NEW YORK MARATHON:

"Phew...I can't go on...my legs are killing me! ... c'mon Smithy, don't give up now,...let's get those legs moving!"

This morning I am going to tell you about an amazing sporting event – one of the biggest and most exciting events in the annual world calendar of this sport. The sport requires discipline and dedication and many, many hours and kilometres of training; yes, you guessed it, the sport is long-distance running and the event that I have chosen is the New York Marathon. I have chosen this topic for three reasons:

1. It is imminent;
2. I enjoy athletics; and
3. My Dad and Mr Castle will be running it.

The first New York Marathon started in 1970 and was approximately four laps around Central Park, and had only 55 athletes finishing the race. Now it has become a week-long, world wide celebration. On the guest list this year we have 30 000 athletes, 12 000 volunteers, over 9 thousand spectators lining the course and tens of millions of television crews, all celebrating friendship, sport and human potential. In 1976 the Marathon moved from the Park to the streets of New York's five boroughs:

1. Staten Island;
2. Brooklyn;
3. Queens;
4. The Bronx; and
5. Manhattan.

The course united dozens of culturally and ethnically diverse neighbourhoods passing over bridges, dodging potholes and finishing up at Tavern Green in Central Park. In 1978 over 9 000 Marathoners participated in the run and in 1995, 27 000 crossed the finishing line. The 2000 race included an official wheel-chair division for the first time. In 2001, less than two months after September 11, the Marathon became a race of hope and renewal for all New Yorkers.

The 2002 race had a separate start for the women's field and a record 31 834 finishers crossed the line. This year's New York Marathon will have a record R730 000 worth of prizes for both the women's and the men's races, along with a

smart car. The total prize money for this year is 3.8 million, the largest in the sport. On the first Sunday in November, 30,000 men and women from around the world will fill the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge for the start of the Marathon. Athletes will be from every walk of life: professional athletes, teachers, lawyers, artists, police, firefighters, bankers, postal workers, CEO's and mechanics.

Starting at Staten Island, the runners fill the expanse of the Verrazano-Narrows Bridge into Brooklyn, where they run through different areas from Halai to Hispanic and into the Hasadic Jewish quarter.

At the halfway mark, the race crosses into Queens and rises up into the Queens Borough on 59th Street, emerging into Manhattan along 1st Avenue. Running down 1st Avenue, the route briefly enters the Bronx returning to Manhattan to enter Central Park for the finish.

27 years later, the N.Y.C. Marathon has become a model for big city Marathon courses around the world, so next time you see me coming to school in a limo, you'll know that my Dad won the Marathon! (ha, ha!)

is my grandmother and a delight!

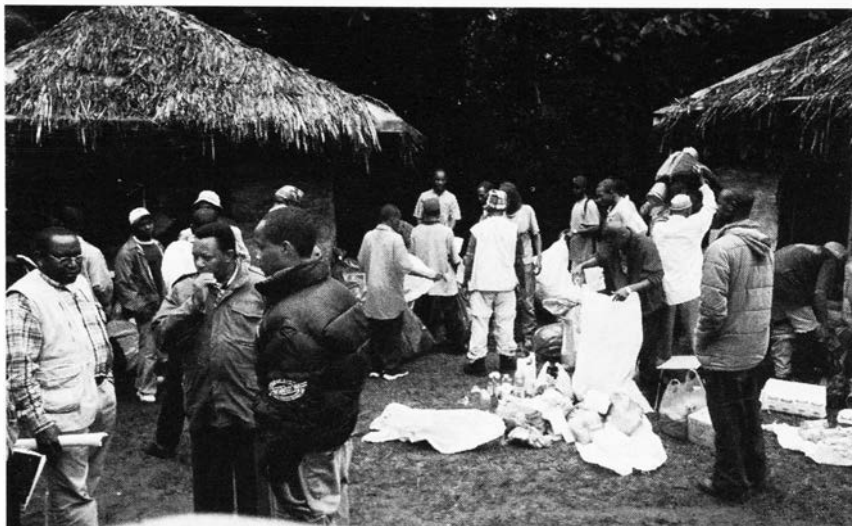

MY TRIP TO KILIMANJARO

Kilimanjaro is situated in Tanzania, Africa. Uhuru Peak is 5,896 meters above sea level. It is the highest point of Mount Kilimanjaro, which is the highest freestanding mountain and highest volcano in the world.

There are three main routes which lead to the summit. These routes take between 5 to 8 days of quite gruelling walking and climbing. The Marangu route is commonly called the "Coca Cola" route and is known to be the easiest. The Shira route is a long walk through arid desert land and meets up with the Machame route, which is known for its beauty and opportunity to acclimatize - quite a long acclimatizing walk! We chose the Umbwe Route, which is said not to be for the "Faint Hearted". This route tests you to your limits, mentally and physically. The main problems encountered are altitude sickness and the extreme cold.



Day 1

We are driven on an incredibly bumpy drive to the Park Gate. The porters took three hours to pack the supplies in for the expedition.

The first day was a seven-hour walk through the muddy rain forest. We arrived at Caves Campsite that night to find no porters in sight. There was an accident on the way to the gate and all the supplies were stranded. Our guide, Francis, ran the seven-hour walk in two hours to catch up with us.



Day 2

Another long six hour walk up the mountain - this time finally out of the wet Rain Forest and into the dry moorland. The vegetation changed dramatically from big trees to small shrubs and vast lands of openness. We arrived at Barranco Hut, 3900mt above sea level. That evening the temperature dropped to -10°C.



Day 3

A four-hour climb to Lava Tower camp 4600m above sea level. A hot lunch is served and the constant headache begins. I decided to climb to the top of Lava Tower with Frances our guide. From this point the temperature remained a constant -14°C. We all take sleeping pills to sleep.

Day 4

Step 2 - 3 hours climb across rocky cliffs to Arrow Glacier camp 4900mt. It is very windy so we cannot sit outside. The whole team is very nervous for the summit climb the next morning at midnight. We do not want to eat but are forced to by one of our porters named Paul. You just won't make it if you do not have enough food and energy.

Day 5

We were woken up at 11h30pm for tea and biscuits. At our briefing the previous evening we were given clear instructions by Frances to be ready on time and to stick close to one another. The Glacier climb can be dangerous and you cannot put a foot out. I lost all feeling in my fingers and face until long after sunrise. This was the beginning of an 18-hour walk - 7 hours to Uhuru Peak.



We walk across the crater. With each step I felt as though I could fall asleep. I could take 10 steps at a time, the rest of the team settled on 6 steps before having to stop and rest. When I reached the top I felt a sense of great achievement. The glacier rests on a great valley of volcanic ash. I started to feel really sick, cold, nauseous and knew that I had to get down. Frances took me under his arm and we sort of "sand dragged" our way down at a top speed. We arrived at the camp 2 hours before everyone else at Millennium camp for lunch and then onto Mweka 3100mt for our last evening in the bush.

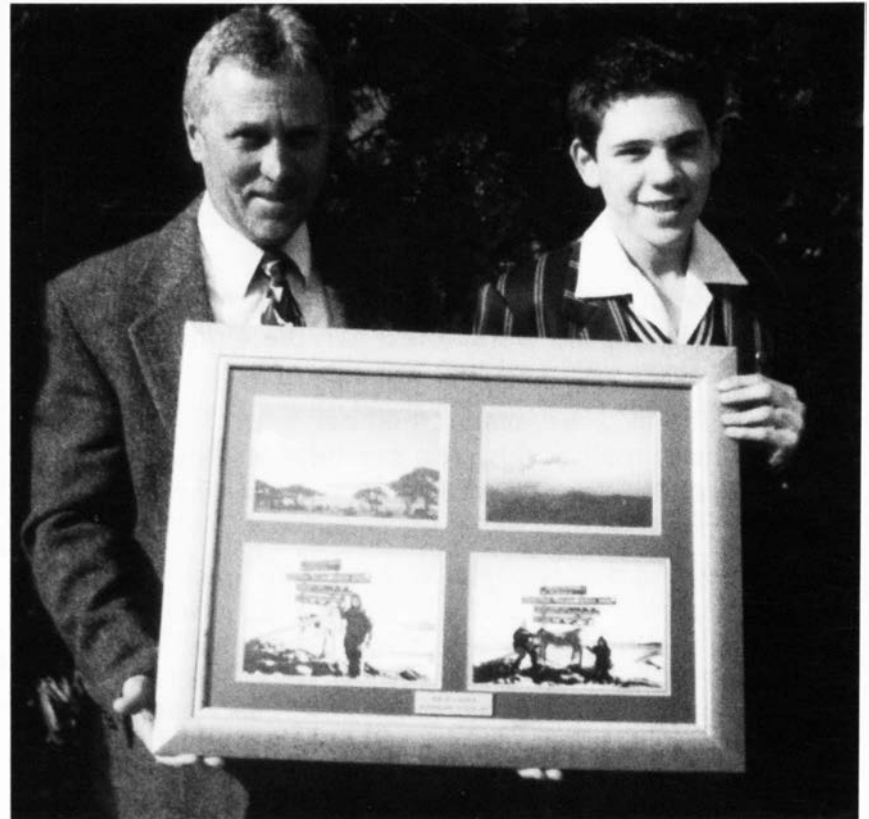


St David's Flag flies high on Kilimanjaro-Uhuru Peak

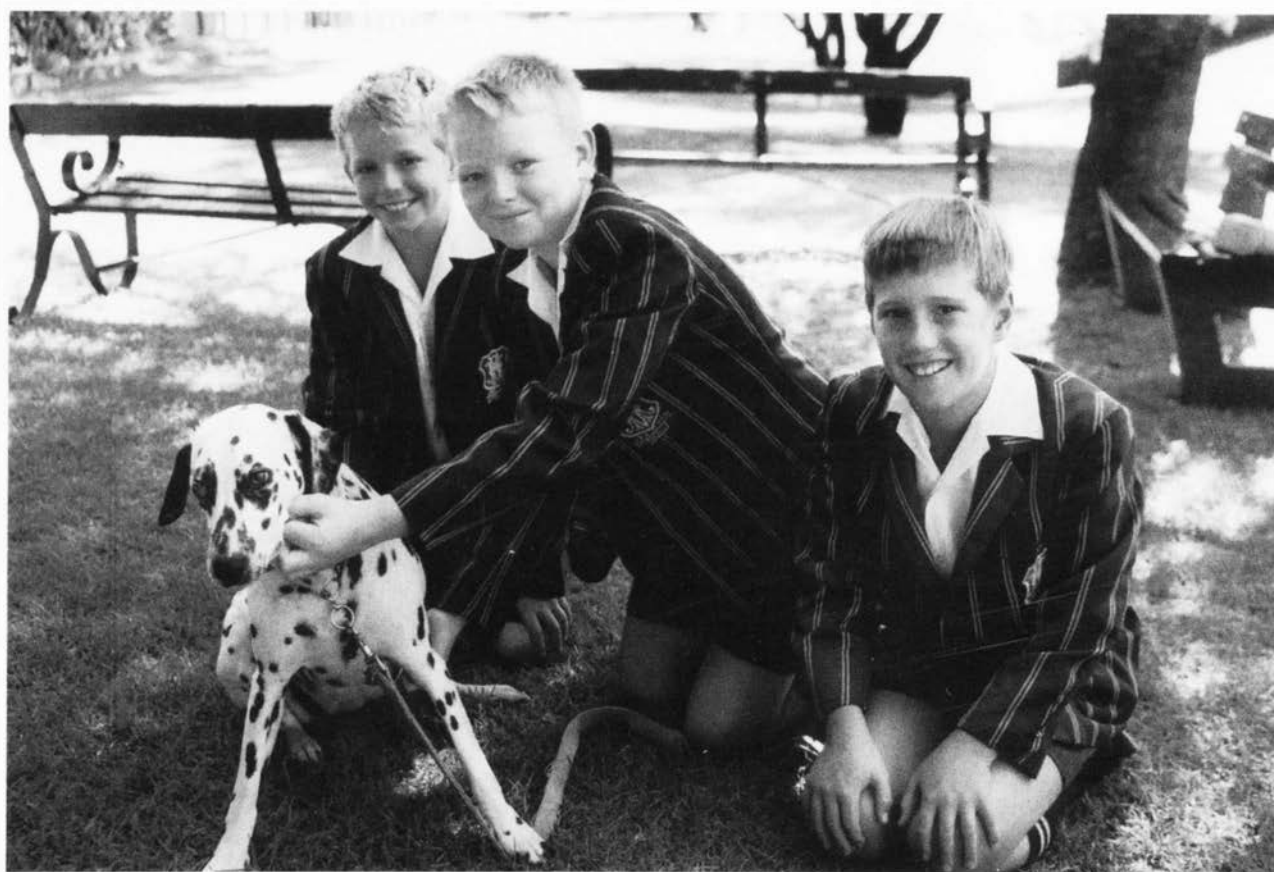

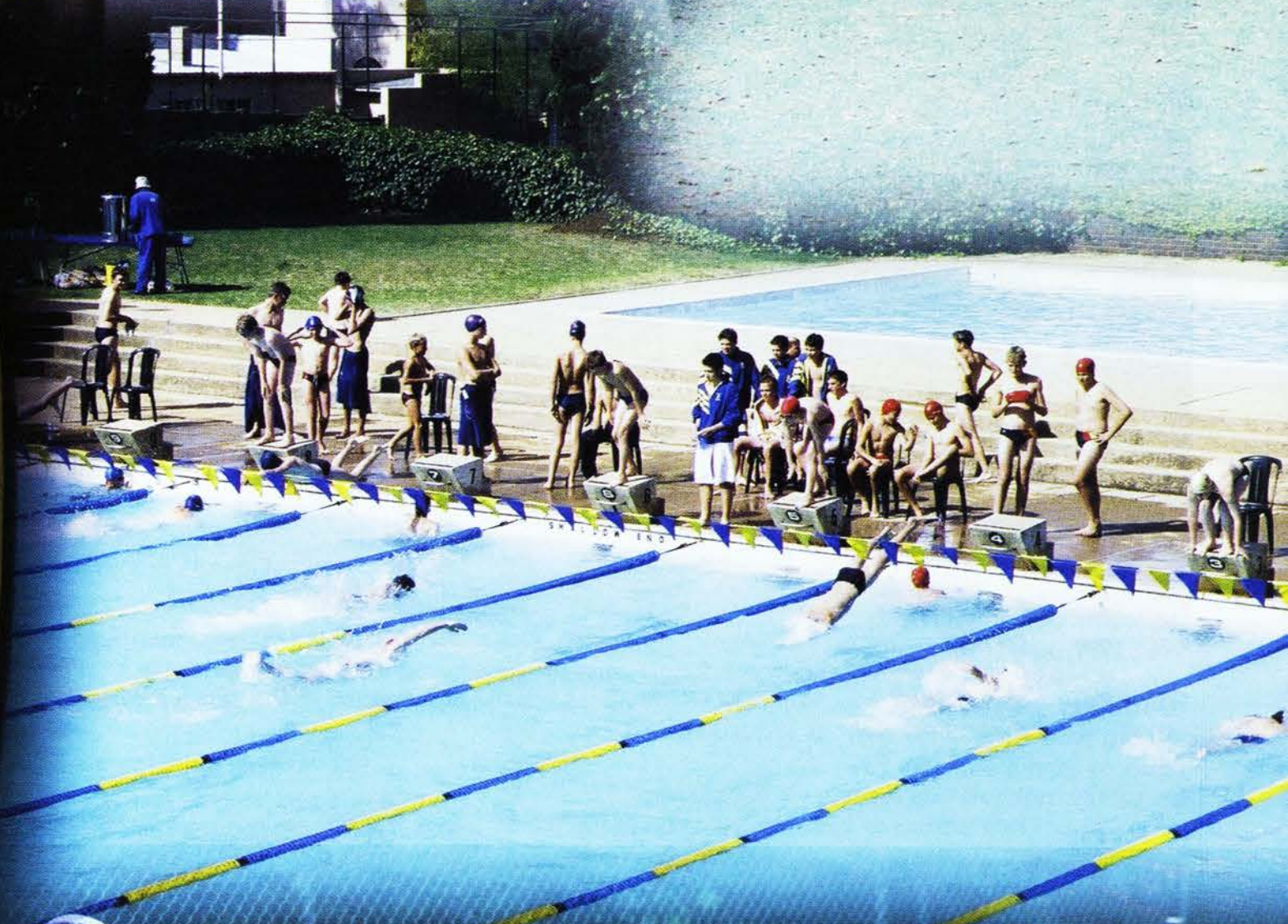

Clifton u11 tour to Gauteng: This tour saw our younger boys come up against some stiff opposition.

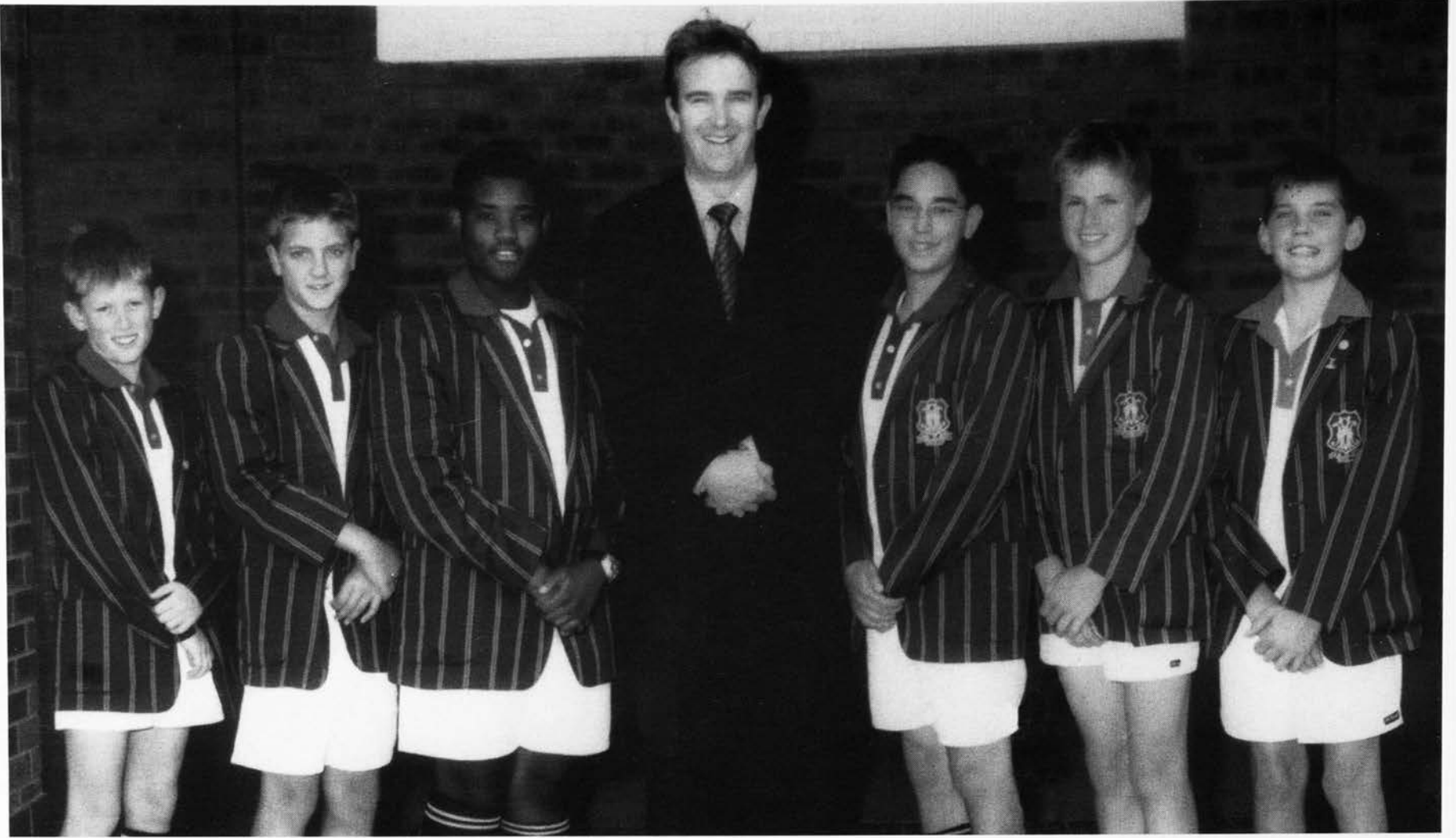
St David's Tennis Festival:
