



the extent to which our former students contribute to the welfare of their fellowmen, raise their contemporaries to higher levels of civilised living, make this world a better and happier place in which to live.





## SOME OF THE HIGHLIGHTS OF OUR FIRST TWENTY-FIVE YEARS

- 1940 Building operations commenced. First buildings erected were the present Std. 1-3 classrooms. Founder of the College, Bro. Osmond, did much to overcome wartime difficulties.
- 1941 Opening of Grades and Standards One and Two.
- 1943 Official opening by His Lordship Bishop David O'Leary; Two foundation stones laid by Gen. J. J. Pienaar, Administrator of the Transvaal. The Boarding Departments were completed for the school term and on the first night there was a full complement of 176 boarders (all of them Juniors!) School roll over 200.
- 1944 Rev. Bro. Urban appointed Headmaster; First Swimming Gala and first Athletic Meeting.
- 1945 School roll over 300; Mr. Asher Swede presented the "Owen Swims" trophy for the house which won the Inter-House competition in all the major sports.

- 1946 Science Laboratory opened.
- 1947 The College Chapel was furnished in time for the first boys' Retreat; Two tennis courts laid; Rugby started in the Senior School; Competitive Cricket started; First Prefect scrolls awarded; First Inter-College Athletic Meeting against Observatory—Observatory won by a narrow margin.
- 1948 First Matric year; First Honours blazers awarded; First College Dance; First Gala against Observatory; Levelling of top fields; Fourth School House proclaimed "College House"; Debating Society founded with the name "Inanda Forum": First Cricket Tour to Durban, beat St. Henry's; E. Hulse awarded Provincial Blazer.
- 1949 Won first game of 1st XV standard against Parktown; E. Barale awarded Provincial Blazer.
- 1950 Rev. Bro. Edwin appointed Headmaster.
- 1951 Sodality of the Blessed Virgin established; New Athletic Track opened; Ladies Committee founded; School Roll over 400.


- 1953 Concrete stands overlooking Oval completed; I. Kerley awarded Provincial Blazer.

- 1958 School roll over 500; Operetta "Pirates of Penzance" produced.
- 1959 First Rugby victory over Observatory; M. Funston awarded Provincial Blazer.
- 1960 Rev. Bro. Anthony appointed Headmaster; Science Club founded; Parent Teachers Association established; Cycling Club founded; First Old Boys of the College receive the habit of Marist Brothers in Australia.
- 1961 Six new classrooms erected for Junior School; Manual Arts Block erected; Two classrooms added to Senior School; Art block erected in Junior School; Photographic Club founded; Torchlight Procession in honour of the Blessed Virgin held at the end of May, after outdoor Mass.



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

This year the Altar Boys' Society really got on its feet and by the end of the year most of the Catholics in the Boarding Department should be able to serve Holy Mass.



## The Sodality of Our Lady

"Men may rise on stepping stones Of their dead selves to higher things."

This is the lesson insisted upon in the Sodality. As soon as we consider ourselves 'good enough' our progress is halted - even to the extent that we are much more likely to slip back than to stand still. The war to arrive at self-matery must never cease to be

Praising the Sodality comes too perilously near self-praise. Everybody will admit that it serves a useful and purposeful end — that without its influence St. David's would be

poorer in driving power for good.

Unfortunately, we were without the assistance of a Spiritual Director this year, for it is usually under his direction that the Sodality leaps along the 'way of life'. Left to our own devices we are rather phlegmatic in spiritual matters and are content to crawl.

On August 5th, after many months of probation, 17 boys pledged themselves to Mary

and were consecrated.

During the year: The Bishop's Lental Appeal received tremendous support (the amount realized R140, was very good considering that nobody was forced to make a sacrifice); monetary assistance was given to the Carmelite nuns of Rivonia and a group of

French nuns; literally thousands of used-stamps were collected (ultimately to help in the education of more priests); a social gathering was enjoyed at Maryvale Convent in April; the council met the Pioneers of Rosebank Convent for an afternoon's discussion in August.

Useful and practical innovations, introduced this year, include a reduction on yearly subscriptions and a new weekly 'secret-bag'; the appointment of two Recorders (B. Turnbull and P. Young); the appointment of a Reader (P. Noble); the showing of religious films; the introduction of a neater and smaller Sodality medal (as opposed to the old, large, aluminium medal on a Blue ribbon).

The Prefect of Sodality expresses his sincere thanks to Father Mulligan the college chaplain, for his assistance during the year; to F. Tinsley for looking after the Sodality notice-board and to G. Lindegger, M. Beaumont, A. Walker and N. de la Cour who on more than one occasion stood up to give a talk.



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
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## Junior Sodality

THIS year has been a very active one for the Junior Sodality. We started off the year with a very successful campaign to assist the poor. This was called Operation Charity. The campaign lasted eight days and 48 boxes of food and clothing were collected. Each day two members were sent to each class to collect the donations. At a special Mass to honour Blessed Marcellin Champagnat and to give thanks for the Silver Jubilee of the College, the food and clothing were blessed at the Offertory. These gifts were then distributed to the poor at the Orlando East Mission Station. The Africans of Soweto were very grateful, and it was a valuable experience for us to see the poverty of our 'next-door neighbours'.

It was decided by Brother Patrick and the members of the Sodality that a project book be made on the "Life of Christ". Each boy has selected a topic and is preparing a few pages that will go up to make this book.

Soon after the beginning of the third term a "Dedication Mass" was held in the College Chapel for the Junior Sodalists. The celebrant was Father McGough from Braamfontein. This Mass was offered for the success of the Junior Sodality and Father delivered a very interesting sermon. Subsequently it was decided at the request of the members that a Sodality Mass be held once a month. Father

McGough has kindly consented to celebrate this Mass and spontaneously offered to hear Confessions for half an hour beforehand each time. Many thanks Father!.

During the month of May a competition was organised in the Junior School to arouse enthusiasm for the erection of May Altars. This competition was arranged by the members of the Sodality who also provided a small reward for each member of the winning class.

A large glass cased notice-board made by Eric Rostin and paid for by the members, has been erected in the Junior School for the purpose of Religious Information.

In the third term several discussions were held along the lines of the Y.C.W. 'SEE-JUDGE-ACT'. On one occasion when behaviour at parties was being discussed, reference was made to the opinion of girls. To find out just what the girls thought a questionnaire was sent to Rosebank Convent. We are very grateful to the girls who filled in this questionnaire and gave us some idea of what they really think!





IT was a great privilege to have been elected as Head Boy of St. David's for the year 1966.


With the wonderful help and great co-operation of the other prefects, this year has been


The following Sunday supporting the same

#### TALENT CONTEST



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#### BEST SPEAKERS COMPETITION

G. Lindegger's Prizewinning speech "How to Sell Yourself to Others!"

IN the past few decades there have been extensive developments in science and many other walks of life. Consequently the number of occupations open for man to fill has greatly increased. In the last half century alone, the variety of occupations has almost trebled.

However, although there is now such a vast variety of occupations, varying from postman to company director, the chief occupation still lies in the art of selling.

The art of selling is classified into four categories.

1st: The door to door salesman — who is probably the most acquainted with domestic life.

2nd: Shop assistant — who deals with business and domestic life.

3rd: Industrial representative — who deals in the line of technical equipment.

Lastly: International salesman — who sells the latest in his country's ideas to foreign countries.

But if we analyse the subject in more detail, much to our surprise most occupations depend either directly or indirectly on selling.

One of the most significant divisions in selling lies in the art of advertising. A vast number of people are occupied in advertising on radio and television alone, as well as in newspapers, films and magazines. It is a known fact that thousands of millions of pounds are spent annually in advertising especially in novelties and attractions.

What is the key to success of these various salesmen?

Since the door to door salesman and the shop salesman have very similar paths to success let us regard them as one.

Almost undoubtedly the door to door salesman with charming personality is well on the road to success. Originality also plays a vital part in selling and to illustrate this we have the story of the salesman selling Ace washing machines, and upon coming on a certain lady the conversation went as follows:

Salesman: Madam, can I interest you in a

revolutionary washing machine

Customer: I'm not interested

Salesman: Nowhere in the world will you find

a machine like this

Customer: I'm not interested

Salesman: Madam . . . this machine will add

20 years to your life

Customer: Bring it straight in.

The main qualifications other than these are sufficient stamina, unlimited patience, but most important of all is the ability to talk so well that you can convince an Eskimo that he can't live without a refrigerator in mid-winter.

To an industrial salesman personality counts little. He requires the ability to talk and a very sound knowledge of the mechanism and technical advantages of his product.

Perhaps the international salesman has the easiest task of all, because he does not require any personality, he does not have to be able to convince his customer (which is a foreign country) on his product, for every country wants to be on top with the latest and most revolutionary ideas.

The trend and theme of our modern world is "BE YOUR OWN BOSS". This is very easily achieved by merely becoming a salesman. Some of to-day's most successful men started this way.

What are the advantages in this occupation?

- (1) You are your own boss.
- (2) You can work exactly when you feel like it.
- (3) You can declare for yourself a public holiday if you have a hang-over.

Let us consider the life of the door to door salesman more closely i.e., techniques, difficulties, and the types of people he is inclined to come across.

Experience of salesmen has shown time and time again that the most successful salesman is the salesman who looks less like a salesman. As said by a certain experienced salesman,

"If you are recognised before the door, you stand no chance".

Now as everything, the salesman has his disadvantages as well as advantages. Perhaps the salesman's chief difficulty is being able to face up to the various types he meets. A perfect example of this is a picture frame salesman who comes upon a certain lady. She listens to everything with great interest, invites him inside, shows him dozens of family photographs with a running commentary on each and discusses the proposition in full detail. Then after three-quarters of an hour she says . . . "The frames are very nice, and the prices very reasonable. I would just love to have one but we could not possibly afford anything like that at the moment. You see we have just bought a new radio on the hire purchase, and the fridge needs repairing, and what with the price of food nowadays I do not know how anyone manages. Besides I could never buy anything like that without letting my husband know and . . . !

This is where the salesman feels like folding his sample case, and stealing away, fighting an impulse to utter some bitter remarks. The housewife who says "If you are selling anything, I do not want it thanks very much" is the soul of kindness by comparison.

Most door to door salesman have a strong fear for dogs and as said by a famous salesman "If dog is man's best friend, then salesmen are not included in the human species".

Finally we have looked upon selling as the exchange of goods for money, but let us look at it from a different angle. As said by Edward Wiggan a famous doctor "The most important thing in life is not the ability to sell goods, but the ability to sell yourself". When he quoted this he referred to everyone, not only salesmen and he simply means "many people have great talents but they do not know how to sell them". A typical example of this was Mozart — one of the greatest musicians that ever lived, but 90% of the world has never heard of him. The reason is simple, he had the goods or talents but he did not know how to sell them to the public. There are hundreds of examples of modern people selling themselves to others. So in conclusion always remember the statement by Edward Wiggan "the key to success for all people is not to be able to sell their goods to others, but themselves to others".

Below and on the following page is the speech made by B. Dorrestein at the Chamber of Mines Speech Contest. Twenty-four schools, both English- and Afrikaansspeaking took part and in the final result St. David's was placed second.

DIE lewe is 'n misterie, 'n onoplosbare misterie, 'n geheim, wat deur niemand uitgelê kan word nie.

Waarom haat die een en bemin die ander? Waarom is die een sterk en die ander swak? Waarom is die een bevoorreg en die ander onbevoorreg? Waarom?

Al wat ons weet is dat ons lewens deur ons gevoelens, sterktes, swaktes, emosies, liefde en as ons so ongelukkig is, ons haat beïnvloed word. Ja, ons lewe net en beleef.

Wat beteken die lewe vir u, vir my, vir die wêreld, vir ons almal? Hoe sal die wêreld getref word as ons sterwe?

Die lewe sal nog steeds voortgaan, net soos die branders onversteund op die strand neer-klots. Ja, ons is net soos 'n brander. Ons begin klein, ons strewe en volhard, en ons sterwe met ons onreikbare doel in sig. Sommige branders het 'n hoër kruin as die ander. Sommige beland op rotse, en ander spoel saggies oor die sand. Sommige is meer indrukwekkend as ander.

Die mensdom bly onpeilbaar voordat dit saamgestel word deur 'n legkaart van karakters en gevolglik bestaan uit die swakes en sterkes, siekes en gesondes, dapperes en lafhartiges, luies en flukses, somberes en opgewektes, vriendelikes en haters.

Waarom is almal verskillend? Sou nie so veel van die stryd in die wêreld verwyder word as ons almal ewe sterk, slim en aantreklik was nie? Maar ag, dan sou die lewe ook nie meer so interessant, verwagtingsvol, vry en opgewek wes nie. Nou is veel meer aan ons eie inisiatief oorgelaat.

Die lewe word beslis wat ons self daarvan

maak. Ons het 'n aantal talente en nou is dit aan ons oorgelaat om hulle so goed moontlik te ontwikkel.

As ons aanhoudend strewe om ons ambisies te verwesenlik sal ons 'n sukses van ons lewens maak. Die man, wat volhard, is gelukkig en tevrede. Maar een besonderheid moet voor oë gehou word, en dit is dat ons strewes nie hoër as ons vermoërs mag wees nie, anders word ons tot 'n neerslagtige, pessimistiese en teleurgestelde persoon gedryf.

Die wêreld is besmet met haat en vrees, maar sonder die liefde, uitgebeeld deur die apostel Paulus aan die Korinthiërs:

"Al sou ek die tale van mense en engele spreek

en die liefde nie hê nie, dan het ek 'n klinkende metaal geword of 'n luidende simbaal'', word dit dus duidelik, dat liefde ons belangrikste behoefte is.

Om te lewe is om te hê. Sonder liefde is ons bestaan sinneloos, onvriendelik, bitter en niks werd nie. In almal se lewe is daar iemand of iets wat ons lief het. Iemand of iets waaraan ons daagliks dink en wat ons harte met vrede en hoop vir die toekoms vul. As dit van ons weggevat word, dan verdwyn 'n deel van die lig van die lewe, en verloor dit sy betekenis, totdat ons hart deur 'n ander liefde oorrompel word.

Hoe kan 'n mens haat as dit soveel makliker is om lief te hê? Waarom is ons hedendaagse wêreld aangetas deur 'n oorlogsugtige strydende massa? Waarom is dit nie 'n vrolike, jubelende mansdom nie? Waarom is die lewe so vol armoede en haat? Dit is omdat so baie mense nie weet wat dit is om lief te hê, en omdat hulle die ander die liefde en vrede nie gun nie.

Om te lewe is om lief te hê, en in die woorde van Paulus:

"Die liefde is lankmoedig en vriendelik; die liefde is nie jaloers nie; word nie verbitterd nie; is nie bly oor ongeregtigheid nie; maar is bly met die waarheid". Is die lewe nie die waarheid nie? Is die liefde dan nie die grootste gebod nie?


New cadets in 'C' Company were introduced to army discipline with a course in basic foot drill. The inevitable akwardness of the first few parades soon disappeared under the guid-







# RHODES SCHOLAR




After we have spent some time there, we can hire a glass bottomed boat and as we idle along we see through the glass bottom all the splendours of the reef.




Benedict House won the meeting with College coming a close second. Athletic scrolls

honour of presenting the prizes.




#### Inter-School League

SECOND TENNIS TEAM



A special word of thanks is extended to Bro. Michael who has taken a keen interest in the tennis activities.



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
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## **SWIMMING**


