Twenty sixteen (2016) was a memorable year of celebration of the past, present and future of a remarkable institution. But it was so much more than just a celebration of progress and achievement; it was a celebration of the very essence of a Marist school.

Every member of the St David's family, past and present, was invited to be a part of the programmes, which reached out far beyond the School to the wider community. Every aspect of life at

BIRTHDAY MASS ON 27 JANUARY

St David's was celebrated: religious life, academics, sport, culture and outreach. New initiatives were launched which would greatly enrich both the School and the communities it serves.

This was no ordinary celebration.

The Jubilee was launched with the Birthday Mass on 27 January, the same day as the official opening of the School in 1941. At the mass, the School Brass Ensemble gave the first performance of the Jubilee Fanfare composed by Head of Music, Mr Chris Luke. The Memorare prayer was sung by the School Chamber Choir. It was arranged for Choir by Mr Jaco Ferreira and composed by Mr Chris Luke. The day was further commemorated with the blessing of the Jubilee Fountain in the main quadrangle, a permanent reminder of the living waters that underpin our Marist heritage.


The next major event was something of a novelty. Although they had been near neighbours for some time, it might have seemed that an independent Catholic school and the Johannesburg Stock Exchange, the country's financial centre, had little in common. Not so, it seemed. Brokers, bankers and business executives





must have been somewhat surprised when they arrived at the JSE on the morning of 3 March to be greeted by a fine array of food and musical entertainment by St David's musicians. At 9 o'clock the School officially opened the exchange for the day's business. This unusual and, for South Africa, unique event was part of the St David's Foundation's 'Business in Education Funding Initiative' which aimed to reach out to the corporate sector to partner with St David's to fund bursaries to enable boys from underprivileged backgrounds to attend the School.

This enterprising initiative was in aid of the Foundation's priority at this time, which was to make it possible for more boys from disadvantaged communities to have the opportunity of an education at St David's. It was a creative way of trying to address the challenge of remaining financially viable while still fulfilling the Marist mission of providing education for those who need it most.







Another first for St David's was the African Regional Conference of the International Boys Schools' Coalition which was hosted by the School in March of the Jubilee Year. This organisation, which focuses on the work of boys' schools from both the private and public sectors, has a global membership of 300 schools across 5 continents. Some 200 delegates from Southern Africa attended the conference, enjoying fruitful interactions with their colleagues and leaving with many new ideas and a renewed enthusiasm for their work.






2016 was a year that saw fierce debates over issues of race and gender in the media and at schools and universities in particular. It was clearly not something that could reasonably be ignored, particularly in view of St David's commitment to becoming a more diverse community. This was a challenge that had to be tackled head-on. The response was named the #beyondthebox Campaign which aimed at challenging racial and gender stereotypes and encouraging the participants to embrace diversity. Although not exactly a Jubilee event, the process was entirely in harmony with the ethos and values that were being celebrated and, indeed, upon which the future is to be built.





The boys returned from the April holidays to find that another significant development was under way - work had begun on the much-anticipated Multi-Sport Facility which, when completed, will offer state of the art facilities for aquatics, tennis and basketball complete with stands, change-rooms and ablution facilities.

But the real excitement was always going to be reserved for the main Jubilee Celebrations which took place from 6 to 12 June. On Monday 6 June, the Archbishop of Johannesburg, Archbishop Buti Tlhagale, celebrated the annual Champagnat Day Mass, which was followed by a day of fun activities. The musical 'The Prodigal Son' opened on Tuesday 7 June and ran to packed houses until Friday 10 June. Not only was this a collaboration with St Teresa's, as had been the case for the past 15 years, but it was also open to both College and Prep boys. The story may have been an old one, but the treatment it received certainly wasn't, and it featured some very contemporary music supported by St David's musicians, as the core themes of belonging and family were highlighted.



Friday 10 June opened with an Assembly with a difference. It was open to Old Boys, a number of whom attended. It must have brought back memories for them, even though the days when they could fit into their school uniforms were largely long past. The oldest Old Boy who joined in the week's celebration left school in 1949! This assembly kicked off the Old Boys' Weekend, which hundreds of Old Boys from across the world and across many matriculation years attended. Events included tours of the School, a golf day,



year-group reunions and many happy hours and laughs in the specially erected 'Castle Corner' at which Chairman of the Old Boys' Association, Willy Castle, played host. Many Old Boys also

> The two highlights of the Jubilee week were the Jubilee Dinner Dance on Saturday II June and the Jubilee Mass on the Sunday. Despite icy weather, some 650 guests, including current and past parents, staff, Old Boys and Friends of St David's attended the dinner and the numbers swelled to over 3 000 for the following day's Mass held in a marquee on the McGregor Oval and celebrated by Bishop Duncan Tsoke, Auxiliary Bishop of Johannesburg. Moving in and out of the St David's community during the year were a number of foreign exchange students from India, Spain and the United States. All these visits as well as some others from during the year were reciprocated in October, when their former St David's hosts joined the exchange students in India, Spain, Japan and Australia. A particularly important visitor was the Marist Superior General, Brother Emili Turu, who visited the School from Rome in September and who brought a salutory reminder of the mission of Marist education.




















And of course there were Jubilee sporting and cultural fixtures during the week as well. There was Rugby, Hockey, Cross Country and Tennis sporting fixtures. Debating and Chess also formed part of the day's activities against a new opponent Clifton College, from Kwa-Zulu Natal and old rivals St Benedict's during Jubilee Week. Visitors were advised not to miss the Hockey fixtures as St David's had enjoyed an outstanding season with no fewer than 11 players selected to represent South Gauteng teams. Then in September, the Jubilee Cricket Festival brought 9 top boys' schools to the College to participate in a heady mix of full-day and T20 matches. The annual Soccer festival, which was hosted in August featured no fewer than 32 teams involving 600 boys. The Prep School also hosted a successful second FNB Prep Cricket Tournament, at which seven other prep schools were hosted.





There were initiatives from members of staff as well. Willy Castle decided to run three major marathons during the year – the Two Oceans, the London Marathon and the Comrades to raise funds for the St David's Marist Foundation, specifically the the Willy and Dorothy Castle Sports and Cultural Bursary Fund. Known as the Willy Castle Triple Marathons Campaign and run by the Foundation, R7I 842 was raised for bursaries.

The Jubilee celebrations were brought to a close with the Montagne Day Mass on 28 October. Not only did this mass round off the year's events, it also established what may well prove to be the most significant legacy of the Jubilee year. During the mass, three key elements were brought to the altar and blessed. The strong symbolism embodied by these three elements not only served to remind the community of their mission, but it also pointed the way forward.





Montagne Day was instituted to commemorate the significance of St Marcellin Champagnat's meeting with the dying 16-year-old Jean-Baptiste Montagne, whose death two centuries ago, on 28 October 1816, inspired St Marcellin's vocation to found a teaching order. In keeping with this calling, the boys, and many members of staff, had made a written pledge (signed with a thumbprint by the Mini-Marists) to commit themselves to living the Marist values. These pledges, the first element brought to the altar, were to be recycled into compost, which in turn would be used to plant the Montagne Pledge Tree.


The second element brought to the altar was the Montagne Pledge Tree, an olive tree (to symbolise peace), which will be planted in the Montagne Quad (the area between the Hall and the Music Centre) once the development work on the multisports centre has been completed.



The third element presented at the Mass was a unique picture. At first glance it appeared to be the standard painting of St Marcellin Champagnat. Closer inspection, however, revealed that it was in fact a montage of some 3 500 photographs of the staff and boys of St David's, cleverly created by Mr Rose-Reddiar within the painting of St Marcellin. A "halo" around St Marcellin was created to represent the 75th Jubilee Circles of Friendship, in essence a sustained giving programme. Circles of Friendship were being created by groups of families and friends within and without the St David's community; members of the circle decided on a bursary or development project that they wished to support, and committed to contributing a fixed monthly, regular or annual amount over a period of five years, to lead up to the 80th Jubilee.

Although bursaries were a priority, it was envisaged that some of these circles would also raise money for the next development project — the building of a multi-use facility to be known as the "Maristonian" for use by the Old Boys and the School as a centre for functions, meetings, events and various programmes. Clearly this, too, reflected the commitment of the whole School community to live the vision of the founder and continue his work.

The boys' circles, according to the year in which they will finish matric, were launched as part of their Montagne Day pledges – each boy was encouraged to raise R75 through his own efforts or acts of service; this money would go towards a bursary for









another boy to attend St David's. Boys will also be encouraged to make an annual contribution towards their circle each Montagne Day. Pledges had reached R70 650 by the end of the school year, and by the end of 2016 there were 50 Circles of Friendship in place, ranging from staff to parents and Old Boys' circles.

Finally, there came the reminder. This Mass may have seemed like the end, but it was only the end of the beginning. In 2017, it is the Marist Bicentenary, celebrating 200 years since the founding of the Institute of the Marist Brothers (internationally) and 150 years since the first Marist Brothers arrived on the African continent, landing at Simon's Town in 1867. The Jubilee year drew into focus just how much is expected of the Marist boy, as well as just how much is expected of a Marist school. We have an ethos and a vision and an example to live by. The Jubilee may be over, but the real challenge of living and sharing Marist values lays ahead.

Jubilee celebrations marked every pillar of our work - the Religious in the Birthday Mass in January when we blessed the Jubilee Fountain in the St David's Quad, and also in the Champagnat Day Mass, the Jubilee Mass of thanksgiving and our first Montagne Day Mass; the Academic by hosting the Africa Region Conference of the International Boys' School Coalition in March; the Cultural in the hugely successful combined production of The Prodigal Son which ran to packed and appreciative audiences; the Sporting in the two Jubilee fixtures, first a traditional rival in St Benedict's, and then a new weekend derby against Clifton School from Durban; Service and Outreach in our water collection on our birthday and the Montagne Day R75 pledges from the boys. We also focused on our Old Boys, who joined us from around the world. The year was about reconnecting or strengthening existing connections with old friends and with the School. Many people came back to our magnificent campus for the first time in years. The overarching theme and intention of the Jubilee was to remember the past, to celebrate the present and to envisage the future.





During the Jubilee celebrations, Head Boy Joshua Clegg pointed out that St David's is no ordinary school. It is perhaps precisely because of this that we have grown and continue to thrive... because we work so hard to find a balance between our context and our values, because we teach that what matters most is not what we have but who we are and what we give. These are timeless lessons that we want our boys to understand and embrace. These are the lessons that a great school offers.

A great school supports boys in their quest to find themselves, and uses uncomfortable situations as learning moments, with the pursuit of excellence and purpose as our guide. A great school is not judged by the facilities the boys use, or even by their curriculum or results... far more important are the people our boys engage with, the teachers who set an example of hard work and uncompromising character, the parents who instil family values and



boundaries and the Old Boys who hand on a legacy of expectation to the boys to nurture and protect, so that they grow their School in the time they are entrusted with it.

A great school must challenge boys to think, teach them to engage on issues and debate alternatives, so that they leave as men undaunted by the increasing challenges which society will throw at them and certain of the moral and ethical leadership they will need to provide in their communities beyond St David's. In an increasingly negative discourse in our world where interactions are focused on material possessions and in a world where boundaries are becoming blurred, all we can give our boys is opportunity. Opportunity to experiment, to try, to fail, to grow, to be positive in outlook. The most important things we can give our children are education and independence.

This is what great schools offer, and what St David's Marist Inanda will continue to offer - a Marist education which focuses on the boy, and on the relationships which he forms, teaching him to live a principled and significant life, and teaching him to step boldly into new situations on a road to his independence.

FOUNDATION MANAGER'S REPORT - 75TH JUBILEE YEAR 2016

The St David's Marist Inanda Foundation is a registered Trust (No: IT4826/06) and PBO (No: 930023385) and was founded in 2006 to ensure the long-term sustainability of St David's Marist Inanda. In 2016, in addition to the 7^{5th} Jubilee Celebrations, the Foundation celebrated its tenth year of existence,

The Foundation, based on the Advancement model used successfully in many overseas schools, as well as local and international universities, has as its primary aim the identification of opportunities for growth and development for St David's. This also includes full engagement with community and society in general in order to support St David's vision, mission and strategic objectives and to benefit those engaged with.

In the immediate term the Foundation has the responsibility to ensure that children from financially disempowered communities also have the opportunity of a St David's education, and to share in the Marist vision. The Foundation administers funds and donations received in support of this aim and supports the holistic development of each bursary beneficiary.

St David's, at its Marist core, has a very strong social development ethos and finding ways to maximise our impact in society remains a priority. The Foundation's focus also centres on introducing and growing philanthropic thought, practices and technology within our community – to do 'What you can, with what you have, where you are.'

Foundation Bursary Beneficiaries

There are currently 44 boys on bursaries at St David's – 17 (15 at school level and 2 at tertiary level) boys are funded directly through the Foundation, and a further 29 are funded through the School, some in partnership with the Alexandra Education Trust and the Student Sponsorship Programme.

Donor funding received during 2016 has gone a long way to making a very real difference in the lives of boys who would otherwise be unable to afford a Marist education and has assisted us practically in living out our Founder, St Marcellin Champagnat's belief that, 'To teach children, you must love them and love them equally.'

THE 75TH JUBILEE YEAR – FOUNDATION EVENTS AND CAMPAIGNS

The 75th Jubilee Campaign - Circles of Friendship

The 75th Jubilee Circles of Friendship campaign was designed to link the parents, staff, boys, and Old Boys as a community in long-term relationship and giving campaign, to commemorate the 75th Jubilee year and carry through to the 80th Jubilee.

The aim of the Circles is to connect the entire St David's community through interconnected circles of giving reflecting all the areas of connectedness and involvement at St David's; the Montagne Day Pledge was the start of initiating the boys' Circles of Friendship which will continue until their matric year and beyond as they become Old Boys.

The Campaign was initially introduced towards the end of 2015 when the entire School received the Circles of Friendship Bracelet with an accompanying explanation: the campaign was promoted

through various forums and mediums to parent, staff and Old Boys throughout 2016 (including through the Coffee and Donuts Sessions – each of which covered a different area of interest and activity at St David's), with the final 'activation' being with the St David's boys through the Montagne Day Pledge initiative. A google form link was also shared with the community where Circles could register and indicate their area of support and how they would be contributing to their Circle (ranging from monthly to annual contributions or contributions on an ad hoc if they had decided to engage in fundraising activities in support of their Circle). The St David's Marist Foundation Trustees initiated the first Circle and by the end of 2016 there were 50 Circles in place, which to date had brought in combined donations of R 754 236.

Coffee and Donut 75th Jubilee Circles of Friendship Mornings

Seven Coffee and Donut mornings were held during the year to provide further information on the Circles initiative, each with a specific focus, for example, Sports and Cultural Activities, Outreach, Old Boys, etc. A number of Circles were initiated through these mornings, with some being more 'fundraising' focused than others. The mornings were a wonderful opportunity for some great discussions around areas that parents feel passionately about and ideas on how to raise funds through the various Circles, from those Circles who preferred this rather than to commit to a monthly or annual donation, has been very innovative and inspiring. The idea of the Circles is to create a form of Giving Circle participatory philanthropy linking our community in a rich tapestry of support and connection and we have been inspired and touched by the way this initiative has evolved.



St David's JSE Opening of the Market Morning (3 March 2016)

('Business in Education' BEE Bursary Fund initiative)

On Thursday 3 March, St David's became the first school in South Africa to open the JSE (Johannesburg Securities Exchange) trading floor for the day as part of the launch of the St David's Marist Foundation 'Business in Education' Bursary Fund initiative.

Almost 100 Captains of Industry, including several St David's Old Boys, gathered at the JSE for the launch – Nicky Newton-

King, CEO of the JSE, gave the Keynote Speech and commended St David's on being the first school in the history of the JSE to open the Market. Andy Hall, then-Vice-Chair of the St David's Marist Foundation, and CEO of Adcock Ingram, introduced the 'Business in Education' initiative and invited business to partner with St David's to invest in education with a school that has a proud 75-year legacy of creating leaders who act with integrity, have a hunger for pursuing excellence and social responsibility and are values-driven business, political, sports and community leaders.

Sandra Borrageiro, Head of Project Delivery, Trading and Market Services at the JSE, and a proud St David's parent, MC'd the morning and the St David's Chamber Choir and Saxophone Quartet entertained the gathered guests with their performances, under the direction of Mr Ferreira and Mr Luke. Members of the Matric Executive and the St David's PR Portfolio boys were also in attendance with 2016 Head Boy Joshua Clegg, and Deputy Head Boy Bogosi Msutwana, joining Mike Thiel, Andy Hall and Lara Klement



on the JSE rostrum to officially open the Market with the sound of a Kudu Horn, drums, marimba and vuvuzela. The gathered guests were also involved in the count-down to the Market Open at 9am and the JSE commented that St David's had provided the loudest Market Open to date at the JSE.

Nicky Newton-King had earlier light-heartedly remarked in her speech that at the JSE they have noticed a correlation between the amount of sound made by a company opening the Market, and the (good) performance of the Market that day — that night business news reports were reporting an unprecedented good day on the JSE Market!

The morning closed with the St David's boys giving an impromptu presentation of 'Inanda's Call' which made a marked impression on the guests.

St David's was also delighted to be able to live-stream the event from the JSE – members of the St David's community were able to watch the proceedings live back at St David's, and around the world.

The 'Business in Education' initiative invites businesses to partner with St David's in establishing a fund, ring-fenced according to the B-BBEE Revised Codes of Good Practice, which will enable the School to expand its existing bursary programme which awards young deserving scholars from historically disadvantaged backgrounds with bursaries to St David's.

As Mike Thiel, Executive Headmaster, said "The issues faced by business and society are issues that should be solved during the formative educational years. Our strategic partnerships with Business are creating opportunities to grow a truly transformed and uplifted South Africa. Business and Education share a common dialogue — our partnerships with Business will bring this conversation into one space."

Willy Castle Triple Marathons Bursary Campaign (February – April 2016)

It was a Triple Marathon Year for St David's legend Willy Castle during the St David's 75th Jubilee Year. Willy ran three marathons in three months in support of two of the Foundation Bursary Fund programmes: his 14th Two Oceans Marathon on Saturday 26 March, his 4th London Marathon on Sunday 24 April and his 29th Comrades Marathon on Sunday 29 May. Willy ran the three marathons in aid of the Willy & Dorothy Castle Sports and Cultural Fund, as well as in aid of the Marist Old Boys' Bursary Fund – a fund which supports boys who are sons of St David's Old Boys, who may have fallen upon difficult times, or any boy that the Old Boys identify as being a worthy candidate and who displays the Marist values. He was unfortunately unable to complete the Two Oceans Marathon due to suspected hypothermia, but successfully completed his 4th London Marathon and his 29th Comrades Marathon and in the process raised R 71 842 for the two bursary funds.

Montagne Day 2016 Pledges (28 October 2016)

The 75th Jubilee Year celebrations formally concluded with the celebration of Montagne Day Mass on Friday 28 October which marked the 200th Anniversary of the visit of St Marcellin Champagnat to the bedside of the dying 16 year-old Jean-Baptiste Montagne, an incident which profoundly affected St Marcellin and inspired





him to found the teaching order of Marist Brothers. Each boy was asked to make a Montagne Day Marist Pledge, and to accompany this by donating R 75 towards the 75th Jubilee Circles of Friendship Campaign, raised through his own efforts and acts of service. These donations form the start of each year group's own Jubilee Circles of Friendship as per the matric years that they will eventually become,

for example, those boys who were in Grade 6 in 2016 will be the Matric Class of 2022. The funds raised go towards a bursary for an underprivileged boy (a modern-day Montagne) — the Grade 5s, led by Mr Byron King, decided to take part in the 94.7 Mountain Bike Challenge on 13 November 2016 to raise additional funds in support of their Montagne Day Pledges towards this bursary and contributed just over R 21 000 to the final tally of R 70 650 in pledges received.









75th Jubilee Photo Montage of St Marcellin Champagnat

As part of the Montage Day Mass the photo composite of St Marcellin Champagnat was unveiled and blessed — the idea for this had come about in the Foundation space whilst doing conducting online research for the Circles of Friendship campaign and Jubilee Bracelet — we came across a photo composite of St Marcellin Champagnat that had been created by Marist High School in Chicago, USA. The face of St Marcellin was made up of photographs of the students and staff of the Marist High School and we felt that this would be an excellent way to celebrate and remember our 75th Jubilee Year for many years to come and to reflect the Circles of Friendship that were formed at this time. To have



the face of our Founder made up of all of our faces reflects where our Marist roots come from and how we, as the St David's community, continue to carry forward the ethos, vision, work and legacy of St Marcelllin Champagnat 200 years after he founded the Marist Brothers teaching order. The Chicago photograph was used on the information cards that accompanied the Jubilee Bracelets and, being fortunate to have the photographic talents of Mr Rose-Reddiar at St David's, we spoke to him about creating our very own St David's image. He worked throughout the Jubilee Year to compile the photomontage from individual St David's boys and staff photographs plus photos taken at the Jubilee celebrations and other events through the year. The Photo Montage has been placed in the foyer of the Champagnat Hall in commemoration of our 75th Jubilee Year.

Montagne Day also formally led into the Bicentenary of the founding of the Marist Institute as well as marking the 150th year of Marist education in South Africa, which are both celebrated in 2017. The Marist Education Bicentenary will be celebrated globally throughout the Marist community.

Staff Giving Fund (SGF)

The Staff Giving Fund (formerly known as the Staff Bursary Fund) was established 18 years ago in response to the needs of boys in the School and in keeping with one of the teachings of St Marcellin Champagnat that "to teach children well, you must first love them, and love them all equally." The Fund provides boys on financial support with not only the basics such as textbooks, uniforms and lunches but also some of the extras that would enable them to thrive such as proper sports kits, payment for extra-curricular tours, tutoring and medical expenses (such as glasses and dentistry), meaning that they have access to support and opportunities equal to those of their more financially-privileged peers at St David's.

The SGT is supported solely by the monthly contributions of St David's Staff and from the fundraising activities from Champagnat Day (6 June each year). The funds are administered by the St David's Marist Foundation; however, the SGF Committee, headed by Mrs Belinda Marais, make the decisions around the allocation of the funds. During 2016 48 staff members contributed a total of R 73 100 via their monthly contributions bringing the total donated over the past 18 years to just under R 900 000.

Christmas Giving Campaign 2016 (November 2016)

2016 concluded with the third annual Christmas Giving Campaign — an initiative through which donors give a Christmas gift of a different kind — one which will have the most profound impact on the lives of young boys who ordinarily would not have access to the unique opportunity of a Marist education, due to family or social circumstances. Donations of R 18 400 were received which were highly appreciated in light of the fact that the campaign last year ran alongside the 2016 Montagne Day Pledge initiative (which brought in funds of R 70 550). Total contributions to the Christmas Giving campaign over the past three years have amounted to R 194 000.

A Tribute to Robin Smith (Outgoing Foundation Chairman)



CHAPLAIN'S NOTES FR TEBOHO MATSEKE

JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY and ST DAVID'S JUBILEE - YESTERDAY, TODAY, TOMORROW AND TOGETHER.


On the 8th December 2015 Pope Francis promulgated 2015 – 2016 as the Year of Mercy. The word, "Mercy" is the word that we find in the Gospel of Luke 6:36: "Be merciful as your Father is merciful". This means that the whole Church has to be merciful to ALL humanity despite the acts that one has done. In announcing the Extraordinary Jubilee of Mercy, Pope Francis declared: "The Holy Door will become a Door of mercy through which anyone who enters will experience the love of God who consoles, pardons and in stills hope". He continued to say that anyone who passes through the door from outside of St Peter's into the basilica is to pass from this world into the presence of God, just as in the old temple of Jerusalem. Jesus said: "I am the door" Jn 10:7, in order to make it clear that no one can come to the Father except through him.

The significance of the Holy Door is from the year I300 when Pope Boniface VIII declared the first Holy year, the Catholic Church has regularly celebrated "Holy years", usually every twenty-five years. A major aspect of the Holy year has been that of pilgrimage to Rome to make reparation for sin and to renew the conversion of one's life. Therefore, each pilgrim has to pass through the Holy Door because Christ identifies Himself as "the door".

In our Archdiocese, Archbishop Buti Thlagale asked each Dean to organise a Holy Door in their deaneries so that the faithful could come together and share the day with Mass, prayers, benediction and confessions. This was accepted by all faithful and it was a success in most parishes.

The Year of Mercy and the Door of Mercy coincided very well with

our Jubilee at the School - 75 years in existence. There were so many activities done during this year and we are grateful for the blessings and love from God. We started our school on a high note by having a Week of Prayer, from 25 January to 29 January 2016 with a slogan of the week that says: #thankyouLord. Each day we had prayers that are very close to other religions i.e. on Monday 25 January we prayed an Islam Prayer of Peace,



Tuesday the 26th we prayed a Lutheran Morning Prayer, Wednesday the 27th we launched the Jubilee Year and also blessed the Jubilee Fountain. Bishop Emeritus, Patrick Mvemve was the main celebrant.

The prayer of help that reminds us that the Blessed Virgin Mary is ready to help us when needed if we approach her with love, true contrition for our sins and a sincere desire to do her son's will, the Memorare, a hymn called, "The Memorare", was composed for the School Jubilee year 2016 by our Head of Music, Mr Chris Luke, and it was sung during communion on 27 January 2016. We chose the 27th of January because the day marked a very important day for the School – the Birthday of the School. On Thursday 28 January we prayed a Hindu Prayer of Peace and on Friday the 29th we prayed the Christian Prayer for all in need. These prayers were said

by the Staff in their morning prayer and thereafter the boys would say same prayers in the assembly. The week was the beginning of a busy year and one could feel the spirit of God among the staff, boys and parents. During this week the boys spent their time in the chapel during the Religious Education lessons and dropped off their prayer petitions into the Prayer Box. The prayer petitions were burned at the Senior Prep Mass on Friday the 5th of February 2016. This was a personal and sentimental experience for all.

Both the Prep and College had their prayers said in their Houses, The Bishops (yellow), Osmond (blue) Benedict (green) and College (red). The Prep school at the start of each day except Wednesday the 27, in each class formed a circle and prayed the following prayer for the boy standing on their right: "Lord, please bless my friend (name of a friend) and his family. Please keep them safe and happy. Amen", The College prayers were led by the Religious Portfolio boys.

On the 3rd of February we celebrated the Feast of St Blaise, the patron saint of sore throats. On this day students, teachers and parents came to the Priest or the Extra Ordinary Minister of the Eucharist for a blessing with crossed candles which are blessed by the Priest. The blessing of the throats is a sacramental of the Roman Catholic Church which we encourage all to attend Mass for healing. On the 1st of March we celebrated the Feast of St David's. the patron saint of Wales. This day was chosen in remembrance of the death of Saint David, and as a Catholic School that is named after St David, it is therefore appropriate to observe a moment of silence and gratitude for St David's prayers and protection. On the same day we launched the Marist Acts of Kindness cards which were distributed to all members of the staff, the boys and parents. This was a reminder that during the time of the Year of Mercy and the School Jubilee Year, we needed to be merciful and be kind to others in small things.

On the 10th of March we celebrated Ash Wednesday which is the beginning of Lent. On this day it's a Combined Mass which is well attended by all including the parents. During the period of Lent, we had the Stations of the Cross every morning in the Chapel of our Lady. We invited all to come as we prepared ourselves for the Death and Resurrection of our Lord, On Sunday 20 March it was Palm Sunday; a week prior to Palm Sunday we prepared the boys in the Chapel by explaining to them the meaning and purpose of Palm Sunday. We then celebrated Palm Sunday in our weekly Masses with palms brought during the procession, then blessed and laid on the altar. The Feast day is celebrated in a solemn way. 2016 was definitely a blessed year for us for the fact that for the first time this year we celebrated the Holy Week at School. The beginning of Triduum was on Maundy Thursday where 12 boys were chosen from the confirmation group to come forward for their feet to be washed by the priest. This ceremony was explained to the boys and they also learned about it in the Religious Education periods,

The Jubilee Year came with so many activities at the School were we had a Jubilee week from Saturday the 4th of June to Sunday the 12th of June 2016. The Executive Headmaster, Mr Mike Thiel puts it like this: "...the Jubilee week will be our main time of celebration with major sporting home fixtures on both Saturdays, the first against a traditional rival and the last against a new rival, and many activities in between... the week will include Opening Mass on Monday the 6th June as we celebrate Champagnat Day, the traditional Champagnat day Carnival and Sport... the Jubilee Gala dinner on Saturday the 11th of June and the Jubilee Mass on Sunday the 12th of June followed by a family picnic in the grounds". This was

the summit of the Jubilee and the Auxiliary Bishop of Johannesburg, Duncan Tsoke, was the main celebrant with Fr Michael Austin the former School Chaplain, Fr Inigo from the Opus Dei congregation, Fr Patrick Dladla (an Old Boy), Fr Ben Mahlangu from Victory Park parish and Fr Teboho Matseke, the Chaplain of the School, as cocelebrants. On this day the Jubilee Flag was blessed by the School Chaplain, Fr Teboho Matseke and a Jubilee Cake was cut by an Old boy, Mr Chris Busschau.



On the 6th of June we celebrated Champagnat Day, Mass was celebrated and the main celebrant was His Grace Archbishop Buti. Thlagale. St Marcellin Champagnat was declared Venerable in 1920 by Pope Benedict XV, beatified by Pope Pius XII on 29th May 1955 and canonised by Pope John Paull II on the 18th of April 1999. His feast day is observed on the 6th June.

We pride ourselves by following the Ethos of the School as we continue to praise God in different ways at the School. Every first Saturday of the month, we have a Family Mass, where we invite the boys, parents and friends to come together and break the bread as a family. This Mass is always full and there is a demand that we need to celebrate it every Saturday. After each Mass we have refreshments, tea and coffee, for members to know each other and also share with friends. This gathering is also meant to welcome new members/parents of the School and boys. We practice what the Pope asks us to do, to be kind and merciful just like the Father.

We also had the confirmation ceremony on 9 September which was celebrated at the Chapel of our Lady. 2016 marked another special year, as it was the first time that we celebrated the Confirmation ceremony at the School. It was always celebrated at the parish, Immaculate Conception in Rosebank. Once again our boys made us proud and raised the flag very high as they behaved and followed the instructions very well. The Spirit of God was at work on this day. The boys and the parents were happy to see the Archbishop and that he has confirmed them at the School, their house of worship, Friends and family members were there to witness and be part of the beautiful ceremony and refreshments were served for all to enjoy. Prior to the Sacrament of Confirmation, the 34 boys together with the RE Co-ordinator, Mr Pat Lenye spent the whole weekend together for a retreat and confessions. This year they went to Saint Bosco Youth Retreat Centre in Daleside where the boys were given more information about the Sacrament of Confirmation and also did the Stations of the Cross on the mountain. What a moving experience they had and they all came back filled by God's Spirit.

The Sacrament of First Holy Communion for the boys was also celebrated at the School on the 2nd of October 2016. This was another high point for the School during the Jubilee Year. This year we had approximately 31 boys who also raised the School flag very high. Their instructor, Mrs Cherie Smith, took them for a day's retreat on the 1st of October where they were prepared for the Sacrament and also taught about nature. This was fruitful as the boys came back with so much zeal and enthusiasm for the Sacrament. The following day, the boys were so beautiful with their school uniform and they looked like angels. Again the day was well attended by parents, relatives and many friends. The choir under the guidance of Mrs Merle Kantor and Mrs Susanne-Human and Mrs Libby Hill sang melodiously. Our boys made us proud once again with their behaviour and good manners. The day ended with refreshments for all in the garden of Our Lady.

The Ethos of the School demands that each Catholic boy is expected to go for confessions, especially just before or during the season of Lent and Advent. Our Prep boys were given the opportunity to confess their sins and this included those who are not Catholic. The non-Catholic boys would pray together with the confessor for his sins to be forgiven. This is well encouraged and the boys took this time very seriously and we thank all the teachers who supported Mrs Cherie Smith. We had external priests who assisted our Chaplain, Fr Teboho Matseke, with the confessions namely Fr Patrick Dladla and Fr Chaka Motanyane and the confessions took three days (15th – 18th) during the month of November.

As we were approaching the month of December we all know that the December month is the birth of our Lord, Jesus Christ, The Prep School organised a beautiful ceremony of Carols by Candle Light on 22 November. Again the boys under the guidance of their choir masters made us proud by singing the Carols while holding their candles under the theme of "God being the gift to us". Parents, staff and friends were all invited to experience this magnificent spirit of Christmas with the boys. The boys were exceptionally beautiful with their play and dramatizing the birth of Our Lord. Something that was more personal for me was the fact that each boy brought a gift for the baby Jesus. These gifts were brought to the Altar towards the end of the ceremony and they were shared with the children who could not receive a gift because of their condition. So our boys brought a smile to many children who are poor and that is what our current Pope, Pope Francis says: "...if you want to end poverty to the world, be the first one to help the poor...", and our boys did just that as they exchanged the gift of love to the poor, for which we are grateful to the parents who assisted our boys.

As a School that was started by St Marcellin Champagnat who founded a religious community called; "The Marist Brothers", it is mentioned that on the 28th of October 1816, three months after his ordination, St Marcellin Champagnat was called to the Montagne home where a 16-year-old boy, Jean-Baptiste Montagne was dying. As St Marcellin prepared to hear confessions of Jean-Baptiste, he realized that the young man had little religious or academic education. It occurred to him that Jean-Baptiste was one of many young people victimized by lack of education during and after the French Revolution. He thought of his own difficult school experience and his encounter with Jean-Baptiste Montagne convinced him that he had to do something to combat the illiteracy and spiritual poverty of the young people in rural France. Then he started the order of Brothers, the Marist Brothers.

The School therefore celebrated Montagne Day on the 28th of October and the theme was; "Rooted in the Spirit". In the liturgical calendar of the Church, the day is a feast of two disciples of Jesus Christ, SS Simon and Jude. Both Saints died for their faith and their blood was shed, hence the colour of the day is red. This coincided beautifully with the order of the day as a school because Jean-Baptiste died after being baptised and confessed. So his faith of believing made him receive a peaceful death. The day started with the celebration of Mass and it marked the end of the Jubilee celebrations. During this celebration all School members were invited to pledge to live a Marist life moving forward,

The pledges were brought by the Prep boys to the altar during the procession of the offertory. A collage of St Marcellin Champagnat with pictures of each member of staff, and boy was brought to the altar. Towards the end of Mass, a tree was also brought to the altar to symbolize the moving forward as Marist. The photo and tree, were blessed by the School Chaplain, Fr Teboho Matseke. The pledges were used as a compost for the tree. The two Old Boys of St David's who are ordained as priests were present to commemorate this beautiful day with us namely, Fr Patrick Dladla, who gave a moving sermon, and Fr Deneys Williamson, who was the main celebrant.



The year 2016 came and it is gone and now we are starting a new year where we prepare a start of another 75 years. As we start the second 75 years let us continue to be pillars of strength to the current boys and many more who are going to pass the walls of St David's Marist Inanda in the future. Let us continue to build a good foundation and never lose the vision of our founder, St Marcellin Champagnat when he said: "if you want to teach young people, first you much love them - love them equally". And also: "I cannot see a child without wanting to tell them how much God loves them". Let us therefore love our family members equally.

As the Year of Mercy is coming to an end, have a blessed Christmas and a prosperous new year. May God surround you with Peace and love as you enjoy the time with your families. God bless you all.



The following day was the annual carnival fun day full of fun activities and the Prep 5-a-side soccer tournament run by Mr Bruce Eyles.



























Good evening, Ladies and Gentlemen, Board Chair Mr John Chemaly, Foundation Chair Mr Andy Hall, PTA Chair Mr Grant Krog, Marist Old Boys' Chair Mr Willy Castle, and each one of you as parents, and friends present, who voluntarily give of your time and expertise to ensuring the smooth governance and running of the committees that build the fabric of our School. We are fortunate that so many people understand so clearly what a Marist school is all about and are prepared to put in the work needed to make this a special place for our boys. Your presence this evening is much appreciated and a reminder of this commitment you bring to our School.

It is in modelling this type of commitment to hard work, and in sharing our love for that fabric that is St David's Marist Inanda that we are able to teach our sons what it takes to be a man in today's world. Likewise, in greeting the young men of St David's, most especially tonight our leaving class – the Matrics of 2016 – I commend you all on the role that you have played in making 2016, our Jubilee year in celebration of 75 years of St David's, a special year which has certainly woven in many new strands to that St David's fabric.

While I was at times at odds with some of her more conservative judgements, retired American Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor really got it right when she said:

"We don't accomplish anything in this life alone... and whatever happens is the result of the whole tapestry of one's life and all the weavings of individual threads from one to another that together create something."

Celebrating a Jubilee year gave us opportunity to look again at what we create here, our own school community tapestry, woven together to make our St David's Marist Inanda 'something'. It is a vibrant piece, with contrasting colours and shapes, new designs, some dead-ends and some threads loose and moving in new and original directions.

Who works on this tapestry? Easy to answer, we all do – every one of us has had a part to play in what the School looks like. Whether you joined St David's 14 years ago, 40 years ago or whether you arrived just this term, your input and actions are part of this incredible tapestry, your actions and inactions all woven in to the fabric of our School.

While there is and should always be room for individual creativity at St David's, our tapestry needs a cohesive theme, a set of nonnegotiables which form the centre point of our weaving. In welcoming Br Joe and Br Mario to Speech Night, I thank the Marist Brothers for laying a foundation over the years that has given us firmly established principles to guide us. We look regularly at what simplicity, modesty and humility mean in our world context, we acknowledge that we go further individually and collectively with a love of Mary, by operating as a Family, by loving work and showing this in what we do, and by being present, to those around us, to ourselves and present to the experiences we have on offer here. For the past two years we have especially linked an understanding of being Marist with the phrase of 'Gentleman, Scholar and Sportsman'. There are very few areas of our Marist school life, and indeed our family lives at home that would not be covered by striving to be all three of these. Similarly, as Mr Smith often points out, where we make mistakes it is often because we have failed to act in a gentlemanly way, have neglected what it takes to be academically curious and diligent or have forgotten the character traits necessary to be a good sport on our fields or stages of competition.

Here at St David's we are privileged to have superb teams working with our boys, modelling for them correct behaviour in spiritual, academic, cultural, sporting, administrative and support areas and guiding them to both inner and outer success for their College years and beyond.

In thanking the College staffing teams under the leadership of Messrs Dave Smith, Nick Clogg and Brad Ireland, as well as the Housemasters, academic subject leaders and all our teachers and interns, we can take pride in an evolving pastoral care system which seeks to make all boys known and loved, which seeks to challenge them in new directions, which seeks to remind us all that every boy must count and every relationship and interaction must therefore be nourished. Our evolving pillars of character are a clear road map for all our boys and a tighter emphasis will challenge each grade into a specific focus – for Grade 8s – the chance To Join, for the Grade 9s – chance To Journey, for the Grade 10s – chance To Serve, for the Grade 11s – chance To Lead, and for the Grade 12s – chance To have Impact...

A College journey will ready our young men for the significant challenges they will meet in our wider world. We teach universal values as the rocks for our boys to root themselves on. If they come back to them then the constructs of race and culture will never overcome their identity, as it is rooted on timeless values and skills that cannot be disputed.

Likewise, one never 'arrives' at a holy grail of academic curriculum, a perfect timetable or the best way even to teach a specific subject. At St David's we are blessed with divergent thinkers on our staff who understand that teaching to the test is a sad way of dumbing down boys who must rather be taught subject mastery so that the tests become no more than a vehicle for them to prove their academic credentials. Our 2016 introduction of teaching Divergent Thinking Skills will grow next year into a cross-modular experience for our Grade 8 and 9 boys as they delve into the world of maker-crafts, linking thoughts, processes and making connections that can only come when the curriculum structures are sufficiently loosened for this to happen. I look forward to debates on ethics, and to evermore creative use of computer coding, design, music, art and dance, amongst other things. This is a programme that will excite all of us and give a modern shine to our tapestry.

As will the introduction of an Academic Think Tank at senior staff level, with the constant call to find innovation in academic areas so that we do indeed prepare our boys for the tests at matric level, but also for life beyond those tests.

In our sporting and cultural areas, we are focusing on the lessons our boys need to learn, the life skills we want them to leave with and the fun that will make these pursuits their passions in future years, whether destined for national teams or not.

I am also pleased to be able to announce, following the approval by both our Board of Governors and last week by the Marist Schools' Council, that St David's will change shape somewhat over the next few years, with the first of what we hope will be a number of family-unit boarding houses opening during 2017. Further detail on cost and offerings will reach all our current families in the next few weeks, and I look forward to the positive benefits St David's will experience as it moves to a hybrid model of day-schooling and boarding in the years to come. Both will remain integral parts of what we offer, but the fabric of our tapestry can only be strengthened by the addition of a boarding element.

In thanking Mr Graeme Edwards and the Prep School team for their hard work this year, I would like to wish Mr Tony Williams well as he leaves us to take over as Principal of the Prep School at Marist Linneyer. Thanks also to the College and broader Admin teams for the work they do under the leadership of Mrs Lara Klement (our Advancement Manager). Mr Mike Boden (our Business Manager), Mr Thomas Ramutshindela (our Estate Manager) and of course our Chaplain, Fr Teboho Matseke,

I ask you boys and parents to join me in acknowledging and applauding the work of the teachers and administration teams during 2016, our Jubilee year.

The real success for you, boys, comes in living the values of simplicity, humility and modesty as you model them for the Prep boys who will enter the College in years to come and as you live and lead using them as your guide in an increasingly fractured society.

Our newsletters have covered our multiple successes, and also our moments of failure, in diverse areas – on the sports fields, the cultural stages and in academic and other pursuits. I am not going to repeat them here, as you will re-live them in our Jubilee Yearbook.

What is gratifying to mention tonight is the way in which our boys participated, with enthusiasm, tenacity, and a can-do attitude that is ultimately far more important than what was achieved. Gentlemen, your contribution to the tapestry of St David's in this Jubilee year fills us all with pride and confirms for us that you truly understand what this School is about and have played your role admirably in building another fine year for our School.

The Auxiliary Bishop of Johannesburg encouraged us to have gratitude in his homily at the Jubilee Mass, for the comfort of our lives and School. But the greater world is one of less certain comfort, and Josh. Bogosi and all our matrics will venture into a world more challenging than at any time in the recent past. The turmoil and confusion on our university campuses is a concern to all. What started as a simple and possible call for free tertiary education in state universities has gathered other causes alongside it and now reflects the frustration so many hold with a lack of leadership in this and other sectors.

In turn this situation polarises many, who so easily turn to race and class divisions, and to perceptions that schools like ours work so hard to try and overcome in a new generation. Instead of rational debate and listening to others, a destructive and confrontational situation has now developed that is breaking down the traditional richness of debate which has always been so much a part of student and university life;

Boys, you need to enter this debate not afraid, but heartened—because at St David's you have been challenged to develop your own opinions, to listen to others as part of this process and to lead discussions with courage, integrity and with an understanding that it is in how we treat those weaker than ourselves that our true character shows. I told last year's matrics to be bold in how they lived their adult lives, and for you this is even more important. Be bold and model relationships and values, and remember that a win-at-all costs attitude leads only to loss for everyone, Listen and build the fabric of our society according to the values that you have learned at this School.

Our St David's tapestry is unlikely to ever be square, or even rectangular, or even round. It is more likely to be a work of unusual shape and it will definitely be a work in continual progress. It probably won't even be pretty — in a conventional sense that is, because education is a messy business, in that it works with people's minds and attitudes. It moves at different paces for different people, it doesn't square away into neat boxes, it seldom allows for the perfect photo opportunity or a moment when everything is just right – school is a never-ending place of journey, and that is OK, because it mirrors life.

Ladies and Gentlemen, in our Jubilee year we have celebrated the past, we have enjoyed the present, and we must now look to the future, secure in nothing other than the values that we hold dear and the belief that our people must count more than anything else.

COLLEGE OUTREACH

Community service continues to embody the values of St David's Marist Inanda. Marist men do not only strive for personal excellence, but show compassion and care for others as well. Going from strength to strength, many new initiatives have been taken on board this year. The weekly activities of Alexandra Soup Kitchen, S.M.I.L.E. and the visits to Mother Teresa's Home and Headway have been well supported this year. A new system of signing up boys for the respective school-organised community service trips have proven to be successful and hopefully these activities will continue to be supported in the years to come. These activities are important and build up a healthy awareness of the needs of our community.

Because of other commitments and a full school programme, many of our boys are unable to attend the weekly activities offered by the School. These boys are encouraged to find their own community service activities and to furnish details of this to the Co-ordinator of Outreach. Boys are consequently involved in a very wide range of activities outside of the School.

Before the commencement of the school year, the Head of School, Joshua Clegg and Deputy Head of School, Bogosi Msutwana embarked on a Marist schools 'camp'. This is always a wonderful opportunity for the leaders of the School to experience the work done by the Marist Brothers and to demonstrate solidarity with them.

The annual Shavathon was once again well supported this year by both the Prep School and College. Approximately RI4000.00 was raised for this worthy cause. The Blood Drive during February and April was supported by an ever-increasing number of boys. Every pint counts and a big thank you must go to these boys who have helped potentially to save lives of those in need. The recent addition of the pancake drive organised by Mrs Marais into the St David's calendar has been approached in a fun and giving manner once again. RI0000.00 was raised and was sent to the Eastern Cape where Brother Christopher received it on behalf of Marist Care.





The Grade 10 and 11 Outreach days were once again a huge success and an opportunity for our boys to experience the working, learning and living conditions of fellow South Africans who are not as privileged as themselves. The children in the schools visited really appreciate the presence of our St David's boys and there is always a sense of excitement at our arrival. The boys were divided up between four primary schools in Alexandra township. The schools were Ekukhanyisweni Primary, Emfundisweni Primary, Gordon Primary and Ikage Primary. Staff members accompanied the boys to each of the schools where literacy and numeracy lessons were delivered. While the spirit of giving was clearly evident in the passion in which the boys

helped the children, they also got a chance to see the conditions under which people in the country live and the limited facilities that many schools have. These visits are certainly as much an education for the St David's boys as it is for the children in Alexandra.

The cash collection from the Civvies day in April went towards the bread and soup supplies for Alex Soup Kitchen. There were many charity drives during the year. An initiative was taken on board which was called Clothes to Cash. This involved members of the St David's community donating used clothes still in a good condition which in turn was used to support children in early childhood development (including children with disabilities), improve mobility for children living with disabilities or to plant trees. The blankets and food for the SPCA was another drive that was generously supported and all collections went towards animals in distress. The Jeans for Genes drive was fantastic and a huge success. The St David's boys united by wearing their favourite jeans and donating money to support genetic research. Every rand raised on the day helps scientists at Children's Medical Research Institute discover treatments and cures, to give every child the opportunity to live a long and healthy life.

The holiday 'camp', 3 to 6 Refugee Program in April afforded the boys an opportunity to help and play with refugee children at Sacred Heart College. The boys were involved in various other activities during the week.

The Champagnat Day celebrations were enjoyed by all at St David's and is an important day on the calendar as the funds raised go towards the bursary fund run by the teachers. This money is kept for students who come from disadvantaged schools and can't afford to come to St David's.

The Physical Science teacher enrichment programme for Alexandra High Schools is run by St Mary's Community office, directed by Mrs Linda Giuricich. Based on the claim that the high schools lack the Science equipment and the skills to do experimental work, we facilitate workshops as part of the outreach project. The project has even gone further to involve boys from St David's and girls from St Mary's to work with students from the Alex schools to put order into the Science storerooms. This has helped the teachers in the schools to easily locate the apparatus that they want to use. In fact, the schools have lots of equipment but because there is no order, it becomes difficult to access the equipment. The outreach on Friday afternoons have earned the boys and girls involved hours of service. What is now required is for the schools to maintain order and take stock of what they have and utilise the equipment in the teaching of Science. (We thank Mr Mudzingwa for his time and efforts with regard to this Science enrichment programme.)

In keeping with the Pope's policy of inclusivity, our Grade II Hands of Champagnat worked very closely with The Gift of the Givers, the most trusted disaster relief organisation in South Africa. The boys were eager to participate in Operation Hydrate and started raising funds to bring some relief to areas which had been affected by the drought. They encountered many problems and were disappointed by the amount of money that the School brought in.

However, in the April holiday this year the boys participated in a residential project with the Sai Centre in Midrand. Again the boys had the privilege of meeting people from different racial and religious backgrounds, but found common ground in their desire to be of service to humanity and to make a difference in this country in which we live. The boys enjoyed their interaction with the coordinators of the camp. They attended workshops outlining the difference

between donating and giving, participated in a tutoring session at a school in Alexandra, fed homeless people in the inner city and lay some gardens on the site, which will support the soup kitchen for the inner city. They also helped to prepare their own meals and kept the place clean. Their responses during the reflection at the end of the week were amazing and almost all who attended felt that the experience had been a paradigm shift for them.

After the November examination the Grade IIs will participate in another residential project in Limpopo, accompanied by Mrs Ellis and Mrs Marais. They will be renovating a school, painting, building and laying a vegetable garden. It is our intention to involve the learners from the area so that they can continue to take care of their buildings and take pride in it as well as for them to maintain the vegetable garden.

Those staff involved in the Outreach programme attended a conference at St John's College in October, which was most useful in assessing what we do at St David's. The conference also exposed us to new insights and possibilities which we are looking to discuss and consider. We need to take stock in three areas: how successfully we are sensitising our boys to the needs of our community; what sustainable difference we can make within our communities and

how St David's is transforming in terms of providing opportunities to learners from disadvantaged backgrounds and providing internship opportunities to prospective teachers from other communities.



HEAD PREFECT'S ADDRESS

"Rise and rise again until lambs become lions and our opponents fall at the sight of black and gold." This is a quote that struck me at the beginning of the year and has stayed in my mind ever since because it aptly portrays what I feel about our beloved Inanda, what I feel the goal of the School is; to produce Marist men of character with strong, well-based values and an ability to tackle challenges.

Good evening Mr Thiel, Deputy Headmasters, Board of Governors, distinguished guests, staff, parents and the gentlemen of St David's.

While trying to write this speech, I realised it was going to be incredibly difficult to sum up the last five years of my life. I also noticed that my time here is almost one third of some of my fellow matrics, yet this School has still managed to be the central point of my life, around which I based almost everything.

When I considered why this was the case in my own personal experience, the answer was all around me. It appeared in the diaries, in the Hall, in the pamphlets and on our blazers. St David's is a Marist School. In truth, I only grasped the real concept of our Marist community on a camp at the end of last year, but it changed how I thought about the word. This greater Marist community is something bigger than everyone part of it. Not only is it a family to which we belong, but something that shapes our character and values. This School is a school which embraces the Marist ethos and that is why I can truthfully call St David's my home and family.

Earlier this year I was filled with immense pride at seeing how the Old Boys reacted when they came back for the Jubilee celebrations. Each Old Boy was clearly passionate of the place he used to call home and after listening to their stories, some of which are probably inappropriate to mention, it was clear the buildings and fields that we often take for granted, are the stuff of legends to them. These Old Boys, from as fair back as 1966, all displayed a sense of pride in the School, and a unity that spanned their grades and generations. No ordinary school can achieve that. The sense of brotherhood that each of us feels is something that needs to be protected and cherished, because that is something rare to find, and something that oozes out of the bricks and walls here at St David's.

This Inanda brotherhood is something that was evident in every aspect of the School this year. It showed in the fantastic performances of The Prodigal Son and The Lord of the Flies. It showed in the way the sports teams conducted themselves and supported each other. It showed in the classrooms and academic periods and even in the way the matrics helped each other back to their feet after that chemistry prelim. Most obviously I think, is in the atmosphere the boys carried around the School. This was clear in the build-up to key fixtures during the winter season and in the war cry practices that occasionally went over time (sorry Ms Voorendyk). I can guarantee that that all of the gentlemen sitting here tonight experienced chills when uniting together to perform "Oh Inanda Boys". The kind of passion and unity was honestly incredible and the vibe that coursed through the veins of the School is something unforgettable. When our brotherhood at this School creates a unity and passion like that, I would like to ask you all to notice it, feel it, breathe as much of it in as possible because that is something unique and before you know it, as many of the matrics realised, it will come to an end.

Another thing that I implore the Grade 8s through to 11s to do, is to make memories. The environment that has built up this School over 75 years of legacy is conducive to make memories that will last a lifetime. Never again shall you feel as united as in your school years, never again shall you play as passionately for your sports teams and



never again shall you belong to such an incredible family as is here at St David's. So make the best of it while you can. Push yourselves out of your comfort zones and experience new things, because as Mr Bauer always told me, that is where you grow. I know I shall forever remember Dave Shanley's ridiculous fitness Tuesdays and the way in which going through such torture with those around me, brought me so much closer to them. I shall forever remember the day it snowed at School, and how all the teachers somehow knew no work was going to be done under any circumstances. I shall forever remember Morné practising his fullback duties at an Under 16 Rugby practice, in which he dropped probably 49 kicks, but boy when he caught the 50th, did we celebrate - now that is brotherhood. On the 27th of January 1941 St David's Marist Inanda was born. A legacy was born. A legacy which from then, 75 years ago, till now continues to challenge the boundaries of excellence. Great people have come and gone – I'm sure all with goals of finding success in their own areas of interest both towards the end of high school, and in life outside of school.

It is safe to say that in our Jubilee year we have challenged adversity and achieved excellence, in all that we do. On the sports fields, on the stage, in the classroom - serving each other and ourselves to be the best we can be. Without losing sight of our faith.

We have achieved at high levels, and continue to rise and rise again. The list of these achievements is endless, with the likes of being the runners-up at the Aitken Hockey tournament – accompanied by the best season with only 2 losses; producing the spectacles of The Lord of the Flies and The Prodigal Son – which showcased the talent that we have in such a wonderful way; winning the plate section at AISJ Basketball tournament to exhibit the rapid growth of Inanda Hoops; the start of #inandapride; coming away as Champions in both the St Peter's and Grey Football tournaments, and many more.

But throughout my experience as a St David's boy, some different schools have matched and sometimes exceeded our efforts and achievements. So when I ask myself: what makes St David's great, our achievements are not the answer. Looking across the hall, I think of all the memories I share with people in this hall: memories that made up the steps of my I4-year journey, showing me how Inanda is indeed great.

At the age of 4, I put on my floppy hat and entered the gates of Inanda as a student for the first time. I don't remember much from this year, but there are two things that I will always remember. The first thing, Jonathan: the dreadlocked giant who knew everyone's name. He would not tire as he pretended to easily get nutmegged by us, as our numbers decreased into the late afternoons. The second, being taller than Brendan Walsh. Brendan, sitting next to you throughout the Grade 00 year was much like sitting next to you is now – laughing at the most random things, and fighting over leg space. Little did I know that you would walk with me from then until the end. So many things have changed in our lives, but the one thing that I have always known from the beginning until now, is our friendship.

As I donned the Marist blazer for the third year, I waited anxiously in the quadrangle for the class lists to be published. Across the jungle gym, I saw Thabani Mlalazi crying his eyes out as people rolled into School. (Yes Thabani, no one will ever forget). Little did I know that the scared boy from that sullen Wednesday morning would end up arguing with almost everyone about everything without fail. And over the years, you have always shown me the power of character, and how the ultimate measure of each person is their integrity, regardless of what situation you may find yourself in.



Four years later, the time came for our Grade to lead the Prep School. I stood graced with the position of leading College House, along with Nicholas Daras. Now, 5 years later College House is yours Darry, and you have pushed us far further than I could ever have dreamed to. We have been brothers at School, and brothers in life, and I cannot imagine my life without you, because you have shown me and taught me more than anyone would ever understand.

At the end of my Grade seven year, as I stood in the hall for my last time as a Prep School boy singing the hymn – Courage, Stand up like a Man; for the first time ever everything was lucid. I truly understood what it meant to be a Marist boy, for I truly felt as though I was losing all of it. High school beckoned and I was not ready to answer, for I would lose friends to other schools and lose teachers that had been present in my growing – I felt lost with a hunch of great regret for opportunities. So, I began to cherish this community of friendship, character and lessons – and vowed to never take it for granted again.

When we boarded the bus awaiting the week of Grade 8 camp, there were 6 massive people on the bus. The 5 prefects at the back and next to me, Joseph Lebos. I started my high school journey with you, and I'm glad to be able to end it with you. You have pushed people's limits - in the classroom and on the sports field, truly showing us how mediocrity is a sin, and excellence our religion.

From then onwards, the challenges of high school came round: having to deal with peers and seniors; being pushed by teachers, and coaches; having to deal with the exponential increase in difficulty across grades, and so many more challenges that have come and gone.

Challenges of us sprinting towards the corner for a 4x40m sprint after Mr Gelderbloem told us to "Get on the corner buggers." Challenges of getting a 40 for an English poetry test to find that it is going straight into your portfolio. Challenges of facing the wrath of (Tate) Gerald Mambo when talking in Choir, Challenges of waking up at 5 o'clock in the morning for early morning Basketball training, to be greeted by Coach Roger and a 20 lap warm-up around the courts. These challenges only represent very few of those that high school had in store for us.

I know for sure that all of these challenges would be a lot more difficult if I didn't have Matthew Lumsden playing organ on Thursday mornings, Tom Heald and Colin Holden making Geography almost as funny as Spencer's frequent yawns throughout the day, Shane

Weiss giving crash courses to everyone on the benches outside in the mornings before assessments, Nicholas Reuss not being able to meditate in RE for more than 30 seconds without bursting into laughter, Thabo Fokane talking about how 'kids' the last test was, Thabo Khanyile squaring up with everyone – especially Dom van Eck in RE, Thapelo Letsoalo laughing as he exclaims that we must "Blom steady" when we ask why he's laughing, knowing that Massi Rizzo's exam timetable will always be worse than yours, Riyadh Desai never not asking questions in class, Mas Afeltra always maintaining a great standard of work ethic until "it's Friday brother", Kieran Gilchrist for always dunking on me every time without fail and Ruvashan Moodliar for never letting Gerald dunk on him.

And then, Joshua Clegg standing by me through thick and thin. Clegg, when I stood next to you a year ago, anxiously, after they had called our names, I looked across the quadrangle with the same image in my mind as my Grade 7 self at the final Prep praise giving. I contemplated all great things of our School, and felt the same sense of loss that I had experienced back then, as it was all coming to an end. But then I realised that I had nothing to worry about because I had a year left to make the most of it with you. You have always been willing to help regardless of your lack of sleep in the prior 3 days. You have approached everything with zeal for the good of the School and the good of all the people around you. And I know that when the qualities of what it means to be a Marist man are discussed, the list of words that come up in the conversation will be a few of the many qualities that you have. On behalf of the School, I'd like to thank you for being Head Boy this year - for being kind but firm in all that you have done. It's been a remarkable journey and I'm glad that I could spend it with you.

This has been a journey filled with humour, class lessons, life lessons, curve balls and the lads. So for the last 14 years my journey has reinforced what makes St David's great — other than our achievements. And these aspects of the School are all entrenched in the main purpose for why we are here: which is education. Education is not limited in any sense, Its facets transcend everything that it is assumed to be at face-value. It consists of knowledge, skills, and perspective. None of this would have been possible without the teachers that we are all so lucky to have.

So I'd like to thank all of you. Special thanks to:

Meyrou Greensill for always being there and doing all that you can, You have shown me that regardless of whether people see or not, if you're doing the right thing, that is all that matters.

Mrs Richter for never failing to have a sense of humour—especially with Tom Heald in the class. You have shown me that worrying too much is pointless, and that prosperity is inevitable by balance.

Mr Bauer for showing me that passion is the most important thing in what you do. Not only in the classroom but in everything. Also that there is a time and place for everything, you just have to take accountability for your choices. As I grew into high school. I saw the extent at which you wanted all of us to grow into being Marist men in every sense of the phrase, and that is something that I'm proud to have experienced.

Mr Albertyn for always putting a smile on my face on some of my worst days. You have always understood the pressures of high school – regardless of how trivial they may seem at times. And the fact that putting in time to help others succeed has never been an issue for you.

Gogo Dube for always managing to simultaneously improve my day with laughter, and make it worse with an essay for tomorrow.

Thina, abafundi bakho, sibone Nhliziyombi Bashise kulo nyaka. But nevertheless, I have learnt so much from you about respect and life, and I am proud to have had you as a teacher and our Gogo. Mr Castle for being the legend that every great institution needs. You have been a role model to so many, including myself. Your humour is priceless and your impact is timeless. Over the years I have come to know that the size of your heart is the only thing that echoes louder than your voice. You have taught everyone so much about the School, for no one knows it better.

And lastly, to all of you, my brothers for being each other's keepers, despite the differences some of us may have. Each one of you has educated me in so many different ways. Making me better through competition, advice and support.

So now, I think of what I will see in years to come when I return to the School. I will walk out from the parking lot to stand where Stravino Park once was, as boys doff their caps as they pass — as I reminisce in my journey with all of you. Thinking of how much has changed yet how little, I know I will feel at home.

So lastly, thank you to St David's for being my home for the last 14 years and to all of you, for being my family.

Just before I finish, I'd like to offer a piece of advice to the lads still moving through high school. Don't postpone anything, because before you know it, you'll have I month left of having the badge this close to your heart – and I'm sure you don't want to regret anything. You have so much; a wonderful campus, excellent staff, numerous opportunities on the sports field, on the stage, in the classroom, but most importantly, you have each other. Take these opportunities, use everything you can and try everything you can because that's the only way you can get the best out of everything, and in the end, to try be the greatest. So continue living your journeys, and experiencing the ups and downs of school – just cherish the moments as they come so that you are content when you have to go.

To the matrics of 2016; yesterday when I took a trip down memory lane, I saw how far we have come together. All throughout high school, there has never been a dull moment within our Grade. My heart beats Marist and my blood bleeds gold. When I think of the memories, my pride is tenfold. 14 years of Inanda. So much stays untold. But 600 hearts beating will never get old.

Those who were involved in the Inter-House play, for which Kondwani Mwanza received the award for Best Script, also did us proud as they took second place. Thomas received the award of Best Actor in a supporting role and Damien was highly commended on his acting in a leading role. All this dedication and talent was recognised when 3 Team Awards for Drama and 4 Half Colours were received by the aspiring young actors in College and Damien deservedly received Full Colours.

College was also represented at the entertaining and inspiring Best Speaker Competition where 2 learners received Team Awards for Public Speaking, Jordan Parker placed second in the senior section with his amusing description of Joburg (as the gangster's paradise?) and Gerhard placed third in the junior section.

I was impressed with all the sportsmen in College who received various awards and with those who demonstrated their skills to lead College to victory in the Inter-House events for Soccer, Rugby and Golf. No fewer than 7 College sportsmen were members of the 1st Soccer team who were victorious for the second year in a row at the Grey College Bloemfontein Soccer Festival. The talented Alessandro Venditti who captained the team, received the award of Soccer Player of the Year and all 6 senior players hold Full Colours. 

Helped by Morné Roos, William Shoki and the prefects Matthew Roos, Matthew Grobbelaar and Matthew Lumsden, we set out with an idea that along with being gentlemen, we also wanted the boys to encompass the Pillars of Character being gentlemen, scholars and sportsmen, as well as pushing the idea of presence and participation.

This became evident as the year progressed with us having 9 boys being awarded General Honours in varying activities covering all aspects of the School from cultural activities to sporting achievements. Westley van der Spuy made the Gauteng UI9B Cricket team and Jacob Miltz made the UI7A Gauteng Cricket team. However, a House cannot be successful if only a handful of boys are succeeding. The road to success starts from Grade 8 when you have boys who have never played a sport or done a cultural activity, step into a role to help their friends out.

In my opinion, we cannot measure the success of a House on pure achievements; we must look deeper and ask ourselves the question: "what type of man are we trying to send out into the world?"

With this in mind we realise that there is a much bigger picture. It is not about cups, scrolls or winning every event; rather, it is about developing a strong moral character. Gents, you need to set yourself challenging goals, ones that will stretch you and test you. Take yourself out of your comfort zone by challenging yourself and your assumptions. Try different activities and make new friends. Don't wait for opportunities to arise; rather work hard and create those opportunities for yourself. Be a leader, not by design but rather by your strength of character. Carry forth the values of the School: simplicity, modesty and humility and wear those values as a mark of pride.

Your journey through The Bishops House starts in Grade 8 but it doesn't end in Matric. You come from the House of Gentlemen and a School that demands resilience of character. Remember that when you enter the wide world where your every value will be tested at some time.

I wish to thank all the tutors of The Bishops House for all their hard work in making the House a very special place and ensuring that the boys get the best possible pastoral care. I also wish to thank my Deputy, Mr Ferreira, for all his hard work this year.

ENGLISH REPORT

The English Department remains committed to inspiring a love of literature and an appreciation of language in all the boys at St David's. At the same time, we are constantly encouraging boys to think critically, to engage with the world around them and to develop their own thoughtful opinions.

The year began on an encouraging note with some excellent results from the 2015 matric group and we hope that the skills that they learnt in English will continue to enrich and enable them.

The English Olympiad remains a firm fixture in our calendar and provides an opportunity for boys to express their ideas in a creative and thought-provoking manner. This year the boys who entered benefitted from their engagement with the topic which was: "A journey into darkness: Excerpts from stories exploring the darker side of human nature."

The introduction of Module days provided the senior grades with the opportunity of devoting an entire day to English. This allowed the boys to engage with the subject in new and interesting ways. In the first term, the Grade 10s explored the language of Shakespeare and as they were studying Macbeth at the time, they were given the chance to perform some of the monologues from the play. In the second term, the Grade 10s were lucky enough to have Tristan Schafer, an Old Boy, address them on film production following which they went on to produce their own film trailers. The Grade IIs read Zoo City in the second term and as this novel is set in Hillbrow we

wanted to provide the boys with an opportunity to visit and explore this area of Johannesburg. We went to the top of Ponte, went on a walking tour of Hillbrow and ended with lunch at a Cameroonian restaurant in Yeoville. This allowed the boys to engage not only with the novel, but with their city, in a more informed and empathetic manner.

Advanced Programme English continues to attract a small group of dedicated boys who love literature and who manage to find the time to read the prescribed texts independently. The 2017 theme is 'The Danger of a Single Story' which promises to elicit a great deal of discussion. This subject certainly helps prepare boys for tertiary education as they are encouraged to develop their own arguments and to express them in an eloquent and convincing manner.

At the beginning of 2016 we welcomed Mr Barnard, Mr Page and Mr McCarthy to the English Department and the boys have certainly benefitted from their enthusiasm and love of the subject. Sadly, Mr Barnard will be returning to Port Elizabeth at the end of the year - we thank him for all he has contributed to our Department and we wish him everything of the best for the future.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the members of the English Department for their continued dedication, support and commitment to our subject.



This fire is all consuming, yet not a dancing flame; all painful, yet not hot to the touch. No, this fire is that of a race.

Fifty metres left. That is all that remains of my final four hundred metre race for my school. And it is at this point that the fire grips me in its lashing flickers. The fire beats me, whips me, strikes me and chokes me. The unforgiving heat that radiates around me causes my eyes to pour. I cannot see properly as a result but the finish line ahead simmers while the mirage rears up, taunts and mocks me. I might not be able to see because my head cannot process the information. My brain's core temperature has risen and much like an old car's dilapidated radiator, my sharp breaths seem unable to cool it. The poor organ is struggling to function; the warmth seems to be melting its circuitry, frazzling its communication. It almost billows smoke into my head, adding to the pressure caused by the brilliant fire, Its impending meltdown screams at me to stop, to end this fire, but there is just fifty meters left.

The fire's core rages heaviest at my lungs. At this moment they feel damaged, burnt and crumpled: a melted plastic bag. Their walls are set alight and each quickening breath fuels the fire even more It spreads out of control. A wild fire, spurred on by the wind that engulfs one cell at a time. My lungs sizzle and crackle under the heat. I think I smell overdone bacon. Next to me sprints my enemy and my soul roars with the heat of competition. All of the heat and pressure is causing me to bend and buckle yet I know I cannot let the fire get the better of me. Then my enemy shall win and the mirage at the finish line will earn the last smirk.

So I will endure the fire, run over the coals and through the flames and emerge from the immense heat and rising smoke as a winner. Fifty metres left and I am not on fire, but burning.

As the fumes explode from my chest, I know that I will leave the grass behind me burning.



He walks along the river, searching for any stone that calls out to him. The ground is scattered with rocks and with the uneven footing, he is forced to walk slowly, but he doesn't mind. He has no future arrangements, no agenda, no one who could potentially be waiting for him. Only time. Time to scan the sloping river bed for pebbles. Time to think about his breathing. Time to kill, He thinks of nothing other than the next stone, sees nothing other than the uneven ground along which he hobbles, hearing nothing other than the rushing current of the river.

He spends the best part of the morning picking them out, walking along the riverbank. looking for each individual stone. He knows that each stone he chooses is meant to be where he finds it. A sort of destiny has lead him to this moment, if you believe in that sort of thing. He doesn't. He simply knows that the stones he finds are meant to be found, and that if he were to leave the stones that caught his eye, it would be a mistake. In the same way that each stone somehow seemed to know that if they were not to catch his eye, they would be mistaken.

By the time he is done, his light brown chinos are sliding down his legs, and he is forced to hold them up with one hand as he walks to the grassy embankment overlooking the river: He should have brought his belt, he thinks, he can go back to get one. He considers hiding the pebbles in a hollow of a tree or digging a hole for them, but remembers that the key to his one-bedroom apartment is already miles away, carried away in the river's bitter, bitting arms. He could find the building manager, an old, greying lady in her 60's, in her flat on the ground floor, and ask to use the spare key that she has, but there would be too much explaining to do, and she might be out by the time he arrived. Besides, what's the use of a belt on a day like this anyway?

He unloads the stones onto the grass delicately, one by one, so as to not disturb them any further. He lays them in a line, side by side, meticulously ensuring that each is neither too close to nor too far from the other. He takes his time, relishing in his new task like a child who has to put away the toys before leaving a friend's house, knowing that he will never come this way again and that he has already finished the first of his few tasks, that the play date is nearing its end. Deep down, he can sense some sort of subconscious resistance, no matter how small, to this job. His insides are churning and he can swear that he hears some small child screaming, off in the distance.

It is at this point that he notices just how cold the world is. The sky had been overcome by cold tones; harsh blues and whites and greys waging war far above his head, as the wind whips against his face, angered by the changing seasons. The grass sways in the wind, but in none of the ways a poet would care to describe. Noiseless and diluted and dull, everywhere he looked, as if the world was mourning. The thick, heavy weight of winter had fallen upon the world, as if even natures sounds were suppressed under its weight.

Before him lay five-six... thirty-sevenl stones. Some could hardly be called pebbles, others were nearer to rocks. Thirty-seven different shapes lay on the grass. Some seemed to have been cut by a master jeweller, with hard angles and sharp edges, others had clearly been spat out of the river only days earlier, round, egg-shaped balls of rock, smooth to the touch, almost calming. No one stone was the same, few seemed even similar. Each had its own life, a living, breathing, individual experience which the he can sense only by looking at them. Like a psychologist and geologist in one, he sits before his closed sample of thirty-seven stones, examining their behaviours, personalities, their heart rates and breathing patterns.

After a long time, he bends over and removes his shoes. Slowly, he begins to load his socks with all the stones he can. There, that round bluish one, then the sandy one shaped like a continent, then the angular one that is almost a perfect cube. The cold, hard stones scratch his skin, chill him, make themselves noticed. After that he moves onto his jacket, piling stones into the inside pockets, filling them until he can hardly zip them up again. After that he fills his pants' pockets, and then he is done. He does this all frantically, with the speed of a new-adult, barely out of college, who has woken up late for his first day of work.

He sits panting on the embankment, his breath hanging like clouds in front of him. His breathing is shallow, his chest heaving up and down quickly, out of breath. Once again he has become conscious of his breathing, all too aware that his life depends on the rhythmic intake of air that is no longer on autopilot.

He sits and watches the river.

Water rushes by at a pace that can only ever be seen in rivers, gushing and bouncing against the banks, hurtling against rocks and tree branches, smashing against a fallen log that is clearly used as a bridge. Someway downstream is a huge boulder, surprisingly spherical in spite of the torrent slamming against it. It sits slightly to left of the river, closer to the man than the other side. Two small songbirds are sitting atop it, fighting over food, or sharing it - he's unsure - blissfully unaware of the world around them, on their own little island, a safe haven, amidst the torrents. The dark waters appear surprisingly calm for their speed, almost inviting, but the white peaks of foam and spray that constantly spring up give away the facade. Even when there is seemingly nothing for the water to hit, it crashes into itself, hurtling at angry speeds towards pools of calmer water. Torrents of dark blue water fly past him, foaming at the mouth, heading further and further into the woods.

The man sighs, and slowly, reluctantly, put his shoes back on. They are thick, leather boots which he had bought yesterday. He didn't know why, but he knew that he would need them. Much like the rocks on the shore, the boots had caught his eye and he immediately knew he had to get them. He methodically slides his foot in, adjusts the tongue, tightens the laces, re-laces the top two sets of holes and double-knots his laces, With his shoes solidly on

his feet, he stands up. The stones seem to have doubled in weight since earlier that day. He accredits this to their even distribution and his being seated for a long time. He walks towards the log-bridge, no longer with any hesitation. The little boy he had heard screaming must have calmed down by now, or been killed, forced silent. It's much the same to him; if you're not screaming, are you really alive? As he approaches the river once more, it roars louder and louder to greet him, the rabid dog is frothing, bubbling over with excitement. It looks even more inviting than before, its dark waters seem to call out to him specifically, shouting a name he no longer recognises.

He is on the log-bridge. His body is laden with stones. The water is calling someone else's name.

The stones speak to him. They tell him of the lives they have lead, the worlds they have seen, how they fell from the highest peaks on earth. He speaks back to them, of the family he once had, of the career he still has, and how he regretted it all. All thirty-eight of them stay like this for an age. Locked in conversation. In the time they are speaking, children are born, people are killed, markets crash, computers freeze, ice caps melt. But then again, all that can happen in an instant.

As abruptly as it starts, it ends. The conversation gives itself over to silence, gives itself over to the river. The man gives himself over to the river. No symbolic last looks at the world, no prayers, no final words or deep breaths. He simply finishes his conversation with the stones and they enter the river.


He enters feet first, and the water takes him. He hits his head off of something, scratches his knee off of something, sinks deeper into something. Blinding light assaults his eyes and the dull thud of his head echoes in his ears. He hears himself splash into the water and then he is submerged. Water fills his ears and assaults his skin, the cacophony of running water surrounds him, the cold biting him all over. The river is deeper than it appears, where he thinks the riverbed ought to be, there is only water, where he ought to hit the ground, he only sinks. The current is pushing him - or is it pulling? - along at speeds faster than he had previously guessed, but he doesn't panic or fight or struggle. The dark waters provide him cold catharsis - he welcomes it. He brings the stones with him, they were also preparing themselves for this. He sinks and spins and hurls further downstream. He is at peace, his face, like a porcelain doll, shows only his calmness, his full relinquishment of control. The cold water attacks him, forming white peaks underwater. The mad dog still froths with excitement. The idea of his body slamming into the large boulder only further excites him, for a second, you could swear he smiles. He imagines hitting the rock, being held against it as the water rushes past him. He is gasping for air but all that fills his lungs is water, the rock is hard, he's sure that he's broken many bones. Then, like the water which flows around the boulder, he would simply split in half, and continue to follow nature's path, simply keep going until the end of the world. Or maybe they'd find him still pinned to the boulder, like a piece of driftwood. Fitting for someone who simply went through life without question. Marry, have 1.7 children, get a job in finance. What difference was there between him and a piece of driftwood?

The pain in his head only further calms him. The chances of him coming out alive are only lessened, what with the potential

concussion. Slowly, his lungs begin to feel taught, as if they had been stretched out by some torture device. They scream out, begging him for air. The stones cry out, telling him that he is almost there, he can do it, he has made it. As with all humans, his resolve breaks. His commitment to his cause has wavered. He begins to thrash, clawing for air, seeking escape from the river. Like a predator toying with its prey, the River only seems to become more excited. It thrashes with him, writhes with him, bites him with its cold, sharp teeth. He screams, but no air leaves his lips, no bubbles form. Water floods his lungs, surrounds his body, tears him apart.

He has lost consciousness by the time he hits the boulder. His body is limp, it crumples against the cold, hard rock and sticks there, much like he had imagined. His body is slowly pulled to the right by the current, along the dark waters and further into the woods. Brambles cut at his skin, he runs into rocks and dead logs. How long he travels along this river, one cannot say, but by the time his body sinks to the bottom of a calm, open pond, his skin is blue and wrinkled, his lungs sodden.

ACCOUNTING

The matric class of 2015 achieved outstanding results and has set the bar going forward. 40 per cent of the boys achieved distinctions and the average for the subject at St David's was nearly 75 %. A truly remarkable achievement – given the IEB average of 63 %. I am hopeful that the matric class of 2016 will achieve top results too.

Accounting is an exacting and demanding subject and the final matric examination tests all work learnt from Grade 8 through to Grade 12.

Once again, we entered the Accounting Olympiad with 18 boys participating in the first round in May 2016. The second round took place in August and 6 boys participated. Shane Weisz achieved 81% for the second and final round. The Olympiad is designed to challenge students to think beyond school Accounting.

We strive daily to make Accounting relevant and interesting for the boys. We believe, we are teaching the boys an important life skill, which is to be financially literate. Not all students who choose Accounting continue with a career in this field, but everyone needs to understand basic concepts such as cash, credit, income, expenses, solvency, materiality, etc. In addition, the matric syllabus includes International Financial Reporting Systems (IFRS) and good corporate governance.

At the start of the year, we welcomed Mr D Whyte to the Accounting Department and I know many of the junior accounting classes thoroughly enjoyed Mr Whyte's energetic approach to teaching.

We sadly said good-bye to Mr V Gelderbloem at the end of 2015 as he took up a new position at Uplands College. We welcomed Mr J van Dyk who joined us at the beginning of the second term. Mr van Dyk is passionate about Accounting and Cricket and has added a great deal of value and in-depth knowledge to the Accounting Department.

Praise must be given to the hard-working teachers in the Department; namely Mr J Black, Mr B Ireland, Mr M Schneider and Mr D Whyte. We strive daily to ensure that the boys understand the concepts and are able to interpret and analyse the information. We as a Department, strive to return all assessments to the boys as quickly as possible in order to ensure a better understanding of the subject. The fact that year after year the Accounting matriculants are successful, is due in large proportion to these wonderful teachers.

HISTORY



There is often a misconception of what History is and does. History is not just remembering facts and dates from the past. The subject looks at events of the past and critically analyses cause and effects. Just as in present times, there is often much debate as to why events occur and speculation as to their consequences, so historians offer interpretations with regard to events in the past. Pupils are encouraged to evaluate events in the past and to think critically around the circumstances and significance of that event. This is the approach taken to History at St David's and pupils are encouraged to enter debate and to develop a questioning and critical mind.

A decision has been taken to spend the Grade 8 year looking at the history of South Africa. The history of our own country has been limited mainly to recent events or only to specific events over the last three hundred years. It is our belief that the story of our country should be told from beginning to end in the most educational, fascinating and palatable way possible. To achieve this, we have divided the work into twenty-one units, ranging from Africa as the cradle of humankind, to South Africa becoming a democracy in the 1990s. Each unit is four pages which includes colour text and pictures and which may be accessed on the pupil's iPad via Moodle. Some of these units are presented to the boys as PowerPoint presentations where the teacher discusses the key questions of the unit with the pupils. Other units are done either as a self-study assessment with boys answering key questions, while accessing the information on their iPad. Still other units require boys to read the text and to then answer an iPad quiz. The

activities are therefore varied in order to keep interest alive and the boys engaged. The last two methods mentioned also serve as a means of the boys improving their literacy skills.

The units facilitate the teaching of skills such as identifying primary and secondary sources and constructing organised paragraphs. The pupils are also exposed to concepts such as nationalism, stereotyping and different historical interpretations as it pertains to the history of our country. Where possible, video material is introduced to bring the topics alive and to allow for greater empathy.



We have introduced an experimental approach to the teaching of History in the senior grades. This has proved to be very successful. The onus is on the pupils to read the information in class from a thoroughly prepared text which is a synthesis of a number of sources. The booklet, in which the text appears, identifies issues for discussion, which lends itself to a tutorial type of interaction between the teacher and the pupils. The pupils clearly enjoy entering into debate, rather than being treated as passive learners. The results in the matric examination at the end of 2016, were far beyond expectations which seems to indicate that the experiment is worth pursuing.

This year our Grade 9 boys continued programming in Alice 3, an Object Orientated Programming language. The program not

only gives the learners a feeling of what objects in programming are, but also teaches them what the objects consist of. Learners are also exposed to working with variables, loops and different variable types.

It was again a privilege to work with Mrs S Crichton, Mrs L Black and Mr N Mtembu in the Department this year. I want to thank them for all their hard work.

LIFE ORIENTATION

The subject of Life Orientation addresses a wide range of CAPS Topics such as Constitutional Rights and Responsibilities, Development of Self in Society, Careers and Career Choices, Social and Environmental Responsibility and Democracy and Human Rights. The challenge is to squeeze it all into two lessons per cycle in the senior grades, and only one for the juniors! A syllabus is also never fixed or stagnant — we have to keep our eyes and ears open to current events, trends and developments, and adapt or add at a moment's notice. In addition to this, we strive to develop skills in our boys. All tasks require them to reflect on content, using a variety of skills ranging from essay-writing, oral presentations, mind-mapping, video clips, PowerPoint presentations and even artistic presentations.

Some highlights this year included an impromptu curtain-hanging demonstration; using crayons to draw coats of arms; a Jenga challenge to determine problem-solving approaches through body language; the Grade 9 iPad examination; an animated discussion on the Blesser phenomenon and some interesting debates around the dangers of performance enhancing substances and pornography.

From Mr Rose-Reddiar, who joined us at the start of the year: "At the onset of my teaching post at St David's Marist Inanda beginning in January of this year, I have had the pleasure of working with a dynamic, professional and well-organised Department. This has allowed me as an educator to explore new ways of providing lessons that are interactive, informative and enjoyable, while always maintaining a safe space where learning takes place. I have learnt so much this year from the boys in my care, listening to their intelligent discussions, facilitating debates, to having an entire discussion using just social media (WhatsApp) with the Grade IIs. This year has been one of integration for me and getting to know

how things are done in this ever-dynamic Department. I look forward to the next academic year and the keen young minds that will challenge me, question me and offer their own unique insight on the various topics that make up the Life Orientation syllabus."

Central to the Life Orientation curriculum, is the importance of our social and environmental responsibility. The Gr 11s completed a community service task to explore our constitutional rights and responsibilities and reflected on their experience. In the words of Merrick Hughes: "A rights and responsibilities culture is hugely beneficial in societies. It is based around the fact that we are protected and cared for in so many ways, that we need to make it our duty for those around us to be treated in the same way. In South Africa, we are protected by a Bill of Rights and we reap the benefits of these every day. We need to simultaneously work to protect the less fortunate in the same way; this is the fee we pay to be looked after by our rights. If we are able to effectively uplift those around us through our responsibilities, the government and other organisations can divide the resources allocated to these issues more effectively and spread it further to spend time enhancing the lives of the entire community, including the underprivileged. It is clear that there are huge benefits to outreach and how it plays its part in developing democracy and a rights and responsibilities culture."

I am privileged to work with a team of committed, caring, enthusiastic and innovative educators who are role models to the boys in their care. Thank you to Mr Chonco, Mr Bhinder and Mr Rose-Reddiar for growing and strengthening our Department and its academic footprint, as well as guiding our boys on their journey to adulthood.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Religious Education has been taken seriously at St David's Marist Inanda, not only as a very important component of education in helping the boys grow and develop as responsible citizens, but also as an academic subject.

Why is Religious Education important in Catholic Schools?

Religious Education is the "core of the core curriculum" in a Catholic school (Pope St John Paul II). Placing Religious Education at the core of the curriculum in Catholic schools helps the School to fulfil its mission to educate the whole person in discerning the meaning of their existence, since "Religious Education is concerned not only with intellectual knowledge but also includes emotional and affective learning."

Do we teach about other religions?

Yes, all Catholic schools are required to teach about other religions as part of the Religious Education curriculum. This is a feature of Catholic RE in all stages of a child's development, from the beginning of primary school until the end of secondary school.

The outcome of excellent Religious Education is religiously literate and engaged young people who have the knowledge, understanding and skills – appropriate to their age and capacity – to reflect spiritually, think ethically and act with love.

I propose that the nature and purpose of Religious Education is to inform, form and transform our boys and our communities. It is about bringing spiritual consciousness to every aspect of life and activity and to enable learners to discover God in all faces, places, and indeed, in all life. The teaching and learning in Religious Education should be active and participative. We encourage dialogue and sharing among learners.

Meditation - with Gen Kelsang Mila

In these meditation classes, the students were introduced to the

mind and how to understand their mind as well as the purpose and benefits of meditation practise.

Through understanding the nature and function of their mind, they discovered that it is possible to change their experience simply by changing their mind. For example, instead of viewing a difficult person in their life as an as an enemy, and developing anger and frustration, they learnt to view them as an object of patience, simply by changing their view and attitude, and thereby accept and not reject the person or situation. Through practising a simple breathing meditation, they were able to pacify their distractions and experience their mind becoming peaceful.

By training in meditation, the students were able to identify with their potential for peace. By pacifying busy thoughts and distractions, they were able to experience for themselves the inner peace that arises from a less distracted mind. By cultivating inner peace in meditation, many of our daily problems are easier to deal with and our relationships with others improve. Through in-depth discussion, the students could identify that our problems do not exist outside the mind; they are the part of the mind that experiences unpleasant feelings. Happiness on the other hand, is a part of our mind that experiences inner peace. Through learning how to control our mind in and out of meditation, we can increase our present, peaceful, positive minds and thereby improve the quality of our life. - This understanding can lead them to be truly happy, and truly peaceful.







MATHEMATICS

Over the past number of years our IEB Mathematics results have exceeded our expectations and the Class of 2015 was no exception. Eighty percent of the candidates that wrote Core Mathematics last year, achieved an average of 60% or above with 43 out of 95 achieving an A symbol for the subject. So, our challenge this year has been to maintain or to improve on this high standard. A number of important factors contribute towards achieving this goal. One being, a team of dedicated and passionate mathematics teachers. I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate and thank the Mathematics Department staff for their commitment towards ensuring the best outcome for each learner.

It is important to foster a love for Mathematics at an early age and so it has been pleasing to note the number of Grade 8 and 9 boys who have enthusiastically taken part in each leg of the Tour de Maths Competition this year. Tour de Maths exposes the learners to different problem solving situations which require creative and adaptive thinking skills. It is these skills which are essential in developing independent thinkers.

We continue to enjoy success in the South African Mathematics Olympiad. Our boys are actively encouraged to participate and once again Mrs Goemans offered training to those Junior boys who showed an interest. Shane Weisz and Rory Ellis must be congratulated for qualifying for the 3rd round. This places them in the top 100 students in the country. Shane was also recognised as the 2nd runner-up in Gauteng. Shane, Rory, Brandon Gallichan and Miguel Torres were invited to represent Gauteng at the Inter-provincial Olympiad Competition and we congratulate them on this.

As the School and our Department grows in numbers, we continue to strive towards achieving excellence in our subject

by encouraging many of the boys to consider taking Advanced Programme Mathematics, by exposing them to Olympiads and Maths Competitions and by including problem-solving scenarios in our teaching, as the successful student of tomorrow will be required to master more than the prescribed syllabus.

Once again, I thank the Mathematics staff for their support and dedication: without them none of the above would be possible. We look forward to challenges that 2017 will bring.

The St David's High School Music Department has had a highly productive year: The Music Department is directed by Mr C Luke, with Choir and Chamber Choir falling under the expert guidance of Mr J Ferreira. 
Mass Ensemble




- The Opening Performance at the Southern African Chapter of the International Boys' Schools Coalition Conference, which was hosted at St David's in February.



The Major Music Production: The Prodigal Son

Preparing for a major production is always an interesting process, and in 2016 it was doubly so. After all, Jubilees only come around once every 75 years or so and one has to mark the occasion with something memorable! Our Year of Celebration resonated with thousands of people across many generations and required not just something entertaining; it begged for a show that connects deeply and sincerely with everyone and everything that is associated with St David's, with Inanda, with Marist and with family.

What a strange and wonderful concept: family! We all know it so well. All of us are touched by it. Our emotions are stirred by it: cherished memories of time spent with loved ones, frustrations of lingering conflicts with the ones closest to us, our hopes for ourselves and for those in our care, our fears for what may befall the ones who shape our worlds so profoundly!

Stories that attempt to capture this complexity of family abound. In fact, one could argue that all stories are ultimately about family and about those around us and how the things they do stir us into action.

The Prodigal Son was based on the Luke 15 account of what is probably Jesus' most memorable, if not most famous, parable. The younger of two sons asks for his share of an inheritance from his father who is still very much alive. As if the request in itself isn't shocking enough, the father responds by granting the request. The son's actions are perhaps typical: he leaves the safety of home, squanders the money in wild living and ends up virtually destitute. When, out of sheer desperation, he risks returning to his home he is, however, not met by an angry and bitter father, but rather by a father who has been desperate for the return of his youngest son. In fact, the father immediately arranges a feast to celebrate the restoration of his family and urges everyone to rejoice with him.

A story about the power of family if ever there was one!



Our version of the story was not a simple retelling of Jesus' original. Although the basic narrative was certainly still recognisable, we dealt with it quite freely. However, as in the original, our characters were confronted by a world full of many temptations and all of them were enticed to control, to pretend, to hide, to insult or to ignore. Ultimately all of them had to deal with the people put on their paths and none of them could escape the power of those loved ones who had crept into their hearts.

Who better than a family to be tasked with telling a story that is about family? This production was a combined effort between the College and the Prep and the show of support from the Marist family by way of passion and commitment from teachers, parents and all of the well over 150 boys from the Junior Prep, the Senior Prep and the College, was overwhelming. The Marist family truly told this story together.

Of course, we also value our partnership with St Teresa's for our Major Productions. This partnership now spans fifteen years. We thank Sister Barbara for her continued support and Sarah Terry for her administration of the process. The participation of the girls added immense value to the production.

Inter-House Plays

The 2016 Inter-House Plays took place on Tuesday, 23 February, in the Champagnat Hall. The production teams of the various Houses spent several weeks crafting pieces of theatre that both entertained and spoke to an audience comprising of their peers, parents and teachers. The Head of Dramatic Arts at St Teresa's, Sarah Terry, served as adjudicator:

It is difficult to create theatre. One doesn't simply write a couple of lines and have a director throw some theatrical ingredients together. Creating theatre is a risky business, and a tough one at that. A team might invest great effort into what seems like brilliant ideas only to find them deflated and severely lacklustre after a couple of serious investigative prods. The playwright might pour his heart and soul into a piece and be convinced of that piece's validity and power; however, his peers might reject it and fail to see the very same beauty to which the playwright has been so committed. There simply is no guarantee that a play will come together. One can only persevere by cautiously following the steps, fleshing out the ideas, experimenting with scenarios, testing characters, developing character relationships, finding the best available performers, rehearsing as much as is possible, adding whatever devices might serve to highlight the essence of the play and releasing it all to the universe once that curtain opens, hoping for a bit of magic, a bit of alchemy to weave it all together out of what was essentially nothing.

As usual it was up to the Grade 12 playwrights and directors to grapple with all of these difficult steps in the first couple of weeks of 2016. The Benedict team had to contend with highlighting the complicated notions of success and manhood in The Room. College toyed with the expression of time standing still in Time. Osmond engaged with the personal fall-out of terrible mistakes, highlighting the problem of religious environments that often empower the

bully in Destructive Absolution. The Bishops' mix of stereotypes and crafty use of risky terminology focused our attention on social taboos in Rated PC. The end result was a powerful evening that showcased individual talent as well as team work.



SOUND AND LIGHTING

Sound and Lighting is one of the more interesting projects to be part of at St David's. A small group of dedicated boys get the opportunity to work with the ever-increasing high tech gear that St David's is accumulating as it builds up its store house of performance and presentation equipment. Our sound systems across the School, our lighting gear in the Champagnat Hall and our projector set-ups are all state-of-the-art.

The Sound and Lighting team fulfils various essential roles:

- It makes sure equipment is set up for events in both the Hall and the Chapel of Mary;
- It is responsible for the design and set up of lighting in both the College and Prep major productions;
- It prepares and runs the PowerPoint presentations for the College Mass;
- It is responsible for keeping the inventory of all equipment up to date;
- It advises teachers on how to further the School's expertise in this area.

Who better than a bunch of teenage boys to run the show when it comes to gear. Under the leadership of Vaughan Lotz, boys could "mess around" in a constructive way and enhance the School's technical IQ while they were at it.

The team had several major projects in 2016:

 The Southern African Chapter of the International Boys' Schools Coalition Conference that was hosted at St David's in February. Apart from hearing top experts talk on a variety of education-related subjects, this event was also an opportunity to showcase what St David's can do in terms of presenting a conference of an international standard. The Sound and Lighting team did not disappoint! From an exceptional Opening Concert to so many presentations that were managed at a consistently professional level, the team held the School's name high.

- The Jubilee Production in June was a massive undertaking.
 This entailed the setup of a highly complex sound design that
 had to accommodate the School's biggest show band yet,
 the Chamber Choir, at least 20 soloists, major chorus scenes
 and the occasional instrumental solo. In addition to that they
 also had to create a set of lighting cues to make all of the
 participants look as good as they sounded.
- The Minor Production in July, whilst not such a large
 undertaking, had its own complications. The Lord of the Flies
 was presented in the amphitheatre and the boys had to create
 a completely new lighting grid for the show. Vaughan Lotz was
 instrumental in the creation of a portable system that allowed
 us to set up a decent set of lights for the show. Thanks to this
 system, St David's will now be able to create a performance
 space virtually anywhere on the School property.

The team will be guided by Ryan Thomas in 2017 and can look forward to an interesting year filled with One Act Play showcases, Supper Theatre shows, Junior Prep productions, a whole range of Choir performances and hopefully also a recording session of our excellent Band.

Debating has the ability to shape a boy's future and his outlook on the world in both a positive and an inspiring way. It teaches boys how to engage intellectually and respectfully with others and often involves having to defend opinions other than one's own. I firmly believe that debaters are the leaders of the future and would encourage any boy interested in grappling with current events, and in learning how to express himself in an eloquent and convincing manner, to join the Debating society.

This year has been one of the most successful years in St David's Debating history and I would like to congratulate all members of the society as well as our coach, Phiwe Salukazana, on their excellent achievements.

The Gauteng Schools' SACEE Debating League began in earnest in February. This league incorporates schools from all over Gauteng and involves twelve preliminary rounds of debates. Both the Junior and Senior teams performed well in the early rounds of this tournament. Once again we were able to enter two Junior teams which bodes well for the future. Both Junior teams did well enough to progress to the championship rounds. These rounds were incredibly challenging and the Grade 9 Junior team succeeded in breaking tenth and making it through to the quarterfinals of the Plate rounds.

The Senior team won ten of their twelve preliminary debates and thus made it through to the quarterfinals which took place at the end of July. They won their quarterfinal debate against Dainfern and then met King David Victory Park in the semi-finals. They won this debate convincingly and then came up against Roedean

in the finals. The motion for this debate was: This House regrets the South African rainbow nation narrative. This debate was of an extremely high standard and St David's won it on a 3-2 split. This is the second time in four years that St David's has won this tournament. Congratulations must go to the team comprised of William Shoki, Daniel Lee and Ritvik Sojen.

The Gauteng Schools' Provincial Debating Championships took place in September. These championships set out to establish the best team in the province. From a pool of about 200 schools, a limited number of teams is invited to participate in these championships and these teams then take part in six preliminary rounds to establish which teams go forward to the quarterfinal stage. The Junior team competed enthusiastically and with real dedication and progressed as far as the quarterfinals of the Plate which was an admirable achievement for a team comprising of three Grade 8 boys (Kade Kalell, Brendan Craven and Nzuzo Magagula) and one Grade 9 boy (Tameez Kana).

Having progressed comfortably through the preliminary rounds, the Senior team took part in the final stages of the tournament. They won both their quarterfinal debate against Pretoria Boys High School and their semi-final debate against Bophela-Impilo Private School to progress to the finals. Here St David's came up against HeronBridge College where the motion was: This House Regrets the prominence of the 'Being WOKE' narrative. All three members of the team spoke exceptionally well and as a result St David's won this debate and, for the first time, became the Gauteng Provincial Debating Champions. We congratulate William Shoki, Daniel Lee and Ritvik Sojen on this outstanding achievement.

We are extremely proud of William Shoki who was appointed captain of the South African Senior Debating team this year. Furthermore, Daniel Lee was chosen as a member of the South African Al Senior Debating team and Ritvik Sojen as a member of the South African Junior Debating team. All three boys represented South Africa at tournaments overseas and we commend them on their wonderful achievements.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank William Shoki for the way in which he has led the Debating Society this year and for the meaningful contribution he has made to it over the past five years. Not only is William an extremely talented debater but he has had a positive and inspiring influence on all those with whom he has come into contact.

I wish all the members of the Debating society continued success in 2017. It has been a pleasure working with you this year.







We remain supremely fortunate to be affiliated with The Wanderers Golf Club, just a few kilometres down the road in Inanda. The Wanderers gives St David's the rare privilege of playing on Monday afternoons when our magnificent home course is closed to the general public. This does occasionally mean that players have to run for cover when the irrigation systems unexpectedly spring to life, but it also means that our players have the opportunity to practice after school on Mondays

and to tee off for official fixtures early enough to finish rounds while it is still light to trace the flight and lie of the ball! The Wanderers remains extraordinarily generous and magnanimous towards St David's Marist for which we are extremely grateful.

The 2015–2016 season saw the introduction of a new component to school golf, namely professional coaching under the superb guidance of head Wanderers coach, Francois Spangenberg. Francois and his team of coaches use the cutting edge technology of Trackman in their Friday afternoon sessions with the St David's players. This advanced data capture system analyses both the flight of the ball as well as each boy's personal swing. The combination of precision data from Trackman with the professional skills of the coaches bore very noticeable results, evident in vastly improved play and dropping handicaps whenever boys committed themselves to weekly practice sessions.

A very strong group of matrics led the St David's field in the 2015-16 season. Daniel Bregman-Frangos bowed out with Full Colours after playing for the A team every year from Grade 8 to matric. Adam Breen, Michael Cardoso and David Cardoso also achieved Full Colours, Adam ending the season playing off scratch, Michael captaining the team superbly with his dedication, faultless etiquette and superb attitude, and David finishing as Player of the Year, never missing a game and scoring a

Stableford average of 15 over the season's 9 official inter-schools fixtures. Mention must also be made of matric Gerard Merchak who captained the B side: Gerard was note-worthy for his quiet modesty and loyalty to St David's Golf.

For us, one of the most important objectives was to ensure that the boys' individual skills improved, and they all gained a better understanding of the game. These objectives are vital especially as they continue their Hockey journey over the next four years.

We participated in three festivals; all of which provided the boys opportunities to improve upon the above, but more importantly, they also allowed the boys to foster new friendships, many of which will contribute to the four-year journey ahead of them. Hockey is one of those sports that allows you to continue to play long after you have left school. Therefore, many of these friendships will develop for many years to come. Of course, being able to travel away for these festivals is an excitement in itself. We were always very proud of the manner in which the boys conducted themselves both on and off the astroturf.

Although we suffered too many losses, for us, this was not the primary objective. Clearly, we all love to win, but I would suggest that the boys have learnt so much more through their losses. What we found incredible was, despite these losses, the boys never gave up. Their enthusiasm seemed to be fuelled by their emotional distress, and literally an hour or so after such a loss, significant encouragement emerged from all via WhatsApp. This





reaction cannot be taught and thus, having experienced this suggests that as the boys get stronger, fitter and more skilled, these losses will be turned into victories. In addition, as these victories become the norm, I believe firmly that this team will remain humble due to their past experiences.

It was our pleasure being part of this journey and we will certainly follow this team's Hockey journey in the years to come with much enthusiasm.

I was privileged to travel to India with a number of boys completing the Gold Level. We were humbled on so many occasions and discovered strengths – physical, emotional, and spiritual – that we did not know we had.

I encourage the boys of St David's Marist Inanda to embrace the Award in 2017. Jung encompassed this when he said that you are what you do, not what you say you'll do. Walk the talk, gentleman. 2017 is your year.


The Peer Counsellors this year took part in the 'beyondthebox' campaign beginning with our Peer Counsellors discussing gender stereotypes in Assembly, with a thought-provoking speech by Laurence Bennett challenging us all to live by values and not to restrict ourselves but to go beyond our boxes in order to become Marist men. A video ably filmed by Luca Strappazzon, scripted and directed by Andrew D S Reed and starring Gerald Mambo, Ruvi Moodliar and Andrew Reed was used in a tutor period to discuss supporting our fellow peers, regardless of their choices. A wall of boxes was moved around the School highlighting our Marist Values and what they mean to the boys and an art installation was displayed in the boys' bathrooms. The artwork confronted the boys with a question of 'who were they when they looked in the mirror?'

The Peer Counsellors also assisted and worked tirelessly in three blood drives, one in 2015 and two in 2016. They educated their respective Houses on why it is so important to donate blood, and on the days were integral to the smooth running of each blood drive. Other notable efforts included raising the important issue of misuse of over-the-counter medication, speaking to

their peers ongoing around bullying and conflict resolution and attending weekly supervision sessions learning important skills to use both here at St David's and beyond. Mrs M Waller, Mrs C van der Zwan and I were honoured to work with these Marist men over the course of 2016, and wish them well in their future endeavours.
