis seasons with all age groups, especially the opens, producing some fine results. Of course, there are new, exciting developments on the horizon in the sporting fold. Next year we will have short seasons for both rugby and hockey during the year. These have both been long overdue in coming and I am delighted that Mr Castle has managed to juggle our hectic extra mural timetable to accommodate the new sports. This year has seen another 'first' as the Grade 7 boys have been attending rugby clinics every week in the third term to give them the basic skills required for high school rugby next year. They have also benefited tremendously by learning to play water polo.

Our compulsory sport policy, coupled to a naturally selffulfilling competitive spirit amongst the boys themselves to play their hardest, are the real reasons for our pleasing results. I thank the teachers who devote many hours to the extra mural programme for their time and for their insistence on nurturing in our boys - the correct attitude towards sport, namely, 'win with humility, lose with dignity.'

Being continually successful in sport can, however, be 'a double edged sword' – ask the Australians!

This year, as an experiment, we held a separate extracurricula achievement assembly in November which included sports and cultural awards. A number of boys reached the pinnacle of achievement by being selected for regional teams in football, athletics, cricket and swimming. Additionally, others represented the province in sports such as Karate and hockey. Our chess teams once again, excelled in their league.

The 'Beyond our Gates' community support programme continues with our co-workers, under the guidance of Mrs Zambon, playing a strong supporting role at Clairvaux and Thabang Baby shelters, whilst our SPCA partnership headed by Ms Joseph, sees a very dedicated group of our boys working hard every week in caring for the animals at the Sandton facility. Our Grade 0's bring sandwiches for hungry children in Alexandra and for the second year, some Grade 6&7 boys under the supervision of Mrs Geldenhuys, collected money for destitute villagers at Lerome village so that they could buy water. Additionally, co-ordinated by Mrs Ansell, we support over a dozen charities and the Marist Brother's Mission at Slough, on a continuous basis.

Our association with Holy Cross Primary School in Soweto has continued and we hope to even further uplift our involvement in the New Year.

Our two mini-city council representatives were both elected onto the Executive Committee and Kai Marini and Bradford Latilla Campbell served those less fortunate in our city, with distinction.

Our school's physical metamorphosis continues unabated!

Last year, at this function I mentioned the next major development in our strategic plan – that of the astro turf. Today, work is almost complete on a magnificent facility which is going to add a whole new dimension to sport in our school. I commend the development committee and especially my colleague Mr Malcolm Williams, for their collective drive and hard work towards making this superb facility a reality.

We have some more exciting developments in the pipeline for the near future. Next year, we will commence Rolling out lists of achievements is not a difficult task and we are proud of what we, as a family, accomplish. Senior management is however - ever mindful of the need to constantly evaluate what we do and to avoid falling into comfort zones. To this end, we have elected to undertake a major, accredited, self evaluation exercise next year. Developed jointly by ISASA and the Catholic Institute of Education, the instrument examines key performance areas in the school and measures how effectively they are handled. How or why this happens, no-one is sure, but one thing I am certain about - is that the Grade 7 'class of 2005' is one of those exceptional years. At the beginning of this year, we called them together as they had made a less than ideal start to their final year. From that day onward, this group of boys have exceeded the lofty expectations we had of them. This is a group which 'has it all.' Their achievements in every sphere of school life have been of the highest order, be they academic, sporting or cultural. Most importantly from my own perspective - they have developed into a really decent group of young men. Their strength has lain in their support for each other and a genuine desire to do well for the school.

Boys, you now start the next phase of your lives. Teenage years are both exciting and sometimes - confusing. I am guite certain that in your lives you will sometimes experience success and sometimes (and I pray that it won't be too often,) failure. We live in a highly critical society and world at large. We are intolerant of our politicians, our sports teams, other countries actions and policies and sadly, at times, we are unreasonably intolerant of each other. For the few times in the future that you might try something and fail, I remind you that failing does not make you a failure. The only time you become a failure, is when you stop trying. The world is your oyster - you can achieve anything you set your heart and mind to. We all seek the keys to success, but remember that success does not come looking for us. We must pursue it. When the pursuit is fuelled by determination and hard work, things fall into place with remarkable ease.

Don't be overly concerned with people who criticise you, for criticism is cheap and very easy to deliver. Stick to your ideals and keep striving. You can draw tremendous strength from the following words spoken by the late President of the United States, Theodore Roosevelt, who said and I quote:

"It is not the critic who counts, not the man who points out how the strong man stumbled, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better.

The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena; whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly, who errs and comes short again and again, who knows the great enthusiasms, the great devotions, and spends himself in a worthy cause, who at the best, knows the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall

VOCAL TRAINING

This year saw the commencement of Bel Canto vocal training for those boys who have an interest in singing. Although Bel canto

is essentially the wellspring of Italian Grand Opera the technique does fit students to become practitioners of any of the different performing genres from classical to rock music.

Bel Canto originated with the Florentine School of vocal production during the Renaissance. Centuries of empirically based scientific research that included a sound knowledge of vocal mechanics resulted in the dissemination of this school of singing throughout the world.

With the frenetic pace of modern life and the advent of the 'mask' method advocated by Jean de Rezke, Bel Canto's importance in the world of singing was

superseded by methods that advocated rapid development and little study.

'Slowness is beauty' runs the old adage and never was a saying more appropriate in its ability to describe the development of vocal power and control that has been evinced by all the great exponents of Bel Canto from Melba to Tetrazzini and from Caruso to Gigli.

A number of boys from the preparatory and high schools have taken on the exciting challenge of developing their voices through consistent training based upon Bel Canto principles. The boys have shown the almost heroic patience needed to develop their voices through vocal drilling and intelligent application. I think that the months of sacrifice on their part has been time well spent and I congratulate them on their perseverance and on the beauty and guality of their voices. Thank you, boys, for giving me the opportunity to work with students that possess excellent voices and who show determination to succeed (Qualities not always present at one and the same time). I hope that 2006 will see an even greater development of your God given talents.
