


Aerial view of the College, taken March 1969.

Editorial

"I HAVE A DREAM!"—famous words of the American idealist Martin Luther King. These are words which also characterise Reverend Brother Anthony who this year completes 10 years as Headmaster of St. David's. His dream is that St. David's will be a great College—and the fact that this dream is stronger, clearer and closer to realisation in 1969 than it was in 1960 is evidence of his abiding youthful enthusiasm and determination.

Dream has of course become reality in many ways in these 10 years: the remarkable degree of parent participation; the provision of numerous new facilities for pupils; the expansion of the school roll; academic results rivalling the best produced by other leading Colleges; the establishment of Clubs and Societies to develop varied interests and talents — above all, the maintenance of a very fine school spirit — these are all great achievements.

Few schools can boast that their parents are as actively interested and involved in school matters as those of St. David's. Brother Anthony has started several Committees to canalise this interest and to cater for such diverse school activities as Tuck Shop, Library, Cadets, Swop Shop and Horse Riding. The coordinating body — the Parent-Teacher Association — also owes its establishment to him. These Committees have helped to spread the burden of running a large school (and St. David's roll has expanded from 500 to 800 in 10 years) and have also made possible some new activities for the pupils.

Brother Anthony's "pride and joy" is the new property that was purchased from Mrs. McGill-Love in 1965. This at present is being developed into first-rate playing fields that will give every boy the opportunity to participate in the many organised sports that the school provides. The coloured aerial photograph gives

a good idea of the remarkable progress made on these fields since 1966 when the property was cleared. A keen sportsman himself, Brother Anthony has inspired and encouraged a high standard in most competitive sports, especially cricket, swimming and athletics.

From an academic and cultural point of view there has been great progress also. The College records indicate that between 1960 and 1968, 300 boys matriculated with a total of 66 distinctions and 70 first class passes. An Art Room and a Library have been established as well as new Junior Classrooms and an Administration Block. Several important cultural functions appear regularly on the College Calendar e.g. the Art Exhibition, the Senior and Junior Best Speaker Contests. A more varied curriculum is being offered, including such subjects as Physics, Chemistry, Add. Maths., Biology and French.

School spirit is a difficult thing to define and analyse, but no visitor leaves St. David's without commenting upon the spirit that animates the school. The basis of it is Brother Anthony's personal interest in every member of staff, every parent, and every pupil, and in all activities undertaken by them. A Headmaster is called upon to make frequent decisions and judgments: Brother Anthony's have always been sound, just and eminently reasonable — the most severe of them softened with a smile and a joke!


The master-plan that is published elsewhere in this Review is clear proof of how close Brother Anthony's dream is to realisation. Next year will see the commencement of building operations on a splendid Department of Natural Sciences building. In gratitude to Brother for his ten years of selfless unremitting work for this College, we can wish him nothing better than the full realisation of his dream.


R.I.P. Brother Edmund Macdonald

of the Marist Brothers School, Hatfield Street, Gardens, died in his sleep while recuperating at Groote Schuur Hospital on March 11. He was 74.

Brother Edmund was born in Scotland and joined the Marist Brothers in 1910. He then taught in France for a few years. Appointed principal of the Marist College in Aden, he held this position for 31 years.

Brother Edmund came to South Africa in 1950 and taught in various colleges here.

He was Bursar at St. David's from 1965-1967.



The first High School in Johannesburg, Sacred Heart College, Koch Street, opened by the Marist Brothers 80 years ago.


ONE MORNING during the year 1889 two men in clerical garb stepped out of the coach just arrived from Kimberley to the jubilant notes of the bugle. These two men were the centre of curiosity for the moment, the clerical habit not being a familiar sight in the mining camp of Johannesburg. "Ain't it against the rules for a parsin ter prospect?" asked a burly Australian of his neighbour. "Maybe they're gonna start a Cathedral all on their own," was the not inapt reply.

Paying no attention, however, to these remarks the two new arrivals went straight to the Government offices — a large marquee — and interviewed the sheriff. They emerged carrying a bundle of papers and hurried off to the north-east, under the guidance of a phlegmatic old Boer, until they arrived at the foot of a low ridge. Here, after consulting their plans, they drew lines on the ground and took rough measurements and angles. By this time their baggage had arrived, whereupon they pitched a little belltent and laid out the camp equipments.

In the course of three short weeks a small cottage had been built, and a large piece of ground around it, fenced in. A few visits to the near-by convent resulted in the arrival one day of a mule trolley carrying fourteen small boys. Our friends in black conducted them all through the tiny cottage. That night the two men, in company with the resident Catholic Priest, went into all the rooms of the little house reciting prayers and finally bestowing benediction. The following morning early fourteen boys duly arrived, this time each carrying a few books. When the door opened they all crowded in and the pioneer College of the Rand was in being. The two black-coated men were the Reverend Brothers Frederick and Albert Dominic. They were among the very few who came to the Rand in those early days with motives other than of gain.

It was actually on a Wednesday morning, the 9th October 1889, that the first Boys School in Johannesburg opened its doors. This was Marist Brothers, Koch Street.

The Marist Brothers in the Biafran War

(An extract from an article by Brother Francis who has been in Biafra throughout the war. The Article first appeared in the July 1969 edition of the Bulettin de l'Institut des Freres Maristes des Ecoles.)

AT THE BEGINNING OF THE WAR there were about 70 Brothers in the eastern region of Nigeria which is now known as Biafra. In addition about 30 African boys were in training. Of the 70 professed Brothers, 13 were European Brothers from the Province of Great Britain.

After the fall of Enugu, on the 1st October 1967, and the advance of the Federal troops on the outer fronts, the refugees poured into the Ibo region. Soon a dangerous quota had been reached, and it was impossible to ignore the millions of people who were living in the bush, with hardly anything to eat. As our Primary schools had not reopened after Christmas 1967 we decided to use our buildings to house as many refugees as possible and each local Community had to do its best to feed them. Their condition worsened very rapidly as fever and sickness made their ravages.

With the help of money sent from the British Province a local committee was organised to buy little plots of ground for each refugee family and yam plants

were bought for them to plant.


As the local hospital was full not only of sick refugees but also with wounded soldiers there was only one thing to do — open up our own hospital. Early in 1968 we began with the aid of two nurses to run a dispensary which opened twice a week. However the crowd of sick people was so great that daily care became necessary, and so a Dormitory for the Juniors was converted into a temporary hospital. Soon the number of people treated daily reached 200. We thought that this would be the maximum when on a certain unforgettable day more than 150 sick and dying children arrived in two large trucks. We had neither space, nor medication, nor food to cater for such a crowd. We quickly made up our minds that whatever the cost we would not abandon one of these children, though the work seemed impossible. From the oldest Brother to the youngest Junior everyone set himself to the task.

Our greatest support at this time was an old truck which used to arrive regularly carrying supplies. It

bore the moving slogan "I believe in God!"

Very sad days followed the arrival of dying children. The little procession to the cemetery four or five times every day became a habit. Equally depressing were the overcrowded dormitories — everywhere one could see the frightening work of hunger. Little bodies swollen from head to foot from lack of proteins, or the skin which could no longer hold the pressure of the flesh broken and shrivelled up all over the body.

Other little bodies were as fragile as glass to such an extent that one dared not even move them. And as we began to care for each group we began to see that there would be a double task ahead — one to restore health to bodies, the other to restore the spirit. The latter was a much more difficult task to achieve. The world had dealt these children a violent blow. Was it any surprise that they arrived with haggard eyes, eyes

turned inwards, haunted by horrors that they should never have seen, eyes filled with suspicion and defiance towards a humanity that had betrayed them. Many times we had to wait a week before we got a single smile out of such children, and we had to rack our brains even to achieve this much.

Food itself had little effect. The injections and unpleasant medicine we had to administer certainly did not help in this respect! There was only one solution, that of Christ — endless personal attention to these children. Br. Peter introduced an idea which was to become a determining factor in the rehabilitation programme. Having a musical ear, and a small harmonica of which he is very proud, he made his way from dormitory to dormitory whistling and playing the harmonica. The healthy children began to stand up on their mats, keeping time by clapping their hands. At the same time, Br. Rufus would tour the rooms dancing to the accompaniment of the harmonica. Soon some children began to dance. From then on, every evening Br. Peter assembled all the healthy children and from a collection of little drums, tin cans bottles, boxes, anything that could help the volume an orchestra was born! And this "orchestra" did valuable work in cheering up the sick children.

One idea led to another and soon Br. James uncovered rolls of wire, electric installation tubes and two loud-speakers and after many failures we had music from a tape recorder which cried out its message above the cries and groans of the dying for those who still had the will to live.

Men will always owe a great debt to Charlie Chaplin! Never has this been better realised than during those harassing months at Uturu. Once again it was Br. James' idea to show Charlie to the children and he did this religiously day after day so that the first welcome which he had each morning from the children was "Brother Cinema"!



Development Plan


development of the school over the next five years and beyond, based on the assumption that the Sandton authorities will expropriate a strip of land fifty feet wide from the western boundary of the property. This will necessitate the demolition of both junior school buildings near Rivonia Road. The architect envisages an entirely separate primary school on the Boundary Road end of the original main fields (beyond the Cricket score box) and the use of these fields for primary school sporting fixtures.

The laboratory block to be built in 1970 is clearly indicated (see also the Architect's impression and accompanying description) as well as the sites for a hall (close to a new Main Entrance) a chapel and further facilities such as a library (the wing projecting from the present Boarders' Dining Hall) and other special teaching rooms (such as a language laboratory) which will be included in the extension of the Boarding Department wing and in the wing running parallel to it on the left. The Senior quadrangle is shown divided into several courtyards by means of ponds and attractive paving, and adequate parking space is provided in the surroundings of the Hall.

The architect responsible for the Development Plan is Professor John Fassler, former Head of the School of architecture at the University of the Witwatersrand.




DEVELOPMENT PLAN FOR MARIST BROTH

Architect's impression of proposed natural sciences wing


THE VIEW IS FROM THE SOUTH-EAST, i.e. from the street level in First Avenue. The building adjoins the present Senior classroom block, running approximately west to east (on the right). The top floor contains two senior laboratories (Stds. 9 and 10) for physics and chemistry respectively and the middle floor houses corresponding junior laboratories (Stds. 6, 7 and 8). Both chemistry laboratories are on the east

end of the wing with the physics laboratories lying between the classrooms and the centre projection. The ground floor contains an auditorium to seat 154 people and a biology laboratory on the east end.

The projection to the south serves the following purposes: top floor — lecture room for one class of 36; middle floor — workshop and preparation room; ground floor — biology museum and preparation room.

Other facilities included in the block are: preparation and store rooms for the physical sciences; an office for the members of the Science Department; a tea kitchen to serve the auditorium; and for the auditorium, black-out facilities and a projection room (the present games room).

The Architect is Prof. John Fassler.

Religious Notes

Time of Sunday Mass

THE DOCUMENT ON THE LITURGY issued by Vatican II calls Sunday "the original feastday" and the "foundation and kernel of the whole liturgical year". In order to stress the importance of Sunday Mass we have changed the time from 7.00 a.m. to 9.00 a.m. with very happy results. Participation — whether by saying the responses, or singing the hymns, or simply attending to the sermon — is far better. We are very grateful to the Dominican Fathers who have made it possible for us to have Mass at this time, also to Mgr. Anthony Kelly who has helped out on several occasions.

Choir

Another factor contributing towards improved participation has been the formation of a small Choir of Junior Boarders (12 in number). Choir stalls have been erected on the lefthand side of the altar and the new electric organ purchased this year, has been placed next to them. The ministerial role of the Choir becomes clear from this position. On occasion the Choir has come in Procession with the Celebrant and servers to further illustrate their function. They lead the Congregational singing; sing verses of Psalms to which the whole congregation responds; sing Motets at the Gradual and Communion; and introduce the Eucharistic Acclamations. Sincere thanks to Mrs. Dorothy Castle who plays the Organ at Sunday Mass and assists in the training of the Choir.

Friday evening Mass

An innovation this year has been a Friday evening mass at 6 p.m. It was thought that Boarders would find it easier to come to Mass at this time than any other time of the week — in general attendance has proved this idea correct. We owe this Mass to the generosity of Fr. Anthony Bailey O.M.I., the College Chaplain. We take this opportunity of thanking him for all his services to the College; his interest in all College activities is highly valued by Staff and boys.

Retreats

We held two retreats this year, one for the Std. IX's (preached by Fr. Broderick M.S.C.) and the other for Matrics. The latter was the first "Ecumenical Retreat" we have had; it was directed by Fr. Victor Whelan

O.M.I. and the Rev. David Jones of the Linden Methodist Church. It ended with a Unity Service in the Chapel. All who participated in this Retreat found it very stimulating and heartily endorse the idea.

Visiting Ministers

Last year we were very pleased to welcome Rev. Fr. Hugh Harker who takes the Anglican boys for a lesson once a week. This year he was joined by Mr. Ted Goodyer, an Anglican Deacon, who gives the Anglicans in the Senior School a lesson once a week. Rev. Mr. David Jones, Mr. Parker and Mr. Brown all of the Methodist Church are now also regular visitors to the College. They have taken it in turns to instruct the Protestant boys in the Matriculation classes. We are extremely grateful to them, and their Anglican colleagues for giving their time so generously.

Month of May Devotions

The month of May was marked by short devotions held in the Chapel every evening. These took the form of the singing of the *Salve Regina* in English, before a candle-lit shrine of Our Lady. Large numbers of Boarders attended each evening.

Visit of Rev. Fr. John Goller S.J.

In the first term we were privileged to have Fr. John Goller (National Assistant of the C.L.G. Movement) with us for about five weeks. He came to give specialised assistance to the three C.L.G.'s in the school. He sat in on all the C.L.G. general and council meetings, giving very valuable advice; he visited many of the classes to recruit new members; he addressed the Senior School staff and the parents at the A.G.M. of the P.T.A. We are quite sure that under his leadership the C.L.G. movement will make phenomenal progress in this country.

80th Anniversary Mass

To mark the 80th Anniversary of the arrival of the Marist Brothers in Johannesburg, a Solemn High Mass was celebrated in the Cathedral of Christ the King on Tuesday 21st October. This Mass was attended by all the pupils of the three Marist Colleges in Johannesburg, together with a large crowd of parents and past pupils. The principal celebrant of the Mass was His Lordship Bishop Boyle — he was assisted by six Priests who are past pupils of the Brothers.



The remainder of this term was spent having discussions on topics ranging from "leaving home" to "drugs and juvenile delinquency".



The Walkathon was held on Saturday, 26th July, 1969. The Catholic Bishop of Johannesburg and the Mayor and Mayoress of Johannesburg were present to start the Walk. Over 400 people, walkers and their families had gathered on the main cricket oval at 9.00 a.m. The Bishop gave a short talk in which he said he was exceptionally pleased to see the keen spirit of the boys. He then blessed the Walkers; the Mayor spoke briefly and fired the gun for the start of the race.

A loudspeaker car patrolled the route with about ten marshals who also directed the walkers and ensured their safety. The Catering Committee laid on refreshments at five intervals along the route. After the twenty miles had been completed, pies and cool drinks were served to those who arrived back at school. Over 275 people completed the 20-mile walk which passed through Sandown, Bryanston and Rivonia. Among those who walked were three blind walkers. Br. Paul Nolan, the blind Marist Brother, founder of the Guild of St. Theresa for the Blind also walked. He was guided by the president of the Marist Observatory C.L.G. Br. Paul completed 18 miles after he learned that he had been sponsored by the Mayor of Johannesburg for R5 for each mile he walked.

This walk was indeed one of the greatest charity projects which the school has ever undertaken, and certainly the greatest that any C.L.G. of the College has undertaken.

Over R6,400 was raised and this was distributed to the following: The C.L.G. Movement in South Africa, the Guild of St. Theresa, The African Children's Feeding Scheme, the Johannesburg Civilian Blind Association, and the Marist Brothers in Biafra.

During the planning of the Walkathon, however, C.L.G. meetings continued. Films were shown and guest speakers were invited to address the group. Among the guest speakers were: Fr. Cizcovsky, a Czechoslovakian priest, who managed to escape from his country. He, indeed, had a most fascinating story to tell. Mr. Bird of the Social Welfare Organisation addressed the C.L.G. on "Social Work as a Career".

Junior Christian Life Group

THE JUNIOR C. L. G. is an apostolic movement for the boys in Stds. 6, 7 and 8. This year it had a membership of about 24 who met regularly on Thursdays between 5.00 and 6.00 p.m. Many of the meetings were devoted to enquiries on the C.L.G. way of life and leadership qualities.






In the last term the boys are challenging the parents at Kyalami Golf Club, and are determined to beat the parents this time.


Public Speaking

From the above it can be seen that we enjoyed a good deal of success in public speaking competitions this year. However public speaking does not yet receive the prominence it should in this school. Far too many boys are Matriculating with very little experience in public speaking. There are several reasons for this:

 Spoken English does not yet receive any more than token acknowledgment from examining

boards;

(ii) Debating and Public Speaking contests are for the few — a high standard attained in them can be very deceptive — for it gives no indication of the speaking ability of the bulk of pupils at a school.

We hope in future years to remedy this situation by an increased attention to oral work in the English classes, by frequent internal debates and external debates that involve several teams on the same occasion. Parents have a very valuable role to play in this matter. Their attendance at debates and speech contests will impress upon the boys the importance of this aspect of school life.

The Business Game

s o METHING NEW for the Matriculants this year... The National Council for Chartered Accountants in co-operation with International Computer Limited introduced for the first time in the Republic an Inter-High School Business Game. A similar competition held in England last year was most successful, the winning school being Downside Benedictine College, one of the leading Catholic boarding Colleges in the country.

The game is intended to give senior boys an insight into the functioning of the directors of a manufacturing and marketing company. In short, it is a computer-based management exercise, which is sometimes used in actual management training.

Three teams play at a time, the winner being the one which makes most profit in "two years" of simulated business. Policies for a "quarter" are entered on to a decision form covering such items as selling price of product, and capital allocations for plant, for

marketing and for research and development. When the computer is fed with the data from three teams, it simulates three months of business, and issues a report to each competitor. This statement details the overall state of the market, as well as the financial position of the firm. At any stage (except after the "annual report" issued after four periods) the condition of rivals remains a matter of guesswork.

During the first term, then, 27 schools from all parts of the country competed in nine games. The nine winners were to play a further three games in the second term, leaving only three teams to compete in the final. Our team was matched with Helpmekaar and Parktown Boys' High schools. The arrival of the reports from I.C.L. was always keenly anticipated and meetings were lively (sometimes quite heated) especially in the early stages. Though our R3.5 million profit was not enough to beat either of our competitors, the boys learnt much during the two months. Our congratulations go to Helpmekaar (R8.9 million) and to the national winners, Clapham College, and our thanks to the organisers for the valuable experience.

Next year we are hoping to have a combined Senior Junior Art exhibition, with the idea of finding the latent talent which must obviously be present in a school of this size.




It can be seen from these results that this was a poor season. In the majority of matches we were outclassed by superior teams. A few of the players are worthy of individual mention:





Mozambique Expedition

(Std. IX — Biology Class) — P. Scott — Std. 9

A THOUGHT EARLY IN THE YEAR became a reality when the International Truck and Trailer squealed slowly down the darkness of the College driveway. This was the termination of weeks of preparation mainly by Mr. and Mrs. Fearnhead, and to some extent the Standard Nine Biology class. There were passports to be obtained, inoculations to be had, equipment to be collected and made. The purpose of this winter expedition was to collect marine specimens and to study natural habitat.

It was a night of broken sleep, punctuated by the glare of passing cars, the aura of service stations, and the squeal of the loose trailer, which caused a delay and breakfast in Nelspruit. After a smooth passage over the border, and a humid afternoon, we reached our destination early in the evening. Chidenguele, some 150 miles north of Lourenco Marques, is a small village lining the main highway.

Our objective was a clearing below the lighthouse, but it was too much to hope for. Soft sand - wheels spin - stuck! The full moon shining over the smooth lagoon provided the light, the ravenous mosquitoes provided the goad, and we provided the willing labour. We spent the night at an alternative camp site under the stars on the beach. Determination, speed and a detour across the veld the following day brought us to the living quarters of the lighthouse keeper, some 200 feet below the lighthouse. Here we were informed that our destination was the best part of one mile through the most fly-populated, insect-ridden, thorninfested, dense stretch of sub-tropical jungle on the Portuguese East Coast. And that whole trailer to be cleared and conveyed. Slipping and sliding, grunting and groaning, sticky and sweating we made our way.

The following days flowed with an alarming rapidity, and soon, we established a routine in the way of camp life. We began with the volunteering of Cook's helpers for each day. Before long we had gathered a horde of interested spectators, and from their ranks we selected one of the oldest, an intelligent looking piccanin with an unpronounceable name, to be nicknamed "Number One". Their services proved invaluable. On our first free morning we received our first lesson in skin-diving, and the use of the snorkel is in itself an art. Below the surface, one is in a different world, the world of the graceful and lazy movements of the variety of multicoloured fish, and the slow waving of the sea-weed and anemonies. The more proficient among us quickly adapted themselves to the netting of marine specimens, and the swish of the passing swells was often broken by cries of, "Look,

This action involved climbing the lighthouse to admire the scenery, borrowing the keeper's binoculars and spilling as much water as we could. The return journey was a race to see which group could drag their heavy container down the treacherous route lined with thorn bushes, and reach the camp first.

The evenings of our stay coincided with the rising of the full moon, and were spent on the rocks searching either for crayfish or for trapped specimens. This was followed by a mad torchlight chase along the waterline catching crabs. Other nights were spent round the campfire, identifying the fish caught that day, singing songs accompanied by guitar, playing poker, or just

discussion and recollections.

This was one holiday we are not likely to forget in a hurry, and on behalf of those on the expedition sincere thanks to Mr. and Mrs. Fearnhead for the organisation and for the excellent menus that were provided.


Both the Moni League and the Werner League were held with great enthusiasm this year. This meant that about 300 of the Primary School boys were able to take part in a weekly game of soccer.


During this year, two main projects have continued to receive the attention of your committee, namely, the development of playing fields and the construction of the new Science Wing.

We are pleased to report that work related to the establishment and preparation of the sports-fields is

nearing completion. Members of the Committee were recently engaged in the task of pegging-out the last playing-fields and levelling of the area is now in progress. Your committee has also financed the purchase of a heavy-duty lawnmower and other lesser items of equipment essential to the maintenance of the College grounds. The problem of watering remains to be solved, but the sinking of additional bore-holes cannot be contemplated at this stage on account of the cost likely to be incurred. Preliminary work associated with the proposed Science Building has not been accomplished without complication. Your Committee has assisted the College in its negotiations with the Peri-Urban Areas (now Sandton) Council and in this connection a special word of thanks is due to Adv. P. A. Paizes for his advice and guidance and to Messrs. V. Andersen and P. Banahan who have set aside so much time for this project. Happily, the feasibility of the Council's requirements as to the siting of the proposed building has been tested and found acceptable so that the College is now free to submit building plans for approval. The Architect, Prof. J. Fassler is presently engaged in the preparation of detailed drawings and the services of prominent Electrical and Structural Consultants have been retained. It is hoped therefore, that before the end of 1970 the Science Wing will be nearing completion.

This year witnessed the inauguration of our Sunday film evenings. Three of these performances have been held so far and we are indebted to Mr. M. Ross for organisation of these shows. Mr. Ross, we must mention, has donated an aerial photograph of the College to the Headmaster and it is intended to mount a more expansive version near the main entrance to the school suitably annotated to serve as guide to the various sections of the school complex.

Brother Anthony and Mr. Simaan have completed a further year of office as Trustees of the St. David's College Trust Fund and your Chairman has acted as Secretary. A cheese and wine party was held in March for the purpose of explaining the function of the Fund to new parents and once again, a number of parents kindly volunteered as canvassers of contributions. Monies solicited in this manner have been augmented during the year by the proceeds of a raffle and by the July Sweep Stake the organisation of which was

the responsibility of Mr. Simaan, ably assisted accounting-wise by Mrs. Buckley-Jones.

Our News Letter continues to be edited by Mrs. Sagar and this Committee is most appreciative of her efforts in collating and presenting material to the parents through this important medium. Mrs. Sagar also heads a small team of ladies in the handling of the sale of new books and out of profits the "Book Sale" Committee was able to donate a Hi-fi record player to the school library.

On assumption of office, this Committee set its mind towards seeking a solution to the problem of accommodating internal traffic and it was decided that, with the permission of the College, an attempt would be made to route the traffic-flow through the exit from the school leading to 1st Avenue. It thus became essential that the approach to this exit be suitably surfaced and having declined two tenders for this work which were considered inordinately high, a working party was duly organised from within the Committee to perform the task of laying two "concrete strips". Other measures introduced involved the barricading of the northern entrance to the main gate, the closure of the communicating lane adjacent to the primary school, the erection of wire-lines and of traffic signs and the establishment of a one-way traffic route from the northernmost entrance to the centre gate. After a trial period, however, it was decided to reopen the main gate entirely and to remove the wire separation lines so that now parents are under no compulsion to utilise the 1st Avenue exit; travel along the communicating lane between the schools is restricted to service vehicles only during school hours; traffic entering the school through the northern gate is obliged to follow the one-way course to the centre gate; and a 10 m.p.h. speed limit has been imposed. The problem of traffic control will continue to receive your committee's attention although it is generally considered that with the co-operation of parents, the measures adopted have improved the conditions.

In the realm of sport, your Committee has presented

a rugby scrumming-machine and goal post pads to the College, and with the assistance of co-opted parents has assisted the Brothers in the organisation of school sporting events, in coaching activities and of course, with the ever-popular "domestic" sporting occasions — this year's "Fathers' Cricket Day" was held on the 16th March, arrangements having again been initiated and controlled by Mr. Boyes-Varley. A number of parents volunteered their services to the Riding Club in March and immediately set about applying their efforts towards improving the administration and operation of the Club. The results of their endeavours are already apparent. The paddock area (fenced by means of a loan from this Committee) having been cleared of timber, is now being grassed whilst the stables now have a more presentable appearance. A riding uniform devised by the Club Committee has been approved and the services of a qualified riding instructor are now available to our boys. Mr. M. Sterkowitz was succeeded as convenor recently by Mr. B. Hewitt and to these parents and their fellow Committee members we must record our

Our Ladies' Committee, assisted by Mr. Ross, has been instrumental in procuring a dish-washing machine, crockery, and a food-waste disposer on behalf of the school and this gesture is indeed praiseworthy. The various Sub-Committees of "Book Sales", "Cadets", "Catering", "Library", "Swop" and "Tuck" under the Chairmanship of Mesdames D. Sagar, M. Moni, J. Ryan, L. van Deventer, D. Walker and G. Duncan have maintained a high standard of proficiency in the performance of their functions and the P.T.A. Committee desires to express its appreciation of the voluntary services thus rendered on behalf of the College.

In conclusion, this Committee wishes to extend its sincere thanks to so many parents who by their active interest, enthusiasm and encouragement have contributed materially to the work of this Committee in an increasing sphere of involvement. M. RAE,




