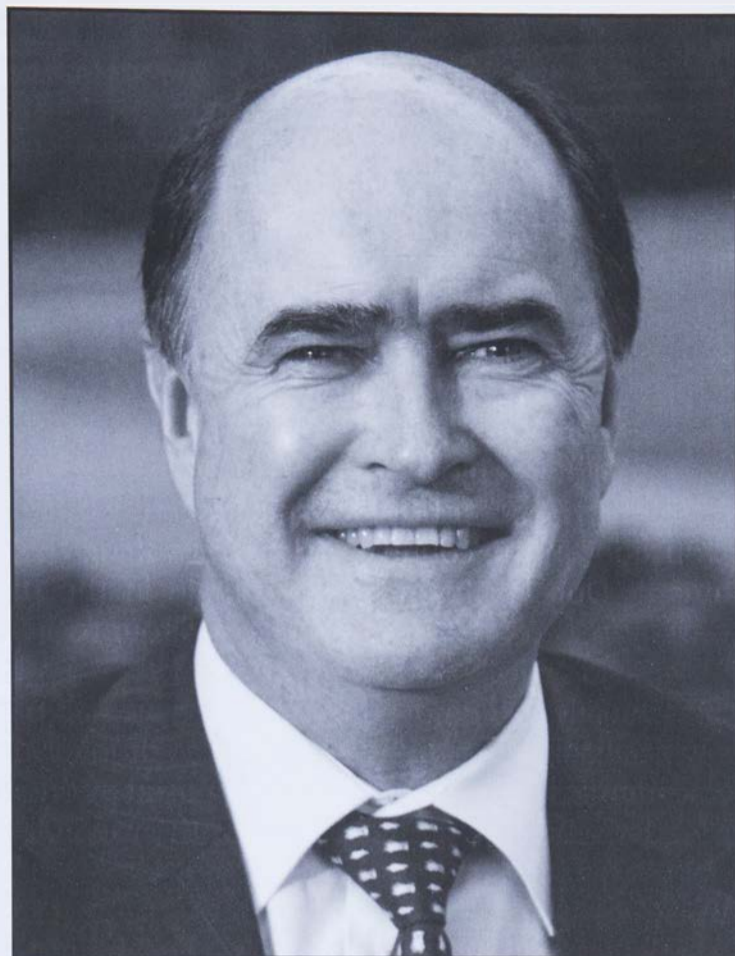

HEADMASTER'S ADDRESS



Mr Malcolm Williams

"Space Oddity" by David Bowie captured the aura of space as the last frontier which abounded in the 1960s. The song, inspired by Stanley Kubrick's "2001 - A Space Odyssey", was released in 1969 to coincide with the Apollo 11 Mission to the moon. On July 20, 1969, Neil Armstrong stepped on to the moon's surface for the first time uttering those immortal words, "That's one small step for man, a giant leap for mankind".

Good evening, Dr Britten, Mr and Mrs Greeff, Mr and Mrs Wilson, Father Teboho Matseke, Chair of the Board Lachlan Harris, honoured guests, members of staff, parents and the young men of St David's.

We have an uncanny way of remembering where we were at key moments. There was no TV in South Africa in 1969. I remember sitting on the carpet in the lounge at home with my brother having tuned the old radiogram, which still had valves, into 'Voice of America' and listening to the live transmission of Neil Armstrong's first words as he stepped on to the moon. It was one of those global moments where my brother and I felt that Neil Armstrong was representing us also, and there was a tremendous sense of euphoria and achievement that we shared. In some ways it was all the more real because we heard it and did not see it.

There was a reason for us not having television. Albert Hertzog, Minister of Posts and Telegraphs, warned that "Inside the pill of TV there is the bitter poison which will ultimately mean the downfall of civilisation." Television came on line only in 1976, seven years later. Of course, given some of the shows on television, perhaps Albert Hertzog was closer to the truth than we care to admit.

Massive leaps in technology mean we have to take a conscious decision these days to escape from our in-tune world. A journey to the remotest caravan park may not do it anymore. The odds are you will have someone close to you with his portable satellite dish or Drifta who is determined not to miss an episode of "Days of our Lives", "7de Laan", "Big Brother 12" or Manchester United's recent narrow loss to Manchester City.

We now get everything, good and bad, in glorious technicolour and the barrage of information is unabated and overwhelming. How we access information has changed also with our Web 2.0 world of interactive social media, the latest leap forward.

An example of this is that less than five hours following the announcement of the death of Steve Jobs, 1.4 million tweets were posted; by the next morning 2.5 million tweets had been posted. While newspapers and magazines were being pulled from the printing presses and lead stories were hastily being replaced, the news had gone viral.

In George Orwell's "1984", written in 1949, Big Brother maintains 24 hour surveillance over all the people on Earth. The Party is in control and the Ministry of Love and the Thought Police are there to deal with miscreants. Each home has a telescreen with brainwashing propaganda; images are transmitted back to the Thought Police; Police Patrol helicopters prowl the skies above the suburbs. This depiction of a centrally controlled totalitarian society strikes a chord - this technology exists today and the computer has made it all possible.

The world of IT has probably been the real frontier of Major Tom's exploration. Man's fascination with computers and artificial intelligence is evident in the world of film. For example, there is Skynet, the controlling AI in "Terminator" and there is "The Matrix" where the Virtual Reality programme for pacification of humans, who are the food of the machines, dominates proceedings. Who could forget the deadpan face of Mr Smith with those dark glasses....

When I was in Grade 9 I remember a trip to Wits University for a computer expo. We viewed large machines with tapes turning erratically in their special holders. There were some screens with keyboards also where we were able to play noughts and crosses against the computer. My claim to fame was I beat the computer. The staccato phrase "Ah, you got me!" which appeared on the screen showed the programmer had a sense of humour - even though he wasn't great at noughts and crosses.

The development of IT since then has been exponential. Today smart phones hold 16, 32 or 64 gigs of RAM. They do everything our computer does and more. We can talk via Skype with anyone in the world.

In 1994 the World Wide Web was launched. Facebook was registered in 2004. As of July this year there are 800 million plus active users of Facebook. Mark Zuckerberg is the world's youngest billionaire.

A key person in the development of our world today has been Steve Jobs. The outpouring of emotion following his death prompted me to investigate in more depth. John Ostrick, writing about Jobs and Apple says the following: "He was building a whole experience and culture around that technology - not marketing, sales, branding, product development, but a coherent offering that has a multi-faceted value to many." When chosen as Fortune Magazine's CEO of the decade, Jobs was hailed for relentlessly pursuing new Apps.

Have a look at this ad flighted for the first time at Superbowl 18, 1984. This ad, to launch the Apple Mac Computer, gives an indication of what Jobs was about. By using the clever play on George Orwell's "1984" he presented the Apple Mac as a way to break through the shackles of the world we were

in - which is exactly what it did in the world of computers. In luring the Pepsi Executive, John Scully, to Apple, Jobs famously said: "Do you want to sell sugar water for the rest of your life, or do you want to come with me and change the world?" Steve Jobs lived his dream. He had the passion and desire to succeed, and he was driven by a grand vision.

As a School we are already part of this changed world. Currently we are piloting Apple and Android software and Apps in certain classes. Staff are embarking on online assessments, creating subject-specific blogs, posting info on Moodle and receiving work electronically. Does one go the laptop, notebook, Apple or Android route? Does one focus on smartphones remembering that in South Africa 80% of internet access is via mobile phones? These are the matters receiving our attention. The relationship between teacher and pupil is now different. The "sage on the stage" is now more the "guide on the side." Our teaching needs to be "blended", combining "face to face" with online learning.

There is biological evidence to support the fact that struggles make you smarter; the brain in fact functions like a muscle - no pain, no gain. You will remember that Anthony Artemides challenged you in his final assembly speech to step up and become more involved in the development of your school and not passively wait for the staff or management to do it all for you. Our continued focus on the spreading of pupil leadership opportunities through portfolios, activities and house structures reflects our intent.

Academically the same applies. You will be required to participate more, to collaborate with others more in a focused, meaningful way. You will be required to take responsibility for using and not abusing internet and cell phone accessibility. You will need to understand you are accountable for what you present or write in these public forums. In any event, the colloquial, casual register of social media cannot break down the formal nature of the teacher-pupil relationship; there are boundaries which must be respected at all times.

So, sorry chaps, the foot will not be taken off the accelerator next year. We are moving into an exciting phase in our education in St David's, as we grow our IT footprint.

In the midst of all this are the people. On 27 January 1941, the day our school opened its doors, there were 2 billion people in the world. On 21 July 1969, the day of the lunar landing, there were 3.6 billion people. The birth on Monday of Danica Camacho in the Philippines symbolically took the number of people on the planet over the 7 billion mark. The population South Africa now numbers over 50 million.

Why not merely work online? We believe the "face to face" part of blended learning is central to who we are at St David's Marist Inanda. Our task is to ensure we build relationships with each other - one of the key ways we can give meaning to being part of 7 billion others. We use words such as "family", "brotherhood" and "camaraderie". We are 70-years-old this year, and our school is rich in tradition, and espouses an ethos which is a touchstone that provides guidance as we travel, like Major Tom, towards new horizons.

The School's 70th year has been a fine one, again based on the high levels of commitment by the staff and the boys. These achievements include the continued dominance of our A and B Swimming teams, our academic profile evidenced by our top achievers, including a National Accounting Olympiad winner, our top two places in the Tour de Maths, and our intrepid Future Problem Solvers, who made their mark in international

competition. "Back to the 80s" was a hit, and the continued growth of Music in the School bodes well. The Choir excelled this year, receiving numerous standing ovations, and we look forward to hearing all our Music sections this evening. Here tribute must be paid to Ms Belinda de Villiers who has in her four years at the School placed St David's very firmly on the map in this area. Well done and thank you.

The 1st XI Hockey were Aitken finalists, and remain one of the top sides in the country, the 1st XV Rugby squad set the tone for the whole section, in terms of performance and attitude, and our Rugby boys enjoyed a very good season across the board. Our 1st XI Soccer boys retained their position as one of the top sides in the country, including winning the Kloof Tournament. Our 1st Team Tennis remain in the premier League. Our Cricketers enjoyed a successful tour to Sri Lanka, and our St David's Soccer and Twenty 20 Cricket Festivals were run professionally and enjoyed by all. We have had national and provincial selections in nearly all areas of involvement. On the academic front, St David's is recognised as one of the top 30 feeder schools to UCT, and one of the top 20 schools writing the IEB Examinations.

These successes rely on each man doing his bit, and is why we value the commitment of each player in every team and activity. We are not complacent; nor can we afford to be.

The sense of camaraderie and support across the pupil body remains a huge strength. You welcome those new to the school and include them with a minimum of fuss. The seniors continue to make their mark as mentors, and each year more boys grasp the power of positive example and servant leadership. The Matric Group have maintained a high level of involvement in all areas of School life. Anthony Artemides's call to you to remain actively involved is backed up by his own example, both in participation and leadership. Anthony, you have never asked others to do things you have not committed yourself to, you are direct and you cut to the chase. You have formed a very good team with Jason, in leading the School, and we have enjoyed your one-liners in assemblies. Jason, as Head Prefect, your mantra has been for the boys to take responsibility and get on with it, and not waste time pointing fingers at others when the chips are down. There is no doubt this has contributed to the success of this year. You have not shied away from the difficult moments which Head Prefects have to confront; you have overcome the frustrations of a debilitating injury, and one of your strengths is the compassion and support you are able to show to others in their time of need. Thank you Jason and Anthony for your contribution in leading the School this year.

It is a privilege to be part of the passionate and committed staff at St David's. Our staff has a true sense of vocation, and I am excited that over 17 St David's Old Boys have over the last 12 years joined the teaching profession. My thanks to the parents and to the staff for their support, and in particular, David Smith, Nick Clogg and Alan Redfern. Thank you also to Mike Greeff, Rick Wilson, Board Chair Lachlan Harris, and members of the board for their counsel and support.

In closing, I return to the world of space. Steve Jobs also founded Pixar, the film animation company. One of his first successes was "Toy Story". Rather than focusing on the disconnected, and rather overwhelmed Major Tom in his tin can, Buzz Lightyear, for me, encapsulates the creative spirit and positive energy that was Steve Jobs. Let us also, as we boldly go where others have not been before, echo Buzz Lightyear's aspirational call to arms: 'To Infinity and Beyond!'

We welcomed Mr Alan Redfern as Deputy Head: Extramurals and he settled in to this demanding role very quickly. It is no easy task managing the complex extramural programme in our very busy School and Mr Redfern worked very closely with the heads of the various sports and activities to ensure that things ran smoothly. The festivals hosted by St David's were most successful and overseen by Mr Redfern. Mr Redfern's balanced, objective approach to issues he has dealt with as Deputy Headmaster has received a positive response from his colleagues and the boys. His calm manner in interacting with others has been appreciated.

Mr Michael Smith joined us as Head of Art from Maragon Private School. Over the year Mr Smith quietly established himself in his field of expertise. He is an artist in his own right and has enjoyed working with and getting to know the boys under his tutelage. He is clearly passionate about this subject and has also made a positive contribution to broader matters of policy within the School; we have no doubt he will continue in this vein going forward.

Mr Herbert Mudzingwa joined the Science Department from Parktown Boys' and he also has enjoyed a sound start to his career at St David's. Mr Mudzingwa has a genuine concern for the individuals with whom he interacts and he has enjoyed good relations both with the pupils and his colleagues. His friendly, open manner is a tonic.

Mr John Jericevich, an Old Boy of St David's, joined the English Department and he settled very quickly into his new role. Mr Jericevich is a passionate and enthusiastic educator and he has established a positive rapport with all the boys that he has taught; in addition, he is fully involved extramurally and has contributed positively in this area.

Mr Pat Lenye joined as RE Co-Ordinator from Holy Family College and he has used the first year at the School to settle in to his new role. A key area he picked up was the preparation of the boys for their Confirmation ceremony towards the end of Grade 11 and this is an important part of the boys' development over the year.

Father Teboho Matseke joined us as College Chaplain and one of his first tasks was participating in the Grade 8 Camp. It was very good to have Father Teboho with us for the whole period of the camp where he was able

to get to know a number of the senior staff and also the new Grade 8 group joining the School. Father Teboho's genuine concern for others and his relaxed manner has resulted in his settling very quickly at the School and the boys and staff enjoy their interactions with him.

On the extramural front, we also welcomed Mr Stan Gospodinov who assisted us during the mornings as well as continuing as Director of Coaching in Water Polo. Mr Gospodinov is an enthusiastic member of staff and we are pleased to have him with us on a more full-time basis.

In terms of Staff Development, we congratulate Mrs Glenda Dell who completed her Science Education Honours Degree at the end of 2010; we congratulate Ms Nicci Glanville who completed her MSc Degree during this year - a tremendous achievement.

Mrs Anneke Carter retired from St David's at the end of 2011 having taught at St David's for 22 years. She joined the School on a full-time basis in 1989. Previously Mrs Carter taught in a part-time capacity at the School from 1987. It is difficult to sum up the impact any person makes over a period of 22 years but there is no doubt that Mrs Carter made her mark on the School.

Mrs Carter is a warm, caring person and was always concerned for the needs of the individual; she often performed a caring, motherly role to many of the boys under her tutelage. This ability to focus on the individual was also evident in her teaching where she often spent much of her time after hours, including whole weekends when necessary, to provide one on one input to many of the students that she taught across Grades 8 to 12. Her students benefitted from her attention to detail in assisting them with their work, particularly in the areas of drawing and painting. She always encouraged boys to push boundaries in terms of their ability.

Mrs Carter also was not prescriptive in terms of the style she wished boys to follow and this enabled them to express themselves and develop their own ideas. This was evident in the Art Exhibitions over the years with many original works of high quality on show. There are various works by Mrs Carter and her pupils around the School. The Staff Room area has also a number of the combined paintings completed by juniors over the years. Mrs Carter's involvement in the School went beyond her subject and her areas of involvement included the completing of certificates for awards; the assistance from an administration perspective with various sports events and functions, and of course in recent years

her work on the sets for major productions resulted in settings and scenes being created with authenticity and quality.

Mrs Carter is described by her colleagues as a kind, gentle, thoughtful and caring person who is always willing to spend time with those pupils or staff who might require support. Her friendly presence was always appreciated and she was always an enthusiastic supporter of various staff functions. Mrs Carter is well-read, has intellectual curiosity, a quick wit and is an artist in her own right.

We thank Mrs Carter for her significant contribution to the School. We wish Mrs Carter well as she explores new opportunities; we shall miss her.

In her four years at St David's, Ms Belinda de Villiers's impact as Director of Music and Drama was significant. This area of school life has developed both in the Prep and the High School over this time. Ms de Villiers's role included major productions and soiree evenings across both schools, Inter-House Competitions in Music and Drama, the development of a number of Choirs and Marimba Bands across both schools as well as a Jazz Band in the High School. In addition, Music is now offered as a subject from Grade 10 through to Grade 12. The School also now performs in a number of High School Choir Festivals where our boys have performed with distinction. All of this has been achieved on the back of a huge commitment of time and energy by Ms de Villiers. It is her drive and enthusiasm which has been an important factor in the growth of Music and Drama at the School, and she also ran the Department most effectively. Ms de Villiers is an excellent musician in her own right, especially as a pianist, and we wish her well as she takes on a Masters Degree in Music Practical. Our thanks to Ms de Villiers for her contribution to St David's across both the High School and the Prep School.

Mr Sbu Hlongwane was involved in the teaching of isiZulu First Additional Language and Drama over the past few years. Mr Hlongwane's pupils enjoyed his lessons in both isiZulu and in Drama. Mr Hlongwane established a very positive rapport with those whom he taught and this was also evident in the area of extramurals where he was involved. He enjoyed his Soccer coaching particularly, as well as assisting with Hockey. Mr Hlongwane moved on promotion to grow isiZulu through to Matric at his new school and we wish him well in this endeavour. Our thanks to Mr Hlongwane for his contribution to St David's.

Mr Chris Carey has moved to the Midlands from the start of 2012 where he has taken up the position of High Performance Sport Scientist and will also be teaching Physical Education. A key innovation from Mr Carey was the personalised conditioning programme set up on Moodle which we shall be building upon this year. Ek het gedink dat ek veilig was, maar ek was verkeerd.

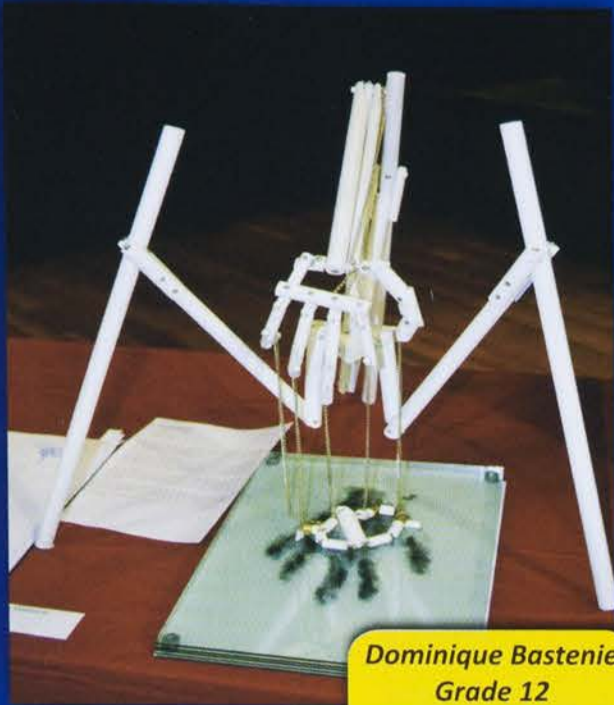

ENGLISH

The English Department at St David's is a busy department. We teach all 544 learners in the school, and we are passionate and committed about what we do. This has been a year of growth within the Department: we welcomed Mr John Jericevich and we are also fortunate to have Mr Andrew McArthur teaching English again.

This year a record 36 St David's boys entered the English Olympiad. The theme for 2011 was: Confession and Consequence including extracts from: Measure for Measure, The Crucible, media coverage of the Tiger Woods affair and 2 Samuel, chapters 11 and 12. We commend all the young men who participated in the 2011 Olympiad; special mention must be made of Max Schomburg and Ryan Skirving who attained silver merit awards. We also congratulate Michael Gustavo, the 2011 recipient of the Trudy Elliot Shield for literature. This award recognises achievement over an entire High School journey. Michael has impressed the English department throughout his High School career with his love of reading and his insightful and mature appreciation of literature.

Perhaps the biggest news for the English Department in terms of curriculum development in 2011 was our involvement in the Advanced English pilot programme. The theme for 2011-2013 is Power and Powerlessness. This is a course introduced by the Independent Examination Board for the first time this year. St David's was fortunate

to be one of sixteen schools in the country to run this programme in 2011 as a pilot project. The programme will be implemented in all schools that write the IEB examinations from Grade 10 to Grade 12 from 2012. While many Grade 12,11 and some Grade 10 boys, volunteered for the programme, the absence of formal timetabled slots has made the programme challenging both to facilitate, and to participate in. However, some stalwarts have remained focused and determined, and their perseverance has made the programme worthwhile. Alexander Radford and the other unsung heroes will sit the first Advanced Programme English examination at the end of November, and we wish them well for this 'pioneering' experience.

English Home Language is a vast discipline with wide application. We teach grammar and the fundamental elements of the language, but we are also concerned with the heritage of the language; its evolution, the psychological applications of language through thinking and reasoning and, of course, effective communication. In an age where communication is often constrained by trends and popular culture, it is imperative to equip St David's men with the critical reasoning skills to communicate their thoughts independently and articulately.

LIFE ORIENTATION

The Value of Life Orientation

Life Orientation is a relatively new subject and is typically very different from the traditional academic subjects on offer at St David's. The subject has become entrenched in the new curriculum and has been further solidified in the new outlines being implemented in Grade 10 for 2012. Therefore Life Orientation is one of the 'core' subjects needed in order to get a NSC Qualification and university exemption.

Life Orientation looks at the personal, intellectual, emotional, spiritual and physical development of learners. At its core, Life Orientation strives to enable learners to be effective in their community and society, now, and in the future.

Leadership, and in particular, leadership development, forms a vital part of the curriculum from Grade 8 to 12. The opportunities for leadership are varied and numerous at St David's. They include: Parliament, captains of extra mural teams, leading and organising various cultural and outreach programmes, leading of various portfolios. Every grade attends an annual camp, and these camps are designed specifically to develop leadership knowledge, skills and values.

The focus areas of Life Orientation in the High School are:

Careers and career choices/ the world of work:

The learners engage with various topics in the following areas: study skills; further study opportunities; university/

college applications; job application processes and interview skills; and the value of working. Grade 9 and Grade 11 learners are required to complete a Job Shadowing Project.

Recreation and physical wellbeing:

Here learners learn to make healthy exercise and eating choices. The focus is to instil a lifelong capacity for physical health and, of particular importance, the role sport and physical exercise plays in the development of boys.

Citizen Education:

Learners develop skills and values to enable them to participate effectively in society. This includes: acceptance of diversity through learning about diverse religions and culture; constitutional knowledge; human rights and responsibilities; and developing a social conscience through community service and awareness. A minimum of 30 hours of community service is required in Grade 10 to 12 to satisfy the passing requirement of Life Orientation in Grade 12.

Personal wellbeing and development:

Learners develop knowledge, skills and values that enable them to make healthy choices for physical, emotional, social and spiritual health. Learners develop strategies to: enable decision-making; manage conflict; cope with peer pressure; choose healthy relationships; and make healthy lifestyle choices (exercise, nutrition, alcohol and substance abuse).

MATHS

Some of the favourite items were: "Kitchen chemistry" which used normal household items for exciting experiments that fizzed and burned and produced wonderful colours and smells; the laser light show which had everyone on their feet dancing; and the Maths Mojo which saw a couple of our young men sporting new T-shirts that they won in competitions. Talks on rallying, astronomy, biomimicry, use of electron microscopes and demonstrations with rockets and robots filled the time completely. The group took part in a murder mystery evening which was aimed at improving the chances of South Africa developing its own DNA database. The grand opening on the Friday evening included the address by the keynote speaker, Dr Tiplady. He gave a whirlwind tour of the Square Kilometre Array project and the MeerKat project and left participants feeling optimistic about South Africa's chances of winning world approval for the project.

Saturday morning saw a rainy, cold day when we were participating in the Robotics Competition. The workshops on the previous days had seen many improvements occurring on the robots that had been built during the holidays. The teams 'burnt the midnight oil' making last minute modifications to their robots. During the day, there were long hours of waiting and watching other teams playing, interspersed with frantic moments of chasing ping-pong balls around a "soccer field" with the robots and doing hasty repairs. In the end our boys did not reach the final, but so much was learnt from the experience.

Royal Society of South Africa Essay Competition

Mr Mudzingwa, Mrs Dell and Ms Glanville marked the essays and submitted the best to the Royal Society of South Africa's annual essay competition. Celso Zuccollo was awarded 2nd place and Matthew Savadier and Kyle Saunders received Merit prizes for their essays, "Is the Square Kilometre Array (SKA) telescope project justified?" Michael Gustavo was awarded a merit prize for his essay, "Is green chemistry sustainable in South Africa?"

Materials Science Trail

Mr Mudzingwa and Mrs Dell entered the Grade 10s in the Materials Science Trail. The following boys were awarded a special award for outstanding artistic and graphical presentation: Jason Hanf, James Long, Senzo Mutswana and Philip Rumpelt.

St David's was awarded a special award for the school with the most consistently high standard of entries overall and received R2000 for the Science Department. The boys whose projects were selected for entry were: Rogan Bell, Lance Brogden, Robert Brown, Grant Caister, David Coleman, Jason Hanf, Hugo Johnston, Jayme Kingaby, James Long, Kyle McCauley, Devon Morris, Senzo Mutswana, Grant Perry, Philip Rumpelt, Max Schomburg and Jordan Shrank.



Mythbusters at St David's

This year the theme of the annual Science Expo was Mythbusters which put an interesting spin on the experiments carried out. Presentations included a video of the experimental work. Waseem Seedat and Jordan Stier received the gold medal in the senior category for testing various materials including stockings, duct tape, dental floss and toilet paper that could be used to tow a car.

The winning project in Grade 8 investigated melting plastic with a water bottle on the dashboard of a hot car by Arthur Dobson and Andrea De Lorenzo.

Science Outings

Yebo Gogga Grade 8 learners attended the annual Yebo Gogga exhibition at the University of the Witwatersrand.

Paleosciences Grade 9 learners were led on a fascinating tour of the Paleosciences department at the University of the Witwatersrand. Highlights included seeing the intricate and detailed work preparing the fossils.

Sci-Bono Grade 10 learners visited Sci-Bono to investigate waves, sound and light. The boys enjoyed many of the interactive exhibits which are always being updated and extended.

Grade 11s went to Sandton City armed with bathroom scales to determine the acceleration and deceleration of the lifts. The data they collected also enabled them to calculate the height travelled between floors.

Acid Mine Drainage in the Krugersdorp Area - Grade 11 learners were taken on a fascinating if frightening tour by Mariette Lieferink of the Federation for a Sustainable Environment sponsored by Rand Platinum concerning acid mine drainage (AMD) and radioactive tailings dumps and dams in the Krugersdorp area. We visited Tudor Dam informal settlement situated on a radioactive mine dump, tested the pH of Robinson Dam and saw water gushing out of a ventilation shaft and a chemical water treatment plant that neutralizes the water with limestone. This also causes the toxic heavy metals to precipitate out but leaves the water very high in sulfates. Mariette Lieferink will run a workshop for learners and parents with more detailed information on these environmental challenges at St David's early in 2012.

The Future Problem Solving Programme has reached maturity this year, two years after its initial introduction to St David's and to South Africa. Although we started the year with an enrolment of thirty invited lateral thinkers, by the time we completed the qualifying booklet in August, we had eleven young men who had lasted the pace. Fortunately, our booklets (comprised of future-based problems requiring research and creative thinking) made the grade and two teams with three reserves were invited to Australia to take part in the National Competition. We are affiliated to the Australian branch of the world-wide organisation until we have enough other schools following the programme to run our own South African competition.

The competition took place at Sea World, Gold Coast, Queensland. Each of us has brought back lasting memories and experiences from meeting Australian people, discussing schooling, living styles and training as well as all the things that teenagers talk about. The competition itself was an eye-opener, as we came to realise just how many hours of dedicated preparation had been involved in reaching the finals. Our teams were very adequately prepared, thanks to Eva Biebuyck's help, but we know how much work will be involved next year to improve our levels of performance. A difficult part of the competition was the performance section, where we had to market ideas proposed in the competition booklet through a dramatic presentation. We were under-prepared for this activity, having not known that the practice is to prepare well in advance, using props and keywords that have to be included. Our "new boys on the block" status

counted against us - but we'll be ready for 2012! One team, comprising J.P Da Costa, R Lockwood, V Petrarolo, M Mol and D Peters, has been invited to take part in the International Finals at the Indiana University in Bloomington, Indiana, from 7th to 10th June 2012.

The tour was not purely work. We spent five glorious days in Sydney, taking in the famous sights. One of the highlights was a five hour cycle tour of the city, with a humorous guide who egged us on! We experienced our own Master Chef competition when each team had to cater for the group's suppers. Fortunately we have some budding chefs and no one went hungry! On-going high spots for the boys were the many times they found free internet to be able to contact friends - fingers were busier with messaging than eyes were with sight-seeing. Another lasting memory is watching our active young chaps throwing a rugby ball to each other at every opportunity, including around airline passengers and their luggage - there's no stopping a keen South African in the midst of the Rugby World Cup!

Hopes are high that the boys will maintain contact with Australian students they met during the three days of the competition. We look forward to meeting some again in 2012!

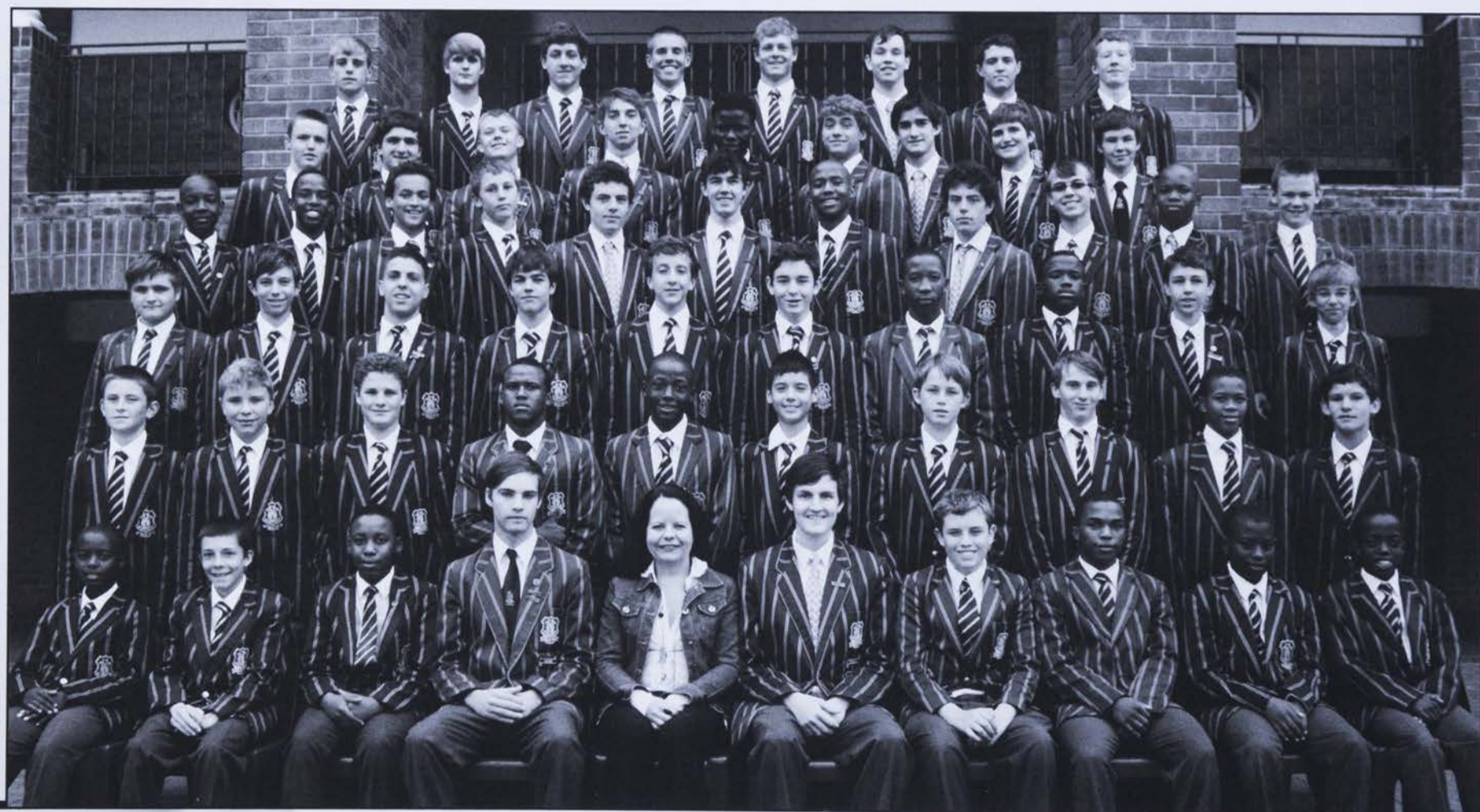

Major Production 2011: Back To The 80s

From the era that brought the world The Rubik's Cube, Max Headroom, and The Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles, this "totally awesome" musical is in the style of movies such as Back To The Future, Ferris Bueller's Day Off, The Karate Kid, and The Wedding Singer.

Set in the USA, Back To The 80s tells the story of the senior class of William Ocean High School that graduated in the 1980s, as remembered and seen through the eyes of Corey Palmer (Lloyd Armstrong), who is now 30-something.

The then 17-year-old Corey (Matthew Zambon) is madly in love with his next-door neighbour, Tiffany Houston (Caitlin McKenzie), one of the coolest girls in the school. However, she barely notices this, as she is too busy mooning over Michael Feldman (Stuart Smith), the hottest guy around. Michael and his friends are athletic and good-looking - the kind of guys that Corey and his two best friends dream of being. However, while they may not be the coolest guys in school, they are still one up on Feargal McFerrin III (Daniel Peter), whose best friend is his computer, and who believes the crazy notion that one day CD's will replace cassette tapes. Other friends of the various 'gangs' were played by Claire King, Christopher Khoury, Siyabonga Sepotekele, Daniel Donaldson, Nicholas Bayly, Severin Curtis, Bronwyn Kodisang, and Rahiwa Mashudu-Tobane.

During the year, several new students arrive at the school - Mel and Kim Easton (Gaby Raad and Kirsten Dinnie) - the all-singing, all-dancing twin cheerleaders, and Eileen Reagan (Eva Baatsch), whose life becomes a nightmare when Michael and his gang start to send her fake love letters.

Meanwhile the teachers are having issues of their own. Mr Cocker (Mark Hodgson), after being in a relationship for two years with the apparently conservative English teacher, Miss Sheena Brannigan (Ruth Stephenson), confiscates an old edition of Penthouse from a student, only to discover that his girlfriend is the centerfold.

Throw in a Star Wars dream sequence, high-energy dance routines, the obligatory 80s party scene, copious amounts of blue eye-shadow, twenty cans of hairspray, as well as some of the most popular songs ever written, and the result was a musical that delighted and amused audiences of all ages.

After having staged a rather heavy and complicated production in 2010, I decided to take on a lighter, more fun musical this year. However, just because the music

is fun and the storyline is light-hearted, it does not mean that it was easy or less work. I was once again fortunate to have a cast, band and crew from St David's and St Teresa's who took on this challenge on with no hesitation, and we staged a professional production with almost full houses on all four of nights.

The cast from St David's and St Teresa's spent many late, grueling hours rehearsing over a period of ten weeks, and every single cast member should feel very proud of what they achieved.

I once again had a strong team to support me: Mrs Sue Soulsby, assisted by Mrs Alison Smith and Mrs Michelle Khoury, sourced and made costumes of exceptionally high quality; Mrs Glenda Dell co-ordinated the ticket sales and front of house; Mr Willem van der Merwe and his team spent many hours constructing the set; Mrs Anneke Carter co-ordinated the painting of the sets; Mrs Tiziana Harris and Mrs Colleen Kennedy co-ordinated the backstage team; Mrs Susanne Human, Ms Heather Joseph and Mrs Louisa Nortje ensured that the cast was professionally made-up. Mr Byron Ray was once again our professional sound engineer; Mark Paterson headed up the lighting crew and Mrs Shelley Watson and Mr Jon-Jon Dry made sure that everyone was well fed. The Band must be commended on a job well done once again. 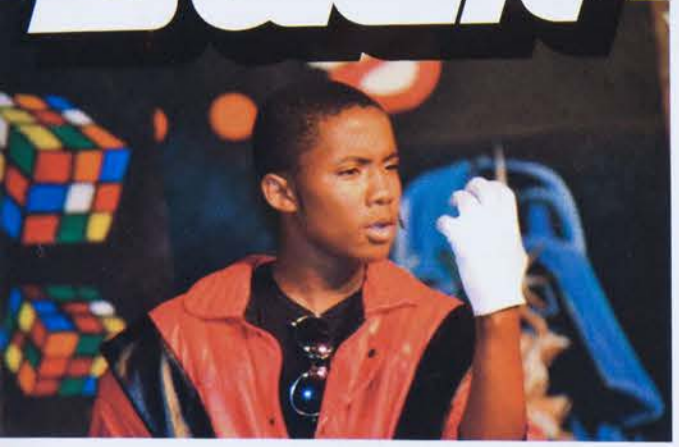

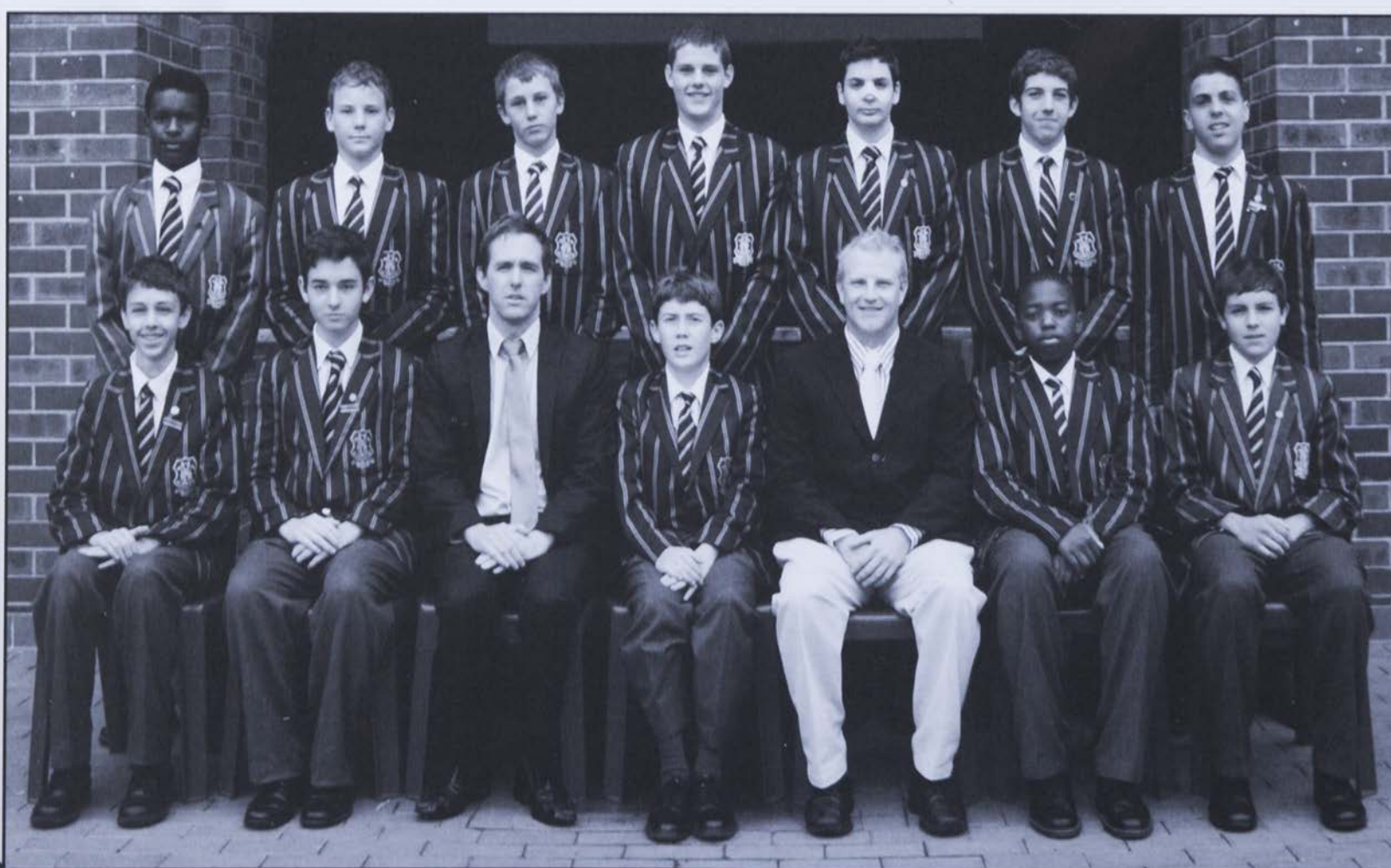

Thank you to Adrian Marcia for his coaching, and his ability to inspire the boys to enjoy Debating.

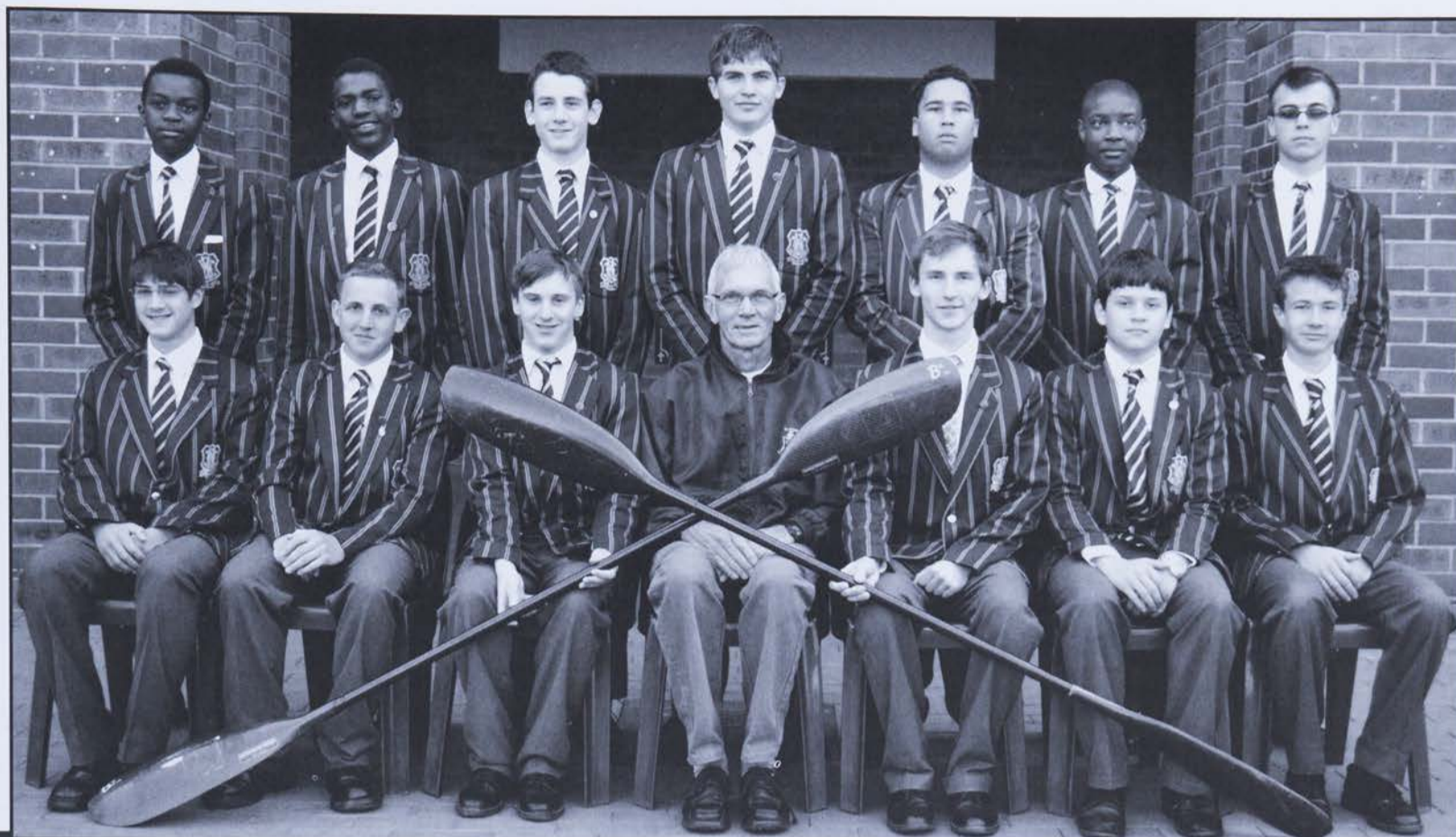

Well done to all on a wonderful season.

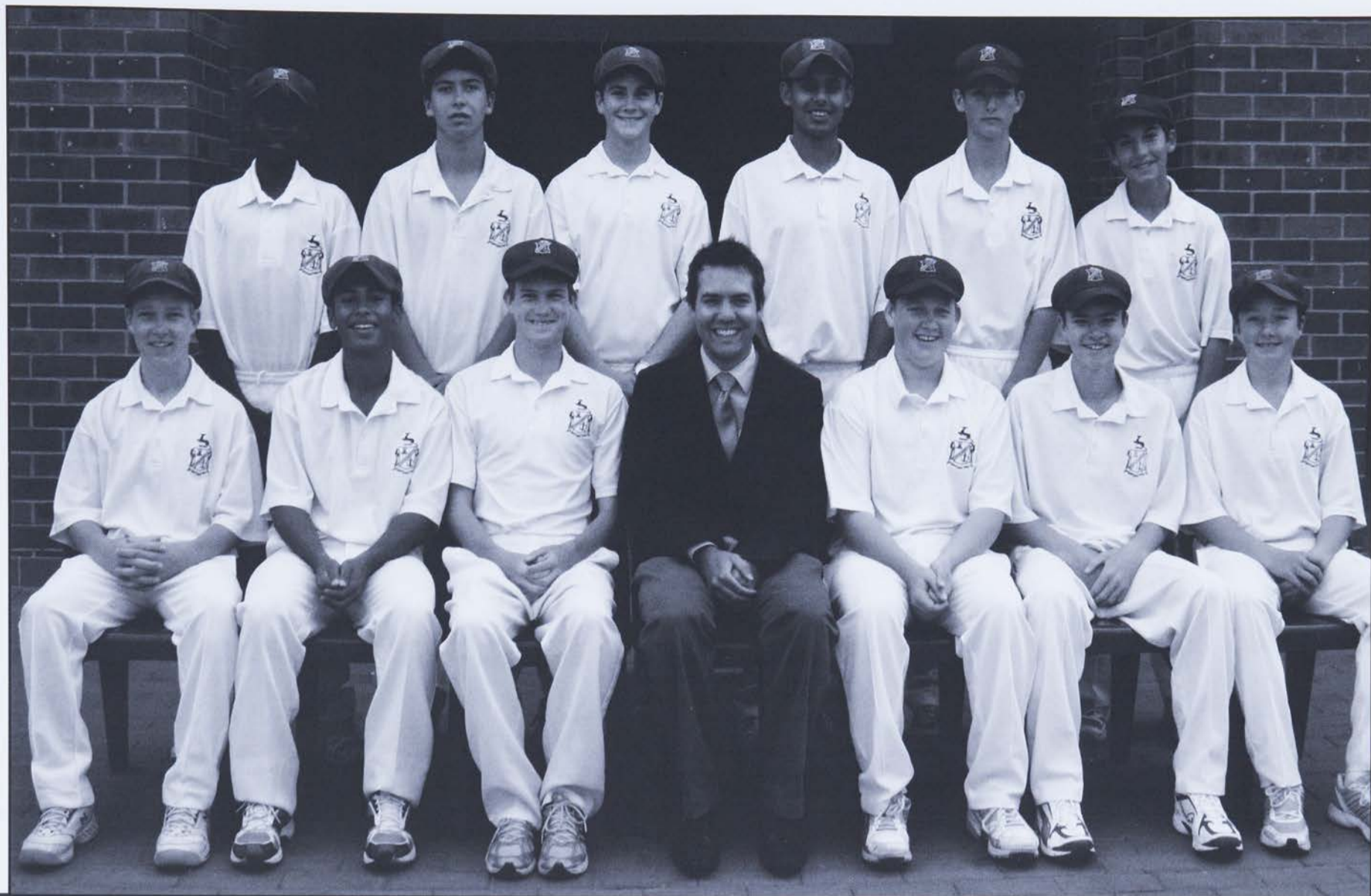

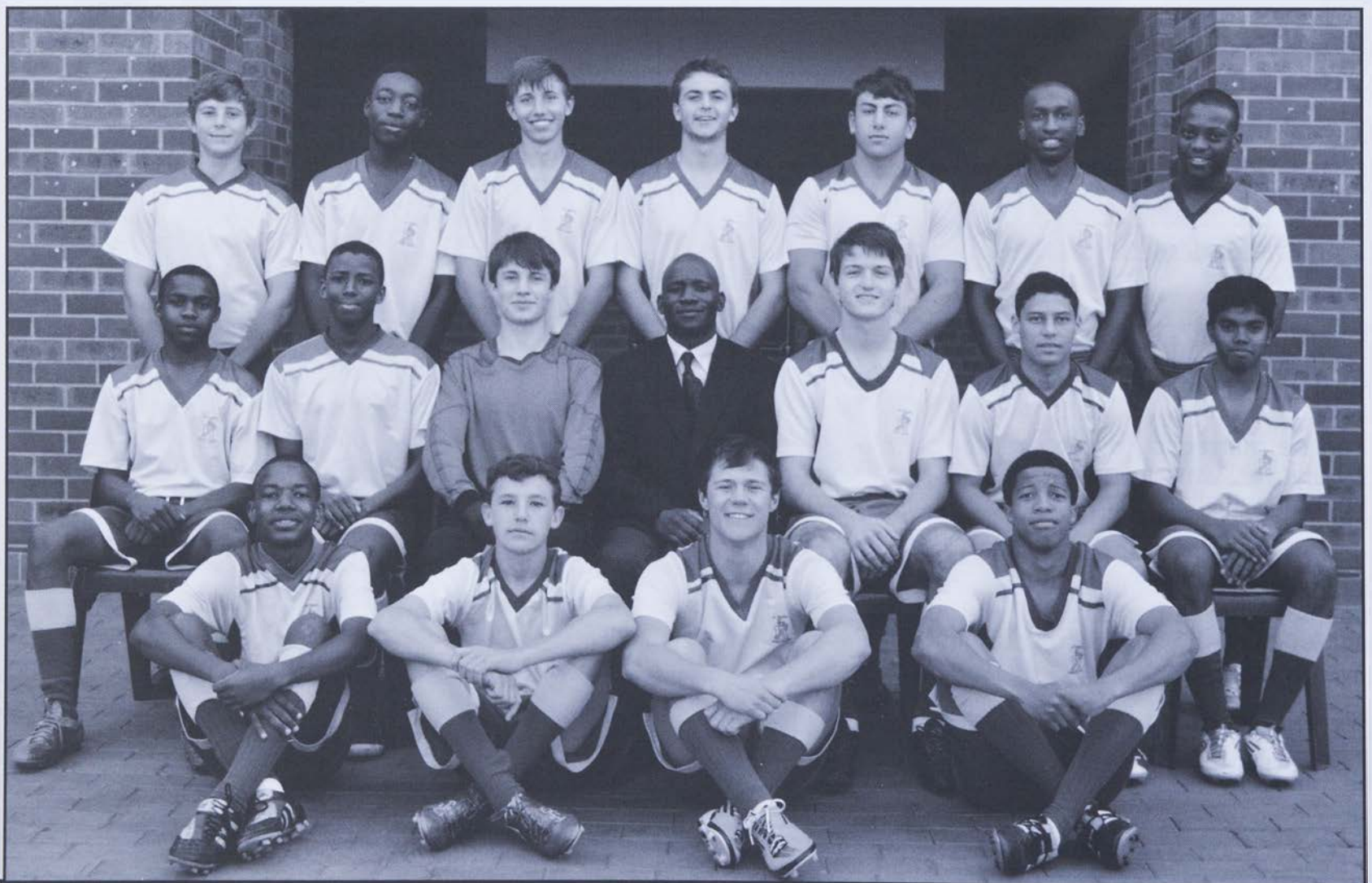

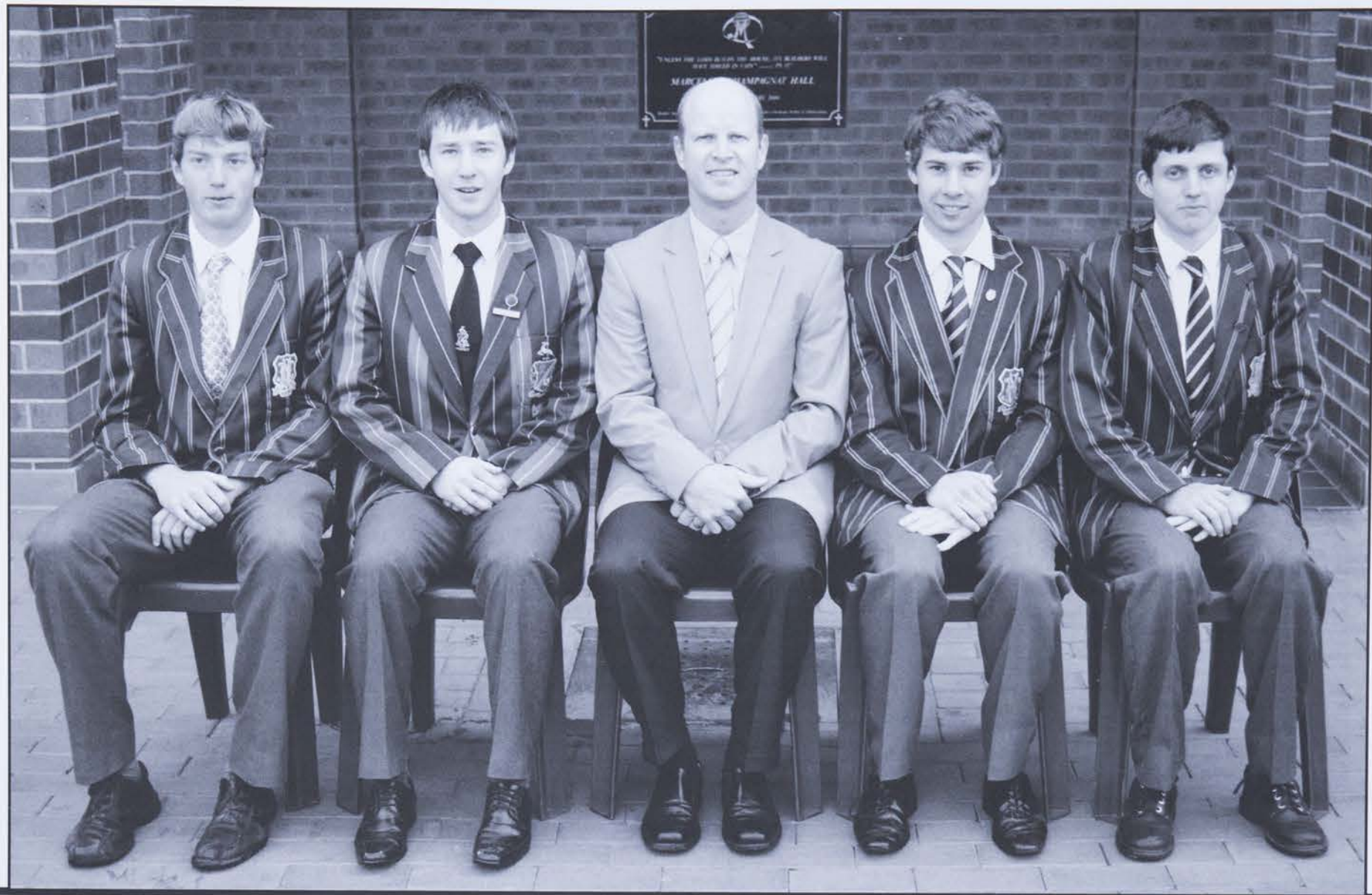

The A Team played 13 games, winning 6, drawing 3 and losing 4.

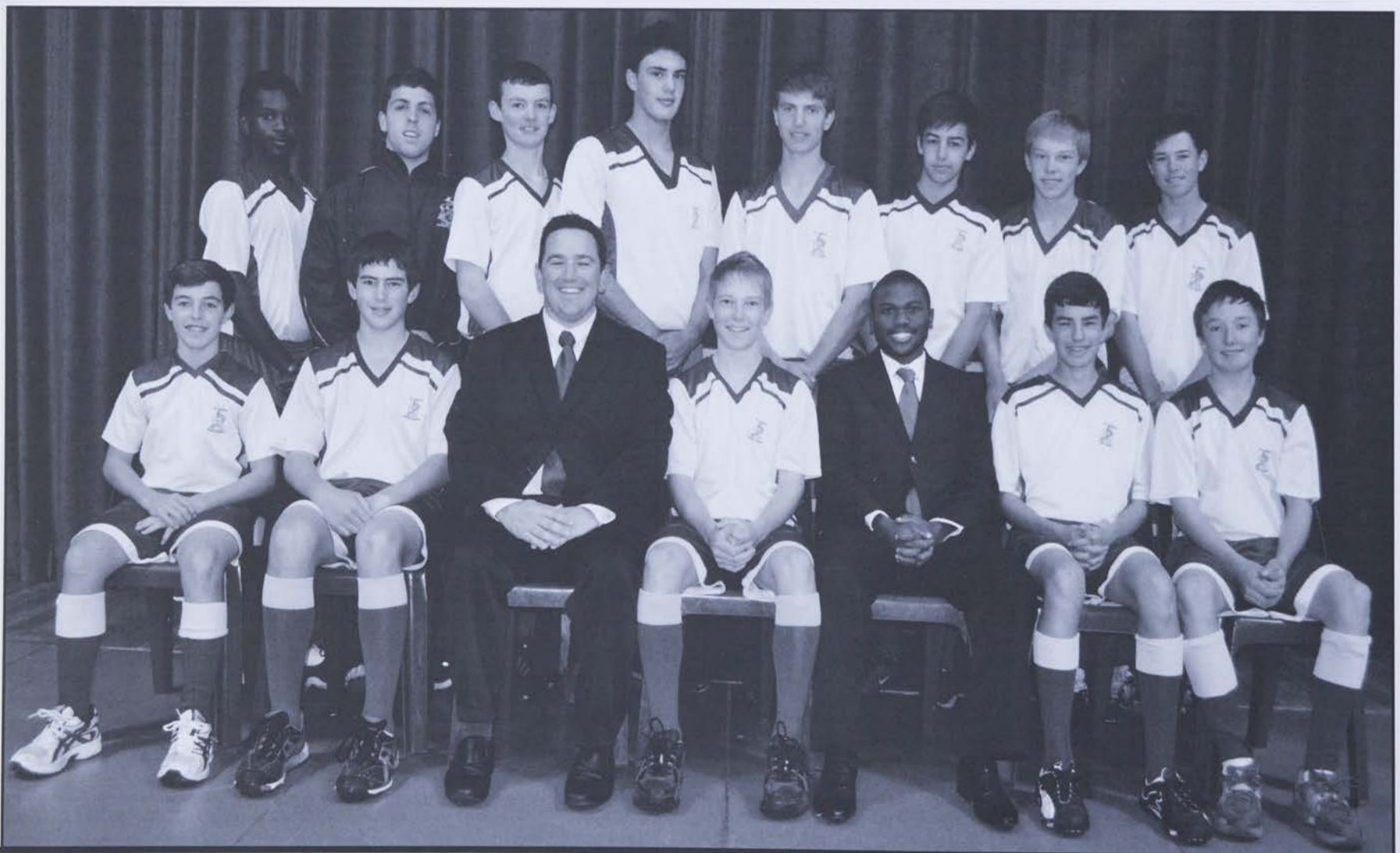

a 70% win record and an 80% no loss record. With only 2 losses and a draw the entire season this team had one of the finest records in the school.

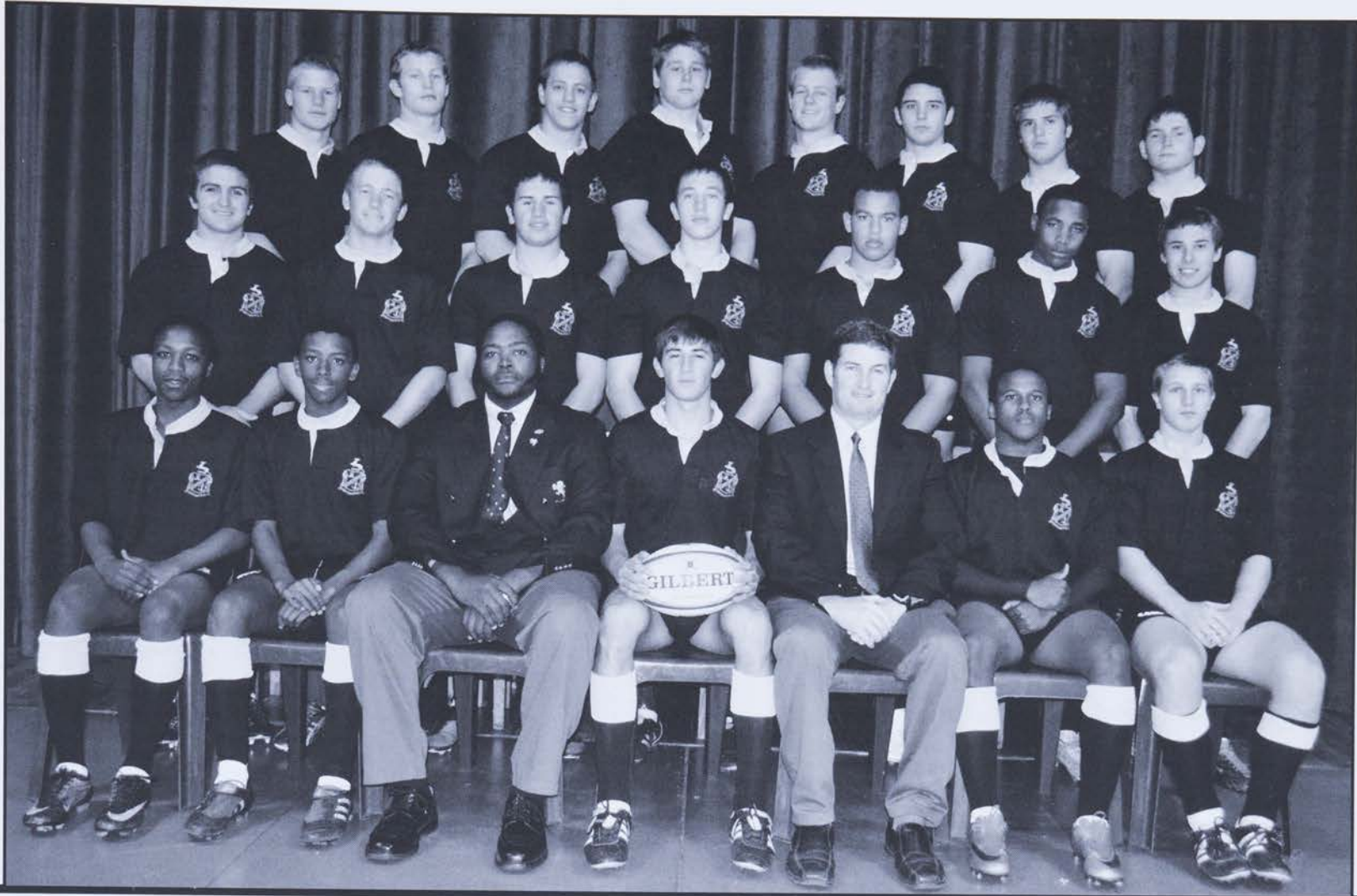

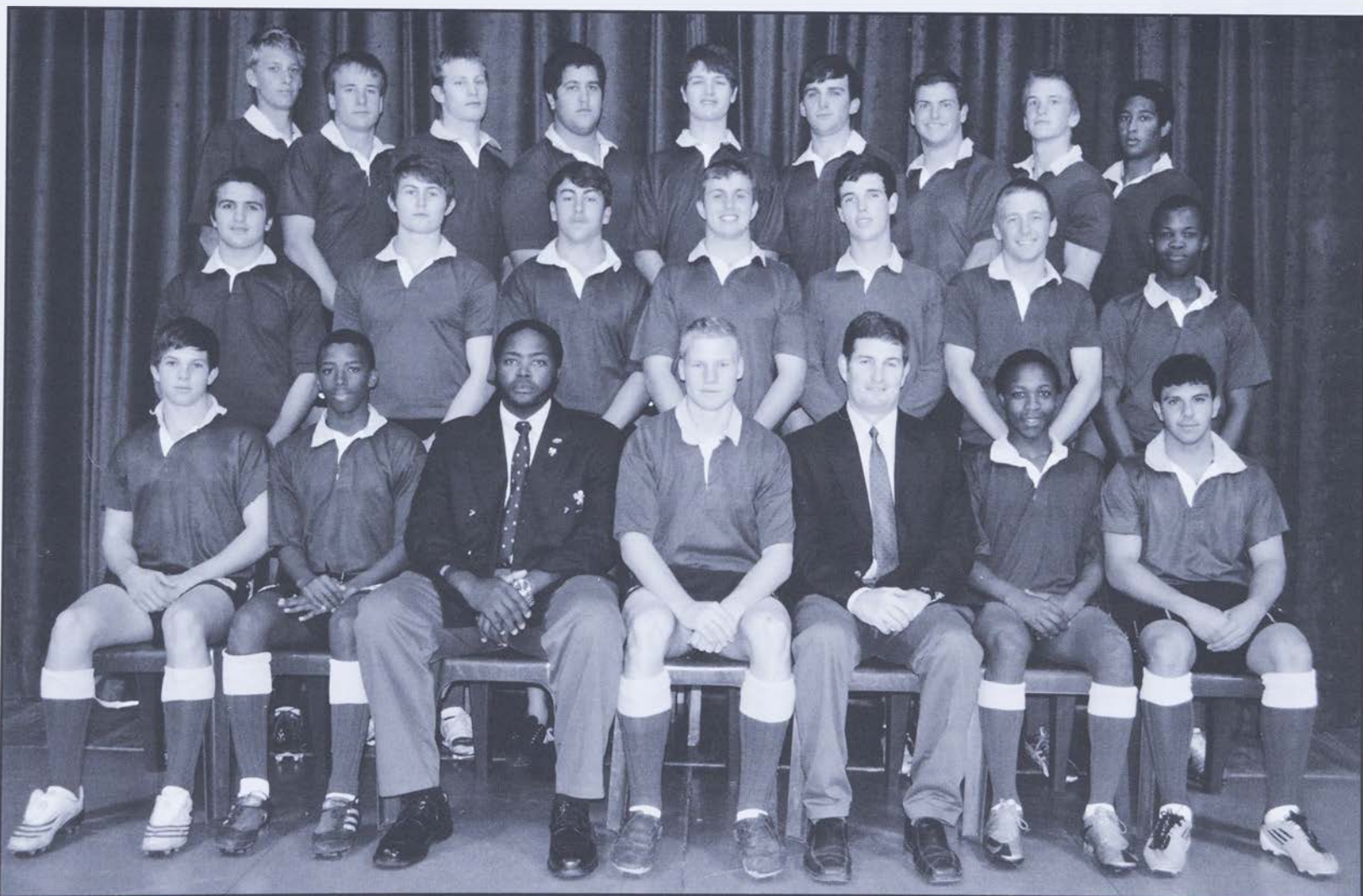

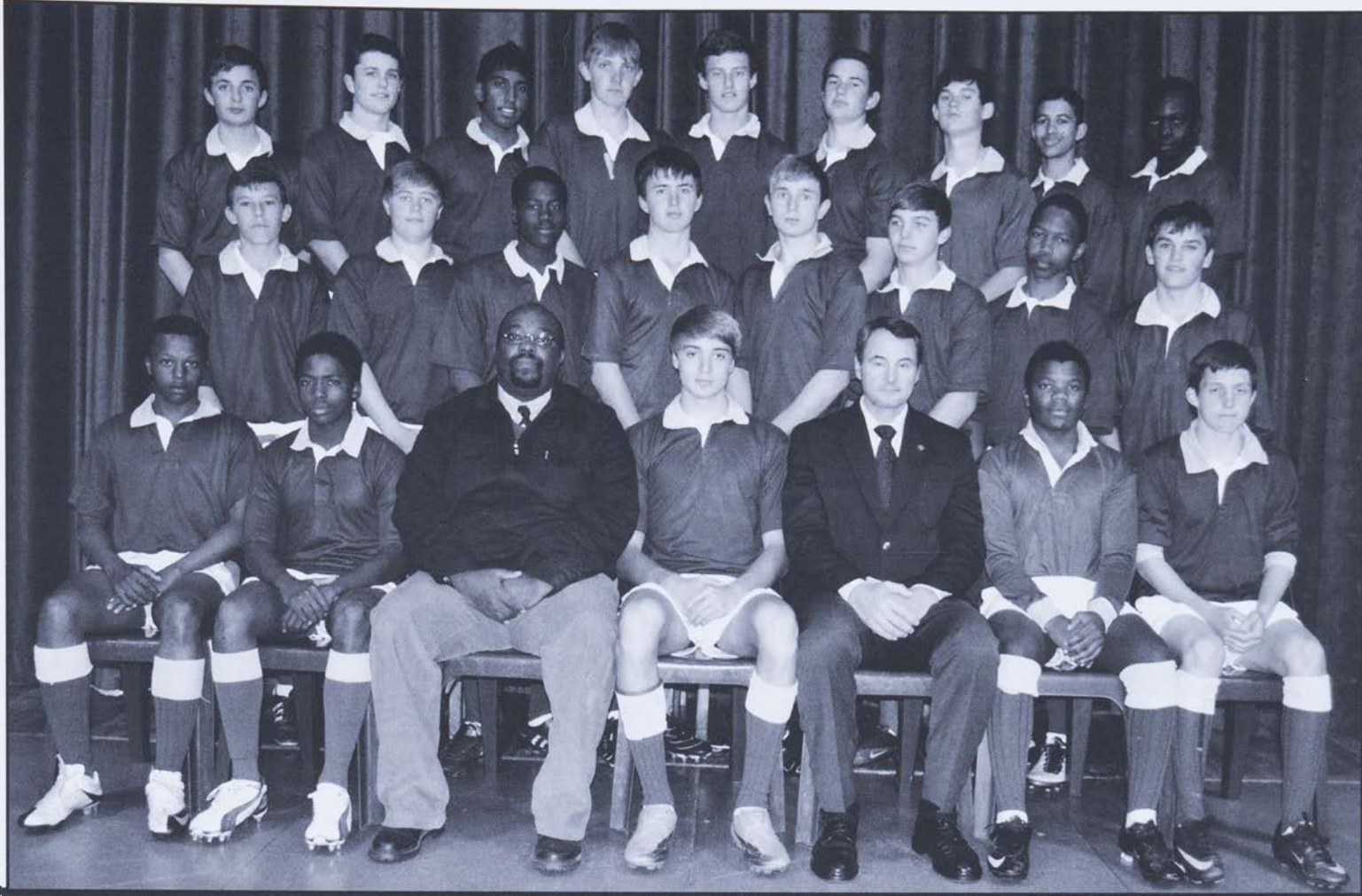

I would like to thank the coaches, Mr Khanyile and Mr Green for all their support and assistance in implementing our objectives.

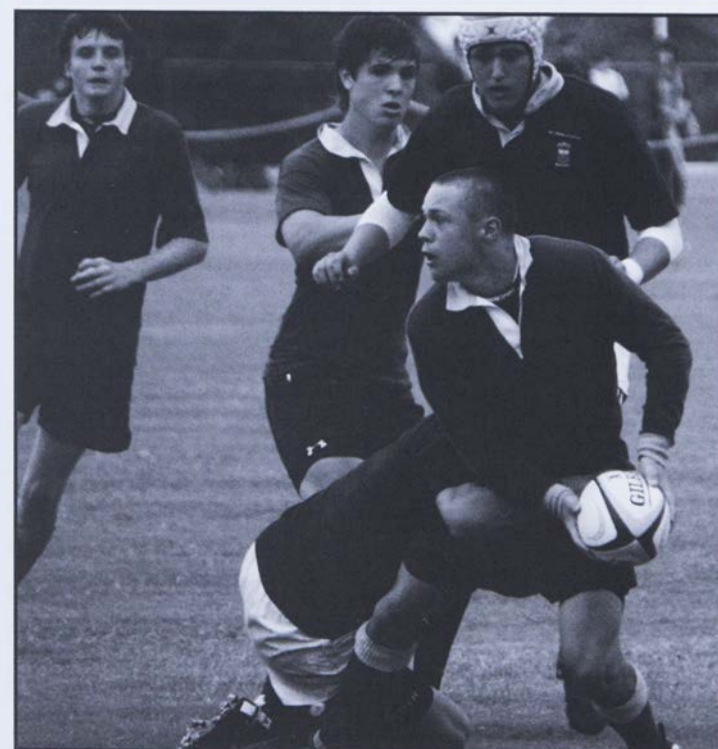

Robotics Club Report - Making Education Relevant

At the beginning of the third term in 2011, a dozen boys and three members of staff started a course in Robotics, following on from an enjoyable and successful trip to the Grahamstown Sci-Fest in May. One of the activities presented at the Sci-Fest was building robots that were later used to play a game of soccer. This experience brought enthusiastic consensus that all the boys wanted to learn more about robotics.

Michael Ettershank of Robot Science was contracted to guide us through the process of building robots. The emphasis has been to learn the whole process of building robots, not just using a kit robot and only doing the programming. The first four weeks were spent with each boy building up his own motherboard. This involved learning the art of positioning transistors, resistors and capacitors onto a board and then soldering the pieces in place. After three weeks of intense activity it was time for the big test: we connected a battery pack to the board and were given a tremendous sense of satisfaction as the LEDs (light emitting diodes) lit up.

The next step is to build the chassis and body of the robot that will house the electronic components. Finally, we will learn to program our robots to move on command from a remote control. Having mastered this, the future is beckoning and the only limitation will be the boys' imaginations.

Although this club is only in its infancy, there is a level of passion and dedication to be admired. Many of these boys spend all day at school and an afternoon playing cricket or swimming in galas before starting a two hour session of robotics. They are driven by the knowledge that robotics is the science of the future, and by learning the ropes whilst at school, they are preparing themselves for a future in the 21st century.

This has been achieved by working closely with the School and the PTA and has ultimately led to a more synergistic approach to raising funds, contributing to the Foundation and ensuring that we as an Old Boys' Association are financially viable. The School, PTA, Board and Foundation remain extremely supportive of the value that the Old Boys can add to the Marist Family and St David's in particular and their ongoing support is most certainly appreciated. In this regard I would like to personally thank Mike Greeff, Malcolm Williams, Rick Wilson, Lara Klement and Cheryl King for the effort and support they have shown towards us.

After five years as Chairman of a growing and increasingly proactive Old Boys' Association, I believe that we have managed to convince those around us that the MOBS has a far greater role to play in the overall marketing of the Foundation and the school. Essentially we understand that as an Alumni body we can and will make a far greater social and financial contribution to the school. We also understand that parents can and should be involved once their boys have left the school and as such at last year's AGM we agreed that parents can be associate members of the MOBS. Subsequent to this decision and a change in the constitution we have not actively marketed this to the parents and one of our goals for this year is to do so accordingly.

The MOBS has an association with the school that is unparalleled in that we understand its traditions, ethos and the Spirit of Marcellin Champagnat. As such, the role of the Old Boys has changed from survival and funding to that of marketing the benefits of a well balanced Catholic Education that can benefit all learners and in so doing create a sustainable solution for the future of Marist Education in South Africa. I am proud to say that even though this is a long term vision of the Old Boys, we as a committee have made great strides in ensuring that we attain this end goal. In the year since our last AGM we have accomplished the following:

- The Old Boys has again sponsored 25% of the cost of education at St David's to a son of an Old Boy from the Old Boys' Bursary Fund. The award was once again based on exceptional performance and commitment to the School.
- We participated financially to the Old Boys/70th Anniversary Weekend with a Donation of R25,000.00.
- We have contributed financially (for the first time) in support of the Old Boys' Matric Rite of Passage to the value of R21,000.00.
- We have deposited R35,000.00 into the Old Boys' Bursary Fund managed by the Foundation. The Fund has grown from R168,338.00 (2010) to R193,271.00 (2011) after awards and I believe that now is the right time to award a deserving Marist family and candidate in 2012.
- Our cash flow is positive at R 60,000.00 in the bank and our income statement and balance sheet are sound.
- We are continuing to grow our database through the efforts of the foundation office (in particular Cheryl King) and other social media networks (driven by Charlie Hodgson).

The 2010/2011 Old Boys Calendar has involved the following activities to date:

- The Cape Town/Grahamstown Old Boys' Reunions were once again very successful and attendance is growing every time we go back and show our support (Attendance - 30+ Old Boys in Grahamstown and 60+ Old Boys in Cape Town)

- PTA/Old Boys' Golf Day – oversubscribed by parents, staff and Old Boys. At least 35% of the field was made up of Old Boys. We hope to continue increasing our participation in 2012. Approximately +R120,000 was raised from this event of which we received 35% of the net profits from the PTA to fund future initiatives and we are exceptionally grateful for the PTA's support in this regard. We hope to grow our support and participation in 2012 and would like to increase the stakes in terms of fund raising for the Old Boys.
- The Old Boys' Reunion weekend in conjunction with the 70th Birthday celebrations was a huge success with Old Boys participation and support in all the activities (Dinner, School Sport and the Mass) being exceptionally well attended.
- The Matric Rite of Passage – the highlight of our calendar every year, as it is the formal induction of the Matric Group into the Old Boys' community. This was our fifth Matric Rite of Passage and every year continues to enhance our reputation as a school and fraternity that these young men want to belong to and get involved with. Once again, I would like to thank, Mike Greeff, Cheryl King, Lara Klement, Willy Castle, Malcolm Williams, Rick Wilson and staff at the Wanderers Club for making this event so special. A special thanks must be mentioned to Darrell Caister our guest speaker – who as per usual imparted the appropriate words of wisdom to these young men.
- The Old Boys UK reunion and trustees meeting (part of the UK Foundation Chapter) I believe was well attended by new Old Boys and those that have been involved from its inception.
- Hosted the 1991 matriculants at the College Pavilion for their 20 year reunion which I attended, 50% of the boys from that year attended.

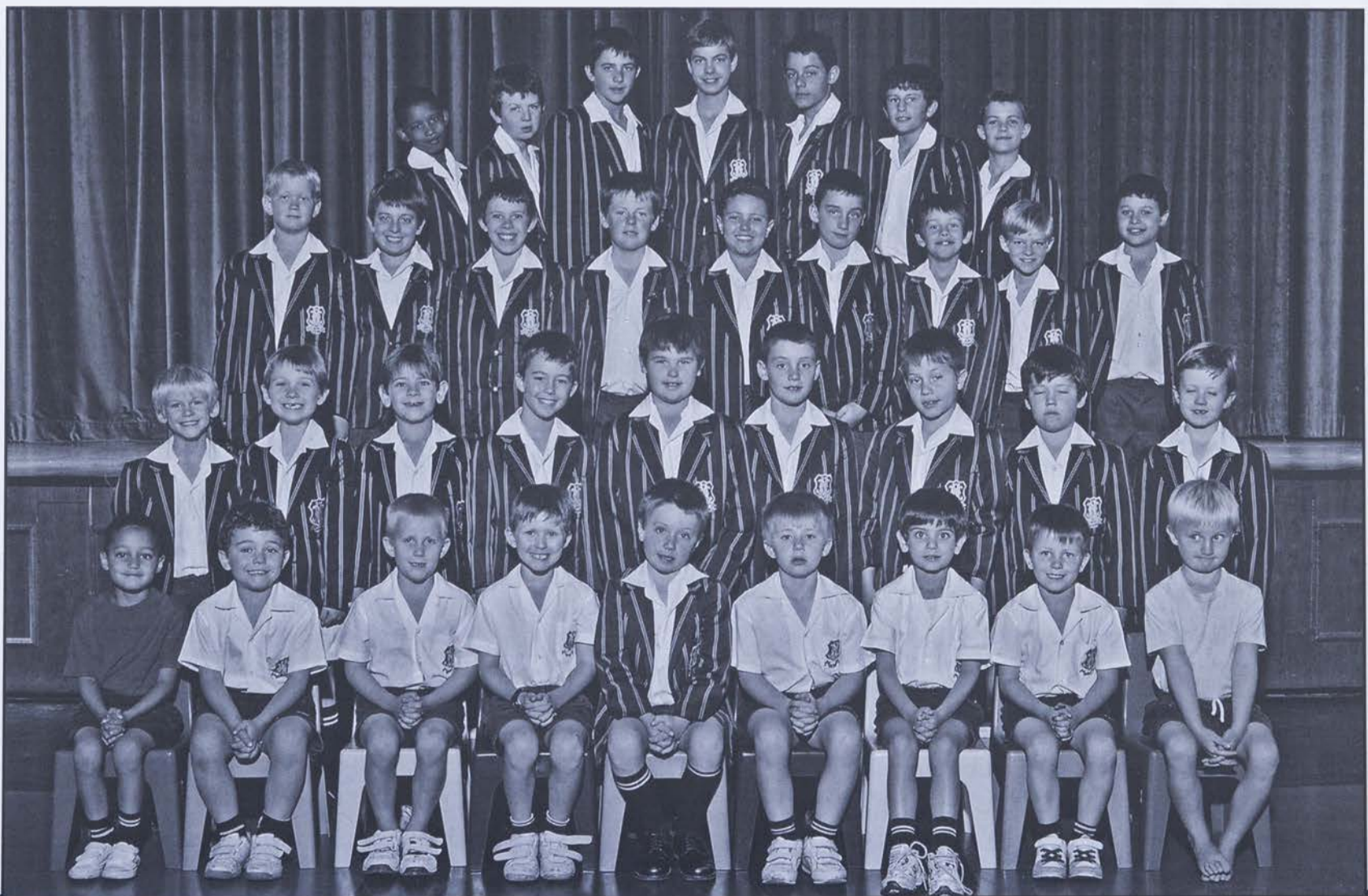
