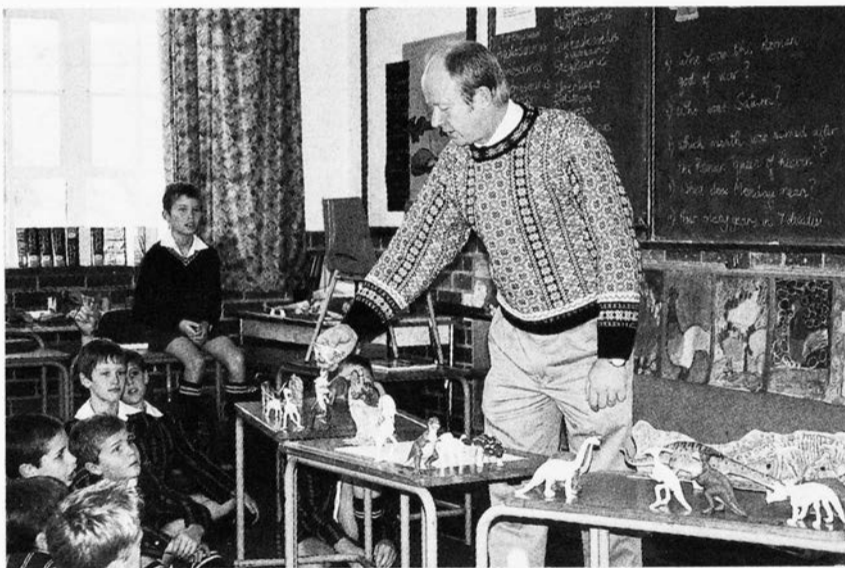

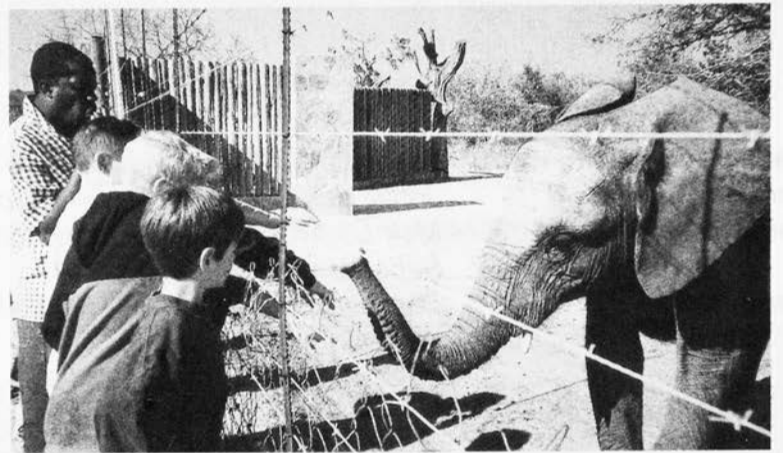

Ben at Auschwitz

"Raus! Raus!! Get out of here. Get out of here!" still rings through my mind as I reflect back on my experiences in World War 11.

Church bells ringing, trucks hooting, guns firing was all I heard that night as two German officers ran into our home with rifles ordering my family to line up next to the trucks outside. My mom and dad went frantic collecting valuables. They were sent to one truck and my brother and I were sent to another. We traveled for two days, non-stop, day and night, with no food or drink and finally came to a stop outside a camp. I was paralyzed as I peered through the canvas and read on a signpost, Auschwitz. Extermination camp rung through my mind. When daylight came German officers slid open the door and all we heard was, "Raus, Raus, get out of here, get out of here."

My brother and I scampered over people who had died from heat and the lack of food and water. We were lined up facing an SS officer with a skull printed on his cap. That is when the selection took place. Left or right was the command. I went left followed by my brother. On the left were mostly children and elderly people. I guessed they went to the gas chambers. I never saw them again. We were then taken to the real showers where we were given striped clothing and wooden shoes. They also tattooed numbers on us. My number was B-3348.

We were taken to our barracks. We were facing the crematorium and gas chambers. We could smell the burning flesh of human bodies. We were woken each morning at 5am and anyone who could not get up was immediately sent to the gas chambers. At lunch we were given soup in a tin which was just plain cold water. Everyday we searched through the soup to see if we could find anything solid to eat. Sometimes we found a potato peel, which we fought over. At dinner we were given a slice of bread and if we were lucky a slice of salami. One day I kept my soup because I was too sick and it was later

found by a German officer and I was taken outside and beaten. Diseases spread quickly and many people just went crazy and died. Each day we were taken to carry beams outside when it was -10 to -15 degrees Celsius.

In 1944 when the Russians started pushing we were moved to a forced labor camp and then to a German concentration camp called Dachau. By then I was just a skeleton. Shortly afterwards the Germans decided it was time to leave. We could hear the war. But we were told to march. We marched about 5 km towards a camp called Alach. Then I fell. I could not walk anymore. The others kept walking. Then I heard gunfire, then screams, then silence..... I survived because I could not walk. Ben lived until 1979 telling this horrific story.

The Holocaust

The holocaust is the name given to a twelve-year period of history when the Nazis persecuted the Jews and other minority groups of people living in Europe. Adolf Hitler disliked these folk and robbed them of their freedom of speech, their gift of life and often punished them for crimes they were not guilty of.

In Germany, the Nazi Party destroyed every Jewish synagogue. In Italy an anti-Jewish law, modeled on German principles regarding racial discrimination, was formed. In Austria they did the same. In Hungary they agreed totally with these laws as they had a background of anti-Jewish policies.

Jewish business was vandalised, all Jewish employees were fired from jobs in local government departments and all Jewish scholars attending universities were told to leave.

Hitler was a born leader and he was extremely manipulative and persuasive. During the holocaust years there was widespread poverty in Germany and the Germans were easily persuaded to believe that these terrible deeds were necessary to create more money for them. With the support of his nation, Hitler was able to fulfil his childhood fantasies of wiping out unwanted races and creating the 'master race'.

Hitler formed concentration camps to provide accommodation for the Jewish people and other minority groups. These concentration camps were under the supervision of a division of the German army called the SS. They were free to conduct any form of torture on these captives. The first concentration camps were established in 1933, for those found guilty of treason or having affiliations with communism or socialism. The Nazis soon enlarged this concept to include minority groups of Jews and gypsies. While in concentration camps the prisoners were forced into hard labour and those who were unable to work were deprived of rations and would often starve to death. Some time later a number of these camps were developed into extermination centres. The most notorious of these being 'Auschwitz' which imprisoned over one hundred thousand people. Gas chambers were installed in the camps and over two thousand people could be gassed at one time. Others died of starvation, medical experiments and disease.

Many Jewish people are still affected by the atrocities committed during the holocaust years. Certain leaders of the SS were taken to trial and a number of them were prosecuted and hung for their actions in the holocaust.

This twelve year period was probably the most brutal and inhumane in our history and hopefully in our future.

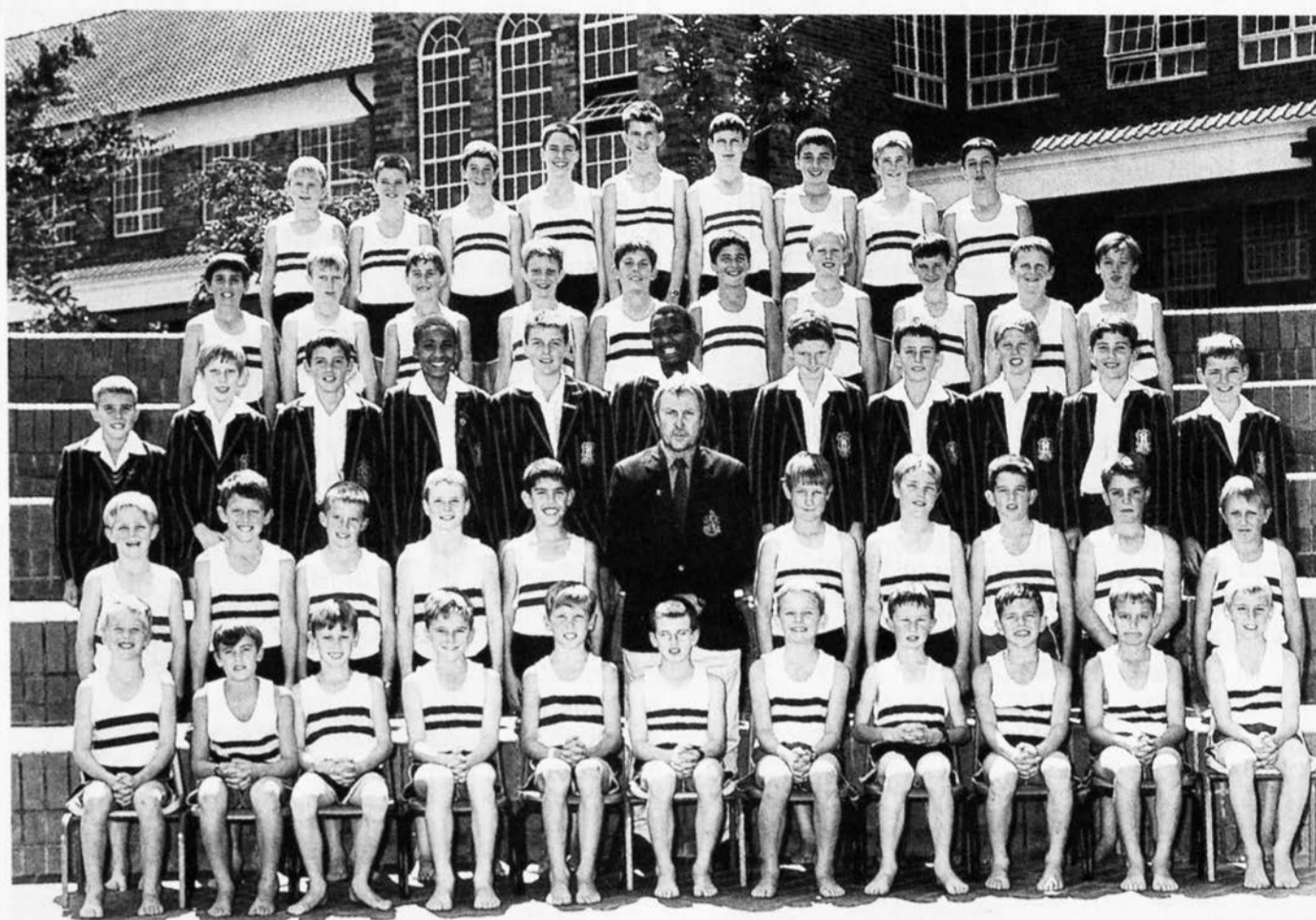

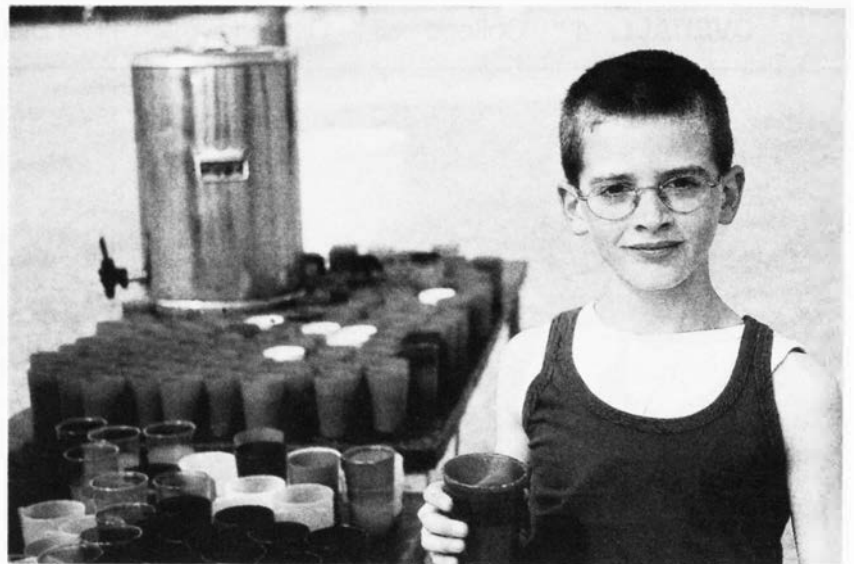

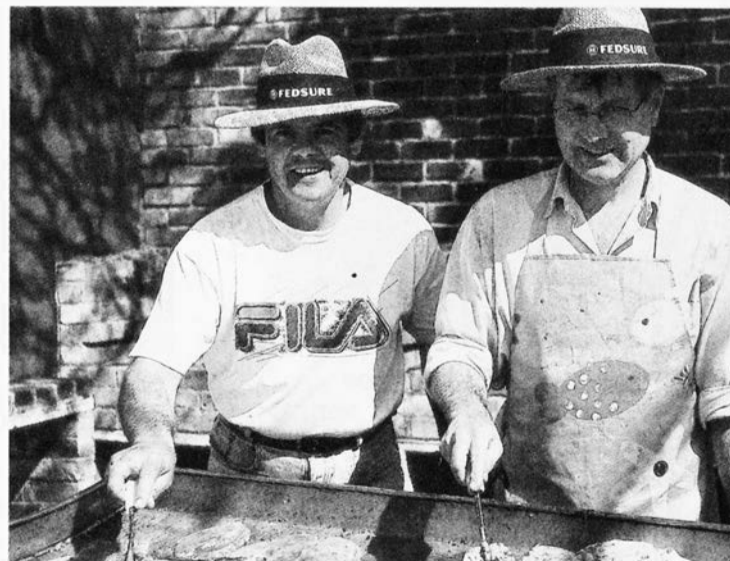

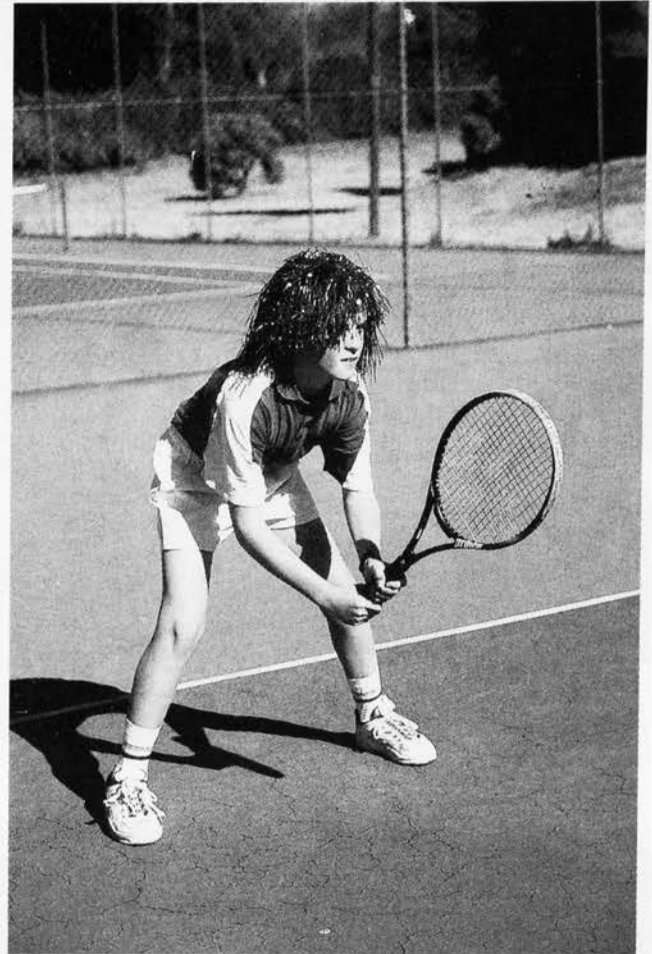
