But they have an important advantage. They knew the land around them, when the weather changed the cure for the diseases and the best places to hide

Since the Boers were farmers they would burn their farms, destroy their crops that they used for food and cut off the route that Durban used to deliver the Boers supplies. Despite this the Boers wouldn't give up their homeland and eventually overthrew the English. The English just couldn't cope with the conditions they had in Africa. So they left South Africa. This is the Kingda Ka Roller Coaster found in the six flags great adventure park in New Jersey. Here is the picture...

Roller Coasters have been built around the world since the 15th century, where the first one was built in St Petersburg Russia. The idea started during the winter months where large ice slides were built. The El Toro is an example of the ice slides built in wood that goes up and down. It has the steepest angle in wooden roller coasters which is 76 degrees. Here is a picture.....

Most of you might have experienced the Tower of Terror at Gold Reef City this is the 10th steepest roller coaster in the world at 90 degrees. Where you travel in a mine hopper up and down the plunge. The longest Roller Coaster in the world at 2,5 km is in Japan and is called the Steel Dragon 2000. This distance of this ride would be the equivalent of 6 times round our athletics track.

They should make ticket prices much cheaper and you never know, our sport might improve.

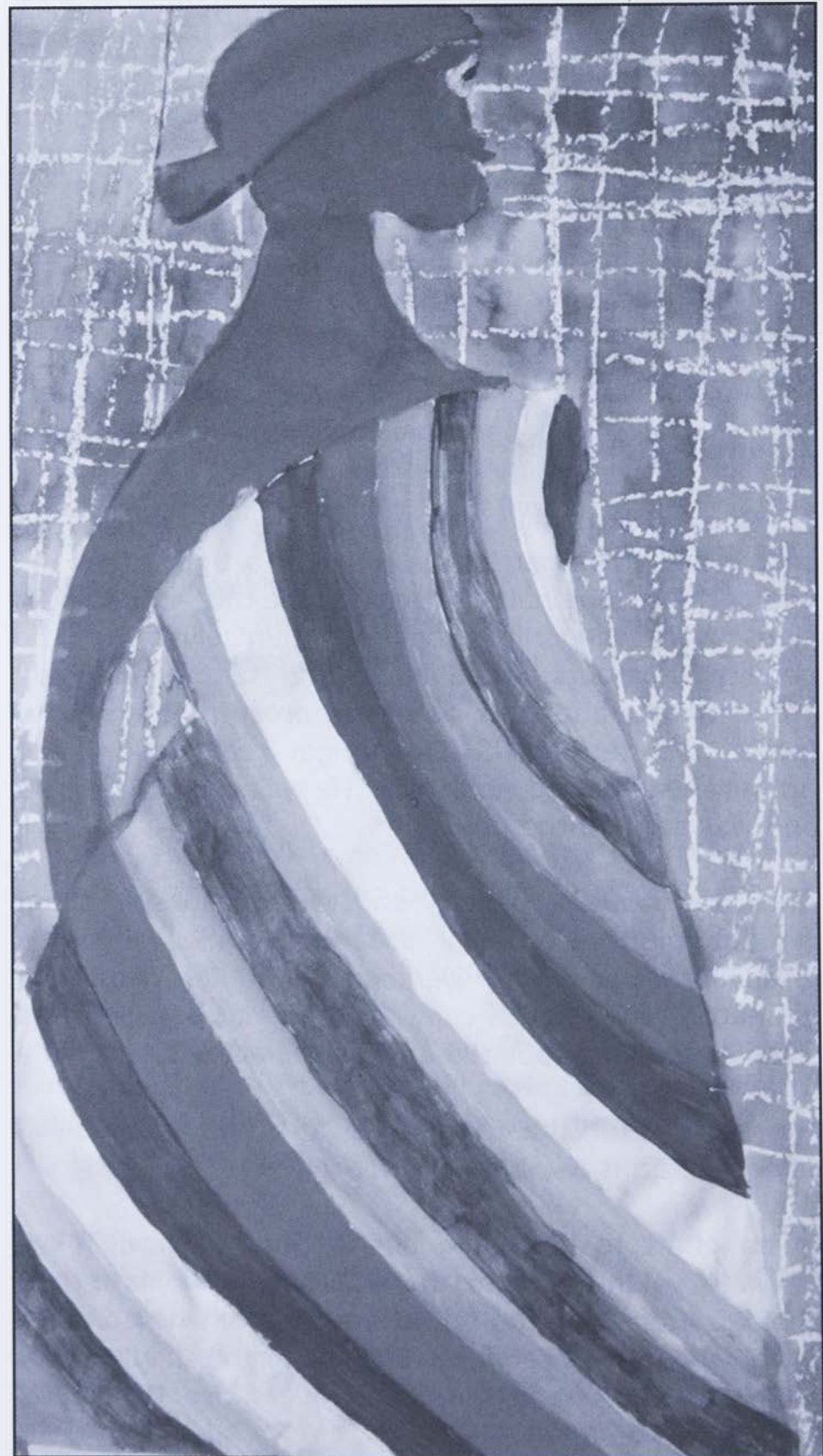

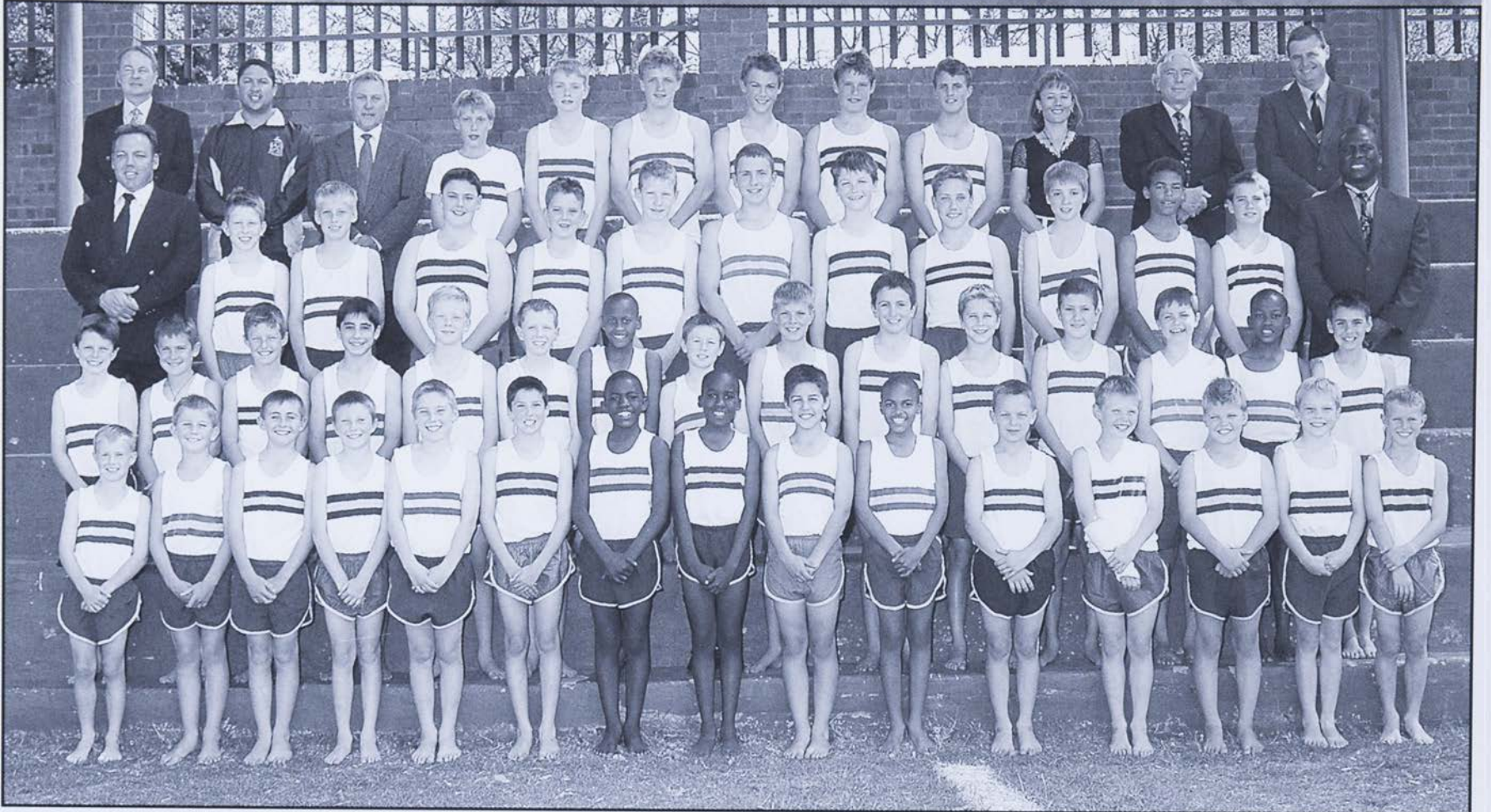

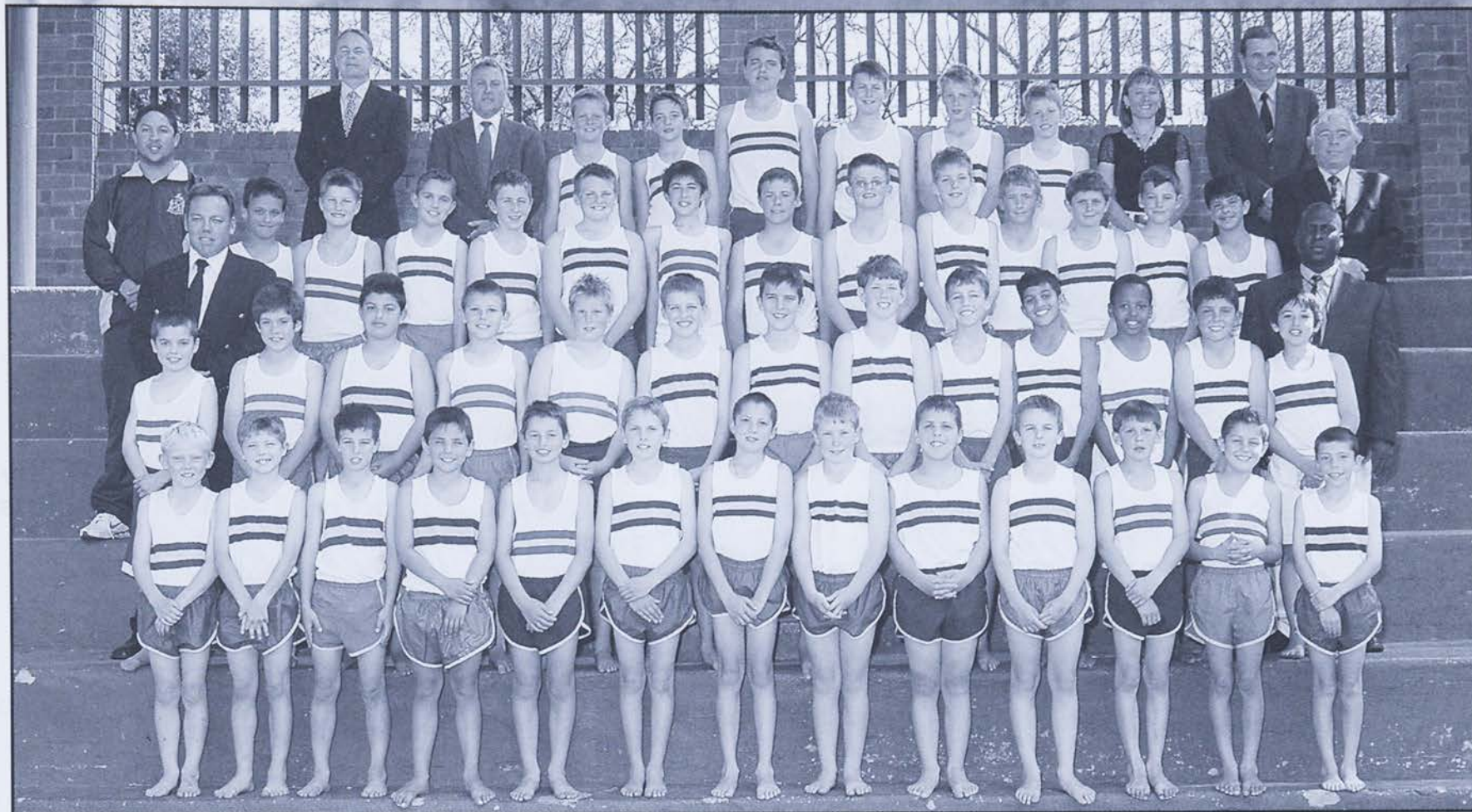

425 runs at 28.33 and he took 19 wickets at 14.95. Michael McCollum took 22 wickets at 15.09. Gareth Wildman scored 556 runs at 27.80 and took 34 wickets at 15.32 with his express bowling. Rory Wildman took 32 wickets at 13.31 per wicket with his off-spin.

These were the standout performances but a characteristic of this team was that when the team was in trouble, when the key players hadn't performed, one of the lesser lights stepped forward to make a crucial contribution through a brilliant catch, by taking an important wicket or by scoring vital runs. Declan Ahern bowled many tight overs when most needed and his catching was amazing. Barry Morisse was ever reliable behind the stumps and played a few important innings. Who could forget Ethan Wallington's brilliant catch that took the fight out of Far North A or Stuart Ingledew's belligerent innings in the same match? Without Louis Wildman's determined innings, we would have lost against St. Stithian's. It was typical and fitting that Ethan Wallington should hit the final runs of the year, a testament to the never say die character of this team.

Something else to be pleased about is that contrary to current trends and to many of their opponents, the St. David's boys played their cricket quietly and with respect for the opposition. The tiger only roars after it has caught its prey. The Prep 1st XI boys certainly let their cricket do the talking and they have now earned the right to roar!

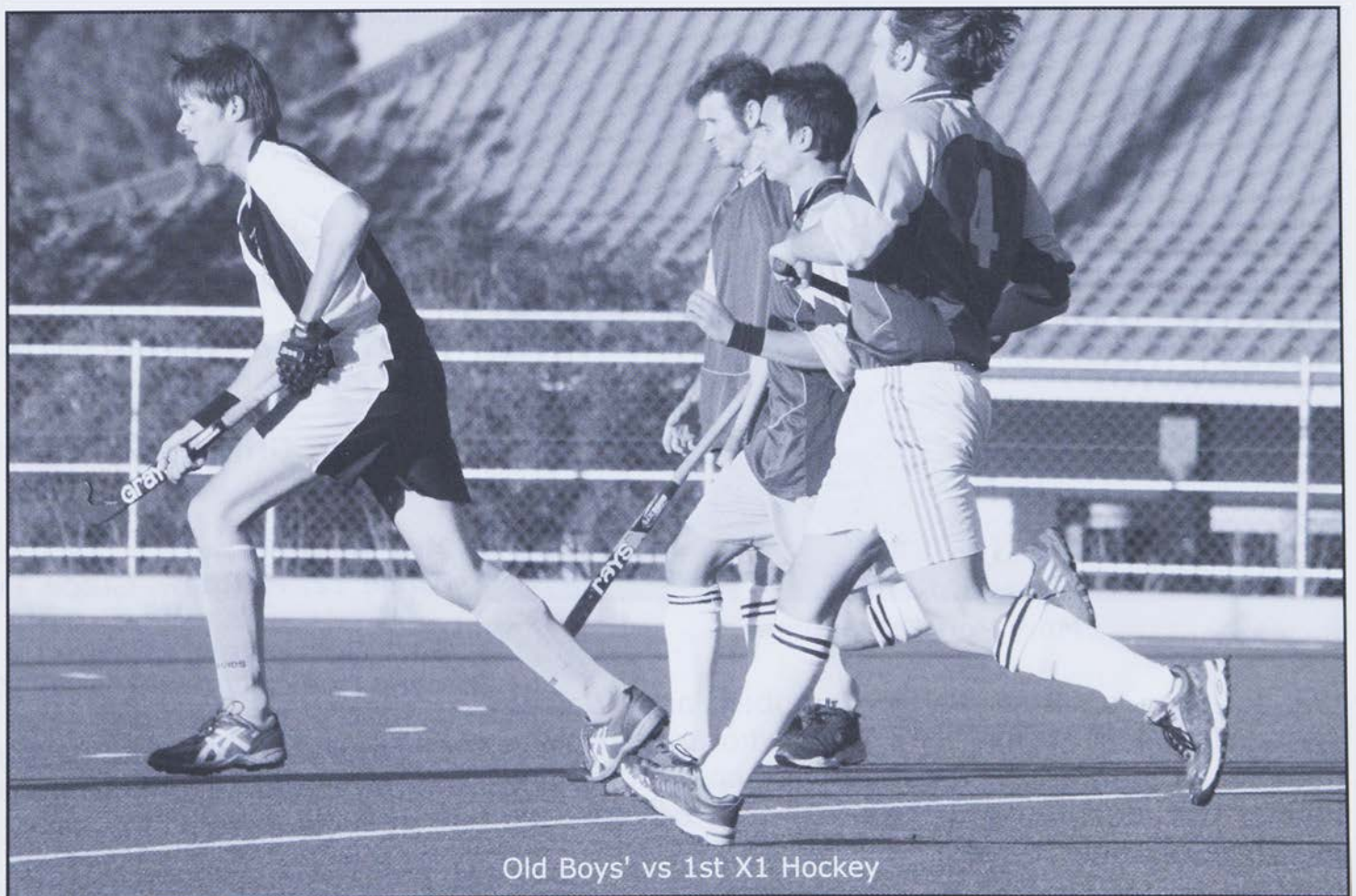
Dinner Dance 2006

Old Boys Achievements

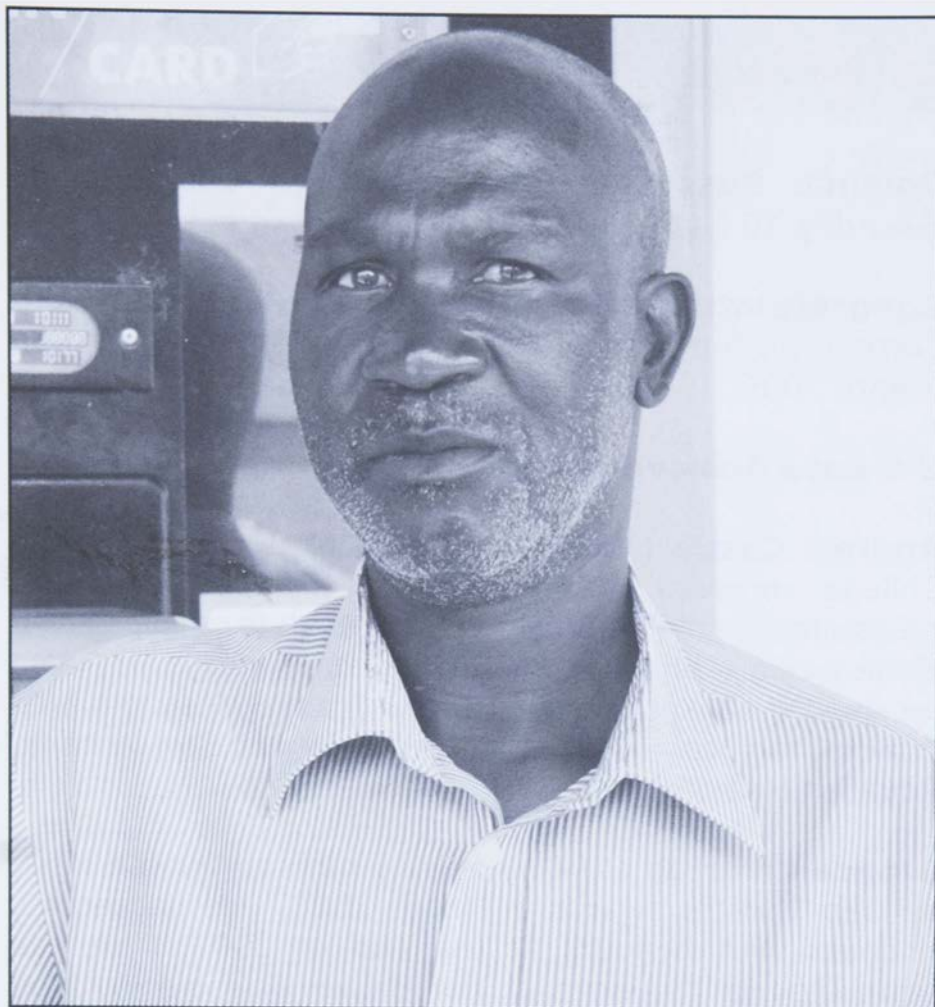

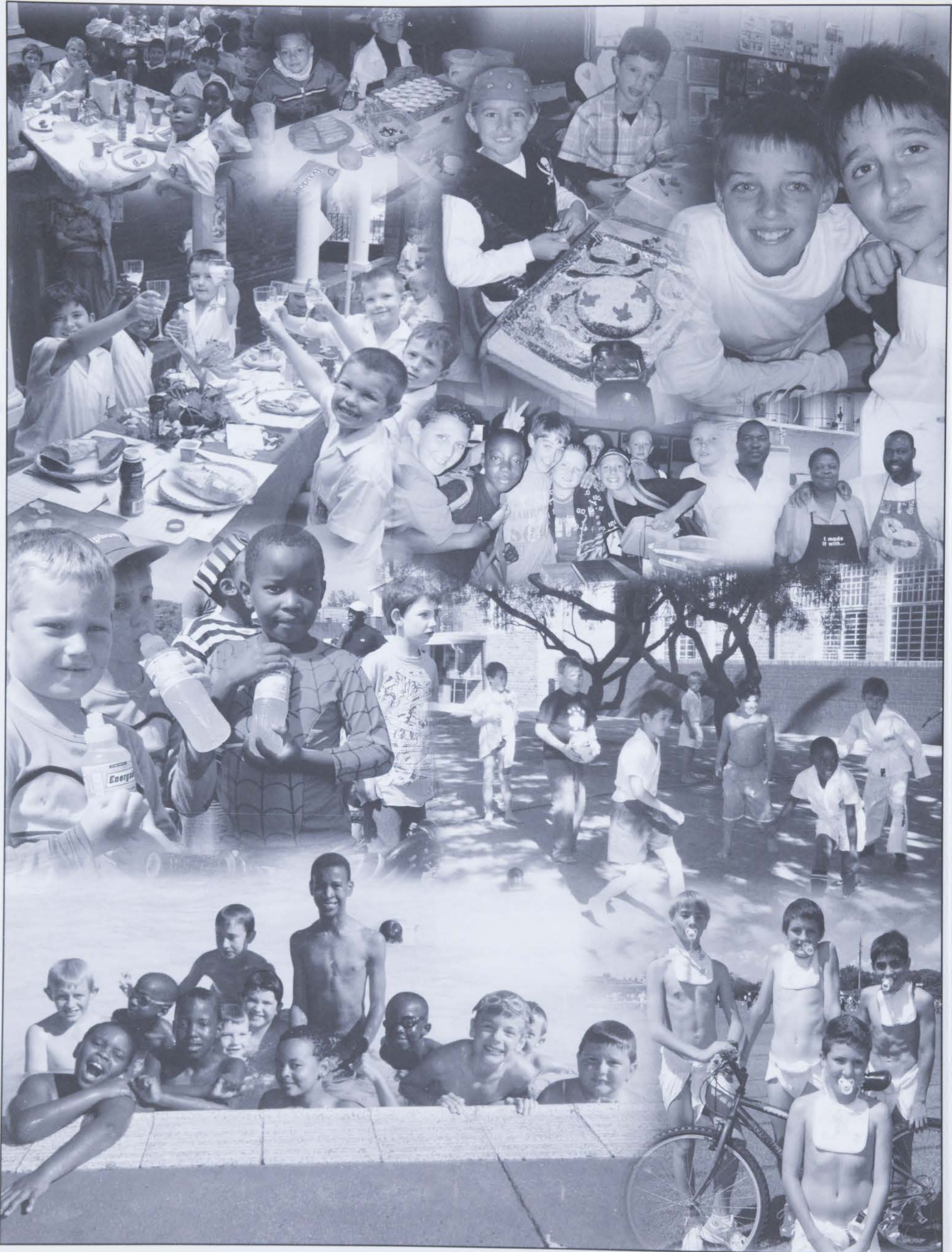
