
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

Message from the Headmaster





Religious Notes

This year we contined the pattern of religious practices that have become an established part of the life of the boys at St David' College. Opportunities for Confession and Class Masses were organised on a regular basis. The monthly Marist Family Masses were always well attended and the weekly assemblies have also become established expressions of community worship at the College.

During Lent this year the Senior Boys were given the opportunity to accept responsibility for their own participation in the Bishop's Lenten Appeal. Each boy received a batch of envelopes at Mass on Ash Wednesday and returned an envelope each week with his offering at the weekly Lenten Mass. While the Catholic Boys were at Mass, the non-Catholics assembled in the Auditorium where a Lenten Service was conducted by a visiting minister. We were blessed to have Rev S Pitts, T Harrod, I Macintosh and M Waite on successive Thursday mornings during Lent.

This year we celebrated the feast of the Founder of the Marist Brothers, Blessed Marcellin Champagnat, on Wednesday, June 6. Holy Mass was concelebrated by Father Benedict Mulder, O.P., an Old Boy of our Rondebosch College, Father Harry Wilkinson, our Parish Priest and Father Albert Plesters, our College Chaplain. In his sermon, Father Mulder urged us all to become aware of the false gods and idols that were leading people away from the true God. The text of Father Mulder's sermon appears elsewhere in this magazine.

During July we were very happy to congratulate our Chaplain, Father Albert Plesters, who had been made a Monsignor. Another priest to be made a Monsignor was Father Killoran, an old boy of our Koch Street and Uitenhage Colleges. Congratulations Father Killoran.

Early in the third term the boys from Standard 7-10 followed programmes conducted by members of the Diocesan Family and Community Bureau. These programmes included films and discussions that developed the beauty God intended for sex, love, dating and marriage and also on pregnancy and the subsequent pressures to procure an abortion. As sex education is the basic right and duty of parents the members of the Bureau offered these programmes to the parents in the evenings.

Four boys from the College received the Sacrament of Confirmation from His Lordship, Bishop Reginald Orsmond in the Rosebank Parish Church on Saturday, September 8. A few weeks prior to this, the boys joined the Parish Confirmation Group and the Confirmation class from Rosebank Convent for a special Confirmation preparation retreat conducted by Father Johan Strydom. Our four confirmandi were Brent Cathrall, Jason Goodall, Mark Greene and Timothy Robinson.

A group known as Marist Co-Workers has been established at the College. The adult group was formed by Brother Anthony. Mr Tom McFadden is responsible for coordinating the efforts of the boys. In establishing Marist Co-Worker groups, the Brothers hope to provide the means for a truly spiritual dimension to be available to all those interested in helping to promote the work of the Marist Brothers and especially their work amongst the poor and the disadvantaged in our South African society. This year marks the end of the direct influence of the Brothers on the staff of the School. This means, of course, that the role and responsibility of the lay members of staff takes on a new dimension and importance. The Marist Brothers are confident that this responsibility is being accepted by the lay members of the staff and that the College will realize the aims and accomplish the objective of the Catholic School which are summarised in this from "To Teach as Jesus did", paragraph 106:

More than any other programme of education sponsored by the Church, the Catholic School has the opportunity and obligation to be unique, contemporary and oriented to Christian service:


UNIQUE because it is distinguished by its commitment to the threefold purpose of Christian education and by its total design and operation which foster the integration of religion with the rest of learning and living.

CONTEMPORARY because it enables students to address with Christian insight the multiple problems which face individuals and society today.

All those involved in a Catholic school: parents, pastors, teachers, administrators and students: must earnestly desire to make it a community of faith which is indeed "living, conscious and active".

Champagnat Day

(Sermon given by Fr Benedict Mulder O.P. to staff and pupils at the Champagnat Day Mass at Inanda on 6th June 1984).

Some years ago I was working in the Springs area. One day when I was driving past the Far East Rand Hospital, I gave a lift to a tramp. To my delight, he was, like myself, a Marist Old Boy. I can't remember the Marist school he had been to but we spent the short trip to Springs talking about the various Brothers we had suffered under. When I mentioned this to the other Fathers at lunch that day, one of them mentioned that in the history of Johannesburg there was a time when the top man in the legal business, perhaps an Attorney General, was a Marist Old Boy ... as also was the top racketeer!

I have always claimed that the Marist schools somehow build up character. And when we read about Blessed Marcellin Champagnat, we learn that he had character, and that he was quite a character. Instead of accepting and relaxing into the relatively secure position of a Parish Priest, he left it all to start the Marist Brothers. His enthusiasm for what he had in mind was so contagious that one young man who came to "rescue" his younger brother from the clutches of Fr Champagnat, actually stayed on himself to become a Marist Brother. I am sure that if Blessed Marcellin were here today, looking especially at the situation in South Africa, he would have no difficulty in persuading us to follow him in answering what needs to be done here.

In his day, he looked round him at what had happened to the people in the years after the French Revolution. He noticed how poor the people were, not only very poor in material things but especially poor in their knowledge of the true God. He saw that to improve the value of human life, he would have to start with the young. In spite of strong opposition through criticism, threats and great bitterness from those who did not see the needs as he saw them, he started the Marist Brothers Society.

I wonder what he would say if he were to look at our society in South Africa today, looking at what makes people live the way they do. He would see that there are many forces driving people, often against their will and often without their knowing it, driving them away from the true God towards what are really false gods. And these false gods, these idols are hidden behind a smokescreen of propaganda, keeping people in the dark, keeping them in ignorance of what is really happening.

Let me mention only some of these false gods, these idols: The idol of POWER AND MIGHT which teaches us to believe that what we have must be defended from others by force, even military force, to stop others - even kill them but at all costs to stop them from sharing what we have. Do you know that in the world today, 17 billion dollars are spent on armaments, and in making armies stronger than other armies, every two weeks; and what they spend in two weeks to make one more powerful than others is enough to feed all the starving in the world for a whole year? Then there is the IDOL OF PROGRESS, especially ECONOMIC PROGRESS which so often brings to many people only misery and suffering. Even now it is being planned to spend 27 to 30 million rands in celebrating a hundred years of progress in Johannesburg. And who will benefit from the centenary celebrations? Will it benefit the thousands of people here in South Africa who are living in misery and dying of starvation? Somebody wrote a letter to "The Star" recently suggesting that we should commemorate the Johannesburg centenary by building a ten-metrehigh golden calf on top of the Hillbrow Tower!

There is the *IDOL OF LAW AND ORDER* which ignores all human rights and dignity by detaining people for days, months, even for years and sometimes torturing them, and then letting them go without even an apology all in the name of Law and Order!

And what about the *IDOL OF A BETTER STANDARD OF LIVING* which, if we look at it carefully, can only be served by those who knowingly or unknowingly succeed in exploiting the ignorant, the defenceless, those who have no status or standing.

There is also the false god of WESTERN CAPITALISTIC CULTURE which has as its high priests, the multinational corporations, with their purpose of making profit. True, this culture has brought about some fantastic technological advancement, but at what cost to man's spiritual life, bringing misery to labourers, dehumanising them, often treating them as animals, regardless of their rights and dignity as images of the true God, and loved by God.

Have you heard of the *IDOL CALLED PRODUCTIVITY*? You must learn to be productive, otherwise there is no place for you in society, you will be rejected and looked down upon, just like beggars and tramps.

And lastly, the anti-Christ of PERSONAL ADVANCE-MENT AND INDIVIDUALISM which teaches us to think first of ourselves, love yourself first, and work and learn so that you will be better than others.

I am sure that Blessed Marcellin, with his clear spiritual vision, would not be blinded by all the propaganda, the smokescreen, deliberately created to mislead people away from the truth. He would recognise these many false gods around us in South Africa. Perhaps already they are infiltrating their ideas even into our own schools. He would start asking himself questions. He would ask: how is it possible in a Christian country that some can buy houses for hundreds of thousands of rands, while many, many other people have to live in miserable shacks? How is it possible the some people can buy expensive cars, perhaps even more than one, have swimming pools, perhaps have house at the coast, while thousands of people can't even buy food for their starving children. It is a fact that every year about 50,000 young children die of starvation in South Africa. Blessed Marcellin would notice that in some schools children have pocket money, transport, accessories, such as radios, which are worth more than their domestics earn working for them; that in the poor areas schoolchildren faint in class because they are hungry, in some of his schools children spend tens of rands on sweets and entertainment.

Fr. Marcellin would certainly realise that many Christians caught up in what is jokingly called the "rat race", are not themselves to blame, but he would feel that something had to be done. The "rat race" is not a joke. It is evil and is leading people away from love of their neighbour and from the true God. In his day he found that the people were ignorant of the true God, they were God-starved people. Today we have a similar situation. What is needed here in South Africa is to bring the true God back to all people, the true God hidden from our eyes by the massive smokescreen in which we are being misguided. Like he did before, Fr Marcellin would appeal to young men to follow him in this mission, this crusade of freeing people, especially the young from the unhappy, godless situation in which they find themselves. He would look for young men to offer themselves for the sake of bringing Peace and Justice into the world, to give back to all people their dignity as human beings, as images of God. Fr Marcellin would call young men to his Society of Mary,

young men who, with him, would be prepared to be rejected, criticised and even threatened for the sake of the Kingdom of God, where there will be no poverty or riches, because all will share instead of hoarding, so that "each will receive according to his needs"... a Kingdom where there will be no oppressed or oppressor because all will be real brothers and sisters, loving each other and caring for each other and not trying to be greater and stronger than others - all will be members of the one family of God. Only in that Kingdom will we find true peace, justice and happiness.

Thank you God for having given us Blessed Marcellin; thank you God for the Society of Mary, the Marist Brothers. May they grow in strength and numbers, because the harvest is great and the reapers, the educators, are so few.

Under the guidance of Mr McFadden, a religious group known as the Marist Co-Workers was formed. This group consists of boys in the senior school from Std 6 - 9. We work alongside the Churches in helping the aged and underprivileged of our country. The main aim of the group, which was formed in August 1984, is to help others to help themselves and at the same time to gain as much experience as possible. The projects which this group aim to undertake, include fund raising for the poor, the blind and the deaf and financial help for the aged, help for the mission station in Kuruman and support and friendship to our fellow pupils at school.

It is my hope that this group grows from strength to strength under the guidance of the staff at St David's and that it is blessed with the continued support of the boys in the school.

Visit to the Mission Stations

On July 27 we set out for Kuruman with a Kombi full of food, clothing, medication and money collected throughout the year by Marist Boys.

We arrived in Kuruman at about 13h00 and went to see 'Die Oog' (the eye) which is a strong natural spring which gives the town life. After lunch we visited Robert Moffat's mission station which was established in 1820. It was at this humble church that the famous Dr Livingstone was married.

We returned to Kuruman and met Brother Anthony. He led us down 90 km of what must be the worst dirt roads in Southern Africa, to Slough. We unloaded what we had brought with us, and toured the mission. The mission consists of a church, workshops and the Brothers' house. We were warmly greeted by Brother Christopher and Brother Charles.

Slough is devoid of electricity, except that which is supplied by gasoline generators. Hot water is supplied by solar panels. There is plenty of water, but it has a high salt content and is therefore most inadequate for watering plants. The 'soil' is fine desert sand and infertile to say the least.

In the immediate vicinity, there are 100 000 extremely poor people, half of whom are out of work. Slough alone has a population of 5 000. There has not been a crop for the past five years. Through Brother Anthony and Operation Hunger, R40 000 of food is distributed a month.





The next morning Brother Anthony took us on what was to be a most enlightening tour of the area. The present conditions under which the people live are shocking. There are two tin shacks which serve as toilets to each small plot of land. The worst town in the area is Padstow. The area surrounding this town has no trees or bushes, due to the fact that it was stripped in the search for fuel and building materials. The teachers in the school are often drunk and unsuited to teach. The shopkeepers in these villages charge exhorbitant prices for basic necessities on which they have the monopoly.

The key to solving this problem is definitely education. This was graphically depicted when we saw the slaughtering of goats and cows. The people did not know what they where doing and therefore a lot of energy and time was wasted. Thanks to Brother Anthony, new schools consisting of six classrooms each, have been built. Each classroom costs about R5 000, which was donated by various embassies and Marist schools. Brother Christopher conducts agricultural classes which are a great help to these hungry people. Brother Anthony has made it possible for a young girl to study to be a nurse as he hopes to establish a clinic. The Brothers involve the community in all their projects, in order that they become self sufficient.

We found this excursion an extremely educational experience. On behalf of Brother Anthony, we would like to thank all those who contributed so generously to this worthwhile charity. We would also like to thank Mr Castle and Mr van der Merwe for making this trip possible for us.



Tour of Europe and Israel

(July 1984)

On Friday 13 July superstition was ignored and an excited party of 30 (Mr and Mrs Frielick, Mr Boswell, Mrs Kraut and 26 senior school boys) departed from Jan Smuts Airport looking forward to three glorious weeks in Europe and Israel.

Our first stop was Amsterdam. This mecca for young people was the perfect introduction to Europe. Highlights included a canal trip and a morning in the country (Marken and Vollendam). Not even the typical Dutch weather could dampen the spirits and excitement of the party. The group then went by coach from Amsterdam to Calais, via Antwerp. A morning coach tour of the city, a visit to Greenwich, a boat trip along the Thames and an excursion into the country to Stratford-Upon-Avon and Oxford all proved to be most enjoyable and educational. The free day in London was most welcome, and we were all able to "do our own thing" – explore further the underground system; take advantage of numerous sales; visit all those places we had read and heard so much about.

Our next stop was Munich and after arrival we left immediately for Oberammergau where we were to spend the night and attend the Passion Play. Our stay in this picturesque Bavarian village was happy and enjoyable. The Passion Play proved to be overwhelming – both the magnitude of the production and its length. This is a oncein-a-lifetime experience and all considered it worthwhile. We then returned to Munich where we stayed overnight. Most agreed that our time in Munich was too short. By now we were all basking in the glorious European summer sunshine and starting to wilt somewhat.


We then flew to Rome. The hot, humid weather was now even a challenge to sun-worshipping South Africans! Highlights in Italy included a day trip to Florence, and a visit to the Vatican where we were privileged to attend a public audience with the Pope. We were also thrilled to hear the group from St David's Marist College publicly welcomed. It was an experience we will not forget. Whatever happened afterwards could only have been, and proved to be an anti-climax. We somehow were always conscious of the litter in Rome and got the impression that we were being "ripped off". Perhaps the heat had something to do with it. Athens was our next port of call. We were all unanimous that our stay in Greece was possibly our most enjoyable, in all respects - the Acropolis, dinner in the Plaka district (a belly of fun, delicious food and non-stop entertainment even members of the group revealed hitherto unknown talent – no names, no pack drill!). We were also given a taste of the Greek islands, and our trip to Aegina, Poros and Hydra no doubt resulted in many wistful dreams of future holidays.

Our tour ended in Israel, and what a pity time was of the essence. Such variety and contrasts; so much to see and do and learn and experience - and in the end so little time. And what of our memories and experiences? The group's sense of sound was most certainly taxed due to the situation of our hotel in Jerusalem. It proved to be a very sensitive experience, especially at 4 o'clock in the morning: Who will forget the Mount of Olives, the fascinating old city of Jerusalem - the Wailing Wall, Dome of the Rock, the Via Dolorosa, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre; our trip to Bethlehem, Nazareth, Jericho (it was so hot that many ended up with Arabian headdress and litres and litres of water); the moving visit to Massada: a "swim" in the Dead Sea; witnessing a baptism in the Jordan River; swimming and wind surfing in Lake Galilee; our stay at the Kibbutz Lavi; and then homeward bound via Acre and the old Crusader settlement: our last swim at Caesarea. In the end, an incredible experience, but far too much to absorb in so little time.

We were greeted by family and friends on our return to South Africa – always a happy occasion – after a most enjoyable and memorable tour.



St David's won 15-12.


Vs Northview







Message from the Chairman of the Old Boys' Association

The inaugural meeting of the Old Boys' Association was held in October 1964. This means that at this year's Annual General Meeting the Association will be 20 years old. When we think back to those days and how hard we had to fight to be able to use the name St David's in the title of our Marist Old Boys' Association, today we know it was well worth it. Especially as we look around and see that the only Marist Association which has survived in Johannesburg is St. David's and on a national basis we are one of possibly four Associations.

The first Ad Hoc meetings of the Old Boys' Association tentatively took place in late 1962. This initial, slow momentum, only took off when Brother Anthony personally became involved with the Ad Hoc Committee. Address lists were compiled, old boys contacted and then Brother Anthony gave the Old Boys a magnificent cocktail party. Within six weeks we had our first Annual General Meeting. The Brothers close co-operation and full support was one of the secrets of our success in the early days.

The history of the school appears to be evolving into 20 year phases. During the first 20 years the school, founded by the Brothers, with an almost exclusive teaching staff of Brothers, set standards in education and sport of which all could justifiably be proud. By the time the school was 20 years old we were mature enough to attempt to form an Old Boys' Association. The first 20 years of our existance has proved that the founders ideals when forming our Association on the principles of fraternity and comradeship without any permanent links to sporting or social bodies, has been and still is a very successful formula.

Once again we find ourselves at a cross road in the history of the school. We now have a lay principal and by the end of the year there will be no teaching Brothers at St. David's. The challenge of Vatican II has finally caught up with St. David's Marist College. We will be Marist in name and tradition and the challenge will be to maintain a Catholic school at the high standards to which we were accustomed when the Brothers were actively involved at the College. The challenge facing the Old Boys' Association, in fact the Old Boys', is to be able to turn that spirit and vitality which has kept our Association vibrantly active for the past 20 years, to good use by the building of a strong tradition which in turn could be used in the running of the school. More and more parent old boys are supporting the school. The depth of leadership and ability within the Old Boys' ranks can only lead to a strengthening of the Old Boys' Association within the school. A glance at the names of those serving on the Board of Governors, the P.T.A. and other bodies at the school, shows an increasing number of Old Boys.

In conclusion, the one body which maintains continuous

staff, on the one hand, and the ability of the Brothers to adapt to these radical changes in a spirit of co-operation and trust on the other hand. After 20 years of Association history and 43 years of school history, we are full of confidence for the future.



All team members had prepared themselves very ably. This was very apparant to all those attending as the answers to what many of the audience considered difficult questions rolled from the team members with little or no hesitation.




My Family
