






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Consecration to the Blessed Virgin



# ED'S NOTES

I am happy to put before you a record of the many and varied interests and achievements at this Marist School during 1988. They make up the substance, the history and the tradition of the Marist School. I would like to thank all those who have contributed to the completion and success of the 1988 Review.

All involved at St David's College wish the readers of this Review a blessed Christmas and every happiness in the New Year.

## **Religious Notes**

An important aim at St David's College is to make religion a way of life for both teachers and pupils — not only a subject that is taught or lip service in a church. Certainly, there are R.E. periods every day and input from Masses, Assemblies, retreats etc; but the aim is to make the whole atmosphere at school a religious one so that it can influence all aspects of the pupils' lives and attitudes. For this reason it is stressed that "an ounce of good example is worth more than a ton of words."

The R.E. department is very fortunate to have a large collection of excellent source material and teaching aids available to the teachers in the RE room, and the Religious Co-ordinator is available to assist any teachers who may need help or special material. The R.E. room is a quiet, carpeted room, conducive to reflection and study and is often used by the senior classes for meditation.

Slotted into the school timetable are class confessions and class Masses each term. The fulltime College Chaplain, Father Brewer, is available at all times to counsel both junior and senior pupils. Indeed a structured programme of "individual conselling" by Father Brewer has been implemented for the Senior school. His advice and very presence is invaluable to all aspects of school life.

In order to foster family spirit, family Masses for each standard are held at intervals throughout the year. Marist families occasionally have christenings and weddings in the school chapel. Parents are also welcome to attend the First Friday Masses held each month.

A very important event each year is the First Holy Communion day of the Standard I Catholic pupils.

Parents and friends attend this very special Mass which is then followed by a short celebration. The standard 9 pupils are also prepared for a special day — their Confirmation day. They are encouraged to be confirmed in their own parishes.

The spiritual growth of the boys is enriched by retreats which are held for the boys in Standard 5-10. That of the teachers is also fostered by days of reflection and prayer. The school was also paid a visit by Brother Othmar who gave the senior boys individual counselling. Another highlight of the year was the two week long visit of the Father Luke Fay from Australia who said a special Mass for each class from Standard 7-10.

During the various seasons of the Church's year there are appropriate religious activities: the stations of the cross during Lent, the Rosary during the month of May and so on. There is also an "Altar-Boys club every Friday after school where the Altar boys are trained and encouraged in their spiritual life.

The faith of the pupils is also given the opportunity to be expressed through action — largely in the activities of the Co-Workers who have the well known "prayer of St Francis" as their guiding prayer. The Co-Workers involve themselves in projects helping those in need and fostering a Christian community spirit.

Special attention is given to the Matric boys. A Mass is said to pray for their success in the matric exam and then there is the Matric Valedicatory Mass to bid them farewell.

Thus under the patronage of Our Lady, Marist Inanda strives to help its pupils follow in the footsteps of their leader, Jesus Christ.

### **Marist Co-Workers**

### For St David's Marist College A First!!

(Ascension Day pilgrimage to Slough)

Father Bernard Brewer, the Jesuit Chaplain of St David's Marist College, celebrated Mass in Robert Moffat's historic and hallowed Church at Kuruman. The leading local Catholics who attended, Chris Waraner and Marist Brother Anthony, are sure that this was the first Catholic Mass celebrated in this Church in 160 years.

The Putco busload of St David's families and pupils, with a Catholic driver, enjoyed the very special Mass as part of a tour. Perhaps it could be called a pilgrimage: they stayed at Moffat's Mission and visited the Marist Brother's Mission at Slough. This mission is 83 km away in a sandy semi-desert resettlement area.

The 61 pilgrims revelled in three days of Christian fellowship and togetherness. Rev David Booysen, a Congregational Minister from Wrenchville (another resettlement area) gave a lovely Evensong in the old Church. His choir of shy but very warm and loving people, punctuated the service, a supper and on the second night a braai, with divine hymn singing. Choristers from Rev Alan Butler's Anglican congregation,

joined the braai. They contributed some lovely soul hymns and their friendly company.

All of the pilgrimage was not happy-making, gratifying or uplifting. Pilgrims saw first hand the sufferings of the victims of the population explosion: Broken families after broken family existing in an ecologically disaster area.


This experience forced the asking of questions like "Was all the misery caused by racism enshrined in our laws?" "Are the sad circumstances under which these resettled people live, only worsened or exacerbated by white South African laws?" At least the latter deserves the answer yes! and as Christians the group acknowledged this. Those who are disinherited, discriminated against and who live in poverty and deprivation must know at least of a Christian sympathy. They must know that you support them and care, if only through the Church or its Brothers. Surely as Christ would have you do!

Thanks go to Putco whose sponsorship made this family venture possible. The group hopes that much good will result. In particular that other groups will visit mission stations to learn from the same scaring unsettling resettlement experience.

### Sifiso is Sandton's junior mayor!

A sixteen-year-old schoolboy has made history in an élite white town by being elected as the first ever black junior mayor there.

Sifiso Ngwenya, who lives in Diepkloof, Soweto, was this year elected by other high school pupils in Sandton as the town's junior mayor.

Sifiso is a standard nine pupil at Marist Brothers' High School in affluent Hyde Park, north of Johannesburg.

Says Sifiso: "My sole aim in offering my services was to attempt to bridge the gap between black and white youths, by creating a climate of mutual understanding, friendships and inter-relationships."

To achieve this, Sifiso hopes to establish a multiracial taxi service to ferry scholars around Sandton.

And although this may seem like a daunting task, for Sifiso it is merely one of his many duties. As head of the non-racial council of forty — there are four Indians and 35 white serving members — Sifiso's task is to serve the needs and interests of the Sandton community by raising funds for charitable organisations such as The Twilight Children, the SPCA, SHAP, Cripple Care and a host of others.

Functions lined up for this year include a jumble sale, book and cake sales, fashion shows, a debutantes' ball and a music festival.

Sifiso aims to read for a degree in computer science after he matriculates and then hopes to embark on a post-graduate course in computers overseas.


#### Matric Dance '88



In conclusion I would like to thank most sincerely all at St David's, especially my Headmaster Mr Boswell, for your generous hospitality and interest shown in my exchange.


Good luck, Brian Steele, in Oz next year. We will teach you to play the real sports of Rugby League and "Aussie Rules" next year.

The next day was spent in Knysna where we enjoyed relative freedom and a good night's rest.



### THE EDU-TRAIN

Four of us were chosen to go on the Edu-Train. None realised the impact it would have on us. Our expectations were that of work and facts; how mistaken we were. The Edu-Train was more than just learning about South Africa and its environment; it went to the very source of South Africa — its people.

Our analysis of the situation in South Africa was divided into three categories; the economic, the political and the social situation of the people of South Africa.

As far as the economic situation was concerned, we visited many of the homelands and industries operating in these areas. It was really an eye opener to be exposed to something of which we were unaware. We saw how homelands such as Kwandebele and Lebowagowa operated and how they relied heavily on industries like Ekandustria for survival. It was also interesting to note the views and opinions of the worker and his employer (and how contrasting they were — whom do you believe?)

As far as politics was concerned, everyone was given the opportunity to express his feelings and ideals. Because the train consisted of different races, it was very interesting as well as disturbing to hear the views and experiences of the black people. Due to the "limited rights of speech", one is seldom exposed to the realities of this country which is a very sad situation indeed. It makes one realise how self centred, ambitious and greedy man is. As long as he himself is satisfied, who cares about anyone else?

Linked closely to politics, is the social situation in South Africa. Many peoples knowledge of the social life is very limited to the urban areas and perhaps the townships. We were also exposed to the situation in the rural areas. One cannot believe the poverty and ill health which exists here. One of the most fascinating, but very depressing parts of the trip, was a visit to the Shongwe Mission Hospital (about 8 km from Swaziland). It was a disgrace to see the conditions in this place. Although the doctors and their staff did their best to try and make it as hygenic and hospitable as possible, with their very limited funds, the consequences were clear. There was crowding, the result being that they were forced to turn away many people. This was sickening especially when we have huge hospitals like the General which are almost empty; what a waste, when there are people who are in desperate need of hospital and medical services. Because they have different backgrounds and cultures, do we just cast them aside, like some form of inferior beings? Remember, it takes all kinds to make up a world; but, unity and more important, faith and respect are needed. These are, however, things which modern day man often forgets and ignores.

Thus, on a personal note, Edu-Train must have been one of the most fulfilling experiences we have ever had. Along with the greater knowledge we acquired in the economic, political and social fields, we also experienced something which very few South Africans have experienced — that of total unity. It was something really amazing and wonderful. We proved, al-

though on a small scale, that black and white could very easily live in harmony. The bond that was formed between the 60 of us over 9 days was incredible.

It was as though we were one big family — a goal South Africa should put at the top of her list of goals; for it is only unity and a common nationalism, amongst the different cultures in South Africa; that can bring this beautiful country of ours together.

Thus, many thanks to Sean Johnstone and to Mr Boswell, for giving us the opportunity to be a part of, and experience the fulfilling impact of such a trip.

The following verse describes in a few words the meaning of Edu-Train to us:

#### We are the World

There comes a time when we need a certain call When the world must come together as one There are people dying and it's time to lend a hand To life, the greatest gift of all We can't go on, pretending day by day That someone, somewhere will soon make a change We are all a part of God's great big family And the truth, you know love is all we need.

The Retreat was most enjoyable and I am sure that everyone will agree that we learnt a great deal.







The plays were well attended by a very appreciative audience and provided a very enjoyable evening.




After much deliberation the adjudicators awarded The Brother Philip Plater for the winning play to Craig Cox of The Bishops.

C Cox receiving the trophy for the best producer.




A scene from the play Politics and Terror.

The lemon tree is wedged between two moss draped walls in the furthermost corner of this miniature quadrangle. It bears a bitter fruit.

Inside, a shaft of sunlight breaches the criss-cross matrix of the frayed creeper, revealed by the tiny dust particles swirling about the room. Uncomfortable alongside the numerous prints, it dazzles like visible electricity, firmly imprinted on my wall. The curtains hang recoiled waiting for evening's dapple-grey kiss to smudge and unwind their colour, revealing moth-like wings through a cruel metamorphosis. Outside the washing line droops under a new load. The tee-shirt and jeans have been removed, giving way to a heavier weight, whose flow of droplets form rivulets in the gaps between the water-blackened slate.


I savour these scenes, trying to grasp hold of them by creating extra details and configurations from the cupboards and the clouds. Certain changes have occurred, but the images remain unchanged in nature. The rooms lie like those of the deceased, desolate, outlined by faint shadows and a sense of misery; cursed and bare. As I walk, the house stretches out like an avenue by petrified trees, having a finite path, but lacking the soul to sustain it. This avenue leads me past withered roses, black at the edges all hope of prosperity gone, no pungent fumes set free to purge the stifling air.

Gold frames hang transfixed upon the diningroom walls, and the cabinet, half filled with old, leaning volumes, transmits from its brown-black surface a soulless sheen. Cold and dark and devoid of life; each angle of the house hides something. Bygone bottle on a shelf stares through frosted glass. After solitude, loneliness settles in, its cold touch unavoidable, its bleak fires extinguished only by companionship. Resounding through the house, the second hand of an alarm clock can be heard, an adequate soundtrack to a lonely day.

In our first debate against King David Victory Park (which we narrowly lost) we opposed the motion:




# The Black Cat, 702 Schools Relay


# Cycling




#### Retreat

#### Maandag:



#### Dinsdag:




She stalks along with superior might, then sees some impala in the shadow of oncoming night. She charges, but the antelope, as in a trance, begin to run and dance and prance.




Peg-leg-Pete




# A variety of acts







As usual it was an exciting contest with the lead changing several times and as the end approached the ten-






The 1st team must be congratulated for winning the trophy for playing the most attractive football at the Soccer Day in East London.



We include the various ladies committees, tuck and swop shop ladies, class representatives and all those parents who helped at our functions during the year. We must not forget the excellent assistance given by the teachers; the involvement of many of them was beyond the call of duty.

## **OBITUARY**

On the 20th June, after Requiem Mass celebrated by Bishop Orsmond and Bishop Mvemve and a number of the clergy of the diocese Msgr. Albert Pierre Plesters was buried in Westpark cemetery in the priests' plot.

Msgr. Plesters was born to Amold Joseph and Anna Catharina Plesters (néé Hermans) in Brussels, Belgium on the 30th May 1911.

After his primary and secondary schooling he proceeded to Gent where he completed his Teacher's Diploma and followed this with a degree B.Rd. at Louvain University.

He then responded to a call to try his vocation and came to South Africa and began his studies for the priesthood at Aliwal North, in the Seminary of the Sacred Heart in 1935.

On the 3rd of December 1939 he was ordained a diocesan priest of Johannesburg in the Pro-Cathedral by Bishop David O'Leary O.M.I.

He subsequently served in Luipaardsvlei and the African Townships of Roodepoort from 1940 to 1947. From there he went as Principal and Headmaster to St Eugene's College at Leeuwpan.

In 1960 he was appointed to the parish of Primrose and served there until 1962. The following year he returned to Brussels, to the Lumen Vitae Institute to do

a Diploma in Catechetics. On his return he was appointed to the S.A.C.B.C. as Secretary for Liturgy and Catechetics, and he continued in that post until 1968.

From then until 1973 he served as pastor of Braamfontein parish and from 1973 until 1984 he served as resident chaplain to the Brothers and pupils of St David's College, Inanda.

On the 28th May 1984 he was made a Prelate of Honour of Pope John Paul II at the request of the late Archbishop Joseph Patrick Fitzgerald O.M.I. as token of esteem and gratitude for his years of servic to the diocese and the church. He retired that sam year.

At the beginning of 1988 his health deteriorated and after a short stay in hospital he went to Nazareth House where he died on the 15th June. May he rest in peace.
