A TRIBUTE TO MALCOLM WILLIAMS

Malcolm Williams, the School's 12th Headmaster, leaves St David's Marist Inanda at the end of 2013 after nearly seventeen years at the School, twelve of them as Headmaster. After Brother Anthony who served as Headmaster for a total of 17 years, between 1960 and 1983, Malcolm Williams was the second longest serving Headmaster of the High School since its founding in 1941.

The 'Williams" years (1997-2013) will be remembered as a time when St David's expanded its horizons dramatically to embrace the rapid pace of educational, societal and technological change in South Africa. St David's has under his leadership become a place of leaning; a place of wonder; a magical place where to work, play and study. Malcolm always recognised that St David's is a part of, and not separate from other Johannesburg and South African schools. Through his involvement in numerous educational bodies for many years, Malcolm has made his voice heard in an attempt to improve South African education at large.


At School, under his Headship, he has encouraged an 'Outreach' approach, expanding the experiences of St David's students beyond the gates of the School, to the benefit of all involved parties. Malcolm is extremely proud of the Outreach initiatives such as Mandela Day and the other many Outreach days and programmes that the school is involved with - and, Malcolm, leading by example, was never afraid of rolling up his sleeves and helping out with these activities.

St David's, while a Marist Catholic School, nevertheless accepts boys of all faiths and cultures and, as a patriotic South African - his blood is definitely green, Malcolm has always worked at transforming St David's into a great, and truly representative South African Boys' School - one that celebrates the broad diversity of South African History, Culture and Ethnicity.

On the development side, practical, tangible examples of milestones built during the 'William's' years can be seen throughout the College grounds. The Hockey Astroturf was built largely through his efforts and initiative. Recognising the need to develop academic facilities to keep pace with the rapid progress in contemporary education, Malcolm worked tirelessly to see the creation of the Brother Anthony Wing, with its modern, open plan classrooms, equipped with the latest technology and seating - an outstanding facility for 21st century learning. In addition, he was involved with many other notable capital works - the Champagnat Hall, the Art/ Design & Technology Centre, the Music Centre and the College Pavilion.

The greatest testimony to any leader is the loyalty of his followers. There is little doubt that people work for bosses! The average tenure of St David's staff says it all. In 1997 very few high school staff had taught for more than a few years at St David's. Today many staff have served well over 10 years. - Mrs B Marais, Mr S Fry, Ms T Voorendyk, Mrs J Roman, Mrs D Webb, Mrs L Deetlefs, Mrs S Crichton, Mr B Ireland, Mrs C Kennedy, Mrs L Nagy, Mrs N Glanville, Mrs S Ramdarie, Mrs S Pillay and Mrs J Skeen – these staff, and the many others who are approaching ten years' service have worked for their Headmaster; they are testimony to his leadership, the charismatic way in which he lead the School and his ability to form quality relationships. Malcolm always openly spoke of the extra mile he expected from his team - both in the classroom and in the wide range of service and extra-curricular activities which so enhances the St David's allround experience for the boys attending the School. Malcolm is extraordinarily hard-working and the School could not have wished for a Head who gave more of himself. He always had time to visit families in distress, care about people and he really has given so much of himself, often at a cost to his own family, and to Sue.

On the sports field, Malcolm made no secret of the sport he holds dearest to his heart; never one to miss a 1st XI Hockey encounter,



he proudly promoted Field Hockey whenever he could. However, Malcolm loved all sports - testimony to this is his support of all the School's sporting codes. - only on the very rare occasion did Malcolm miss any St David's extra mural fixture. The 'Williams years' have seen St David's become extremely competitive in all sporting codes. The 'Williams years' have also seen new sports emerging and thriving, including Soccer, Canoeing, Climbing, Orienteering and Cross Country.

A patron of the Arts, Malcolm always showed a special love for cultural activities, and fostered an appreciation of the arts among staff and students. The introduction of Music and Drama under his Headmastership was certainly not by chance. A highlight in Malcolm's calendar was always the various music, drama, public speaking and debating evenings. Given half the chance, Malcolm would himself perform with gusto and enthusiasm at any of these events. During the 'Williams' years the Music and Drama developed a programme of events and performances, that places it amongst the leading schools in South Africa.

Throughout his headship, Malcolm established an excellent rapport with all the boys - he loved a lively banter. An accomplished English teacher, he also taught Life Orientation, Leadership classes, and whenever possible a Tutor Group, in order to be keep abreast with what his boys were thinking and saying. Great Headmasters are rare: a Headmaster with a sense of humour: vision: an extraordinary presence: an in depth knowledge of all his boys; someone who will leave everything to be with boys and families in distress; someone who has an in depth knowledge of his staff; a passion for his institution: a knowledge of sport and the arts: who is a caring person; a fair person: someone who understands there are no boundaries between people - who understands we are all the same underneath: someone who loves fun and laughter - these qualities are magical: and Malcolm Williams had them all - indeed, he was a Headmaster Extraordinaire

Mr Malcolm Williams served this institution with distinction for many summers, four-and-a-half as Deputy Headmaster; and twelve as Headmaster. His sole mission was to provide the boys who passed through these gates with the best education possible, in the broadest sense of the word. Malcolm was an amazingly busy 21st Century Headmaster, and can truly be said, to have been one of those individuals who has made a difference. Malcolm made St David's a magical place to work at, to play at, and to study at. A man with wonderful enthusiasm, with a zest for life, a brilliant teacher of English, a fiercely competitive drive within - Malcolm has made an outstanding contribution. He can look back on his headship with tremendous pride. As he leaves St David's it stands right up in the pantheon of boys' schools in South Africa, recognised for its outstanding academics and the quality of the boys that leave the School.

A TRIBUTE TO RICK WILSON

"It was on a chilly day on 2 August 1995 when we were busy with our annual inter-house cross country on the College rugby fields when Mr Edey came down the dreaded First rugby team stairs with a little gentleman in tow wearing a green jacket. We all thought he was going to introduce us to the recent winner of the Masters in Augusta but no such luck - we were introduced to Mr Rick Wilson, our new Headmaster," remembers Willy Castle.

Rick was born in England and moved to then Rhodesia at a young age where he was educated at Milton Boy's High and then UCR in Bulawayo. He was a successful sportsman, playing golf for the national team for 8 years being amongst his many achievements. He met and married his wife Gerry in Zimbabwe and they had two boys, Bruce and Andrew.

Rick's childhood in Zimbabwe instilled a love for the bush and Rick and his family have spent many happy days in the Kruger National Park; by his own admission he is "happiest when sitting at Satara with Willy Castle ... in front of a braai fire." Rick has often shared stories of his time in Zimbabwe and later Botswana, where he was appointed as Headmaster of Acacia Primary in Jwaneng (the richest diamond mine in the world at the time), where he spent 11 happy years.

Upon being appointed at Headmaster of the Prep School at St David's, Rick soon made his mark, introducing staff to SWOT analysis, new strategies and the effective use of technology. Rick's fascination with technology saw the first computers being introduced at St David's and his perseverance in this regard has helped take St David's to the forefront of technology in education. Rick is, however, still a traditional teacher and traditional headmaster. His values and spirituality are deepseated. He appreciates the importance of the long-term life lessons and their impact on a young person's development and growth. However, this has never got in the way of embracing the change needed to lead a school in a changing world. The articles that Rick has penned over many years, talking about the role of teaching and the role of parenting have shown his understanding of the importance of values but also acknowledging the pressures that todays' parents and children are facing and giving his wise counsel as to how these should be handled. His wisdom and vision have seen St David's through its most exciting phase of growth and development; he has been responsible for assembling a formidable team of staff, both teaching and coaching, who he has led with a firm yet caring approach. Rick is the epitome of a Marist man, embodying the tenet of Presence in the most practical sense of the word. Rick has been a passionate supporter of 'his soldiers' and his ever present support has helped many young boys achieve even greater heights than they would have if their Headmaster had not been as present as Rick has been.

Rick is a wonderful storyteller and his assemblies have become folklore, with the boys hanging onto his every word waiting for the mention of 'the dog'. Many of us look forward to reading the book of the collated stories from the assemblies that Rick has presented! However, his creative side also extends to a wicked sense of humour, and no-one has been immune from his practical jokes and pranks: disappearing keys/ diaries/ remotes/ cases, sound equipment being switched off at key moments, fake letters, 'naughty' notes during

meetings and many more. Perhaps a good sense of humour was needed to survive at St David's, with friends like Willy Castle, Ron Thackwell, Willem van der Merwe, Craig Sinclair and others who were just as eager to create havoc in Rick's life. Shortly after arriving at St David's, Rick had left his car with the keys in it whilst running back into his house on campus to fetch something he had forgotten. Passing by, Willy noticed this and couldn't resist the opportunity! He moved the car behind the Music block, out of sight. Upon returning to the car, Rick was incensed, convinced that he had moved his family into a crime-ridden neighbourhood. Willy's raucous laughter soon alerted Rick to the direction of the hidden car and clearly set the tone for years to come. These, and many other friendships developed over the years around Rick's other passions, music and good food. Rick is a complete muso, being a good musician himself and incredibly knowledgeable about a range of genre and artists; a perfect evening (if not in the bush) comprising an intense discussion on the merits of Jimmy Hendricks over a Col'Cacchio pizza with extra chilli.

When we asked the Grade 0's, they reported that they thought that Mr Wilson "worked at his computer and drank tea" or "ticked work" in his office all day. However, we are all very aware of the immense impact that Rick Wilson has had on the lives of the boys, parents and staff that have had the privilege of having him as their Headmaster for the past 17 years. We have been the recipients of Rick's care, guidance, wisdom, humanity, empathy, advice and love and are all the better for having had him touch our lives.



CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

FOUNDATION MANAGER'S REPORT 2013

The longer that I work in a Marist School, the more convinced I am that the vision of a priest in rural France in 1817 is as relevant today as it was nearly 200 years ago. The vision of St Marcellin Champagnat to spiritually liberate the poor and disenfranchised through education was a revolutionary notion in its day, and one that challenged both the status quo and started a movement that would have a remarkable impact on the lives of thousands across the globe.

St David's Marist Inanda in 2013 finds itself in a somewhat different context to that of St Marcellin Champagnat in 1817, however, in many respects, the global social challenges remain the same. Lack of education continues to keep individuals economically, politically, socially, psychologically and spiritually shackled and, as espoused by Nelson Mandela, education still remains "the most powerful weapon that you can use to change the world". Although education is acknowledged as a basic human right for all children, UNICEF reports that there are over 101 million children across the globe not in school. Obstacles to accessing quality education further increase the number of children not being educated to impact society and change their own circumstances and those of others. Our challenge therefore remains the same as that in the 19th Century - to educate children in a manner that equips them intellectually and morally with skills, knowledge and values.

The St David's Marist Inanda community finds itself in a blessed and privileged position. We are the recipients of the legacy of those who have passed through the School over the past 72 years as well as the long line of those who dedicated their lives to Marist education since the first Marist Brothers landed at the Cape in 1867 and established schools in a number of provinces before heading to Johannesburg to open the first Marist School in Koch St in 1889.

Today, our boys are amongst the educationally fortunate in South Africa, with access to highly qualified teachers, the latest technology, world class sporting facilities and progressive educational pedagogies. Indeed, St David's is in a position that most would term 'liberated'. However, liberation cannot exist in a vacuum; neither can it exist unless it impacts those around it.

The role, we might deduce that St David's Marist Inanda 2013 plays in fulfilling the vision of St Marcellin, is to be the catalyst, through the boys we educated, for change. Perhaps a measure of our success should be the impact that our boys have on society, albeit politically, spiritually, economically or psychologically; what we might call gamechangers. The role of the St David's Marist Foundation is integral to this process. Our goal of establishing a substantial Endowment Fund to sustain the School in perpetuity provides us the financial security we need to continue delivering a Marist education and allows us the freedom to continue to make bold and brave decisions that impact the lives of not only the boys at St David's for future generations, but also those lives our boys will intersect.

Our aim of supporting the School's Key Strategic Driver of Transformation is a direct way in which we continue to live the vision of St Marcellin and the Marist Brothers, and impact and change the current status quo.

This guite philosophical account, in actual fact, plays itself out on a very human and functional level each day at St David's: in the decisions we make, in the interactions we have, in the expectations we have of staff and boys, and in the meeting of needs of those in our community and those in communities we are involved in. The simplicity of these everyday actions and interactions send the message of "Marist" in a subtle but strong way. In the same way, the donations of those who share our vision and mission send a powerful message to the 16 boys who are currently recipients of support through the Foundation - one of belief in the potential of the individual. We cannot express our gratitude strongly enough for the financial, and by extension, the spiritual and psychological investment made by our donors in the lives of these boys. As a Foundation and as a School, the faith placed in us by our donors is taken very seriously, as is the decision of who should receive support - the number of boys qualifying always exceeding the amount we are able to commit. The decision for us is not just about the finances, although this is obviously critical. We need to be sure that, when we bring a boy into St David's, we can also meet the other needs he may have, which sometimes have financial implications but also involve pastoral care and mentorship. The St David's Staff play a critical role in this regard, and from the Foundation perspective, we are extremely grateful for their investment of time and care.

In 2013, the St David's Marist Foundation, under the able chairmanship of Robin Smith, reached and exceeded an important milestone, which was R20million in income received - actually closing our books at over R22million. Of this amount, over R5,5million has been made in award to the School (for bursaries and scholarships as well as in support of capital development). An additional R900k has been awarded for bursaries and scholarships for 2014.

My thanks go to each of our Trustees for their time, commitment and wisdom. This year, three new Trustees joined the Foundation, namely Darrell Caister, Andy Hall and Conor McFadden. These men join our current Trustees of Robin Smith (Chairman), Br Jude Pieterse, Cleo Artemides (ex-officio), Tony Chappel, Gianni Mariano, Mike Greeff (ex-officio), Rick Wilson (ex-officio), Malcolm Williams (ex-officio) and Lara Klement (ex-officio). My thanks also to Brian Kalil, our auditor, for his invaluable support and expertise and to Cheryl King, our Foundation and Alumni Liaison Officer for her dedication to the vision and goals of the Foundation.

Our goals for 2016 (our 75th Jubilee) and beyond are ambitious, somewhat bold and brave, but we believe that this is line with the vision of St Marcellin Champagnat and that we have a responsibility to live up to this expectation.







Faith, culture and life in harmony



Arise And Walk - Acts 3:1-10

2013 was a year which brought many challenges which we met together. As the end of the year approaches, we trust that God will help us to end this year with the same vision and mission we had in the beginning of 2013.

In the Acts of the Apostles chapter 3 verses 1 to 10 we read: "Now Peter and John were going up to the temple area for the three o'clock hour of prayer. And a man crippled from birth was carried and placed at the gate of the temple called, "the Beautiful Gate", every day to beg for alms from the people who entered the temple. When he saw Peter and John about to go into the temple, he asked for alms. But Peter looked intently at him, as did John and said: "Look at us". He paid attention to them, expecting to receive something from them. Peter said, "I have neither silver nor gold, but what I do have I give you: in the name of Jesus Christ the Nazarene, rise and walk. Then Peter took him by the right hand and raised him up, and immediately his feet and ankles grew strong. He leapt up, stood, and walked around and went into the temple with them, walking and jumping and praising God. When all the people saw him walking and praising God, they recognised him as the one who used to sit begging at the Beautiful Gate of the temple and they were filled with amazement and astonishment at what had happened to him".

I have chosen this scripture text because of its fundamental importance in our lives. God wants us to rise and walk tall wherever we may be. He demands of us that we listen to him and adhere to his message and command. God gives us his gift of life, life which no one has the power to give or take. And not only that, God also gives us power to believe in ourselves and hold us by his hand and says to us: "My son/daughter, rise and walk". If you have not succeeded well in 2013, it is not the end of the world but the beginning of a new phase of life – so arise and walk. If you have experienced a tragedy or bereavement in 2013 – rise and walk again.

CHAPLAIN'S NOTES FR TEBOHO MATSEKE

God I will be with you until the end of time (Matthew 28:20b). God is our Father in Heaven and Christ is our friend, God and Christ are helping us to see life in a different way and approach it in a different way.

Christ walks with us on this road of life, and expects us to follow in his footsteps, to be good leaders and good educators for others. One of the characteristics of Christ is to be a good or genuine leader to all and also to lead by example. The former President of South Africa, President Thabo Mbeki speaks very fondly about the quality of leadership when he says: "We must ask ourselves the question, and look closely at the question, as to what are we doing with regard to the goals which are contained in the constitution....how loyal are we to the values of those which Nelson Mandela represented? Do his values continue to inspire the values by which we act to continue to develop a better South Africa?". We need to ask: At St Davids Marist, Inanda we actualise the quality of leadership through prayer and Mass. Each grade has Mass at least once a week and every time we celebrate Mass we have altar servers who help the priest with the sacred vessels. We have a small group of people who look at the Ethos of the School where we revisit the five characteristics of St Marcellin Champagnat and contextualise these characteristics into our lives and the lives of others. And by doing this we respond positively to the love of Christ when he said: "....love one another as I have loved you and there is no greater love than to lay down your life for your brother", John 13:34. This is the greatest commandment of them all. One cannot love another if you do not see Christ in your brother and sister. We are all children of God so we ought to love one another because God is love.

This love manifests itself in many ways at our School. For example, during the Lenten period which starts on Ash Wednesday, we have Stations of the Cross daily in the chapel and we invite Catholics and non-Catholics to attend. We were so fortunate this year because Holy week fell during the school period. This gave us the opportunity to educate the boys about the meaning of The Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Holy Saturday) and what is expected of us as Catholics. The mood of the liturgy during this time of the year changes to solemnity and quiet. The drums, marimba and saxophone are not played during Mass to symbolize the different meaning of the season. However, on, Easter Sunday, the colour on the altar cloth is white signifying life and resurrection. From this day forward we play all kinds of instruments until we reach the season of Advent – a period before Christmas, where we prepare to celebrate the birth of our Lord with jubilation on Christmas day.

We also have a lay Marist community, where we reflect on the gospel of the day on our daily lives as a Marist community and we share our daily experiences. This enhances our relationship with God and others.

We also exercise this commandment of love when we teach and instruct our boys about God's role in their lives. This is clearly visible when we allow the boys in high school to come for confessions once a semester and those who are not Catholic are also invited to chat about their experiences and relations with others. We experienced a beautiful and exquisite celebration of the sacrament of First Holy Communion in October 2013. This was a moving experience.

Marist boys are taught the values and doctrine of Catholicism and this is evident especially in the confirmation group. The confirmation group are boys who are in Grade 10 or 11 who are given extra classes once a week and would be confirmed at Rosebank parish later in the year. In 2013, the sacrament of confirmation was celebrated by Archbishop Buti Tlhagale in September.

Both Catholic and non-Catholic staff members were invited to attend a weekend of a retreat. This was a time to reflect and meditate about life in general and to gain more strength from God. Most of those who went came back rejuvenated. We are mindful of other denominations and so, for example during the Ramadan we observe this period with respect and dignity.

Although we have had many challenges in 2013, these made us reflect on our work and lives. The values, vision and mission of St Marcellin helped us to be strong and optimistic and to persevere.

I end with a quotation from one of the past Presidents of South Africa, the late Nelson Mandela who said: "Part of being optimistic is keeping one's head pointed towards the sun, one's feet moving forward". Let us move forward as a family of St Davids Marist, Inanda and as brothers and sisters. Let us hold each

other's hand and help each other during the coming year, 2014. Let us carry each other's burdens so that the world could be a better place for all of us. Let us remove the splinter in our eyes first, before we point to the splinter in others, Matthew 7:3.

Let us be optimistic and positive in 2014 as there is a potential in us that is waiting to be actualized. May the almighty God Bless you all.





COLLEGE OUTREACH

This has been another very active year of Outreach service in the College. The usual weekly activities have continued and these have included the following:

- Tuesday Alexandra Soup kitchen. (This is fully funded by the boys, as it comes out of their Thursday collection.) Boys are involved in the packing of soup, juice, bread and sweets and in serving the attendees who queue at the Alexandra Outreach Centre, as well as setting up and organising. Mr Mudzingwa has accompanied the boys and managed proceedings. The soup kitchen tends to the needs of the many unemployed and elderly people of the township. Children are also looked after by the project.
- Wednesday SMILE. (This programme is shared during the year by Drake Koka School and Ebony Park School). Pupils from the two schools are tutored by St David's boys in basic English literacy. Boys have shown great leadership and responsibility and on the whole interacted with tremendous enthusiasm and enjoyment. The programme is co-ordinated by Mrs Marais.
- Thursday Mother Teresa's Home. (These visits take place on a fortnightly basis.) The visit is to the abandoned and orphaned toddlers and children of the Home. Boys take along treats for the children and give of their time interacting and playing with them. The project is intended to evoke compassion and awareness among our boys and at the same time, give children a sense of worth and the understanding that they are not forgotten.
- Friday Headway. Boys visit Headway and assist with mental and physical stimulation programmes provided for the attendees.

The School hosted another Blood Drive this year as well as the annual Shavathon day. The Shavathon raised R15 000 for CANSA. Boys were also involved in Shavathons in various shopping malls with the most popular one being Bryanston Mall. The School received letters of commendation from members of the public on the behaviour and demeanour of our young men. There have been a number of civvies days this year, with boys donating tins of food and money. Our soup kitchen has been largely the recipient of these donations.

The Clothes for Cash initiative was very successful and the College contributed to the collecting of more than 3 tons of clothes. The pancake sale on Shrove Tuesday yielded R4000. This money was transferred to Brother Christopher at Maristcare in the Eastern Cape. We received a response from Uitenhage saying that the donation was the answer to a prayer, as their soup kitchen was struggling for resources.

The 67 Minutes for Nelson Mandela involved our boys in making sandwiches for those less fortunate. With a number of mothers supervising the day went very well and the mountains of sandwiches made were delivered to our soup kitchen in Alexandra. The School also made available a school bus and driver to transport the attendees of Headway to a 67 minute concert at the SABC.

During the April holiday there was a visit to Phomolong Secondary School where trees were planted. The following is a report by Nahum Bangura on this trip to Tembisa: "During the holidays a couple of St David's boys and I went on a service trip to a school in Thembisa. We were told we were going to plant trees in the school and thereafter go to Alexandra to provide the local people with food donated by the St David's boys.

I don't think anyone expected how tough planting trees could be. We all had this idea that we were going to get there, take trees and put them in the ground but this was not the case at all. As soon as we arrived we were greeted by the Principal of the school and were thanked by him on behalf of his school for arriving to do the job. He commended us on our thoughtfulness to help the community while we were on holiday and emphasised how happy and grateful he was for our services.

Straight after all the formalities it was time to start the work. First there was a demonstration on how to dig and plant the trees by Mr A Rambau, a Support Staff member, and then we were given spades and other planting and digging equipment. After that, we were on our own. We had split into groups of three each and were given specific spots on where to plant the trees. No one was prepared for the hard work we were about to do, people were struggling to dig a meter by meter hole, others taking breaks after 5 minutes because of the extreme heat, other guys disappointed at how bad and amateur their holes were looking like but needless to say, we got the job done.

After all the tress had been planted, everyone was so proud of what they had accomplished and was so happy about giving back to the community and the environment. Now it was time to go to Alexandra and provide people with food for the day. Thanks to the St David's boys; there were enough cans to give everyone 3 cans each and a loaf of bread. The smiles on those people's faces made everyone's day.

Overall, it was a great day to give back to the community and the environment and because of our services we were able to create smiles and fill up hungry stomachs. I'd like to thank St David's for constantly giving us the opportunity to always give back to others."

In July the Grade 11s visited four schools in Alexandra Township. This was also part of the GIBS Schools' Project. St David's boys assisted the GIBS Alex schools with preparation for ANA's (Annual National Assessment) in Maths and English. The interaction between the schools fostered a newfound respect and sensitivity of the St David's boys to the circumstances which prevail in Alex. A sense of community between the schools is being developed and there is an intention to build on this relationship year on year. Thanks to Mr Williams for initiating this and to Mrs Charmaine Smith for facilitating it.

During the August holiday a number of boys made the daily trip out to Refilwe for a week which served as the Service 'camp' of 2013. Sikhulekile Duma wrote the following report on the camp.

"In the week between Monday the 12th and Friday the 16th of August 2013, five to twelve boys from St David's Marist Inanda undertook a gruelling week of community

service that would test them physically but would offer them so much to learn about each other, help their broader community and lastly, have a good time through the whole experience. Initially 12 boys were selected for the Service week that would include us going to the Refilwe Community project in Lanseria for ten hours a day, for a total of five days. Only few of the boys knew what to expect out of this week and the place we would be doing community service.

On the 12th of August five boys turned up at 7:30 am at School looking exhausted from the term that had just passed. It was questionable if any of us were ready to be doing community service for 10 hours that day, let alone the whole week. We found that morning that only five of the ten to twelve boys that were supposed to come actually would make it; we then embarked on a long 45 minute trip to Lanseria, passing countless suburbs and realising how massive this city of gold actually is. We finally arrived at Refilwe, a place located so far at the edge of the city that it was almost rural.

The boys enthusiastically got off the bus despite the chilly morning and listened to the CEO of Refilwe tell us that Refilwe is a community-based project that provides an orphanage for small children, a day care centre (crèche) and other skills development projects, school-related programmes, and employment for young people and adults in the nearby informal settlement of Joe Slovo. In order to sustain this project, Refilwe gets sponsorships from local companies such as Discovery, international sponsorships and volunteers from overseas (especially America). The other way in which they sustained their operations was through a nursery business and an eco-friendly worm compost business that they run; it also helps in creating employment for the local population. This is where we would be helping out and we knew we were in for a tough week.

The CEO then got straight to business by assigning jobs to us; some of us got the unfortunate but important job of shovelling horse manure and cabbage and others were assigned with transporting the manure and cabbage to the place where the worms were kept, so they could be used to make compost. Before we started with our roles, we were told to get on a bakkie with water tanks from every part of Refilwe and collect water for the Refilwe estate at a water source outside. The boys enjoyed this very much as we felt part of a busy farming lifestyle.

After this job we did the roles assigned to us and worked very hard to get 40 crates of manure and cabbage full and packed. By the time that was done it was lunch, which could not have come sooner, as we all felt we could eat the horse that had created all this work for us. During our hour lunch we discovered other parts of the huge Refilwe estate/farm across the river and found an amazing multi-purpose centre right next to the crèche that could be used for lunch and a game of soccer. We used this opportunity to make our lunch break a soccer and food affair.

After lunch some of us were assigned with working in the nursery, by transporting out the huge plants for delivery and taking out weeds in the various plants. In the process

we met the manager of the nursery, Allan, who is a very unique gentleman that kept us entertained by talking about everything under the sun, especially his beloved dogs. He and his hilarious workers kept the mood upbeat and productive; time seemed to fly when we were there. When the job was done, the day had already ended and Mr Fry was there to take us back home through the horrible Johannesburg traffic. When we finally got to School after five, most of us were tired but excited for the coming days, as we felt we had accomplished a lot and made a small difference in our small part of the world. We truly were living by Mahatma Ghandi's quote of: be the change you want to see in the world

The rest of the week would go the same as the first day and we even got the chance to take down walls that needed to be demolished with sledgehammers, which is any boy's dream. On the Friday when we finally finished the gruelling week our number had increased to twelve, as boys heard about the Service camp from us. All the boys will agree that it was a week to remember that tested us physically but at the end of it, we felt we had accomplished a lot, and contributed to the mission of Refilwe and the community they help, which is priceless. Finally, many boys had earned various Service Awards and achievements as a result of the hours gained. With Christmas approaching the School has again contributed towards making the lives of those less fortunate a little easier at this time of year. Christmas presents have been collected for Mother Teresa's Home and for children with cystic fibrosis. Our thanks go to Mrs Marais and Mrs Kennedy for co-ordinating this.

PREP CO-WORKERS REPORT

Mrs Nieman, Mrs Moorhouse and a very enthusiastic group of Grade 7 boys went to do outreach at Princess Alice Adoption Home in Westcliff for the first time this year.

"Princess Alice Adoption Home (PAAH) is a facility of Johannesburg Child Welfare. They provide a place of safety for up to 30 babies at a time - each of whom have been either consented for adoption or abandoned. The ages of the babies range from newborn to two years. They provide for all their developmental needs around the clock in a very caring nursery environment. Adoptions are managed by Johannesburg Child Welfare's professional social work team.

A loyal volunteer base ensures that each baby and toddler receives the affection needed for them to bond with others (a very important foundation for later life) as well as engaging in stimulating activities.

PAAH is also able to provide a temporary place of safety for up to four young pregnant girls in crisis. They are assisted in all ways during the latter part of their pregnancies, and counseled and supported in making decisions through the difficult time in their lives."

This year fourteen Grade 7 Boys volunteered, along with Mrs Moorhouse and Mrs Nieman, to visit The Princess Alice Adoption Home in Westcliff Johannesburg on a regular

Princess Alice Adoption Home is a facility which is part of the Johannesburg Child Welfare Association. It is a safe place where up to thirty babies at a time, each of whom has been either consented for adoption or has been abandoned, are cared for and loved until a new home is found for them.

On our visits we helped clean and organize the home, we helped feed and change the babies. And most importantly we spent quality time playing with them and giving them the attention they deserve. We have had many laughs with them this year. The most memorable being the initiation whereby we were vomited on after feeding time. We learnt some valuable life lessons and gained appreciation for our own lives through the tragic stories of these precious little

We hope this initiative will remain an important part of the Grade 7 learning experience.

SALT OF THE EARTH

The Salt of the Earth boys, together with Ms Nkosi and Mrs Cryer, visit the senior citizens residing at Queen Alexandra Home every third week during the course of the year. These visits from our friendly, polite and well mannered boys always bring a smile to the residents. Mr Ray Geyer has been the boys' favourite resident because of his love and knowledge of sport, being a retired cricket coach and an international player in his prime time.

The boys visit the residents in frail care, and then move on to the more "able-bodied" residents for chats and laughs. It has been interesting to see how the boys interact with the senior citizens. Sadly, the Home lost one of their oldest residents, Mrs Christine Marcovici who was 106 years old and was loved by the boys because of her warm personality.

During these vists, the boys help the staff in serving tea and biscuits before returning to school.

On November 18th, we will be having a Christmas tea, where we hope, with the generous donations from the Grade 7 families, be able to give each resident a Christmas gift of soap, body lotion or shaving cream; face cloth AND a box of biscuits or soft sweets that are easily chewable.

It has been a fulfilling experience for us and the boys to be able give back to the community, we would to thank the School for this opportunity.

HEADMASTER'S REPORT

MR R WILSON

As the year ends I feel a bit like the quintessential olden day cowboy who, in the closing sequence of the film, rides off on his horse into the sunset - his faithful dog trotting behind in the dust. For me, the years of herding frisky calves are over, so too (thankfully,) the gunfights in the saloon. We won't mention the cheap liquor and fast women - neither really featured in this cowboy's story.....!

But where do I begin – looking backwards or forwards? Maybe I should be like a chameleon which can do both simultaneously?

The past 12 months have been frenetic and I'm sure the boys and staff are exhausted and looking forward to a welldeserved break:

In reviewing the year, so much of what we've undertaken and accomplished has been recorded in the weekly Newsletter and on the website and so in the first fifteen pages, I'll just mention some of the highlights. In mentioning the Newsletter - this year we moved from printed to the electronic version and worryingly, over the past months our readership has dropped significantly. I encourage you to make this a 'must read' in your weekly schedule as we are experiencing a surge in phone calls asking for information which is contained in the Newsletter.

It might come as a bit of a surprise to many boys, but the real reason you come to school boys is to study academics, so we'll begin with that. On the academic front - Jethro Strydom won the Major Open Scholarship to Kearsney College against top academic achievers from around the country and additionally nine boys have been awarded scholarships into our own high school. The Major Closed Academic Scholarship was awarded to Luke Rheeder.

Ensuring that we remain abreast of technological trends iPads were introduced for the first time in support of the curriculum in both sections of the school and we are looking to increase the number of tablets in the next year. Every classroom in the school has a Promethean interactive smart board and Apple TV is being increasingly used in the high school workspaces.

All the major sporting achievements of the year have been mentioned in the Extra-curricular assembly. For those who were not there - we congratulate Nicholas Kourie who was awarded the Prep School Sportsman of the Year and James Macindoe and Murray Bester who were runners up.

A précis of top-end sporting achievement must once again include our 'A' swimming team who remain unbeaten for their 16th consecutive year and our 'B' teams who regularly beat other schools' 'A' teams. Three weeks ago our 'A' team won the Prestige gala for the 16th successive year against all our leading competitors and our 'B' team was likewise victorious in their section of the same event.



We had boys selected for Area cricket, Area football, Area hockey, and we also had boys selected for Gauteng and even South Africa in canoeing, tennis, judo and karate.

Canoeing is a hugely popular sport amongst the younger boys in our school and following their participation in the 5.A Schools Canoe Sprint Championships we were very proud when the boys returned as South African Primary school champions for the 4th successive year.

Our school play, which was written, produced and directed by Mrs Human was a light-hearted gangster comedy entitled 'Wanted.' For some reason, best known to themselves, the boys decided that they were going to adlib whenever they felt like it - often with hilarious results and to the bemusement of Mrs Human.

Staff development is an integral part of our school and once again our teachers were encouraged to attend seminars and workshops locally, nationally and even internationally. Mrs Pat Milne has just returned from an international Early Childhood Development conference in Washington and earlier this year Mrs Frances McWilliams attended the International Coalition of Boys Schools conference in Richmond Virginia.

New initiatives in education are as frequent and cyclic as the seasons and it never ceases to amaze me how rapidly they come and then how many disappear from the horizon. You are, I'm sure, painfully aware of how poorly our country is ranked in global education rankings. The powerful teacher unions have effectively hamstrung the Education Department from introducing any initiatives which would attempt to make teachers more accountable and in turn try to uplift standards. Too many teachers are unmotivated, arrive at work late, don't prepare their lessons at all, sit in the staffroom drinking tea and to cap it all – often become



involved in inappropriate relationships with their pupils. Any attempts to address this unsavoury impasse are met with threats of strikes or lockouts. However, in this morass of mediocrity; some top State and independent schools stand tall in still maintaining high standards. Children from our top schools often attend tertiary institutions overseas and they cope extremely well. There is still a strong and compelling argument for schools such as ours (whilst being keenly mindful of trends) to still also focus on the fundamentals and basics and to exercise caution in becoming overly committed to expensive and sometimes unsustainable alternatives. That said: we will always invest appropriately in technology as we appreciate that technology drives both the present and the future. As an aside, I sometimes find myself pondering how much outdated technology lies unused in storerooms in businesses and schools. What does one do with those hundreds of overhead projectors, slide projectors, floppy disks and video machines?

NOW BACK TO THAT COWBOY – RIDING INTO THE SUNSET.

My 18 years here have gone by in a flash. The school was very different in 1996. Initially alongside Paul Edey and latterly with Mike Greeff, we have invested over R30 million in the buildings and infrastructure which your sons now enjoy. If you consider for a moment what we have developed, it will bring home how far we've come and how vibrant our development has been through various Boards of Governors.

In a nutshell, since 1996 we have built: this hall, 15 high school classrooms, a whole new Pre-school, a high school pavilion, an Astroturf, a chapel, six staff houses (and purchased three houses and a large flat.) We've added automated sprinkler systems to all but one of our fields, built new tennis courts, developed two new libraries, implemented a whole new fibre optic and then wi-fi network system, built two computer centres and added Promethean boards throughout the school. We've developed a new Administration centre, expanded six Prep classrooms, heated the pool, developed a new Junior playground, purchased two larger buses, built a climbing wall and countless other minor projects. This list is not only an expression of financial investment in the school, but it also encapsulates the vision, confidence and energy of our successive Boards and school management. There still remains a list with more than 20 projects of varying sizes and costs to be incorporated and these will be completed in good time.

Those are some of the physical changes in my time here. Each project has, in its own way, added so much value to what we can offer our boys, but what about the other changes?

Of great satisfaction has been to witness the growing stature of our school as a leading role player in our city. In 1996, we were a lower profile, smaller neighbourhood Catholic school – uncompetitive and seemingly satisfied to be flying below the radar. Boy, how that situation has changed. Our decision to increase the enrolment of the school, which led to the development of the entire infrastructure I have just listed, thrust us into the major league, whether we aspired to it or not. We gradually shook off our inferiority complex and started competing, on an equal footing, with the leading schools in the city.

Our academic results in the high school have been simply outstanding for the past ten years and each year our boys achieve a 100% IEB pass rate with an above 90% university acceptance. I commend my colleague Mr Malcolm Williams and his staff for this superb accomplishment.

Our Prep school boys have similarly excelled and have won the Open major scholarships to Hilton, Michaelhouse, St Albans and now Kearsney College. They have also won countless other academic scholarships to these and other leading schools. Every semester we receive feedback from those schools about our boys and almost without exception our lads are doing both themselves and our school proud. Furthermore, each year many of our boys are selected in positions of leadership in their schools: head boys, deputies and Heads of House. I mention in passing one of our former pupils, Andrew Taylor, who has just been elected Deputy Head Boy of Ballakermeen High School which is the largest and most prestigious Independent School on the Isle of Man. I make a point of always sharing these results and appointments with the staff, for not only is it gratifying to hear how well our old boys are all doing, but it is also affirming for us as teachers to know and hear from other significant professionals outside the school - that we're doing a good job. What is equally gratifying are the Matric results obtained by our Prep boys through our own high school and beyond, in university.

Teaching is becoming increasingly more difficult and stressful and it is vital that those in the profession feel valued and appreciated. As you are all aware, hardly a week goes by without schools or pupils hitting the headlines for the wrong reasons. It's not just in South Africa either. Schools in other parts of the world are also experiencing a maelstrom of aggression from pupils and an avalanche of unreasonable expectation and pressure from parents. The net result of this is debilitating stress amongst teachers which results in fewer young people joining the ranks and

increasing numbers leaving to seek alternative occupations. In our country alone, we are short of more than 100 000 qualified teachers.

Teachers are no different from other people in that they too have feelings and because they are dealing with (and expected to handle) such a complex range of skills required in teaching today's young people, they are bound on occasion to not come up to a certain parent's expectation. They then inevitably face unkind criticism from an irate parent – often by means of e-mail. As an illustrative analogy – the greatest number of objects I've ever seen a juggler performing with is 6 or 7. Try juggling for a year with the expectations and requirements of 25 boys of varying ability in each class. It's hard not to drop the proverbial ball once in a while.

To my teachers – I share with you and ask you to draw strength from the words of Theodore Roosevelt who, in describing people who criticize said:

"It is not the critic who counts; nor the man who points out how the strong man stumbles, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the arena, whose face is marred by dust and sweat and blood; who strives valiantly; who errs, who comes short again and again, because there is no effort without error and shortcoming; but who does actually strive to do the deeds; who knows great enthusiasms, the great devotions; who spends himself in a worthy cause; who at the best knows in the end the triumph of high achievement, and who at the worst, if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who neither know victory nor defeat."

Thankfully, in our school, we enjoy an overwhelming support from the majority of you, our parents. This was made abundantly clear in the Perception Survey we undertook last year. The positive feedback we received was an indication of almost global satisfaction with the school and a rousing endorsement of what we try to accomplish. We're not perfect, we know that, but the men and women working here strive to their utmost to give your sons the best grounding in education possible and with humility, I submit that they are doing a fine job. Our track record speaks for itself.

Eighteen years ago, our sport was uncompetitive and certain schools just had to drive in through the gate for us to capitulate. Those days too, have long gone. We compete against the best and meet with a good measure of success. One aspect which hasn't changed, however, is our philosophy towards sport which guards against us becoming arrogant or complacent. Our unwritten motto remains: 'If you win, you win with humility. If you lose, you lose with dignity.'

One thing which hasn't changed in 18 years, or for that matter for 35 years, is a certain personality on the staff. As you know - I hand over the ship to Mr Castle for 2014 confident that he will avoid icebergs and resist the temptation to sail too close to any islands al la Costa

Concordia. 18 years ago he had dark brown hair and I had hair! Willy, I have every faith that you'll continue keep our standards as high as possible and I wish you every success and happiness in the year ahead. You richly deserve the honour which has been bestowed upon you.

I would like to offer a special welcome to Mr Gareth Kolkenbeck-Ruh who returns to this, his alma mater, as your Deputy Headmaster – Extra murals. Gareth is an ex-Head Boy of the school and a fine sportsman. I could not think of a better man for the job and to be re-joining the school. Welcome, Gareth!

Whilst I have shared a few reflections of my time at St David's, tonight is not really about me – it's about all of you. From my bright eyed soldiers and you the parents sitting in front - to the staff here with me on the stage. I leave from here with such a feeling of contentment and gratitude. The past may well be mine upon which to reflect but the future is definitely yours. Ronald Regan stated that, "The future does not belong to the fainthearted: it belongs to the brave," so boys live up to our motto: take courage – be men, grasp what the future offers you and fly with the eagles!

We have all come such a long way and each and every one of us should feel inordinately proud to be a part of the school we have collectively created. Together, we have built a school which stands shoulder to shoulder with the best in the city. Ours is a school in huge demand with waiting lists in the Pre-school exceeding 200 per class for 2015 and 2016. This is an indication of what people 'out there' think about St David's. We have reached our current position not through the efforts of any one person or even a small group of people, but rather through the collective – all of us. It is incumbent on those taking the school into the future to remain involved and committed to our mission so that future generations of young Marist men may enjoy the benefits of this great establishment.

In an appeal to our parents I ask that you go out of your way to treasure and support your son's teachers – every one of them. Please do this for me. Like rhinos – they are becoming an endangered species with the predators, in their case, being unreasonable societal demands and unrealistic expectations. The future success of education in our country is strongly linked to the morale of the teaching force and as we sit here – the profession is under huge stress.

It is both right and fitting that I thank certain people for both their commitment to our school and for the personal support they have afforded me.

To the teachers, Exco team, school management colleagues including Mike Greeff, Mike Boden and Malcolm Williams: I thank you for: the work you have done and continue to do in our school, your courage, your unflinching support, your humour and dedication. I wish you all the very best in your endeavours for the future.

Thank you to everyone connected to and working in our school, parents, administration and ground staff alike for

your support, kind words and encouragement. They have meant a great deal to me. Then some words to the boys. As I reflected to the Grade 1's at their outstanding "Goodbye Mr Wilson" assembly: boys like you are the reason I became a teacher. Working with such fine young men has been such a pleasure for me – yes even the mischievous ones amongst you. Boys, continue to be the decent young men you are. Be humble, be kind and always support each other and your teachers. I wish you success and happiness through your school years and beyond and I promise – I will pop past next year to support you from time to time. Always remember that because you are St David's boys – "You will never walk alone!"

Behind every good man there stands a woman - usually with his debit card in one hand and a sjambok in the other! My final thanks are to my wife Gerry. You alone really know what an emotional and sometimes stressful rollercoaster Headship is. The words you lovingly used to encourage me always had the desired effect: QUOTE: "Stop feeling sorry for yourself and go and play golf you soppy bugger!" (Only joking!) Gerry - thanks for everything hon!

We are entering the most magical time of year – the season of giving, of family togetherness and of spirituality. I wish you all a restful holiday, safe journeys and the best quality time together.

I close with one of my favourite passages (slightly modified) from 'A Tale of Two Cities' by Charles Dickens which reflects something of a parody of my tenure in St David's, and then a short 2 minute slide show which says goodbye to the boys and which involves my favourite animals — cats! I ask you boys to take the words in those slides to heart....

But first...Dickens....

"It was the best of times, it was seldom the worst of times, it was the age of wisdom, it was the age of foolishness, it was the epoch of belief, it was the epoch of incredulity, it was the season of Light, it was seldom the season of darkness, it was the spring of hope, it was seldom the winter of despair, we had little before us at the start - we have everything before us now, we were all going direct to heaven, we hoped none were going the other way – in short, the period was so far like the present period, that some of its noisiest authorities insisted on its being received, for good or for evil, in the superlative degree of comparison only.

For Rick Wilson - It wasthe best of times!"





























LIBRARY REPORT 2013


GRADE 6 & 7 PLAY: WANTED

FUTURE PROBLEM SOLVING PROGRAMME

Our Future Problem solvers have been quietly active this year, with slow but steady growth in interest in the benefits of the Program.

Happily we now have four staff members involved: Mrs Bev Geldenhuys from the Prep School, Miss Leigh Rider, Mrs Glenda Dell and Mrs Sue Soulsby from the High School. A visit from our Australian mentor, Dr Niranjan Casinader, resulted in an unofficial training session over dinner one evening and has given the staff a better grasp of the process of the Program. We hope to be more successful in developing the boys' competitive skills after our first interactive training ever.

From the boys' perspective, we now have Grade 6, 7, 8 and 9 involvement. Our regular attendees from Grade 7 and 8 are making excellent progress through the Program and will shortly be competing against their Australian counterparts in a National Final. The competition will determine whether a team is invited to the International Finals in the USA in June 2014 or not. The competition takes the form of a two hour scenario analysis where the six-step process is applied to a futuristic one page story written around the problems of plastic polluting our oceans. We have a recently formed a Grade 9 team who may try to compete as well. These boys are strong debaters who bring good logical skills to the Program: they need to learn future-based thinking to compete effectively.


An enthusiastic group of Grade 6 boys have joined the Program and are happily engaging with the activities which lead to the more formal six-step process which is core to the Program. Mrs Geldenhuys has these boys designing creatively new school bags through using techniques which teach them to move into new territory with a plan. They have learnt how to SCAMPER

and will soon apply de Bono's Six Thinking Hats to stretch their skills further. Group work and respect for each other's ideas is a feature of the work as well as learning to use the ideas from others to reach more creative ideas as a group. These are skills will aid them in their adult working life!

As always, we have struggled to find time for our activities: we continue to be accommodated at the end of the school and sporting day and compete with many other activities even then — not an ideal time for brain-work! Happily, in 2014 the Prep School will be introducing a lesson each week during the school day. Considering the value of learning thinking skills, increasingly recognised as crucial in 21st century life, this is an exciting progression. The high school is investigating a similar move.

We need to address the question of high school awards for activities in the Program. Until we have enough other South African schools involved, we cannot hope for top honours as any overseas competition is because we are still the only South African competitors. However, team and half colours may possibly be awarded for hours spent in the Program and contribution to furthering its scope.

Mahatma Gandhi summed up the need for planning and practising in the present to cope with a new and different world in the future when he said: "The future depends on what you do today." Malcolm X supports this too: "Education is our passport to the future, for tomorrow belongs to the people who prepare for it today." We sincerely believe the Future Problem Solving Program participants are learning skills now to enhance their effectiveness in their futures!

But this function would never be complete without the hard work and dedication of Mrs G. Please would you also come up and receive a token of our appreciation for organising this function so well.


