My Dad

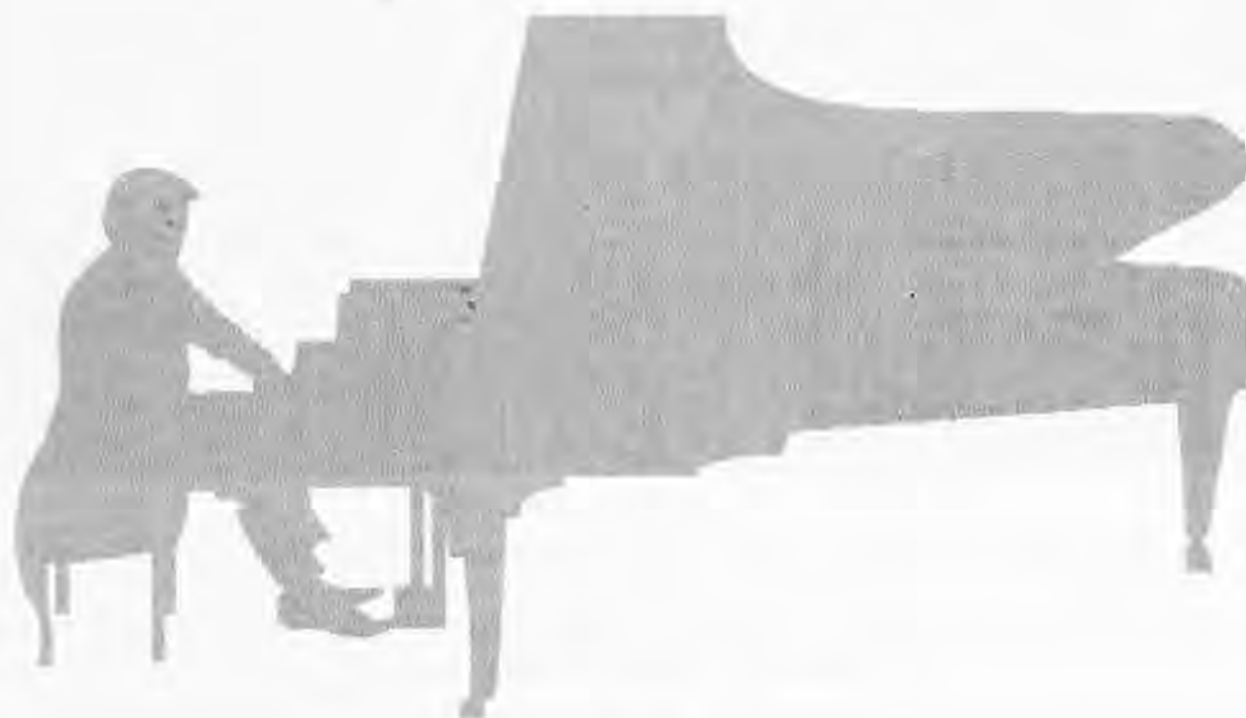
My dad is serious at work and fun at home. He loves music and enjoys being outdoors, listening to the birds in the trees.

ACTING HEADMASTER'S PRIZE-GIVING REPORT

A young mother with time on her hands between running a home and making numerous trips to school as Mom's taxi, decided she wanted to make a contribution to her community. She enrolled in a First Aid course and made rapid progress in learning to deal with all kinds of medical emergencies. The section on Cardio-Pulmonary-Resuscitation (CPR) fascinated her. Imagine her delight when driving home she saw a man lying on the pavement. Without stopping to think, she pulled to the kerb, bent over the prostrate figure and began to apply her new-found skills, thankful that at last she was able to help a heart-attack victim. Great was her surprise when a somewhat bemused "patient" looked up at her and said: "Lady, I don't know what you think you are doing, but I'm fixing drains".

There are two ways of looking at most things. The ancient Romans understood this idea when they included in their pantheon the God Janus who had two faces to his head. One face looking back, the other looking forward. We are at that time of year when something of the spirit of Janus creeps into all of us. We look back over the past year with all its victories and defeats, we analyse and examine our actions and achievements in an attempt to improve our approach and to make it more effective, but we also keep our eyes on the future as we strive to plan and prepare as best we can for what lies ahead.

Looking back over 1995, it becomes apparent that it was a watershed year in the management structures of the school. Mr Edey, with his vision and dynamism arrived and took over the helm in the College and Mr Royce who had so ably guided the Prep School with his insight and wisdom over the past six years, left to take up the Headship of St Peter's. Full credit must go to the Prep Staff who took this significant change in their stride and continued to promote the interests of our pupils and have produced outstanding academic results. To Greg and Pam we extend our sincere appreciation for the years of guidance and friendship and we give you to St Peter's conscious that their gain is our loss.

1995 saw the retirement from service of two long-serving, dedicated members of Staff, who between them, gave almost fifty years of their expertise and talents

to St David's. We pay tribute tonight to Wendy Schaafsma, Head of Junior Prep, (34 years) and Joan Kirchhoffer R.E. Co-ordinator (14 years), for the influence they exerted on the lives of a great number of our pupils and for the indelible mark they have left on our school community. May their years of retirement be filled with peace and an over-riding sense of fulfilment and contentment, secure in the knowledge that they have faithfully served he who said, "Bring the little children to me for the Kingdom of God belongs to them also".

Thank you Wendy and Joan. God bless you both.

We have also had to say goodbye to Jane Egan who left us during the third term on compassionate leave and will be taking up an appointment in the commercial world in the New Year. We wish her every blessing in her new career and thank her for her contribution to our school family.

In the Academic, Sporting and Cultural arenas, our pupils have continued to show their mettle. Every challenge that was presented to them they faced and emerged as winners both in and out of school. While time does not permit me to mention individual achievements, of the pupils, suffice it to say that our boys did us proud in the Science and Mathematics Olympiads, Choir Festivals and Literary Evenings, Public Speaking contest and Soccer tours to East London. Science and Geography exhibitions and the HSRC Standardised Test in English and Mathematics, written by the Standard 5 group have produced the best results ever attained at St David's. A number of our pupils have also been awarded provincial colours for swimming, soccer, cricket, karate and baseball.

While our pupils have done much to enhance our reputation as an academic and sporting institution, individual members of Staff have also made a contribution to the wider educational community through invitations to conduct a workshop at the ISC Primary Schools' Conference held at St Stithians; a lecture on Kumon maths to Nursery School teachers, organised the JCE Teachers' Centre. Two members of Staff completed a course and were awarded certificates in Educational Management and another an advanced course at Provincial level, in soccer and cricket coaching.

Looking to the future, we await the arrival of Rick Wilson who has been appointed to the headship of the Prep School with effect from January next

year. Mr Wilson has many years of experience as a headmaster in Botswana to his credit and we wish him and his wife Gerry, every success in their new appointment and pray that their stay with us will be a long, happy and fulfilling one.

In this time of educational uncertainty in our country, I believe that private school institutions are going to be challenged more and more by society to produce the future leaders in commerce and industry. As a Prep school, we have the awesome responsibility to society to lay a very sound foundation on which our pupils can build as they move on to the secondary and tertiary phase of their academic development. To this end, we as a Prep school commit ourselves to continue to be pro-active in our approach to making education in the Primary phase relevant and dynamic. Structures have already been implemented to increase the academic time in our school day from 50 periods to 53 periods per week. In 1997 a system of phases in the Junior Primary department will be introduced that will greatly enhance the efficacy of the method of assessing pupils' progress from Grade 1 to Standard 1. The setting of English at a Standard 5 level is imperative to ensure that academic standards in this subject are maintained at the present high level as is the case with mathematics. More work is still to be done to develop the higher cognitive skills in all subjects which have already been implemented in the Senior Primary department with the modicum of success. The appointment of a Zulu specialist next year will help us in our endeavours to upgrade the language tuition and to put it on a par with Afrikaans as a spoken, written and read language and to make it a viable subject choice.

The introduction of Craft, Design Technology, the expansion of the Computer department to increase computer literacy and the introduction of Technical Drawing at the Standard 5 level are no longer options to be debated if we, in the spirit of Marcellin Champagnat, our Founder, wish to make education, in its broadest sense, available to as wide spectrum of our youth as possible.

As we continue with our expansion programme, formulated some years ago by the Board of Governors, of creating 3 classes per standard, and the third Standard 3 class become operational in January 1996, extra classrooms and a hall are now a priority. The chapel can

no longer accommodate the whole Prep school and as a result, we have had to divide our pupils into two groups in order to celebrate mass. We are in danger of having to do the same with our weekly assembly as of next year because the hall can no longer accommodate our numbers.

All Grade "0" classes are currently excluded from these two major weekly events that bond the school together into a unity, due to lack of space. With enrollment for the Prep next year standing at 542 pupils with two more classes still to be added in 1997 and 1998 when our full quota will be in the vicinity of 590 boys, the time has come to consider seriously the establishment of a Middle school (Standards 5 - 7) in the College whereby special attention can be given to our pupils, in the most vulnerable years of their adolescence, in order to develop the emotional and spiritual components of their natures and better prepare them for life, future careers and adulthood at a time in history when society's structures are being placed under considerable pressure.

The future of St David's, as a college of academic note, is bright with hope and I am confident that, under God, the best is yet to be.

In closing, and I am aware that certain members of the Prep have been laying odds as to the length of this report, I wish to address my final remarks to the Staff.

There are those who perceive our work as being that of people who fix drains. I wish to affirm you in your profession of giving life-saving support to the pupils in your care. Your level of commitment to St David's and all that we stand for and are striving to achieve is, without parallel. The loyalty, enthusiasm and dedication you have shown in the fulfilment of your responsibilities and your endeavours to bring out and develop the best in your children, contributes immeasurably to the level of success and respect that we currently enjoy in academic circles. Your willingness to go the extra mile even at those times when your cheerfulness and good humour was stretched to the limit, makes each one of you the valued and special person you are.

Two of our teachers have been promoted to Senior positions, namely Mrs Glenda Anderson - HOD: Junior Primary and Mr Nigel Sloane - HOD Senior Primary, with effect from January 1996. Their insight, motivation and organisational skills have already been

tapped during this last term, to the benefit of the entire Prep school.

To Glenda and Nigel I extend our heartiest congratulations and to you the Staff - I salute and thank you.

The English Declamation and Afrikaans Deklamasie

Once again this year the orators of the Prep School came to the Declamation and the Deklamasie to regale, entertain, impress and inform their audience, and once again they came to surprise, astound and amaze their adjudicator.

It must really start to sound like a

cliche when I comment time after time on the high standard of the speeches heard at these events. But, year after year the boys arrive at the auditorium with their speeches clutched in sweaty little hands, often dressed up in weird and wonderful costumes, armed with bright and colourful posters and props, and with their adrenaline pumping so fast and furious that one can almost see it happening. And, year after year they really do astound us with the quality of their speeches; - the logic of the construction with strong, attention-grabbing openings, strong, memorable conclusions, not too many main points and each one well substantiated with examples and deliveries that would put many professional public speakers to shame.

In fact, this year was the first time that hardly a one of the speakers could be faulted on any of these basic points in speech making. They all came with excellently prepared speeches. We heard about the people they admire most and about their sport - and other heroes; we heard imaginative accounts of time machines, ghosts and summer holidays in far away places; we heard interesting philosophies on religion on the importance of first impressions and freedom; we listened to scientific talks on birds, decomposition and rain forests, and we

learned about historic events such as world war II.

More difficult than ever before, therefore, was deciding who was to get a gold, a silver or a bronze. As the standard of the speech construction and preparation was so uniformly high, the only way to make a distinction was to concentrate more on the delivery of the speeches. Here too the standard was exceptional this year and the adjudicator was very tempted to award gold, or at least silver, to everyone!

But, as always, a few do stand out above the rest and once again the gold winners were those who not only had a perfectly prepared speech, a next-to-perfect delivery, but also that "extra little something", that added ingredient of the unexpected, that original thought and that ingenious touch of magic. And looking at the list of gold winners this year, it is obvious that not only are the English and Afrikaans teachers acquitting themselves excellently of their duties, but the boys are enjoying the challenge as well as becoming very proficient in an art form which is without doubt one of the most vital ones in the world today.

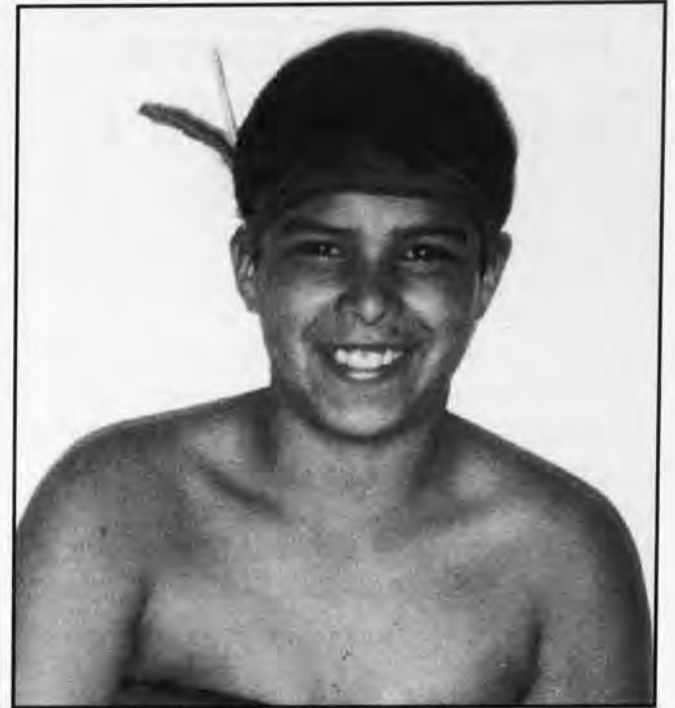

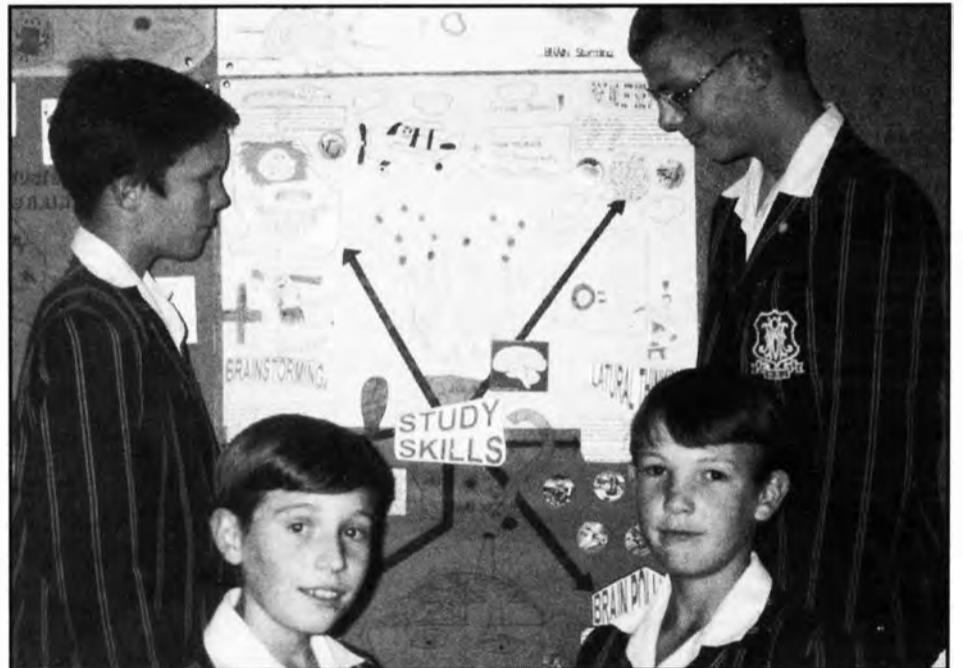

The boys were fortunate to have Lovemore Music Centre come out to the school and show the boys a number of instruments, as well as letting them 'play' them.

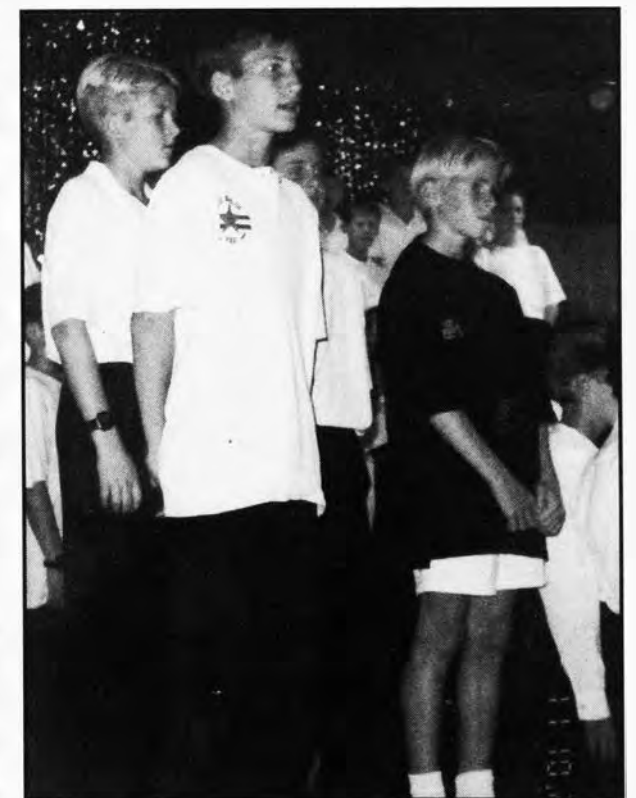
Throughout the Prep. School, music is taught in the hope that the boys will enjoy their lessons and create a love and interest in Music.

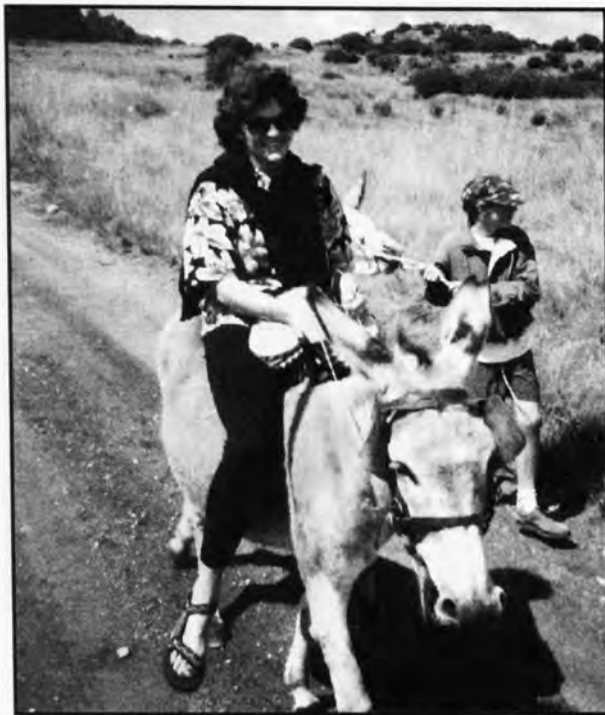

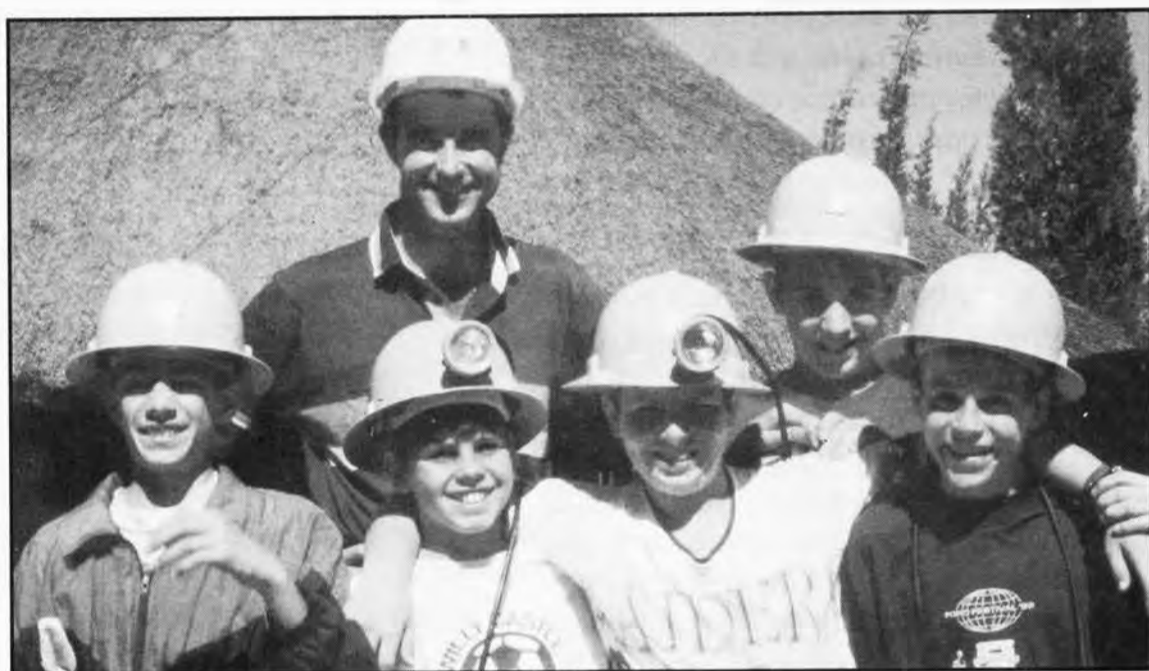

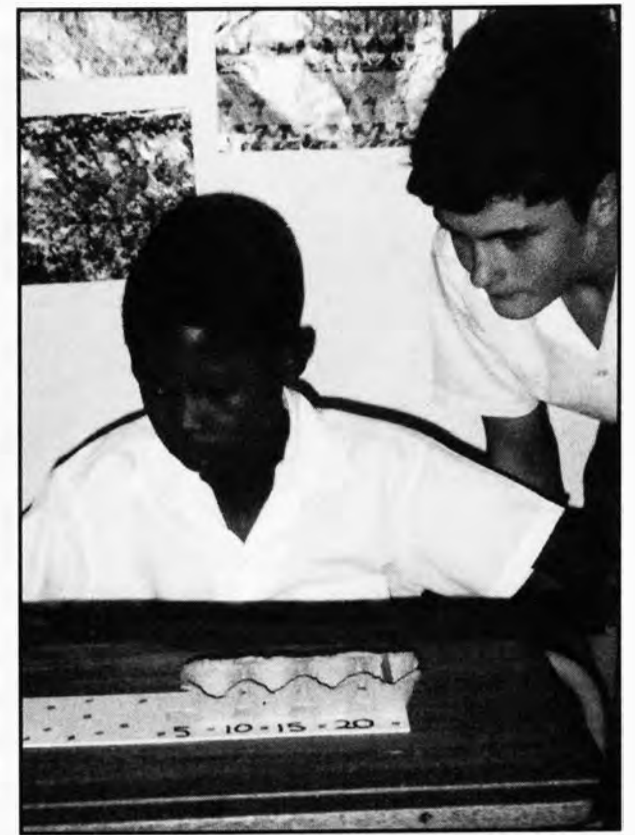

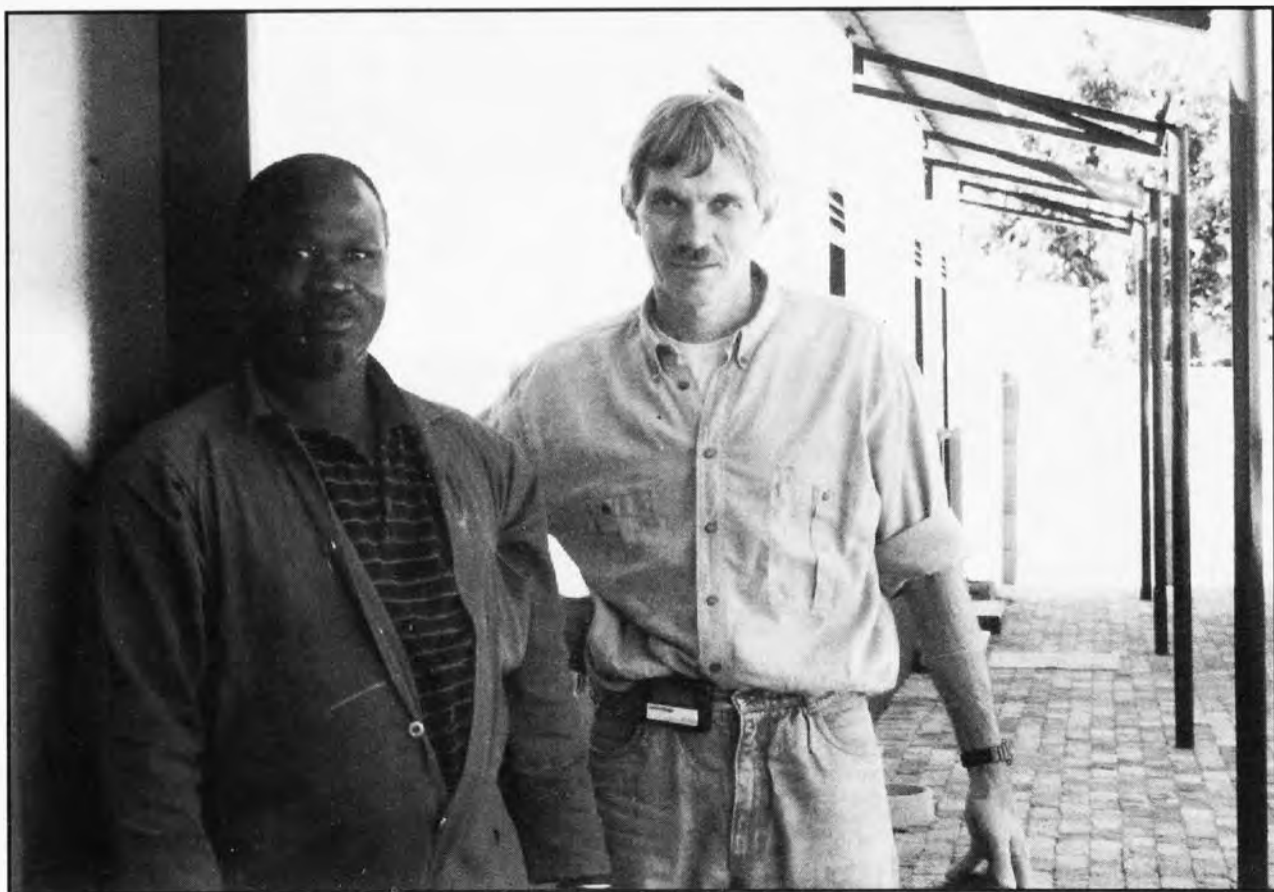
