

Good evening Ladies and Gentlemen, the Board and Foundation Board members, led tonight by Mr John Chemaly, the Vice-Chairman of the Board. Dr Bussin, our Board Chair, sends his apologies as he is overseas on business, but it is timeous to record our thanks to him, to the PTA under the new and energetic leadership of Mr Grant Krog, and to all the men and women who participate in the governance of the school, and every one of you who volunteer for the various committees that function in support of the work of the staff of St David's. We value your input through the year and your attendance tonight, and know that without your inherent belief in what we do at this School, we would be a poorer place.

I acknowledge in gratitude the presence of my predecessor, Mr Mike Greeff, who spent nine years working to ensure that our school stayed true to the challenges set for Marist schools almost 200 years ago by St Marcellin Champagnat. When he left St David's in April, he left a structured and warm place, one where people really do matter, and we can be pleased to have somebody of his calibre developing the new role of Director of the Marist Schools' Council, a position pivotal to the growth of Marist education in South Africa. In welcoming Mr Graeme Edwards to his first College Speech Night as Prep School Headmaster, I congratulate him on a strong start to his tenure here and thank him for his clear understanding of the value of combined leadership in a School that welcomes little boys aged 4 and says farewell to young men of 18.

It takes a diverse team to achieve the type of success we have, and our leadership structure altered again this year to reflect a new reality for St David's; I thank our Business Manager, Mr Mike Boden, our Advancement Director, Mrs Lara Klement, our Old Boys' Chairman, Mr Willy Castle, and three of the best Deputies any head could ask for in Mr Dave Smith, Mr Nick Clogg and Mr Brad Ireland for providing that diversity out of which our strength comes. The College has been blessed not only in this leadership, but in the strength brought to every part of our School by a quality teaching and coaching body and hard-working admin and estate teams. In the high school I thank Mrs Pam Groenewald, my PA, Mrs Tanith Wantenaar and Mrs Michelle Bastenie, who together support the high school executive. Support from Mr Thomas Ramutshindela who leads a vibrant and committed Estate team and from all in the whole school admin staff continues to be crucial to our success.

The faculty of the School build daily on the achievements of our boys, but more importantly, teach them lessons of life by their example and hard work. I ask you to join me in applauding all St David's staff for the efforts they have put in to make our 74th year the incredible success it has been. It is a privilege to work alongside you all.

I add my thanks to our guest speakers tonight, Mr Andrew Levy and Mr Gilbert Pooley, who as Marist Old Boys will, I am sure, prove again that the lessons learned here, whether directly or indirectly, are the ones that count in producing men of character who can and do make a significant impact on their world.

In mentioning them as Old Boys, I turn my attention to the succeeding generations, the robust young men who today wear the St David's blazer with pride and enthusiasm. In so doing, gentlemen, you are indeed the life-blood of this place and you remind me every day of the relevance of this thing we call a Marist education. It carries privilege, and indeed how privileged we all are to be able to sit in a setting of this beauty, to reflect on a cycle of achievements in such wonderful weather and to take pride in another year of formation of young men ready to tackle the challenges of the world.

Archbishop Slattery of Pretoria speaks passionately about "belonging" being at the core of a Catholic education, a belonging that brings each of us together here in a community that protects us against the alienation and negativities of the modern world where the individual is sadly more valued than the collective. Our boys are daily taught the opposite by the very way we structure our School: that it is together that we will go the furthest, and while it may be easier and quicker to do things alone, that these will never carry the richness or success of combined efforts.

It is appropriate that on the verge of entering our Jubilee year celebrating 75 years of such collaborative efforts, that we reflect a bit on what will make our School successful for another 75, what will keep us relevant in our fast-changing world. It is human nature to remember the good, the best parts of our experiences, and despite the nostalgia we might have for how schools once were in our minds and memories, we will all acknowledge that great schools are ones able to differentiate between doing things because we have always done it that way as opposed to maintaining and developing traditions that allow our boys to boldly go where they have never been before.

Ladies and gentlemen, the word Bold is one of my favourites, and one I use often because it reminds us as Matthew wrote in his Gospel, not to hide our God-given talents, but to allow them to stand out — as bold letters do in a piece of writing — and contribute to the success of what we are doing. In reflecting on the St David's of 2015 and the colourful array of experiences and successes we have enjoyed, I am excited to see how you boys have used your talents boldly and also excited by the bold steps taken in our planning to ensure that this remains a school of relevance, a great school, able to produce the future leaders our country so desperately needs.

So what is required of a great school in the 21st Century, a school that is relevant to the today and the tomorrow of our world? And ... are we bold enough to do what is required to be relevant, to be great?

My first characteristic of a great school is an ability to acknowledge and celebrate the past. Much can be learned from our own and the experiences of others, and during the year we welcomed back on various occasions the Old Boys of the College, who brought with them that wonderful sense of possibility grounded in the reality of the hard knocks of life. You boys may remember that freezing cold assembly in the Amphitheatre when a 1990 Old Boy, Mr Ryan Roseveare, spoke of how his experiences in these same classrooms had allowed him to go forward with an enquiring mind to invent an IT security mechanism that brought him both professional and financial success.

The Old Boys host the matrics annually at the Rite of Passage evening in which they are formally invited to join the Marist Old Boys' Association — this evening allows all to reminisce and discover the commonality of experience for both current St David's boys and Old Boys — this common experience is because we continue to build using the same values as the Brothers and early staff did in our foundation years, while translating them into a relevant and modern interpretation for the world we live in.

Always look back, always reflect what an experience has taught you and then don't be scared to do things differently in the future. We will be using the Jubilee year as a year to do just this, a moment to celebrate the bold decision of the Marist Brothers all those years ago to start a school in what was then the veld, far from the city centre. That is our past, but our future is going to be as a Sandton city school, and we can learn from the changes in Inanda over the years that we need to be open to a future we can not yet fully discern. We need to build it boldy with vision on the unchanging values that our religious base as a Catholic Marist school gives us.

It is easy to get stuck in the past, and we need to be bold to lose the ideas that have served their time and take only those past ideas that still have value into the future.

My second characteristic of a great school is one where the people count more than the place. Here at St David's our pastoral care

structure is enviable, but our future decision-making must continue to ask the hard questions necessary for our boys to develop grit and perseverance. Experiences must provide opportunity for our boys to fail and to grow from this failure, and in so doing to develop courage to move beyond self-imposed limiting thoughts. Our camps in 2015 focused especially on this type of growth, and the Grade 9 boys spent almost two weeks in tough physical challenges in the Drakensberg on their journey, an adventure as much into themselves as into the mountains. This was combined with personal reflection designed to grow them into a life driven by purpose rather than a life driven by ego, power and money. Schools are transformational places, and St David's is no different, but transforming is tough and requires trust that all are working towards the same goal – developing young men who are courageous and able to focus on what really matters, able to look beyond themselves to the people most in need.

The relationships our boys build with each other and with their teachers are crucial and a real strength of this School. It is these friendships that will sustain long after the matric certificate is replaced by a university degree. I will pause here to acknowledge the changes to our academic staff in this year. When saying farewell to Mrs Shamani Pillay in March, we welcomed Mr Lloyd Ripley-Evans into the role of School Psychologist, one to which he has quickly brought his own flair and commitment to the boys. In August we said farewell to Ms Bridget Kee, who moved to Michaelhouse as a Geography teacher and at year end we will say goodbye to Mr Kevin Leathern, who moves to Jeppe Boys' High in a promotion position as Deputy Headmaster. December also sees the retirement of Mrs Julie Roman, who has completed 18 committed years in service to the boys of Inanda. As with all our teachers, Julie truly understands that St David's is all about empowering others and allowing their passions to fly unchained. You have touched the lives of thousands of young men here, Julie and we thank you for the warm and caring way in which you have done this. Teaching is all about building positive relationships.

In 2016 we will be expanding our teaching staff to allow not only for the continuation of the larger Grade 8 group piloted this year, but also a commitment to smaller groups in our Grade 8 and 9 academic years as the foundation for the quality matric results we continue to enjoy. Joining us on the Academic staff will be Mrs Centa Stanger (from St Stithians) in the Afrikaans Department, Mrs Kesa Molpolai (from the Oprah Winfrey Academy) in the Maths Department, Mr Gareth Brown (from Durban High School) in the Geography Department, Mr Clinton Page (currently on locum in our Prep School) and Mr Fenner Barnard (from Grey High School) in the English Department, Mr Sheldon Rose-Reddiar in the Life Orientation and Religious Education Departments and Mr Llewellyn James (from the International School) and Mrs Samantha Kolkenbeck-Ruh (from King Edward's) into the Science Departments.

Thankfully St David's continues to attract quality applicants in an ever-decreasing pool of quality teachers available in South Africa and indeed across the world. However, this international problem of undervaluing the very people we entrust our children to in their most formative years is a critical issue that needs to be addressed by society in general. If a great school values people more than the place, then our ongoing formation of teachers through our intern programme is our small way of addressing a future problem. We all need to understand that unless we raise the profile of the profession by valuing what teachers do, there will be nobody of value entering the profession. And I ask you then..., who will teach your grandchildren..., and their children?

My third characteristic of a great school is a belief in something bigger than ourselves. It is having visionary ideas and the boldness to go into the areas we know are right, and not just popular. This quad, these facilities and the experience that St David's offers our boys will outlive all of us and all of them. We need to make sure that the lessons taught here do that too. Our community knows the value of collaborative endeavour and our boys have a real desire to make a difference. The

many hours offered to different Service programmes this year are clear proof that we all want the world to be a better place. Don't ever lose the boldness to fight for what you know is right, gentlemen. A visionary school requires us to look beyond the traditional to new alternatives, and having vision puts us into awkward, new and uncomfortable spaces — this is where the power of collective genius comes together to find the best answers, the solutions that will work in the future.

My fourth characteristic of a great school is to embrace change and innovation, it is true to say that if I asked this audience to what extent you enjoy and embrace change as a regular part of your life, there would be an overwhelming majority, certainly of those sitting on this side, who would respond more negatively than positively. We become comfortable and risk-averse as we get older, yet it is the very fact that there are ongoing cycles in our life that give us regular opportunities for self-renewal.

The education world is in the grip of researchers who say that data is everything and if we can't measure it, then it is of questionable systemic value for schools. I say the opposite — when you work with people, especially teenagers constantly pushing the boundaries of accepted facts, then the learning process is what is of value. An example of this is placing our boys in spaces where they can think critically, and repeatedly practise this skill. To my mind this is far more important than testing retention of knowledge. To this end we piloted a divergent thinking programme with the Grade 8s earlier this year, and will be extending this into other parts of our Schools in 2016. Don't get me wrong, exams are not about to disappear from our calendar — they have their place and teach other skills — but it is in moving to new ways of engaging our boys that they will grow most.

Last year the boys were mortified when I announced a seven day academic cycle, especially with much longer teaching periods, but this has proved itself. Apart from the fact that the School is quieter with less time spent in the corridors, the academic benefits have also been seen. A recent review of the results of our current Grade 8 boys shows that their averages in almost all subjects are at least on par and in most instances exceed those of the Grade 8 groups from the previous five years. We will continue and extend our academic practices of splitting some of the core subjects like the Mathematics groups into smaller tutorial style settings and modularising the noncore subjects for more effective teaching and greater enjoyment, especially as our boys lay the all-important foundations in Grades 8 and 9.

The benefit of our status as an independent School is clear, and what our government does not fully grasp is that schools should never be like factories, with a one-size fits all mentality. The ongoing success of our School comes from a willingness to innovate and being prepared to let go of the way things were in favour of the way they should be. While we need to be bold to recognise what no longer works, I love change and believe it allows us stay relevant for the boys and what they need to experience.

The fifth and final characteristic I am going to offer of a great school is the promotion of life-long learning and action for an increasingly interconnected world. The early commentators on the refugee crisis in Europe (and to be honest, across the world) are already talking of a world where the nation state and citizenship as we know it will be no more. While that may take a long time, the importance of connecting and understanding our global brothers and sisters is growing.

There are many ways of doing this – both touring, as our Hockey and Rugby teams did to Holland, Germany and Italy this year, actually working on projects as our World Challenge boys do every year (this year in Indonesia), and most recently by the introduction of extended exchange periods to partner schools. With our Indian exchange already underway and an extension of the exchange opportunities to Spain in 2016, our aim as with everything is to open our boys to new experiences, some of which will be challenging and all of which will be rewarding.

There is no doubt that in a boys' school there is a lot of action, and 2015 has been a full year. Our sporting prowess continues to grow, capped by some significant wins, amongst them winning both the Inter-High Relay Gala and the Inter-High Individual Gala, a rare double. Our Rugby and Hockey results were equally pleasing and our re-entry into the world of the Easter Festivals was successful. Our Hockey sides across every age group had an exceptional year, with three A sides and the 2nd team all making the finals of their respective Southern Gauteng tournaments. Coupled with national representation which we will acknowledge separately tonight, our boys have proved that training and bold participation putting our training into action is the secret of this success. With our First Soccer side victorious in our own St David's Challenge Cup as well as winning the Grey College Tournament, there is a real sense of action across this and every sport, The cultural area of St David's also continues to grow in participant numbers and in quality - and tonight we are hearing some of the fruits of this work.

We indeed have much to be proud of in our boys and their work, and I know that they will take this introduction from their talented coaches and teachers and develop these skills throughout their lives. It is not enough to be talented, it takes grit and determination and sheer hard work to boldly develop and use one's talents. It is also what ultimately makes for success in life.

Tonight we say farewell to the 2015 matriculants, some of whom write their first IEB paper on Thursday. Under the capable and, dare I say it, BOLD leadership of Sebastian and Matthew they have all stepped up to the plate, and become fully involved in the life of their School. I have no doubt that they have learned the lessons which will stand them in good stead in the future. Matrics, remember the St David's challenge to be men of courage who understand that it is in treating those weaker than ourselves as well as we do those in high positions that we show our Marist strength. Go well and keep learning every day of your lives.

Ladies and Gentlemen, Dostoyevsky said: "the role of education is to give good memories, so that they will later Illuminate the paths of life."

I cannot tell you exactly where we are going as a School, but I can tell you that we are going to stick to these principles on our journey:

We will celebrate the past and learn from it,
People will continue to count more than buildings,
This School will always be about something bigger than ourselves,
We will continue to embrace change and innovation, and
We will continue to teach life-long learning in an interconnected
world.

So as we head calmly but also boldly into our Jubilee year on the firm foundation of 74 successful years, firmly rooted in the values that we know will keep our School relevant and great. Thank you for your attention and congratulations to all tonight's prize winners.





"Would you please tell me which way I ought to walk from here?" asked Alice.

Gentlemen, which way do you want to walk?

Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. It is an honour and a privilege that I address you tonight for the last time, as the Head Boy and as a friend.

It's at this very assembly last year that I aimed at leading this School with a charisma that I hadn't seen in the last five years. I aimed at motivating myself to inspire others around me to be better versions of themselves and I hope I can say that I've achieved that this year.

What I learnt is that leadership in itself can be a very hard and lonely road, but it is a road that has shaped and grown me significantly into the man that I am today.

No one told me as a leader how hard it would be to say no to your friends, to stand up for what's right and what I believe in, and that a decision that I make can compromise a friendship.

Mr Venter, I think I've earned the right to call you Clive, so Clive, thanks for being so approachable and for all the laughs.

Mr Gelderbloem, you have taught me something so deep and profound. You have taught me that education is important, but big biceps are importanter.

I have so many teachers I would like to thank and who have impacted on the way I've grown and I just can't say thank you enough.

Matthew Benfield. Matt, I have so much admiration and respect for you. I admire your work ethic and it is truly something that in the future I hope I will be able to match myself.

Just knowing that you've been by my side and had my back, has honestly made this road so much easier, and knowing I am standing next to someone who is like-minded in thinking has been a pillar that I have truly relied on and I thank you for that.

To my family: my mom and my dad and my sister, I don't know where to begin. The tears, the laughs, the achievements, the disappointments, you've been through it all with me and I'd just like to thank you so much for that. Thank you.

You see, all journeys in life come to an end. They have a beginning and an ending.

I'll be focusing now on what memories and moments in time mean to me. (reference: YouTube; 2013 – Existential Bummer)

There is a beautiful essay written by Sigmund Freud entitled "On Transience", and in it he cites a conversation he has with a poet named Rilke as they're walking through a beautiful garden. And as they're walking he notices Rilke has a tear in his eye and he asks Rilke "What is the matter? This is a beautiful day. Look at the plants, look at the animals" and Rilke turns to him and says "I can't come to terms with the fact that one day this is all going to die and simply decay and that everything dissolves into meaninglessness when you understand that impermanence is a very real thing."

You see, perhaps the greatest existential bummer of all is entropy. Entropy being the gradual progression to disorder. And perhaps that's why, when we fall in love or experience happy things, we at the same time are kind of sad. And I don't know if you've experienced this, but what friendship and beautiful memories hint at, is the exception, a vision of something more, an open door, but only a temporary one.

And that scares us you see, because I can speak on behalf of myself and I don't know if you've ever felt this before, but I often feel nostalgic and melancholic over something or someone I haven't even lost yet.

Because we see the transience or impermanence, the fact that it will all come to an end, just like school.

So what do we do? Do we hold on a little longer and do we squeeze a little tighter to those memories, those friends? Or do we accept the Buddhist creed of "no strings attached" and simply accept the fact that one day everyone will be taken from us.

You see, I don't believe in that. I side with the Dylan Thomas quote that says "I will not go gently into this dark night, but rather fight against the dying of the light." Because we as students, parents, teachers, educators: we defy entropy and impermanence with our art, with our music, with our leadership and with institutions like this one.

So I'm going to hold on to moments for longer and I'm going to make my memories count. I'm going to make moments last and even if I can't, I'm going to try, you see, because I've always asked, or been looking for the answers, but it's not about the answers, it's about better questions,

An answer signifies completion and the end, and I'm far from being done, but what a question signifies is the journey. A journey that every single one of us is still on. So it's not about the answers. It's about better questions.

So to my Matric group of 2015, if there's one last thing I can say to you it's remember your ABCs. Not the ABCs you were taught in class or the ABCs you were taught by your parents, but the ABCs of Life and you see, the ABCs of Life go like this: (Reference Alphabet of life; youtube; 2014)

And X, x-ray our lifestyles



"People don't remember what you did. People don't remember what you said. But people will always remember the way you made them feel."



Grade II: Tinotenda Gorowa and Maxie Pirikisi for their portraits executed in oil paint.


Grade 12: Nathan Michlo for the Best Overall Body of Work.

Matthew Adair for the Best Individual Work, a self-portrait installation work.


The evening was topped off with an enthusiastic and hotly-contested auction of prize works from the Preparatory School, conducted by our own Mr Willy Castle.




"Die dooies kan nie vergifnis gee nie, meneer Petrus."

This competition attracts entrants from about fifteen schools and we congratulate Saul Kemack on being placed 1st in the Senior Prose category. 





Small Anatolian towns. Narrow, dusty streets. Tea houses on one side, kebab stalls and barbershops on the other. On the outskirts of Uchisar, moustached, elderly men sit on antique wicker chairs as they drink tea and observe daily life. They watch their grandchildren. This is the land of their forefathers; this is their vatan.

The underground city is breathtaking. The entrance albeit simple, is majestic. Evidence of a generation of craftsmen long gone. The carved, beige volcanic rock is soft to the touch. I am struck by the fact that in its heyday this intricate network of underground tunnels was inhabited by over twenty thousand people. This 'city' which extends up to eighty metres below ground is now mostly deserted.

Ventilation shafts, bathhouses, communication tunnels - these are walls which cradled one of the world's most advanced, but now forgotten, civilizations. I imagine a shawled mother cradling her precious bundle - a baby, wrapped in a pashmina. That pashmina is an heirloom - it has been passed from generation to generation. She is trying to escape the Arab-Byzantine war. I imagine her making her way to the ventilated food stores - selecting a few potatoes, a handful of lentils and a cup of grain. It is dark outside, but below ground the night is alive, full of activity and full of hope. Cooking, cleaning, collaborating.

Wells, niches and stables. Every room has a story of its own. The temperature in here is perfect.

The mother sits in a common area, She sits on a chair chiseled into the rock and begins to weave. The rapid, swift movements of her fingers on the almost-finished Kilim astonish me. Such precision; such attention to detail. Her facial expression is unchanged. She is preserving her heritage – the one thing the enemy will never destroy.

After a while she gets up and walks into the chapel next door. She kneels on a rug, It is a Hereke - burgundy and beige - the best of its kind. I think of the Evil Eye - the supposed good luck charm. It is not the same as the others. It is shattered. It truly is an evil eye.

I can't be like the snow. I am here with a purpose and a reason. A job. I see it reflected in the shine of my boots, polished every morning, and in the proud lines of the black badge pinned to the

collar of my coat – that thick mass of cloth that acts as a warm comfort in my cold line of work, which begins every day at the same time; a practiced, efficient routine.

I open the door to the guards' barracks, and a gust of winter morning air, icy and quick, slaps my face as I gaze upon my office in its entirety. This place – its dark halls, tall furnaces, winding fences, vast chambers – was built to carry out our leader's vision for humanity. And like many others, I was conscripted to help.

Last night was cold. Freezing. The guards complain often about their fingers, snivelling about those black tendrils of frostbite that threaten their flesh. That boring complaint can be heard, muttered under the breath of another uniform, as I begin my walk across the yard. He is slowly pushing a deep wooden cart around the grounds, collecting the naked, ice-sculpture skeletons of the prisoners who missed curfew last night.

But that isn't my concern. It isn't my assignment for the day. I am far luckier than my unfortunate co-worker; I have been here since this camp opened, loyal, obedient, and hard-working in ridding Europe of its infestation. Now, I am starting my first day working at the euthanasia centre – a far too merciful post, relieving the old and sick of their pain.

I reach the opposite end of the courtyard, opening a wide set of frost-coated double-doors that reveal a dimly lit corridor leading past the various sorting rooms, and to my job. A sign, white with red lettering, warns those entering to "WATCH YOUR STEP." Above it is a similar sign with just one word on it:

"SHOWERS."

The sorting rooms are a strange phenomenon. Ghosts in striped pyjamas stand at row upon row of tables, carefully crafting piles of shoes, rings, spectacles, and teeth. Their faces remain blank, unaffected by the growing collection of remnants from their past lives that glisten in front of them. Again, I must remind myself of my duty – to protect Germany from that plague – and I start off down the corridor, my footsteps echoed by the clinking noise of more items being piled up behind me. The chambers, I notice, are just as organised as every other facility in this camp. There are neat shelves where prisoners can put their clothes down for the last time, and two rows of benches where they may sit and wait.

I open the chamber door and see them. Suddenly my insides turn colder than the world outside. Everywhere, buried into concrete by desperate fingernails are claw marks that could only be created by frenzied animals. But it was not animals that engraved terror into the walls, it was men and women. It was children, whose frantic etchings are closer to the floor. I realise that this is not where the old and sick come to pass on; it is where all are exterminated.

Each one is different. Some run deep and substantial, screaming of those who were ripped from the arms of their families by a hoard of scrambling bones. The faint scars wind quietly around the others, and whisper the final thoughts of the damned. Each one is different, but when I search over that wall, I see only one word written by the nails of thousands:

Dachau.

i drop the carton of cigarettes on the pavement and make my way towards the car that haven where small talk disguises experience.


behind me, the crutch has made his way to my discardment. he picks it up, examining the contents with a sort of desperate scrutiny.

Within the School we have seen a phenomenal growth in the uptake of the subject, reaching our peak with 86 Grade 10 pupils doing the subject in 2015. This is really largely due to the hard work, dedication and innovation of the teachers in this Department.

Our matric results have been outstanding over the past few years, averaging around 74% over the past 5 years and culminating in a 75% average in 2014, where more than 40% of the boys achieved their distinctions. We are really proud of the hard work and commitment shown by the matric group of 2014.

We strive to make the subject relevant and interesting for the boys, encouraging them to see life as a cyclical, connected process. We try to challenge them to think and become innovative in their approach to Geography and life. Application of knowledge in all spheres of learning is encouraged and expected. Learning cannot happen in a bubble and the boys are asked to assess the impact they have on the environment and the economy on a daily basis.

We unfortunately had to say farewell to one of our teachers this year: Miss Kee took up a post at Michaelhouse. Luckily for the boys, we had Miss Sirakis to step in to help for the third term. The growth in the number of boys taking Geography also sees us welcoming an additional full-time staff member in 2016.

The team I have around me is phenomenal. They are always willing to go the extra mile and always with a smile! Thanks to Miss Sirakis for so ably stepping in to teach Miss Kee's classes this term and to Mr Venter, who continues to grow in the subject. To Mrs Richter, my right hand man (lady), you really make the subject of Geography amazing. As Brad Henry said "A good teacher can inspire hope, ignite the imagination, and instill a love of learning."

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

Information Technology again has had a very successful year. A third of the class of matric 2014 Information Technology achieved distinctions last year. This was followed up by a strong and hard-working 2015 matric Information Technology group this year. Our young programmers have again excelled in producing programming projects of a very high quality. We are looking forward to the end of the year's IEB examination results and wish our matrics all of the best in their future endeavours.

This year we have introduced a new Object Orientated Programming introductory language, called Alice 3, to our Grade 9 Information Technology group. The program not only gives the learners a feeling of what objects in programming are, but also teaches them what the objects consist of Learners are also exposed to working with variables, loops

and different variable types.

We had a visit this year from a few of our Old Boys currently using Information Technology in their studies. One of these boys was James Gibson. During his visit, James showed the Grade 10 to Grade 12 learners what he is currently doing in his programming studies. He also showed the boys how he is using the content he learnt in Information Technology in school to achieve his objectives in his studies.

It was again a privilege to work with Mrs Sylvia Crichton and Mr Nkosi Mthembu in the Department this year. I want to thank them for all their hard work.

LIFE ORIENTATION

Life Orientation continues to grow and develop at St David's. The Department has increased its involvement in IEB matters, from marking at senior-sub level of the Common Assessment Task, to regional and national moderation of SBAs and ORTPs. It is through this involvement that we ensure that our boys are provided with the best possible input, while we are part of the very exciting curriculum development of the subject at the highest level.

We were fortunate to have two new members join the Department this year. Mr D Smith brings a wealth of experience to the Grade 9 syllabus - learners were challenged to reflect on their personal goals and contribution to society. They were guided through the difficult process of choosing their subjects, taking into account their strengths, interests and potential career choices. Mr Smith's advice to the boys was: "Do what you love".

In Grade 8, Mr Bhinder introduced the boys to the academic standards required of Life Orientation at high school level. His hands-on, enthusiastic approach encouraged them to produce work of an excellent caliber. Values and skills such as respect, accountability, time management and organisation were emphasised and developed throughout their module.

The Grade 10s benefitted from the expertise of Mr Whyte, our Water Polo coach, himself a national sportsman, and Mr Masondo, a provincial cricketer. Topics such as unfair sporting practices and substance abuse were covered in great detail and the discussions were lively and thought-provoking.

Mr Chonco proved that he is a man of many talents, as he guestlectured on a wide range of topics across all three senior grades. He facilitated discussions on job interviewing skills, gender and sexuality, social media, the dangers of pornography, protest strategies and leadership skills.

We continue to encourage our Old Boys to share their knowledge with our students. Kimon Kramvis (2008) and Richard Wands (2004) addressed the Grade IIs on entrepreneurship and legal matters respectively. Dr Matthew Barendse (2004) presented a talk on studies in general and medical science in particular. The Grade IIs and I2s also attended the Perfect Life Career Expo at St Peter's in February.

While the subject addresses a wide range of topics such as Constitutional Rights and Responsibilities, Development of Self in Society, Careers and Career Choices, Social and Environmental Responsibility and Democracy and Human Rights, we also strive to develop skills in our boys. Tasks set require them to reflect on content, using a variety of skills ranging from essay-writing, oral presentations, mind-mapping, video clips, PowerPoint presentations and even artistic presentations, if they so choose.

So, how does one assess in Life Orientation? The development of substantiated own opinion, while respecting the opinions of others, is emphasised throughout. Boys are encouraged to apply their learnt knowledge of topics in a new context. Examinations and tasks this year, for example, were set around the xenophobic violence in April, and the most recent "Fees must fall" campaign. The concept of their own contribution to their world is emphasised and they are challenged to consider the potential outcome of their involvement. "LO" is a rich, vibrant subject directly relevant to all spheres of life and personal development. Boys are encouraged to question, challenge, discuss and reflect while learning the importance of respect, empathy, accountability and tolerance.

Sadly, we said farewell to Ms Kee at the end of the second term. Her contribution to the subject has been hugely significant and she has been instrumental in helping the boys grow and develop as responsible citizens. We wish her well in her new venture.


















RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

Religious Education is that part of the school curriculum which helps the learner to explore the religious dimension of human experience. It seeks to develop the knowledge, skills, values and attitudes, and the experience-base necessary for the learner to grow towards maturity in that dimension.

The aim of Religious Education then, in the Catholic school, is to nature in its students their personal gifts of "faith" so as to bring awareness, growth, true freedom, and healing into their lives and life-giving communities that are signs of hope for the world.

St David's Marist Inanda, as a Catholic school, is open not only to Catholics but to all faiths traditions, and its Religious Education programme strives to be respectful and sensitive to the diversity of chosen and inherited religious paths of individuals within the school community. Indeed, Catholic school Religious Education actively endeavours to promote mutual understanding and respect among people of different religious and other worldviews, in response to the Gospel vision of unity and love among all people.

Taking Religious Education Seriously!

At St David's Marist Inanda, Religious Education is an academic subject as any other academic subject, and is much more linked

to Life Orientation as a "twin- subject". It is important that Religious Education be recognised as a valued and integral part of the School curriculum, and this means that it should be assessed just as any other area of the curriculum. It is also important to recognise that many desired outcomes for Religious Education cannot, and should not, be assessed. For this purpose, there are a set of four specific Outcomes that give a comprehensive picture of what Religious Education can achieve in a measurable way. These are: Spiritual Awareness, Social Development, Personal Development and Religious Tradition.

We will argue there are two fundamental reasons for including Religious Education in the Curriculum, for taking it seriously. First, there are civic reasons in the sense that Religious Education teaches the learner to show respect for the dignity of self, others and the whole creation, and reaches out in compassionate service. Second, there are educational reasons for taking Religious Education seriously: A good holistic education should expose students to the major ways humanity has developed for making sense of the world - and some of those ways of understanding the world are religious. Indeed, we cannot systematically exclude the religious voices in our intellectual and cultural conversation.

The impact religion has on modern mankind



MATHEMATICS

The Class of 2014 achieved far beyond our expectations and set a benchmark that we have striven to maintain or even better, this year. As a Department, we are aware that the target of 50% of our boys achieving an A symbol will be difficult to match, but we have every confidence in the commitment and ability of the 2015 matriculants.

Over the past few years the Mathematics Department has grown both with the appointment of new full-time staff and a number of interns. This has enabled us to offer smaller class sizes and therefore, more individualised mathematics tuition. Our continued association with the Epoch and Optima Trust has allowed us to offer these smaller classes so that all our boys are afforded every opportunity of a quality mathematics education, irrespective of their skill set. Evidence of this is in the increasing number of boys electing to take Advanced Programme Mathematics which has great benefit at a tertiary level. Part of our success is that the Mathematics Department is a passionate group of educators who believe in the subject and are willing to go the extra mile to assist our boys.

We continue to encourage the boys to extend themselves by entering the South African Mathematics Olympiad, as the ability to problem-solve is integral to the development of young minds. We congratulate Shane Weisz on qualifying for the 3rd round of the Olympiad which places him in the top 100 learners in the



country. This means that he is the recipient of the Steve Bailey Memorial Trophy for 2015.

The structure of Tour de Maths changed at the start of this year to include only Grade 8, 9 and 10 pupils. Our boys continue to enjoy the social interaction with the other schools whilst still being challenged mathematically.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all the Mathematics staff for their continued support and commitment to teaching the boys. The fact that year after year our matriculants are so successful in the IEB examinations is largely due to their hard work and dedication.

All aspects of the Music Department were showcased in the Supper Show including the Senior Prep choir, headed by Mrs S Human and the Grade 3 ensemble headed by Mrs M Cantor.



MASS ENSEMBLE

The Mass Ensemble consists of St David's pupils who have given of their free time to play the various masses that happen at St David's; these include Family Mass, Combined Mass and High School Mass. The Mass 'stage' challenges our boys to play softly and beautifully. Further, brass instruments must first learn to play smoothly and must have the music transposed to the pitch of the instrument. The hymns are all written in concert pitch; trumpets are made in Bb and saxophones are made in Eb. This means parts have to be handwritten for every new hymn they play. Boys who play masses have to practise their parts at home and meet at 7am before school on a Thursday; they also give up their breaks to rehearse for Combined Mass.

Two Grade II boys stand out in the Mass group; they are Matthew Lumsden (organ) and Akash Chiman (saxophone), who are always ready to give up their time for a mass. Matthew Lumsden in particular has played every Family Mass this year. Matthew is a pleasure to work with; a gifted musician. I've had the privilege of rehearsing and performing several solo items with Matthew this year: The Highland Cathedral and Handel's Largo are two of my favourites.

THE ST DAVID'S SAXOPHONE QUINTET

In 2014 a small ensemble was created to play the soundtrack of the annual production: Macbeth. This ensemble consisted of mainly saxophones. INTER-HOUSE PLAYS

The annual Inter-House Plays competition was held on Tuesday, the 9th of June, in the Champagnat Hall. Inter-House Plays requires each House to create an original one-act play, managing the process from beginning to end. The boys have to write their own scripts, arrange auditions in order to select their cast, manage rehearsals, make technical decisions, keep order backstage and basically, do everything that any professional company needs to do in order to keep "the show on the road", at least for the twenty minutes that they are allowed on stage: the curtain automatically closes after this time so that the boys are forced to create theatre that is short, impactful and deliberate.

Impactful the boys certainly were. Subject material covered the entire gamut of social-psychological dysfunctions ranging from theatrical obsessions to lust for power, lust for fame and a lust for comfort even if it comes at the cost of justice, equality and a sense of fair play. The Bishops took on the insanity of a director who goes too far to keep theatre relevant in Monopoly. College considered what would happen if St David's were run by the students, demonstrating that wielding power is not for the faint of heart nor the unwise in Silly Season. Benedict looked at the relevance of the media, forcing the audience to contend with the notion of honesty, good intentions and how these are often swept aside by the urge to be successful in Normal Norman. Osmond took us back to a time when Apartheid was still coming to an end, pondering the power of racial and gender prejudice and confronting the audience with the notion that no-one's hands are truly clean in Stereo Staat. Lofty topics and all of them surprisingly valid.

It was also gratifying to see the boys experimenting with different staging techniques, specific costume choices, deliberate blocking as well as considering the impact of different props. The Bishops had the audience guessing when its lead, Saul Kemack, lit a real cigarette, demonstrating the frustration of his character quite successfully and believably without having to inhale. There were hints of Absurdism, Postmodernism and even Kitchen-Sink Realism: Osmond's use of an ironing board had definite hints of John Osborne's seminal work Look back in anger and powerfully suggested that the issues of the play were in fact, the issues of every South African,

The night flowed exceptionally well and all of the above were squeezed into only 80 minutes. Special mention must also be made of the audience, the Grade 8 and 9 boys, for whom attendance was compulsory. They behaved themselves impeccably and supported the efforts of their mates earnestly.

In the end the night belonged to The Bishops. They made a clean sweep of the production awards, walking away with best director, best script and best production.

MAJOR PRODUCTION

TAKE A CLOSER LOOK

St David's Marist Inanda and St Teresa's School have worked together for many years to create extremely lavish and often very memorable annual productions. These shows have always been large affairs requiring impressive budgets, thousands of hours of preparation and plenty of nerve in order to take on the works of some of theatre's most famous playwrights and composers, Andrew Lloyd Webber, Stephen Sondheim, Arthur Miller and William Shakespeare are only a few of the names that have contributed to an impressive line-up over the last decade or so.

This year's collaboration was equally impressive, albeit for very different reasons. Apart from the hours of preparation and the severe dose of nerve that is required for any dramatic venture, the ingredients of "impressive budgets" and "famous playwrights" were wholly left out. Instead, we opted to take on the challenge of the minimalistic approach and left the machinations of the dramatic process entirely up to our students. The 2015 line-up was, in fact, doubly impressive exactly because we left the "keys to the kingdom" in the hands of the sons and daughters of St David's and St Teresa's.

In January they were handed a vague task description and were given approximately two and a half months to turn it into three plays fit for a professional stage. Off they went conducting their own auditions, choosing their casts, brainstorming a multitude of dramatic options, improvising character upon character and scene upon scene, finalising scripts, blocking and re-blocking established scenes and debating

whether or not to block them again, selecting costumes, designing sets, compiling audio and visual devices to support the action on stage, designing the posters, and finally simply putting their hearts on the line by pouring their intuition, ideas and passion into a mystery of the dramatic arts, the One Act Play, hoping that this grand alchemy would produce something memorable and perhaps even something cathartic at the Auto & General Theatre on the Square on the 13th and 14th of April 2015.

Our boys worked incredibly hard and faced criticism, ridicule, rejection and disappointment in the risky process of turning ideas into performance and an empty stage into a looking glass. Some of what was seen scared and shocked our patrons; some of it enticed, delighted and transported them back to their own teenage Sturm und Drang years. Whatever the case may be, their eyes were opened as they were tempted to "take a closer look".

ONE-ACT PLAY FESTIVALS

In Term 2 the plays created for Take a closer look went on to represent St David's at the inter-school one-act play festivals of FEDA (Festival of Excellence in Dramatic Arts) and RAPS (Repertory Amateur Players Society), which was a first for the School.

The plays Take a closer look (co-directed by Saul Kemack) and Bang Bang You're Dead (co-directed by William Shoki) were presented at FEDA at the Joburg Theatre on the 14th and 20th of May respectively and garnered positive comments from the adjudicators. They highlighted the maturity of the productions and emphasised the excellent ensemble work evident in both pieces. Damien Wantenaar's portrayal of a disturbed boy who has

committed a school shooting received special mention.

A dark comedy (co-directed and workshopped by Joshua van der Velden) was performed at the RAPS competition at the Market Laboratory Theatre on the 23rd of May. What was particularly impressive about this piece was the fact that it was entirely original, drawing on the observations and improvisations of the cast members in order to create a 40-minute tableau that confronted the audience with its own preconceptions around xenophobia. A dark comedy was eerily powerful, as it was first performed literally days after the first spate of xenophobic violence hit KwaZulu-Natal and Gauteng in April. The piece was heralded for its bravery in taking on such a topic as well as for its ingenuity in making the audience both laugh at and interrogate their own prejudice.

"This year a small group of St David's boys and St Teresa's girls embarked on a seemingly impossible task — act in, direct and arrange a fully-fledged one-act play with limited adult supervision. Naturally with teenagers, the task was made somewhat difficult – because we were teenagers. However, with the many (loud) words of wisdom and encouragement from Mrs Higgo and Mr Ferreira, we were able to produce a dark, fast-paced and visually interesting rendition of the original William Mastrosimone play Bang Bang You're Dead. If you missed it, well – too bad." (William Shoki)

We are proud of the boys and girls who pulled off immaculate performances and who have contributed towards establishing these two new Drama Departments (both St Teresa's and St David's have only recently started their Departments) as forces to be reckoned with in the near future. Special thanks to Tiffany Higgo, Sarah Terry and Kailin Pillay for facilitating the excellent work.

Debating teaches many lifelong skills. It equips boys to speak with confidence and insight and to be able to think 'on their feet' in pressure situations. The Debating Club enjoyed much success in 2015 and continues to grow in strength and popularity. It is an activity that runs throughout the year and we are lucky to have a core group of

dedicated and committed members. We welcomed a talented group of Grade 8s to the Club at the beginning of the year and their enthusiasm for Debating has been contagious. The Club is also lucky to have the input of Senior members such as William Shoki and Daniel Lee and I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for the guidance and time that they so willingly give to the Junior members of the Club. Once again, the boys were able to benefit from the expert coaching of Phiwe Salukazana while also gaining additional advice from Paida Mangondo at various times in the year.

DEBATING

The Gauteng Schools' SACEE Debating League began in earnest in February. Once again we were able to enter two Junior teams and a Senior team. The Juniors struggled in the early rounds but gained a great deal of experience. The A team did well enough to make it through to the second stage of the competition where they then found their form and went on to win five out of their next six debates. This ensured that they 'broke' second and were invited to take part in the quarterfinals.

The Senior team performed exceptionally well in the first two stages of the SACEE championships. They lost only two debates out of twelve and as a result they were also invited to take part in the quarterfinals which took place in August. The Seniors made it through to the semi-finals where they lost to HeronBridge in a closely contested debate.

The Juniors did themselves proud and went on to win the SACEE championships. This is the first time that a St David's Junior team has won this tournament and the following boys are to be congratulated on a wonderful achievement: Ritvik Sojen, Joseph Pritchard, Adam Goetsch, Jason Raman and Tameez Kana. At the end of the championships, Ritvik Sojen ranked 4th best junior speaker; Daniel Lee ranked 7th best senior speaker and William Shoki ranked 10th best senior speaker.

The Gauteng Schools' Provincial Debating Championships took place in September and much time was put into preparing for these Championships. Both the Junior and Senior teams won 5 out of the 6 debates in the preliminary rounds and as a result both teams were invited to compete in the quarterfinals. The Juniors were sadly unable to take part while the Seniors lost to HeronBridge. This, however, should not detract from a year in which there were many outstanding achievements and where the debating teams of St David's continued to be ranked amongst the top eight teams in the province. At the end of these championships, Ritvik Sojen was ranked 7th best junior speaker and William Shoki was ranked 5th best senior speaker.

It is important that we celebrate the achievements of William Shoki and Daniel Lee who, as members of the South African Schools Senior B team, took part in the Argo Schools Debating Championships held in Romania. William was ranked 6th best speaker at this tournament. We also congratulate William, Daniel and Ritvik Sojen on their recent selection to the Gauteng provincial teams which will take part in the National Debating Championships in December.

I wish all the members of the Debating Club continued success in 2016. It has been a pleasure working with you this year.

It is ironic that Dr James Naismith invented Basketball in 1891 as a winter sport for indoor training, and yet our schools play it in summer when thunderstorms are at their worst here on the Highveld. Basketball's origins in North America make it a different sporting culture to many of the English Public School games we also play, not only in the dress codes, but in how coaches are involved and how referees interact with players. But there is still a bedrock of respect for one's opponent that is a vital element of all the sports our boys play, and while Basketball is still relatively new at St David's we are gradually winning the respect of our boys' schools opponents, who acknowledge how far we have come in the Basketball programme.

Basketball is becoming embedded in the sporting life of our School and our numbers continue to grow each season. Many of our boys have discovered a passion for the game, and I commend them and thank them for the commitment they have shown in practices and matches. Particularly when played in summer heat, Basketball is very physically demanding for the boys, and given that we are often at a disadvantage to other schools who have established Basketball already in their prep schools, it also requires mental resilience on the part of our boys, to face teams that have more familiarity with the game than we do, and nevertheless to meet them head-on and not to wilt, even when games do not go our way.

Though our win-loss records still have plenty of room for improvement, the margins of our games are narrowing, and there is lots of talent rising through our various age groups. Boys will

need to realise, however, that just as with any form of excellence, real improvement will require that they devote their own personal time to improving their skills, so that when they practise together, they are able to learn to work as a team in which the whole can be greater than sum of the parts.

I am pleased that we are beginning to develop some continuity in our coaching staff, and look forward next year to welcoming our new full-time Basketball co-ordinator who brings with him considerable experience in developing players, coaches and entire Basketball programmes to their full potential. We are also delighted that our boys will now begin to be eligible for recognition for colours in the sport of Basketball, and that from January, those who have proven themselves as 1st team players will be given the honour of wearing 1st team tracksuits on match-days.

My thanks go to our Headmaster Mr Thiel and our Deputy Head Extramurals Mr Bradley Ireland for their considerable support of the Basketball programme, as well as to our Business Manager Mr Mike Boden and the ground staff team under Mr Thomas Ramutshindela for their time and effort devoted to the improvement of our physical facilities for Basketball. To Mr Pat Lenye and Mrs Michèle Bastenie: my humble thanks for their tireless administrative and pastoral support to all of our teams.

We are very proud of the young men we see representing St David's Basketball and look forward to them pushing themselves further and higher to win against many of the teams we play against. Not just to compete, but to achieve victories that bring with them self-belief and validation of the hard work they have all put in to get there.





What a privilege it is to be a St David's golfer: we are affiliated to one of Johannesburg's finest golf clubs, The Wanderers, where we are coached by professionals who love the game and invest their time and expertise in St David's sportsmen. Every Monday finds teeing off for a schools' fixture on one of our city's magnificent courses - perhaps Royal Johannesburg, Glenvista, Ruimsig, Kyalami, Randpark or Irene. We pit ourselves against students from other schools who share our love for competition but who are just as exposed and vulnerable as we are, every time they address the ball. We have countless opportunities to test ourselves physically and mentally, to be better, to be Marist men.

The 2014/2015 season was our most successful in years: the A side - Daniel Bregman-Frangos, Adam Breen, Michael Cardoso (Captain) and David Cardoso - finished with the highest points average in their league, and were third highest overall in Gauteng. Half Colours:

They won all but one of their schools' fixtures (coming second to St Alban's A), thus placing overall second in their league. The B team (a more assorted group lead by Gerard Merchak and Cody Hansen) had a creditable finish to the season, winding up third in their league. The results were very close: just what one would wish for in Inter-House competition: Benedict finished first on 63 points; Osmond second on 61; College third on 60 and The Bishops fourth on 58. David Cardoso shot the best individual Stableford score (32 points) and Daniel Bregman-Frangos the best overall gross score (77 points). Sincere thanks is due to The Wanderers Club which generously supports St David's Golf on every occasion.



This season we competed in two tournaments: the Dainfern National College Golf Championship and the Woodlands Junior Masters, both magnificently run contests played on superb, world-class courses and open to schools from around the country. Tournament golf is a real test of concentration and the ability to play consistently good rounds when up against fierce opposition. In this season's Dainfern Championship (15 - 17 March 2015), David and Michael Cardoso were placed in the middle of the field (25th out of 50 schools' teams). Later in the year in May at Woodlands (on the Serengeti course), our A side finished 12th with Daniel Bregman-Frangos scoring a total of 94 after three days.

Congratulations go to Daniel Bregman-Frangos who was named Player of the Year. He was awarded Full Colours for the 2014/15 season, Further accolades go to Michael Cardoso, David Cardoso and Adam Breen who were awarded Half Colours.

The final word should perhaps go to South African legend, Gary Player who commented: "Golf is a puzzle without an answer. I've played the game for 50 years and I still haven't the slightest idea of how to play." Perhaps that's why it has such endless fascination and why our golfers keep playing - there is always room to improve; business on the course is never finished.

Rarely after fourteen years of coaching would a team leave such an impression on a coaching staff as these boys have done. The grit and determination shown during practices and matches was testament to the squad's success.

The two preseason fixtures went off well with wins against Hyde Park and then the KES U16B side before regular season wins against Parktown, St Benedict's and King David Linksfield.

Hilton College hosted the Independent Schools festival during the first week in April, where nine schools took part. A different format was adopted with teams playing up to three 25-minute matches per day, therefore a squad rotation system would prove to be the best option by keeping the players fresh and providing an equal playing opportunity for all 25 boys. Our first fixture was against rivals St Stithians College, where poor line defence lead to them scoring three unanswered tries and winning 19 to 0. There was no time to linger on the loss as two hours later we were up against gutsy St Charles College, who held us to a narrow 7-5 win. Another two hours later and the final fixture of the first day was against Penryn College - the team retained ball well and was able to play the expansive game we had been working so hard on. In 25 minutes we scored 5 tries, converting 3 and winning 31 to 0.

Day 2 followed with wins against Kingswood and Uplands College, 21 to 0 and 24 to 0 respectively. Then arguably the most tightly contested game of the festival was between Hilton College and ourselves. Despite the 5 to 0 loss, the players made a good account of themselves and with the shortened format it was difficult to gain momentum in a match where we had very little possession.

The remainder of the season saw wins against Rand Park, Sutherland, St John's, St Andrew's, Northcliff and Potch Boys. Unfortunately, the final game of the season was a yet another loss to St Stithians, by 17 points to 12 after leading 12 to 0. A bitter disappointment after leading the match by a two try cushion, but also a valuable lesson learnt that it takes a combined effort for the entire game to win tightly contested matches.

Thank you to the team of coaches, namely: Mr Engelbrecht and Mr Shanley with their assistance, tireless hard work and dedication to the team; to Nicholas Minnie and Thomas Nott as captain and vice-captain for their outstanding leadership and commitment on and off the field and to all the 25 players for their hard work throughout the season. "It is not the fifteen players on the field but rather the extended squad of twenty-five that make the season a success".



GRADE 8 CAMP

You never forget your Grade 8 camp.

GRADE 9 CAMP

The Grade 9s had a different camp to what they normally take on during the year. This year they would take on the first ever St David's Journey. This is a concept that many schools have adopted over the years and have seen many benefits, including increased academic performance. Our idea behind the camp was to try and get the boys to see that they can push themselves and do things they didn't think they could.

We split the entire grade into two large groups that were further split into smaller groups of 14 boys. These groups were called "Fires". The idea behind this name was that at the end of a long day in the bush, you normally sit around a fire and talk about the day. Half the Fires started at Wagendrift dam and the other half started at Entabeni Education Centre, situated in the High Moor area of the Drakensberg.

All this was about to be soothed within about ten minutes of walking, where two white rhino were spotted just on the horizon. Immediately, nerves were calmed and we realised that we were in for a treat.

We really were treated to some unforgettable game. The sighting of rhino every single day, both black and white made us realise how privileged we were to have seen this endangered species. In fact, that third morning was just unimaginable. Two black rhinos within fifteen meters of our camp. We were also treated to some beautiful birds. Miles Muller might have been a bit over-enthusiastic about his vultures and hornbills, but in truth, it really is a majestic sight. Seeing these massive and colourful birds in flight. If it wasn't for those vultures, the hyena in the reeds would not have been spotted.

BORNEO WORLD CHALLENGE TOUR

We started our hike early in the morning and seven hours of climbing later we arrived at our overnight stay, 3200m above sea level! We were woken up at 2am for breakfast and then began



our summit. We walked out of breakfast and were greeted by stairs and rope ladders that you do before the sun comes up. The higher you climb, the less air you can take in and it really does become difficult to breathe at those altitudes. At the summit we were greeted by clear skies and you look down on the entire island of Borneo. It is a sight that is very difficult to describe. The rest of the day is the descent down the mountain. It is a 2 day journey but after it, all of us were walking very gingerly from being so stiff.

We spent the rest of the time seeing chimpanzees, shopping, sightseeing around the cities and scuba diving off the islands surrounding Kota Kinabalu.
