


A MESSAGE FROM THE MARIST BROTHERS

Branding has become a very popular word in today's business world referring as it does to the promoting of a particular product or service by identifying it with a particular brand. While the five schools in South Africa that belong to the Institute of the Marist Brothers all bear Marist in their names, quite frequently those associated with a particular school are only conscious of that school and not its connection with the other four Marist schools in South Africa and even less to it being one of a family of Marist institutions in 80 countries of the world serving 700,000 young children and young people. The Marist brand is truly international.

The story of the Marist Brother in South Africa goes back to April 1867 when, at the invitation of the Catholic Bishop of Cape Town at the time, a group of five Brothers arrived in Cape Town from France to open a school for boys. Twelve years later, through dint of hard work and with the support of parents and well wishers of the time, the Brothers were able to open a school in Port Elizabeth. This was followed, five years later, by a school in Uitenhage and another five years later in 1889 by a school in Johannesburg. This process of each new establishment growing out of the support and assistance provided by the already existing schools has been the basis of the development of the Marist school network, not only in South Africa but worldwide. The schools and the facilities that are enjoyed today are the fruit of the work of the Brothers, parents and supporters who have gone before us. This support and process continues today through an annual contribution provided by each school to a central fund.

The majority of people, if not all, associated with the five Marist colleges in South Africa know that their local Marist college has a Board of Governors that has the responsibility for the promotion, maintenance and sound control and effective management of the business of the College as a Catholic school according to the principles and the tradition of the Marist Brothers. Fewer will probably be aware of other structures within which a Board of Governors operates. As guardians of the college and its mission, the Board of each college is in fact accountable in the first place to a body known as the Marist Schools Council and, through the Marist Schools Council, to the Provincial Council of the Southern African Province of the Marist Brothers.

For administrative purposes, the Marist World, spanning as it does 80 countries, is divided into "provinces" or semi-independent units, all of which fall under the General Administration of the Institute that is based in Rome. For many years South Africa was a province on its own. In 1999, however, the Brothers and their work in Angola, Malawi, Mozambique, South Africa, Zambia and Zimbabwe came together to form the new Province of Southern Africa.

At the same time, to facilitate the administration of the Marist schools in South Africa, it was decided to set up a new body within South Africa which was to be known as the Marist Schools Council and which would be composed of Brothers and lay people who had a strong association with one of the schools and its rich Marist tradition and vision of education. The Marist Schools Council has the task of promoting the development of the Marist schools within South Africa, providing guidance to the School Boards where requested or necessary and overseeing, on behalf of the Provincial Council, the functioning of the schools. Within the limits of its own authority it delegates certain powers to the school Boards to facilitate the effective functioning of the schools.

The Provincial Council of Southern Africa appoints the members of the Marist Schools Council. Its current members are Adrienne Egbers, Janice Seland, Alan Barbeau, Kevin Brewer, Iain Grieve and Glynn O'Leary and Brs Brendan O'Shea, Christopher Zimmermann, Jude Pieterse and Laurence Morrison. The Council meets three or four times a year or more frequently if needed. Meetings are held on a rotation basis in each of the Colleges to give the Council the opportunity of meeting Board members and to acquaint itself at first hand with the developments and key matters associated with each College. These meetings also give members of the Boards of Governors the opportunity to interact directly with the members of the Council.




Mr Lachlan Harris


Director. He is married to Tiziana, who is a teacher at St David's, and has two children.

and he and his wife, Debbie, have two children, with his son currently attending St David's.




Mr Mike Greeff



FOUNDATION

The St David's Marist Foundation was established in 2006, guided by the vision and values of St Marcellin Champagnat, the founder of the Marist Order in the 18th Century. St Marcellin lived through the turmoil of the French Revolution and grew to become a great educator and a humble leader, founding the Congregation of the Little Brothers of Mary, the origin of the Marist education system. He had a special place in his heart for the poor and the disadvantaged. At his death he left behind 280 Brothers and 48 schools with thousands of students. Today, St David's shares in the rich legacy of St Marcellin. It is one of hundreds of Marist schools, youth institutions and universities around the world that strive to carry on his work, and the St David's Marist Foundation aims to support St David's in this endeavour.

The Foundation is a formal extension of the work started by St Marcellin and perpetuated by the life's work of the Marist Brothers in South Africa. In 2006, the Board of Governors, under the guidance of the Brothers, recognised that in order to secure the long term sustainability of the School and in particular to provide access to Marist education for less financially privileged individuals, a fund would need to be established to support this vision, hence the establishment of the St David's Marist Foundation.

The interceding 5 years have seen many individuals, and some organisations, support this vision through financial donations, each Rand given with a generous heart and a belief that the money would be an investment in the life of a boy and in the life of the School. The Foundation reached a significant milestone in 2011 when it exceeded the R11 million mark in donations received with a further R1 million in committed pledges. This amount excludes the nearly R2 million already allocated to bursaries and scholarships, which currently supports 15 boys in the Preparatory and High School and at University.

The majority of the Foundation funds have been directed to the Endowment Fund and towards the goal of establishing a significant 'war chest'. Centaur Asset Management has invested most of this money on our behalf and between 3 and 5% of this investment has been allocated to bursaries and scholarships annually. Our investments have realised above anticipated returns, which has been encouraging given the economic climate of 2011.

The more significant growth, however, has been in that of the boys currently being supported by the Foundation. It is a privilege to be able to provide these boys, who have so much potential, with the opportunity to realise this potential and to watch them grow under the care of St David's.

The Foundation voted in a new Chairman in 2011. Robin Smith took over the reins from Thierry Dalais who has been an inspiring Chairman since the inception of the Foundation. Our deepest appreciation goes to Thierry for all he has done to help the Foundation achieve the successes to date. Our sincere thanks also to Mark Wilson, who resigned as a Trustee in 2011, for his time, energy and wisdom.

A number of events throughout 2011 aimed at acknowledging donors, and building relationships with the St David's Marist community. These events include the 70th Birthday Dinner, the Old Boys' Reunion Weekend, Old Boys' events in Johannesburg, Grahamstown, Cape Town and London, the Matric Rite of Passage and the PTA/ Old Boy's Golf Day. Special thanks to Mrs. Cheryl King for her organisation and administration of many of these events.







COURAGE, FAITH AND BELIEF

When you read the following texts: Matthew 14:22-33; Mark 6: 45-52 or John 6:15-21 you will hear the story of Jesus walking on water.

I remember my first day at school many, many years ago. My elder sister took me to school; I was so scared to be left there with people / children I did not know. The previous My clothes had been night had been most exciting. prepared and my books were beautifully covered with my name written on them. My school bag was new, as were my school uniform and shoes. However, that was not important or on my mind when I was taken to school the following day. It was the worst day of my life, and I cried a great deal. My sister, seeing what I was going through, looked at me and said with a smile, Teboho you will enjoy yourself at school with other children, nothing will happen to you and I will come and fetch you after school. I looked at her with disbelief; she smiled and kissed me on my forehead. As soon as she dropped me at school she walked back and a teacher came to fetch me and took me to my class. In the class I asked to sit next to the door so that I could go out whenever I felt unsafe or scared.

When I think about that today, I laugh at myself because there was no need for me to be scared. In fact, I was safer there than in any other place besides being at home. And I think that is what we all go through. We become scared of the unknown, especially in situations where nothing or no one will harm us. Have you been really scared in your life?

The Gospel of Matthew 14:22-33 tells us about the fear that the disciples of Jesus felt. The story indicates to us that even the disciples of Jesus were afraid to be alone they needed Christ to be their pillar and sole provider.

The story goes like this: "Then Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side of the lake, while he sent the people away. After sending the people away, he went up a hill by himself to pray.

When evening came, Jesus was there alone, and by this time the boat was far out in the lake, tossed about by the waves, because the wind was blowing against it. Between three and six o'clock in the morning Jesus came to the disciples, walking on the water. When they saw him walking on the water, they were terrified, "it is a ghost!" they said, and screamed with fear. Jesus spoke to them at once. "Courage!" he said, "It is I. Don't be afraid". Then Peter spoke up, "Lord, if it is really you, order me to come out on the water to you". "Come!" answered Jesus. So Peter got out of the boat and started walking on the water to Jesus. But when he noticed the strong wind, he was afraid and started to sink down in the water, "Save me, Lord!" he cried. At once Jesus reached out and grabbed hold of him and said, "How little faith you have! Why did you doubt?" They both got into the boat, and the wind died down. Then the disciples in the boat worshipped Jesus. "Truly you are the Son of God!" they exclaimed.

In our lives we are afraid of the unknown and sometimes we interpret life for ourselves and we are still afraid of the results. The Disciples of Christ, were afraid and Jesus seeing what was in their hearts said to them, "have courage, it is I". , Peter said "Lord if it is you order me to come out on the water to you". Even Peter, after hearing Jesus saying, "It is I", still did not believe that it was Christ, the Son of God. Are we not like Peter? Don't we always doubt Christ's existence and presence? Even though He reveals himself during Mass and Benediction, we still doubt that it is He. And when our life has disaster, turmoil or frustrations, we then ask ourselves; "where is God when it hurts?" This reminds me of a book I once read entitled; "Where is God when it hurts?" This book, written by Philip Yancy, won a Gold Medallion Award and has been an inspirational best seller for over twenty years.

Yancy consoles readers who do not see sense in life and suggests how to reach out to someone in pain even when you don't know what to say. It is a thought provoking book which helps one to accept without blame, anger or fear that which we cannot understand. We try to find God, but we cannot because of our own blindness. God is

everywhere, but we cannot see him because we are blind. And blindness makes us constantly fear the unknown.

Susan Jeffers in her book entitled; "Feel the fear and do it anyway", says fear is a feeling that comes and goes and we should approach it as a challenge because if we don't we will constantly be in fear for the rest of our lives. Going back to my story of being fearful on my first day at school: on that day there were many children at school and many were there for the first time and yet they faced the fear and did it. Again there were many others who had previously faced this same fear, and had moved on to higher grades. We all have the innate power to master our fears but we are not aware of it because it has not been realized. Once we realise this, we can conquer our fear. St. David's Marist has made me realize that the power that God gave me is and will continue to be visible. I had many questions when I first started as chaplain of this beautiful and prestigious school.

The first question I asked myself was, will I cope with the school, my two parishes, studies and sports? I prayed and I felt that God was not listening to my prayers and so I spoke to my spiritual director, who advised me not to take up the post if I was afraid. With all this, a voice inside me said, "What are you afraid of, go for it you will make it, give it all your best, remember it is I, have courage. If you fail then you will know that at least you have tried". The first few months were definitely very difficult especially travelling back and forth to and from school to parish, and delivering homilies for the boys. Difficult and challenging as it was, I managed to conquer my fear and uncertainties. Susan Jeffers taught me to accept my power (within) and be loved.

When I speak about fear it also reminds me of the group that was confirmed at Rosebank parish on the 30th of September 2011. These young men were finding it difficult to attend their extra classes, especially on Thursday mornings where Mr Pat Lenye, (RE Co-ordinator) gave them instruction for confirmation. They were scared because they did not know what was in store for them. I remember on the day of the practice they came with their godparents and parents to listen to the last instructions. They were excited that Confirmation was coming nearer and they were also afraid as to what the Archbishop would ask them. To their amazement, the evening of the 30th September was the most beautiful day of their lives. They excelled and behaved like true St. Marcellin Champagnat boys.

Two days after that, on the 2nd October 2011 we had another superb day at St. Davids chapel of Mary where our Junior Prep boys received their First Holy Communion. They too were very excited and still had that fear deep down in themselves. To be honest with you, I was also scared for them.

The service went beautifully with the professional help of Mrs Cherie Smith, their instructor. That was followed by the Valedictory Mass which was the first time I had celebrated Mass in the chapel of Mary with so many people present, especially parents and friends of the boys. I remember Mr Malcolm Williams saying to me: "these people are professionals in their fields and you are also a professional in your field and today you are going to make us proud". The butterflies in my stomach faded away for a short period of time and I took a long, deep breath. The special moment that will always remain in my mind was when the Grade 12 boys gave their mothers each a rose at the end of Mass. Well done boys!

So fear is not a word that we should be scared of but have faith, because without faith we cannot move mountains. Our faith in God and ourselves should be the driving force behind our reasoning and with that behind us we will conquer the world. We are now approaching or already in the year 2012. Let us conquer and move away from fear of the unknown. God has a plan for each one of us and, with God on our side, nothing is impossible.

I would like to thank the whole staff of St David's for their utmost and untiring support during 2011. 2011 has been a very challenging year but also a very good and exciting year. I believe that 2012, with God on our side, will be a successful year for all of us. Ora et labora.





This year has again been a good one for community service in the High School. Each boy in Grade 10, 11 and 12 is required to do a minimum of 10 hours per year so that by the end of his Matric year, the minimum 30 hours has been accomplished. A vast number of our boys have gone far beyond this and been recognised through awards. It is our aim, however, to sensitise our boys to the fact that there is no greater reward than the knowledge that they have made a difference in the life of another human being.

Community service visits, organised by the school, have included the Alexandra Soup Kitchen, Rena Le Lona in Soweto, Mother Teresa's Home in Yeoville and Headway in Hyde Park. These visits entail engagement with the community through the handing out of soup, coldrinks, bread and tins of food at the Alex Soup Kitchen, teaching computers, Maths and English to the children at the afterschool care centre of Rena Le Lona, taking sweets to and giving of time to the orphan children and babies at Mother Teresa's Home as well as assisting the patients at Headway. At the school itself the S.M.I.L.E programme continues on a Wednesday afternoon with the children from Ebony Park being tutored in English by our boys.

Fundraising and collections have been particularly successful this year. In the first term we hosted a Cansa Shavathon at the school and also manned a Shavathon station at the Norwood shopping centre on a Saturday morning. In excess of R40 000 was raised for this worthwhile cause. St David's again participated in the Jacaranda 94.2 Winter Warmer Campaign and more than 300 blankets were collected. Hundreds of food tins were collected on each of our civvies days and distributed at our Soup Kitchen as well as to the Rosebank Parish Soulprovider Programme.

Many of our boys have found their own community service activities during the holidays or over weekends. Three of our boys participated in the Marist Sacred Heart Refugee Holiday Programme in August. We are particularly grateful for the opportunity of visiting Maristcare in the Eastern Cape also over the August holidays. This visit was undertaken by eight of our Matric boys in the first week of the holidays.

We congratulate Chris Sexwale for achieving Specific Honours in the category of Community Service. He was the first boy to achieve this honour at St David's, to our knowledge, and we thank him for the example he has set for our Marist community.

St David's Service Camp 2011 Addo

In the true Marist spirit, with simplicity, humility and love of work, the few remaining Brothers do today what Champagnat did in rural France in the early 19th Century. They selflessly serve the impoverished and destitute in rural Eastern Cape.

On the first Sunday of the August holidays, a group of 11 St. David's representatives took the never ending road on a monotonous 13 hour journey to Addo. At Addo we were very generously and well hosted by Br. Christopher and the Mercy Sisters on their little property.

The objectives of our stay were: to paint the classrooms of a little school that Br. Christopher oversees, to deliver gifts from St. David's and to observe the work done by the Marist Brothers and the Mercy Sisters in the area.

Each morning began with reflection and prayer in the beautiful little chapel on the Brothers' property. Br. Christopher reminded us that Nelson Mandela said that no one is born hating another person. Mandela said that hate is learned and if we can learn to hate then we can also learn to love. Br. Christopher reminded us that education in schools and in the family is vital as it is here where children can learn to love. Br. Christopher said that our mission for the week of our visit would be to bring a little bit of joy and a little bit of hope to the people whom we would meet.

The first two days of the service camp were spent in hard but fruitful labour as the boys painted the classrooms of one of the small Catholic schools that Br. Christopher oversees.

As these two days were school holidays, the children were not at school. The task was tiring but the burden was lightened by the opportunity to observe and interact with the local children who came to play at the school. Although obviously poor and with very few material possessions, they were confident and friendly and they live an enviously simple life where they are able to roam barefoot around the healthy country-side and play simple and energetic games. There was laughter and joy. Although the work of painting was long and difficult, the colourful end result brightened up the classrooms and it was rewarding to help the children who have so little to look forward to.

The third day encompassed visits to two small crèches run by two Mercy Sisters who work in conjunction with the Brothers. One of the crèches is in a poor area which is a combination of new RDP houses and old shacks. The other crèche is in an informal settlement. Both of these crèches are beautifully maintained and they provide a safe haven for the small children who would otherwise be roaming the neighbourhood, mostly unsupervised. The crèches also provide a place where the children are able to get a good meal and a good grounding for later education.

Two other schools that the Brothers supervise were also visited and soccer balls that were donated to St. David's by FNB were given to these schools. Like almost all boys around the world, the boys of this area have massive eagerness and enthusiasm for soccer but their soccer fields are in terrible condition.

On this day, a visit was also paid to the school that the St. David's boys had painted. Gifts from St. David's were handed out, new soccer balls, stationery and hundreds of worksheets that the Prep teachers had kindly donated. The beanies which the St. David's community had so generously knitted and donated were very well received.

On the fourth day of the Service Camp, we visited the impressive Brother's house in Uitenhage. Here we met Br. Claude, a French-Canadian with a wonderful sense of humour. He and Br. Christopher took us to the immensely impoverished Joe Slovo informal settlement. They gave us a guided tour and we met the people who, with the Brothers' assistance, operate a soup kitchen for the hungry people of this sad place. It was good to see how the Brothers were welcomed in this grim place and how the children flocked to Br. Claude, perhaps as the impoverished children of the French Revolution would have flocked to Marcellin Champagnat. Although these were the most shocking conditions that we witnessed, it was inspiring to see the dignity with which many of these people carried themselves. Their simple but basic goodness shone through even in the dreadful circumstances.

There was also a little bit of fun as we saw elephants, were not afraid of the lions, saw the sights of Port Elizabeth and the sea. We also saw the new Nelson Mandela stadium. We played on the children's slide and we rode in the bus.

Our challenge at St. David's is to support the Brothers and the Mercy Sisters in their wonderful work, especially as their work is so specifically Marist, as it is about providing education for the destitute.

The work that we accomplished during our week's visit was but a drop in the ocean. The struggle would appear hopeless but we are reminded by the prayer of St. Teresa of Avila that, Christ has no body now but ours, no hands, no feet on earth but ours and we are called to look upon the world with compassion.












OUTREACH TO LEROME




Visit to Lerome By: Roberto Borrageiro - 18 October 2011

Trip to Lerome









Champagnat Day





"I have a dream..."

I wonder how many of us know more than those four immortal words from a speech which was delivered on the steps at the Lincoln Memorial in Washington D.C. on August 28, 1963? In this day and age: I wonder how many young adults or school children even know who delivered what must rank amongst the most powerful speeches in history?

Of course, Martin Luther King spoke those words and they have resonated ever since. What started off as one man's fervent desire to wish for racial equality, social justice and the uplifting of the poor in the USA took on far further reaching significance across the world. It ended, with King praying for the day when the citizens of the USA could all sing out the words of the old spiritual: "Free at last, free at last. Thank God Almighty, we are free at last."

This speech became a rallying cry, a touchstone and an inspiration for millions.

I too have a dream. I am, however, just an ordinary man who is blessed by working in an extraordinary school with extraordinary people. I too have a dream, and whilst it may not be on the same scale of grandeur as the dream of Martin Luther King: it is as important to me as his dream was to him. Martin Luther King's dream was for a better future, mine is of the present. Martin Luther's dream was about the USA in particular and indirectly, the world in general. My dream is about this school. Martin Luther King's speech ultimately cost him his life – I sincerely hope that mine here tonight, will not!

I cannot help feeling a huge sense of pride in our school. One of the weekly highlights of my position is taking prospective parents around the campus, this after I have given them a thorough overview of who we are and what it is we try to accomplish with our young Marist men. I always hasten to add that I am, of course, naturally biased but that in my opinion the boys themselves are better at school marketing than I am. We then walk around and pop into classrooms and such is the spirit, friendliness and positive energy exuded by the staff and boys: that I don't have to say too much more thereafter. Yes - I am an ordinary man but I work in an extraordinary school and I - am living my dream.

When looking into the crystal ball at the future of St David's, I see the most exciting times. All too often we are measured against our main rival schools in the Northern Suburbs but I believe such comparisons are odious. We have no desire to be like anyone else, we just want to be the happiest and best St David's that we can be. When I glance back at the journey over the past 15 years, I never cease to be amazed by the development and the positive changes we have made and that by a quirk of human nature: we all too often just take for granted. Of course it takes people of action and courage to turn dreams into reality, but that is an attribute which has never been found wanting in this school.

At his Prize Giving, my colleague Malcolm Williams spoke passionately about Steve Jobs, the founding father of Apple, a man who undoubtedly had the ability to convert his dreams into reality. People like Jobs, Richard Branson and Bill Gates are quite special as they seem to have the ability, drive and focus to be able to do this on a continuous basis. They also seem to avoid having a 'mission accomplished!' mindset. For them - there are always new dreams......

I wonder how many of us have 'bucket lists' – things we'd like to do whilst we're still around? How many of us will convert those bucket lists into reality, or will they just remain fanciful thoughts? Bucket lists are like dreams. Three things on my personal bucket list include: playing a round of golf at Augusta, driving a Ferrari for a day and having Willy Castle wear a Liverpool shirt and sing, "You'll never walk alone," to me! Two of the three are possibly achievable. I think we all know which one isn't! I'm sure his response will be: 'Dream on!'

It would seem that while most people spend most of their lives struggling to earn a living, a much smaller number seem to have everything going their way. Instead of just earning a living, the smaller group is busily working at building and enjoying a fortune and a future. Everything just seems to work out for them. And here sits the much larger group, wondering how life can be so unfair, so complicated and unjust. What's the major difference

between the little group with so much and the larger group with so little? Despite all of the factors that affect our lives, like the kind of parents we have, the schools we attended, the part of the country we grew up in, none of these factors has as much potential power for affecting our futures as our ability to dream. The smaller successful group have learned how to convert those dreams into reality.

Dreams are a projection of the kind of life you want to lead. Dreams can drive you. They can make you skip over obstacles. When you allow your dreams to pull you along, they unleash a creative force that can overpower any obstacle in your path. To unleash this power, though, your dreams must be well defined. A fuzzy future has little pulling power. Well-defined dreams are not fuzzy - wishes are fuzzy. To really achieve your dreams, to really have your future plans pull you forward, your dreams must be vivid.

We've all got to be dreamers: parents, teachers and you my boys. We've got to learn to envision the desired future. We've got to see the summit while we're in dark valleys. We've got to see the finish line while we're running the race. We've got to hear the cheers of success when we're in the middle of a mammoth project, and we've got to be willing to put ourselves through the paces of doing the uncomfortable until it becomes comfortable, because that's how you realize your dreams.

A couple of weeks ago, we took the Grade 7 group aside and outlined what was going to happen over their last few weeks in the school and also what our expectations of them were going to be. We also emphasised that as Grade 7 year groups go: theirs has been one of the finest in recent years. This group of young men have given much to their school and in the process achieved much. Their accomplishments in the fields of academics, sport and cultural pursuits are praiseworthy. They are the winners of 7 academic scholarships to high schools including our own and they have 17 Area or Provincial sportsmen in their ranks. Matthew Roos and Rowan Mockler also served the Mini City Council with distinction.

More than that however, these boys have conducted themselves in a manner befitting of St David's boys and we are justifiably proud of them. Whilst they have already achieved much, the bigger part of their lives still lies ahead. I dare these competent boys to be dreamers; I challenge them to strive to fulfil their dreams.

I would like our Grade 7's in particular, to listen to the following true story for it beautifully highlights what it is I am trying to convey to you:

One rainy afternoon, an outwardly unremarkable 15 year old boy named John Goddard sat down at his kitchen table. He couldn't go outside to play with his friends because of the weather. He was bored, so he found a writing pad and wrote at the top "My life list."

Under that heading, there were eleven different categories and under those categories he wrote 127 goals – things he would like to do in his life. Some were quite straightforward to achieve – others were hugely ambitious.

These are a few he wanted to:

Explore: The 8 major rivers of the world

including the Amazon, Nile and Yangtzi.

Climb: The world's 15 greatest mountains.

Visit: Every country in the world

(there are 203 and at the last count he

had 4 to go!).

Learn: to fly a plane.

Make: a career as a doctor in medicine and

as an explorer.

Photograph: nature's most beautiful sights around

the world.

Explore: the 10 greatest underwater sites

in the world.

Visit: the most amazing wonders of the world

Taj Mahal, Ayer's Rock, Easter Islands,

and the North and South Poles. The world's 6 greatest lakes.

He also wanted to accomplish the following:

• Dive in a submarine,

Swim in:

- Land and take off from an aircraft carrier,
- Ride an elephant, camel and an ostrich.
- Fly in an airship, glider and hot air balloon.
- Do a parachute jump.
- Learn to play flute and violin,
- Photograph all the great beasts of the world including whales.
- Star in a Tarzan movie.
- Read the entire Encyclopaedia Britannica (over 10 thousand pages!)
- Sail around the world (which he has done 4 times)
- Visit the moon.

.....and so on!

John Goddard is now 86 years old and has achieved 114 of his 127 childhood goals. He hasn't been to the moon, or starred in a Tarzan movie, but some of the other goals, which you and I would not even dream of attempting – he has accomplished. His person motto is: "To dare - is to do, to fear - is to fail."

Why do I tell you this story? For two reasons: I personally found it fascinating! I'm one of those people who watch the Comrades Marathon or Argus Cycle Tour on television

and then say to myself "Hmmm... I'd like to try that!" but I NEVER even make a start at doing so! (Maybe I am more ordinary than I would care to admit?) I wonder how many of us harbour those secret goals and dreams but don't write them down, or even take the first step in trying to accomplish them?

The real reason I tell this story though is that I hope that you, the boys in front of me, especially the Grade 7's, will not be afraid to try and 'live your dreams.' Boys, if you want to do anything in life — don't be afraid to try. The biggest mistake we all make is thinking of reasons why we can't do things, instead of working out how we CAN actually do them.

I hope you all have BIG dreams and that you possess the fortitude to make many of them come true!

Yes, I am living my dream in a school which has achieved so much in the past year. As you are aware, 2011 is our school's 70th year of existence. To celebrate this milestone we put on a drama production celebrating those 7 decades through song and commentary. Every boy from Grade 4 – 7 had a part.

Our academic results have once again been impressive and in the National AMESA JET Maths challenge Jared Land was the only child in the country to achieve 100%. Our sporting results on the whole have also been pleasing. Our Tennis players won the Sun City Inter-schools Championships for the 4th time in succession and our canoeists retained their South African Primary Schools Sprint Championship for the second successive year.

Our depth in swimming was once again evident as our 'A' team were victorious in the season ending Prestige Gala for a record 13th consecutive time and by a record margin of 58 points. They remain unbeaten in any gala for the same period of time – 13 years! Our 'B' team too won their section of the Prestige by 52 points.

Our sporting win rate overall this year is greater than The Springboks, Proteas or Bafana Bafana and certainly greater than the current Liverpool team – which might not be saying much!

To my staff, I once again thank you for your hard work this year, for your investment in the boys and for being a teacher in this school. By your collective, herculean efforts, you make my job easier and so much more enjoyable. Tonight, we bid farewell to Mrs Clare Hedding who is retiring, Mr Page who is relocating to the Cape and Miss Kirsty van der Westhuizen who has been appointed as Head of Music at St Peter's in Nelspruit. We thank each

one of them for their dedication and input into our school. I especially thank Mr Page for acceding to hand out our special prizes tonight.

To Mr Greeff, Mr Williams, the Board and my long suffering wife Gerry - I thank you for your wise counsel and unstinting support.

To you, the parents, who so willingly support us in terms of time and contribution to our Outreach programmes, thank you. You are making a huge difference in the lives of the less fortunate and in so doing you are demonstrating to your sons the importance of having a philanthropic attitude in life.

And finally, to you the young men of the Prep school – thank you for being the boys you are. Your value to this school lies far beyond your academic, sporting or cultural achievements. Your value lies in your uniqueness, your spirit, your love of life and the zest you bring here each day. Remain the fine young men you are and have BIG dreams.

I usually end my speech with an Irish Blessing, but tonight I ask your indulgence as I deviate slightly. An Irishman named Muldoon lived alone in the countryside with only a pet dog named Rooney for company. One day Rooney passed away, and Muldoon went to the parish priest and asked, "Father, my dog is dead, could ya' be saying' a Mass for the poor creature?"

Father Patrick replied, "I'm afraid not; we cannot have services for an animal in our church, but there are some Baptists down the lane, and there's no telling what they believe. Maybe they'll do something for the creature." Muldoon said, "I'll go right away Father. Do ya think EUR 50 000 is enough to donate to them for the service?" Father Patrick exclaimed, "Begorragh! Why didn't ya tell me the dog was Catholic?"

I have a dream and a prayer that next year will be even better and even happier than this wonderful year has been.

When I was Younger


