



HEADMASTER'S REPORT



Good evening, Mr Thiel, our executive headmaster, Dr Bussin, our chairman of the Board, Board members, invited guests, parents, staff and the young men of St David's Preparatory School.

As the year comes to a close at a seemingly ever-increasing pace, I believe it is always an opportune

moment to reflect on our journey of 2018. When we opened our doors in January of this year, we were always full of hope that the year would lead us to unparalleled joys in all sectors of our school. Indeed, the happiness on the faces of our little ones, particularly in the lower grades, when they returned to school, demanded that we enjoyed successes during the year. Of course, one may counter this when one observes all the parents' tears as they dropped off their Grade 00s and 0s for the first time with the realisation that their sons were growing up – although, sometimes I get the feeling that these tears may be tears of joy and excitement.

Schools by their nature should be places of happiness, excitement and exploration, among many other positive emotional reactions. I will never forget the first day when my wife and I dropped off Samuel at Mini Marist for the first time: on his return home that day we asked him how it had all gone, and he turned to us and said: "That was such fun! Please can I go back tomorrow?" At the start of your sons' academic journey we always wish them every success and opportunity to develop their own individual talents and potentials, which will allow them to continue to enjoy success throughout their lives. Hopefully, we choose a school environment that will be the best fit to tease out our sons' potentials.

It is here that I would like all parents to pause and reflect on why they chose this wonderful school. I would hope that this decision was based on a number of significant points of difference directly applicable to us. Foremost should be the fact that we are underpinned by our Catholicity and we allow for each boy to experience a spiritual journey with the living Lord, together with respecting all other religious denominations. Equally, should be the fact that we are a proudly Marist school deeply entrenched within the values of Humility, Modesty and Simplicity. Many schools have wonderful facilities and excellent staff who complement the educational journey. For me, these are not the most important defining points of difference; for me, one of the most critical emotional reactions that must occur when deciding on a school that best fits your son, is that real sense of belonging. If your son feels like he belongs, he will take advantage of all the opportunities available to him that will allow him to reach his potential; more importantly, he will have fun along the way.

Unfortunately, many schools today have been swallowed up by the world's various rat races, and many have lost

the ability to allow for both learners and staff to actually have fun – we are driven by the unrealistic expectations of our 21st century world and we have forgotten that this is merely part of each boy's significant life journey, a journey that will always have unexpected turns. But if we remain true to our core values and allow for that aspect of fun, I believe we will continue to allow our boys to achieve to their own potential and we will remain a school of choice.

Each year I see fine young men leave after Grade 12, and I am exceptionally proud of their humility, openness and, importantly, their willingness to make a difference in life. To me, we are all about developing the scholar, gentleman and sportsman in each boy, housed within a real sense of character development that epitomises humility, modesty and simplicity. Our boys are down to earth, wonderful young men who wear their St David's badge with pride and are grateful for the opportunities that have allowed them to reach their own individual potential. We do not, and should not, pin our successes on results within the classrooms, on the sports fields or in the cultural spaces – we must measure our successes, however, on our ability to send out young men of character who will remain true to themselves, embrace diversity, be humble and, most importantly, make a difference to others in our world – be true Marist disciples that will make our world a better place for all. This, I hope, is why you chose us as a school.

As teachers, we have so many vitally important things to try and inculcate in the lives of our boys. Most importantly, we must allow for our boys to think for themselves. We are in a rapidly changing world with few certainties – fake news has gained more momentum this year than ever before, and if we do not allow for our boys to think for themselves, this concept will continue to gain momentum and arguably lose the adjective of fake-ness. To counter this, I am delighted with our pedagogical shift towards enquiry-based learning, housed within the development of problem solving, collaboration, creativity and communication. Moreover, heading into 2019 we will be reflecting on our current assessment policies. Teaching thus remains an awesome responsibility. It has never been more important for our boys to think independently and not be swept along by sensationalist mass media. Rather than mirroring society, all of us must hold up a mirror to society – revealing its best and its worst, and then we need to be strong enough to stand up for the good and discard the bad. In the end we must seek to open our boys' eyes, encourage them to look, to reflect, to use their minds, to use their hearts and their spirits that they might live lives to the full and be those wonderful beacons of hope for our society. We must never stop learning and never stop thinking.

All the above is impossible without an exceptionally dedicated staff. Our staff have had to struggle with a change in leadership, and yet I am in awe of them. Never have they wavered from loving your boys and allowing them every opportunity to reach their own potential. It is an absolute privilege for me to be in this position and work

with educators who epitomise everything good about our profession, and equally insist that we never compromise on our core Marist values. I thank each and every one of you for remaining that glue that binds our school together, you continue to invest in each one of our boys and you all make a significant difference. In particular, I would like to thank the Prep executive: your continued dedication to our school is remarkable and on a personal note, I thank you most sincerely for welcoming me into your space.

In the sporting arena, I am delighted to report our continued successes in so many different sports: many of our boys have achieved provincial representation, as mentioned in our sports awards ceremony earlier today. More important, however, is the manner in which our boys play their sports: they continue to internalise the concepts of being humble in victory and gracious in defeat; and they seldom compromise on the true meaning of being good sportsmen. I congratulate all those who were recognised this morning, and encourage everyone to play to the best of their ability next year.

Our cultural programme continues to flourish – in particular, our school quiz team regularly challenges for the top position in the inter-schools quiz competition. As we move into 2019 we are committed to creating a more significant cultural footprint that will celebrate our boys' cultural talents.

Our choirs and marimba bands performed admirably throughout the year, and there were a good number of boys who were successful in their theory and practical music exams.

Outreach remains a critical cornerstone of who we are and I am moved by what our boys continue to do under the careful guidance of Mrs Cherie Smith.

Our mini-councillors, Jack Latilla-Campbell and Andrew Kleinhans, served this body with distinction and I thank Miss Meierowitz for her dedication in ensuring our boys remain committed to their duties. I know for a fact that the experience the boys have gained by serving others has enriched their lives and impacted others in so many profound ways.

Sadly, as we reflect on 2018, we have had to say farewell to a number of our staff. The departure of Mr Martin Hewitt after 19 years of service, as well as the departure of Miss Carole Hatfield after 14 years of service, left a significant void in our staff room. In addition, we also bade farewell to Mrs Nikki Rebello. Despite their departures, there is no doubt that all contributed significantly to the lives of our boys, for which they will always be remembered.

Saying farewell is never a happy occasion. Tonight we bid adieu to Mrs T Harris, who will be taking up a post at Marist Linmeyer. Mrs T, you have left behind permanent

footprints encased in love, dedication and commitment; we wish you well on your new adventure and we will certainly miss you. In addition, we say farewell to Mr Vincent Jordaan, who has been with us for the past four years. Mr Jordaan, you have developed significant relationships with our boys, particularly on the sports fields; I know the boys and staff will miss you terribly. We wish you all of the best as you begin your journey at Jeppe High School. And last, but certainly not least, we bid farewell to Miss Karolien van Rooy, who has only been with us this year. Miss Van Rooy, your quiet disposition, yet completely professional conduct, will remain with us for years to come; we wish you well in your future endeavours.

Of course, with the departure of some staff we also welcome a number of new staff to our family next year. Mr Karabo Makola joins us as the HoD of Phys Ed; Mrs Kerry van Niekerk joins us in the Art department; Mrs Sarah Ward in Grade 4; Mrs Ayahsa Mather in Grade 6 Maths, and Mrs Sindy Venizelos joins us in Mini Marist as a Grade 0 teacher.

To the Prep executive, Mr Thiel, the school executive and the Board, I thank you all sincerely: your advice, support and care have allowed us to steady the ship and look for exciting new opportunities, particularly with regard to synergies with our College. Most importantly, I thank my wife and family. As many of you know, my daughter wrote matric this year and despite it being a difficult year, I know that she would not have been able to achieve what she has without my wife – thank you for everything you do for me and our wonderful family.

To you, the parents, I thank you for your continued support of our wonderful school. You make a significant difference to our school, and your unwavering love and care for our boys does not go unnoticed. Our real sense of family and community is bound by your presence and commitment.

And finally, to you, the young men of the Prep School – thank you for being the boys who you are. Your value to this school lies far beyond your academic, sporting or cultural achievements. Your value lies in your uniqueness, your spirit, your love of life and zest you have brought to school each day. I am exceptionally proud of each one of you, and I have no doubt that you will all remain true Marist brothers and achieve to your own individual potential. RELIGION: PREP CO-WORKERS' REPORT

As part of our St David's Prep Outreach, the Grades 6 and 7 boys regularly visit the Princess Alice Adoption Home (PAAH), based in Westcliff. PAAH is a temporary place of safety that provides 24-hour residential care to babies who have been consented for adoption, abandoned or, occasionally, removed from family care.

On our visits with the boys, we do odd jobs around the house. For example, cleaning toys, tidying the garden, packing away groceries, nappies and donations of clothes. We also have contact time with the toddlers, playing with and entertaining them before moving in to the nursery, where we are able to assist with feeding time for the babies. It is a very rewarding afternoon and the boys always come away feeling like they have made a difference.

We held a successful nappy drive earlier in 2018 and the home was very grateful for all that we were able to donate. Through our involvement with the home, one of our St David's families made a very generous donation of AstroTurf for the gardens and much-needed insect screens on the windows. We are extremely grateful for their generosity.

This year we have struggled to get the number of boys who we would like to attend due to conflicts with the sporting calendar. We hope to be able to address this problem going forward into 2019.

Over the past year I have visited Princess Alice Adoption Home as part of the St David's Prep outreach programme. The home is for children who have been abandoned and have nobody to care for them. We can go about once or twice a month, on Thursday afternoons. The St David's boys are in Grades 6 and 7.

The home has given me a chance to help the underprivileged and in my time there I have met different children with whom I have played. The home has needed all the help we can give. Often, when we go, we help with

chores such as window cleaning, tidying and feeding the smaller children. However, these chores rarely last longer than 20 minutes, so there is always something new to do.

The reason I find it important is because one of the Marist pillars is "love of work". This means more than getting an "A" for schoolwork, it means embracing the opportunity to work for others. Another pillar is "in the way of Mary" and what better way to be Marist than try to be like Mary with children who have no parents?

While on a visit I met a boy to whom I became particularly attached. I was delighted to find that a week later he was adopted. I was so happy for him. I have seen eight children adopted in the time that I have been there.

We work at the Sandton branch of the SPCA in Marlboro, assisted by its education officer, Ms Wilna Lamb. It is an extremely well-run branch, with dedicated staff and volunteers. The boys have a formal training session on their first visit, consisting of animal care, treatment of disease and the adoption process.

Once the boys have received the necessary training, they interact with the animals. There are dogs, cats, rabbits,

chickens, goats and pigs. The boys wash the dogs, brush the cats, help with feeding, and spend time socialising the dogs and cats. Socialising is very important, as these animals need human contact in order to be rehomed.

The SPCA is always in need of old towels for drying the dogs, and leads for taking the dogs for walks. We had a very successful towel and blanket drive this year, which came in most useful during our cold winter months. Many thanks to all who contributed to this worthwhile cause. We also donated dog and cat food, which was collected on Civvies Day.

Both the teachers and boys have so enjoyed working with the animals, and will continue to do so in the years to come. Once again, we surprised all the SPCA staff with a big box of biscuits for Christmas, to show our support for the incredible work that they do with all the animals.

This year I was approached by Sandhurst Preparatory to have a quiz for Grade 3 learners, along with Sandton Preparatory and St Teresa's School. With the assistance of Mrs Dehaloo, we conducted the quiz using Kahoot, which is a quiz app.

The pupils enjoyed completing the quiz on iPads. The first and second quizzes proved to be such a success that we were asked if we could host one once a term.

It was a wonderful opportunity for the boys and girls to mix with learners from other schools, and to participate in mixed teams.

St David's boys donated books that they had finished reading or had outgrown to our Nelson Mandela Day outreach. The response from our boys was overwhelming,

and we managed to collect many boxes of amazing books that will go into HA Jack Primary's newly restored library.

The Gauteng public library holds reading quizzes each year for learners throughout the province. There are two quizzes, Story Skirmish for Grades 4 and 5 learners, and Battle of the Books for Grades 6 and 7 learners.

During our Reading Week in September, the boys dressed up as their favourite book characters on Character Day. I invited author and journalist Hamilton Wende to read extracts of his two *Arabella* books to the Grades 3 and 4 boys.

Siseko Ntondini, from the book *Confluence: Beyond the River*, spoke to the Senior Primary boys about his life: from leaving his rural home in the Cape to living in the city, and how he became a successful canoeist. The boys were fascinated by his story, and were encouraged by Ntondini to follow their dreams and to believe in themselves.

It has been a busy year, filled with a variety of activities for our boys to get involved and be encouraged to read.

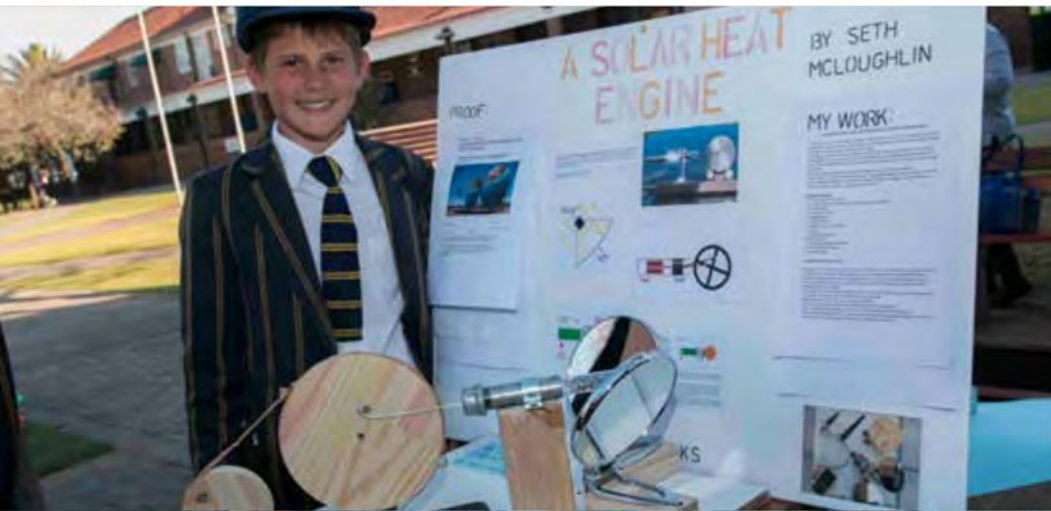
MICHAEL JACK

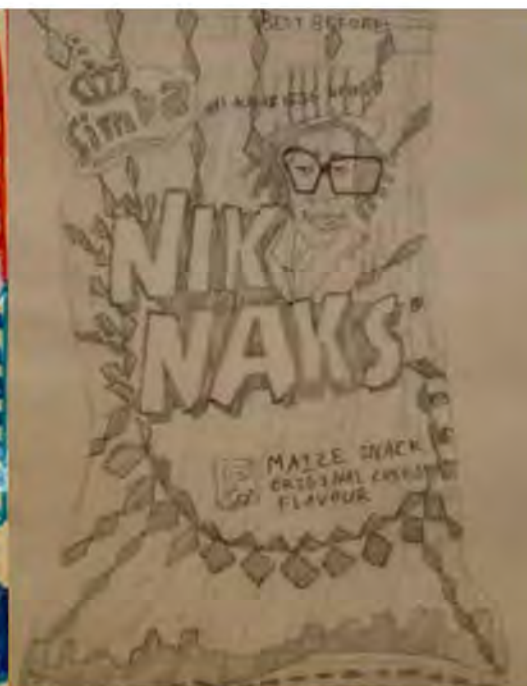
