To the disappointment of some boys, the tents were not quite the 5 star accommodation that they were hoping for.

I scanned the vast area in which the camp was situated. Surrounding me was lush bush, tents, mud, blue sky, insects and the hind of wildlife, out there but not seen. No pollution, no litter, no stress - it was truly African paradise. We explored the different parts of the camp, first were the bathrooms - a bushman styled areas with no roof (enabling you to admire the sky and hope you wouldn't admire the droppings of a malicious bird!) 3 toilets and 3 'open' showers. This caused quite a disturbance among the boys. Next was the kitchen area - prepared, the lapa - the meeting place of 'chilling out' area and the dining area - where we ate and played games.

We were put into walking groups or teams and were assigned to a leader. Our leader was Pieter, a light hearted and enthusiastic guy willing to crack a joke or sing a song at any given opportunity. We had a safety and environmental talk and then named our group. Ours was 'The Survivors'.

Lunch was soon ready so we took our seats in the dining area. For lunch we had hot dogs and a fresh fruit. What was nice about this camp was that tea, coffee, hot chocolate, juice and fresh fruit were always on offer. After lunch we had free time followed by a game of Mangosotho's farm. After that we had to complete a puzzle of the farm and list all the things that were wrong with our puzzle in comparison to a picture of the farm that we were given. The list was hotly debated so were the pro's and con's of our answers which helped to lead us to the most accurate choices.

A bout of free time was enjoyed followed by a game called the 'Food Chain', followed by supper, which was chicken curry.

Once supper had finished we had our night activity - Orienteering. Orienteering was all about team-work and solving puzzles and brain teasers. In the end our team won. Bed was at 23.30 and the sounds of the night disappeared as I drifted off to sleep.

Day 2: I woke up at 06.30, dressed and went down to a breakfast for cereal and French toast. Today we are going to swim at the dam. En-route to the dam we had a bush talk and hike that lasted about an hour. It was sad to find a dead giraffe's remains scattered on the ground. We got to the dam and we had a choice of canoeing or swimming -

I decided on the latter. After an hour or two we were called to lunch – 2 delicious tuna rolls and a fruit. After lunch we had a mud-fight which was so much fun. What wasn't fun was being hit in the eye but revenge can be so sweet!

We travelled back to camp and after MORE Free time we went to a Pedi Cultural Village. There we climbed a massive tree house (which had a spectacular view) and listened to a talk with the manager. We then explored all the huts as they were constructed through the ages. We watched a show of Pedi dancing and singing. With the cackling fire, the silky smooth glow of the full moon and the beat of the drum it was a perfect setting. It was truly a culturally enriching experience.

Supper was Spaghetti Bolognese, which didn't quite compare with Nonna's (my Italian grandmother who makes very tasty Italian Cuisine). Bedtime was a bit earlier at 21.30 as we had to get up at 05.45 the next morning for the game drive.

Day 3: I woke up to the sound of rain beating hard against the tent. What I said about the tents being good shelter I found out wasn't exactly true as we had several leaks. We went to breakfast and got ready for the game drive. The game drive vehicles arrived with no roof. We left the camp sopping wet and went to the game reserve. Once in the game reserve we were quite lucky to see zebra, kudu, impala, springbok, blue wildebeest, black wildebeest, jackals and a few birds. What I enjoyed most about the game drive was the 'bundu – bashing' as the powerful engines of the vehicles hauled us over the rough terrain and slippery mud. Due to some spoil sports we had to go back because they were whinging about being cold and wet. I wondered why we were called the Survivors if they couldn't handle a bit of cold and rain.

More free time was followed by lunch – salad rolls and fruit. By this time the weather had cleared up and was now partly cloudy. In our teams we took part in a mini-hockey tournament. There was fierce competition – boys were tripping and diving trying to defend and score. There were screams and shouts of encouragement. Things did get a bit out of hand when some boys were getting too competitive. As a result friendships were strained and that wasn't a pleasant or a good thing. They should realise that it is just a game. Unfortunately guys have an ego, a thing that can be a bit of a problem at times.

It was our final night so we were treated to twist bread and marshmallows, which we cooked over the fire. After indulging in our treats we had supper, which was Chicken a la King. We played a game, went to pack and went to bed. We'd had such a good time that a notable amount of sadness was building up because we were leaving for Johannesburg tomorrow.

Day 4 – final day: Once again it was raining hard. I gathered my bags and went down to breakfast. After breakfast we got out bags and got ready to get on the bus but there was a serious problem. The buses were stuck deep in the mud. You could cut the tension and anxiety with a knife as the boys went totally quiet. Two tractors and a bakkie later, the first bus got pulled out. The silence was broken with a huge roar that emerged from the boys. People were so happy that they were hugging each other. I was on the bus so I loaded my bags, waved goodbye and left Ubungani on that rainy day. Apparently the other bus got pulled out about 5 minutes later so we were both safely on the road heading for home. Three hours later we arrived back at St David's to be welcomed by our families.

I believe that travel and exposure to other 'ways' of living is one of the best forms of education. It gives us an insight into different places, their histories, their people and legacies. It is important that we have the ability to change and Ubungani was a change for me from normal city life. Without change, life would be so dull so this experience is merely one of but many memories to be cherished for a long time.
