

THE EXECUTIVE HEADMASTER'S REPORT



The school reopened to the news that the 2005 Matric class had achieved the best results since we went into the IEB Examination Board in 1996. Not only were there some brilliant individual results, with 3 St David's candidates

being placed in the TOP 50 countrywide, but the university entrance was the highest ever with an extraordinary 99% from the 86 candidates. There is much debate about educational standards and the quality of Matric. This debate is not confined to South Africa and in England there has been heated discussion about the quality of candidates entering university and the huge increase in the number of candidates who achieve "A " Aggregates. Nonetheless the results of the Class of 2005 are on a par with the top schools in the country and testimony to the focus that the school has put into academics over the past ten years. The staff and boys are to be congratulated. (In 1996 we had one "A" aggregate matriculant and the only distinction achieved in the languages was in Japanese, which needless to say was not taught at St David's!)

Living in South Africa presents very real challenges especially to parents trying to bring up their children in a society where it is difficult to find a balance between freedom and responsibility and where the moral fabric appears to be threatened.

The school was shattered to hear of the abduction and subsequent murder of Stephen Sieberts, whilst on holiday in Plettenberg Bay. A moving and appropriate service was held in the College chapel in January. School had barely opened when we were rocked with further bad news with the deaths of Dr John Jamieson, Old Boy and father of pupils Ryan and Sean and brother of long serving staff member Carol Ansell, and then Julius Shibambu passed away after a long battle with illness. Tributes are elsewhere in this magazine.

The Astroturf took ages to complete as the contractors battled with the extraordinarily wet summer weather. The end result is magnificent and the landscaping and new parking area around the Astroturf has resulted in a vastly improved entrance and a much improved traffic flow. The school has a much needed break from the sound of graders and the grind of builders before the new chapel begins in 2007.

Meanwhile the boys and staff continued to throw themselves into the busy world of work, and play, both on the sports field and in the cultural arena. The results are in this magazine for you to read. The school's endeavours were placed under rigorous scrutiny when we embarked on a whole school evaluation exercise under the guidance of mentors appointed by IQAA, the Independent Quality Assurance Agency. The results which were written up in a comprehensive report are most gratifying and reveal that across the school our major stakeholders believe that we are doing a good job. Action plans are in place to rectify areas of weakness. After many years of talk, the Foundation was launched in October. The primary aim is to ensure the long term sustainability of the school through the provision of bursaries to candidates from disadvantaged backgrounds. Great schools can no longer survive on fee income alone and we hope that the St David's community will contribute generously to ensure that the ambitious target of R 25 million is reached.

On the staffing front the most significant news was the promotion of Mr Darrel Webb, Deputy (Academics) in the Prep to the Headship of Dainfern Preparatory. It is always a blow to lose someone of Mr Webb's calibre but his contribution to the school over the past six years has been immense and we wish him well.

As I leave St David's after eleven and a half years I should like to thank: the Staff, Academic, Administrative, and Ancillary, for their hard work and support. The school is a very different place from what it was in 1995.




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In appreciation

Looking through the tributes written by the boys in the Prep school from Grade 1 through to 7, one notes a consistency of comment like "He is kind and cares about everyone. He always has a smile and is very funny. He has made St David's a great school. He worked very hard to make the school better. He is like a factory – he keeps the school up and running. He hates litter. He was always nice to everyone – a big man with an even bigger heart." Thus, out of the mouths of babes......

When he arrived in 1996 to be the Headmaster, St David's was a smaller school. The High School numbered just 400 boys. Since then, extra streams have been added to the High School which now numbers 516 boys, while the Junior School has been increased by the addition of Grade 0 then Grade 00, so that St David's now has over 1100 pupils from Grade 00 to Grade 12. Along with expansion in pupils, the staff has had to be increased as also the facilities. We now boast of two pavilions at the College and Prep sports fields, a well-stocked library and media center for each school, as well as Computer laboratories. The Champagnat Hall is a splendid facility that adds focus to the relandscaped quadrangle. This year the Astro turf was completed and the parking was re-designed and expanded. Mr Edey showed flair and vision in his cooperation with the Board of Governors of St David's in expanding the school and increasing and updating its facilities.

But these are all buildings which are, of course, very



necessary. But Mr Edey's greatest achievement has been in the non tangible things like human relationships, engendering a spirit of value and mutual respect among staff and boys, and creating a relaxed atmosphere where everyone in the school felt valued and had the freedom to express themselves. People have remarked on his gift of memory – the ability to remember persons and situations, especially funny and embarrassing ones.

As a practicing Anglican, it must have been a challenge for him to take on not merely a Catholic school but one with a Marian ethos so insisted on by the Brothers. Paul rose to the occasion magnificently and there was never any hint that he was not whole hearted in his commitment to the Marist ethos and to the Catholic religious dimension of St David's. He could easily have been a Catholic as he pursued these ideals and was always sympathetic to encouraging and maintaining the Catholic ethos of the school, even at times when other pressing academic or sporting functions threatened to muscle the worship component out. He was insistent on staff attendance at the weekly Mass and led by example.

His vision for St David's never ended at the status quo, content with the way things are. He was always agonizing over the ratio of black and white boys, desirous of increasing the number of the former to make St David's a true reflection of South African society. He was conscious of the privileged position of St David's located in Sandton and comprising boys from a small moneyed proportion of society often driven by secular and consumer values. He supported outreach programs like Co-Workers and SMILE and never failed to remind boys, parents and staff of the counter-culture values of St Marcellin, namely, modesty, simplicity and humility. A testament to this sincere concern motivated his colleagues to choose him as the principals' representative to JOCASO and also to the Catholic Schools Board where he made his mark.


Both Mr Edey and his wife, Sue, were gracious and warm hosts opening their home to staff and guests for



school functions. This openness is appreciated by staff and parents who enjoyed generous hospitality in the Headmaster's house overlooking the cricket oval.

At his final assembly with staff and boys, Mr Edey reminded them that they were the life-blood of the school; that they were the custodians of the ethos and values of St David's Marist College; and that they should "Take courage" and not shy away from exercising this responsibility.

And so, staff and students unite to wish Mr Edey well in his new enterprise while we treasure happy memories of his principalship of St David's Marist College.



Chaplain's Notes

This year has not seen any innovations or nine-day wonders on the religious scene. It has been very much the same basics: weekly Mass, Confessions, First Holy Communions and Confirmations. All these have gone off well according to the high standards we have established at St David's for them.

35 boys received First Holy Communion in July and 37 High School boys were confirmed in the third term. As every year, a few boys requested the Sacrament of Baptism and some requested reception into full communion with the Catholic Church. This has been an ongoing



and pleasing aspect to my ministry here at St David's.


A personal highlight for me was the invitation to participate in the celebrations for the founding of the Papal Swiss Guard 500 years ago in the Vatican. The highlight was to concelebrate the Mass in St Peter's with the Holy Father, Pope Benedict XVI on 6th May with a number of cardinals and the whole hierarchy of Switzerland. We were invited to witness the swearing in of 30 new recruits from the cantons in Switzerland that provide the guards, and to enjoy the sight of 50 veteran guards who marched from Switzerland and were met in St Peter's Square by the band and a detachment of present guards being warmly welcomed by the Holy Father. In the Committee Room of the school is a collection of Papal Blessings from Pope Pius XII who was reigning in 1941 when St David's was founded, and from each successive pope. So I took the occasion to obtain a blessing from the Papal Almoner in the name of Pope Benedict XVI for the staff and students of our school. This now joins the others framed and hung on the wall of the Committee Room.

Celebrating the High School Mass in Champagnat Hall involves transporting various requisites from the sacristy in the Chapel to the Hall and their return. I value the assistance of the sacristans who faithfully report each week for this duty. Sean Jamieson assisted by James Lowe, Brendan Stott and Antimo Osato, collect the chalice, communion bowls, breads and wine and set up the table-altar for Mass in the Hall. Gerard Kairuz and On the music front, Mr Dry and the Prep and High School choirs go from strength to strength. This has enabled me to introduce two new settings of the Mass and also new settings for the Responses, which adds variety and interest to our celebration of the Eucharist.

As I write this report, the new Chapel committee is meeting under the chairmanship of Mr Robin Smith and I am busy with the internal fittings and décor, trying to source what is needed to ensue that the St David's College Chapel will be worthy and artistically integrated in conformity with the Canon Law requirements for an altar and church to be consecrated.

On 3rd December we celebrated the last Family Mass of the year, which was also the final Mass to be celebrated in the school chapel. There was a good turn out of parents and boys, and Mr Willy Castle gave a moving history of the chapel and its usages over the years from his personal perspective of a boarder for 8 years, and then as a teacher. He has seen many changes, such as the altar affixed to the wall for the old Roman rite to the post-Vatican II liturgy with the altar free-standing for the celebrant to face the congregation, and for an ambo from which to proclaim the Scriptures. At the end of term I supervised the de-commissioning of the chapel, the storage of the furnishings so that it can become the art studio for the Prep school in 2007.



This year we had forty candidates for Confirmation. This year took on a different perspective in that Father Michael assisted the candidates in exploring their role in the Catholic Church. The candidates have been empowered to fulfill this task with the aid of the Holy Spirit.



The tension grew towards the end of the First Term, when they were to begin serving, but they soon settled and have served each week with great success. As time




Do you recognise this new species? The millennial boy drools over software like we used to drool over cars and V8 engines. His social interaction revolves around technology; he needs to feel digitally connected at all times; he learns by tinkering and experimenting; he is visually bound and likes to work at high speed; he demands instant feedback and gratification.

I am sure that you also recognise elements of this beast at home and often perhaps 'instant feedback' is more like feedina' `instant and gratification. Perhaps you have also witnessed his penchant for

wanting to do more than one thing at once and work, watch television and listen to music at the same time. He increasingly wants visual stimulation first before he gets to the text of the work that he is doing. He prefers working in a fantasy world rather than reality especially with exams coming up.

Of course at home you may already be SMSing your son to get him up in the morning rather than walking through to his bedroom. I am certain we are moving towards weblinks for different subjects, blogs for

writing, creative homework links, even support homework groups which can be via accessed internet; nevertheless the teacher remains place. The changing world requires our



teaching to be dynamic and to focus on meaning and opportunity; rote based learning is something of the past. This does not mean that reading and numeracy skills need to be neglected, in fact the core skills for success are developing at an early age appropriate

gamesmanship and cheating. Sport is big business and school sport has not been untouched. There has for some time been concern about the pressure on schools and school boys to perform at the highest level - one of the reasons why we and Boys' Schools Heads around country have withdrawn their schools from league tables on the Superschools website and in the Sunday Times. The associated dangers of steroids and other supplements are ever present because of the pressure to achieve. This is a distorted image of self-esteem, and in fact has the opposite effect. It is our role as parents and educators to develop in our captains of sport and our senior players the ability to be good role models, team players who play 'hard but clean', so that these values are internalised by our juniors. The self-centred narcissistic hero is not the answer.

This does not mean we must not strive for excellence and success - this should be part of all that we do. It must be accepted also that one often makes mistakes when one strives to achieve. The rotation of success and failure is directly linked to the process of learning. Overemphasis on winning can result in the negative energy of fear of failure. Sadly, huge expectations of society and parents place massive pressure on boys not to fail and hence the boys often shy away from taking risks and do not keep setbacks in perspective.

> St David's today is more diverse than the traditional boys' school model. We make every effort to offer a variety of opportunities at involved and develop themselves in activities which are different from their traditional team involvement, and which also interest them.

In the academic context, with talk about 'dumbing down' of standards in education it is important that we encourage our boys to aspire to higher things with the recognition that this does require work. Marcellin's love

What else are we about in the world of the new millennium? Parliament year will run from September each year and this will afford new representatives the opportunity to be familiar with the school before they are voted in.



An extract from his farewell speech to the school: October 2006

I love the way I can walk around in South Africa and never know what kind of people I am going to see, or what kind of accent I am going to hear. During my stay in South Africa, I have been to the most beautiful places, and I know for sure I will take home a wonderful image of this country. Places like: Umhlanga, Cape Agulhas, Plettenberg Bay, Kruger Park and all the other national parks, Johannesburg, Sun City, East London, and probably my favourite city in the world, Cape Town. Travelling in South Africa was a brilliant experience, and I enjoyed it as much as I could possibly have. I also learned a lot of the history, out of the way people fought their way for a free society, and I can see it happening now. People here are, if not more than, as friendly as the Brazilians, and there is no better feeling than walking around in a place that feels like home.

I leave with my perception of the school. I was also in a private school back home, but the differences are huge: a t-shirt was my uniform, I had 185 people in my classroom and I matriculated last year, when I was 17. We had no rules about shaving; about cutting hair; about saying good morning every time a member of the staff passes by; standing up when people come inside of the classroom. We did not have prefects. It took me a while to get used to school here, but now, this being my last day of classes; I know that I will miss it very much. The grounds, the teachers, my friends, the entire place! I will never forget my first day of classes, lost Brazilian, five days in the country: as soon as the bell rang, every boy in the class came and said, "hello" and helped me with my time table; a lot of people stopped by and welcomed me. Unfortunately, that would never happen in my school in Brasil, and you have no idea how much better my day felt after that, and also my entire stay in South Africa.

I have been blessed by being chosen to come to St. David's, and in the end, I would just like to thank the staff so much for being so kind and understanding the whole year; to wish the Matrics good luck in the upcoming exams; and thank them for putting up with me in their class the whole year. Thank you to the entire school for hosting me! I will deeply miss all of this!

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St. David's Annual Art Exhibition

The judging of the Art was performed by Mr Stuart Smith, an experienced former Art teacher, who said that it had been very enjoyable judging the Art Exhibition, as there were many creative, exciting and visually pleasing works. Artistic variety was added by means of the number of processes and techniques used.

Grade 8

Gary Beck was awarded first place, for his excellent Impressionist picture of a figure in the wind, his "writing" a face which showed his perception of when to limit the line, his elongated figure on a plank, and his self portrait. Second was Raymond Zambon, with his good self portrait, and a very bold Impressionist work. Third place went to Warren Ezzey, on the strength of a truly outstanding pastel drawing based on a Monet haystack: an excellent rendition of the effect of light on an object.

Grade 9

First place in Grade 9 went to Marco Carleo, with his superb drawing of a mielie, his landscape of shacks and skyscrapers, and his Surrealist painting of an octopus in the bath. Four boys tied in second place: Alex Fischer for his drawing of a mealie; Kyle Lacey for his family portrait; Chris Lai King for his meticulously drawn landscape, and Simon Ngwenya for his shacks made out of burnt matches.

Grade 10

First in Grade 10 was John Gilfillan, with his tree drawing showing careful observation and understanding

of the growth pattern, his subtle relief sculpture and delicate drawing of a dragonfly, and his fairly aggressive "Kandinsky" face, with its bold use of paint. Second place went to Bradley Donaldson, with his beautiful drawing of a zebra, and deeply carved relief sculpture. Third place was awarded to Elliott Marsden, with his beautifully textured abstract painting, his pointillist trees and relief sculpture.

Grade 11

First place was awarded to Thierry Langlois, with his exceptional skull painting and his combination of Beethoven and Kiss. Second place was tied by Nkateko Baloyi, for his sensitive use of colour - lavender and lime green – in his skull painting, and Byron King for his hand. Third place went to Westley Larkin, with his "van Gogh modernised" interior which had beautifully detailed touches such as the Iwisa bag and paint tin.

Grade 12

First place was tied between Murray Crichton and Adrian Gebers, Murray Crichton's baby had incredible power, and his 'children in the park' was excellent conceptually and in composition. His underwater scene with writing engraved in wax added a subtle touch. Adrian Gebers excelled both conceptually and technically with his classical painting with a modern element skillfully introduced, and his rowing scene, which was difficult to pull off, having a lightness of touch. His "shadows" painting was highly textured, and the semi-hidden writing gave it an added interest beyond the visual.

St. David's continues to impress in Olympiads due to the calibre of our aspiring Mathematicians.



The Robo Saints Nets an Award at the 2006 Open European Robotic Championship


The St. David's "Robo Saints", outdid 52 teams to win the project presentation award amongst stiff competition at the FLL Robotic Championships in Holland on 5-7 May 2006. The tournament organizers only allowed national trophy winning teams, and the event was held at the Technical University of Eindhoven, to form part of the institution's 50-year celebration. Aimed at children of 16 and under, the preliminary regional and national competition totalled over 70 000 participants from 30 countries that resulted in an international championship for 52 elite teams in Holland.

With "Surfing Safari" from the beach boys in the background, Lawrence Steyn dressed as a scientist (far right), explains to the judges how the team's adaptation of the Natal Sharks Board invention (The shark pod) can be used in a large scale application to make bathers and surfers 100% shark safe. Miles Demmer pretends to

The St. David's team chose to address the issue of shark conservation when, after some research, it became evident that 90% of the oceans big fish are gone and that sharks are being killed at a rate of 95million sharks per year! Making use of an electrically generated field between positive plates on the sea floor and negative plates suspended from floats on the sea surface the team proposed over stimulating the highly sensitive electrical sensors situated in the shark's snout, a k a "The ampullae of Lorenzini" by its biological term. (The technology and idea was an innovative adaptation of the South African designed "shark pod" from the Umhlanga Sharks Board.) Making use of a healthy mixture of scare tactics, role-play and comedy the team carried the problem situation and solution across to the judges on an intellectual and emotional level, which would impress from a 5year old to a sceptical scientist!

The overall winners of the European Championship were the Robo Genius team from Denmark and the International Champion's Award was won by the TR8 team from the USA.

The project section involves selecting an area of aquatic biodiversity, identifying the problematic areas and learning what the experts were doing. 

The intrepid budding structural specialists from the land of Marist surprised tester and teacher alike when they achieved 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th place! It was a sight to see top Grade 11 and 12 scholars from achieving schools trumped by our boys! The best of the St David's was young master, Christopher Judd with an amazing 73kg! It is noteworthy that the bridge that won the regional final was built by the pupil who had won the competition the year before. His design had and only bettered Judd's by about 7kg. Congratulations boys, you have done the school proud!

David Naylor is to be congratulated on winning a competition run by the African Graphics Association in which he wrote a computer program to produce a fractal image. He won entrance to AFRIGRAPH2006 which is the 4th International Conference on Virtual Reality, Computer Graphics, Visualization and Interaction in Africa. The conference was held in Cape Town in January.

According to one of the organisers of the competition which is open to high school learners from across the country, the standard this year was extremely high. The judges are doctoral students in computer graphics, and a senior lecturer from UCT, who is internationally known for his research on deformation (a graphics technique). 

THE CRUCIBLE

After the success of last year's musical, "Footloose", I decided to change tack a little bit and mount a straight play rather than a musical. The reasons for this were twofold. There were two expectations that I had at the beginning of the audition process: the first one was that not as many learners would audition because of the serious nature of the play and, secondly, that we would struggle to get "bums on seats" for the same reason. I'm delighted to say that I was wrong on both accounts. Over 100 boys and girls attended the auditions, and Mrs Susanne Human (Producer) and I were particularly impressed by the amount of talent coming up from the younger grades of St David's and St Teresa's, with whom we once again partnered up.

The brooding Matthew Alves (Grade 11) was cast in the role of John Proctor and the vivacious Kelly Botes in the role of the vindictive Abigail Williams (Grade 12).

The rehearsals proceeded and the cast worked incredibly hard. *The Crucible* is a very emotionally demanding play. There are very few light moments, and the cast are expected to engage fully in this emotional intensity for the entire two and –a- half hours! I am so proud of this year's cast for their unbelievable commitment and maturity in the way they handled this. Many of the audience members found it difficult to believe that they were watching school children, and many, including my own father, thought that we had brought adults in to play some of the roles!

In order to achieve the intimacy needed for an effective presentation of a play like *The Crucible*, I decided not to mount the play on the tradition stage, but, instead, to turn the hall around and place the actors on the same level as the audience, thus allowing the audience truly to feel part of the action – to see the blood, sweat and tears of the actors. I am pleased to say that this worked well. The hall was almost full every night, and the cast received a deserved standing ovation after every performance.

I have directed over twenty school productions. This year's highlight was the recording of a CD. The boys



Gultural Tour to Italy and Greece

Bill Bryson, regarded by many as one of the most prominent travel writers of our time once said, "I can't think of anything that excites a greater sense of childlike wonder than to be in a country where you are ignorant of almost everything."

And he couldn't have been more right.

For eighteen St David's boys, I being one of them, and twenty three Holy Rosary girls, the April holidays were saturated with childlike wonder, fascination and discovery, but then, travel has that effect on people, doesn't it?

Our incredible journey began with a transit flight to Athens before re-boarding to land in Italia, the home to beautiful people, fashion, culture, history and delicious ice-cream. After a brief tour of Milan, we headed for Verona, the setting of Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. Verona whizzed by in a haze of marble-pink skies and cobble stone roads.

The sights and sound of Venice enthralled us the following day. We visited the Doges Palace, the island of Burano, the Campanile tower and enjoyed some retail therapy before heading back to the hotel.

We then visited Maranello, the home town of Ferrari. We had a tour of the very red museum filled with fast cars, loud music and powerful engines before heading for Florence.

We visited the Uffizi Gallery, housing the most comprehensive collection of Renaissance art on the planet, before heading to the Academmia Gallery to admire the works of Da Vinci, Botticelli, Parmigianino, Caravaggio and (of course) Michaelangelo. We explored Rome by day, visiting the eerie catacombs of San Domitila, the Vatican Museum, Michaelangelo's frescoes of the Sistine Chapel, and St Peter's Basilica, the largest church in Christendom.



We left Italy on a buzzing high, not knowing what to expect for, as Fanny Burney said, "Travelling is the ruin of all happiness! There's no looking at a building after seeing Italy."

Athens: urban, flashy, crowded, and fast-paced. Very much like Jo'burg, but in Greek and with halloumi. We toured the ancient and culture-drenched city visiting the blindingly white marble Olympic stadium, the Acropolis ruins, Parthenon and a fascinating museum. A light drizzle accompanied our walk to a traditional Greek lunch in the Plaka, followed by some interesting shopping experiences.

A catamaran ride whisked us to the Greek island of Aegina. With luggage in rooms and keys in backpockets, we took advantage of some free time. The crystal blue pool beckoned many (despite the cloudy skies) and the beautiful rocky beach attracted a few while the rest remained in rooms, chatting and relaxing.

Our last day in Europe was spent visiting the sun-kissed sights of the beautiful island. The ancient temple of Aphaia and a magnificent Greek Orthodox church kept heads turning and cameras flashing.

We headed to the airport, evil eye beads in hand and heads filled with incredible memories, sights, smells, flavours and words. We revelled in the euphoria of our trip, culture-shocked, but satisfied on a quiet and gentle plane-ride home.

The next day was spent exploring Tuscany. We visited a picturesque vineyard called Villa Petriolo, the medieval Manhattan of Tuscany, San Gimignano and the town of Pisa.

Roma, the eternal city was next on the itinerary. We took a short detour at the quaint hilly town of Orvieto, admiring the incredible landscape and its enormous



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The aim of the Adventure Club is to instill in our boys a love and respect for the environment. We also provide opportunities for them to pursue healthy outdoor activities.




His hair. Unkempt. Dirty. Wild. "What do you think, Sam?"





As with any team sport, hockey is reliant on player involvement. The game can only flow and can only be played at its best when all are in agreement as to the game plan.


This season this singular focus has been developed: players are beginning to reap the rewards of following their given role; of working towards its attainability in the interest of the team.

Saying goodbye to so many matric players at the end of the 2005 season, left the door open to nine new first team players eager to show their skills and contribute to form a close-knit first team.




Under 16 A and B Hockey

Several players in this squad have considerable potential. The Churchillian never, never, never give up, is however something these boys need to inculcate into their approach.




Under 15B Hockey


Under 14 A Hockey

The major role of the rugby coach is simple, but certainly not easy. His role as coach is to assist a player to move into new space, be it, physically, mentally, or emotionally. From that simplicity comes all the joy, challenge, difficulty, skill and complexity of the role in action.

How does the coach carry out this role? He follows the golden rules upon which the playing of rugby is based. Firstly, the principles of attack: gain possession of the ball; use the ball to go forward; support the ball carrier; maintain continuity; and exert pressure to score points. Secondly, the principles of defence: go forward (with the support of team mates); to apply pressure; and regain possession of the ball; in order to attack (and so the cycle continues).

St David's rugby coaches are fulfilling this role. They are dynamic, they are searching for ways to improves the game, they embrace new ideas, they have your boys' interests at heart, and they really enjoy this game. The future of St Davids' rugby is safe in their hands. cacophony of noise around him. All of us would do well to remember the following (and perhaps whisper it in a needy ear):

- Children learn best by example. Applaud good play by your team and by members of the opposing team.
- Do not publicly question the referee's judgement and never his honesty.
- Support all efforts to remove verbal and physical abuse from children's rugby.
- Insist on fair and disciplined play; do not tolerate foul play, fighting or bad language. Coaches must be prepared to take off offending players.

So THE HEADMASTER'S REPORT ~

Good evening Chairman of the Board Mr Chappel, Chief Executive Mr Greeff, Chairman of the Foundation Mr Dalais, Guest of Honour Mr Webb, High school Head Mr Williams, Fr Michael, invited guests, colleagues, parents and especially - boys.

To those of you who assiduously read the weekly Newsletter - thank you. You will be aware of my humble efforts to start your weekend on a light hearted note "Smile with awhile!" As compensation for my hour long speech tonight, I offer you the following:

may not withstand a hurricane, but a forest will.

So, where is the parallel between our school and with the general principle of Ubuntu. It's quite simple. I humbly put it to you that we have had an exceptional year on many fronts. We have enjoyed success in almost every sphere of activity, but if we analyse the reason for this success, we will endeavour collective find underpinning much of it.

Even the occasions of individual brilliance at which we have marvelled could not have been achieved without team-mates, coaches, parental involvement and their support.

It is wonderful of course, to finally be able to stand proudly on a pedestal, but one must always be mindful of the care and thought that went into the construction of that pedestal, the cement holding it together and the strong hands and which will ensure that it does not topple over. Yes, this is Ubuntu here in action.

Once again, we find ourselves asking 'where the year has gone?' In the case of the Grade 7's, they might well ask 'Where have the last 7 years gone?'

A brief retrospection will show that we have been busy!

We saw two changes in senior management. Firstly, when our Business Manager Mr Forder retired and was replaced by Mr Mike Boden from St Henry's Marist and then of course, Mr Edey moved into the business world and Mr Mike Greeff joined us from that sector! Despite reservations from some about a non-educationist being at the helm, Mike's appointment has proved to be an inspired one. Without being patronising, I am happy to report that he has swiftly adapted to the change of environment, wholeheartedly embraced the special culture and values of our school and he is already making an invaluable contribution in areas, which are foreign to us as teachers.

In the second term, we undertook our 'Whole School Evaluation' exercise using the instrument developed by ISASA/ CIE called "School in a Mirror." As you may be aware, it is incumbent upon Independent schools to undertake an accredited evaluation on a regular basis. External appropriately trained moderators oversee the whole exercise and if applicable, endorse the findings. There are seven Key Performance Areas to be evaluated over a cyclic period and we selected the four most critical.

- Teaching and Learning.
- Attainments and progress. .
- Functioning of the school. .

"Ubuntu - we are, what we are, through other people." How true the great African idiom is when we reflect upon our school. The more simplistic analogy of Ubuntu is that: alone, a stick has no strength, but tied to others - it becomes strong, unbending, unbreakable. One tree Governance and management.

We received a huge amount of feedback from pupils, teachers and parents and from the latter group, the parents, the following statistics for the whole school (Grade 00 - 12) came through:

- 97% say their son is happy at school. .
- .
- 96% feel he is making good progress. 98.5% of our parents think the school's academic . standards are high.
- 95% feel the standard of sport is high. .
- 95% feel our cultural standards are high. .
- 97.5% feel their son is safe and secure here. .

But the areas we fall short in:

- 9% feel they are not too well informed of their son's progress.
- 35% think that petty theft is a problem.
- 11% think their child has been a victim of bullying.
- 11% have issues with homework.

We have and continue to evaluate and act upon the information we received and one of the big priorities for the New Year; is to address the security concerns raised, both personal safety and that of possessions.

Another major undertaking was the launch of the Foundation in October. It was a memorable event. The Foundation is going to be a crucial component of our school, as through this office, we hope to secure the school's preferred future and ensure it endures for our children's children. The major objective is to realise an endowment fund of R25 million which will be invested and projects undertaken from the dividends of that investment. Foremost amongst the major projects we have in mind for the Foundation, is the increase in the number of bursaries we are able to provide. Currently, these are funded from our annual operating budget, which is a less than ideal situation.

Development of the school's facilities has continued. Each year I stand before you and reflect on the changing skyline of our school. This year has been no exception. It gives me a sense of grim satisfaction to think back to the beginning of the year and the disaster that was our car park. I am quite sure that it was one of your worst nightmares about our school. We lived through six very trying months, of modification whilst it was expanded. At the same time, the astro was developed and we have subsequently enjoyed our first season of home matches. What a difference both have made to our lives here.

The next major development will be the chapel, the building of which is scheduled to commence in the first term. It is fair that I give warning that this will cause a good deal of disruption for a few months as we hope to 'twin' this project with a sorely needed expansion of Grade 4&5 classrooms, the latter in the August holidays. We will also have to build a new art room as the new chapel will be situated where the current art room stands.

We are also seeking Council permission to create additional parking along 1st Avenue and improve the waiting area there for our boys.

I often find myself pondering on what the greater aims of schools and therefore education are all about. It worries me that we are on a treadmill or rollercoaster, the pace of which is ever increasing.

Schools are microcosms of our rapidly changing society. We live in a pressure cooker here in the northern suburbs of Johannesburg. The pace of life is frenetic and we drive ourselves hard to achieve in everything we do. We seldom stop to consider that our children are caught up in our wakes and are dragged along behind us. Do we ever make that conscious effort to take a step back and have a good look at our family's lifestyle? We are so caught up in pursuing our dreams and financial goals that we forget to look after ourselves. I believe that the majority of us pay far more attention to ensuring our cars receive regular and thorough services, than we do in checking on the state of our families. Once or twice a year, we charge down to the coast, or overseas, for a week or two and then for the remaining 50 - it's back to that relentless treadmill. We think that our children are 'doing fine' because they don't tell us otherwise. They are coping well at school, they are heavily involved in their sports and cultural pursuits and heck - they're young and naturally fit and Sadly, this is one of the great well adjusted. misconceptions.

I think our current generation of children are under the greatest pressure ever witnessed, wars notwithstanding. We all keep pressurising them – their own peer group, you the parents and we the teachers. You pay big fees and want 'bang for your bucks' and we make rabbits jump through hoops accordingly.

We are not called the Human RACE for nothing. As schools, we are involved in a facilities arms race, a sports results race and pursuit of academic excellence race. If the school in the south builds a rocket launch pad – we all follow blindly like lemmings. Astro turf fields, design technology centres, hundreds of computers and so on. This is not to say that these things aren't important – they are, but where will it all end? You need have no fear on one issue however. St David's will NOT be following the example of Mr Webb's school with its unique feature! It is not a project in our own pipeline!

Every year, we seem to add to the boys' programme. We turn up the speed on the treadmill. It is a matter of school pride that we single-mindedly set out to 'be the best' in everything - from sports results to facility provision. Once on it, it is extremely difficult to get off that treadmill. My fear is how long we can continue to sustain this pressure until someone's legs finally buckle. Like many things occurring in our country, we just shrug our shoulders and accept situations - then get on with our lives. The time is rapidly approaching when someone needs to pull the plug out of that treadmill and to step back and ask, 'what on earth we are trying to do.'

It is certainly not my intention to sound like a prophet of doom, but think we all need to ponder this issue. I was genuinely worried about the future when I read the predications of that intellectual giant, Stephen Hawkins. Last week he predicted that it wouldn't be too long before we have to move to other planets as ours would not sustain us forever. What he was saying is that the human race: is racing itself towards an abyss. Science fiction? Maybe, maybe not!

I would now like to turn my words to our current Grade 7's who are leaving us.

Your predecessors in 2005 set a standard that, quite frankly, I didn't expect you to match. They were an exceptional year group with talents across the full spectrum of school life. You, the class of 2006 have stepped out of their shadow into the bright sunlight of your own array of wonderful accomplishments. It is a constant source of amazement; just how much our boys mature in every respect in Grade 7. At the beginning of each year we can literally look down at the boys, but by the end of the year we generally find ourselves having to stand on a step in order to look them in the eye! What a talented group they have been!

To begin with, Matthew Peter became our fifth Mini City Council mayor in ten years. This is an enviable statistic and it highlights that St David's boys are confident, strong public speakers, good leaders and importantly, are prepared to make a difference to those less fortunate in life. The Major closed Scholarship to our high school was won by Matthew's mini council partner, John Sherry and secondary scholarships were won by James Thorne and Celso Zuccollo. Within its ranks, this group of boys possess some supremely talented sportsmen and this year Michael Sherratt (for cricket) and Anthony de Vincentiis (for swimming and athletics) and Fabian Ruszczynski (for swimming) were awarded sports scholarships to our high school. It didn't end there either! Murray McDougall for swimming and Declan Ahern for general sports ability, won scholarships to Kearsney College in KwaZulu Natal and the Wildman triplets received Sports awards to King Edwards. At our extra curricula awards ceremony last Friday, we heard of some of the outstanding sports achievements

in our school and the current Grade 7's were at the forefront, setting the example. They anchored our 'A' swimming team to remain unbeaten for our sixth straight year. They were the top athletes as we defended our title at the Prestige Athletics championships and in cricket they scored 6 centuries this year and took 2 hat tricks. Yes, boys, you have done yourselves and your school proud. You have raised the crossbar for next year's Grade 7's.

We wish you well as you move into the next exciting phase of your school careers. I dedicate the following words to you:






cogs and oiling the chains in order to ensure that the journey was a great success. They were without doubt the best crew that any boat could have.



A number of boys had suggested titles or series that I must get for the library, so I took myself off to a number of booksellers to seek out the boys' requests. I was reasonably successful and was able to acquire some of the titles.

A visit from "The Travelling Bookshop" brought a number of new and reasonably priced books for us to buy. It is always a successful way of encouraging boys to read. A number of parents generously bought and donated books for the library. Thank you parents for your support.

My small, team of dedicated Media Monitors was a great help to me in the smooth running of the Media Centre. Thank you boys, I do appreciate all that you did in the library. Miss Mowale joined us at the beginning of the year and quietly gets on with the day-to-day chores of keeping a library in order. Her help is greatly appreciated. Thank you Miss Mowale.

We were fortunate to have a new author, Shaun Chapman, speak to the boys about taking care of the environment and how we can help to become more environmentally conscious. The purpose of his visit was to launch his first novel, "Rocky in the Wilderness". Rocky is a Staffordshire terrier and Shaun's faithful companion. Shaun and Rocky both autographed copies of the novel for the boys. One of the teachers' biggest concerns is that boys seem to stop reading once they reach Grade 6. Ilse Tennant and Thane Haarhof have reviewed a number of books suitable for Primary school children. They have a company called "Handpicked Books". Boys are able to visit their website and choose books from the books on offer. Once the boys have read any books from their choice of books, they can write a review of the book, recommending it to other young readers. In June 2007 all these Book Reviews will be judged and children stand to win some wonderful prizes. A number of the boys have submitted reviews; I wish them luck in this competition.

It was International Library Day on the 23 October. The boys were encouraged to bring one book that was in good condition or a book that they had finished reading or outgrown to school. We collected between 500 and 600 books. These books were then given to Holy Cross or "Lourdes Private School" in Diepkloof. One of our aims is to start a library for the boys and girls at Holy Cross. Our next step is to obtain a computer and a library software program so that we can process these books and keep track of who has borrowed the books, so that they have a functioning library

We hosted a reading workshop over 4 weeks organised by NUE. Kirsty and a colleague, both from Crawford Benmore, ran the workshop. We invited the Foundation Phase teachers at Lourdes Private School (Holy Cross). These teachers found it to be most helpful and went away feeling inspired and ready to try out all the new ideas. We hope the books the boys donated will go a long way to achieving improved literacy.





2006 has been a wonderful year for both the music and drama in the Prep school. St David's now offers the following music and drama activities and I will deal with each one as a separate heading:

THE PREP SENIOR CHOIR OR SAINT MARCELLIN SINGERS

In 2006 I have tried to combine the high school and prep school choirs as much as possible, but in many cases it is possible for only one of the two halves of the choir to perform. Chorally, 2006 has been an exceptionally busy and productive year. The Prep Senior Choir now has approximately 50 boys (all auditioned) and the full choir has over 90! We started off with a bang in the first term with the Choir Concert (formerly the Choir Supper Show). This year's theme was "Africa", and the audience was entertained by the Prep Junior Choir under the direction of Mrs Sharon Jones, Mrs Louise Browne and Mr Ron Thackwell, who performed extremely well, especially considering how little time they have to rehearse. The full choir or "Saint Marcellin Singers" as they are now known as, performed a set of African songs from Namibia and South Africa and the evening was a huge success.

The Prep Senior Choir once again participated in the Grayston Magic of Music Festival at the Linder Auditorium where, once again, they brought the house down with their renditions of The Okavango Songs, Mbobe (The Lion Sleeps Tonight) and Weeping.

The third term has been especially busy, with the choir participating in a number of activities. Firstly, the choir recorded a CD. The prep library viewing room was used as a very suitable studio, and the boys were given the day off to record ten numbers including the African program. Our very sincere thanks go out to Kreesan Pillay and his engineers, who gave of their incredibly valuable time to record the CD for free. We are so grateful! At the time of writing this article, the CD is currently being edited and we hope it'll be ready for sale by the Carol Pageant.

Next came the International Burns Foundation Conference Opening Ceremony at Constitution Hill. Here

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the choir again entertained an international crowd with a section of the African program and were given a standing ovation.

The Prep Senior Choir also performed at the St Stithian's Choir Festival with over 500 choristers. Here, again, they performed with aplomb and were, arguably, the best choir there.

At the time of writing this article the choirs still have a busy rest of the year ahead of them. They will be singing at the launch of the St David's Foundation, The Valedictory Mass for the matrics, The High School Prize Giving and, of course, the big choir event of the year, the annual Carol Pageant.

The main function of a choir at a church school is to support the religious services, and in this duty the choir has been exceptionally active. We now have at least one joint mass each month, and the choir has performed various numbers including Be Still And Know, Psalm 23 and the Sanctus from Gabriel Faure's Requiem at these services.

This year also saw the introduction of our choir uniform. It is a black Mandarin shirt with gold printing of St David's Marist, Inanda on one breast and St Marcellin Singers on the other. 2007 promises to be another fantastic year. Thank you to everyone involved for all your support.

THE MUSIC CENTRE

The music centre continues to go from strength to strength. At the time of writing there are over 120 boys taking private instrument lessons. The instruments being offered are: Piano, guitar (electric, acoustic, bass) drums, flute, fife, recorder, saxophone and clarinet.

We have had two concerts where the boys who are learning instruments get to perform in front of an audience of their peers and parents. Both evenings were extremely successful, and I hope to have even more next year. I am always amazed at the amount of talent we have at St David's, but would like to remind the boys and parents that talent is not enough. If your son has chosen to learn an instrument, please encourage him as often as possible to practice. Remember, learning an instrument is a lifetime endeavor.

The music and drama at St David's continues to raise the bar every year. Thank you to all of you who have supported this vital aspect of education at St David's.

IsiZulu in the Prep School.

IsiZulu additional language is taught to all boys from Grade 0 - 6. In Grade 7 they are expected to choose between Afrikaans and isiZulu and this will then become their second language moving into the high school.

The aim of our curriculum is to develop vocabulary and introduce grammatical rules which are then applied to the written and spoken word. There is also widespread use of comprehension involving reading simple stories and answering questions thereon.

Underpinning this is the rich culture and heritage of the Zulu nation, its Kingdom and the structures present in Zulu society. Through all facets the boys have been receptive to the lessons and have responded well in class.

Communication skills are honed in less formal ways. Oral presentations, role playing and conversation
