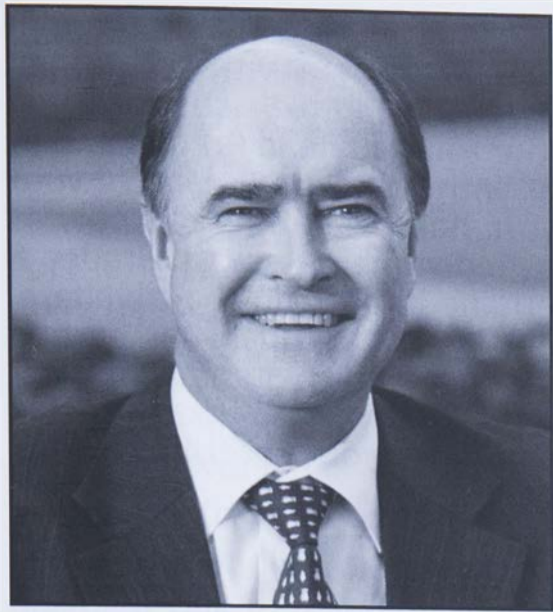

Headmaster's Address



Good evening Guest of Honour, Professor Adam Habib, Mr and Mrs Greeff, Mr and Mrs Wilson, Mr and Mrs Harris, staff, parents and the young men of St David's.

The Soccer World Cup has been for most South Africans the defining experience of 2010. Every time I hear the Waka Waka - the blare of vuvuzelas

is strident once more and the smell of facepaint and street vendors' cooking assaults the senses.

I first really got caught up in the World Cup atmosphere on the Wednesday before - the day when the whole of Johannesburg poured out onto the streets in Bafana Bafana shirts, vuvuzelas and flags in hand to show their support for the national side. Mr Greeff's painted tackies were a hit in assembly that day - far more so than my feeble attempt at mastering the vuvuzela. The boys, however, quickly showed us their expertise in this area. This day began the roller-coaster ride of the next few weeks. On the field there were the trials and tribulations of individual teams and their performances - mirrored by the responses of their fans according to how things were going.

The real success was the excitement, bonhomie and camaraderie which permeated the whole tournament and made such an impact on visitors from all over the world. The event changed perceptions about South Africa and so many tourists I met spoke of returning to the country again. Importantly, the tournament was also embraced as an African tournament - the support for Ghana in their match versus Uruguay by all South Africans reflected this strongly. Within this general sense of camaraderie what struck me was the drawing together of all South Africans united in common purpose. I enjoyed the banter on the park-and-ride buses to the grounds - where the South Africans were clearly proud that the tournament was a great success and that they were happy to be part of it. I was also excited by seeing so many regular rugby followers fully kitted out and painted from head to toe as Bafana supporters, and totally behind the event.

In speaking to those supporters I became aware of the impact of the Super 14 semifinal and final being played at the Orlando Stadium in the weeks prior to the World Cup. The context here is important. These matches in Soweto broke down longstanding social, cultural and psychological barriers. Soweto is a symbolic as well as a physical place. For many Soweto is the site of what was the turning point of the struggle against apartheid, with the 1976 Soweto riots a key historical moment. For the two rugby matches to be such successes from a community perspective was huge for the country. We had a taste of this in 1995, with Nelson Mandela donning a replica of Francois Pienaar's No. 6 jersey. In Soweto this year, the key was that such statements were being made time and again by members of the community, and being fully reciprocated by the rugby visitors. Ordinary people were connecting, and making their own statement.

To have die-hard Blue Bulls supporters speak of their being hosted so warmly in Soweto, and Sowetans speak of how they had enjoyed welcoming their rugby guests made me realise that things really have changed. There is no doubt that we all benefited from the inspired decision

of the Blue Bulls to play two matches in Soweto - it sent a very real message that the traditionally conservative rugby fraternity was willing to take the risk and do things differently, as was their embracing of the Soccer World Cup.

The four weeks were something of a blur. In no time at all, it seemed, we reached the day of the final. One of the full page adverts in the Sunday Times that day rightly proclaimed, "Today this is the greatest country in the world". As South Africans we had every reason to feel a sense of pride. Much of this pride stemmed from the realisation of the capacity of South Africans to achieve great things when they put their minds to it.

There were bizarre moments too - who would have thought that an octopus could be a celebrity, after correctly predicting all of Germany's results at the World Cup and Spain's win in the final. Paul the Octopus's death two weeks ago even made front page news.

The euphoria generated by the World Cup made our return to daily life a rather hard, bumpy one. We were soon enmeshed in a host of strike actions, particularly in the services sector, as unions and employers struggled to find common ground on a range of issues. There was a significant impact on the state education system, where nearly three weeks of school was missed by hundreds of thousands of pupils across the country - whatever the merits of the case. What has been very positive have been the efforts of so many teachers and volunteer workers who have gone out of their way to provide extra support after hours, over weekends and during the holidays to make up for time lost in order for the Matrics particularly to be able to write their examinations. It is a timely reminder for us also not to take the opportunities we have for granted.

I'm reminded of Dickens' first lines of 'A Tale of Two Cities' - *It was the best of times, it was the worst of times.* The complex South Africa we live in reflects this. The worst of times for us as a school was the death on 19 August of Steve Bailey followed two days later by the deaths of Old Boy Justin Bessler and Rod Smith and Dave Mackeown. These events were extremely traumatic for all of us, having followed the sudden death of Prep School teacher Ann Hayward in Term 1. With Steve Bailey being a member of the 2010 Matric group, his death was keenly felt by all. The community has pulled together strongly in giving support to each other and this has assisted many through difficult times. The boys especially have shown tremendous resilience, while at the same time not shying away from expressing their grief. We mourn also the death earlier this week of Brother Anthony, a much loved past headmaster of St David's. How does one reflect, thus, on a year of such highs and lows?

At the end of the World Cup, Ray Hartley, a journalist, spoke of our needing to define and "bottle" the "it" factor of the tournament which brought South Africans together as never before. He felt that this "it" factor was the first expression of a new postapartheid nationalism where there was a shared pride in being South African and a determination to build the status, influence and profile of the nation. This was a shared pride felt by all sectors of the community. Clearly we must build on this, but we must acknowledge the complexity of our environment. Our challenge is to manage our relationships with others, and to accept each other with all of our complexities. It is important that we develop a heightened sense of self-awareness and build on the basics of respect and common decency. We laugh about Leon Schuster and his movies, but he satirises effectively many of our South

African stereotypes and shows us the superficiality of our responses when we react on these levels.

One of the successful initiatives to build on the sense of nationhood central to World Cup 2010 has been the Lead SA initiative which has now become part of our daily landscape. It is a call to each of us to make a difference. The spirit of Ubuntu is central to Lead SA and to our moving forward positively as a developing nation.

The school has enjoyed another fine year, made possible in no small measure by the high level of commitment by the staff in all spheres of school life. Some of these successes include our A and B Team Swimmers winning Inter-High Galas; in Public Speaking, Brad Latilla-Campbell placed first in the Individual Section in Gauteng; there were top performances in a range of National Olympiads, and our Tour de Maths profile remains very strong. "Tommy" brought pinball and 1960s rock music back, and the choir again made their mark at the Linder Auditorium.

The 1st XI Hockey enjoyed their best season, reflected by fine results, seven provincial Under 18 selections and three national selections. There were strong performances also across the Rugby section, and the victory versus St John's was one of the highlights. Our Twenty 20 Cricket Festival was again a great success, as was our St David's Soccer Festival, with 46 teams involved. The 1st XI Soccer enjoyed a standout season, maintaining their position as the top side in Gauteng. The School also had national representation in Canoeing and Swimming.

It is important to note that these achievements are founded on the high levels of commitment by all boys in all teams and activities. Each player or participant in each team creates the opportunity for individuals to perform, and thus chaps in the 'B', 'C' or 'D' teams are as important as those in the 'A' teams.

The support of the boys for their peers continues to add value - at events like the Inter-House Music and the fine warcries at sports fixtures. The Matric Leadership Group of 2010 has made their mark here. Apart from being heavily involved themselves, they have driven this support for each other. A few weeks ago Deputy Head Prefect, Chaid White, spoke of the sense of brotherhood at the School which meant so much to him. Chaid, you have been part of creating that brotherhood through your fair and unassuming approach to things and being clear on where you stood. Apart from your friendship,

you and Gabriel soon developed into a strong team in leading the School, working in tandem with each other. Gabriel, with Chaid and your Executive's support, you have been able to fulfil your roles as Head Prefect and as Junior City Council Mayor with distinction. One of your strengths has been to work hard at getting to know as many boys as possible as individuals - across Grades 8 to 12 - and to show a genuine interest in their welfare. This humble approach and personal touch has earned you much respect. Most importantly, you have not lost your sense of mischief or the ability to laugh at yourself. Thank you, Gabriel and Chaid, for your contribution this year.

The staff is the heartbeat of the school. We appreciate all that they do for the boys, the school and for each other. My thanks to them for their support and especially David Smith, Shane Gaffney and Nick Clogg. Special mention must be made of Shane Gaffney, Deputy Head, Extramurals, who leaves us at the end of the year. Shane, it was with this Matric group that you began your tenure as Deputy Head in 2006. The continued growth and success of our extramural programme is due in no small measure to your efforts. You are a person who is driven and you have a huge capacity for work. Apart from developing a sound infrastructure, you have enjoyed much success as a coach. Many coaches, teams and individual players have benefitted from your personal input. We thank you, and wish you and your family well as you take up a Directorship at Hilton College.

Thank you also to Mike Greeff, Rick Wilson, Board Chair Lachlan Harris and members of the Board for their counsel and support. The year 2010 will be remembered for many reasons, and we can draw inspiration from the World Cup and also the dramatic rescue of the Chilean miners - where the whole world's sense of common humanity was touched. Much as the World Cup was a rallying cry for us, so the rescue brought Chile together as a country. It is these moments of common humanity that must form the bedrock of our relations with each other as we continue to build our South African identity. Our School's Marist ethos is hewn from the same rock.

Let us not put off making our contribution to moving our young nation forward. Let us harness the "it" factors of enthusiasm, respect and common decency in all of our dealings with others - we can Lead South Africa.

STEVE BAILEY

'Lord the light of your love is shining, in the midst of the darkness, shining.'

These words ring so true this morning as we join the community in our own metaphoric darkness of the tragic death of Steve Bailey early last Thursday

morning. It is the darkness of a tremendous sense of loss, and the pain we have all felt over the past 24 hours.

Steve's association with St David's began in 2005 when I met this bright-eyed, bushytailed young man from Rivonia Primary. He and his parents made an immediate impact as a quiet, reserved and close-knit family. When it came to academics, Steve perked up, and he began interviewing me, politely I might add, about our academic standards! Steve went on to be awarded a Major Academic Scholarship and he excelled academically, representing South Africa at Under 18 level in Maths, performing with distinction in the Maths Olympiad and

maintaining an excellent academic average; Steve also found time to be a Provincial Chess player as well as representing his School in Cross Country, Public Speaking and other activities with distinction.

For me, it is Steve, the person, I will miss the most. Gabriel Ally's words in a message to me made the point:

"My first memory of Steve is from Grade 8 camp, where he went missing. After a massive manhunt we eventually found him ... sleeping under his travel bag! Steve's nickname was 'Casio' (after the calculator brand) because of his incredible ability to multiply any two digit numbers in his head and get the answer right." I remember the Matrics trying to beat Steve with a calculator, and not being quick enough. His deadpan delivery of witty comments was one of his great strengths as a public speaker.

Steve was often swamped before any Maths test, and true to his nature he was always willing to help, explaining things in 'layman's' terms. Ultimately Steve was loved by everyone for his unassuming nature, his kind heart and his passion for Liverpool. I'm sure you will have picked this up from the regalia behind me and I am pleased to tell you that Liverpool won 1 - 0 last night.

One of Steve's best friends was his dad, and they shared passions for golf, running, soccer, chess and even Maths Olympiad questions. The Baileys are a close-knit family and it is evident that they have spent many special times together. They are most appreciative of the support they have received from the St David's and St Mary's communities and Steve's close friends particularly.

I would like to read you an extract from an essay that Steve wrote last year. The essay was in response to a line from Tennyson's poem, Ulysses: "How dull it is to rust unburnished, not to shine in use".

We need to be kept busy. We desire this, it is essential to our wellbeing.

Humans find excitement in exploring new things, seeing the world, learning things about ourselves, about others. Other people are capable of giving us much happiness. If we make the best effort possible to glean information off them, to let them stimulate us, in this we grow.

In all areas of life, it is essential to keep Tennyson's words in mind. In our schooling, our relationships, our sports, everything. If we were all to do this, we would stimulate ourselves, and stimulate others as well. We therefore work together to improve everyone's quality of life."

Steve's words show that leadership is not about position - that anyone can lead by having a concern for others

and striving for the betterment of all. Steve exhibited the spirit of ubuntu and a concern for others which is part of our heritage; he stood up for what was right; and despite his own tremendous success he never lost sight of our need to work together to improve everyone's quality of life - and he "walked the talk" in our school community.

Such tragic losses cause us to reflect on ourselves and our opportunities - let us remember Steve by leading in the way that we do things around here, and by striving to realise our potential. Steve has shown us that, as individuals, we can make a difference.

Steve was certainly Marist - may his soul rest in peace.

ROD SMITH

It was with great sadness that we learnt of the death of Rod Smith who had recently retired from the staff after 14 years of service in 2008. Rod had always exhibited a sense of joie de vivre and his death was a tremendous shock to the St David's and broader educational community. Rod was a well-liked and respected member of staff whose great strength was his ability to "connect" with pupils that he taught and coached. He brought novels such as "Of Mice and Men" to life for countless generations of boys who have always spoken very fondly of him. He had the ability also to champion the cause of the underdog and spent quality time with those boys facing personal challenges. I never knew him to give up on any boy. It was perhaps fitting that Rod died following one of his passions - flying. He was a man who lived life to the full and he is sorely missed. Our condolences to the Smith and McKeown families.

DAVE MACKEOWN

Dave MacKeown, Rod Smith's brother-in-law and parent of two boys, Tim and Chris, who had matriculated from St David's in 2007 and 2009 was tragically in the plane with Rod Smith when they crashed on the East Rand on 21 August 2010. Dave was very supportive of St David's in all the years that he was associated with the School. He was present at many of his sons' fixtures and activities giving strong but unobtrusive support to their efforts. With his wife, Sue he formed a strong family unit for his sons and they have both developed into fine young men. Dave was certainly respected by the staff at St David's.

The loss of Rod Smith and Dave MacKeown in the same plane crash was a double blow for both of their families and we extend our condolences to them in what has been most difficult and tragic circumstances.

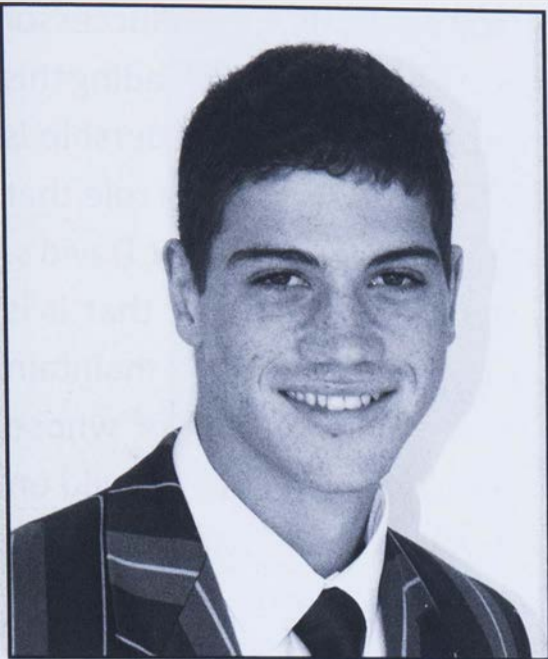

The Challenge

I sure hope I'm still popular and a pleasure to teach, and I'm sure there are a few people sitting here tonight whom I have upset along the way. Of all these words however, the biggest truism lies in the observation that "he will enjoy the challenge"; a challenge that has been riddled with dreams, responsibility, tears, elation and honour; a challenge that is still in its infancy and one that will continue unto death. This challenge is life. 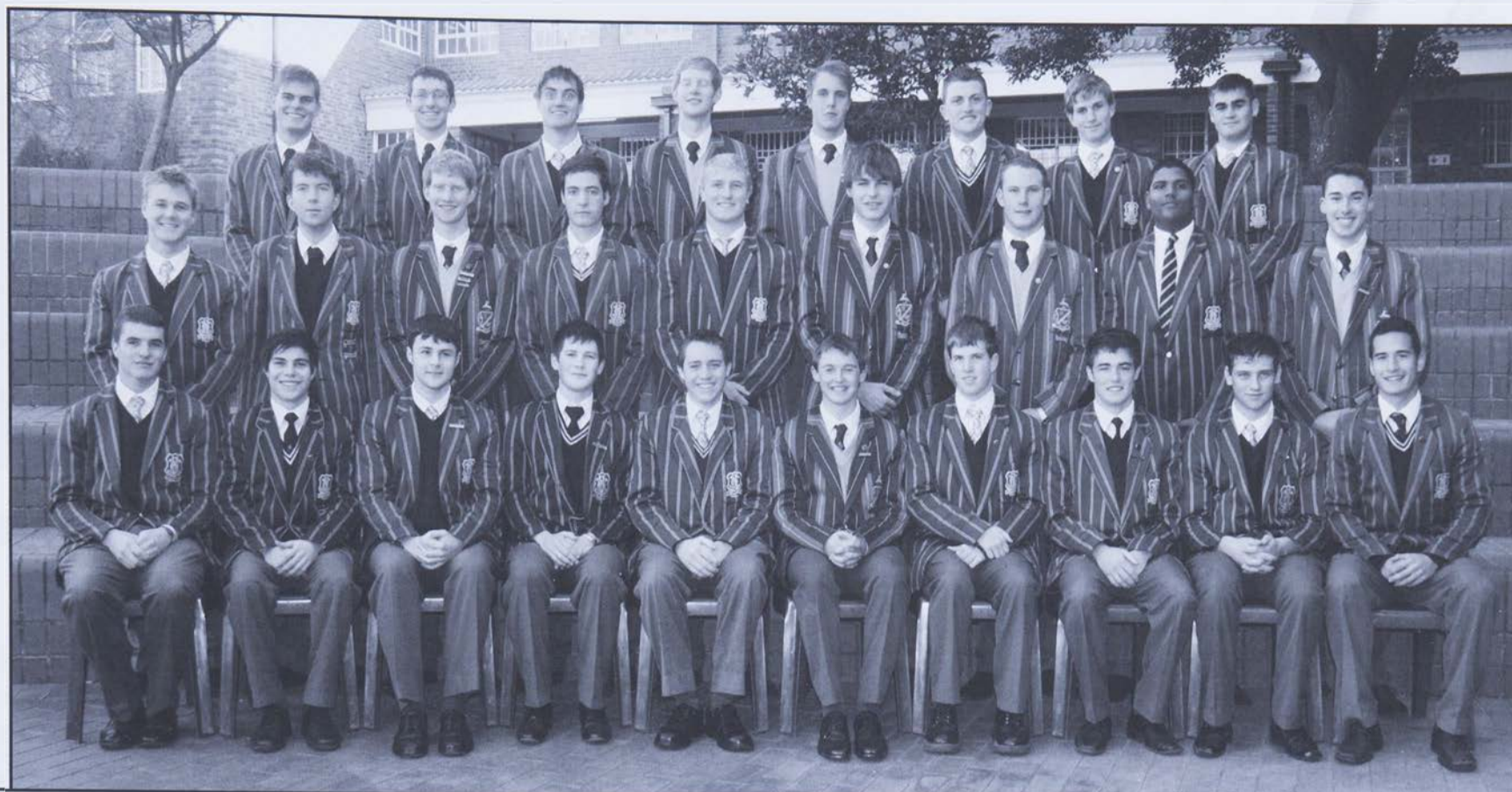

Mathematics

The start of 2010 saw us celebrating the outstanding Mathematics results of the Class of 2009. A particular highlight was the 100% achieved by Robert Peitzsch in Core Mathematics. The diligence displayed by both the Mathematics staff and the learners needs to be applauded and the success of this interaction is reflected in the 45 Mathematics distinctions over the various papers written. The benchmark that has been set for the Class of 2010 is of a very high standard.

Once again our boys participated in the Tour de Maths Series and to date they have been winners at two of the legs. In discussion with Mr Vicente, it has been decided to encourage more senior boys to participate and it is our objective to win the Tour de Maths Series in 2011.

We continue our association with the Epoch Optima Trust, the objective of which is to continually improve the mathematical skills of all learners by utilising all available resources. We again received a grant for 2010 and it is still our intention to develop a Mathematics Centre in the near future.

Over 200 of our learners entered the first round of the Mathematics Olympiad with 68 qualifying for round two. Steve Bailey (Grade 12), Jordan Stier (Grade 10) and Matthew McWilliams (Grade 8) achieved a result in round two that placed them in the top 100 in the country qualifying for round three. Steve was the top senior candidate in Gauteng and was recognised for this achievement.

Steve was one of six chosen to represent South Africa at the International Mathematics Olympiad held in Kazakhstan in July, based on his achievements in the Mathematics Olympiads over the past five years. This was a wonderful and challenging experience for him.

Steve was a gifted and talented mathematician and problem-solver who displayed an eagerness to learn. Regrettably his unexpected passing has left a huge void and has deprived us all of the opportunity to witness what he was bound to achieve. Steve will always be remembered by those whose lives he touched.

Jordan and Matthew participated in round three and were both members of the Southern Gauteng team for the Inter-Provincial Mathematics Olympiad: we commend them for this. We eagerly anticipate their future successes.

This year, 2010, has not been without its many challenges. The FIFA World Cup was a highlight but also a distraction for our boys. I would like to thank all the Mathematics staff for their dedication and commitment to both the department and to the learners. I wish the Class of 2010 every success for their future endeavours.

Gifted and Talented Pupils' Programme

Giraffes and floating islands?

What, you may ask, do giraffes have in common with motorized, futuristic floating islands? "Not much" is the average response - unless you happen to be one of the boys attending the Futurists' Society at school. Then your answer would be a creative, noisily-achieved, off-the-wall answer.

As a school, we have joined a group called Future Problem Solving Programme International. The primary aim of the group is to foster THINKING. This is possibly something we all do, with varying measures of success, every waking minute of our day. But - how often are these thoughts creative and new? The programme teaches students to apply wonderful, dissociative processes to arrive at a new approach to problems offered.

Students are given a scenario set in the future: for example - man-made islands which move around deep areas in the ocean, mining precious minerals from the seabed. The boys extract facts from the given scenario. After heated discussion and democratic processes, potential problems are fleeced out and sorted from most pressing to least important. They then use one of several techniques to force new ideas to solve the most pressing problem.

One technique is SYNECTICS (defined as the art of making new connections), where attributes of unrelated objects are forced into new connections: in this case attributes of an animal with one of the problems related to the island. One group chose a cow as their animal and then used the idea of repeated digestion through multiple stomachs as a means to process and extract useful by-products from the waste matter on the island. Another technique is DELIBERATE ESCAPE, where some critical aspect of the original scenario is removed. They cut their teeth on this technique imagining a restaurant with some critical aspect removed: light or waiters or crockery and cutlery or a kitchen or even food! They are yet to learn a further technique called SCAMPER: Substitute; Combine; Adapt; Modify; Put to other uses; Eliminate; Reverse or Rearrange and one other: Weird to Workable.

The FPSPI dictates a six-step process for each scenario. Groups develop their response to these steps through guided completion of three practice booklets, submitted electronically to the coaches in Australia, who are our mentors. If we match up to standards, we will be invited to Australia (in 2011 to their Gold Coast on the eastern seaboard) to enter a team or two in their national

competition in October. Teams may comprise as few as four or as many as eight or even nine members. Should we succeed in Australia, placing first or second in the division we enter, the team/s will be invited to the USA International Final Competition in March or April 2012 in Minnesota. Who knows how far we can go!

Once we have progressed through the initial stages as we have done this year, we will refine the composition of each team, mixing and changing them frequently. Teams will be grouped by age and school grade to facilitate entry into either the Intermediary or Senior levels of the competition. Ideally each team will include students to cover a variety of abilities: mathematical, linguistic, artistic, pragmatic, scientific and so on. The coach should know the boys' areas of interest and expertise to make the best combination within a group. Our success will depend on the quality of each boy included in the teams.

We are fortunate to have assistance from Mrs Eva Biebuyck in developing our own coaches and the boys in the rigours of the programme. Eva holds a Masters degree in Gifted Education from Connecticut University. When gifted education received attention in South Africa, in the late 1980s and early 1990s, Eva ran the Schmerrenbeck Centre for Gifted and Talented Children at the University of the Witwatersrand. She visits Connecticut University annually to keep abreast of developments in the field of educating these children. We are extremely grateful for the expertise and experience she brings to our sessions.

To date, invitation to become a member of the group has focused mainly on those achieving high academic results. It is a recognised fact, though, that often students with gifted abilities are not top achievers within the 'school game'. Accordingly we have asked teachers to recommend students whose mental powers are noticeable in their creative, perceptive questioning and thinking during lessons. In some instances, students have even volunteered others whom they perceive as gifted. Our numbers will always be small because we are working with the First Thinking Team, just as every extramural has its exceptional participants. We hope to extend activities to other schools. In time, South Africa can claim its own status within the organisation, holding national competitions equal to those in Australia. Every journey begins with a single step - we're on our way!

MUSIC DEPARTMENT REPORT 2010

The Music Department continues to grow in terms of the number of pupils taking lessons, and the variety of instruments that we offer. Tuition is offered on saxophone, trumpet, trombone, flute, piano, guitar, drums and recorder. We were able to purchase more woodwind and brass instruments at the start of 2010, in order to give more boys the opportunity to start learning an instrument. With four guitar teachers and four piano teachers, and our drum teacher teaching a full timetable, these areas have also grown, and there are currently close to 180 boys taking individual music lessons.

In 2009 we saw the first intake of boys taking Music as a Matric subject, and we are looking forward to seeing our first Matrics write Music in 2011. With two Matrics, three Grade 11s, and four Grade 10s enrolled for Music in 2011, we are happy that this is a really good number for a school of this size - the average number of Music pupils in Matric is usually four to six in schools twice the size of St David's.

Events during the year included two very successful Music soirees, one in the first term and one in the third term. We combined the Prep and High Schools in both performances, with many talented soloists as well as our Choirs, Marimba Bands and Drumming group performing. We are thrilled that audience attendance continues to grow with each soiree.

A number of Music pupils played Trinity Guildhall, Rockschooll and Associated Board of Royal Schools Music exams in May, June and September this year, on piano, saxophone, trumpet, trombone, guitar and drums. Subject Music pupils also wrote Trinity Guildhall Theory exams. It is pleasing to see the number of boys entering for these external exams increasing each year, with very pleasing results - many boys achieved Merits (above 75%) or Distinctions (above 85%) for their exams.

Our Choirs and Bands also participated in and performed at numerous events this year - please refer to the individual reports for each group.

Well done to all of our Music pupils on excellent performances throughout the year - it is so exciting to see the enthusiasm that the boys have for making music. Keep it up, boys!

MAJOR PRODUCTION 2010 THE WHO'S TOMMY

After having staged two very light comedies in 2008 (Little Shop of Horrors) and 2009 (Grease), I decided to take on a much heavier, more challenging musical this year. This production has its particular demands - there is very little actual dialogue in the show; it is a multi-media production which requires a co-ordination of music, choreography, lighting, sound effects and slide sequences. The plot is complex and rather dark, and the music itself is incredibly difficult for the singers as well for the band. I must say that I was fortunate to have a cast, band and crew that took on these challenges with no hesitation, and, once again in collaboration with St Teresa's, we managed to stage a professional production that any University Drama Department would have been proud of!

Tommy was the first musical work to be billed overtly as a rock opera. The opera was the fourth album by the English rock band, The Who, and was first released in 1969. It was created by the band's guitarist, Pete Townsend, and is recognised as the album which launched the band to international stardom. The loose story line is about a boy, Tommy, who retreats into himself having witnessed a traumatic incident. As an adolescent, 'the deaf, dumb and blind kid' is discovered to have a talent for pinball and becomes a champion, a 'pinball wizard'. Tommy goes on to suffer various other traumas before returning to reality to be 'miraculously' cured and achieving guru-like status. Written in the 1960s, in the same year as Woodstock, the opera reflects part of that age - a time of questioning, of rebellion and the confusion and uncertainty which accompanies these.

The cast from St David's and St Teresa's spent many late, gruelling hours rehearsing over a period of five months, and every single cast member should feel very proud of what they achieved. I would like to single out a few of the principals for the significant roles that they played: Kade Kalell (St David's Prep Grade 2) and Dean Kennedy as the younger Tommy's, Brad Latilla-Campbell as Uncle Ernie, Barry Morisse as Cousin Kevin, Kailin Pillay and Ruth Stephenson as Captain and Mrs Walker, and Lloyd

Armstrong as the Narrator/Adult Tommy, all played their roles with maturity and the utmost dedication.

I would not have been able to stage this production without the assistance of my 'core' team: Abi van der Westhuizen - choreographer; Bradley Donaldson - dramatic assistance; and Kirsty van der Westhuizen - musical assistance and band pianist; thank you so much to all of you for your hard work and dedication - the success of this musical belongs to all of us!

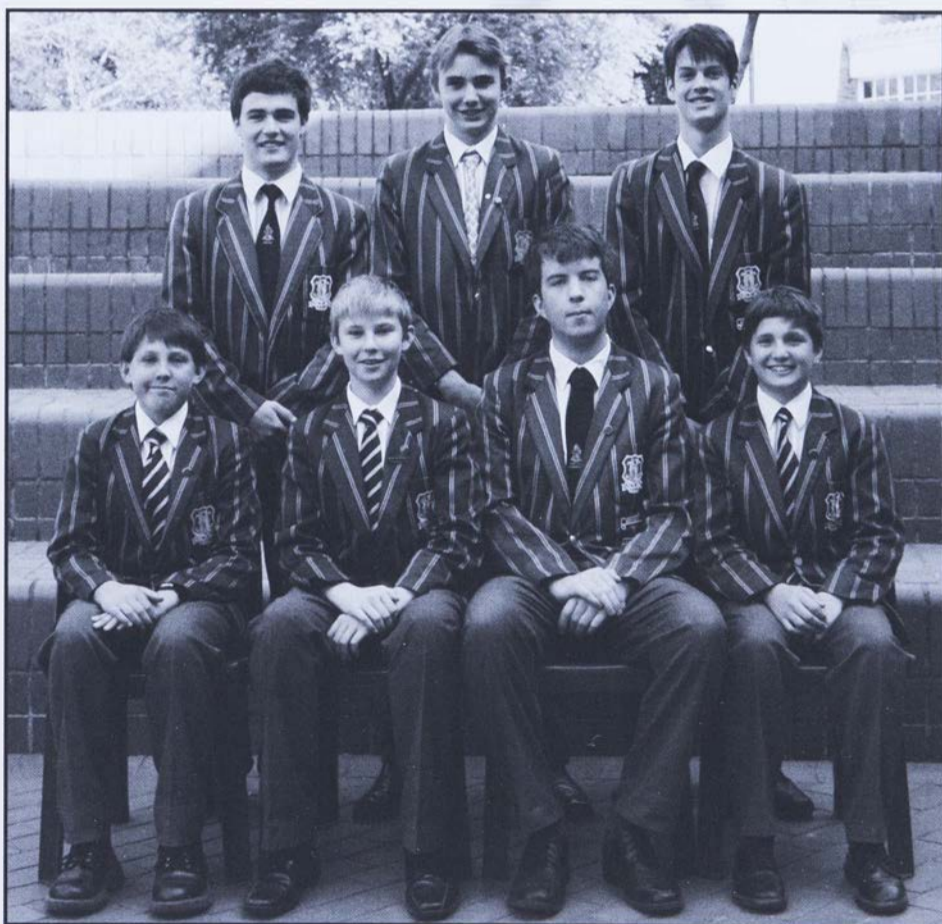

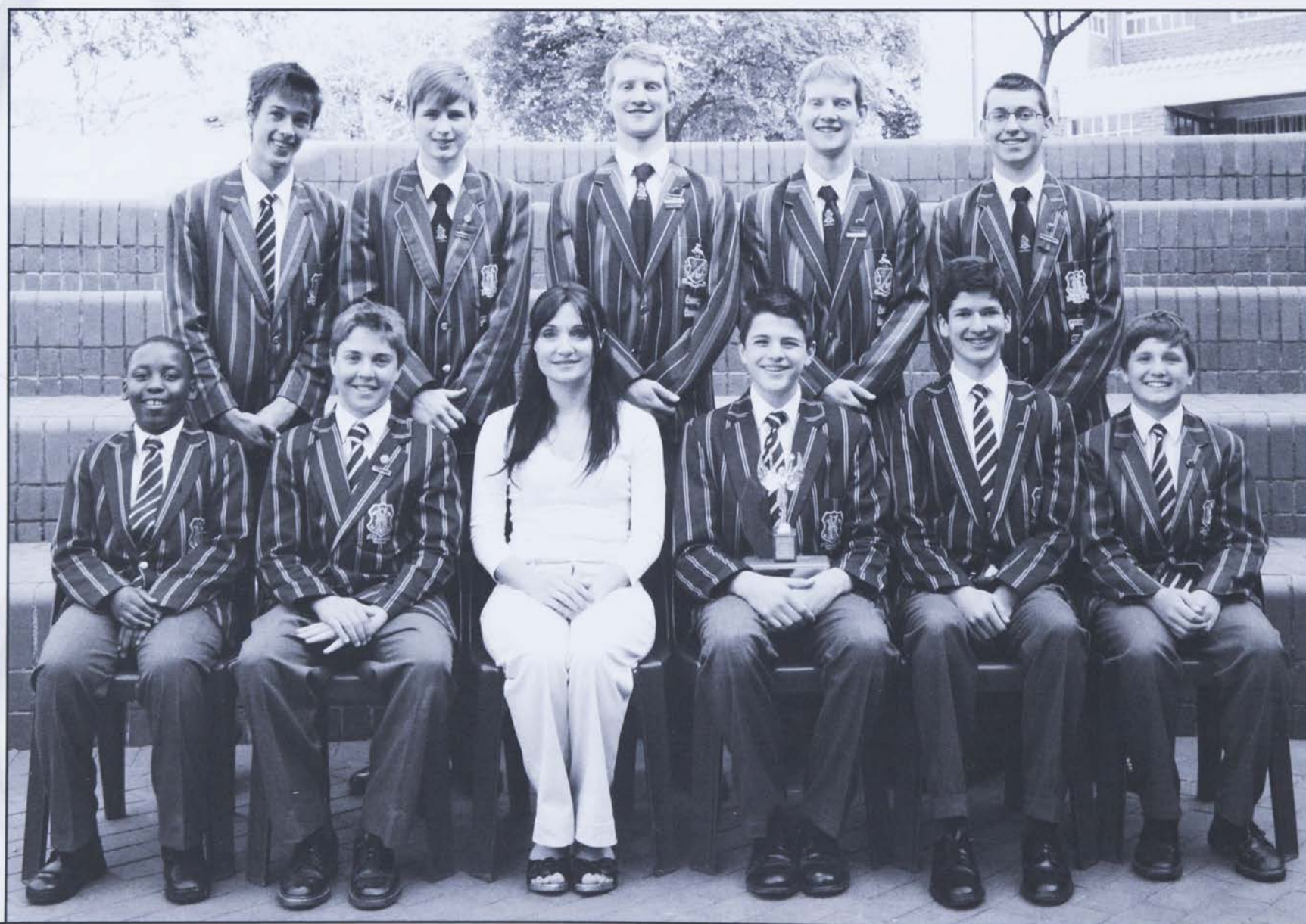

The Good Memories Hurt the Most

"Nobody said it was easy, oh it's such a shame for us to part. Nobody said it was easy, but no one ever said it would be this hard..."

Grief, in its most base form, is an expression of great love. We do not often take the time to reflect on exactly why we are feeling the pain that we do when we lose someone close to us, or someone that we love. This is ironic; that which causes us the most pain in life is the most beautiful of things available to us. To experience grief is a terrible thing; but at the same time, the experience itself is an outpouring of adulation and care for someone that we will miss forever, for memory is not bounded by time.

That Thursday morning was different in its own right: the usual school uniform-induced monotony of the quadrangle was replaced by the explosion of bright colours and textures that can only signify casual clothing, a sight that is oddly jarring and almost unpleasant in its unfamiliarity. The usual tired attitude was disrupted by ripples of excitement across the groups of schoolboys. The teachers appeared, and the following wave of schoolboys was directed towards the amphitheatre to start the day, a great tide of bodies ebbing and whirling giddily towards the drain-shaped steps. There was a general feeling of contentment; I had a free day of no work stretched out lazily ahead of me, as did most of the boys in the school.

It was in those next few moments that my world was shattered into a million glistening shards, forcing me to look back and reflect on the fragility of my life, and indeed on the frailty of life itself. I heard a shout of "Steve?! NO!" and I turned to see a classmate reeling away as if he had been struck. He looked up, and the sight of the raw anguish upon his face was seared into my memory as surely as a scar. I suddenly realised that Steve Bailey hadn't arrived at school; and I began hoping against hope that it is nothing serious. Until one of the boys in the group, white-faced and moving as if in a dream, asked "But how did he die?"

In the flood of memories that I have of the deep, moving emotions that I experienced in the next few minutes, the only thing I remembered clearly is the warm, tickling streams of tears running from my eyes. I had lost a brother.

Since the 19th of August, I have thought about Steve constantly. I miss Steve; I resent the Steve-shaped hole that he has left behind him. Each time I remember him, it is like my chest being ripped open with a crowbar. I do not ache for one more moment, a chance to say goodbye: I wish for the laughs that we should have shared; for the wisdom I would have gained; for the lifetime I should have been privy to.

Therein lies the great paradox of grief: it is selfish. I have looked at the many people grieving over the past few weeks and have constantly asked: how is such an outpouring of life,

adoration, affection and emotion - for the sake of another - selfish? But it is: for we grieve for ourselves. We regret missed opportunities; we dwell on the past interaction. For me, Steve will only ever live in my memory. All I will have are the shared experiences and the fleeting moments that I spent with a person who I now realise was a truly great man, and an even greater friend.

The song I began with, "The Scientist" by Coldplay, was known to be Steve's favourite. I find this ironic: the lines described my situation almost to a tee. Even in death, Steve's happy-go-lucky manner of letting things fall clumsily into place displays itself in an unexpected but profoundly beautiful way, leaving me with a wonderful way to remember him, and allow him to live on in my mind.

Each time I remember him, it hurts me - but the very fact that I have something to remember, and indeed so much of it from such a short space of time, makes me grateful beyond all means. The memories will never fade: they will remain as fresh and crisp as if they were remade each day anew. Steve will live on in my memories, and in the memories of countless others, in the way he moved, spoke and thought. The irony of my grief is that when I remember the good times, I will miss him the most; the sudden, sharp smarting will always offset the warmth and comfort of my recollections of Steve. The pain of remembrance will never fade, but I do not wish it to: he left me with too much to say, with too much to ask... He left me far too early.

Celtic Knot of Life - Daniel Peter

As life's music starts, the first loop of the intricate knot, made with the red twine, is formed. As the base of the knot is formed, so is a heartbeat from the drumming background of the song, steadily continuing as the rest of the knot expands. The two ends go in their separate directions, spreading across the weaver's work surface. The heart of the knot is there constantly, pumping life into the creation.

The weaver snips and knots the two loose ends, but the heart makes sure that they keep growing, making the destined shape. The knot keeps weaving its complex patterns that only it understands; the heart keeps pumping the precious life through the veins, which are the loose ends. When the knot has finally finished its destined purpose of expanding, it stops growing and freezes into the shape it has made.

The knot is like our lives - in the same way that the loose ends are cut and knotted by the weaver in his attempt to stop the knot from doing what it must do - it is the steadiness of the heartbeat that lets the knot continue weaving and the determination on the knot to keep expanding. The U14A team also enjoyed a very successful tournament losing to the eventual winners, Grey College, in the semi-final. This I might add is their only loss in the whole season.

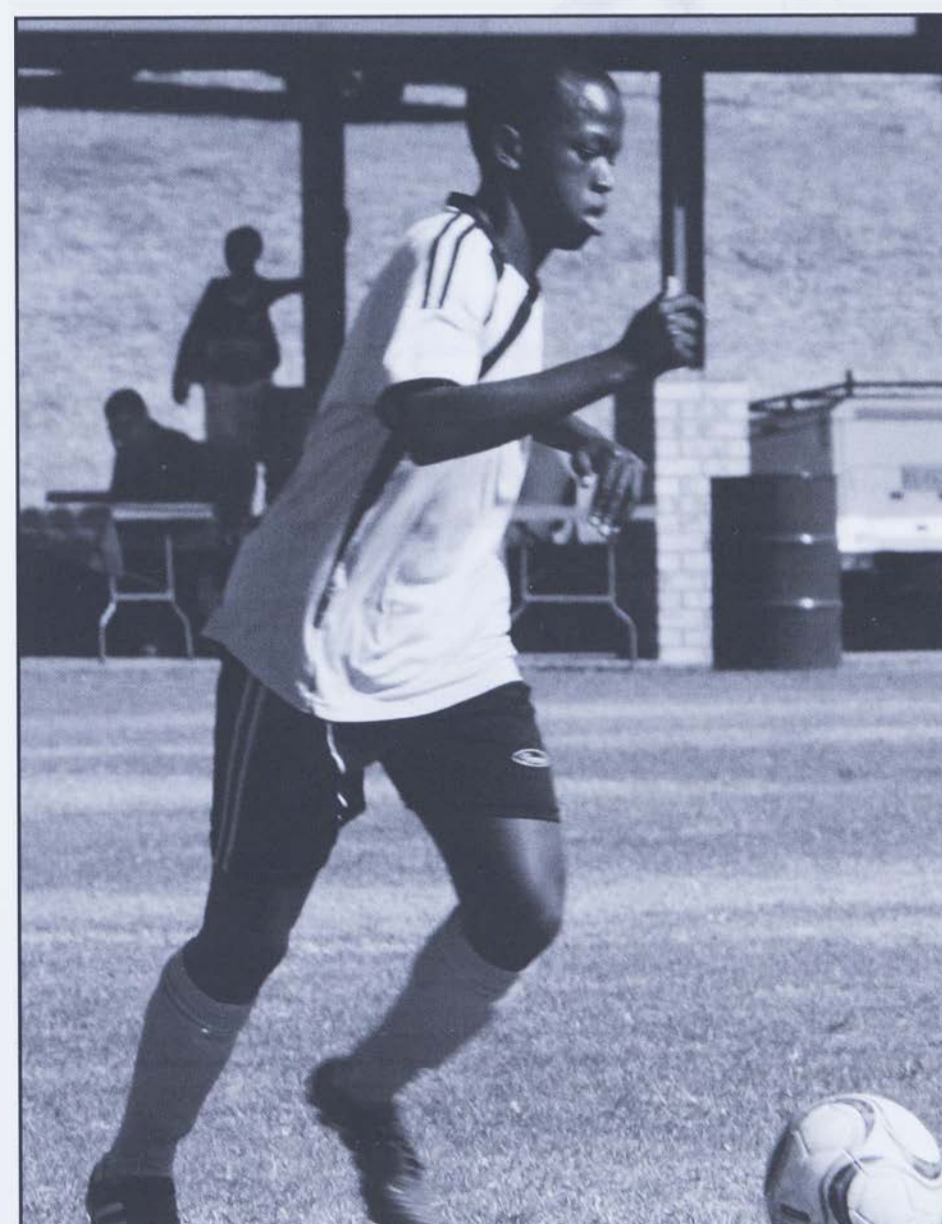

History of 'Our First Golf Tournament' at St. Davids

It was decided by the senior pupils of St David's that the time was ripe to establish a golf club. Alex Quail and Michael Heubeck put their heads together and decided to write to various schools, in the hope of starting an inter-school golf championship. In this they were unsuccessful but undeterred by this seeming lack of enthusiasm for the royal and ancient game, they decided to form a committee and stage a school championship.

The first thing to be done was to approach the other scholars and find out if any of them were really capable of swinging a club. Thirty came forward, and when this group was sorted out, it was found that ten of them could play the game reasonably well. Brother Gerald, being the only golfer of note on the staff was duly elected President, and Alex Quail and Michael Heubeck, as co-founders of the club, were elected jointly to the Chair.

The next difficulty was the venue. This was overcome by approaching Crown Mines Golf Committee and asking for use of the course. Not only was the club accorded the use of the course, but also the courtesy of the club. The day for the tournament was fixed for November 1st, All Saints 'Day. At the eighteenth hole as player after player returned their card, comparisons were made and the final results announced.

These were as follows:

As a final touch to a wonderful tournament, Mr Drummond Bell announced that he would present a floating trophy

to stimulate interest in this fine game, and Mr Singleton promptly added that he would present a miniature to go with it. To these generous donors, we accord our gratitude, Alex Quail and Lorenzo Brocco.

This year golf at St David's is heading into its seventh consecutive year, after being resurrected in 2003. Interest in the sport has grown phenomenally amongst the student body and our boys are now competing successfully in the Gauteng schools league, and regularly being invited to festivals and tournaments nationally.

In January, three golf teams, comprising of six players per team, were entered into the Gauteng inter-schools golf league and were scheduled to each compete against six different schools in their respective divisions. The 1st team finished 3rd in a very competitive 'central group': winning four and losing two of the games played. The 2nd team competed in the very strong 'northern group', having played six games; of which four were lost and drawing two. The 3rd team, comprising mainly of golfers who have recently taken up the amazing game of golf, ended 3rd in the 'west group'. They won one, lost one and drew four of the games played. By and large, these results indicate a steady improvement to those of last year, which is indicative of the sustained growth and interest in this life-long sport at St David's Marist Inanda.

In March, eight of the St David's golfers competed in a highly professional Dainfern College Schools' Golf Championship, hosted over three days at the prestigious Dainfern Country Club. After fifty four holes of enterprising golf, the St David's A team finished in a very credible 8th position and the B team in 17th position out of twenty participating schools. Cameron Goodford finished tied 10th overall, Sebastian Watson 29th, Alvaro Giuricich 52nd, Michael Petersen 58th, Celso Zuccollo 60th, Matthew Elliott 71st and Nicholas Hutter 72nd. These positions were based on their respective individual nett scores.

April saw sixteen golfers from the four houses, Benedict, College, Osmond and The Bishops, battle it for bragging rights to be crowned as school golf champions for 2010. The golfers played eighteen holes at the Wanderers Golf Course. All players played off scratch handicaps, and each four-ball consisted of a player from each house. After a fierce see-saw encounter, Osmond House was crowned victors, with The Bishops as runners-up, College house 3rd and Benedict in 4th position.

In September, four of the top ranked members of the St David's 1st Golf team participated in the seventh annual FNB International Schools' tournament hosted by St John's College at Sun City.

There were thirty two schools participating this year. The competition was extremely close and of an extremely high standard. The tournament has, in its short history, gained the reputation as being the premier schoolboy golf tournament in the country, with several of South Africa's top Under 18 golfers participating. This tournament provided the players with a wonderful opportunity to engage in positive competition and establish new friendships and enjoy the wonderful game of golf in a beautiful setting.

The team of Alvaro Giuricich, Jason Nesbitt, Daniel Barnard and Bradley Collins scored a total of 287 Stableford points (all competitors played off scratch) over four rounds on the

Gary Player Country Club and Lost City layouts. St David's excelled in the combined better-ball stableford format, where the pairing of Jason Nesbitt and Bradley Collins scored two consecutive rounds of two under par. This helped position the team to a credible 10th position going into the weekend. Unfortunately the putts didn't drop in the final rounds, which resulted in the team ending in 23rd position overall. The experience that the boys gained from participating in this tournament is incomparable to any other school golfing experience, with professionalism, etiquette, sportsmanship, commitment to excellence and team spirit the outstanding benefits experienced by these individual competitors. All the players received bronze medals for their endeavour and commitment.

After the short break in September, the Gauteng inter-schools golf league resumed with a small change in format. Four players were selected, per team, per school with each golfer playing off an 18 handicap. The purpose of this change is to identify the top twelve golfers in the province once the league is completed next year. These twelve top golfers will then go to trials where the top six will be selected to represent Central Gauteng at the golf inter-provincial tournament at the end of the year.

Bradley Collins is to be congratulated on being awarded 'Golfer of the Year - 2010' and winning the Junior Club Championships at Country Club Johannesburg. Daniel Barnard is also to be congratulated on his fine achievement in winning the Junior Club Championships at Parkview.

I would like to thank Mr Giuricich and Mr Barnard for the sponsorship of clothing, as well the generous sponsorship of rain jackets and kitbags from Mr Jade de Ridder and Mr Eugene Beck from Road Cover. A special word of appreciation must go to the captain, Alvaro and his team for their display of superior sportsmanship, friendship and humility both on and off the course, over the past three years.

All golfers have this year, displayed elevated levels of dedication and passion for their school and the sport; a true reflection and testament to the type of individual who attends and participates on behalf of St David's Marist Inanda.

Orienteering is a sport that requires navigational skills using a map to get from point to point in diverse terrain and normally moving at speed.

A race is intended to test the navigational skill, concentration and running ability of the competitors. The objective on each leg is to follow the fastest route between controls. The fastest is not always the shortest route and can depend heavily on route choice. Orienteering is therefore very much a strategic, thinking sport in which the fastest athletes do not necessarily win.

Orienteering is an excellent complement to other more team-based sports. Whilst runners compete individually, they have to be aware of the whole playing field and have to take quick strategic decisions, constantly adapting to the conditions. This sort of skill is necessary for all team sports such as soccer, rugby, hockey and cricket.

St David's has been part of the Gauteng Schools League for the past two years. The sport has grown and for the first time in 2010, awards have been made to boys who have excelled in the field. Special mention must be made of Grant Webster who captained the squad, did most of the coaching, and was ably assisted by Thomas Boorman, who also gave of his time and expertise to help the newcomers to the sport.

We hope to see more boys join the squad in future, and thank the parents who have supported us so enthusiastically.

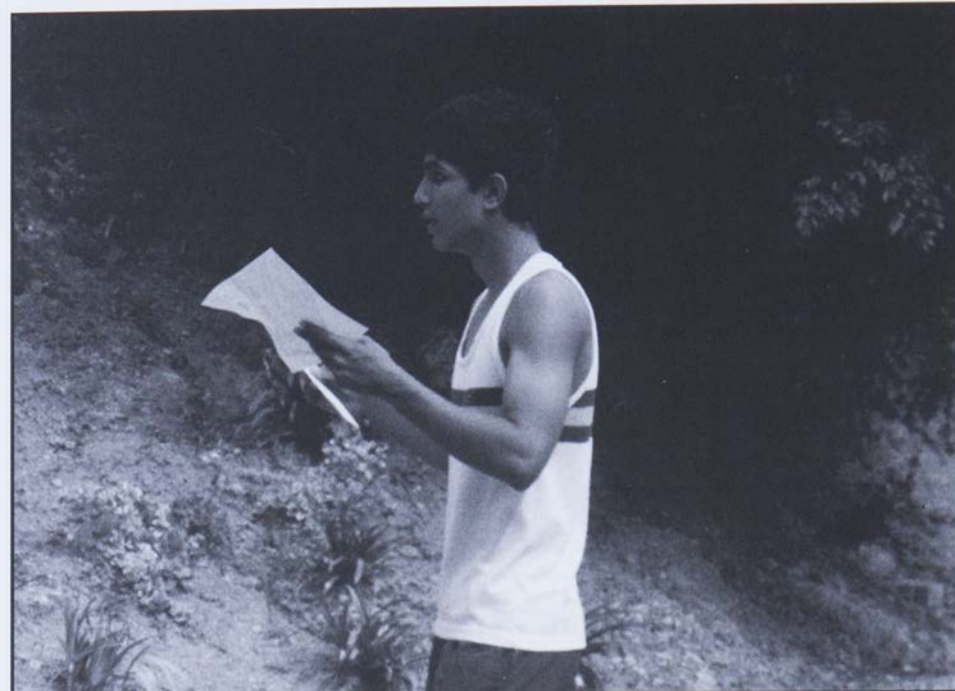

along with a rugby curriculum. Each age group will enter next season being able to build on what they have learnt in 2010.

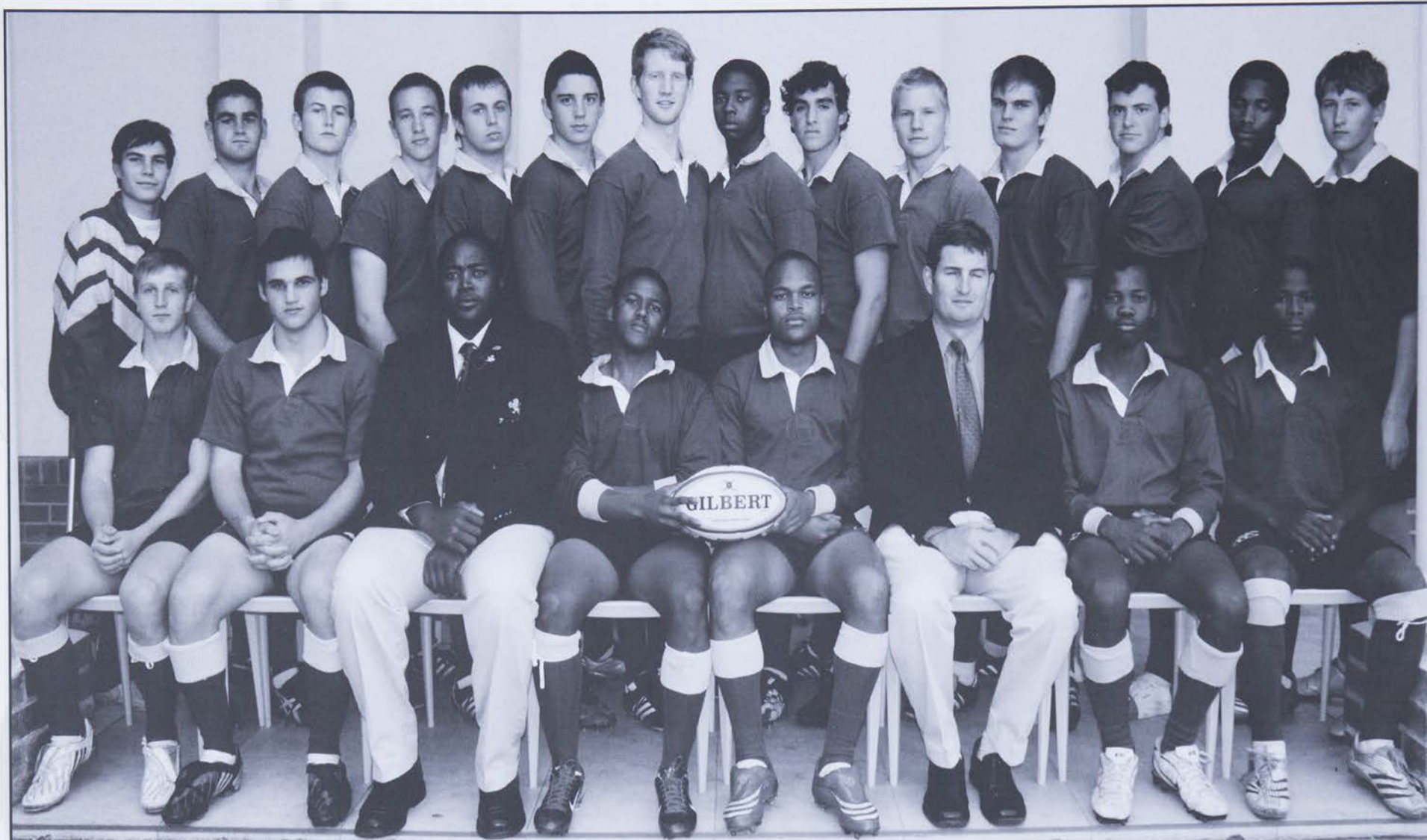

I would like to acknowledge Mr Elvis Mawela's hard work and serious dedication in ensuring that our facilities are always well maintained and prepared for all the fixtures.

I would also like to thank Mr Schneider, Mr Carey, Mr Biller, Mrs Greensill and Mr Bessler for their continuous commitment and hard work in developing and maintaining Water Polo at the College.

Our gratitude to Mr Gospodinov, our professional coach, for his dedication, knowledge and passion for this game. We are most fortunate to have someone of his calibre coaching our players.

In conclusion, I would like to congratulate the players for their dedication to the sport of Water Polo. They were committed and trained hard even in the most unfavourable conditions. They tackled their challenges in the true Marist way and never lost their spirit of perseverance. They can be truly proud of their season.

In summary we are still a fledgling organisation (not in terms of years but in terms of participation) but through the effort and support of Mike Greeff, Malcolm Williams, Rick Wilson, Cheryl King, Lara Klement, Staff and parents, and the Old Boys I believe we will be able to exponentially increase our participation and contribution to the Marist Family.
